## **WA Farmers Bear Brunt of Federal Government's Generosity**

In a bid to ease growers concerns regarding the Federal Government's decision to wipe Iraq's wheat debt to Australia, Federal Minister for Trade Mark Vaile held meetings with farmers in Lake Grace and Merredin yesterday.

"Over the past months, there has been some intense lobbying by WAFarmers and the Grains Council of Australia (GCA) to resolve this long outstanding issue" Mr De Landgraft said.

Western Australian Agriculture Minister Kim Chance said "WA growers who delivered wheat in the period from 1987/88 to 1989/90 are still owed an average of \$25,000 each. They have not been approached by the Federal Government to determine if they want to be paid.

Many of these farmers have ceased farming since 1989/90, some of whom could have continued farming if they had been paid for their sales to Iraq. None of these farmers can possibly benefit from present or future arrangements between Australia and Iraq."

The Federal Government promised in 1992 to ensure that no farmer who supplied wheat to Iraq would be left unpaid.

"The Federal Government has indicated that it wants to forgive the debt and there may be many reasons to support that view," Mr Chance said. "However, having undertaken

that responsibility, the Federal Government now has a duty to make good the wheat growers' losses. These debts were not the Federal Government's to forgive."

According to the AWB, Western Australian farmers' share of the debt was about \$US36 million. With about 7,000 wheat growers in WA, the average per grower is about \$US5,200. These figures do not include accrued interest.

Shadow Minister for Agriculture, Gavan O'Connor, said that "Mr Vaile must provide Australian wheat growers with all the facts surrounding the Howard Government's decision to forgive a \$100 million debt owed to them by Iraq.

This decision amounts to a significant and direct contribution to the economic recovery of Iraq by growers, but there is mounting evidence they were not properly consulted.

Mr Vaile must provide Australian farmers with details of what options were available to the Government to recover the debt before it decided to write that debt off."

Mr Chance said "The Federal Government needed to ensure that, at the very least, the affected growers were contacted and advised of the extent of the funds due to them and be provided with a schedule over which they would be paid.

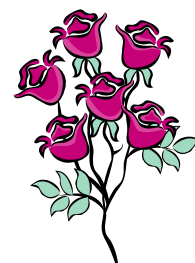

If you are interested in doing this workshop or would like more information please ring Suzanne on 9865 1470. The workshop will be held over two days in August or September. ***It is free.***

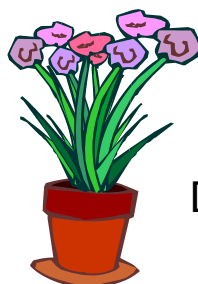

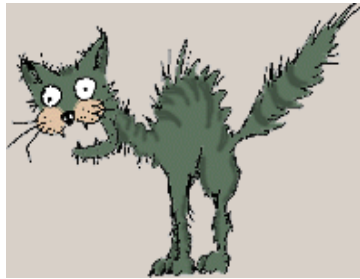

## Walk the Wheatbelt - Pedometer Program

Funding secured through the Physical Activity Taskforce Grant Program sponsored by the Local Government Association and Lotterywest has enabled the Roe District 'Be Active' Coordinators Scheme to purchase approximately 300 pedometers for residents to loan from their local Telecentres or libraries in the region.

Pedometers are an awareness tool used to calculate how much daily exercise people are participating in. They simply clip onto the participants belt on your hip, recording each step taken. They can be set to measure the distance you walk by inputting your stride length. The size of a matchbox they are suitable to be worn by most people at their workplace and at home. You simply clip it on in the morning and then take it off before going to bed, recording the steps for that period. 10,000 steps a day are regarded as enough to remain healthy.

The community awareness program will run for around three months and then we will be organising some inter town competitions with Corrigin, Dumbleyung, Kulin, Lake Grace, Wagin and Wickepin Shires. This will be a 'Walk the

Wheatbelt' program similar to the Be Active 'Swim to Rotto' concept. Teams from different community groups and businesses will be encouraged to participate, including schools and community clubs such as CWA and Seniors.

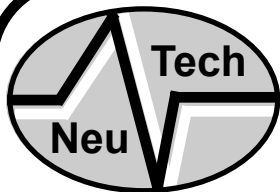

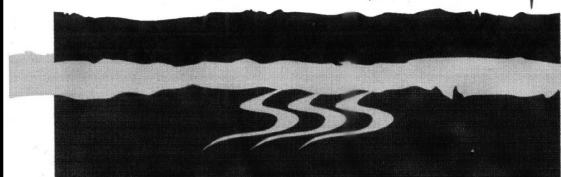

# OBITUARY – JOHN WALTER BENNETT

Our Grandad John Walter Bennett was born in the Wagin hospital on the 9<sup>th</sup> May 1921 son of Ernie and Catherine Bennett who were pioneers of Lake Grace.

Grandad was the youngest of 6 children and the most mischievous and is now only survived by sister Ivy who resides in Kansas City in USA. Grandad reminded us not once, not twice but continuously that his Mother always said he was the "Prettiest Baby" of all the 6 kids.

Grandad was raised on the family farm Rhynie (as it is still known today.) He then attended The Lake Grace Primary School. In those days they travelled to school by horse and sulky. He and his four sisters Ethel, Rita, Lila and Ivy were driven in the sulky by older brother Ralph. As years went by they all upgraded and had a pony or horse of their own, which back then was a bit of a privilege and considered a treat. Grandad's pony was called "Molly".

When he completed Primary School at Lake Grace, Grandad attended Albany High School for 2 years in 1934 and 1935. His sister Ivy has told us that he had a brilliant brain academically but preferred not to use it for this purpose and chose instead to apply it to all the sports available. These being football and cricket. He was chosen in his first year of high school in the football first 18 and in cricket the first 11 (considered a great honour.) We also understand that he was supposed to learn music with a private tutor, but rumours have it that he used to visit the Music Teacher to drink beer and smoke cigarettes. He certainly did not achieve with the piano.

After completing 2 years at Albany High School Grandad came back to the family farm and helped there until the Second World War broke out. He enlisted in the Air Force in 1941. In February 1942 he was sent to Adelaide where he did his Rookies course. After this he was sent to Melbourne and completed his course in Aircraft and Hydraulics. Following on from Melbourne Grandad was posted to Deniliquin and was trained to service and maintain Wirraway and Kittyhawk aircraft. After completing 7 months he became a qualified Leading Air Craftsman, (LAC). During his stay at Deniliquin he was chosen out of 2000 men to be in the first 18 football team and the first 11 cricket team. After this course he had 7 days vacation and then was transferred to Darwin to squadron 77 with Kittyhawks. From Darwin he was sent to Townsville for 2 weeks and was then posted to New Guinea travelling on a ship called the "Vanderlin" which sailed directly to Milne Bay. After

completing 6 months in Milne Bay Grandad was then posted to Goodenough Island. After spending some time there the women and children were evacuated to safer places and we are not sure whether this was to escape the enemy or Jack Bennett. In Goodenough Island tropical fruits such as bananas, paw paw, pineapple were plentiful, which Grandad loved.

At Milne Bay and Goodenough Island part of Grandad's job was to sleep under the aircraft at night and keep guard in case of enemy attack.

In October 1944 Grandad was manpowered out of the Airforce to come home to the family farm because apparently we had the Japs on the run.

After returning back to Lake Grace Grandad continued to court the little Lady who he had gone to Primary School with and kept corresponding with whilst he was in the Forces.

This Lady was Jane Murdoch and on the 1st of August 1945 Grandad and Grandma were married. They had a very close relationship, which grew even stronger after they had three children Faye, John and Clem.

In 1953 Grandad, his brother Ralph and their father Ernie purchased another property called "Coleraine". Here Grandad and Grandma farmed and raised Faye, John and Clem.

Grandad loved shearing time, and even up until last year sat on his chair with broom in hand keeping a watchful eye over the shearers to make sure the job was done correctly.

Over the years Grandad was very involved in sporting activities such as football, cricket, tennis, golf and later bowls. His name is the 1st on the Lake Grace football Club honour board being Fairest and Best in 1945. He also has his name on the Lake Grace Bowling Club honour boards many times.

The arrival of eight Grand children and three great grandchildren really enriched the lives of both Grandad and Grandma.

Grandad and Grandma moved into number 1 Bennett Street in 1981 and called their home "Kiora" and had many wonderful occasions and celebrations there. Unfortunately in 1996 Grandma passed away. Grandad then lived 8 years alone but still had a wonderful sense of humour.

He was affectionately called "Gentleman Jack".

Thank you for your love and caring guidance over a lifetime and being such a special Dad, Grandad and Great Grandad.

## **OBITUARY – GEORGE EDWARD LANNIN**

### **26<sup>th</sup> April 1926 – 20<sup>th</sup> June 2004**

Loved husband of Joyce, father of Kim and Pam, and Cherylyn and Alan, Grandpa to Tahlee, Danielle and Jonathan, Natasha and Benjamin, and Rebecca, and Great-Grandpa to James.

George Lannin will be remembered across Western Australia as a brilliant businessman and tough negotiator. Lannin Motors was synonymous with Lake Grace and the Western Australian farming community.

George Edward Lannin was born in Fremantle on 26 April 1926 to parents George and Kath. He was the first of three children, a brother Jerry and a sister Carol.

George came to the Lake Grace area as a toddler with his parents in 1928 when they took up a virgin block of land north of Lake Biddy. In about 1936 the family moved to a previously abandoned property in the Beenong area.

The move enabled George to attend his first school at the age of 10 (previously he studied by correspondence). He left school at the age of 14 to help on the farm, and in 1944 joined the RAAF at 18.

George left the RAAF in 1946 at age 20, and worked for an uncle at Mundijong who owned butcher shops. George worked at slaughtering, dressing and deliveries, working 60-hour weeks for a wage of 3 pound, 10 shillings per week.

During this time George was a member of the Mundijong Boxing Club and participated in the State Boxing Championship in the Perth Town Hall where he won the amateur middle weight class.

Whilst recovering from diphtheria, George took on a "light" job with a grocery store in Lake Grace.

George married Joyce Lydia Harvey on 5<sup>th</sup> August 1948 at St Anne's Anglican Church, Lake Grace. Their son, Kim, was born in May 1949, and their daughter, Cherylyn, in January 1952.

In 1948, the same year they were married, George and Joyce started a small green grocer business in the main street of Lake Grace. Soon after they became the agency for Austin cars and trucks, and

Case tractors.

George's ability at, and enjoyment of, selling and trading cars and machinery soon ensured the groceries were left behind. Lannin Motors moved into new premises in 1960 and took-up the General Motors Holden dealership and Chamberlain agencies.

Joyce was forever his supportive partner. She has memories of George setting-out on a business trip on Monday morning, and not hearing from him until Thursday night as he drove the state buying and selling cars. One quick trip could last a week.

The Farm Weekly was an integral part of Lannin Motors. George had it couriered to his front door every Wednesday night, and by the time the general public received it on Thursday morning, George had all his deals done!

George was a man with high business principles, and his family can tell many stories of how George helped local farmers. He would sell machinery to those farmers just starting-out in business, and let them pay him when they had available finances or after harvest.

Another famous family story tells of the time George was asked by a finance company to repossess a tractor. It was in the middle of seeding, so he sent a replacement tractor out to the farmer so they could finish seeding. Another repossession story tells how a piece of machinery was "hidden" from the finance company until after harvest!

Lannin Motors was the longest running, privately owned business in Lake Grace's history, closing in 1999.

George loved selling and trading, and he would trade cattle or sheep for machinery, and there was a period where he traded farms – reaching an ownership total of 14 at one stage from Narembreen and Newdegate to Denbarker and Nyabing.

George and Joyce, and their various interests, have been an integral part of Lake Grace and its development, commerce and community for over

50 years. It included 50 years membership of the Masonic Lodge, 10 years as a Shire Councillor and involvement with the Anglican Church, Sportsman's Club, and as a board member of the Community Cooperative. George's community interest was evident even as a 21 year old. In 1947 he formed a youth club in Lake Grace that staged a successful concert and sports meeting.

As much as work was a hobby, George's passions were horses, particularly race horses, and his family. He gave all his grand-daughters their first ponies (most of the ponies were acquired as a resultant swap for a piece of machinery) and taught them how to ride. They have fond memories of travelling to race meetings with their Grandpa in Albany, Bunbury and Mount Barker, and the friendships he made. They will always remember the love, pride and encouragement he showed towards them and their professional careers.

George Lannin worked hard; lived frugally; cared for and served the community; loved, served and provided for his family; and thereby set a fine

example for family and friends to emulate.

Most importantly he will be remembered by family, friends, and the Western Australian farming community, as George Lannin, of Lannin Motors, Lake Grace.

# SCIENCE AND STUFF



**Pharaoh's Catalogue:** The death mask of Tutankhamen may be it's most famous exhibit, but the Egyptian Museum in Cairo has just begun a five-year programme to catalogue and restore 90,000 of its other relics of Egyptian history. *(New Scientist 12th June)*

**Digital Pollution:** Generating the power to run TV's and other video devices already dumps 7 million tonnes of carbon dioxide a year into the atmosphere in the UK alone, and is expected to triple over the next ten years. The hike will come as more people add the set-top box needed to view digital TV to their home entertainment systems. The biggest waste comes in standby mode. Set-top boxes consume around 9 watts while on, but this only drops to 7 watts on standby. The UK leads the world in conversion to digital TV, with 53% of homes now on digital. But Europe and Australia are fast catching up. China wants to switch off all analogue TV's before the Beijing Olympics in 2008, putting another billion digital receivers into use. *(New Scientist - 12th June)*

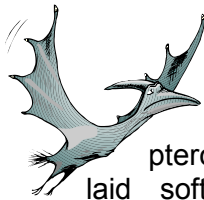


**Mystery Cow Disease:** a strange brain disease that gradually killed a cow is puzzling vets in the UK. They have ruled out BSE, West Nile Virus and Louping-ill, a tick borne disease. Inflammation caused by a virus is the most likely suspect. *(New Scientist - 12th June)*

**Aerosols form in a cocktail of smoke and fumes:** Particles in the air we breathe are blamed by some for the growing health problems in developed countries. But the processes responsible for creating them are poorly understood. Now it turns out that the particles form much more easily than had been thought - from the cocktail of traffic fumes and industrial pollution found in urban areas. Simulated levels of urban pollution were obtained by varying the amount of aromatic acid and sulphuric acid vapours in an enclosed vessel. Sulphuric acid is produced by burning coal, while aromatic acids are associated with vehicle emissions. It was found that the formation of particles increased as much as tenfold in the presence of both aromatic acids and sulphuric acid. The researchers believe that the interaction between these acids reduce the amount of energy needed to form particulate matter. Calculations suggest that substances combine to form an intermediate stable aromatic acid-sulphuric acid complex which acts as a stepping stone to the formation of mixed organic

sulphate particles.

Suspensions of particles in the atmosphere, known as aerosols, also affect the global climate by scattering incoming radiation and creating a cooling effect. More locally they can affect weather systems by changing the way clouds form and altering the chances of rain or snow falling. *(Science, vol 304, p 1487)*



**Pterosaurs went for the soft shell:** A spectacular fossil, the only one known to contain an embryonic pterosaur, suggests that flying reptiles laid soft eggs rather than hard ones. Fossilised dinosaur eggs are common, although very few contain the bones needed to identify the parents. Fossilised lizard and bird eggs have also been found but none from a pterosaur. The embryo dates back to the early Cretaceous period around 121 million years ago and was preserved in the sediment of an ancient lake in north-eastern China. The embryo is nearly complete, with its wing bones folded tightly to fit into a volume about the size of a chicken egg. Its elongated fourth finger and other bones clearly identify it as a pterosaur, with a wingspan of about 27 centimetres. The egg must have been soft as it was squashed flat so that the pterosaur would not have been able to sit on them. *(Nature, vol 429, p 621)*



**Wind warns of big waves in record time:** dark patches on the ocean surface could help warn coastal communities of the approach of a menacing wave. Tsunamis are huge waves that swell out from the sites of underwater earthquakes or landslides, travelling across oceans at around 800 kilometres per hour. In deep water, they only raise the surface of the ocean by a few centimetres, but when they near the shore they billow up into giant tidal waves. People on the shore have sometimes reported seeing mysterious strips of dark water several kilometres wide moving across the sea surface before tsunamis strike. It is calculated that the dark patch is caused by a rapid airflow ruffling the sea surface. *(Geophysical research letters)*

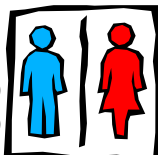
#### GREAT SOUTHERN COLTS CARNIVAL

## Getting What You Pay For

How often does it happen? You pay for something and then problems arise which take all the fun out of the purchase. The Department of Consumer and Employment Protection regularly hears from frustrated consumers who end up having arguments with merchants for providing what they think is a less than satisfactory service or product.

Most often, the argument is about quality. A consumer can reasonably expect that if they pay for a kilo of goods, then they should get a kilo. If they have asked for a delivery of wood, then it shouldn't contain rocks. Consumers generally expect to get what they are paying for. An unhelpful attitude sometimes displayed in business, that 'near enough is good enough', is not well received by many consumers.

The sort of things being reported include loads of garden compost containing un-composted materials (like shredded paper); loads of firewood sold by weight found to be wet or contain foreign materials such as gravel; contracted mechanical repairs or home extensions taking too long or ending up more expensive than first quoted; garden mulch sold by weight but found to contain stones and soil; garden loam which turns out to yield a range of weeds; electrical appliances which fail after little use, a merchant denying liability and flicking the consumer off to 'the approved repairer'

and deli items, such as meat, sold underweight.

The list goes on and almost everyone has a story to tell. Consumers have a right to expect to get what they pay for and this right is enshrined in law.

The Fair Trading Act sets out that goods should 'be as described' and that they should 'be fit for the purpose for which they were intended'. The law also sets out that services provided should be to a 'trade standard'. This obligation to quality is a warranty that all traders must honour and cannot be set aside by signs stating 'all care but no responsibility'.

Failure to adhere to these basic guidelines in commerce can result in prosecutions along with hefty fines for those found guilty.

The Fair Trading Act aims to reinforce what the community at large expects and that is, integrity in commerce and trade. Those who flaunt these community expectations should expect consequences.

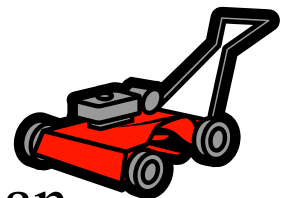

## Get in Early with Funding Requests Advises new 'Be Active Coordinator'



Groups interested in planning or conducting events that will benefit the general health of the community but are unsure of how to go about getting funding support should contact Healthways' new 'Be Active' Community Sport and Recreation Coordinator for the region, Ben Bryant.

Ben is encouraging community groups to contact him to discuss any projects for which they may be sourcing funds.

Some funds are available to support small equipment purchases, conduct events and development programs, and for capital infrastructure projects.

"However, in many circumstances it takes at least four months for a funding to be approved after receipt of the application, so it is very important for groups to plan well ahead of the date of their event," Ben said. "Interested groups should determine the conditions under which grants are made available, and prepare early.

"Part of my role as the 'Be Active' Coordinator for the seven shires within the scheme - Corrigin,

Dumbleyung, Kondinnin, Kulin, Lake Grace, Wagin and Wickepin - is to assist all clubs and sporting associations to prepare and write their funding applications."

Since arriving in Kulin last month after fulfilling a similar role for two years with the Shire of Dundas, Ben has 'hit the ground running,' promoting physical activity through the schools and communities within the region and providing advice to sporting clubs, community groups and local government officers in all issues relating to sport and recreation, including grant funding, training courses and special events.

"In the next few weeks I will be visiting schools and local shires to fast-track several programs including the 'Walk the Wheatbelt Pedometer' Program, the Schools 'Winter Warm-Up' Program, and promoting school and community clinics and activities such golf, fishing, soccer and self-defense," Ben said.

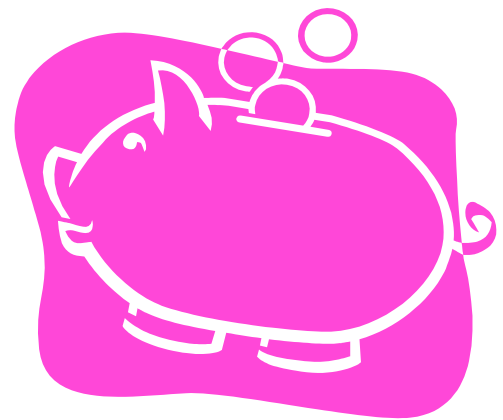

## Getting Your Complaint Heard!

When the shopping experience turns sour and the purchase isn't all you had hoped, what can an individual do to make it right? Here are some do's and don'ts in trying to make your case and to be heard:

**DO** remember to keep your receipts. Businesses are not legally obliged to do anything if customers cannot show "proof of purchase".

**DO** try to discuss the matter calmly with the person who dealt with you. Familiarity may speed up the process.

**DON'T** allow yourself to become irritated, emotional, raise your voice or otherwise make a scene. Becoming angry doesn't help. It will only cloud your judgement and make any resolution far more difficult to reach.

**DO** be logical when explaining the problem.

**DO** be prepared to learn about your rights and responsibilities as a shopper. The Department of Consumer and Employment Protection has an excellent free booklet entitled "Your Rights When

Shopping", a telephone help line: 1300 30 40 54 and a very useful website full of relevant information. ([www.docep.wa.gov.au](http://www.docep.wa.gov.au))

**DO** be prepared as a next step, to put your complaint in writing to the proprietor. A written complaint always carries far more weight than a phone call in the complaint handling process. This is particularly true for large businesses.

**DO** be prepared to go directly to the business owner if shop floor staff can't help you.

**DO** allow your local Consumer Protection office to assist if it becomes too hard. Our staff are trained and experienced in negotiation and our service is free.

**DO** expect that from time to time, you may be wrong or have an unrealistic expectation of what the business can do to rectify the problem. Likewise businesses can also make mistakes, that's where we may be able to help set things right.

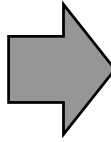

# Licensing - Where to go and what to do!

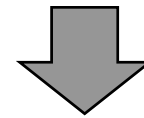
## General Theory Test

Applicant completes a 30 multiple-choice Computerised Theory Test. Test takes 35 minutes or less with a pass mark of 24/30. Applicant must be 16 years or older. This test is undertaken at the Lake Grace Telecentre. Applicant must bring one form each of Primary and Secondary ID. If you are under 18, you must also have a letter of consent signed by your parent or legal guardian. Once test is completed, results are available at the Lake Grace Shire. If you have passed you then fill in an application form for a learner's permit (at Shire) - at this point you also need to present Primary and Secondary ID, and make a payment of \$51.20.



## Practical Driving Test

This assessment is completed by the Lake Grace Police, applicant must be 16.5 years of age. Testing is done on **WEDNESDAYS** and takes approximately 30 minutes. Ring Tony or Dave on 9865 1007 for an appointment (no more than a week in advance). Applicant must bring their learner's permit and have the use of a roadworthy vehicle.



## Hazard Perception Test

Applicant must be 17 years or older, he/she takes completed Log Book (25 hours of supervised driving), learner's permit and Primary ID to Lake Grace Shire Office. Once payment is made, you will receive a HPT application form. Applicant can then proceed to Lake Grace Telecentre to undertake computerised HPT. Once test is completed results are obtained from the Shire office. Initial fee is \$24.20, every ensuing test costs \$14.90.

# NIGHT WATCH

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday July 2 to midnight Friday July 16.

Earth, on Monday 5th will be at Aphelion, furthest from the Sun at 1.017 astronomical units, or 152,095,209kms at 7pm.

The latest onset of twilight is at 5.41pm on the 4th.

The Sun, resides in Gemini for this fortnight.

The last quarter moon is at 3.34pm on the 9th in Pisces. On the 15th the Moon will be a Apogee, furthest from earth at 406,192 kms. The moon moves through the night sky this fortnight.

Mercury in Cancer on Saturday sets at 6.24pm and sets around five minutes later each night, setting at 7.17pm on the 16th in Leo. Mercury on Sunday 11th will be 0.2° north of Mars.

Venus now in the morning sky in Taurus, rises on Saturday at 4.40am and rises at 4.07 on the 16th. On this Sunday Venus will be 1° north of the orange/red star Aldebaran, which represents the eye of the bull and is in the open star cluster "the Hyades", in the shape of a V and represents the head. On the 14th Venus will be 8° south of the Moon. On the 15th Venus will be at its greatest brilliancy of -4.5 magnitude.

Mars, in Cancer sets around 7pm.

Jupiter, in Leo sets around 10.30pm at magnitude -2.1.

The ringed planet Saturn, will be in the early morning twilight by the end of the fortnight after being in conjunction with the Sun on the 9th.

The blue/green planet Uranus, in Aquarius, rises around 9.30pm and is at magnitude 5.7. on the 6th Uranus will be 4° north of the Moon.

The grey/green planet Neptune, at magnitude 7.8 rises around 7.40pm in Capricornus and will be 5° north of the moon on Sunday 4th.

Pluto in the constellation of Serpens at 13.8 is in the sky all night.

There should be a good few meteors in the night sky mostly in Aquarius but also in Capricornus, Sagittarius, Pisces and in Pegasus which is north of Pisces in the morning sky. In Aquarius there will be about 10 per hour.

The Moon this fortnight is in Capricornus on 3rd and 4th. Aquarius on 5th, 6th and 7th. Cetus on 8th. Pisces on 9th. Aries on 10th and 11th. Taurus on 12th, 13th and 14th. Gemini on 15th and 16th.

The sky was cloudy most of the afternoon for the transit of Venus across the face of the Sun on June 8th, but with a few breaks we did manage to see some of it. At the same time there was two small sunspots which gave a good idea of how the Earth and Venus really are, and there was no mention of them on the news. The next one is in 2012.

# LAKE GRACE DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION

Sometimes we wonder if we are achieving anything as we attend seemingly endless meetings and things just happen Oh So Slowly that at times we can wonder if it is all worth while. A few weeks ago I found this in my notes:

The following are 10 of the **Priority Projects For Community Action** that were a result of the original "Vision 2020" meeting in Lake Grace. The 2020 Vision meeting was held late in 1992 in the Town Hall for the whole Shire.

## 1. Agricultural college with alternative farming.

- Establish an agricultural college which looks at alternative farming. Lake Grace to be promoted as the alternative farming centre of the Wheatbelt and of W.A./Australia.

## 2. Improve town appearances with townscape and promote town and Shire themes.

- Establish overall townscape plans which get completed in stages. Improve signage throughout the Shire and develop a theme relevant to each town.

- Initiated and funded by the Shire in 18 months to 2 years.

## 3. Restore Old Railway Building

- Refurbish and restore the railway station in Lake Grace, and incorporate a tourist bureau, coffee shop, child care facilities/playgroup, and craft shop. One year for completion.

## 4. Establish a Development Association and/or Chamber of Commerce.

- Establish a Development or Progress Association to actively pursue local economic development opportunities that arise. Rationalise existing groups into this Association. Also consider the establishment of a Chamber of Commerce.

## 5. Establish Lake King Toilets/Craft Centre.

- Establish a craft shop in Lake King and consider the establishment of more public toilets near the site. The shop could be a sales outlet to the passing tourist trade.

## 6. Gypsum Mining and Value Added Industries.

- Promote the mining of gypsum and other value adding industries.

## 7. Recycling Project(s).

- Encourage local recycling programs in the Shire.

## 8. Tourism Project - Old Hospital and Interpretive Centre.

- More aggressively market tourism opportunities at the old hospital. Give the Perth based tourism bureau more information about the attractions in the Lake Grace Shire.

- Establish a tourist walk and tourist drive, and produce a map of the associated attractions in the Shire. Improve signage in the Shire and promote the salt lake systems.

- Establish a new tourist group in each town.

## 9. Telecentre and Improved Library Resources Centre.

- Establish a Telecentre in Lake Grace with smaller centres in Lake King and Newdegate. The Development Association to assist with the ongoing establishment of this resource, with support from the Wheatbelt Development Commission.

## 10. Transport old buildings to create housing and commercial areas.

- Make use of old housing in the Shire by transporting materials for the construction of housing in the towns. It has been eleven and a half years since that meeting and all things considered we have done quite well even though the time frames were a bit out. Give yourselves a pat on the back Lake Grace.

## Baking With Pamela

What a joy it is to live in a rural community like Lake Grace.

This was brought home to our family, last week, when after George's funeral we returned with family and friends to the Shire Hall to share in stories, food and a cuppa. The spread prepared by the Lake Grace Cooks was amazing and the tables were overflowing with the very best of authentic baking.

We talk about "comfort food", I am sure the term must have originated in Lake Grace as only care and love can produce such food, which, in turn was a comfort to all of us.

### Sponge

Old favourites are still favourites today. I have used, over the years, numerous sponge recipes from all over the world. This one is my all time favourite, given to me by my friend Joan. It is guaranteed to not fail.

I will always remember the time (~1986) my eldest daughter was busy baking to enter into the local show. Our power failed so we had to pack everything into our car and drive to Joan's home, a distance between farms of 30 km. Yes, she did win a prize for the sponge however, our best memories are not of the win but the fun time shared in Joan's kitchen as Dani baked away.

4 eggs – room temperature  
 3/4 cup castor sugar  
 3/4 cup cornflour  
 1 rounded tablespoon custard powder  
 2 teaspoons cream of tartar  
 1 teaspoon bi-carbonate soda

- Preheat oven to 180-190°C. Line base, grease and flour two 20 cm (8in) cake tins.
- Beat eggs until thick and creamy, add castor sugar and continue beating until a figure of 8 will form and hold.
- While mixture is beating sift together all the powders, 3-4 times.
- Fold powders into beaten mixture.
- Divide mixture evenly into two tins, drop each tin from a height of 30-45 cm onto bench or floor. This will eradicate any large air bubbles and result in a finer sponge.
- Bake for 20 minutes.
- Remove from tins as soon as cooked.

| Coffee Sponge    | 1 tablespoon instant coffee added to egg mixture before the powders, make sure it dissolves. |
| Cinnamon Sponge  | 1 tablespoon cinnamon and 2 teaspoons mixed spice added to cornflour before sifting.         |
| Ginger Sponge    | Add 1 tablespoon ginger and 1 teaspoon mixed spice to cornflour before sifting.              |

### Swiss Roll

- Make half the basic recipe mixture.
- Pour into a small swiss roll tin, which has been papered and greased.
- Bake in 180°C oven until golden and springy to touch.
- Place a clean tea towel (preferably a thin one) on the table and turn the cake on to this.
- Remove paper from base of cake.
- Trim off any dry, crusty edges.
- Spread cake quickly with warmed thin jam.
- Make a shallow cut in cake about 2 cm from the end furthest from you.
- Fold this over firmly and pull the tea towel or cloth towards you and the cake will roll as you pull.
- Wrap in cloth for a few seconds to ensure roll is firm.
- Sprinkle a little castor sugar into the cloth and roll the cake backwards and forwards till it is coated thinly.
- Cool on a wire tray away from a draught.

# ABCDE

## Asset Based Community Development through Education

**Asset-Based Community Development through Education** is a strategic approach to developing connections between schools and their local communities.

Lake Grace has been selected for a pilot project to investigate community development by using the assets of the community and the school along with the education process. The strategy aims to recognise and value schools as significant (and in many cases untapped) community assets. The first phase of the project is to create an inventory of community and school assets and develop a registry of skills that exist in our community.

Lake Grace District High School students have been working on this first phase and presented their findings to the ABCDE reference group and community members on Tuesday June 22<sup>nd</sup>.

The Year 1,2 and 3 students, with teachers Jodie Blackwood and Janet Sebestyen, were asked to collate local business assets. They visited the town's businesses, asking various questions such as 'Is this a family business? Do you wear a uniform? How many people work here?' With this information, the students made a Big Book which was shown to all at the meeting.

Year 4, 5, and 6 students, with teachers Gemma Scarterfield, Kristey Hobley and Barry Lane have chosen to do a 3D scale-model of the town. The 1.2m x 4.6m base has been made in three interlocking pieces with the streets and blocks drawn to scale. Groups of students sketched the buildings of Stubbs Street, taking measurements and noting colours and distinguishing features. Models of the buildings will be made and it is hoped that interested community members will assist the students.

A recent survey of Western Australia shows a volunteer rate of 45% in rural communities. The Year 7 class with Davina Reid listed all of the organizations in town with a preliminary count of more than 50 community groups. They showed a very impressive Power Point presentation listing each organization's origin, aims, meeting times, office bearers, members, special skills and contact details.

An exercise by the Year 8 class has the potential to reveal a wealth of skills and talent in our

community. Year 8 students with teachers Stuart Blackwood, Rick Elliot, Davina Reid and Lynn Draper compiled a survey to identify the talents, interests and abilities of the population. Designed on a check box format to encourage wider participation, occupations and skills range from accountancy to woodworking. Of 260 surveys sent to the parents of students, 31 have so far been returned. If you have not received a survey form, collect one from the Post Office and let us know what you can do!

The Year 10 class with Miss Dodson looked at how Lake Grace's location might be an asset. They identified such things as the low crime rate, lack of over-crowding, no terrorism, the clean air and caring people.

Natural environmental assets was the focus of the Year 9 class. They made a day trip to local attractions such as the salt lakes, the look-out, Dingo Rock and the White Cliffs and also looked at local flora and fauna.

All presentations were extremely professional with good use of the digital camera, computer graphics and Power Point.

A major point to come from this meeting was that Lake Grace has the potential to become a significant sub-regional centre. Another community meeting will be held on Tuesday July 27<sup>th</sup> to identify a number of objectives for the next phase of the project. This will be followed by a video conference with members of the reference group.

A community forum, with the reference group, students and school principals, will then be held on August 3<sup>rd</sup>. Mr Rick Battistoni, a visiting US facilitator, will give us feedback on the project to date, give examples of and advise on how we can develop our community goals.

The database is the central listing for all Western Australian clubs, societies, groups and associations incorporated under the Associations Incorporation Act (1987). A review is currently underway to confirm which associations are currently active, and which aren't.

"There are thousands of names on the database, including many weird and wonderful ones and some that are just plain interesting, such as the Skull Bone and Pig Society", Consumer Protection Commissioner Patrick Walker said.

Some other names are:

- \* The Chain Locker Club
- \* Organising Council of the 7th British Empire and Commonwealth Games

- \* The Useless Angling Club
- \* Light Weight Sharpie Club of Western Australia

"What we don't know is whether they all still exist, as clubs are not required to contact the department to keep us informed of their activities and contact details.

"We are now making a number of public approaches to find out.

"Not only would we like to hear from members of active groups, we would also love to hear from former members of now defunct groups. In this way we can confirm the current status of associations, and update our database to reflect this.

If associations are found to be inactive we can then also take the legal steps necessary to cancel the entries and free up names for other organisations", Mr Walker said.

## Transport Industry Hazards Lead to High Injury Rates

The transport and storage industry in WA has a consistently higher rate of work-related injuries and diseases than the average.

Statistics show that the employees most in danger of sustaining a lost-time injury (an incident that results in at least one day or shift lost from work) are truck drivers, who account for 27 per cent of injuries.

Transport and storage is also one of the five industries on which the ThinkSafe campaign focuses because of serious concerns with high injury rates.

WorkSafe WA Commissioner Nina Lyhne said today that the transport and storage industry had a high rate of manual handling injuries, both from lifting and handling heavy items.

"Manual handling is one of WorkSafe's priority areas, and one-third of all lost-time injuries in the transport and storage industry are the result of incorrect lifting and handling of goods," Ms Lyhne

said.

"Manual handling injuries can be anything from minor muscle strains to debilitating long-term injuries. A further 23 per cent of lost-time injuries are the result of falls in the workplace, another one of WorkSafe's priority areas."

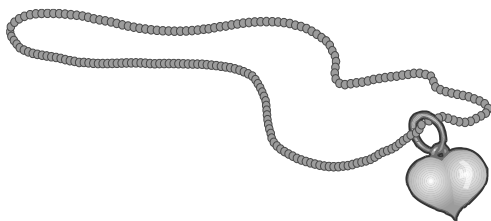
"Across all industries, an average of two Western Australians die each year as a result of workplace falls, and there are around 1350 incidents involving falls each year that result in injuries to workers."

"A very comprehensive revised code of practice on falls was released recently which provides information on the identification of common fall hazards at all workplaces and the use of fall-arrest equipment and systems, along with chapters on work practices specific to the transport industry."

Another cause for concern in the transport and storage industry is the safe movement of vehicles at workplaces.

## Transport Industry Hazards Lead to High Injury Rates...cont

Activities often linked to injuries are reversing, loading, unloading and pedestrian movements, and all these activities need to be designed, planned and controlled in order to reduce the risk of incidents.

Fatigue is also of great concern in the transport and storage industry, with fatigue contributing to around 25 per cent of fatal truck crashes in WA each year.

Fatigue can lead to loss of concentration, drowsiness, slow reaction times and falling asleep at the wheel.

New standards for managing fatigue came into effect last year designed to help drivers have minimum periods of rest, better opportunities for sleep, and require drivers to undertake medical examinations to ensure they are fit to drive.

"I strongly encourage employers in the transport and storage industry to take a good look at their workplaces, identify any possible risks to employees and take action to reduce these risks and improve safety in this industry," Ms Lyhne said

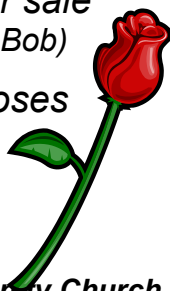

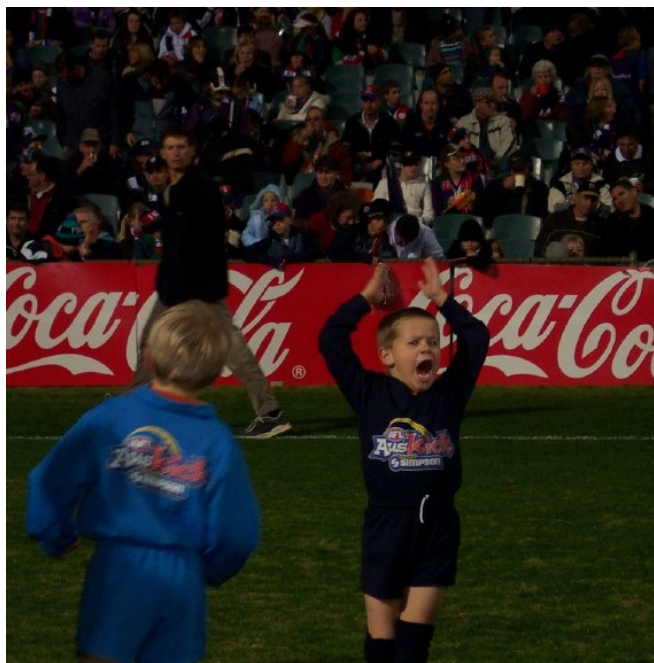

## Businesses Hassled by Charitable Collections

Rural businesses are regularly approached for donations for various causes. The requests come in many forms; letter, fax, telephone call and personal approaches on site. Requests for charity range from small amounts by the "tin rattlers" to thousand dollar sponsorships.

How does business manage what is becoming a real nuisance and distraction in the workplace? As a consequence of this constant barrage of requests, some charities are finding themselves receiving a less-than-polite reception by hassled proprietors.

To alleviate this problem, a simple business decision needs to be made: Does your business wish to donate to any charity? If no, then make this policy clear by posting a sign at the entrance to your premises and also, by informing your employees. This will save a lot of time and provides clarity in your own mind and that of your staff.

However, if you would like to be charitable then deciding how much and to whom is the next step. Making this decision early will remove uncertainty. Many regional businesses choose to support the people that support them; that is, their local community. Schools, churches, emergency services, social and sporting clubs are always appreciative of financial support.

In my discussions with businesspeople, it seems that much of their annoyance and frustration with collectors comes from the conflict between a

genuine wish to support others that are less fortunate and being pressured into a decision whilst at work and by a total stranger. This removes any possibility of enjoying that sense of pride and achievement which should come when giving to a charitable cause.

The Department of Consumer and Employment Protection regulates licenced charitable organisations and businesses can check the department's register of licenced charities by logging on to our website at [www.docep.wa.gov.au/charities](http://www.docep.wa.gov.au/charities). Collectors may only operate from 9am to 6pm, Monday to Saturday, and instances of collectors seeking donations outside of these hours should be reported to the department.

It is also important to note that some organisations which may seek donations from businesses or the general public are not at present required by legislation to be registered with DOCEP. School parents and friends associations and sporting clubs are examples of this.
