Making That Cuppa Count

Over 60 people attended the Australia's Biggest Morning Tea in Lake Grace on Thursday 24th May. Held at the Lake Grace ArtSpace and hosted by Devon Stubberfield and Margaret Duckworth, chairs were at a premium as many came together to help raise funds for a worthwhile cause. Aside from the fabulous food, Margaret and Devon had a wonderful display of teapots, cups and tablecloths.

An Australia wide event, The Biggest Morning Tea is one of The Cancer Council's most popular fundraising events and the largest, most successful event of its kind in Australia. Throughout May, more than one million people came together at work, school, home and in their community to make their cups count in the fight against cancer. Last year the event raised more than \$7.7 million.

The millions of dollars raised by Australia's Biggest Morning Tea allow The Cancer Council, as the country's leading cancer charity committed to the prevention and control of the disease, to continue their research initiatives, education programs and support services for those diagnosed with cancer, their families and carers.

This is how every cuppa counts:

- \$5 can enable The Cancer Council to provide a newly diagnosed cancer patient with important support and information resources to help them through their cancer journey. Support and information services ensure that cancer patients are fully informed about their disease, understand their treatment options and are aware of the local services available to them.

Preparing a Community for Emergencies

Floods, fires, storms and other emergencies cause great damage to property and even greater economic loss for a community through damage to infrastructure, crops and livestock. Following the dramatic experience of the January 2006 flood, the Shire of Lake Grace decided to review its emergency management arrangements for the communities of Lake Grace, Newdegate, Lake King and Varley.

The Shire of Lake Grace has engaged consultant Tim Stevens of Risk Solutions to develop a locally relevant emergency risk management strategy for the four towns of the shire. Emergency Risk Management is an essential part of a community's ability to identify what risks exist within a community and how these risks should be dealt with to minimise future harm to the community.

The Shire recognises that local knowledge is critical in managing emergencies and invites community members to participate in this process. Lake Grace shire residents will soon receive a postal survey asking to give their views on emergency hazards and community emergency

management within the Shire. The survey takes approximately 10 minutes to complete and all details are confidential and anonymous. Mr Stevens will use the survey information to prioritise the issues listed by respondents and then suggest locally relevant strategies to address those issues.

The Shire will also consult with the Local Emergency Management Committee and Shire CEO Chris Jackson will speak about the project to students in Lake Grace, Newdegate and Lake King.

"Community input in this project is very important and I urge all residents to participate in the survey," Mr Jackson said. "Your assistance is appreciated and will ensure that the community has a voice in any outcomes that arise from this project."

Extra survey forms are available at the Shire office, post offices and telecentres in the shire. This project is funded by AWARE (All West Australians Reducing Emergencies), an initiative of the Fire and Emergency Services Authority of Western Australia (FESA).

\$27 Million Boost for Apprenticeships and Traineeships

Every young unemployed Western Australian will be guaranteed a training place under a new \$27 million State Government initiative which will see more than 9,000 new apprentice and trainee places over the next four years.

The initiative has been designed to alleviate the State's skill shortage and some of the workforce pressures faced by the booming building and construction, automotive, manufacturing, hospitality and resources sectors.

The training place may be an apprenticeship or traineeship, where you will need to find an employer, or another training opportunity in a TAFEWA college or registered training provider funded by the state Government.

Announcing the funding increase, the Premier said that despite the record low youth unemployment rate in WA, there were still several thousand unemployed young people who would stand to benefit from the scheme.

"We are experience unprecedented growth in WA and need thousands of new skilled workers to drive our economy," he said. "however, with a still untapped pool of potential workers currently within our State, it makes sense to offer this opportunity to these young people."

The new places will help young people move into rewarding careers and deliver skilled workers to the trades and occupations where they are needed most.

Fuel Tank Security

The theft of fuel is one of the most common types of theft on farms. The theft of fuel can vary from a nuisance factor to a substantial financial cost. With the current high price of fuel, thefts from fuel tanks on properties have escalated. Consequently, the financial losses to farmers have increased.

Locking your tanks

The first step in preventing fuel theft is to lock your fuel tank. While a determined thief can use bolt cutters, a good strong steel padlock and chain can prevent a theft. Many people make the mistake of putting a \$2 lock on a \$1,000 fuel tank. The key to the padlock should not be removable unless the padlock is closed. Ideally the fuel tank cut-off valve should be locked rather than the nozzle and hose. If there is an electrically controlled pump on the tank, make sure the control switch is located in a locked building or in the house, and that the electricity is turned off when the fuel tank is not in use.

Location of fuel tanks

Fuel theft can be reduced by properly locating storage tanks. Often the primary consideration for the location of fuel tanks is convenience. This is important but what is convenient for the resident may be equally convenient for the thief. If the tank is located above ground, and ideal placement would be where the tank is visible from the house but concealed from the roadway. Don't locate them behind sheds or silos. The further the tank is from the road the better. Most thieves will think twice about stealing when they do not have an easy escape route.

Keep the area around the pumps or tanks clear of equipment and other obstructions - don't give thieves

If there is more than one tank, they can be clustered in the same area. This will simplify observation and make it easier to fence or put alarms on the tanks if it becomes necessary.

The best location for a fuel tank is underground. Tanks are less visible and much more difficult to steal from when placed underground. However, it also adds to the installation cost and therefore may not always be practical.

If there are diesel and fuel tanks, use a colour coded system to identify the contents, rather than labeling them. Make it as difficult as possible for the thief to identify a target.

On large properties where tanks are needed to service isolated areas of the property, it is important to ensure they are kept locked and located out of sight of a public road. It is a good idea to only fill these tanks over the time they are in use, such as sowing of harvest.

Likewise, mobile tanks used to service farm machinery over busy periods also need to be locked and stored out of sight when not in use. Ideally, these tanks should be returned to the main storage area.

Security

Close and lock the valves on the on-ground and

- overhead tanks when not in use.
- Turn off power to pumps.
- Keep track of fuel purchase. Dip your tanks daily and monitor your fuel usage so that you know if there is an unexplained loss of fuel. Install a flow metre to supervise fuel use.
- Keep a book at the tank for each user to record fuel usage for various vehicles and machinery.
- It is a good idea to fence the area around the fuel tanks. Consider locating the tanks close to an outbuilding in which tools and other valuable equipment are stored, and then erecting a security fence around the entire area. Gates should also be locked with good quality padlocks and chains.

Lighting

- Security lights, if properly installed, can provide excellent low cost security for fuel tanks located within the farmhouse and yard area. To be effective, lights should be placed so that they illuminate the wider area between the house and the tanks.
- Avoid placing lights so that they shine directly on to the tank. This will cause the tank to be silhouetted and thus stand out to a passerby if your house is located close to the road.
- Also ensure that the lights do not point directly toward the house. This causes a blinding effect and makes observation of the tanks diffucult. A soft light is recommended. A bright light, although an effective illuminator of the area, provides too sharp a contrast to allow one to see into the surrounding area.
- Lights can be linked to a sensor, illuminating only with the presence of physical movement in the area or reacting to changes in light: or coming on and staying on throughout the night.

What to do if you experience theft

- Notify the Police. Many farmers fail to report fuel theft because it is difficult to tell exactly how much fuel has been stolen. However the Police would prefer to know these crimes in case there is a pattern of theft in your district.. The more information they have, the better equipped they are.
- Notify your fuel agent. Ask your agent to notify you exactly when and where your tanks are refilled.

A Second Crop of Young Australian Leaders

Motivated young Australians, aged 18 to 35 years, who are eager to take on a greater leadership role in agricultural, fisheries, forestry or rural industries, are encouraged to apply for a place on the Australian Government's next Pathways to Rural Leadership Course.

"We are helping the next generation increase their skills and knowledge to become successful leaders in today's complex rural marketplace," Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry, Sussan Ley said. "I urge young people from a variety of industries and backgrounds to apply for the course – from farm managers, fishers and foresters to Indigenous Australians, agricultural specialists and natural resource managers."

NIGHT





Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight, from midnight Friday 8th June, to midnight Friday 22nd June. Astronomy is looking UP. Never look at the Sun without a proper solar filter and preferably one that fits over the skyward end as your eyes can be quickly damaged beyond repair.

On Friday 22nd at 9:15pm, the Sun will be on the Tropic of Cancer and Earth will be at the winter solstice and the real start of winter. Also the 22nd is the shortest day of the year by a few seconds as the Sun sets around the same time on the 21st, 22nd and 23rd.

Our local Star the Sun remains in Taurus until Saturday 23^{rd} when it will rise in Gemini. The sun at Magnitude - 26.72 gives off light that takes 8.5 minutes to reach Earth. Morning twilight begins at 5:45am on Saturday morning and at 5:40am on Friday morning 22^{nd} . Evening twilight ends at 6:46pm on Saturday evening and at 6:38pm on Friday 22^{nd} . The Sun is 1.015 Astronomical Units away (1AU=149,597,870kms).

THE MOON is at <u>Perigee</u> (closest) at 363,779 kms from Earth on Wednesday 13th at 5:57am. The New Moon is at 11:03am on Friday 15th. On Wednesday 20th, the Moon will be 0.4° (close) north of the bright blue star Regulas. On Friday 22nd at 9:15pm the Moon will be at the 1st quarter phase. The Moon moves through the constellations of Aquarius at 48% on Saturday 9th, Pisces at 37% on 10th and 26% on 11th, Aries at 16% on 12th and 9% on 13th, Taurus on 14th at 3% and 0% on 15th (NM), Auriga on 16th at 1%, Gemini on 17th at 3%, Cancer on 18th at 8% and 19th at 15%, Leo on 20th at 23%, 21st at 32% and Saturday 22nd at 42%.

MERCURY in Gemini sets at 6:40pm in the evening twilight at magnitude +1.2 Saturday. On the evening of Saturday 16th, Mercury will be 0.6° south of the 1% moon and stationary. Mercury sets at 5:59pm on Friday 22nd and will be hard to view.

The very bright Venus will again be visible in daylight on Monday 18th at 45° to the north at 3:15pm at 0.6 degrees south of the 8% Moon.

VENUS in Cancer sets on Saturday at 8:19pm shining at magnitude -4.4 and will be at its Greatest Elongation east at 45° in the north/west with a 45% disc. On Wednesday 13th Venus will be 0.6° (close) to the open star cluster M44 (the beehive cluster). Venus sets on Friday 22nd at 8:36pm.

MARS in Pisces rises at 2:21am on Saturday morning at magnitude +0.8. On Monday 11th Mars will be 5°

south of the Moon. Mars rises at 2:14am on Friday 22nd in the east/north/east.

JUPITER the giant gas planet residing in the Constellation of Ophiuchus and shining at magnitude - 2.6 is still in the sky all night.

SATURN the ringed planet in the constellation of Leo at magnitude +0.5 sets at 9:51pm in the west to north/west on Saturday. Saturn will be 0.4° (close) south of the Moon on Tuesday 19th. Saturn sets at 9:05pm on Friday 22nd. Five moons may be viewed during this time with Titan the furthest away and easy.

URANUS lies in Aquarius at magnitude +5.9 and shows a blue/green disc and is in the morning sky rising at 12:03 on Saturday morning at 1.6° south of the Moon (three fingers). On Friday 22nd, it rises at 11:09pm.

NEPTUNE rises on Saturday at 10pm in Capricornus at magnitude +7.9 and shows a grey/green disc. It rises at 9:02pm on Friday 22nd.

JUPITER'S great red spot (storm), can be viewed on Saturday 9th at 8:39pm, Monday 11th at 10:16pm, Thursday 14th at 7:44pm, Saturday 16th at 9:21pm, Monday 18th at 10:58pm, Tuesday 19th at 6:49pm and Thursday 21st at 8:26pm. The red spot is in view for 1 hour and a telescope is needed.

Jupiter's moons phenomena: IO starts transit of planet at 7:24pm and the shadow follows at 7:30pm on Saturday. On Sunday at 9pm Europa disappears behind planet and reappears at 11:50pm. IO at 9:39pm on Friday 15th will move behind the disc. On Saturday 16th at 6:52pm Ganymede will start transit across planet, followed by the shadow at 7:48pm. Transit ends at 8:56pm followed by the shadow at 10:04pm. On the same night IO starts transit at 6:57pm with shadow at 7:12pm. IO's transit ends at 9:08pm and the shadow at 9:24pm. So there will be two moon's and two shadows on the Jupiter's disc. Europa will move from disc at 7:56pm and shadow at 8:36pm on Tuesday 19th. The 4 moons will be in different places on either side of Jupiter on other days and a telescope is needed. More information is available if wanted.

The Constellation Crux (Southern Cross), will be high in the sky on Friday 15th and Saturday 16th and direct south at 7pm. The bright blue main star is actually a triple star and to test your eyes, there is a small very red star just inside the second brightest blue star on the bar.

Travel Diaries

Travel excerpts from the diaries of Joe and June McEncroe and Helen and Clem Bennett

Africa and Barcelona – Feb 9th – April 11th 2007

An insight into a wonderful 61 day holiday in which we travelled through several African countries plus six days in the amazing city of Barcelona. The trip revolved around the wedding of Renae (McEncroe) to Jaco DeKlerk, her South African fiancée. An atlas may be of use to those of you who would like to know more about where our travels took us. We hope that you enjoy our recollections of this very exciting and interesting trip.

South Africa

Day 1 - An interesting start to the holiday in that to get to Johannesburg (Jo'berg) in South Africa we flew from Perth via Sydney, which extended our travel time from about 10 hours to almost 30. The flights were good and cost a lot less than going direct as we were using a Qantas "One World " arrangement. Spent one night in Jo'berg in a hotel close to the airport and met up with Chris (son of Joe and June) and his girlfriend Chelsea.

Day 2 - A short flight to Bloemfontein where we were met at the airport by Renae and Jaco. We hired a car and drove south for about three hours to his hometown of Zastron where we checked into a great B&B. After having a quick look around the town which is very scenic with a number of mountains surrounding it, we grabbed a few beers etc and then drove to Jaco's parent's farm which was about 40 minutes drive from Zastron.

The farm is situated in the Free State on the south western border of a small landlocked country called Lesotho. Even though it was good farming land and very picturesque, it was not without its problems being so close to a very poor country. Footnote: Jaco's parents Basie – his dad and Santjie – his mum have since sold the farm and moved into Zastron to retire.

We met our soon to be "in laws" including two of Jaco's three sisters - Sunette and Rennie. Rennie has two very full of life young boys. Rassie (husband of Sunette) and Uncle Korbas were also there to greet us. We were treated like royalty and could not ask for nicer people to have as family. After a great feed and the obligatory beer or two Jaco took us on a tour of the farm in the farm ute. Most of us were seated in the open back which we wouldn't get away with in WA. He took us to his farm swimming hole where we all had a swim including a bombie competition. A river (name unknown) which is a tributary of the Orange river divides the farm from Lesotho. This river can vary from docile to a raging torrent depending on the amount of rain that falls in Lesotho, which is a very mountainous country. While we were there we could see thunderstorms building over the mountains.

Had an interesting trip from the farm back to Zastron after tea when we crammed six of us into our not all that large hire car. There were a few very numb limbs when we arrived back at our B&B.

Day 3 - Sunday 11 February - The wedding

Awoke to a beautiful sunny day followed by a yummy breakfast served and prepared by our very friendly hosts. Walked to the top of a small mountain where the town dam is situated – what a great view of the town and surrounds.

Then it was off to the game park, about an hours drive

from Zastron where the wedding was to be held. The park was about 5,000 acres in area, completely enclosed by a two metre plus high fence. One of the property boundaries was a sheer rock face of approx 100 metres in height.

After lunch and a bit of a relax it was into wedding mode. June was the all purpose assistant to Renae including hairdresser. The beautiful ivory raw silk wedding dress survived the trip to its destination and looked stunning on the bride. It was only a small wedding in terms of guests but it was a wonderful day held in superb surroundings. The reception was held in the game lodge which was very tastefully decorated. The meal was great, the company was grand and all in all it was a day to remember for all who attended.

Day 4 - Up early for a game drive and could not believe how cold it was considering that SA is situated in the southern hemisphere the same as Australia. Saw plenty of animals eg springbok, wildebeest, ostrich, zebra, buffalo, plus others; including the cute little meerkats. Stopped for some morning tea including a glass or two of champagne then back to the lodge where our host/owner Hannes Calitz cooked a magnificent breakfast.

After brekky it was back into the vehicles for a journey to have lunch with Jaco's family back at the farm. Had a lovely day with them all, then sadly it was time to say our final farewells, at least until the next time.

Day 5 - Started with a walk and chance to see the animals again and then back to the lodge for another fantastic breakfast. Before leaving the park Jaco said

that we needed to have a go on the "foofie slide" – this is the Africans term for a flying fox. The slide was probably about 200 metres in length and was mainly over the water held in the park dam. Jaco, Renae, Chris and Helen all had a go and to say the landing was a bit hairy would be an understatement, real break a leg stuff. Luckily for the rest of us we ran out of time so we didn't get to have a go – how sad!!

Shortly after getting back on the road again we came to a junction where it was time to say some more farewells. Jaco, Renae, Chris and Chelsea were heading for Jo'berg and the four older ones were heading south towards Cape Town. Renae and Jaco flew to Cuba the next day to start their honeymoon and Chris and Chelsea flew to Nairobi to commence a safari thru Kenya and Tanzania. We were to meet them again in Zanzibar later in the month.

On our way to our first overnight stop at a place called Grahamstown we were able to make one last visit to Zastron where we brought some supplies and fuel and topped up our South African Rands. Grahamstown was about 400 kms from Zastron but the roads were very good and the countryside interesting. We booked into our B&B - the Stones Throw and had a chat to our hostess, Suzanne, who gave us an idea of what we should look at in and around the town. The town was more like a city as it was really quite big and was situated in amongst large green rolling hills. Its main claim to fame appeared to be that of being a university town as there were students everywhere.

Day 6 - After a beautiful brekky under a South African Lapa (like a gazebo) we headed south west towards our next destination of Knysna (pronounced ni's na) which is located at the eastern end of the famous garden route. Our journey took us around the outskirts of Port Elizabeth which looked to be a very large city and then to the famous surfing town of Jeffrey's Bay which was quite upmarket with beautiful houses, some with exquisite thatched roofs. Approximately 40 kms before Knysna we stopped at a Monkey park to see if we could learn a bit more about our ancestors. The park was quite large but with monkey proof external fences so that most of the monkeys could roam as they pleased but were fed every day. There were many species of monkey in the park eg squirrel, verdette, lima, some had long tails, others were cheeky and others just outright funny. Well worth a visit.

Arrived at our B&B on leisure island with two to three daylight hours to spare so went for a walk to have a bit of a gander. The island is located in a bay and is accessed only by a causeway that is secured by a 24/7 guard post which monitors all entries and exits.

We're not sure how we ended up in this location as the standard of housing indicated that there were some very wealthy people living on the island. Anyhow we were there for three nights and happy to make the most of it.

Day 7 - Thursday 15/2/07 - We decided to do a boat and walk tour to take in the scenery. The tour commenced with a boat trip across the bay then into

SCIENCE AND STUFF

GOLDEN SPUDS: A genetically engineered potato with golden flesh could help tackle vitamin A deficiency which causes blindness in 500,000 children worldwide each year, say researchers in Italy and Germany. Bacterial genes added to the potato enable it to make extra beta-carotene, the yellowy orange pigment in carrots that on consumption is converted into vitamin A. (PloS ONE, DOI: 10.1371/journal.pone.oooo350)

OOPS, HE DID IT AGAIN, AND AGAIN AND AGAIN: Some people have all the bad luck. Whether you call them accident -prone, or just unfortunate, there's a group of people who really do have more mishaps than others. To answer this question, Ellen Visser and colleagues at



the University Medical Center Groningen in the Netherlands analysed the results of 79 studies which examined how prone people are to having accidents. In all, the studies recorded the mishaps suffered by 147,000 people, drawn from the general population in 15 countries. Strikingly, it appears that there is a discrete group of people who suffer the most accidents: 1 in 29 people have a 50 per cent higher chance of having an accident than the rest of the population. (Accident Analysis and Prevention, DOI: 10.1016/j.aap.200609.012)

REFUGEES RISING: As many as a billion people could be homeless by 2050 through the combined effects of war and climate change, warns the UK charity Christian Aid in a report released Monday 14th based on the latest UN population and climate change figures. The impact of climate change is the great, frightening unknown, it says, noting that at present 155 million people are living uprooted by conflict, natural disasters and construction projects.

AQUARIUM FISH **'THREATEN** BIODIVERSITY': Experts warn that the millions of exotic fish imported each year are a ticking time bomb to the continent's biodiversity. They say that Australia will find it hard to protect itself unless international trade laws are reformed. Australia imports around 8 to 10 million ornamental fish each year says Professor Whittington of the University of Sydney, and they carry a "plethora of exotic pathogens and parasites recorded and not recorded". Prof Whittington said that the inspection of imported fish failed in 2003 when there was an outbreak of a viral disease from imported gourmi fish. The gourmi iridovirus killed 90 per cent of Murray cod on a farm in Victoria, fortunately the farm did not discharge its affluent into a river. (ABC Science Online)

BANGKOK WAS UNDER THE SEA: A giant oyster shell thought to be more than 5,000 years old has been found in a Bangkok suburb, supporting the theory that the Thai capital was once under the sea. About 100

pieces of 30 different types of shell were found at a building site at the Mahamakut Buddhist University in Nakhon Pathom province, which borders Bangkok to the west.

Geologist Suwat Tiyapairath said most of the shells were from molluscs, snails and blood clams, but it was a rare giant oyster shell found 10 metres beneath the ground that had his team excited. The giant oyster shell is about 20 centimetres long and 10 centimetres wide. Some of the other shells were about 2,000 years old. Geologists are confident that many parts of central Thailand, including Bangkok, were beneath the sea more than five thousand years ago. (ABC Online News)

GENOME IN THE POUCH: The most detailed draft yet of a marsupial genome reveals that they have much more sophisticated immune systems than previously assumed. The genome of the short-tailed opossum shows that marsupials had already evolved a complex immune system before they split from placental mammals 180 million years ago. (Nature, DOI: 10.1038/nature05805).

VIRUS DISASTER FOR BIRDS: Crows are associated with death, but not like this. Numbers of crows and the related blue jay in the north-eastern US are down by nearly half in some places. The cause is West Nile virus, responsible for 179 human deaths since it arrived in North America in 1999, and which is carried mainly by birds. It was known that mosquitoes that carry the virus feed heavily on certain birds, yet scientists weren't finding survivors with antibodies. This suggested they were dying, and sure enough surveys have showed abrupt declines after 1999 in titmice, wrens, chickadees and American robins; but also unexpectedly, bluebirds. This may mean that other species not in the survey are also suffering. Birds of prev are a particular worry. (Nature, DOI: 10.1038/nature05829)

SPACE VIEW SHOWS CANADA AS A LIGHTWEIGHT: When Earth's gravity fields were first mapped in the 1960's it was noticed that Canada had a lower gravity field. It was measured by two satellites called the Gravity Recovery and Climate Experiment (GRACE). It has been found that Canada's crust has not fully rebounded from the last ice age and accounts for half the affect. The half can be put down to the mantle dragging tectonic plates with it as it moves. (Science, vol316, p 881)

DID YOU KNOW: That the gas planet Saturn is lighter than water and would float if you could find an ocean large enough.

Child Care Survey

Dear Danielle.

Thank you for forwarding the results of the recent Lake Grace child care needs survey.

As you alluded to in your letter the survey certainly showed a need for after school hour's care, but did not emphasize the need for extended hours for 0-5 years.

Our mobile child care service currently services Lake Grace 3 days/week during school term time, from 8.30am – 3.30pm. This service is funded through FaCSIA; this government subsidy contributes towards the cost of operating our services, however fees need to be charged in order to meet the full cost, ensuring that the service operates on a breakeven basis.

Gnowangerup Family Support Assoc. is currently meeting the additional cost of providing an extra hour/day at Lake Grace as we are only subsidized to operate between 9am-3pm; this I feel, shows our endeavours to be flexible with each community, as well as our commitment to each district.

I note that parents would only be happy to pay between \$20-\$50 a day for full time care, GFSA charges \$3.50 per hour for a break even status.

May I suggest that your group approach both the shire and School re running after school hours care and vacation care. Katanning shire run a successful vacation care program from their recreation centre. They would certainly be worth speaking to . It would also be worth you contacting WANSLEA in Albany (Family Day Care scheme)- If you have someone within the community who would like to set up a family day care then that could cater perfectly for the longer hours needed by some families.

Thanks once again for taking the time to keep our association updated.

others, one being a young girl with her father who went for the last option. The cave was far from the worlds biggest but it certainly had a number of phenomenal features in regard to stalactites and stalagmites. Most of these we saw in the early part of the tour which must have been what you saw if you did the basic or intermediate options. After this the fun started as we were required to crawl, slide and wriggle up down and around and through the most impossibly small openings. Our guide told us that a few months earlier there was a lady who was very much kilogram challenged in the heavier sense who in spite of being advised of the extremely small openings she would encounter insisted that she would not be discriminated against and preceded on the adventure tour. Needless to say she became stuck in one of the small tunnels for around 10 hours before she could be freed. This would have been bad enough for her but there were several people in front of her that were also trapped for the same time as there was only one way in and one way out. Overall the cave was great, as was the adventure tour, but it may not be if you are claustrophobic in any way.

Day 9 - Left the lovely town of Knysna on our way to Cape Town. The route we took was initially on the N2 through the city of Mossel bay to Heidelberg. Frequently asked Questions

 Why can't broken glass be included - doesn't if get broken as it gets tipped in the truck?
 Some glass does get broken in the handling process, and it is only the larger pieces that Warren Blackwood Waste are able to retrieve, therefore the less glass that gets broken, the better. Defeinitely no precrushed glass to be put in the yellow recycling bin.

· What about lids?

Please remove small plastic lids from glass jars and discard. Small lids are not collected - larger lids on plastic containers (eg ice-cream and margarine containers) can be included.

 I have some big pieces of cardboard that won't fit in the bin, can I leave it along side the bin?
 Warren Blackwood Waste use a full automated truck to collect the material from the bins and cannot pick up anything from alongside the bins. Cardboard needs to be folded or cut to fit in the bin. This also applies at the recycling station - please do not leave any material alongside the bins.

- Is it really necessary to rinse containers? The material is sorted from a conveyor by a team of people. Imagine the smell of unrinsed containers that have been in the recycling bin for up to two weeks! They are also contending with any other unpleasant waste that shouldn't have gone into the recycling bin at all (food scraps, garden waste, dirty nappies, etc).
- Can I include all my paper?
 Newspaper, glossy marazines and leaflets, all cardboard including cereal boxes, soap powder boxes and packetaging boxes are fine. Very small pieces of paper that are impractical to handle should not be included.

Funding for Salinity Management in the Avon River Basin

A new round of the Avon Regional Salinity Tender opened this week, providing farmers and landholders with the opportunity to tender for funds to implement management practices to address dryland salinity. A total of \$350,000 is to be distributed.

The Avon Catchment Council is providing this opportunity through their Salinity Management project delivered with investment from the Australian and Western Australian Governments National Action Plan for Salinity and Water Quality.

Over 40 farmers in the region were successful in the first round of the Salinity Tender receiving funding to implement a variety of salinity management options, including planting of oil mallee, sandalwood, tagasaste and deep rooted perennial pastures.

As a result of this opportunity, landholders in the Avon River Basin have been able to improve management of high recharge landscapes, which will help reduce the occurrence of salinity and improve production.

Landholders wishing to address salinity in the valley floor or reduce recharge upslope of salinity prone areas are encouraged to submit an application. Native revegetation, tree crops, saltbush, deep rooted perennial pastures and surface water management are all eligible activities in the Salinity Tender this year.

Applications received will initially undergo a desktop assessment. Following this, site assessments will be conducted to ensure that the proposed activities of Tender bids will achieve the desired outcome of managing surface water and reducing the impacts of salinity.

Catherine von Pirch, ACC Salinity Coordinator suggests, "Salinity management techniques implemented over a large area have been shown to be more competitive than smaller plantings. The aim is to achieve significant change and improvement to the landscape with the Salinity Tender. The applicants have to be competitive and show value for money to be successful in gaining funds through this initiative."

Landholders and groups in the Avon River Basin are eligible to apply and must submit an Expression of Interest to the Avon Catchment Council by 13th July 2007.

What To Do With Uncollected Goods

It is not uncommon for businesses to have a workshop full of goods left behind by customers who have decided the items are not worth picking up or have not paid for authorised repairs.

When this occurs, businesses are forced to store the customers' goods costing them time and effort.

Consumer Protection has received a number of enquiries from local businesses ranging from mechanics, furniture repairers and storage facilities where customers have asked for goods to be repaired or stored, and have failed to ever pick them up or to pay for the goods once the work has been carried out.

If you take your car into a mechanic and ask them to fix it, you have a responsibility to pay for the work you ask them to do and the trader does not have to release the goods until payment is received.

It is important that consumers are aware that if they authorise work to be done on an item and they do not pay for and pick up the goods, the trader is within their rights to dispose of these goods and recover their money. However there is a process that must be followed before traders can dispose of the goods.

Businesses must follow a procedure set out in the Disposal of Uncollected Goods Act to allow them to

dispose of the goods lawfully. Unfortunately many businesses are not aware of these procedures and risk facing angry customers threatening action if the goods cannot be returned.

The *Disposal of Uncollected Goods Act* covers three types of goods:

- Prescribed goods includes household appliances, bikes, clothing, motor vehicle accessories and/or parts;
- Goods not prescribed and valued at \$300 or less;
- Goods not prescribed and valued at \$300 or more.

Each of these categories has a procedure for lawfully disposing of uncollected goods. If these procedures are followed and the correct forms used, potential problems in the future can be avoided, particularly if the customer turns up wanting their goods at a later date.

The department has a brochure available that clearly outlines how to dispose of uncollected goods and how to recover outstanding money.
