

Dorothy Eileen Jenks (nee Smith)

15th May 1924 - 5th June 2005

Mum was known to most as Dot. Born in Wagin to parents Colin and Keturah Smith, her siblings were Kathleen, Horace, Jack, Eva and Shirley. Mum lived on a farm north of Lake Grace, which is still in the Smith name. After attending school at North Lake Grace, Mum left to help on the farm.

In those days the oldest daughter was to stay single and look after their mother until she passed away. But along came a man to change all that, who is our father, Bill Jenks. Bill came from Tincurrin.

Mum and Dad married on the 9th of January, 1947, living in various towns until after four children - Ken, Harry, Coralee and Colin - they finally settled at 'Rocklea', North Lake Grace.

Mum worked on the farm until the boys were old enough to help. In those days, things were hard and there was not much money, so baked beans was on the menu a lot. Full of goodness, she said, but in the past few years she could not stomach them.

Mum used to play tennis at the 'Jam Patch' on Sundays in her early married life, and bowls in later life.

When we children grew up, Mum and Dad used to go travelling, only around Australia and in later life to Exmouth. They would go in April (to get some fishing in - Mum loved her fishing) and back home in September. This went on for many years.

Mum and Dad moved to the units in Lake Grace in 2001.

Seven weeks ago Mum had a fall and broke her hip. This upset her cancer. She passed away on the 5th of June 2005 at the Lake Grace Hospital.

In response to the drought in 2001/2002 the Lake Grace community needed something to lift its spirits - so the community decided to make a mosaic.

The project caught on in a big way, and the mosaic comprising more than 400 tiles has now become an impressive symbol of the ability of the community to look within and draw on the strengths of its people. Contributors include local children, adults, businesses and organizations, and the tiles depict every facet of life in the town, memorialising passed family members and pets as well as all manner of names, places and events that have local meaning.

A significant contributor to the mosaic is Sheryl Smith, whose intellectual disability has not prevented her from living a rich and included life in the town all her life. Sheryl keeps busy and is well known around town for her volunteer involvement with the Country Women's Association, Hospital Auxiliary and local Home and Community Care groups.

Sheryl's two mosaics depict a floral arrangement and an image of her home. They will be laid in the path from the AIM Hospital Museum to the Mosaic Garden Gallery. Asked how much she enjoyed working with such a big range of people on the mosaics project, Sheryl laughed and said she enjoyed it very much, and added every community should do something like this. She said it had brought together people of all ages, different interests and abilities.

LUNAR AIR PRIZE

Want \$250,000 American? Just squeeze some oxygen out of moon dirt and let NASA know how you did it. On 19th May, NASA announced the Moon Regolith Oxygen challenge. The cash goes to the first team to extract at least 5 kilograms of breathable oxygen from simulated lunar dirt, aka volcanic dust. The extractor must weigh less than 25 kilograms and the closing date is 1 June 2008

Extracting oxygen from dirt, which consists mainly of oxides of silicon, iron, calcium and magnesium, would make a lunar base less reliant on oxygen deliveries from Earth. The lunar soil simulant, known as jsc-1, came from a basaltic ash deposit near Flagstaff, Arizona. The trace elements and particle sizes found in jsc-1 are similar to those in the soil at the Apollo 14 landing site. "Moon soil and rocks are hard to get".

DIRTY SLIMY DUST

Next time astronauts go to the Moon, they'll be prepared for the dirty job ahead. Moon dust hazards include, poor visibility when landing, false instrument readings, slippery surfaces when climbing ladders, static cling on equipment, failing seals in spacesuits and sample boxes even when sealed tight, clogged equipment such as Velcro fasteners and a vacuum cleaner for cleaning off the dust, abrasion such as scratched visors and dust in boots, overheating such as batteries and health problems such as eye and lung irritation. A microscopic view shows a mixture of basalt fragments and round beads of volcanic glass welded together with rock from being bombarded for over 4 billion years.

NEW MONKEY

In Tanzania, the first African monkey discovered for 20 years, the highland mangabey, is a shy tree-dwelling monkey living in two families, in mountain ranges, about 350 kilometres apart. They have long cheek whiskers, a tall crest of hair on the head and are little bigger than their close relative the baboon. There are about 1000. (Science, vol 308, p 1161).

ECHOES OF THE TSUNAMI QUAKE

While the world was gripped with the devastation wrought by the Indian Ocean tsunami, on 26th the Sumatra-Andaman December last year, earthquake, which triggered it, was almost lost in the background. Now some astounding facts are emerging about the biggest quake to rock the Earth in the past few decades: it lasted longer, spread farther, and triggered the most distant and intense secondary quakes ever recorded. It also shook the Earth all over and our planet is still ringing from the shock. The shock also moved all the surface of the planet by at least a centimetre, though the seismic wave moved so slowly it was not noticed. (Science, vol 308, p 1127).

EARLIEST LICHEN FOSSILS FOUND

Fungi and algae first teamed up to form lichen 600

million years ago, according to newly discovered fossils from China. This makes them slightly older than the first fossils of complex soft-bodied animals, and far older than land plants. Lichens are the product of a symbiotic relationship between algae, which produce food, and fungi, which provide moisture, nutrients and a protective framework. The fossils come from south China, and were laid down in shallow seawater. (Science, vol 308, p 1017).

ASPIRIN SHOCK

Far from being a cure-all, daily low doses of aspirin in the over-70's may kill as many people through intestinal bleeding as they save from heart disease. A study modelled the impact of aspirin in a theoretical population of 20,000 men and women aged at least 70 using a new method for combining information from many small trials and population surveys. The results suggest that between 165 and 528 fewer people would die from coronary heart disease if they took low doses of aspirin, but between 86 and 238 more would die from major gastrointestinal bleeds. Overall death rates from the two causes were not significantly different. (British Medical Journal, DOI:10.1136/bmj.38476. 471088.3A).

RECORD DEFORESTATION

The Amazon rainforest is disappearing at the fastest rate for the past 10 years. Figures released by the Brazilian government on 18th May showed that 26,130 square kilometres of rainforest - an area larger than Wales - was lost between August 2003 and August 2004

WARTS-AND-ALL TRIALS

The International Committee of Medical Journal Editors has warned drug firms that to qualify for publication, clinical trials must in future be registered before they begin. The ruling, effective from 1 July, is meant to stop companies suppressing poor or adverse results. "The public deserves to know about trials that could shape the body of evidence about clinical effectiveness or adverse effects", says a statement from the New England Journal of Medicine (vol352, p 2436).

FISH ON THE MOVE AS NORTH SEA HOTS UP

Fish in the North Sea are migrating to cooler waters to escape warming seas, based on data of where fish species are in abundance, published over the last 25 years. During that time, the average temperature in the sea between the UK and Scandinavia has risen by 0.6°C. They found that 21 species of 36 had moved; 15 to cooler latitudes and six to cooler depths. On average, centres of abundance have shifted by 173 kilometres. If warming trends continue unchanged, important commercial species such as blue whiting could vanish from the North Sea by 2050.

From birth, primarily from parents. Later, parents want their values reinforced by schools

Actions speak louder than words!

Children are expert in picking the difference between what adults (especially parents and teachers) say and what they do. Developing positive values in children requires adults to be good role models.

Has your school talked with parents about values?

Research shows that relationships between schools and families could be closer - and many

schools can improve by ensuring that their values are strongly supported by their wider communities.



Changes to the Licensing System - Have Your Say

A sweeping raft of reforms aimed at saving the lives of our Learner and P-Plate drivers has just been unveiled by the WA Road Safety Council and RoadWise wants to ensure the community has its say on the package.

In all, the Council has made nine recommendations to improve driver-training and licensing which, if accepted by the State Government, will give WA one of the safest systems in the world.

Issues such as night-time driving restrictions for new drivers, carrying "peer-group" passengers in a car and 120 hours of supervised driver training have all been raised by the Council, along with stricter controls on demerit points for novice drivers.

The Road Safety Council states that young inexperienced drivers are hugely over-represented in the road toll, therefore are making these recommendations, not to make life harder, but to keep them safe.

The Council admits that some of the changes may cause inconvenience, however these changes could save the lives of up to 28 people on WA's roads each year.

These proposals will need community feedback and RoadWise wants to help ensure as many Western Australians as possible can contribute to the debate in an informed way.

Why is the Road Safety Council proposing to change the current system?

- * Novice drivers, including young drivers and all other new drivers, face a very high crash risk especially during the first 12 months of driving on a Provisional licence (otherwise known as 'P' plate).
- * In 2003, 30 per cent of drivers killed on the road were aged between 17 and 24 years, despite making up only 14 per cent of the licence holders.
- ★ 17 to 18 year olds have a crash rate up to 5 times higher than those over 19 years.

The 9 recommendations:

1. To increase the minimum number of supervised driving hours from 25 to 120 over a longer period.

Why: The minimum driving experience needed to reduce crash risk when first licensed is 120 hours. In other states, logbooks generally report between 80-150 hours of supervised driving experience. In WA the current minimum is 25 hours.

2. To specify a minimum of 6 months for the Learner Phase 2 Period.

Why: Research shows that once a learner driver reaches the minimum licensing age (17yrs) there is little incentive to stay on 'L' Plates and gain more experience. By increasing the time, it will enable a learner to have more experience in a range of driving conditions.

3. To increase the maximum time a learner can stay on their Learner's permit to 3 years.

Why: Novice drivers need to be encouraged to spend longer as supervised drivers to gain necessary experience. Currently, there is a limit of 12 months to stay on a learner's permit before the learner is required to resit the theory test.

4. To extend the Provisional (P Plate) licence period from 2 years to 3.

Why: The greatest reductions in road crashes involving young drivers occur when restrictions are imposed during the first two years. For example, the lower the Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) limit, the higher reduction of death and injury

5. To tighten the requirements for supervising drivers, especially in relation to Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) limit.

Why: Setting minimum requirements for supervisors reduces the crash risk for novice drivers.

To introduce night time driving restrictions for 'P' Plate drivers in the first 6 months.

Why: Night driving is the greatest risk for drivers under 26 years, with more than twice as many people killed between midnight and 6am on weekends as in other periods. Restrictions on P

-Plate night driving may reduce crashes by up to 60 percent during the specified period. In North America and New Zealand this strategy has been very effective where restricted hours may vary between 9pm to 6am to the most common restricted hours, midnight to 5am.

7. To limit the number of "peer group" passengers for 'P' Plate drivers in the first 6 months.

Why: The increased risk of a crash for novice drivers carrying peer group passengers is well documented. In the USA, it has been shown that young drivers lower their risk of crashing when carrying adults and/or child passengers, but increase crash risk when carrying passengers of a similar age to themselves. This is because of distractions to the driver and encouragement to take risks (for example, excessive speed or racing other vehicles).

8. To introduce a zero blood alcohol concentration for both 'L' Plate and 'P' Plate drivers.

Why: Alcohol and driving don't mix at any age group. In WA, more than 10% of P Plate drivers who crash have a Blood Alcohol Concentration (BAC) above the 0.002% currently allowed, and a greater proportion have crashes at lower BAC levels. A zero BAC level will bring WA into line with all other states except the ACT.

9. To introduce a graduated demerit point system for novice drivers and issue warning letters for unsafe driving practices.

Why: International and Australian studies have found that taking away licences, imposing demerit points and sending warning letters all reduce crashes. Drivers are more likely to comply with road laws when penalties are high enough to act as a deterrent and when they believe they will be caught if they offend. The Road Safety council fully supports a change so that, in the first year on a Provisional licence, a novice will lose their licence if they accumulate 4 demerit points. In the second year they would lose their licence after accumulating 8 points, and on the third year they will have the standard 12 points.

Hot Glue + Cardboard = ART

What art you can make with a hot glue and a cardboard. Local artists learned a whole host of skills in a fabulous cardboard construction workshop with West Australian sculptor Susan Flavell on June 4th and 5th.

Versatile and inexpensive, the cardboard construction method is relatively quick, and easy to change as the work progresses. Armed with just a Stanley knife, hot glue gun and sheets of cardboard, we made chairs, animals and abstract forms inspired by nature and microscopic creatures.

Ms Flavell gave a slide presentation of her artworks on Saturday night. Her sculptures, made from a wide variety of materials – bronze and plaster to paper and cardboard, can be seen in galleries and public art projects throughout Western Australia.

The workshop, the first of three for this year, is part of the Lake Grace Artists' Group annual program funded by Country Arts WA. Other workshops include painting and collage (July 30) and metal artwork (welding, forging and tool-making) in September.

Why Safety in Schools Week is Important



More children die from injury, than die from cancer, asthma and infectious disease combined.

Safety in Schools Week 2005 is encouraging students to be aware of hazards that may result in slips, trips and falls while staying active therefore, 'Be Active, Think Safety & Stay Healthy'.

Schools are the second most frequent site of child injury after the home.

"During the 2000/2001 financial year, there were 464 admissions to hospital of children injured at school. The majority of injuries occurred in the school playground as a result of a fall whilst children were playing." Tracey Browning, Acting Injury Prevention Coordinator said.

She went on to say that over 1400 children from the Wheatbelt region, aged 5-14 years, were admitted to hospital between 1996-2000 because of an injury.

"If the Western Australian community is going to achieve a sustainable reduction in childhood injury, a whole school approach is required. This should include school curriculum, parental, and community involvement, environmental modification and supporting policies and legislation."

The Wheatbelt region is promoting the 'Be Active, Think Safety & Stay Healthy' message during Safety in Schools week (13-17 June) by hosting a regional colouring in competition and distributing school safety audits to all primary schools across the region.

Safety in Schools Week is a joint initiative of the Department of Health, Department of Education and Training, Department of Consumer and Employment Protection (Worksafe Division) and Kidsafe WA.

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight, Friday 1st July. Remember Astronomy is looking up and never look directly at the Sun without proper equipment.

On Tuesday 21st June at 3pm, the Winter Solstice will occur, with the Sun being on the tropic of Cancer. This also makes this the shortest day of the Year at 10 hours and 13minutes at latitude 30° south.

On Sunday 26th June in the western evening sky, the three planets Mercury, Venus and Saturn will be very close together, within 1.4° of each other, in Gemini, setting around 6:50pm.

Our local star, the Sun, resides in Taurus until Wednesday 22^{nd} when it will have moved into Gemini.

The Moon, on June 21^{st,} will be 0.7° (about a small finger at arms length), of the red supergiant star, Alpha Scorpii (Antares), the heart of the Scorpion. The full Moon will occur at 12:04pm on Wednesday 22nd in Ophiuchus at magnitude-12.0. On Thursday 23rd at 8pm, the Moon will be at perigee (closest to earth), at 359,694kms. The last quarter Moon, will occur at 2:13am on Wednesday 29th at magnitude -6.0 in Pisces. The Moon will be in Virgo on 18th, Libra on 19th and 20th, Scorpius on 21st, Ophiuchus on 22nd, 23rd and 24th, Capricornus on 25th and 26th, Aquarius on 27th and 28th, Pisces on 29th and 30th and Aries on 1st July, as it rises in the afternoon sky to the evening sky, and then the morning sky.

Mercury, in Gemini at magnitude -1.3, sets on Saturday evening at 6:39pm. On Friday 24th, Mercury will be south of the bright star Pollux and also Venus ,setting at 6:44pm. Mercury, on Sunday 26th will be very close to Venus and Saturn, in <u>conjunction</u> with the three planets in a 5° circle, setting around 6:52pm. ON Friday, 1st July ,Mercury sets in Cancer at 7:07pm at magnitude 0.0.

Venus, in Gemini at magnitude -3.7, sets on Saturday evening at 6:39pm. On Sunday, 26th June, Venus will be close to Mercury, Saturn and the bright star Pollux. Venus sets on Friday, 1st July, in Cancer at 7:03pm at magnitude -4.0 and is still close to Mercury.

The red planet, Mars, in Pisces rises at 12:36am Saturday morning at magnitude 0.0. On Wednesday 22^{nd} Mars will have moved into the constellation of Cetus (the whale or sea monster). Mars, on Wednesday 29^{th} will be 2° south of the Moon (two fingers at arms length), and rises at 12:28am.

Jupiter, the giant gas planet, sets at 1:07am in Virgo at magnitude -2.2 on Saturday morning and at 12:19am on Friday 1st July and is still high in the evening sky.

The ringed planet, Saturn, sets in Gemini at 7:21pm on Saturday at magnitude +0.2. On Sunday 26th, Saturn will be in a circle with Mercury, Venus and the bright star Pollux. Saturn sets on Friday 1st July at 6:37pm at magnitude +0.2 in Cancer.

Uranus, the blue/green coloured planet in Aquarius, rises on Saturday at 10:46pm, shines at magnitude +5.7 and will be 3° north of the Moon on Monday 27th. On Friday, 1st July. Uranus rises at 9:54pm.

Neptune, the grey/green coloured planet in Capricornus, rises at 8:55pm at magnitude +7.8, and will be 5° north of the Moon on Saturday 25th (three fingers at arms length). ON Friday 1st July Neptune rises at 8:03pm.

The small distant planet Pluto, in the Constellation of Serpens Caput, is in the sky all night. Pluto is around 4,482,000,000 kms away and the light takes 250 minutes or 4hrs 16minutes to reach us.

On Tuesday, 17th May, we had a very nice circle around the Moon. This was caused by the moonlight shining through thin CH1 Cirrus cloud and ice crystals, as the humidity was 90 per cent,. If you had covered the moon with your hand you could have seen the clouds. Haloes can be coloured or white and if there is dust around they can be reddish/brown. White haloes are caused by light through ice crystals and reflection and slightly coloured through refraction with the red colour nearest the sun or moon. The colours can be repeated a few times and gradually get fainter

Public Comment Sought on Working Hours

Concern about the safety and health risks from the long hours being worked by some WA workers has led to the development and release of a draft Code of Practice for public comment.

The State Government completed a review of extended working hours in May 2004, and Consumer and Employment Protection Minister John Kobelke then asked the Commission for Occupational Safety and Health to develop the Code of Practice.

The Commission formed a tripartite working party consisting of employer and union representatives and experts in the field, chaired by WorkSafe WA Commissioner Nina Lyhne, to develop the Code of Practice.

In announcing the period of public comment, Commission Chair Tony Cooke said today that there were many issues to consider in refining and finalising the Working Hours Code of Practice.

"One of the issues workplaces must consider is maintaining safety standards and preventing incidents arising from fatigue," Mr Cooke said.

"As with other safety and health issues in the workplace, any safety and health risks arising from shift or roster arrangements and long working days

must be addressed."

The draft Code of Practice suggests ways to reduce risks at workplaces such as identifying tasks and operations in which fatigue may be an issue, and reviewing schedules to avoid worker fatigue.

The public comment period is an open invitation to anyone to submit comment on any aspect of the Code of Practice. The closing date for submissions is September 16.

Copies of the draft Code of Practice are available by telephoning WorkSafe on 9327 8626 or on the website at www.safetyline.wa.gov.au.

"Preventing incidents and risks arising from extended working hours is important to the safety and health of workers in this State, and I encourage all interested parties to make a submission," Mr Cooke said.

"I can assure anyone who does make comments that they will be fully considered, and that they will be making a valuable contribution to improving a situation that is of increasing concern in WA."





PARENTS IN JUNIOR SPORT

Sport and games for children are an opportunity to learn skills that can help them achieve a lifetime of healthy, physical activity. They are also an opportunity for recreation, relaxation and an opportunity to gain confidence in many areas of social development.

In the wrong environment, sport can create more damage than good to your child's development.

Every parent has the right to be proud of their child's involvement in junior sport. Unfortunately, the proud parent can become the pushy parent when they lose sight of the reasons their child is participating. This undesirable occurrence is commonly referred to as the 'ugly parent syndrome'.

Here are some telltale signs that the line between proud and pushy has been crossed.

Pushy parent checklist

- Do the activities appeal more to you than the kids?
- ★ Is it a battle getting your child to activities?
- Do you see the activities as fun, or is it all serious?
- ★ Do you get angry if the kids aren't trying hard?
- ★ Do you like the reflected glory when your kids do well?

It's a sad fact that pushy parents often end up with

burnt-out kids. This denies children the opportunity to grow and develop through sport.

Tips to help your kids play clean and be good team members.

Make sure you do:

- ★ Show that you have faith in them
- ★ Take an interest in their interests
- ★ Take a continuing interest in the club and do not use it as a babysitting service
- ★ Let them find their feet without propping them up
- Make sure the kids are not new tools to service old dreams
- ★ Above all, if you're getting too worked up, find out why it is so important to you

Make sure you do not:

- ★ Interfere with the coach
- ★ Yell out instructions from the sidelines
- ★ Be critical of any player's performance
- ★ Offer financial reward for your child's performance. The reward should be in the activity itself

Remember: a good sport should shake hands at the end of the game – and that's not possible with a clenched fist!
