### **Another Successful Carnival**

It was football fever when 200 young men came together in Lake Grace over the weekend of the 14<sup>th</sup> and 15<sup>th</sup> June to play in the annual Rossi Boots Colts Football Carnival. With eight teams competing there was enough play to keep the many spectators occupied.

Teams taking part were Goldfields, Clontarf, Great Southern, Ongerup. Upper Great Southern, Esperance, Eastern Districts and Combined Futures Side. Eight games were played on two ovals on the Saturday and another four on the Sunday before the Grand Final on Sunday afternoon.

Saturday was a great beginning for the weather was perfect with only a little wind to influence the games. All participants played hard throughout the weekend; no matter what the score line, no side stopped trying. Sunday wasn't so pleasant with the wind making it hard to score on the Northern end. Before the Grand Final the rain came down. A wet and heavy ball

changed the pace of the game and although the wind was not as strong, it still influenced the ball in the air.

After two wins each on the Saturday, it was Upper Great Southern and Great Southern facing off in the Grand Final. In their first win since 2003 Upper Great Southern defeated Great Southern 16 goals 10 (106) to 6 goals 3 (39).

The presentation began with John O'Neill welcoming everyone and hoping all enjoyed the weekend, he then handed over to Graham Taylor of the Great Southern Football Council who said a few words before introducing Bradley Joyce to present the cup to Josh Hughes and Geoff Sims, the Captain and Coach of the winning side. Geoff then presented the team with their individual medals.

Clem Bray then presented his Fairest and Best for the Grand Final award which was won by Damien Roe from the Upper Great Southern team.

# First Solo Exhibition for Kerrie Argent

"Canopy", Kerrie Argent's solo exhibit, opened Wednesday 4<sup>th</sup> June 2008 at the Katanning Art Gallery. A group of 40 interested and intrigued people came to the opening. This included a bus load of Kerrie's Lake Grace and Newdegate friends and colleagues who enjoyed the noisy trip over and back, safely skippered by Kerrie's husband Greg. Kerrie's brother travelled from Muchea and friends from Collie also came to support.

The pieces ranged from her now famous hand dyed silk layered evening dress, close up photos printed onto aluminium and canvas; all giving off completely different finishes. There were silk panels dyed from the colours obtained from leaves and bark from a range of eucalyptus trees at different times of the year; all from her property north east of Lake Grace. Each panel is hand cut with heat to create the lace patterns.

A collection of seed pods from different trees and handmade pods with seed pod designs, hung from the ceiling. The pieces that were admired as a new sensation were "The Treasure Given". Flattened cans were heated to achieve varying colours, then leaves and branches embossed into the aluminium to make the design. They were combined with organza silk panels depicting different images from photographs taken of seed pods that had opened after the Kukerin fire. Seven of these pieces were sold during the night, along with three of the prints.

The exhibition was opened by Beth Louden, the Department of Environment and Conservation's Flora Conservation Officer, who then handed over to Kerrie for a few words. Bruce Gilbert the curator of the Katanning Art Gallery felt the exhibition should go to an Art Gallery in Perth. He has already made a couple of phone calls in support of Kerrie's work.

While people enjoyed and interacted with the art works, they indulged in Lake Grace's Walkers' Wine. It was a very enjoyable evening, wandering through what nature has to offer in the range of colours, textures and designs.

Congratulations Kerrie on your first solo exhibition, we are looking forward to more in the future. The exhibit was open until Monday  $16^{th}$  at the Katanning Art Gallery.





"This is the day...this is the day...
that the Lord has made...that the Lord has made.
We will rejoice...we will rejoice
and be glad in it...and be glad in it."

Whilst the musicians strummed their guitars melodiously to the tune of "This is the Day", voices sang out loud welcoming the arrival of the World Youth Day Cross and Icon in Lake Grace last June 2, 2008. It was a joyful day of God's blessing - the Cross of Christ has come to visit Lake Grace to send the message of God's love to everyone. Specifically entrusted to the youth of the world by the late saintly Pope John Paul II, the Cross and Icon have been going around Australia as preparation for World Youth Day (WYD) on July 15-20, 2008 in Sydney.

Gathering under the roof of the Lake Grace bbq area, people present witnessed the assembling of the 380cm x 176cm cross at 5.30pm. As darkness crept in, candles were lit casting light upon the holy wooden Cross and glass framed Icon which have been going around the world for 25 years, most especially in places which desperately need the hope of Christ like Ground Zero in New York, USA. Weighing 40kg, it took several women and men to lift the Cross upright to be viewed by everyone. Once it stood, indeed, everyone silently agreed, "this is the day that the Lord has made."

After a brief yet meaningful welcome ceremony, the Cross and Icon were processed through Stubbs Street - Lake Grace's main road. Lit candles beautifully adorned the processional path to Maria Regina Catholic Church and it highlighted the Cross and Icon which several women and men took turns in carrying. There was an overwhelming presence of joy on everyone's faces as this was obviously a rare moment "that the Lord has made." After all, joy is the indubitable sign of the presence of God!

The procession was the prologue to the main event— the celebration of the Holy Mass with the presence of the WYD Cross and Icon. Most Rev Gerard Holohan, Catholic Bishop of the Bunbury Diocese, presided over the Holy Mass. During the Mass, everyone was given the privileged moment of being 'at the foot of the Cross' during veneration time. It was a special time for everyone to say a prayer whilst holding the Cross or kneeling before it. By the way people showed their respect to the Cross, it was evident that

the Spirit was moving everyone to understand and experience what the Cross stands for. People truly felt God's love knowing that Christ died on the cross. People genuinely felt God's love knowing that our human burdens find solace in the triumph of Christ over the Cross. People

confidently felt God's love knowing that God sends people like Simon Cyrene, who helped Jesus carry his cross, to help us deal with our own challenges in life. The presence of God's love was clearly evident and people 'rejoice and be glad in it."

The rejoicing continued well through evening when people gathered in the Parish House for a meal. It was a wonderful occasion to share personal experiences and insights on the Cross and Icon and to meet the Team accompanying it around Australia. The WYD 08 Team give witness to the Cross they follow - they gave up their jobs just to "follow the Cross". We remember Christ's invitation to us in the Scriptures, "If you wish to follow me, you must leave everything behind, take up your cross, and follow me." Led by Fr Chris Ryan, the Team have got such a profound relationship with Christ and to one another and it would be impossible not to notice it. John and Nat Curtin witnessed how two of the male members of WYD Team who were billeted to their home prayed for a long time before hitting the sack.

The WYD Team left with the Cross and Icon the next day, June 3, travelling to Esperance. The presence of the Cross and Icon left an indelible mark on those who were there and were very grateful for the opportunity to have been blessed by it. It was obviously 'just a piece of wood' but no-one can underestimate the power of God to work through 'just some piece of wood.' It has moved millions of people around the world and continues to do so. People have found hope through the Cross. Different nations around the globe experienced healing through the Cross. The Cross is a living sign of God's love. We can never be wrong in believing that there is a God who loves us unconditionally, and who will always cares for us even if the going gets tough.

People have given their testimony about their experiences and insights on the Cross. They are powerful symbols themselves expressing God's

handiwork in the lives of those who have opened their lives to the grace of God.

"Being in the presence of the Cross and Icon gave me such a deep feeling of humility, knowing all the countries where they had been venerated, bringing hope and comfort to so many people. The fact that the youth in so many war torn countries requested that the Cross be brought to them, sometimes having to be smuggled across the borders, gives us a great example of faith in God, even while experiencing the horrors of war." - Annie Slarke

"A truly humbling experience. All wished to linger at the momentous occasion. Everyone too reluctant to leave." - Edith Trevenen

"The cross was much more significant than we could have imagined and has certainly left its mark on us. It is only a humble piece of wood but in 25 years this cross has travelled to so many places and touched so many people and been in so many situations from tragic events to joyful occasions that in many ways it was humbling to stand before it. To many it would be just a couple of pieces of wood but even a little faith allows one into the 'presence' this cross represents. We were very blessed as a community to have this cross visit us in Lake Grace and it was a pleasure to have the opportunity to meet and spend time with the young team accompanying the cross around Australia. They are an inspiration." - Genni & Steve Curtin

# Important news for L and P plate drivers

Changes have been made to the legislation governing Learner and P plate drivers. The following changes will be in place soon.

- From Monday 30 June 2008 During their first 6 months on P-plates, drivers will be unable to drive between midnight and 5am, unless they are travelling to work, from work, for work, studying, training or doing voluntary work.
- 2. From Monday 30 June 2008 Learners will need to stay on their L-plates for at least 6 months after they have passed their Practical Driving Assessment (Learner Phase 2).
- 3. From Monday 30 June 2008 In order to allow drivers to gain more experience, they can stay on L plates for up to 3 years.
- 4. From Tuesday 1 July 2008 There will be a zero blood alcohol concentration limit for both learners and P-plate drivers.

As of Monday the 23rd of June 2008 Lake Grace Police will no longer be conducting MDL testing for any class of vehicle.



### **Express Photography**

The Photo Express photo booth at the Lake Grace Telecentre has been a resounding success with no shortage of photographers coming in to print their photos. This has been a huge relief to the Telecentre Committee and staff who very tentatively went out on a limb to have the photo printing machine installed.

With a contract in place that meant the Telecentre had to have 32 customers using the machine each month (if they didn't have 32 they would have to pay the shortfall) there were concerns that after the initial couple of months interest, numbers would drop off and the machine could become a millstone around the Telecentre's neck.

A flood of interest in the first month after the machine was installed in July of 2007 was quickly followed by a dip in numbers in the second month; however since then there has been a steady flow in numbers through the door, with an average of 53 customers per month. At no time has the Telecentre been in danger of not having their 32 customers each month. In the eleven months since installation 17,500 standard photos have been printed; on top of this

there have been 370 6" x 8" photos, 160 novelty prints (borders, collages etc.) and 60 ID prints.

There have been few problems with the machine; a printer head had to be replaced in April which was quickly followed by the entire printer being replaced due to the printer film breaking.

The label of 'photo booth' caused some confusion at first with people thinking you sat in it, had your photo taken and then received ID sized prints. The machine is basically a computer attached to a printer; it is capable of taking a variety of memory cards, flash drives and CD's. It only prints photos in two sizes, but can also do a variety of calendars, collages and borders.

In comparison to the home printer, the photo booth is high on quality and very cost efficient for the consumer. The consumer is also able to select their photos and have them printed on the spot; a facility that is not available in the metropolitan area for this price. One hundred take no more than 15 minutes to print.

# SCIENCE AND 等的的管管

SUN, SKIN AND THE WRONG SET OF GENES: Red hair, freckles and pale skin make you sun sensitive, but genes, not pigmentation, may be the ultimate guide to who is most likely to get skin cancer after sitting in the sun. Genes for light hair and skin and the risk of skin cancer tend to go hand in hand. For instance, the same



mutations in a gene called MC1R that cause red hair and freckles also greatly increase the chances of getting melanoma if you sunbathe.

But not all such genes are equally affected by sunlight. Researchers led by Kari Stefannson of Decode Genetics have identified a mutation in a gene called ASIP that, like MC1R, is linked to red hair and freckles and increases the likelihood of getting skin cancer (Nature, DOI: 10.1038/ng.161). Interestingly though, this ASIP variant doubles the risk of melanoma even in sun-starved Icelanders, indicating that its skin cancer effect is less dependant on sunlight than MCIR's.

"In Iceland you can avoid sunlight because it is so rare," says Stefannson. In contrast, his team found that having the MCIR variant had little effect on Icelandic people's risk of developing skin cancer, indicating that its effect was highly dependant on exposure to sunlight. "It doesn't look like it's just pigmentation," agrees geneticist Stuart MacGregor of the Queensland Institute of Medical Research in Brisbane, Australia.

FIRST COUSINS: Know the risks. Should countries introduce laws that would have made the first-cousin marriages of Darwin and Einstein illegal? In many cultures, tradition favours marriage to someone within the extended family. Some European politicians claim that the children of



immigrant populations with such traditions have an unacceptably high risk of genetic disorders and are calling for marriages between first cousins to be banned, as they are in most US states.

But geneticist Alan Bittles of Murdoch University in Perth, Western Australia, says education and genetic testing is the best way to minimise the risk. To estimate the risk, Bittle reviewed 48 studies from 11 countries. He found that infant mortality is only 1.2 per cent higher among the children of first cousins compared with children that have more distantly related parents. That is in line with a 2002 review suggesting that first-cousin children are less than 3 per cent more likely to have birth defects. However, the risk of genetic disease in a particular population may depend on how genetically diverse it is. Paediatrician Peter Corry of St Luke's Hospital in Bradford, UK, estimates that among people in the city of Pakistani descent, 55 per cent of whom marry first cousins, the risk of a recessive genetic disorder – the type often due to related parents – is 10 to 15 times that in the general population. A 2004 study

found that 13 out of every 1000 Asian children born in the area had recessive disorders. "But it is important to remember that there are lots of other, non-genetic reasons for illness and death in children," Corry says. "And even in places like Bradford most people, even cousins, have healthy children." (New Scientist May 24<sup>th</sup> 2008 p,4).

YABBIES NEVER FORGET A FACE: It's plausible to think of an elephant that never forgets, but extraordinary yabby memories are harder to believe. Yet it seems that when it comes to recognising past opponents, yabbies are the 'rememberers' of the invertebrate world. The aptly named Cherax destructor, or common yabby, is an aggressive species of freshwater crayfish. "Yabbies usually fight when they meet," says Prof David Macmillan, Head of the University of Melbourne's Department of Zoology. "It is as much a way of meeting each other as a way of establishing territory." Macmillan and colleagues gave yabbies an opportunity to indulge their pugilistic natures. Afterwards the losing yabby was isolated and given a choice to spend some time with either the victorious yabby or an opponent matched for size and appearance that it had never met. It might be expected that the defeated yabby would prefer to take on an unknown individual than one that had already defeated it in a fight, but the opposite was the case. Macmillan attributes this to the "dear enemy hypothesis". In some species it's safer to be around someone you know can beat you than someone you have to test your strength against.

"Yabbies remember the smell of other crayfish but the extent to which they remember visual features has previously been unknown," Macmillan says. "Careful observation by our team showed that the facial region is the important area for recognition of yabbies during and after a fight. In particular we showed highly variable cues are used, such as colour and face width." Macmillan tried to fool the subjects by matching individuals that were indistinguishable to the human eye and adding disguise markings, but the yabbies saw through everything. So far the research has not found a time limit for yabby memory, but a defeated yabby will still recognise its victor 10 to 15 days after a fight.

FIRST MICRO-RNA TRIAL: A drug that knocks out the "micro RNA's" that usually halt protein production has entered clinical trials as a possible treatment for hepatitis C. Other forms of RNA interference work by silencing genes, but this approach increases the amount of protein that gets translated, providing a new way to treat disease (New Scientist 31 May 2008 p,7).


Mand was a very informative and generous tutor, encouraging all participants to get in and have a go.



# NIGHT





Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight, from midnight Friday 21st June to midnight Friday 4th July. Astronomy is looking up. Never view the Sun with the naked eye or through binoculars and telescopes without proper solar filters as your eyes can easily be damaged beyond repair. Binoculars and telescopes can easily shatter as well. The Full Moon may also hurt your eyes without filters.

Two major events happen this fortnight: Saturday 8am will mark the Winter Solstice, this is when the Sun is on the Tropic of Cancer and will denote the real start of winter. Then on Friday 4<sup>th</sup> July at 4pm, the Earth will be at <u>Aphelion</u> at 152.1 million kilometres from the Sun.

Our local star, the **SUN**, will rise in the constellation of Taurus on Saturday, but will rise in Gemini on Sunday. Morning twilight begins on Saturday at 5:41am and on Friday 4<sup>th</sup> July at 5:43am. Evening twilight ends at 6:40pm on Saturday and at 6:44pm on Friday 4<sup>th</sup> July. The last quarter Moon will be at 8pm on Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> in the constellation of Pisces at magnitude -6.0.

On Wednesday 2<sup>nd</sup> July, the Moon will be at <u>Perigee</u> (closest), 359,573 Kilometres from Earth at 5am in Gemini. The new Moon will be at 10:06am in Gemini on 3<sup>rd</sup> July.

**MERCURY**, in the constellation of Taurus, at magnitude +1.6 on Saturday, rises at 5:43am in the morning twilight. On July 1<sup>st</sup> Mercury rises at 5:29am, 8° (4 fingers at arms length) south of the Moon at magnitude +0.7. Mercury will be at it's greatest elongation west at 22° on Wednesday 2<sup>nd</sup> July. On Friday 4<sup>th</sup> July at magnitude +0.2, Mercury sets at 5:31am.

**VENUS,** in the constellation of Gemini, at magnitude -3.9, sets low down in the north west at 5:24pm on Saturday. On Friday 4<sup>th</sup> July, Venus sets at 5:45pm in the evening twilight.

**MARS**, the red coloured planet in the constellation of Leo at magnitude +1.6 sets at 9:21pm on Saturday. On Tuesday 1<sup>st</sup> July, Mars will be 0.7° (close) north of the blue star Regulas. Mars on Friday 4<sup>th</sup> July sets at 9:07pm.

**JUPITER,** the giant gas planet, on Saturday in the constellation of Sagittarius at a bright magnitude of -2.6, rises at 6:32pm in the east to south east. On Friday 4<sup>th</sup> July Jupiter rises at 5:32pm.

**SATURN**, the ringed gas planet, on Saturday in the constellation of Leo at magnitude +0.7, sets at 10:06pm. On Friday 4<sup>th</sup> July Saturn sets at 9:20pm.

**URANUS**, the blue/green gas planet, on Saturday rises in the constellation of Aquarius at 11:30pm and shines at magnitude +5.8. On Thursday 26<sup>th</sup> Uranus will be 4° (two fingers at arms length) south of the Moon rising at 11:11pm. Uranus on Friday 4<sup>th</sup> July rises at 10:39pm. Binoculars needed.

**NEPTUNE**, the grey/green gas planet, on Saturday rises at 9:16pm in the constellation of Capricornus at magnitude +7.8. On Monday  $23^{rd}$  Neptune rises close to the Moon (0.8° south) at 9:08pm . Neptune on Friday  $4^{th}$  July rises at 8:25pm.

Viewing at my home is free at any time. You are able to view the Sun, planets, galaxies, double stars, triple stars, planetary nebulae and the constellations pointed out. If you require viewing at your place or school please give me a ring and see what can be arranged. I have clearance to work with children (number 277357). If you view something in the sky you can't understand please call as I can talk to you outside and if I can see it I will explain what it is. People see lots of strange phenomena but do not report it as it may make them look foolish. But if you have not viewed them before it is hard to understand them as your brain does not recognise them.

With the Moon rising later at night it is a good time to look at Saturn and Jupiter. There are five moons around Saturn you can view with the rings and four around Jupiter with the different coloured zones as well as moon shadows and the Great Red Spot (storm) with your telescope and some with binoculars.


The red spot is in view only for one hour at a time: 7:45pm on 22<sup>nd</sup>, 9:23pm on 24<sup>th</sup>, 6:54pm on 27<sup>th</sup>, 8:32pm on 29<sup>th</sup>, 10:11pm on 1<sup>st</sup> July, 6:03pm on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 7:41pm on 4<sup>th</sup>.

Remember to use the darkest position possible and rug up as this time of the year is the best time for viewing.

### **Genealogy - Tracing Our Family Tree**

Lake Grace Telecentre hosted a genealogy workshop on Wednesday 11<sup>th</sup> June with Helen Hiscock from Narrogin's Family History Centre. Eighteen took part, nine in the morning session and nine in the afternoon.

The three hour sessions covered such areas as sources of information; which included official documents, church records, census, war records etc. Time was spent searching the internet on sites recommended by Helen, looking for information about family members. Proving that if you shake the tree hard enough something will fall out, two of the participants (sharing a computer at the time) discovered they were related.

Helen is the Director of the Family History Centre in Narrogin of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints. The Centre provides access to films of Parish Records, Australian Civil Records on microfiche, a library, and you are also able to tap into Helen's personal knowledge of tracing your Ancestors.

### First Aid Course for LGDHS Staff
