


Photo: The John Deere 9570RX Tractor getting ready to go.

Beginner Patchwork Classes

Fabulous new beginner Patchwork classes starting soon.

Have you ever thought that you would like to learn how to do patchwork, and asked yourself these questions. I only want to start on something easy, so where do I start? How do I get started on making a patchwork quilt? Which quilt do I make that's not too hard to start with, how much fabric do I need?

How easy is it? I'm a beginner sewer or a non sewer, I have a machine but I don't really know how to use it.....and the list goes on.

The Lake Grace regional Artspace is organising patch work classes for beginners, and past patch workers that would like to get back into it, and for those that own or would like to own a sewing machine, and have no or minimal skills with a sewing machine. All are welcomeso keep reading for further information.

Excellent patchworkers and sewers and tutors Kerry Hitchins and Nola Frost are going to run patch work classes on Tuesday nights every fortnight for ten weeks. This is following a successful basic sewing class two years ago with Kerry and Nola, which was very well received.

These classes will allow you to create a sampler quilt on a sewing machine in this time. Each fortnight learning a new design and gradually increasing in complexity to build up your confidence, then the final construction and finishing off of your quilt. After that you can go on to bigger and better projects even into art quilt projects.....the mind boggles and the projects are endless. Or you might just make this one family heirloom. You won't have to drool over the quilts in the quilting magazine and wish you knew how to make a quilt.

The first class is on Tuedsay evening 13th June 2017 at

the Lake Grace Regional Artspace at 7pm-9 /10pm. We have decided on this time so that those who work or have little kids can still come. All you have to bring to the first class is your sewing machine in working order, and tool box and instruction book if you



have one, white or cream thread, scissors, pins and enthusiasm. And if you have cutting board ruler and rotary cutter, Kerry and Nola will teach you the rest. A sample kit will be supplied for the first week. The cost for the workshops will be \$25 each for each night and \$5 for the kit for the first week.

We have a couple of spare sewing machines if you don't have a machine and would like to come along and just have a try before you go and buy one..

What is a Sample Quilt?

These quilts are comprised of different block pattern that are generally non repeating. In most samplers every block is different. Traditionally each of these unique blocks is the same size but can vary. When all the blocks are finished they are sewn together with or without sashing/borders. So a sampler quilt is a quilting project that does not repeat the same quilt block, within its layout and most sampler quilts are designed with 12 different quilt blocks, which is what we will be doing at the workshop and with a little bit of home work.

So it's all about playing and fun. Kerry has chosen blocks that are not too complicated and suitable for beginners and as the weeks go on and you are more skilled they slowly get a little harder.

Tea and coffee provided, there are kitchen facilities if you want to come earlier and heat your tea up.

Don't miss out on this onetime only series of classes for the year.

Local Road Users Urged to Support Fatality Free Friday

Media Release

Locals have been urged to pledge their support for road safety ahead of Fatality Free Friday, the nation's largest community-based road safety initiative, on 26 May.

Road users can take a digital pledge, as well as adding a yellow road safety ribbon to their profile picture on Twitter and Facebook, to show their commitment to reducing the devastating impact of road crashes on our communities.

More than 200 regional events will be held across the nation ahead of and on Fatality Free Friday. The events allow local road users to sign the pledge in person and acknowledge the important role each individual plays in stemming the road toll, which last year claimed 1,300 Australian lives.

An initiative of the Australian Road Safety Foundation (ASRF), Fatality Free Friday aims to create a culture where road users not only take responsibility for their own decisions, but also demand safe practice from family, friends, and professional drivers, including taxi or UBER drivers.

ARSF founder and CEO Russell White implored local road users to take the digital road safety pledge, and share their commitment via social media to spread awareness about Fatality Free Friday.

"We urge every motorist, passenger, cyclist and pedestrian to visit our website to pledge their support for this vital community initiative, then change their profile picture on Facebook and Twitter to let everyone know they are serious about change," Mr White said.

"We are using digital channels and social media to spread our message ahead of Fatality Free Friday, because reducing the death toll on our roads must come from

community action, and not just from the authorities dictating road laws.

"Every decision made on or around the road can be the difference between life and death. We need to create a culture where every individual actively seeks to avoid risks – whether speeding, using their mobile phone, or driving erratically – and also calls out other drivers on bad behaviour behind the wheel," he said.

Mr White said Fridays remained one of the deadliest days of the week on Australian roads, accounting for 214 fatalities in 2016, or 16 per cent of the total road roll.

Despite reductions in road deaths over the past decade, just two of the 53 Fridays in 2016 were fatality free – Friday, 5 February, and Friday, 24 June. New research released by ARSF highlighted not only the irresponsible behaviour of drivers but also those who sat idly by and allowed it to happen, revealing almost half (49%) of Australians did not ask speeding friends or family members to slow down.

The research also found 46 per cent of people riding with a texting taxi, UBER or professional driver would not ask them to put their phone away, with 18 per cent of these passengers claiming they were too afraid to speak up, while an additional 18 per cent just 'can't be bothered' speaking to the driver.

Equally as alarming, the data revealed more than half of Australian drivers (58%) narrowly avoided a car crash at least once a month, while 18 per cent of drivers experienced close calls on a weekly basis.

Held annually on the last Friday in May since its inception in 2007, Fatality Free Friday has garnered support from hundreds of thousands of Australians, who have taken the road safety pledge, either in person, at one of the many public signing events across the country, or online.


Of the 1,300 people who lost their lives on Australian roads in 2016, 18 per cent were aged between 18 and 25 years, closely followed by those aged 36 to 45 years (17 per cent), then 26 to 35 years (16 per cent).

Rethinking Suicide Prevention - A Situational Approach

The time has come to re-evaluate the way we approach suicide awareness and prevention! This is the challenge issued in a recent paper delivered by the Australian Institute of Male Health Studies and Western Sydney University. Renowned advocates for Men's Health Dr John Ashfield, Professor John Macdonald and Anthony Smith propose that a significant paradigm shift is needed in order to realise a more effective national suicide prevention strategy. They argue that a 'situational approach' is required, one that acknowledges the more predominant association of situational distress with suicide, as opposed to the current focus on mental illness. This is precisely what we advocate at RMHI.

None of us are immune to the feelings associated with being overwhelmed and challenged by specific events in our lives. These normal life 'situations' such as bereavement or relationship breakdown can impact greatly on our mental and emotional wellbeing. It is at these times, when we are able to draw on our innate resilience as human beings, and to see the best in others when we connect with them for support. The concern is that too often the distress we feel in certain situations aligns with symptoms that are often used to identify a mental illness such as depression. There is no doubt that depression can be a debilitating illness with associations for increased risk of suicide but it has gone from being a condition of relative obscurity to an apparent major social dilemma. The authors take this a step further and argue that 'the current mental health narrative has been allowed to encircle, medicalise and redefine as pathological many of our common human experiences' (Ashfield, Macdonald and Smith).

The paper's central argument is that when it comes to suicide prevention most initiatives are preoccupied with the identification of mental illness. Instead, we need to be considering all forms of life stressors and the associated experience of distress which doesn't necessarily embody a diagnosable mental illness but can result in suicidal behaviour. They argue that many suicides are connected to situational distress often

involving issues such as unemployment, financial problems and conflict, the signs of which may be missed if we adhere to a purely mental illness agenda. We need to be looking at situational distress and how it influences the individual's perspective.

As long as the suicide focus remains mostly on mental illness people will continue to view this problem as that of a professional's domain. Whilst tertiary services are very important their focus is on people with high intensity mental health difficulties and the associated risk issues. At RMHI we strongly support the shift to a more situational approach to suicide awareness because it promotes development of initiatives that advocate capacity building in individuals and their communities, early intervention and a primary care focus, that is ordinary people looking out for each other.





Our waste is growing at double the rate of our population with 52 mega tonnes generated a year. Australia is ranked 5th highest for generating the most municipal waste in the world.

In the 1960's, Australians were considered amongst the best in the world when it came to the ways they dealt with waste. Many recycling programs – especially those involving paper and newspaper – were pioneered in Australia. In the late-60's and 1970's, the launch of the Keep Australia Beautiful campaign put the issue of waste at the forefront of the national consciousness.

In recent decades, the combined effects of consumer demand, supermarket policies and cynicism about the effectiveness of waste and recycling campaigns has seen a surge in the volume of waste we produce as a nation.

Craig Reucassel takes a critical and first-hand look at household, retail and farming waste in Australia and asks, what has changed in the Australian psyche, and in our consumer culture, that has led us to become among the most wasteful nations in the developed world? We'll ask why Australians are generating millions of tonnes more waste every year – in food,

fashion, packaging, electronics and more. We'll discover the truth about where various kinds of waste actually end up, and learn what we can do to reduce the staggering volumes we produce.

Importantly, we'll project into the future. With the amount of waste increasing in Australia by nearly 8% a year, we'll also ask what happens if we do nothing? Is it time for us, as a nation, to seriously re-examine the ways we consume and dispose of consumer items?

according to WWF is that it takes 2,700 litres of water to make one cotton T-shirt, that's enough for one person to drink for 900 days. Australians are currently disposing of 6,000 kilograms of fashion and textile waste every 10 minutes as you will find out in the third episode of War on Waste



CEO's Corner



Flooding Event - February 2017

The Shire has submitted an application to Main Roads WA (MRWA) for funding for road repair works through WANDRRA and we are still awaiting confirmation. Once we receive confirmation of funding, a Tender will be advertised for construction and repair works. Consideration will be given to the timeliness of works as well as quality of construction.

Our application submitted to the Office of Emergency Management seeking financial assistance to remove the water and restore Old Ravensthorpe, Magenta and Hatters Hill Roads, has been approved. Details of required works for Hatters Hill Road and the southern end of Old Ravensthorpe Road have been approved by MRWA. Works has commenced on draining the water from these roads.

For current road closures please refer to the Shire's website www.lakegrace.wa.gov.au or Facebook page for a list of roads that are closed within the Shire.

WANDRRA Day Labour Exemption

An announcement was made on Tuesday 9 May that Local Government now has a choice to use their own plant and equipment when rebuilding essential public assets damaged during the February flood event. Although the exemption has been granted there are still processes to be followed. Currently we are still waiting on MRWA approval for the funding of our recovery works. Once this is approved we then will be required to submit our individual costing for each road to MRWA for approval and be able to show value for money as opposed to using contract services.

There are a number of other issues outstanding, one being the ability for neighbouring Local Governments to be able to assist in undertaking the repair works. The percentage of overheads claimable is another matter outstanding, wages can be claimed, but it is unknown as to the level of other charges, superannuation, workers compensation etc which can be claimed.

Ward Review

Correspondence has been received from the Department of Local Government and Communities, advising that the Minister for Local Government has approved the recommendation of the Local Government Advisory Board to abolish the Shire of Lake Grace's current ward structure and for the number of offices of councillor to remain unchanged at nine.

With this change the current election cycle is to be maintained. Councillors Armstrong, Chappell, De Landgrafft, Stanton and Walkers' current terms expire in October 2017. During the 2017 election period, nominations will be called for these five (5) positions.

Administrative processes are now in place to obtain the Governor's approval and publish the changes in the Government Gazette. This change will be implemented for the 2017 local government elections being held in October 2017.

4WDL Meeting

The Shire President and myself attended the 4WDL meeting held on Tuesday 9 May in Dumbleyung.

The 4WDL is a group of Councils who have joined together to form a Voluntary Regional Organisation of Councils (i.e. VROC) and consists of the Shires of Wagin, Williams, West Arthur, Woodanilling, Dumbleyung and Lake Grace. Shire Presidents and CEOs attend the meetings every two months.

The May meeting included presentations from Graham Cooper, Chair of Regional Development Australia (RDA) Wheatbelt, MRWA Acting Regional Manager Rob Barnsley and DFES Great Southern Superintendent Wayne Green. The opportunity to ask questions of the presenters prompted discussion, with a lot of information being shared across a wide range of topics of importance.

Topics discussed on the day included:

- Commodity Routes road funding and the fact that there is funding for national and state roads but none for local government roads;
- WANDRRA submissions, claims and the approval process;
- Albany Highway / Arthur River intersection modifications;
- Albany Highway Williams River bridge replacement;
- Upcoming bushfire season and the need for DFES to keep local volunteers engaged in bushfire events;
- 4WDL Aged Housing Progress Report; and,
- Current issues around the recent Corruption and Crime Commission's (CCC) statement to the media regarding the Shire of Exmouth and the suggested mismanagement in local government in regional areas.

The Newdegate grader contractor has been working on Ardler Road, Magenta Road and will be moving on to Whurr Road, Biddy Camm Road, Haigh Road and Shalders Road.

The Lake King grader contractor has been working on Muncaster Road, Ladyman Road, Smerdon Road and Kathleen Road.
