Ambulance Building Reaches For The Sky

Contract builder AK Homes Construction made large visual inroads into the new St John Ambulance WA Lake Grace Sub Centre this fortnight, completing the steel framework.

With the peak of the ambulance garage area reaching 4.7 metres in the air and the front of the main building rising 3.5 metres, the newly galvanised steel makes an impression in the space that cannot be ignored. The building has a gross floor area of 538.5m² and a fully enclosed floor area of 463m². The building is located on a 2350m² parcel of land with surrounding space of another 8000+m². To many the building does not look overly large, but the deception may be because of the space the building is sitting in.

Kosters Steel of Albany were appointed by AK Homes to pre fabricate the steel framework in Albany. The frames were transported to Perth for galvanising before being delivered to site 7 days after the concrete slab was laid.

On site for the Kosters Steel, family owned business, were Brett Wallrodt, Sheldon Koster, and Jayden Koster. With the use of a crane and two scissor lifts the trio slipped into their work, and in 2 days had the majority of the main framework in place. The site looked like a giant metal "Meccano" set (model constructions system consisting of metal strips, plates, girders, wheels axles and gears held together with tiny nuts and bolts). The structure grew at an exponential rate, and you could have been forgiven for thinking you missed a day, if you had been watching the building going up.

The boys headed back to Albany on the Friday afternoon only to return on Monday to install the front and rear verandahs and to complete the fully welded components. With efficiency on their side the Koster's team finished a day early and were decamped by Monday afternoon.

At this point we have to thank Steve Macs of Lake Grace for the loan of the big green generator. The loan was required due to the continuing saga of getting our Western Power connection. The connection date was pushed back 2 weeks by Western Power, and was eventually connected to the "green dome" on the 10th May 2016.

Working swiftly after this point AK Homes and their electrical sub contractor, Tiger Spark of Lake Grace, got the temporary supply in place and connected by the



Ross Chappell onsite as the framework is being erected.

13th May. As having power to the "green dome" was the Sub Centres responsibility under our contract with AK Homes, the donation of the use of the generator from Steve Macs, meant we were not operating outside of our contract arrangements. Our thanks also to Ross Chappell for organising the generator and keeping the fuel topped up.

The next stage of the build is the timber framework between the steel. The timber packs arrived on Thursday the 18th May and we expect that by the time you receive your Lakes Link News the carpenters will be hard at work.

The building sub committee met on a cyclonic Saturday 21st May for 3 hours to have a site walk and to finalise audio visual requirements, radio requirements (important for the wires/cables to run in the walls), colour schemes for kitchen and bathrooms, building signage selections, and discussion on the proposed donor recognition sculpture. The building sub committee will next meet when the quotations for the painting, tiling, cabinetry, paving and asphalt are received.

The project has paid AK Homes a 10% deposit for the building, and we have paid the 1st Claim. The first claim was a little less than scheduled as the construction milestone of the steelwork being in place had not been met.

For payment to flow, AK Homes had to supply to St John Ambulance a Statutory Declaration, citing that they had paid all outstanding invoices to suppliers and trade. This documentation was supplied as per the contract.

This building project is protected by a specific insurance policy taken out by AK Homes, in favour of St John

Cyclists

Taken from '12 Most Asked About Road Rules'

Cyclists share the same rights and responsibilities as drivers and must obey the road rules.

Cyclists are vulnerable road users, so for their safety extra precautions and awareness are required from both cyclists and drivers.

Drivers:

- When overtaking cyclists, it is recommended to do so at a distance of at least one metre;
- Must give way to cyclists if crossing an on-road bicycle lane'
- Before opening a car door, ensure there isn't a bicycle rider in the way;
- When turning left - if a cyclist is in front, allow them to pass before making a turn'
- Must not enter the green bicycle boxes (at some intersections).

Cyclists:

- Must wear a helmet that is properly fastened;
- Must have at least one brake and a warning device (bell/horn) working'
- Must use a front white light and rear red light which can be seen for 200m during the night and in conditions of poor visibility. A red rear reflector visible for 50 is also required;
- Can ride two abreast (side-by-side) on the road, with up to 1.5m between riders;

- Can't ride less than 2m behind a vehicle
- Are not allowed to pass on left of a vehicle that is turning left;
- Must give way to vehicles exiting a roundabout;
- Should ensure visibility by wearing reflective or fluorescent clothing'
- When travelling on the road, can be on the left of the edge line.

Penalties - Bike Riders:

Not wearing a helmet = **\$50 fine**

Failure to have at least one effective brake and working warning device = **\$100 fine**

Failure to have correct lighting for visibility = **\$100 fine**

Bicycles can ride two side-by-side with up to 1.5m between riders. Failure to do so = **\$50 fine**

Riding less than 2m behind a vehicle = **\$100 fine**

Passing on the left of a vehicle that is turning left = **\$100 fine**

Penalties - Drivers:

Failing to overtake a bicycle at a safe distance = **4 demerit points and \$400 fine.**

Entering a green bicycle box = **2 demerit points and \$200 fine.**

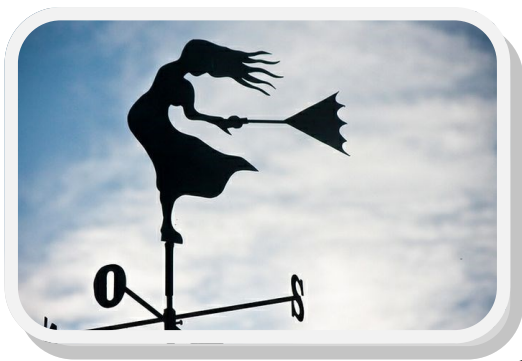

WA Victims Fleeced in Tech Support Scam

Media Release

WA victims have lost almost \$400,000 so far this year in an alarming escalation of the tech support scam.

From 1 January to 30 April 2016, WA ScamNet at Consumer Protection received reports from 36 victims who had lost a total of \$397,151 to the scam. During the same period last year, 25 victims had reported losing a total of \$78,386. During 2015, 70 victims reported losing a total of \$188,478.

The scam involves victims getting phone calls from criminals saying they are tech support officers from Telstra, Optus and sometimes Microsoft, and they require access to the victim's computer in order to fix a problem. After being given access remotely, the scammers then get the victims to log on to their bank accounts and the money is later stolen.

Acting Commissioner for Consumer Protection David Hillyard said it was alarming that losses to this scam had already increased five-fold compared to the same time last year.

"Giving remote access to your computer to someone who has rung you out of the blue can be a very expensive mistake, with victims this year losing about \$11,000 each on average," Mr Hillyard said.

"Access to your computer means access to your personal information, including bank log in details, and scammers may also entice you to log in with what may seem a credible story.

"Don't be fooled by these random calls. Unless you have contacted that organisation for tech support, hang up immediately and don't take the bait. Never allow anyone to have remote access to your computer, unless you have initiated the contact and are sure the person on the phone is genuine.

"Your personal information is the key to unlock your financial accounts, so guard them carefully and ensure you don't become one of the many victims of this tech support scam."

This warning comes at the start of National Consumer Fraud Week (16-20 May 2016) with government agencies throughout Australia running a community awareness campaign with the theme 'wise up to scams'.

The campaign promotes the following advice to avoid becoming a victim:

- **Do not let anyone pressure you into making decisions.** Scammers often try to create a sense of urgency so the recipient of the call will act impulsively. They do this through short deadlines, fake emergencies or threats of legal action;
- **Get a second opinion.** If someone is requesting money from you and you have any doubts, discuss it with a trusted and reliable third party;

- **Get your own investment advice.** Do not respond to emails and phone calls from strangers offering predictions on shares, investment tips, or investment advice. Always do your own research before you invest any money and check the company or scheme is licensed on ASIC's MoneySmart website;
- **Be wary of online dating.** Know who you're dealing with. Don't send money to someone you've never met in person. If someone approaches you on social media and you don't know them, it may be a scam;
- **Computer companies won't call you.** If you receive a call claiming to be from Microsoft, Telstra or anyone else telling you your computer has a problem, it is likely to be a scam. Never allow anyone to remotely log into your computer;
- **Government agency calling.** Government agencies will generally write to you if you are entitled to money or if you have to pay money. If somebody calls you claiming to be from the Government offering you unexpected money or demanding you pay an outstanding debt, be cautious. Get enough information on the organisation and the caller and then find independent contact details so you can check the legitimacy of what you have been told.

ROE 1848 to 1849 Expedition

Roe's 1848 to 1849 exploration was the last of his many expeditions. Of almost five months duration, it became a most testing time for man and beast, as they traversed a route of almost 2,890 kilometres, mostly through country hitherto unknown to white men, and Roe never fully recovered from it. His departure from York saw him advance past the Karlgarin area, and finding little of interest, in particular, water and feed for the horses, he took a south westerly turn toward the Stirling Ranges, later linking up with a branch of the Pallinup River and eventually arriving at Cape Riche.

With horses and a cart laden with the goods and supplies they required, along this section of their journey, they passed through "our patch" of country, after setting a course from one high rising point to the next, on their journey to the east of Lake Grace, and closer to Newdegate. Across this farming area, some farmers feel there is something special in the history of their farm because Roe went across the land they know. Living and working on a property he crossed, one can identify with his description of the area.

Some distance from Silver Wattle Hill, after taking a latitude reading of 33° 16' S, the explorers encountered a series of scattered small pools of fresh water inclining westward, which Roe believed could be the source of

the Buchanan or Beaufort rivers, as it was in the same latitude. In fact, he was unaware of the extensive lake system of Lake Grace and Pingrup. which was less than 32 kilometres to the west, and moreover, delivers its waters toward the Avon River. A little further on, only 11 kilometres to the east of my farm, Anaba, the party discovered gnammas, which provided a watering and camping place. These rockholes came into prominence when John Holland found his first water close by, after venturing into the unknown country on his trail blazing journey to the Eastern Goldfields from Broomehill in 1893. The gnamma holes are now called 'Holland Rocks'.

Roe had little good to say about their experience thus far, having forced their way through pelting rain and hail, driven by the chilling southerly winds, (which at our farm we too, have so often experienced), in a country devoid of grass for their almost starved horses. Passing through miles of scrubby sandplain and mallee, Roe remarked: 'The country continued poor and unpromising'. That was the best he could say of our beloved country!

As the explorers advanced further southward, they met with more distress, when their cart was bogged and, as a result of the exertion to extricate the cart from the soft ground, their best draft horse, Parker 'dropt instantly dead in the shafts'. This event caused them to reassess the expedition's transport and equipment at Cape Riche, so they dispensed with the cart and as much of the heavy supplies as they could, in favour of fitting the horses out as packhorses. A local native known as Bob, was also hired as a guide to replace the ailing Souper.

After resting the men and horses, a fresh start was made to the north-east ward, passing through fertile grasslands near Gairdner River and Jerramungup, then onwards to Mount Madden. From there they stayed on an inland course, until they were forced by the perilous circumstances to find their way closer to the coast, because their horses had become so weakened by lack of water and feed. After being forced to leave a favourite horse Ney, (at what would be named Mount Ney), to recover until their return, the party continued, relying on 'kind Providence'. At a time when their safety was critical, with their horses totally exhausted for want of feed and water, natives' smokes were observed in the distance. The last of their water was shared out at breakfast, before they staggered on to 'ascertain the worst'. That day they reached their goal – the Russell Range, and were encamped there. "No sight could have been more welcome to us at this moment than this beautiful run of pure cool fresh water cascading down from the highest part of the range immediately above," Roe recorded.

Roe could see no inducement to explore further, so he returned to Cape Riche on a more southerly route, to

examine any rivers or streams on the south coast. This course was more favourable, apart from the sharp rocks they had to travel over at times, which troubled the horses' hooves, a problem made worse by running out of nails to shoe them. As part of his instructions to search for resources, including coal, Roe examined the strata of cliff faces of the rivers they crossed, and charted where coal might be found in large quantities.

After 86 days, they were back at Cape Riche, as the guests of Mr and Mrs George Cheyne, where they recruited and restocked with supplies for the last section of their journey, to Swan River. Roe had found the services of Bob of value, but as soon as Bob was back in his home territory, he rejoined his tribe. Instead of following a new line with the assistance of Bob, the explorers followed the beaten sandalwood track. They met up with teams carting sandalwood to Cape Riche for shipment to China, and when the party arrived at John Hassell's sheep station, they found his shepherds transferring to the pastures they had discovered at Jerramungup.

From Kojonup, the post-road [mail road] to Bunbury was followed, and anxiety was again experienced with the

horses, when it was realised the animals had cropped poison plants, necessitating rest to recover from their weak lethargic state. These plants once grew over much of the wheatbelt – and I have had to grub and pull out my share of the poison plant too! Fortunately, by the time the party had reached the Swan River all their animals had fully recovered.

Of this exhaustive exploration, Roe considered that although no great addition had been made to the amount of good land available to the colony, the discovery of coal would compensate. He also drew attention to the timber he had observed inland from Bunbury, as an immediate source of ready wealth from seemingly inexhaustible jarrah forests. I wonder if Roe could have envisioned that the land he described as worthless, would one day grow a big portion of our country's wealth, in grain and primary produce?

With just a few additions, this is the summary of Captain Roe's 1848 exploration that passed between Lake Grace, Newdegate and Pingrup districts, which I was invited to write for the 'West Australian Explorers Diaries' volume of Roe's explorations.

Insurance Tips # 10

With seeding done and dusted for the year, John and Mike were almost relaxing as they cleaned down the machinery to put away for the year.

A phone call from Maddie soon put paid to relaxing! She had just been involved in an accident at an intersection not far from home. The other car had failed to stop at the stop sign and had 'T-Boned' Maddie's car. No-one was hurt in the accident, but her car had certainly sustained considerable damage. This was the first accident she had been involved in and Maddie was quite distraught when speaking to her parents.

Loren was able to calm Maddie down and get her to go to her glove box and get out the 'Glove Box Buddy' that Elders had provided when Maddie first got her car. The 'Glove Box Buddy' allowed her to work through the sections and gather all the information she will need to lodge a claim.

If a third party (ie the other person involved in the accident) is at fault, making sure you get all their details will enable your insurer to recover costs from the third party's insurer. This is important as without details of the third party your insurer will need to process the

claim against your policy and you will need to pay an excess and the claim will remain on your records.

At the time of an accident, drivers and their passengers are often not thinking beyond the immediate concerns of making sure everyone is OK and clearing the road so other traffic can move through. A 'Glove Box Buddy' is a handy reference which will prompt you to ask all the questions you need to ask. In the case of young drivers the excess can be significant and it is well worth taking the effort to gather all the information you need to avoid having to pay this excess.

'Glove Box Buddies' are available from Elders Insurance – Just pop into the office at the end of Stubbs Street and grab one for your car.

Doppler Radar Build Begins at Newdegate

Media Release

Construction has begun locally in Newdegate, on the first of three Doppler radars to boost weather intelligence for farm businesses and regional communities across the Wagin electorate.

A \$23 million *Royalties for Regions* investment will fund the construction of the three radars, which will be located throughout regional WA.

Member for Wagin Terry Waldron MLA said once operational, the local Newdegate radar would provide real-time weather coverage information at a range of up to 200km.

"Local farmers and agricultural businesses will be able to access timely information on rainfall and wind speed and direction, which are all critical markers in terms of making more informed decisions, for example during seeding including fertiliser and chemical applications," Mr Waldron said.

Mr Waldron said research behind this project had estimated that, based on more timely spray applications alone, radars could produce a return of over \$6 for every \$1 invested.

"Over the thousands of hectares farmed across the regions, these savings would definitely become quite considerable," he said.

Katanning local and Nationals WA candidate for Roe Peter Rundle said the improved weather information would also be of great benefit to emergency services and local communities in general.

"As a farmer, I understand the benefits of this real-time weather data, but am also aware of the enormous advantage this type of technology could provide for emergency services personnel, such as fighting fires and even for more general uses, such as planning a community event," Mr Rundle said.

Mr Rundle said Doppler radars would also be installed at South Doodlakine and in Watheroo, near Marchagee, with all three expected to be operational by mid-2017.

Regional Development Minister Terry Redman said the program was a \$23 million commitment by the State Government's *Royalties for Regions* program to transform WA farm businesses.

"These radars will make a real difference to farming businesses while providing relevant information for emergency services providers by offering weather observations at a local level," Mr Redman said.

"The Doppler radars will fill gaps in radar coverage and also provide underlying data to assist insurance providers to develop new insurance products."

Esperance-based Sime Building & Construction will undertake site works construction and the Bureau of Meteorology will install and maintain the Doppler radars. Once the radars have been installed and commissioned, the Bureau will undertake data quality evaluation.

Mr Rundle said it was great to see local and regional businesses having the opportunity to participate in the project.

"This project will not only benefit the people of Newdegate, but will have flow on benefits across the electorate, giving Esperance's Sime Building & Construction the opportunity to employ local workers and contribute to a significant infrastructure project for the region."

The Newdegate radar is expected to be operational by October 2016.

The new radars will build on the Department of Agriculture and Food's extended network of 149 automated weather stations, and the new radars are fully funded by *Royalties for Regions* (RfR).

Ambulance WA Ltd against the value of the building. That is, if AK Homes Construction Ltd for some reason cannot complete the build, the insurance policy will ensure that the value of funds paid and works not completed are indemnified. This point is important to note as the CPD Group (responsible for the hospital upgrade) who were a competing tenderer for this project, suffered financial collapse a week ago, leaving

many trades and services owed funds. Our contract requirements of a specific insurance policy in favor of the construction of this project, is good business sense.

The next milestone payment to AK Homes includes the timber framework, windows, doors and cladding. The carpenters will be on site for 5 weeks to get the building to lockup stage. At present the project is running 14 days behind the proposed build schedule.

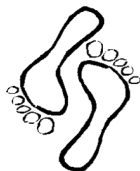

Residents Urged to Collect Firewood Responsibly

Media Release

Now that cooler weather is here, the Department of Parks and Wildlife is asking Great Southern residents to collect firewood responsibly.

Parks and Wildlife district wildlife officer Mel Rowley said people in Narrogin and surrounding towns such as Wickepin, Highbury and Cuballing could access firewood from local designated areas of State forest once they were issued with a permit.

"All people need to do is drop in to the Parks and Wildlife office in Hough Street, Narrogin and obtain a permit and a designated firewood collecting area map," Ms Rowley said.

Ms Rowley said people living in Newdegate, Lake Grace, Nyabing, Kondinin, Brookton, Broomehill and surrounding communities could collect firewood from private properties with written permission from the landowner.

"Another option is to purchase firewood from a licensed supplier," she said.

"Firewood cannot be collected from national parks, nature reserves or conservation reserves."

Otherwise it has been a steady time since I last wrote to you all and we have been dividing our time between our area and working in Narrogin and Pingelly for days at a time. Response to your incidents is still available from our friends in Kulin, Kondinin and Katanning when we are away, but if it is non urgent business we can be contacted when we are back at the station. We endeavour to do our best to deal with all your issues, but we can only do so much given how stretched we are currently – so please be patient!

We had a visit from the notorious "Bitumen Bandits" a couple of weeks ago (not to be confused with Ned Kelly and the Bush Rangers) and some excellent community and Police cooperation led to the culprits being cornered and "invited" to leave town in a rapid manner. They are of interest to various interstate agencies and the intelligence we gathered here is being put to good use. Suffice to say, if people call at your rural property uninvited and you don't like the look of them tell them to leave. If they don't leave call us. Don't let anyone into your house without checking ID or professional credentials. Luckily everyone here was switched on and the Bandits left empty handed from the area.

I propose that in future we have a Q&A section whereby you can email questions to your local CRC and they in turn can forward them to us to address. It can be a traffic matter or it can be a general policing thing or about recruitment. We have been asked the question where can people find out if any "undesirables" are living in your area. Obviously we can't disclose private information held by us but there is a government website that publishes information on various types of serious offenders living in WA. The web page is www.communityprotection.wa.gov.au. There is a search link that identifies offenders living in your and adjoining postal codes, with your driving licence details required for verification. We are a vigilant bunch around here, so please let us know if something concerns you.

I have been asked who has right of way at a crossroads controlled by stop signs, when heading the same

direction (ie. towards town) as we have at the North South Road intersection by the Roadhouse in Lake Grace. Basically, the vehicle that arrives first has right of way. If there is traffic obstructing one vehicle from moving then the other vehicle would be able to move off. Getting Into the Driver's Seat ... It's Your Health!

Supporting men to become empowered and take responsibility for their wellbeing and health; that's our core focus at the Regional Men's Health Initiative. We do this in light of the adverse statistics that represent men's health in general and the notion that for a large proportion of men developing their 'health knowledge' is not seen as a priority. This fits with men having a more functional view of their health i.e. not seeking help until we are virtually physically impaired by the problem. We often challenge men on these points, but what does it really mean as a bloke to take responsibility for your wellbeing and health?

As blokes we take responsibility and make a lot of informed decisions throughout our lives, on a variety of things such as family, work and social issues. Why should decisions about our wellbeing and health be any different?

Too many blokes are running into trouble because we keep avoiding and putting off looking after our wellbeing and health. Just being a passive participant is not good enough, we need to be the one in the driver's seat in all areas of our health be it physical, mental or social/spiritual.

Taking responsibility for our wellbeing and health means becoming an active and informed healthcare consumer. It means scheduling regular service visits with our doctor and being aware of issues that affect us at certain stages of our lives, such as the potential for prostate problems as we get older. We also need to consider issues that could be common in our families (hereditary) and discuss this with the doctor in view of our lifestyle choices. It's a bit of a generalisation but how many of us guys rely on our wives or partners for our health when it comes to our diet i.e. what food is in the house and what we eat for dinner.

Our key message "before it all gets too much, talk to a

mate..." requires us to take some responsibility in that it's important we identify who our mates are so that when the s...t hits the fan, and it does happen, we have a strategy/ plan in place to address things.

While taking charge is important it doesn't mean you have to go it alone, we all need help sometimes. From a community educator and support worker perspective this often means my role involves walking beside someone helping to establish relevant pathways of support. It could also be simply listening to and validating people's issues and the emotions they associate with them. We see it as, *walking beside the ute with the window down but not hopping in* - it's your bus, you are the one in the driver's seat!

Remember that it's not your wife's, mate's or doctor's health and wellbeing, it's yours. Good health and wellbeing can only happen if and when we as blokes take responsibility!

Please place any caltrop you collect into the bin at the Shire depot.

Tree Planting in our Town-sites

I am pleased to report that a number of people have contacted the Shire expressing interest in having a conversation about tree planting in our townsites. A meeting is being set up for the week of 30 May 2016.

The meeting will discuss ideas or thoughts on where community would like to see more trees planted in and around our townsites. As you would all be aware, trees in our townsites are gradually disappearing through age, some die off, some require removal due to being unsafe through white ant infestations, and there is the safety issue of falling branches and the need to keep them off power lines. All of these factors have resulted in a decline in the tree canopy in our towns, with no replacement trees being planted.

As well as adding to the streetscape, the benefits of trees are well documented in that they increase the habitat available for birds and wildlife, reduce stormwater run-off and soil erosion, and are even thought to positively impact on mental health.

Scams....They Just Keep Coming

Australasian Consumer Fraud Taskforce (ACFT) led the 2016 fraud week (16 - 20 May) with the message for everyone to 'wise up to scams', especially those scams targeting over 55s.

It's quite bewildering to see the volume of money lost to scams, with an estimate in excess of \$229 million in 2015. Loneliness and the low returns on traditional investments appear to be a driving force behind a large portion of victims taking risks with their cash.

The old adage 'if it's too good to be true then it probably is' rings loudly but people continue to ignore the warning bells. Greed can overwhelm common sense and cause people to take risks they wouldn't normally take.

Fear can also be a driver, particularly when someone calls you, knows your name and there is an underlying threat of police action if you don't pay your overdue tax account!

Losses reported to ACCC's Scamwatch alone climbed to almost \$85 million, \$3 million more than last year. Much of this was reported by older members of the community. Of the 49 500 reports to the ACCC with an age provided, almost 20 000 were provided

by Australians over the age of 55, with over 21 million dollars lost by this group.

There are many scams which affect older members of the community but reports to the ACCC show investment scams and dating and romance scams account for half of the money lost by over 55's in 2015.

Investment scams almost doubled in terms of the total amounts lost to just over \$25.4 million. These scams pose a significant risk for Australians looking for investment opportunities, especially those looking to grow their retirement funds.

Dating and romance scams slipped to second in terms of reported loss but still accounted for almost \$23 million in losses. These scams are successful because the scammer invests a great deal of time into building a trusting relationship which they ultimately use to defraud their victims.

With the end of the financial year looming the tax scams are now rearing their ugly heads, a relatively new scam involves the victim paying with iTunes cards.

From time to time the Australian Taxation Office (ATO) may contact you by phone, but you should be wary of unsolicited phone calls claiming to be from the ATO and offering you a tax refund or aggressively demanding a payment.

Increasingly, these scams are using names and addresses that have some correlation to actual ATO officers and buildings. If in doubt about the authenticity of a call you receive from the ATO, you should contact the ATO by calling 1800 008 540 to verify the legitimacy of the call.

There are a few warning signs people should take note of. Firstly, an ATO officer would not be threatening and intimidating on a call or demand payment in this manner. Secondly, the ATO only accept payments to be made by legitimate traceable methods and not in unconventional ways such as iTunes cards or cash transfers. Thirdly, the return phone number is a NSW number rather than a national toll free number.

If you do have an ATO debt, you will only be asked to pay in writing first and by using one of the ways listed on the ATO's how to pay page on their website. They will never ask for payments in the form of an iTunes card, pre-paid debit cards, electronic payment vouchers (e.g. Ukash), or wire transfer (eg. Western Union or Moneygram).

Earlier this month a 52-year-old Mandurah woman reported to Consumer Protection that she had bought about \$7,000 worth of iTunes cards from a Woolworths store (\$3,000 on credit card and the rest with cash) to pay phone scammers threatening her with a fabricated

unpaid tax debt. It started after she responded to a threatening voicemail. A Melbourne grandmother told media a similar story after losing \$5000 on iTunes gift cards.

In 2015, WA ScamNet has reported on a woman who lost \$7000 to scammers posing as officers from the Australian Taxation Office. The victim was told that there was a pending court case for unpaid taxes, and was urged to "settle" a fake debt as soon as possible to avoid harsh penalties. The victim was instructed to deposit the money into an Australian bank account, which is suspected to have belonged to a money mule.

Some key indicators of an ATO scam are:

- ☐ Cold calling
- ☐ Pushiness by the person on the phone
- ☐ Caller asking questions about your financial situation or other personal information
- ☐ Caller being aggressive and advising there's a warrant for your arrest

- ☐ Asked to make a payment without any prior advice or correspondence from the ATO or a personal payment slip

There are examples of scams on the ATO website.

Reducing scam victimisation is the shared responsibility of all Australians but sadly unless the victim actively listens to what they're being advised there is little anyone else can do.
