Local Botany Blooms in Town Bush

A botanical survey of Lake Grace town bushland has captured a diverse collection of native plants just on our doorsteps. The survey, a part of the Lake Grace Bushcare Project and the first study of its kind for the townsite, gives an in-depth look at the flora growing around Lake Grace.

Last spring, local botanist Anne Rick surveyed five remnant bush sites around Lake Grace, recording 115 native plant species. These range from tiny orchids and ground covers to large trees like salmon gums. The different locations are home to assorted plant communities including mallee, eucalypt woodland and Allocasuarina (sheoak) shrubland. Included in the survey are eight acacia (wattle) species, eight types of melaleuca (paperbarks, honey-myrtles) and ten eucalypts species.

The Vegetation and Flora Survey by Mrs Rick is the first comprehensive record of the native plant life around the

Katrina was the daughter of John and Whitia, or Fitz as she is more commonly known, sister to Nathan, Georgie, Shane, Huck, John Jr and Lucas, partner of Jarrod, mother to Javette and Farren, sisterin-law to Bessie, Regan and Verity, Aunty to Daniel, Opal and Tyron and Daughter in law to Louie.

In 1988, at the age of 2 Katrina moved to Australia with John, Fitz and Nathan.

John found a secure job and the family moved to Lake Grace. Katrina completed years 1 to 7 at Lake Grace primary school. In 1998 the family moved to Derby for just over a year then moved back to Perth before settling down in Kondinin in 2000 where Katrina travelled to Kulin to attend high school before she boarded at Narrogin Hostel for years 11 and 12.

Upon graduating year 12 in 2003 she did a harvest on the wheat bins at Kulin CBH as an RPO.

And after that harvest was when Katrina fell in love with the shearing industry. Katrina started out as a rouseabout, in 2015 she gained her wool classing ticket which enabled her to then do both. Katrina was very good at her job and many farmers commented on her standard of work. Katrina loved that lifestyle and enjoyed a good cut out.

Katrina has always been fit and thin, but boy could she eat. It was not uncommon for Katrina to have two serves especially if mum was cooking. She sure did love her food. And she could cook a mean feed too when she needed too.

Nathan recalls this story that when they were kids, Fitz was doing a catering job and Nathan and Katrina started eating the cooking chocolate that was set aside. Fitz was not happy with them both when she realised that they had eaten most of the chocolate leaving not enough for the recipe. To teach them a lesson Fitz went to the shops and brought more chocolate and made them both sit down and eat the same amount again they had just consumed in one sitting. Katrina thought this was great until she vomited it all back up.

Katrina celebrated her 21st birthday in Esperance with friends and family.

Jarrod and Katrina first meet in 2008 and they became parents in December 2009, Katrina giving birth to Javette and in July 2014 Farren joined the family. Javette and Farren are by far her life's biggest achievement, and she loved them both dearly.

Katrina's star sign is Scorpio and after reading a poster she had written and hung on her dining room wall, it described her right down to a tee. Scorpio – extremely adorable, attractive, energetic, caring, hardworking,



romantic, talkative, predictable, great kisser, loves to joke, very good sense of humour, will try almost anything once, always get what they want, loves long relationships, loves to be pampered, loves to party and at times to the extreme, loves the smell and feel of money and is good at making it but just as good at spending it, very protective over loved ones, can be a good friend but if disrespected by a friend, the friendship will end. These characteristics all describe her well.

Katrina was a sucker at a bottleshop, she may not even have liked the taste of her next purchase but if Kat thought the bottle or box it came in was cool then she'd buy it for sure.

Katrina had the biggest heart and would do anything for her friends. Sometimes these favours for her friends never ended well, like the time she drove her mate to Perth which resulted in them both getting mugged, and her wallet and phone got stolen. Katrina's phone was never retrieved but her wallet was found by someone on their morning walk in Cockburn.



town (see map). To identify the plant species, Mrs Rick mapped and walked the sites and collected specimens. She compared these with herbarium specimens and consulted other experts. Her collected specimens will now be lodged in the Western Australian Herbarium which houses 815,000 dried specimens from throughout the State. This includes specimens previously collected from Lake Grace shire by Mrs Rick and the local rare flora group over some decades.

Mrs Rick also searched for threatened, priority and other significant flora, finding two Priority 3 species—Persoonia *brevirhachis* (Snottygobble) and *Anticoryne melanosperma* (Rye) in shrub-land at the eastern end of the townsite.

Of special mention is the 2.7ha woodland of Kondinin Blackbutts (*Eucalyptus kondininensis*) and *Eucalyptus myriadena* on the north side of the hospital. Due to land clearing in the WA Wheatbelt, eucalypt woodlands like these are now listed as critically endangered by the Commonwealth and State governments. Despite some weed infestation, this remnant is in good health and an important natural asset.

The Flora Survey also examined the health of the bushland. Despite degraded areas, most of the sites are in good health with the main threats being weeds. Mrs Rick recorded 37 weed or introduced species across the sites. These weeds, such as wild oats, Guildford grass, turnip and dumped garden plants, are a fire hazard, compete with native species and can take over and degrade bushland areas especially in open areas.

We can always learn more. 'Further survey work at different times of the year will increase our knowledge of the flora of the area," Mrs Rick said, "especially those inconspicuous, small species, annuals and geophytes that may have been missed during the present survey".

The Bushcare project team has used the survey to select and order seedlings for the revegetation of these bush sites, with planting busy bees planned for next month. Many of the species however are not available

at nurseries – they are irreplaceable – and, if not protected through conservation, will disappear along with the wildlife that lives with them. This report by Mrs Rick is an important record and tool for the Lake Grace community to better know and care for this special bush around the town.

How can you help?

- Join us for planting busy bees on Sunday 12 & 19 June
- Take your plant waste and rubbish to the tip not the bush
- Get your firewood from a sustainable source not the bush
- Some species are only found in this place take photos not wildflowers

The Bushcare project is funded by a Community Stewardship Grant and led by Lake Grace Community Resource Centre and Lake Grace Land Conservation District Committee.

STATION NEWS

Josh and Wade were down at the Lake Grace District High School recently talking to some of the older students about cyberbullying and online safety. As always, it was great to speak to the kids in an informal setting and to hear some of their stories and experiences.

CRIME

We were investigating a matter recently that required us to attend a property to speak to an individual. Unfortunately for a couple of males, we got lost without realising, on approaching the open doorway, we busted them consuming drugs in plain view from where we were standing, surrounded by drug paraphernalia. After a little bit of formality, we seized the drugs and paraphernalia and realised our error in regards to our location. This is what the painter Bob Ross would call "a happy little accident". Both males were charged with drug offences as a result.

As we said above, we spoke to some of the High School students about cyberbullying and online safety. One of the biggest things we took away from the conversation was that almost every student had a device in their bedroom at night, be that a mobile, tablet or gaming console. Some of the stories of their experiences were concerning and we'd thought we'd provide some information to parents and families about what they can do to minimise the risks. Given the amount of information on both topics we'll talk about Online Safety next issue.

Cyberbullying

Cyberbullying is bullying that uses electronic means like the internet or mobile phones to aggressively and intentionally harm someone. Cyberbullying can include name calling, abusive comments, spreading rumours, threats of physical harm, being ignored or excluded, having opinions slammed, online impersonation, being sent rude or upsetting images, or having personal information or images sent or shared with others. Cyberbullying is most common in late primary school and early high school and up to half of all young people have experienced it.

The effects of cyberbullying are similar to the effects of bullying, but the main difference is that it's much harder to avoid, because it can follow your child home from school and make them feel like they'll never be able to escape it. Make sure your child knows it's not their fault, they're not alone, and that there are ways to deal with cyberbullying.

Parents play a key role in supporting their child to be safe online. Parents can help children form safer online habits

by doing the following.

- Setting clear expectations about online behaviours with your child. This can be done through a family technology agreement. You can download a family tech agreement from <u>eSafety.gov.au</u>. Agreements can include:
 - acceptable and unacceptable websites and apps
 - · safety and privacy control settings
 - time limits
 - places in the house where devices can be used
 - how to treat others online
 - a plan of what to do if they become involved in cyberbullying or something else goes wrong.
- Use parental controls on devices to block, filter and monitor online content and activities. Parental controls are most effective when used with other strategies.
- Have open and regular discussions about what your child is doing and seeing online. Encourage them to share their online interests and activities with you. Children and young people feel more comfortable talking about problems if they are already talking about positive experiences.
- Use digital technology together. Children and young people use technology as a way to express themselves. They build and strengthen connections to others online. Be involved in your child's online world and strengthen your online relationship with them, as well as your offline relationship.
- Learn more about digital technology, cyberbullying and online safety. This can increase your knowledge and confidence about the online world.

Conversations with your child about cyberbullying are an important way of keeping them safe. Use these starters to help get the conversation going.

Check on your child's understanding.

What is cyberbullying? When is cyberbullying against the law? What does your school say about cyberbullying?

Find out if your child has been involved.

Have you ever been bullied online? What about other kids at school? Have you ever bullied someone online? Is that ever okay? Do you ever get harassed or bullied when you're playing a game online? Have you ever told someone that their online behaviour is not ok?

POLICE NEWS (cont.)

Find out if your child knows what to do.

What would you do if someone cyberbullied you? If a friend was being cyberbullied, what could you do? How do you report bullying and cyberbullying at your school? If someone was being cyberbullied, how would you get help from an adult? What can I do to help you if you are involved in cyberbullying?

Learn about your child's knowledge about online safety.

How do you report cyberbullying on the apps and social media you use? Do you know how to have cyberbullying content removed by <u>eSafety</u>? How do you block someone who is being abusive or mean online? Cyberbullying is one bad thing that can happen online, are there are things that can go wrong?

Should your child be experiencing Cyberbullying there is plenty of things that can be done. If it involves another student at the same school, the school should be your first port of call. There will be bullying policies in places.

Social media and mobile phone providers can be a resource to call on in the case of cyberbullying. Mobile phone providers can assist with tracking in the case of abusive texts or calls and you are also able to report cyberbullying content to social media platforms.

The eSafety Commissioner can also help with online bullying by getting offensive material removed from sites on your behalf. This is done by completing a complaint form on their website eSafety.gov.au.

A complaint can be made to the eSafety Commissioner by any young person aged less than 18 years, and any adult who is a parent or guardian to a young person who is being bullied online. Complaints can be made via an online form on eSafety.gov.au.

Before making a complaint:

- contact the social media provider and report the abuse, keep proof that you have done this and keep a note of the date that the report was filed.
- gather as much evidence as you can such as screenshots, videos links and keep the message.
- Making a complaint to the eSafety Commissioner is the best way to go if you have reported abuse to your social media provider and the offensive material hasn't been removed within 48 hours.

Lake Grace Police are always happy to assist should you have any queries. The police should be contacted in the case where the online bullying takes the form of intimidation and direct threats. We can help to track down the perpetrator in the case of anonymous online bullying and will investigate any criminal offending.

TRAFFIC NEWS

We have made some changes to our shifts recently and pairing up with Dumbleyung Police to do night shifts. As a result, we caught a Perth local trying to sneak through the area late one night. He was driving an unlicensed vehicle and his driver's licence had been suspended by the court. As a result, his vehicle was impounded and he was summonsed for the offences.

Another driver was stopped and thought it would be a good idea to consume all the cannabis he was carrying, in an attempt to hide the evidence. Sure enough, he failed a drug test, was suspended from driving on the spot and has been summonsed for 'Driving with prescribed illicit drug in oral fluid'.

This charge is the result of failing a drug oral fluid test. Methamphetamine is normally detectable in oral fluid for up to a week or more after it was last consumed. Cannabis is detectable for even longer. It has a similar penalty to drink driving at levels in excess of 0.05% but below 0.08%. The penalties were increased last year to bring them in line with the seriousness of the offence and the danger a driver who is under the influence of drugs poses to themselves and others.

Lastly, we've been stopping a lot of locals leaving various functions and events later in the evening/night. All have been sober skippers which is great to see.

I want you to make a promise to me that you will always take care of your sisters. That you will always be there for one another. That you will not allow anyone to take you away from each other; ever. Do you understand?


When they are little girls, Cibi, Magda and Livia make a promise to their father – that they will stay together, no matter what.

NOTICE OF BAITING PROGRAM FOR WILD DOGS

www.ewbg.com.au

The Eastern Wheatbelt Biosecurity Group (EWBG) advises that from January 1st 2022 ongoing, heavy baiting programs (using 1080 meat baits) to control wild dogs will be carried out by Licensed Pest Management Technicians on Unallocated Crown Land to the east of the State Barrier Fence. In addition to 1080 baiting programs, technicians will be using foot hold traps treated with Strychnine to remove Wild Dogs that are currently impacting the livestock industry in the EWBG region.

From January 1st 2022, the standard wild dog control methods will be ongoing and this may include setting of traps and dispersing of 1080 meat baits in the groups operational area.

The poison baits will remain toxic for a number of months or until substantial rainfall is received. People are advised to take care when working within or visiting these areas.

Warning signs have been placed where applicable on Unallocated Crown Land and main access roads.

Picnic sites and recreational reserves are **not** included within the baiting program; however, baiting may take place adjacent to such areas and domestic pets should be kept close and under control at all times.

1080 baiting is an integral part of the wild dog pest management program to protect livestock from death and injury caused by wild dogs.



Exercise caution to prevent your pets from being poisoned by 1080 baits.



If a wild dog is sighted, please report to the Eastern Wheatbelt Biosecurity Group immediately.



If poisoning occurs, contact a doctor or Poisons Information Centre (phone 13 11 26).

Country Stargazing

Mysterious Dark Regions of the Sky

Our galaxy is filled with millions of stars and out under dark country skies, the view is incredible. Scientists estimate that our universe contains around 70 sextillion stars, that's a 7 followed by 22 zeros and more stars than grains of sand here on Earth.

However, there are also dark regions throughout that multitude of stars and one of interest now is the Coalsack Nebula. It is a massive dense cloud of interstellar dust that is blocking the stars behind it and is approximately 600 light years from Earth. This thick dense cloud is fuel for future star formation and can be easily seen on a dark night.

The Coalsack Nebula is special in that it also forms the head of the Aboriginal constellation, the Emu In The Sky. Just below the Southern Cross, try to find a dark oval shape, this is the head of the Emu with its beak pointing out. The long neck stretches down and to the left through the middle of 'the Pointers'. The body and legs of the Emu stretch halfway across the horizon towards the east.

It lies within the band of the Milkyway and its shape is outlined by dark areas of the night sky, not the stars.

When to look: 8.30pm, mid-June.

Which direction to look: South

As the weather begins to cool we move into winter, marked by the winter solstice on June 21, the first day of winter and the shortest day of the year. It's a great time to be looking at the stars and also searching out the mysterious dark regions of the sky.


The weather Gods have definitely gone a little crazy. On the afternoon of the 23rd May another storm passed through.






