It has been an incredibly dry start to 2019 with little sign of winter; however, farmers have continued with their seeding programme in the hope that rain is just around the corner.

The Community Cropping group have seeded their fifth crop, with barley once again being the grain of choice. This will be an exciting season for the group as with only two more payments on the land they will have full ownership in February 2020.

Like so many of our community achievements, the cropping programme pivots around the generosity

of volunteers and the grasping of a moment in time for plant, equipment and manpower to come together. As in previous years Afgri were supplying a demonstration rig however, an opportunistic sale put paid to that; with Afgri unable to acquire more machinery in the short term Royce Taylor and his team came in to seed the crop with the Bairstow family undertaking the spraying.

The Community Cropping group are on the lookout for another parcel of land to add to their 118ha; if you would like to have a chat to anyone about this call John O'Neill or Royce Taylor.

Let the Kids Play

Well it's been a long wait but we finally have a playground at the Lake Grace Sporting Precinct. A huge thank you to all who have helped with this project. I know the children of the Lake Grace community and many visitors will get hours and hours of fun out of this new playground.

Thanks to Amanda Trevenen for her excellent grant writing skills. Amanda submitted an application last September to CBH Group's Grass Fund and was successful in securing a \$10,300 grant towards a playground for the Lake Grace Sporting Precinct playground project.

Once this funding was secured Amanda and myself started searching for an appropriate playground that would fit in the play area, while being suitable for a range of ages and within our limited budget. Sounds easy, but this was harder than I first imagined. Many hours were spent searching websites, playground suppliers product ranges and liaising with different supplies to find something appropriate. There are some fantastic playground designs and ideas out there, but the price tags on them is mind blowing in some instances.

After obtaining numerous design ideas and quotes from many different supplies we settled with a design from a Perth based supplier Playmaster. While slightly above our budget the Lake Grace Winter Sports committee helped cover the minor cost over and above the grant money and we placed the order just before Christmas after the concept plan was approved at the December 2018 shire meeting.

A big shout out to Lake Grace Transport who transported the playground from Perth to Lake Grace at no cost. This donation of your service to this project was greatly appreciated.

A huge thank you must go the team of volunteers that

braved the freezing cold conditions on Saturday 18th and Sunday 19th of May to put the playground together. Thank you to Chris Trevenen, Andrew Lewis, Geoffrey Desmond, Brendan Desmond, George Chircop, Tai Bell and Aaron Carruthers for taking the time on your weekend to put the playground together. Thanks also must go to Lisa O'Neill and Debbie Carruthers who along with myself provided the team with some food and drinks to keep them going.

The final step is to get some additional sand added to the sandpit which will hopefully happen shortly, once the Shire can fit this into their works schedule. When complete the plastic tape will be removed and the playground will be ready for the kids.

Michael's Tribute to Richard

Richard grew up on our farm at Tarin Rock where we all shared some of our best years together.

As Richard was the youngest of our tribe, whenever we went anywhere, he was privileged and always got the front seat, while the rest of us had to stack into the back seat.

When Richard started school, both Peter and I were sent away to boarding school at Aquinas so we only saw him during school holidays.

Richard attended the Lake Grace District High School up to Year 8, then he went to Northam Senior High School to finish his education.

He boarded at the Boys Hostel. At that time, I was courting my wife Alex. Her mother worked at the Boys Hostel and of course, Richard always got extra treats from her.

While he was at Northam, at the athletics carnival he





blitzed the school mile by a large margin in a pretty good time, with no training. When he left school I tried to encourage him to take up distance running but life was too good for that.

After finishing school, Richard worked in various jobs around the State including working on farms, shearing and working for the local builder. In his travels around the state, he landed in Darwin and went down to the wharf where he approached a prawn trawler and asked if he could go out with them - he said that he would work for nothing - just for the experience. They took him on and were out to sea for 2 weeks. They gave him the traditional new boy baptism by throwing him to the sharks – they rejected him (because they were baby sharks). Richard said they ate more chicken and steak than fish. They did pay him when they returned to Darwin because he was a great worker and a great mate.

When the Vietnam conscription was coming up, Richard and a mate wanted to sign up and the army said "You're trying to get in but most guys were trying to get out of conscription." They told them to wait for the birth dates to come up - he missed out by one day.

Richard was a natural at every sport he played especially footy, tennis and golf.

He was an avid member of the Lake Grace hot rod club, racing various cars and his Super Mod 7.

During his younger years at Lake Grace he participated in a fundraising event, a walkathon from Lake Grace to Kukerin, a distance of 40 kilometres. After walking the first few kilometres, he couldn't be bothered walking any further, so he ran the rest of the way, arriving hours before anybody else. On another occasion, he ran up Bluff Knoll in a very good time.

His shearing earned him enough money to lease an 800acre block on the edge of the town where he ran a few sheep. Later, Richard purchased this block. Eventually he sold about 400 acres of the salt affected land, (to a person who wanted to run goats), for the same price as he had originally purchased the whole

800 acres. Most enterprising!

He fell in love with and married Corrine and they had two lovely daughters, Kathryn and Hayley.

With his shearing income and selling the rest of the land, they purchased a run-down CP block east of Newdegate and developed it. Later on, he was granted an additional CP block next door and developed that into a viable farm.

He sold the Newdegate property and bought another one closer to Lake Grace

During his farming years Richard was a keen member of the Kukerin Pistol Club

In 1993, they sold the Lake Grace farm and moved to Perth. After a while in the city, investigating various business opportunities and he and Corrine settled on opening a Surf shop at the new Joondalup shopping centre. It was truly a most successful family business where Richard, Corrine, Kathryn and Haley worked.

Needing a hobby, Richard purchased a Austin Healey 3000 joined the Austin Healey Car Club.

While still running the Surf shop, they purchased a 5acre block at Yallingup Siding and built a beautiful

home to which they would retire.

When the shopping centre was being redeveloped in 2013, Richard and Corrine quit the shop and moved to Dunsborough.

The story is important, but more important is the wonderful gentleman called Richard.

He was a combination of all the finest qualities which he inherited from our Mother and Father. He adopted all the best attributes from his big brothers and sisters to be this beautiful, gentle soul – who was kind, generous, loving, great mate and every one's friend. He found a soul-mate in Corrine and together they passed onto Kathryn and Hayley their finest characteristics.

We will all remember Richard as one of God's gentlemen.

Aiming For Awesome

With fortieth birthdays on a distant horizon, Senior Constable Fiona Main and her friend Ian were discussing last year what to do to celebrate the occasion. Although two years away they both wanted to plan something that was different and amazing and not centred around alcohol. Both Fiona and Ian are very active and threw a few ideas in the hat.

Ironically this was an alcohol fuelled discussion that Fiona thought would never come to fruition and promptly forgot about. A few weeks ago Fiona was in Perth celebrating her 39th birthday and the discussion came up again. This time Ian was quite serious and got on to making the arrangements and rallied the troops.

They decided that Everest base camp would be an amazing achievement as well as the most incredible adventure. Although Fiona had never actually done the research as to how difficult it is, she was thinking its only base camp. She has now done a bit of research, and it looks like quite a task. Fiona will be aiming to get her fitness to another level, especially climbing training.

There will be nine doing the climb as part of a group called G Adventures. G Adventures supply the accommodation and Sherpas to carry their main luggage (Fiona hopes they have donkeys or yaks to help with that) throughout the 14 day hike. The adventurers will have to carry about 10kg individually including water and any supplies.

The nine taking part are based between Australia and Ireland, a world away from Everest base camp which is situated at over 5000m in the Himalyas.

Fiona has previously done Ben Nevis (2015) in Scotland (1345 metres high) which involved climbing through four feet of snow at the top. This was difficult at the time, but for whatever reason, Fiona forgot about the pain of climbing once she reached the top. This led her to doing Ben Nevis for a second time (2017) at a warmer time of the year. Again it was very difficult, but felt like a completely different mountain without the snow.

For training Fiona has enlisted the assistance of Letisha Marshall, currently attending her morning classes. After an upcoming holiday Fiona will be upping the training. It has been suggested that she runs with a mask on to restrict the oxygen to help with acclimatisation for the altitude, so if you see her running around town with a mask on you'll know why.

With a shortage of peaks in Lake Grace Fiona will be spending a bit of time at the Stirling Ranges, she has climbed Bluff Knoll the last two weekends with the latter climb being in the wee hours of the morning, arriving in time for a spectacular sunrise. The Fitzgerald National Park is also on Fiona's climbing list.

Fiona would love to use her adventure as a fund raising tool that the community of Lake Grace could benefit from, with the climb being used as the motivator and theme for fundraising ideas and/or events. If you or your organisation have some ideas then please have a chat with Fiona or the staff at the CRC.

Already stocking over 7,000 product lines, the new shelving will increase the shelf space at the Plaza, allowing them to increase the amount of stock items that they carry.



Situational Distress – What is it?


For our small team of community educators working in the field of men's health and wellbeing, we are always challenged on what is classified as a mental illness. We realize there is a small percentage of the population who have a genetic mental illness predisposition. Situational Distress however describes a stage in our mental health and wellbeing that gives us permission to be in a space between being well and being diagnosed with a mental illness. The adoption of this language resonates with blokes and community and fosters change to take personal responsibility for our own wellbeing and health.

Our Mental Health and Wellbeing Gauge (below) shows the space (amber) that there is between being well and a mental illness diagnosis. This is a very important space, because quite often the system wants to shift us from being well straight to a mental illness diagnosis. As individuals we are born with a random capacity to handle things thrown at us in life, these situational factors can come from many places i.e. relationships, financial worries, traumatic events, physical health, pressures of what we do etc. We know that our mental health and wellbeing is a continuum and the gauge can trip from being well (green) to situational distress (amber) and to a mental illness diagnosis and back.

We say all of us will spend some time in the amber through our life (daily, yearly etc) but very few of us will end up in the red zone. The only way we get to the red zone is by being born with a mental illness (a very small percentage of the population) and/or spending too much time in the amber area (this will vary for all of us based on our individual capacity).

We must allow people to have a normal reaction to an adverse/abnormal life event (situational distress). If we recognize and acknowledge the issues causing distress and take steps to address the problems, we will then be able to back up out of the amber zone and back into the green zone.

We focus on the slogan ...before it all gets too much... Talk to a Mate!!® If mates and family members don't ask, it is difficult, even impossible, to ascertain that someone is struggling. Additionally, if issues are left unresolved (too much time is spent in the amber zone) a mental illness diagnosis and/or suicidal thinking can occur.

TRAFFIC NEWS

We had a very busy long weekend traffic-wise, including a tragic fatal crash.

At about 2.30pm on Saturday 1st June 2019 Lake Grace police were returning to Lake Grace following a traffic patrol of Pingaring, Newdegate, Lake King, Varley and Hyden when we received notification of a vehicle rollover on Lake Grace–Newdegate Road, approximately 10 kilometres west of Newdegate.

A Honda CRV carrying seven passengers - two adult males, one adult female and four children -travelling to Esperance for the long weekend crashed when the driver became distracted and drifted onto the left hand side of the road verge. The vehicle travelled 240 metres on the left hand verge before the driver over-corrected, lost control of the vehicle as it re-entered the road in a four wheel skid and pirouette, crossed to the other side of the road where it rolled once over an 18 metre distance.

Sadly a four year old female was ejected through a closed rear passenger window when the vehicle rolled and sustained injuries not compatible with life. All other passengers were injured to varying levels, however not life threatening.

Two ambulances and a fire crew were in attendance, assisting and tending to the injured.

Unfortunately it appears that few people in the vehicle were wearing seatbelts at the time of the crash nor were any child restraining devices present in the vehicle.

I would personally like to thank all the people who assisted and attended this incident, in particular the St John Ambulance volunteers from Lake Grace and Newdegate, the Voluntary Fire Brigade for assisting with the scene, medical staff at Lake Grace Hospital, and Mike and Maggie from the Lake Grace pub who assisted with the language barriers. I had several calls from local emergency service coordinators who, whilst not present in the district, still effectively coordinated the necessary resources to attend and I'd like to thank them also.

This was my first serious emergency in the Lake Grace sub-district and it was gratifying to see everyone working together competently and professionally in such a difficult situation.

Again, a reminder to all drivers who approach any emergency vehicle who are working on the side of the road with emergency lights activated: slow down to 40 kph on approach and when passing those emergency

vehicles. When I re-attended the fatal crash scene the following day with Major Crash, there were two police vehicles on both sides of the road with emergency lights flashing and still several drivers insisted on travelling at 110 kph right where we were working. Number plates were noted and registered owners will be receiving some mail.

Also, vehicles travelling with emergency lights activated on priority attending an accident are not pace cars for civilian traffic who are travelling in the same direction. Just because an ambulance is travelling at high speed to get to a critical incident doesn't mean you can do the same. We received two complaints from St John Ambulance officers en route to a fatality of people driving in this dangerous manner.

CRIME

No crime was reported this fortnight within the subdistrict or that we know about. If you see something suspicious or know of any criminal activity let us know or call Crime Stoppers. Narrogin, on the other hand, is having issues and Lake Grace Police will be assisting in their sub-district this coming week.

OPERATIONS

Operation AUSTRANS was completed on the 28th May in conjunction with two Main Roads inspectors. A total of 48 heavy vehicles were inspected, with the majority passing with flying colours. S/C MAIN and PC OATRIDGE are now all trained up and will be stopping heavy vehicles for inspections in the future.



Operation BLUESUN is completed. We should be receiving the next list of firearms checks shortly.

Thank you to our Valuable Volunteers

A fortnight ago we acknowledged National Volunteer Week (20 - 26 May 2019). Volunteers are the lifeblood of any community and without them we would lose so many services and facilities..

This year's theme " making a world of difference", reflected the incredible impact Australia's six million volunteers have had on our local communities and society overall, through their generous contribution of time, expertise and experience.

The WA Country Health Service sees first-hand how volunteers make a difference. Whether it's visiting wards and chatting with patients, hospital auxiliary raising funds for patient-centred projects and initiatives, transporting people to their appointments, or delivering meals, volunteers help WACHS provide positive patient experiences.

In 2014 the Lake Grace CRC accessed a volunteer grant to research the hours of volunteering within our community. Thirty one groups took part with each of these groups taking a long hard look at the volunteers they have, the roles that they perform and the hours they would fulfil over a calendar year. It was mind blowing to tot up those figures and arrive at 21,960 hours. As we knew at the time this wasn't the full

picture, not all community groups took part, not all volunteering is done as part of a group.

This figure wouldn't have diminished over the last five years. Those hours equated to 11 full time jobs, possibly a reason why we need to share the load as much as possible and try to work out how some volunteer roles could be amalgamated.

It is important for any group or organisation to keep a tally of their volunteers, in name and the number of hours that they do. The name can be handy for when you're looking at an individual achievements and what they have contributed to their community. The hours and numbers of volunteers within your organisations are important when applying for grant funding.

If you aren't doing any volunteering within your community ask yourself why. The benefits, not just for the community but for yourself, far outweigh the outlay of your time. Perhaps you are volunteering but are simply seeing it as part of being part of a club or organisation. There truly is a feel good from volunteering.



How's Your Bowels?

Although a vital part of the digestive tract and something that you might joke about with your friends and family; no one really likes to talk about their bowels. Having said that the most common conversation you have whilst in hospital will revolve around them. Bowel Cancer Australia is keen to break down the barriers and get the conversation started.

June is Bowel Cancer Awareness Month, a Bowel Cancer Australia initiative to raise awareness of **Australia's second deadliest cancer** and raise funds for the leading community-funded charity dedicated to prevention, early diagnosis, research, quality treatment and the best care for everyone affected by bowel cancer.

Bowel cancer claims the lives of 103 Australians every week (5,375 people a year) - but it's one of the most treatable types of cancer if found early.

While the risk of bowel cancer increases significantly with age, the disease doesn't discriminate, affecting men and women, young and old.

1 in 13 Australians will be diagnosed with bowel cancer in their lifetime. 15,604 Australians will be diagnosed with the disease this year. The five year survival rate for bowel cancer is 69%.

Screening, using a non-invasive test for blood in the

faeces that can be done at home, is recommended for all Australians aged 50 to 74. Known as the faecal occult blood test (FOBT), the test is only for low-risk people with no symptoms of bowel cancer. The FOBT is not for people with a family history of bowel cancer. In this case, you may need screening colonoscopies.

Currently, the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program, using FOBT, is offered free to people turning 50, 54, 58, 60, 62, 64, 66, 68, 70, 72, or 74 years of age. By 2020, all Australians aged 50 to 74 will be offered the test free every two years. Now you may have preferred something else for your birthday, but this may be the best present you every received.

Symptoms of bowel cancer include:

- change in bowel habit with diarrhoea, constipation or the feeling of incomplete emptying
- thin bowel movements
- blood in the stools
- abdominal pain, bloating or cramping
- anal or rectal pain
- a lump in the anus or rectum
- weight loss
- fatigue
- unexplained anaemia.

'If in Doubt Leave it Out'

What's Recyclable What's Not!

Acceptable Items



Plastic bottles- without lids, newspaper, cardboard (clean), paper grocery bags, egg cartons, magazines, junk mail, stationery and envelopes, glass bottles and jars, milk & juice cartons, aluminium/tin cans, foil, trays, all plastic food containers, empty aluminium cans.

Unacceptable Items



Plastic wrap, plastic bags, coffee cups, fast food wrappers, paper plates, soiled paper, paper towels, napkins, light bulbs, food waste, cups, plates, wine and drinking glasses, batteries, green waste, shredded paper.

Specific materials which may have questions about them include 'If in doubt leave it out':

Aerosols – although the instructions on current education materials say that empty aerosols are permissible for recycling bins, many aren't. Aerosols have caused 5 small explosions in the compactor of one of the MRF Operators over the last year. There is also the concern that people are putting all types of aerosol into the recycling bin, including butane canisters which are potentially extremely hazardous. Therefore it is recommended that people do not put their aerosols in the recycling bin, instead they take them to one of the 13 Household Hazardous Waste facilities throughout WA.

Coffee cups – although a similar material to milk cartons, coffee cups are not recyclable through kerbside collections because of their shape (they would not be sorted by the sorting screen). Also these materials would represent a contaminate in the cardboard stream.

UHT Milk containers – if silver lined, are not recyclable through the kerbside system. These materials are composite packaging. Normal milk cartons which do not have a silver lining are acceptable in the kerbside recycling bin.

Take away food containers – yes if they're clean.

Meat trays – no, currently it is too confusing to know what the material is therefore if it is or is not recyclable.

Plastic containers 1 – 7, all are recyclable. What isn't recyclable is flexible plastic or polystyrene.

Shredded paper – should not be in the recycling bin as shredded paper is too small to be captured and it contaminates the glass stream.



Australia Ahead of the Renewable Energy Pack

An exciting new piece of research claims that Australia is installing renewable energy faster than any other country – and on top of that, the government recently announced they are taking even more steps to reduce their national carbon footprint by planting one billion trees by 2050.

The research, which was conducted by The Australian National University (ANU), found that Australia is installing renewable power per person each year faster than any other country, which is putting it on track to meet its entire Paris Agreement emissions reduction targets 5 years early. If the nation continues at its current pace, it is likely to be powered by 100% renewable power sources by 2032.

Lead researcher Professor Andrew Blakers said Australia was installing renewable power per capita several times faster than the European Union, Japan, China and the United States, based on preliminary data available for installations globally last year.

"The installation of renewables in Australia last year really ramped up compared to these other major economies, and we expect that trend to continue this year and beyond," said Professor Blakers. "The electricity sector is on track to deliver Australia's entire Paris emissions reduction targets five years early, in

2025 – without the need for any creative accounting.

"Australia is on track to reach 50 per cent renewable electricity in 2024 and 100 per cent by 2032. The Australian renewable energy experience offers real hope for rapid global emissions reductions to preserve a living planet," he added.

Co-researcher Dr Matthew Stocks said the net cost of achieving the 2030 carbon emission targets set in the Paris Agreement would be zero because expensive fossil fuels were being replaced by cheaper renewables.

Meanwhile, the Australian government just announced the launch of a new Regional Forestry Hubs plan to plant one billion trees by 2050. The initiative is expected to remove over 18 million tons of greenhouse gas per year and create over 1.25 million new jobs over the course of the next five years alone.

"This plan ambitiously aims to deliver a billion new trees to meet a projected quadrupling of global demand for timber products by 2050, planting the right trees, at the right scale in the right places," said Prime Minister Scott Morrison. "The end result will be better returns to business, more investment, more jobs and greater economic prosperity for Australia."



Vulnerable Consumers Lose Record Amount to Scammers

Australians who are older, Indigenous or have disability reported record losses in 2018 according to the ACCC's annual Targeting Scams report released last month.

Australians aged over 65 submitted over 26,400 reports to Scamwatch in 2018, with losses of over \$21.4 million. This represents an increase of five per cent in reports but 22 per cent in losses.

"Scammers will scour dating sites and social media for older Australians who have recently divorced or lost a long term partner, taking advantage of those who are inexperienced with these sites and may be in a vulnerable emotional state," ACCC Deputy Chair Delia Rickard said.

"Investment scams are the most financially harmful because the scammers invest time and money into convincing sales pitches, flashy websites and even glossy brochures."

Older Australians looking to grow their nest eggs but who instead get caught up in investment scams reported losses of \$7.6 million, and those misled through fake relationships reported losses of \$5.8 million to dating and romance scams.

"Scammers will start with a cold call to their victim promising low risk investments for high returns. They may spend months grooming their victims and once a victim invests, they're quickly convinced to put more and more money in. As soon as the victim tries to cash in on their investment, the scammer quickly disappears," Ms Rickard said.

Scamwatch received over 7800 reports from people with disability or who identified themselves as having a chronic illness with over \$8.7 million in losses. These Australians also reported higher losses per report to investment scams and dating and romance scams when compared with those that did not identify as having a disability or chronic illness.

Indigenous Australians also reported record losses in 2018. Scamwatch received 2434 scam reports from Indigenous people with losses exceeding \$3 million – a 79 per cent increase compared to 2017. Investment scams were the most financially harmful with \$1.1

The ACCC encourages people to visit www.scamwatch.gov.au to report scams so we can warn others about them and learn more about what to do if they're targeted by scams.

They can also follow @scamwatch_gov on Twitter and subscribe to Scamwatch radar alerts to keep up to date with advice for avoiding the latest scams affecting the community.
