Making Art By Printing

It was texture, contrast and an evolution of ideas for the eleven artists attending the Printmaking workshop hosted by the Lake Grace Regional Artspace.

Denmark artist and printmaker Nikki Green was instructing over the weekend and any materials were seen as fair game to create a different printing effect.

Artists came from as far afield as Bremer Bay, Narrogin and Mt Barker to attend the Artspace's first workshop for 2015. The two day workshop held on the 13th and 14th June, covered lino printing and collagraph. This was pre-empted by Ms Green hosting a two hour workshop with Lake Grace's high school students on the Friday.

For the uninitiated collagraph is when materials (card, bubblewrap, leaves, string etc.) are applied to a rigid sub-structure, such as paperboard or wood. Ink or pigment can be applied to the resulting collage, and the board is used to print onto paper or other materials either using a printing press or various hand tools. Linocut is another printmaking technique where designs are cut into a linoleum surface with a sharp knife, v-shaped chisel or gouge. The linoleum is inked with a roller, then impressed onto paper or fabric with the actual printing done by hand or with a press.

As well as teaching Nikki also gave an artist talk on the projects she is currently involved in. The Artspace is planning on inviting Nikki back for an etching and solar etching workshop in the future, if you're interested in this or other future projects check out their website and like their Facebook page.

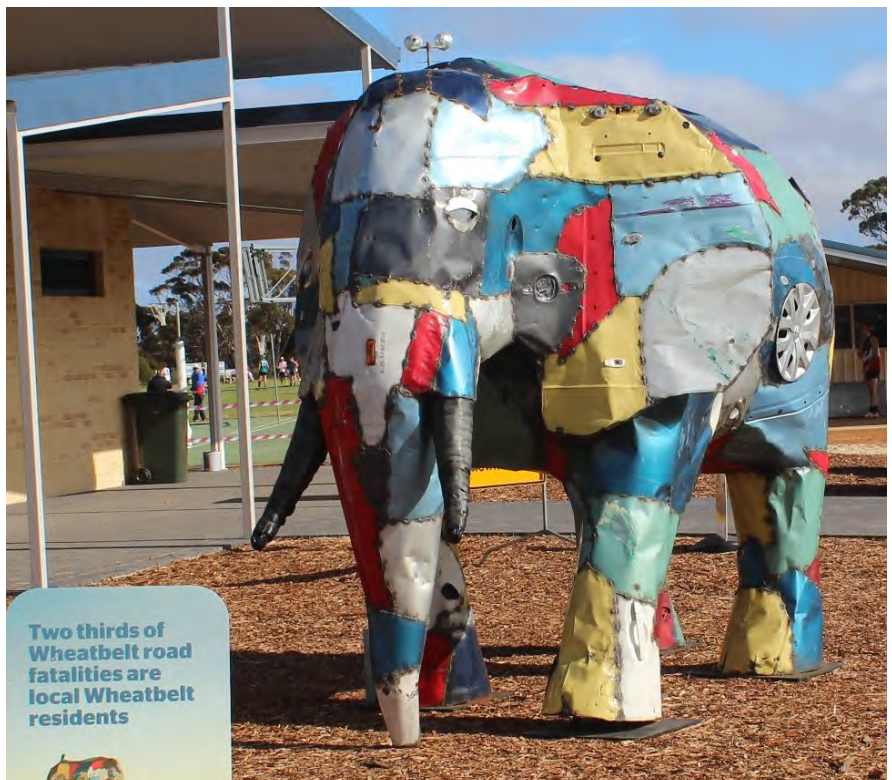

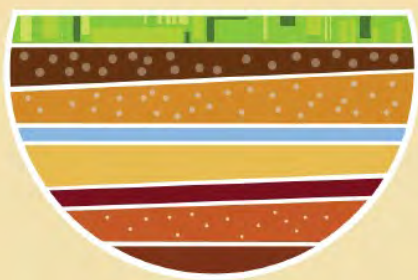

New Sub Centre Moves Ahead

St John Ambulance - Lake Grace Receives \$110,340 from Royalties for Regions towards New Sub Centre Building.

The much anticipated announcement of the November 2014 round, of the Wheatbelt Development Commission Regional Grant Scheme applications, has awarded \$110,340 to the new St John Ambulance Lake Grace Sub Centre Building.

Last November saw the St John Ambulance Lake Grace Sub Centre writing, re-writing, budgeting, undergoing head office financial scrutiny, and obtaining the final sign off from St John Ambulance WA Ltd CEO Tony Ahern for the project to be submitted to the funding round.

Regional Development Minister Terry Redman recently announced the successful Royalties for Regions Regional Grant Scheme projects totalling \$9.024M.

The Wheatbelt Development Commission had \$981,111 of Regional Grant Scheme funding to allocate in what was a high quality and very competitive round of funding applications.

St John Ambulance - Lake Grace Sub Centre was successful in securing \$110,340 (11% of what was available in the Wheatbelt) towards the new sub centre building to be constructed on Stubbs Street in Lake Grace.

The monies have been specifically allocated to the site preparation costs including:-

- Power to site (which has to come from the transformer pole down the road)
- Water to site (which has to come under the main road from the railway side of the road)
- Telecommunication to site (which has to come from the Memorial Drive corner)
- Relocation of the Sportsman's Club Telephone line (which currently runs across the block - yellow flags)
- Relocation of the Sportsman's Club water line (currently also runs through the block - blue flags)
- Site levelling and sand pad.

In addition to the site preparation costs an additional \$17K was allocated to the project, and those monies will be guided towards the building footings and the pre laying of plumbing.

The Lake Grace St John Ambulance Sub Centre was very excited by the announcement and very grateful to Royalties for Regions for recognising the project as being one of high need and of regional significance.

However the announcement was tempered by the fact that the original application was for \$242K, and this announcement is \$132K less than what is needed.

St John Ambulance Lake Grace Chairperson and project manager Amanda Milton said "we were very happy with the announcement, but we also know we

need to find another \$132K before we can begin construction. We are currently waiting on the Lotterywest - Work Places funding announcement, and if that grant does not get funded or is short funded we will need to find even more funds before construction can begin. We have been busy since late last year getting all the planning and approvals completed. The building has its Certificate of Design Compliance, which means that essentially we are "shovel ready", that is, we could go to tender to construct the building tomorrow if we had all the funds we need."

Amanda went on to say "St John Ambulance Lake Grace Sub Centre has \$350K of direct community funds (cash) to put towards the project. We also have \$40K worth of community and business pledges in the form of sand for sand pads, sand for concrete, and assistance to install or relocate services. The funding submissions to Royalties for Regions and Lotterywest were for \$484K combined. So far we have secured less than one quarter of those funds. We now have to get very, very creative in how we look for the shortfall in funds."

The CPD Group, who is the company undertaking the Lake Grace Hospital upgrades, is currently completing a pre-tender Construction Cost estimate for the New Sub Centre building. This estimate will take into account all of the additional engineering that was added to the working drawings since the first Quantity Survey which was completed at the Schematic Design phase of the project (October 2014). The CPD Group are donating the cost of this Construction Cost estimate to the project.

"There are two significant pieces of the puzzle yet to be placed, which will determine where this project is up to" said Amanda. "One is the result of the CPD Group work which will nail down a projected construction cost based on the Building Surveyor endorsed drawings. This figure may be higher than we originally estimated once all the engineering is taken into account. Secondly we need to know the result of the Lotterywest grant application. Whatever the difference is between what secured dollars we have and how much we need, will dictate how many dollars we are short for the project. We have already begun sourcing creative ways to find those much needed dollars, as the project may fall down if we cannot secure the balance of the funds" she said.

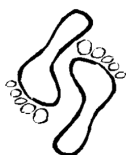

Principal for a Day

As a student did you dream about what changes you would make if you were in charge?

On June 3rd two students from Lake Grace District High School along with others across Australia had the opportunity to step into the shoes of "Principal For a Day" and realise their dreams. An initiative of the Principals Australia Institute, students have the chance to take part in a number of leadership experiences and take part in a national online conversation about leadership and student issues.

Year seven students Kaitlyn O'Neill and James Ayers-Dillon were selected from the high school pupils at Lake Grace to tackle the role normally performed by Ashley Mottershead. Mrs Mottershead said the program was about developing and building an understanding of what leadership is about. More than just positional leadership, it will create an insight into the different complexities and different people you have to work with in the role.

During the day Kaitlyn and James had to fill the varied role the principal holds starting with a tour of the school and greeting parents and students as they arrived.

Before the hard work began everyone was led in a meditation session by School Chaplain, Genni Curtin to help clear heads, remove stress and deliver the ability for clear thinking.

With clear heads Kaitlyn and James joined in a Webinar with other students undertaking the same role. Over 300 students across Australia and one in Singapore had the opportunity to be the Principal For a Day.

The local constabulary called in to discuss road safety and reports of misbehaviour on busses. This discussion helped the 'principals' understand that the role is diverse and there are many issues not only within the school grounds but within the community as a whole that they may need to manage.

Meetings continued with Kaitlyn chairing a secondary staff meeting regarding students of concern and both Kaitlyn and James meeting with a parent to discuss the school's hat policy. A visit from local Member of the Legislative Assembly Terry 'Tuck' Waldron was unplanned and involved an examination on what leadership entails.

The reaction from students and staff has been excellent with students showing the same respect they do to any other staff member and the staff being very helpful. Following classroom observations with a couple of the teachers both Kaitlyn and James were full of praise for their teaching methods. Administration staff said it was really interesting having the students in charge for the

day and expected more orders to be coming from the office.

Both students told me that they had discovered new communication skills they didn't think they had, both with the students and the staff at the school.

Asked whether their day lived up to their expectations both 'principals' conceded that although it looks easy, it is hard to keep on track. Kaitlyn however is keen to pursue a teaching career and said it was a "great experience to see what the principal actually does" while James was "pleased to have found out some of what the teachers and principal actually have to do each day, which is more than expected" he is still thinking about his career options.

Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC

Each of the soldiers listed on the Lake Grace Honour Roll will be featured in the Lakes Link News, as close as possible to 100 years from their enlistment. It is now 100 years, 7 months and 28 days since Frederick William Carter signed up.

CARTER – FREDERICK WILLIAM: Born November 1892 at Toodyay, Western Australia. At the age of 22 years, he joined the Australian Imperial Force on 22/10/1914, and gave his father Robert as next of kin. He was 5 feet 7 inches tall (170cms), weighed 133 lbs (60.5kgs), and had a dark complexion with brown eyes and dark brown hair. He gave his occupation as farm labourer, though in July of 1911, he and his brother Charles were each granted land north of Lake Grace, along with the allocation of land of the first Lake Grace settlers on the eastern side of the lake. Unfortunately our history has recorded nothing of this family – their father Robert also seeming to be involved in their farming venture to some extent.

Private Carter was originally assigned to the 10th Australian Light Horse Regiment as Trooper and about four months later he was appointed as Driver. It would seem that from here on, he had quite a few transfers during his very long period of service, which extended from the end of 1914 through to May 1919, six months after the end of the war!

On the 8th of February 1915, he embarked the *Mashobra* at Fremantle, and at that time was promoted to Driver. He was taken in the Composite Light Horse Regiment on the 20th of November 1915. Though it was recorded that he had always had good health, he was losing weight, and sickness worsened to Bronchitis, so was transferred to Base at Alexandria. After convalescence he was discharged back to duty, and six weeks later on the 20th of May 1916, Driver Carter arrived at Etaples, France, and went to London on furlough.

On return, he proceeded to Abbeville, France, for a course of instruction. It seems as though he remained in this area for almost ten months with the 10th Australian Light Horse Regiment, before again taking leave to England. On his return about two weeks later, on the 8th of September 1917, he joined the 3rd Divisional Train and served in the Field for another long period of about 10 months before taking another 14 days leave in the United Kingdom. About 6 weeks after his return to service, he had another bout of sickness, and it was August before Driver Carter was fit enough to rejoin his unit, the 3rd Divisional Train.

Later, when the war was over, on the 6th of December, 1918, Driver Carter embarked the *Hytesbury* for England for the return journey to Australia, where it was the 1st of February 1919 before he could board the *Delta* at Devonport. He received the 1914-15 STAR Medal, the British War Medal and the Victory medal.

His religion was of the Church of England denomination.

Driver Carter was an original North Lake Grace settler of 1911, and had two locations, 10165 and, 10174, which has the well known Harvey's Lake on it, so often used for recreational purposes and latterly, for water skiing by locals.

Early in his occupation of the land, 3 acres were taken off to provide for a road, now Burns Road. In 1920, these locations were taken over by Harvey brothers, Jack and Bob. It is obvious that the Carter brothers had an affinity with horses, as they both, in turn, served in the Light Horse, and while little is known of them, in 1920, Frederick was granted a license as a reinsman, thought to have been required to compete with trotting horses, in harness racing.

Upon leaving the Lake Grace district, Frederick Carter relocated to Kondut, north of Wongan Hills, to where his younger brother and father had already established themselves in farming operations. Newspapers reveal that he married, had a family, and his name occasionally showed up on the cricket scorecard for Kondut.

Road Safety – RAC's Elephant in the Wheatbelt

The Shire extends its appreciation to the RAC for its 'Elephant in the Wheatbelt' promotion during the Colts Carnival held on the weekend of 13/14 June 2015. The multi coloured Elephant certainly had a high visual presence on the lawn in front of the Shire Office last Friday when a morning tea was provided. The Shire President, Cr Andrew Walker, together with Cr Marshall and Cr Chappell were in attendance along with a number of community members.



The message: "In 2013 the Wheatbelt fatality rate was more than four times the State average and more than double the fatality rate of nearby regions."

Some points to consider:

- Two out of three road deaths in the Wheatbelt between 2007 – 2012 were drivers from the local area;
- Almost two in every three fatalities in the Wheatbelt occurred in daylight hours; and
- Surprisingly, given the law has been in place for more than 40 years, almost 33% of drivers or passengers were not wearing a seatbelt.

2015 Colts Carnival

Congratulations to all involved in organising this event. It provides a wonderful opportunity for local regional players to compete against the best from other regions. I believe there were seven teams competing over the weekend. The oval and recently upgraded Sports Pavilion looked a treat thanks to the voluntary efforts of many in the days leading up to the first bounce-down.

FIRE SAFETY IN YOUR HOME THIS WINTER

Every year more than 1,000 fires occur in the home causing millions of dollars damage and costing people their lives. Most deaths occur from smoke and toxic fumes. Sadly, most household fires are accidental and preventable.

Winter sees an increase in fires in the home, often due to an increased need for heating appliances. It is important to be vigilant around your home, particular throughout the winter months.

WHEN HEATING YOUR HOME

- ALWAYS make sure all items are AT LEAST A METRE FROM THE HEATER
- Never leave heaters on in bedrooms, especially children's
- Heaters should be checked once a year to make sure they are in working order, worn out electrical cords and plugs should be replaced immediately
- Check your heater, fireplace brickwork, chimney and flue before lighting the first fire of the year to make sure it is clean

FIRE SAFETY IN THE KITCHEN

- Never leave cooking unattended
- Switch off all kitchen appliances after use
- Avoid wearing loose clothing with big sleeves when cooking as they can catch fire
- Never hang items such as tea towels near stoves or on cooking appliances

If a fire does start in your home you need to be able to escape as quickly and safely as possible. Having working **Smoke Alarms** and a **Home Fire Escape Plan** will increase your chances of getting out of your house safely.

HOME FIRE ESCAPE PLAN

IN THE EVENT OF A FIRE

- ☐ Crawl low under smoke
- ☐ Assist or alert any people in danger, but only if it is safe to do so
- ☐ Go to your safe meeting place, such as your letter box
- ☐ Call 000 (triple zero)
- ☐ Wait for firefighters to arrive
- ☐ Do not re-enter a burning house under any circumstances.

- ☐ Know two ways out of every room
- ☐ Decide where your safe meeting place is (outside your home)
- ☐ Keep keys in deadlocks to escape quickly in the event of a fire
- ☐ Provide alternatives for anyone with a disability
- ☐ Consider an escape plan for your pets
- ☐ Practise your plan with your family at least twice a year

The first day of school our professor introduced himself and challenged us to get to know someone we didn't already know. I stood up to look around when a gentle hand touched my shoulder. I turned round to find a wrinkled little old lady beaming up at me with a smile that lit up her entire being. She said, "Hi handsome. My name is Rose. I'm eighty-seven years old. Can I give you a hug?"

I laughed and enthusiastically responded, "Of course you may!" and she gave me a giant squeeze.

Why are you in college at such a young innocent age?" I asked. She jokingly replied, "I'm here to meet a rich husband, get married and have a couple of kids..." "No seriously," I asked. I was curious what may have motivated her to be taking on this challenge at her age. "I always dreamed of having a college education and now I'm getting one!" she told me.

After class we walked to the student union building and shared a chocolate milkshake. We became instant friends. Every day for the next three months, we would leave class together and talk nonstop. I was always mesmerized listening to this 'time machine' as she shared her wisdom and experience with me.

Over the course of the year Rose became a campus icon and she easily make friends wherever she went. She loved to dress up and she revelled in the attention bestowed upon her from the other students; she was living it up.

At the end of the semester we invited Rose to speak at a football banquet. I'll never forget what she taught us. She was introduced and stepped up to the podium. As she began to deliver her prepared speech she dropped her 3 x 5 cards on the floor. Frustrated and a little embarrassed she leaned into the microphone and simply said "I'm sorry I'm so jittery. I gave up beer for Lent and this whisky is killing me! I'll never get my speech back in order so let me just tell you what I know."

As we laughed she cleared her throat and began, "We do not stop playing because we are old; we grow old

because we stop playing. There are only four secrets to staying young, being happy and achieving success. You have to laugh and find humour every day. You've got to have a dream. When you lose your dreams, you die. We have so many people walking around who are dead and don't even know it! There is a huge difference between growing older and growing up."

"If you are nineteen years old and lie in bed for a full year and don't do one productive thing, you will turn twenty years old. The Right Time for Business to Invest

ACCELERATED DEPRECIATION

All small businesses will get an immediate tax deduction for any individual assets they buy costing less than \$20,000. (Currently, the threshold sits at \$1,000).

This \$20,000 limit applies to each individual item. Small businesses can apply this \$20,000 rule to as many individual items as they wish. These arrangements start from Budget night and continue until the end of June 2017.

Further information on accelerated depreciation is available on the ATO website.

TAX CUTS

The Government is reducing the tax rate for the more than 90 per cent of incorporated businesses with annual turnover less than \$2 million. The company tax rate for these businesses will be reduced by 1.5 percentage points to 28.5 per cent.

To help all Australian small businesses grow, the Government will also provide a 5 per cent tax discount to unincorporated businesses with annual turnover less than \$2 million from 1 July 2015. This delivers a tax cut of \$1.8 billion over the next four years.

CUTTING RED TAPE

The Government will reduce red tape within the Fringe Benefits Tax (FBT) system by expanding the FBT exemption for work related portable electronic devices. This will help small business employees stay connected in the digital economy.


We are looking at having a powertex workshop and a basket making workshop next year, more information on this as it becomes available.

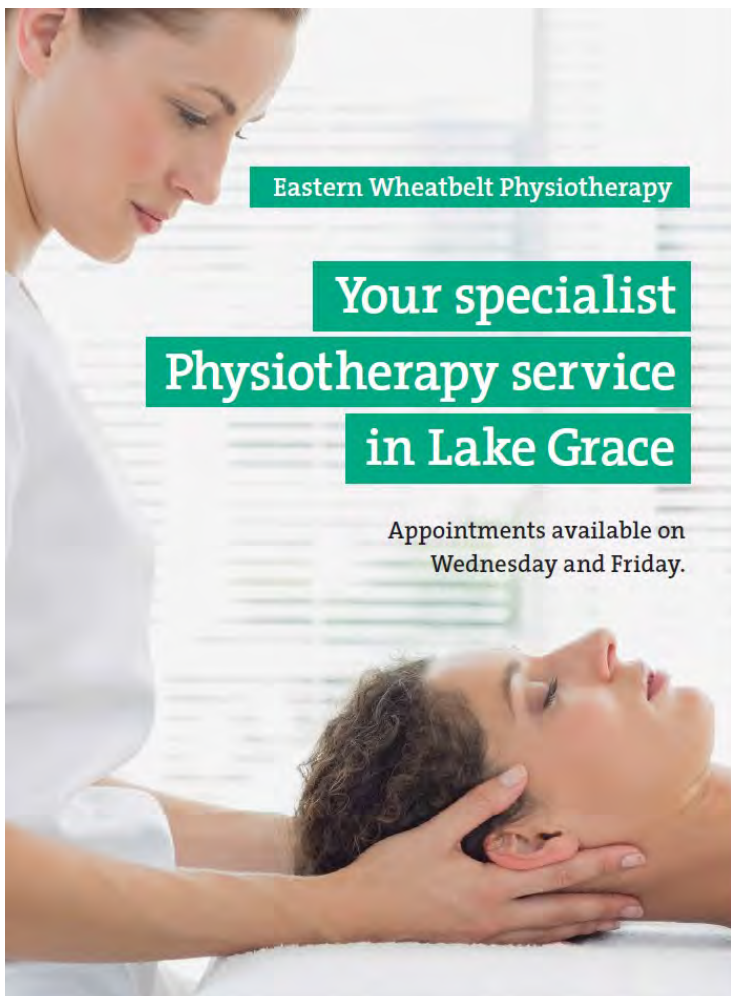

Inquiry into PATS Echoes Need for Overhaul

Media Release

Two Nationals MPs have welcomed a parliamentary inquiry report into WA's Patient Assisted Travel Scheme (PATS) tabled in the Legislative Council. The report highlights a list of deficiencies in the current PATS scheme and put forward 21 recommendations on how the State Government can improve and modernise it.

Member for the Agricultural Region Martin Aldridge MLC said the report took into account and directly addressed many suggested improvements a Parliamentary National Party (PNP) submission to the inquiry raised.

"They include increasing fuel and accommodation subsidies for those patients that receive specialist medical services under PATS and the type of medical service that will be covered by PATS in the future," he said. "Recommendations 13 and 14 suggest the 100km eligibility ruling is scrapped in favour of a system that better responds to the health needs of regional patients."

Mr Aldridge expressed his satisfaction that the inquiry recommended subsidies for accommodation, road and air travel offered by PATS be urgently revised to reflect contemporary market conditions.

"I also believe it is imperative that the PATS scheme includes support for accessing allied health, dental and broader mental health services, another finding made by the inquiry," he said.

In November 2013 Mr Aldridge moved a motion calling for a parliamentary inquiry into PATS, while at the same time recognising the important role it plays assisting regional people to access specialist medical care.

Subsequent to the motion the Public Administration Committee initiated an inquiry into the scheme in February last year. Member for the Mining and Pastoral Region Jacqui Boyde MLC, who sits as a member of the committee, said the report put other aspects of the scheme in need of reform under the microscope.

"Importantly the inquiry recommended fuel and accommodation subsidies are revised annually to ensure they are in line with actual costs," she said.

"I hope this inquiry's findings help strengthen the standard and modernity of PATS in WA to meet requirements outlined in the National Healthcare Agreement 2012 such as equitable access to public health and emergency services irrespective of geographical location."

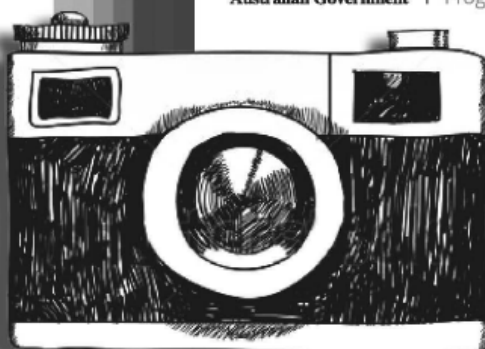

Seniors Concessions in WA

COTA - Council Of The Ageing

Changes were made to seniors' concessions in the 2015-2016 State Budget:

- Extending free public transport for WA Seniors Card holders, pensioners and carers to include free travel after 7pm every night and before 6am each weekday morning.
- Means testing of the Energy Assistance Payment (Cost of Living Allowance) which provides a rebate on electricity charges from July 1, 2015.
- Increasing the eligible age for WA Seniors Card holders from 60 to 65 by 2023-24.
- From 2016-17, a cap of \$550 will be applied to the 50 per cent rebate available to pensioners for local government rates.
- From 2016-17, a cap of \$600 will be applied to the 50 per cent rebate available to pensioners for their water service charge.
- From 2016-17, seniors can get a discount on the WA Photo ID Card for identification purposes.

What does COTA WA think of these changes?

These changes improve the sustainability of the concessions system by reducing the growth in their cost to government, improve targeting of expenditure to people who need it the most and make the council and water rates concessions more equitable. Extended free public transport increases options for social participation.

However;

- The overall impact of these changes, and who is affected by them is unclear and requires further analysis, particularly in view of increased motor vehicle registration costs and utility charges which were announced in the budget.
- Consultation with seniors could have improved the outcome of the review of concessions and
- avoided unanticipated negative consequences. We regret that the WA government has not
- mirrored the ACT Government's approach to reviewing concessions. This is a missed opportunity for public consultation and involvement of seniors.
- Some concessions remain poorly targeted and their social and economic benefits are unclear.
- Further work is required to address these issues.
- Inefficiency remains problematic in the delivery of concessions. WA has a multiplicity of seniors' concessions and they are delivered by a variety of agencies. Improved efficiency could make additional funds available to seniors.
- Some concessions, such as reduced admission fees to national parks, are regarded by government as an expense when, in fact, they create an additional revenue stream from seniors who would not have visited a park at the full admission price.

Key principles to guide Seniors Concessions

1. Sustainability

The Final Report of the Economic Audit Committee (EAC October 2009) noted: Spending on social concessions from 2001-02 to 2007-08 has increased by 30.7%, an annual average growth of 4.6% over the period.

Seniors Concessions in WA (cont.)

And...an ageing population is likely to increase the community's call on existing concessions, as approximately 55% of payments and concessions to individuals are targeted to pensioners, seniors, and veterans.

2. Inefficiency

A diverse range of concessions is available from numerous Government agencies with varying eligibility criteria. While consumer access has been improved through a web based WA Concessions Portal (<http://www.concessions.wa.gov.au/Pages/default.aspx>), there is still duplication of administration that is costly and inefficient. EAC October 2009 suggested:

- i) consolidating processing and administration to a single point in government;
- ii) exploring the aggregation of subsidies and concessions to individuals into a single transfer payment from government...

3. Poor targeting, poor accountability

We don't know if WA gets value for money from

concessions as there is no accountability process to report on the social or economic benefits that seniors and the community receive from the State's investment.

4. Inequity

Not all seniors Card holders have the same needs. There are different levels of underlying social advantage/disadvantage amongst seniors.

5. Adequacy

A robust and sustainable concessions system is essential to supplement the inadequate retirement incomes of many seniors in Western Australia. It is important to maintain the range and value of concessions to those seniors who depend on them.

The way forward?

COTA WA will consult seniors and develop a comprehensive and holistic approach to seniors concessions in Western Australia.
