Monster Machines

Afgri took the opportunity to demonstrate their monster of a new machine for the community crop seeding programme last week. John Deere's new C850 aircart, holding 850 bushels, is the largest that they make; coupled with the 1870 conserver pack seeding bar and new 9570 RX tractor it is an impressive array of equipment that is designed to minimise stoppage time.

The aircart's holding capacity means that there is less downtime for reloading. The new air powered distribution system with section control is a tool against double seeding and it has individual load scales on each bin and automatic calibration.

This is the third year that Afgri have taken part in the community cropping programme and they are one of the many businesses that support this local imitative over the 12 months.

As a result of barley doing well in this paddock and the soil type, this will be the third consecutive year the paddock is sown to barley. Due to the consecutive barley crops, we have decided that Spartacus CL barley is the best fit. - So what's happening in relation to funding cuts? We haven't heard any more at this stage except that it will be happening in 2019. The Lake Grace CRC won't be closing but we will have to look at some of our pricing. The big concern is what will come next. It might be a 30% cut at this stage but what after that? If more cuts come in then we will have to look at opening hours and the kinds of community work that we can take on.
- Once again I would like to remind everyone that if you want something in the paper you need to be getting it to us as soon as possible. Our sporting contributors have been excellent this fortnight with most getting their material in last week. Unless you're involved with the paper you actually don't realise how difficult it is to coordinate. We like to keep our advertising at around the 30-35% mark and balance it out with articles and media releases. We map it out Monday morning (sometimes on a Friday if we're really organized) juggling what will go where. We only need one contributor to not get their material in (or spring something on us) and it can send everything into a spin. A simple half page to the contributor can have us tearing our hair out as to whether we add another two pages (you can't just add one) or try to squish everything up. We love getting everyone's contributions as it's your stuff that makes the paper great but please be mindful of our sanity.

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The Age Of The Debutante

In the United Kingdom debutante ceremonies were seen as the formal coming out for a young woman from an upper-class background, an opportunity to announce to the world that she was of age to be wooed. The debutante ball signalled the start of the social season and was celebrated at English Court with the debutantes being presented to the reigning monarch. The last of these was held in 1958 with Queen Elizabeth II then abolishing the ceremony.

In Australia it was an equally formal affair that has waxed and waned in popularity over the years with girls in high school, between the ages of 15-18 taking part. All the girls wear a white dress, similar to a wedding dress but without a train, while their partners wear black suits, white shirts and a bow tie. Still held in various communities in Australia, the balls are often run by community groups as fundraisers.

Lake Grace has hosted six of these evenings with the first in 1951 and the last in 1979. Mrs Gwen Pugh tutored the first debutante ball held in Lake Grace while Jan Mason (or Thornton as she was) tutored the other five.

In 1961, as part of their jubilee celebrations Lake Grace held a junior debutante ball with 50 primary school aged children accompanied by four teenage flower girls, Moya Pelham, Lenore Elliott, Valma Eggers and Barbara Naisbitt who wore a different coloured evening gown.

With the children being presented to the then WA premier, David Brand and his wife Doris, tutoring was done on a weekly to twice -weekly basis for at least six weeks prior to the evening. The children were all assembled at the CWA hall before being walked to the back of the Shire hall and brought into what was the

At this point the boys and girls were separated with the girls making their way onto the stage while the boys made their way into the main part of the hall and stood at the side of the steps positioned at the centre of the stage. The boys held the hand of their partners as they descended the steps before they both walked the red carpet hand in hand, where they were presented to the Premier and Mrs Brand before taking part in a brief dance.

Jan Mason has fond memories of the debutante balls, the glamour of the dresses and decorations, the participants and the dignitaries who were involved. "The invited guests who were to receive the debutantes on the night were all wonderful people to deal with", said Jan.

A big thank you to Jan Mason for donating so many photographs and information regarding the debutante balls to the CRC. Her detailed information to go with the photographs was fabulous and something that we will be able to utilise in the future. Expect to see more about these debutante balls in the coming papers and also on our Lost Lake Grace Facebook page.



It has been a great first week in Newdegate for the PUBLIC Silo Trail, with Brenton See and the FORM team having made rapid progress. It has been wonderful having the community come and visit, and chat with the team, and there has been a steady stream of travelers and visitors stop and watch the goings on from Esperance, Ravensthorpe and several from New South Wales, who are passing through.

As the first silo came to life, a Western Bearded Dragon - Pogona minor minor (Pogona - Greek, meaning Beard) made an appearance. Named after the flap of skin found below their jaw which they "puff up" if threatened, Bearded Dragons can grow to anywhere from 30cm - 60cm depending on the species. The Western Bearded Dragon is found at Dragon Rocks and is common to this and the Wheatbelt area. You will find Western Bearded Dragons in woodland, scrubland on rocky outcrops. Also featured on this silo are some Cowslip Orchids which are located in this area.





Second to be unveiled was the much anticipated Mallee Fowl. The Mallee Fowl is a ground dwelling bird, a bit larger than a domestic chicken. Their large nesting mounds are constructed by the males who scrape large amounts of leaf litter together, so the eggs can be laid in a cavity at the top. In the background of this silo a Salmon Gum is featured which are found in many paddocks and shade patches around the area.

Yesterday, the latest to be revealed was a Red Tailed Phascogale which is a rare little marsupial that inhabits the area. There is more to come on this little creature as he is further revealed.

We look forward to watching the rest of the silo's come to life and thank the Newdegate community and CBH crew for their amazing support. Hope to see you sometime this week.

Mobiles and Tablets

Today smartphones and tablets are used to connect, shop, work, bank, research, track our fitness and complete hundreds of other tasks any time, and from any location.

Remember: Treat your phone like your wallet; keep it safe and with you at all times.

So what could happen?

If your mobile device is unsecured and it is lost or stolen:

- It could be used to access your money or steal your identity using information stored on your device.
- You may lose irreplaceable data like photos, notes or messages (if it is not backed up).
- Your social media accounts could be accessed, which could enable someone to pose as you, or steal your identity using your profile information (such as your date of birth and photo).
- Someone could use your phone/tablet or its SIM card and rack up telephone charges to your account.
- You may have to cover the cost of a new device while still paying off the lost or stolen one.

Protect yourself by securing your mobile or tablet device

Use the following guidance to make your mobile phone or tablet more secure.

- Set a password, Personal Identification Number (PIN), passcode, gesture or fingerprint that must be entered to unlock the device. Don't forget to put PINs on your SIM card, voicemail and also ensure the device is set to automatically lock.
- Install reputable security software that includes antivirus and antitheft/loss protection – your device's retailer or service provider can provide recommendations. Only install applications from the official device application store and do not "jailbreak" your device.
- Use your device's automatic update feature to install new application and operating system updates as soon as they are available.
- Set the device to require a password before applications are installed. This will prevent unauthorised modifications to the device. Parental controls could also be used for this purpose.

- Leave Bluetooth turned off or in undiscoverable mode (hidden) when you are not using it.
- Ensure your device does not automatically connect to new networks without your confirmation.
- Record the International Mobile Equipment Identifier (IMEI) of your handset. Your IMEI is a 15 or 17 digit number often printed on a label under the battery or found in the Settings under General information about your device. If your device is lost or stolen, report this number to your provider and they can stop the handset from being used.
- Enable the remote locking and/or wiping functions, if your device supports them.

Secure your information

The information stored on your phone is valuable, take these steps to help protect it.

 Back up your data regularly, either with a backup application or by manually syncing the device with a computer.

- Do not save passwords or PINs as contacts on your phone or tablet.
- Enable device encryption to protect personal data stored on the device where possible.
- Check the privacy permissions carefully when installing new apps on your device and only install apps from reputable vendors. Where you can, make apps or profiles private and password protected. Learn more about protecting yourself from mobile malware.
- Ensure you thoroughly remove personal data from the device before selling or recycling it.

Be mindful of where and how you use your mobile or tablet

You also need to be careful about where you use your phone - both online and off.

 Use public Wi-Fi networks wisely – for example, don't do your online banking using these networks.
 Learn how to protect yourself when using public Wi-Fi.

- When connecting using Bluetooth, do it in private areas only.
- Use reputable sites and applications when downloading anything from the internet.
- · Log out of websites when you are finished.
- Turn off location services when you are not using them and limit the applications that can track and use this information.
- Think before you click. Do not open links or attachments unless you are expecting it and you trust the source. If in doubt, hovering over links often allows you to see the destination URL and you can decide if you recognise the website or email address

 although URL shortening can make this difficult.


Seeding In All It's Glory

G'day all,

I can't quite believe I am writing about this again, but here I find myself. In spite of recent tragic events it seems that some people are so desperately stupid and thoughtless that two young men dying on our roads in such a public way isn't enough of a warning.

We had a report of a vehicle performing skids and "doughies" on a residential driveway on the way out of town. The residents have provided us with some excellent CCTV footage and the owner of the vehicle will be receiving a surrender notice to give up their car for 28 days. They will also be going to court for reckless driving, where the strong evidence we present should see them lose their licence as well.

Then if that wasn't bad enough the new "road art" just near Bishop Road just looks awful and really makes people driving into Lake Grace wonder what kind of people live here. The idea that someone would do something like this not very long after what we've been through just beggars belief. We are investigating this and any information anyone has would be gratefully received – we are pursuing this matter vigorously.

Another driving incident occurred a couple of weeks ago with a report of a car crashed into another car on someone's driveway and no driver around to report or take responsibility. Police responded to the incident and the initial account provided by the car owner was that the car had been stolen. We don't get many stolen cars in Lake Grace, so the incident was investigated thoroughly and our investigations revealed the driver may have been mistaken in their belief the car was stolen. My point being that we look into criminal matters reported to us and if we find people have misled or lied to us there are often serious repercussions. In this instance we are considering charges against the driver and I expect they will come to regret their actions.

Finally, we spent a third weekend in four weeks in Newdegate and had cause to breath test and charge a local driver with excess .08 In itself not a catastrophic event, however I have been surprised by the number of positive readings we are getting (under the .05 limit) in comparison to people blowing zeros. 

Labor Drags Its Feet on PATS Improvements

Media Release

A Parliamentary report which recommended sweeping changes to a vital regional health transport subsidy has been left to gather dust since the McGowan Government took power.

The Patient Assisted Travel Scheme, or PATS, provides a subsidy towards the cost of travel and accommodation for eligible regional residents who are required to travel long distances to access health care.

However, the scheme has come under criticism in recent times for being inflexible and unable to adapt to rising cost pressures.

In 2015, a Parliamentary Inquiry recommended PATS be improved in a number of areas, including increasing subsidies and changing eligibility criteria to use a means other than distance.

Under questioning in Budget Estimates last week, Health Minister Roger Cook admitted he had not revisited the inquiry since the election.

The Nationals WA health spokesperson Martin Aldridge said simply forgetting such an important report was not acceptable.

"Unlike people in Perth, regional West Australians often need to travel long distances to access adequate health care," he said.

"That Roger Cook and Labor have not made this a priority after two budgets indicates they either don't understand this problem or simply don't care."

Leader of The Nationals WA Mia Davies, who pursued the Minister over his lack of action in Parliament, called on Labor to make the reform of PATS a priority.

"The Nationals WA identified the need for change in the lead up to the election, committing to implementing all recommendations of the report," she said.

"The Labor Government have now had two budgets to make the reform of PATS a priority, and they have failed to do so.

"Minister Cook gave an undertaking to me in estimates that he would look into this matter.

"I look forward to holding him to that over the next few months."






Business Losses to Scams up 23 per cent

Scammers swindled nearly \$4.7 million from Australian businesses in 2017 according to the ACCC – a 23 per cent increase compared to 2016. The ACCC's Scamwatch service received 5432 reports from businesses about scams in 2017. Businesses that fell victim to scammers lost an average of nearly \$11,000.

"Scammers don't discriminate and businesses have what scammers want: money. They'll use a variety of cons to swindle busy workers and it can be very devastating to a business's bottom line," ACCC Deputy Chair Dr Michael Schaper said.

Small businesses with fewer than 20 staff were most likely to be targeted by scammers and accounted for more than 50 per cent of reports to the ACCC. Businesses were most likely to be targeted with false billing scams (1323 reports), while employment and investment scams caused the most losses at nearly \$1.7 million.

"We've seen a worrying and dramatic jump in losses reported to us about these two scams. False billing scams are where a scammer tries to trick a business into paying fake invoices for directory listings, advertising, domain name renewals or office supplies. The scammers are very aggressive and persistent in

demanding payment," Dr Schaper said.

"With employment and investment scams, scammers offer services commonly used by businesses such as web page development, search engine optimisation, small business loans and business directory listings. The business signs up to what seems like a good deal but quickly discover they receive no service and that the offer was not legitimate."

"It's vital Australian businesses are aware that scammers are actively out there targeting them and to ensure they have strong processes in place to avoid becoming victims," Dr Schaper said.

Australian businesses are encouraged to visit www.scamwatch.gov.au to learn more about scams targeting them. They can follow @scamwatch_gov on Twitter and subscribe to Scamwatch radar alerts.

They can also sign up to the ACCC's Small Business Information Network to receive emails about new or updated resources, enforcement action, changes to Australia's competition and consumer laws, events, surveys and scams relevant to the small business sector.

KidSport enables eligible Western Australian children aged 5 to 18 years to participate in community sport and recreation by offering them financial assistance of up to \$150 per calendar year towards club fees.

Who is eligible for KidSport?

All Western Australian children aged 5 to 18 with a valid Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card are KidSport. Find your nearest through https://www.dsr.wa.gov.au/portal/find-a-club.

How does KidSport work?

Supported by Royalties for Regions

You can apply for KidSport online or by using a hard copy application form.

KidSport applications are assessed by the local government in which the child resides or by the KidSport team at Sport and Recreation (WA). If an application is approved, the KidSport team will email you a voucher code (unique to the child). The code needs to be provided to the club when registering so that the approved amount can be deducted from the registration or membership fees. Hirer Responsibility when using Shire Public Buildings

All people, groups, sporting clubs who hire public buildings are responsible for the cleaning of the facility once used.

If tables and chairs are set up by the group they must also be packed away. All rubbish is to be put into bins provided. Hirers are responsible to ensure all stoves are turned off.

Hirers are responsible for any damages incurred while hiring the facility.


You may be aware Land Conservation District Committees (LCDC's) were notified recently that they were deemed ineligible after applying for the National Landcare Program's Environment Small Grants. Their ineligibility was a result of their status as Unincorporated and/ or State bodies and not Incorporated groups in the application process. LCDC's that applied for the Environment Small Grants have been shocked by the news. For over thirty years they had been successfully applying for Federal environment funding and while the small one off 25th Anniversary Landcare Grants in 2015 were a precedent to these guidelines, most were unaware of the new changes.

There has always been a bit of confusion with LCDC's among our Commonwealth friends, but over the years a few explanations about how LCDC's are in effect local landcare groups run by local community resolved the confusion. WALN has also heard that landcare programs in government schools were also deemed ineligible for these grants, whilst those in private and religious schools are eligible.

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WALN will continue to work on these changes locally and nationally. WALN would like to thank all those who have spent more time than they ever should have on this, it has once again shown us that when we band together there is a strong collective voice out there that to be heard.

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Meth Awareness - Effects and Risks

Methamphetamine is an amphetamine-type stimulant. These stimulants affect the activity of certain chemicals in the brain. Methamphetamine is commonly known as meth and when it has a crystal-like appearance, it is known as ice. If someone close to you is using meth – you are probably worried and concerned – most people are and this is a normal reaction. Common feelings include shock, disbelief, grief, anger and fear.

Common signs of methamphetamine use include:

- Relationship problems
- Changes in eating patterns leading to poor nutrition
- Sleep disturbance
- Mood swings
- Explosive outbursts
- Reduced interaction with family
- Trouble with the police
- Sudden change of friends
- Unexplained need for money
- Declining school/work performance

Harms associated with methamphetamine use can include:

- Malnutrition and weight loss
- Reduced resistance to infection
- Violent behavior
- Emotional disturbances
- Periods of psychosis
- Paranoia
- Delusional thoughts and behaviour
- Mood swings
- Increased risk of stroke and heart attack

Overdose

Overdose occurs when the level of intoxication from the drug reaches a point where it begins to produce physical and/or psychological harm. Overdose from methamphetamine usually results from the drug's stimulating effects and can cause strokes, heart failure, seizures and death. Overdose with amphetamine-type stimulants is referred to as 'toxicity'.

Signs of overdose:

- Hyperactivity/sweating
- Chest pain/pounding heart
- Severe Headache
- Difficulty passing urine
- Convulsions
- Shaking/trembling/spasms
- Disorientation
- Rapid breathing/ feeling that you can't breathe
- Paranoid, delusional, irritable, anxious or psychotic behavior

If you think someone is having an overdose call an ambulance (000) immediately. Remember, police will not attend overdoses unless there is a death or ambulance staff are threatened. If you are concerned about someone's mental health you can contact the Mental Health Emergency Response Line (MEHRL) on 1300 555 788 (Metro callers), 1800 676 822 (Peel callers free call) or 1800 552 002 (Rural callers free call).

Smoking Still Breaking Hearts on World No Tobacco Day

Media Release

In Australia, two out of three smokers will lose ten years of life and die from their smoking. Despite smokers being four times more likely to die from heart disease than non-smokers, public awareness about the damaging effects of smoking on the heart remains low, says Heart Foundation tobacco control spokesperson Maurice Swanson.

Mr Swanson said the battle against tobacco is far from over. "Tobacco smoking remains the single largest cause of preventable death and illness in Australia. World No Tobacco Day is an ideal opportunity to remind Australians that smoking is as bad for your heart as it is for your lungs.

"Smokers should not be fooled into thinking that smoking a few cigarettes a day is harmless. Just one cigarette a day damages your heart and arteries, and results in nearly half the risk for heart disease and stroke as smoking a full pack of 20 per day, according to a study published in the British Medical Journal. "That's why we have a very clear message: Quit, and quit now."

Mr Swanson said that from thousands of heart attack survivors surveyed by the Heart Foundation in the past few years, the most difficult change to make after having a heart attack is to quit smoking. "One is four smokers who have had a heart attack don't even try to quit and another one in four tried but failed to give up," he said. Once a person has a heart attack, they have a much higher risk of another heart event. This is why quitting is one of the most important changes survivors need to make after a heart attack.

"If you look at the effect that smoking has on the heart and circulatory system, it's not a pretty picture. Smoking reduces the amount of oxygen to your heart, raises your blood pressure and heart rate, and leads to the build-up of fatty deposits on the artery walls, which increases the risk of heart attack and stroke. These outcomes dramatically affect a person's chances of leading a full and healthy life."

Mr Swanson added that, there's still a way to go to lead Australia out of the haze. "The fact that we now have a generation who has never been exposed to cigarette smoke in places like restaurants and offices is a huge win, as is the introduction of plain packaging," he said.

"But while Australia has made big strides in cutting deaths from smoking over the past 25 years, the implementation of a comprehensive approach by all governments in Australia has fallen away, and with nearly three million smokers, more needs to be done.

"For example we have seen a drop in funding and support for mass media and public education campaigns in recent years, despite a clear need to give people the information and encouragement they need to resist taking up smoking in the first place, or to quit."

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The Six Steps to Getting Your Licence

The Graduated Driver Training and Licensing (GDT&L) system has been designed to ensure novice drivers get a wider range of supervised driving experience over a longer period of time before going solo. You will acquire the practical driving skills, good driving habits and the responsible and courteous attitudes that are essential to safety on our roads.

Step One - Learner's Permit You can apply for a learner's permit at any Driver and Vehicle Services (DVS) Centre or regional DVS Agent any time after you turn 16. Before you are issued with a learner's permit you will have to pay a fee and pass a theory test. The theory test consists of 30 multiple choice questions on the road rules and safe driving practice. You should read the Drive Safe book beforehand and practice the learner's test online at www. transport.wa.gov.au/dvs to help you pass the test. If you pass, you will also need to pay for your learner's permit and Learner Guide and Log Book. The cost of your learner's permit includes one practical driving assessment.

Step Two - Learning to Drive Now you have your learner's permit, you can commence lessons with an approved instructor/ supervisor. This can be a licensed driving instructor or a person who currently holds, and has held the class of licence stated on your permit for more than 4 years. You can now begin to record your minimum 50 hours of supervised driving (including five hours of night time driving) in your Learner Guide and Log Book if required and you must display 'L' plates whenever you are driving. You may drive on all roads, except within the boundaries of Kings Park. You may drive up to a maximum speed of 100km/h (where permissible).

Step Three - Hazard Perception Test You cannot undertake a Hazard Perception Test until a mandatory 6 month period has lapsed since the issue date of your learner's permit The test will be used to determine your ability to assess traffic situations and to make safe driving decisions. The test consists of a computer screen that displays a series of moving traffic scenes. You have to respond to each scene by clicking a mouse to indicate when it is safe to commence a manoeuvre or when it is necessary to take the appropriate action to reduce the risk of a crash for the traffic situation. The recorded response time, or lack of response from you, will then be compared to the recommended response (or no response) times required to pass the test. A fee is payable to sit a HPT and only one HPT may be attempted per day. More information and practice examples of the Hazard Perception Test are available online at www.transport.wa.gov.au/dvs.

Step Four - Gain Experience During this stage you still have to drive under supervision and continue to record a minimum of 50 hours supervised driving experience (including five hours of night time driving) across a range of conditions if required. You are encouraged to do as many hours of supervised driving experience as

possible. You must continue to display 'L' plates when driving. You may drive up to a maximum speed of 100km/h (where permissible).

Step Five - Practical Driving Assessment When you have developed the ability to control your vehicle safely you can attempt the practical driving assessment. You must be at least 17 years of age, completed a minimum of 50 hours of supervised driving experience (including five hours of night time driving) and passed a HPT to undertake the assessment. To help you pass the assessment you should read the How to pass your practical driving assessment handbook, which is available from all DVS centres and regional DVS agents or online at www.transport.wa.gov.au/dvs. You may be eligible to book your practical driving assessment online by visiting www.transport. wa.gov.au, alternatively you can phone 13 11 56 or visit your nearest centre or regional DVS agent to make an appointment.

Step Six - Provisional Licence Congratulations, you now have your 'P' plates and you can drive without a supervisor! Before you are issued with your provisional licence you are required to have your photo taken and pay for your driver's licence. You will be on 'P' plates for two years, you will need to display the red 'P' plates for the first six months and swap to the green 'P' plates for the remaining time on your provisional licence. It is illegal not to display your 'P' plates whenever you drive. Remember, while on 'P' plates it is illegal to drive with a blood alcohol level above 0.00%. For the first 6 months of your provisional licence period you will be subject to night time driving restrictions. You will also be subject to demerit point restrictions until you have held a driver's licence for 2 years or periods adding up to 2 years.
