


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CIENCE AND

EARTH to EARTH, not ASHES to ASHES:

Professor Short is promoting environmentally friendly deaths or more precisely, environmentally friendly ways

of disposing of the departed. "Think Earth to Earth," he says, "but not ashes to ashes or dust to dust". Short, a reproductive biologist at the University of Melbourne, notes that



as cities run out of space for cemeteries. However, the average Australian male produces 50kg of carbon dioxide during the cremation process. Instead, Short advocates burying people in cardboard boxes that will eventually decay, allowing the nutrient-filled contents to be returned to the soil. If a tree is planted above the site, the dearly departed will fertilise it as they decay. A single tree over a 100-year period absorbs over a metric tonne of carbon dioxide,

Short says, "so imagine the difference it could make if everyone was buried and had a tree planted in their memory". Short acknowledges that his ideas conflict with cultural sensitivities. While his suggestion that people could choose their favourite species of tree to grow above them may attract some enthusiasm, the suggestion that participation will make people "feel better about dying" might prove overly optimistic. To get around the problem of burial space, people could be interred standing up. "Forget pushing up daisies," he says. "We should be pushing up forests instead".

UPLIFTING:

Global warming, overfishing and pollution are not the only threats to coral reefs. Natural forces can play a role as well, with an earthquake identified as the



cause of massive damage over 600 km of Indonesian coastline. On 28 March 2005, an earthquake lifted a huge stretch of the ocean floor near Aceh.

Unlike the quake three months earlier, there was no significant tsunami, so the human toll was two orders of magnitude lower. However, coral reefs around the island of Simeuleu were suddenly lifted 1.2 metres closer to the surface of the ocean. None of the coral lifted by the earthquake have survived. Some of the coral lifted out of the water remained sufficiently preserved to be able to recognise individual species. Meanwhile, the surviving reef is facing a new danger in the crown-of-thorns starfish. Although the starfish have occasionally done damage to the Great Barrier reef, they have never before been observed causing extensive damage in Indonesia (Wildlife Conservation Society Coral Reef Studies).

SPACE SENTATION:

NASA inaugurated its shuttle launch simulator at the Kennedy Space Centre in Florida on 25th May. The 44seat simulator is designed to give visitors a taste of a vertical launch as the shuttle speeds to 28,000 kilometres per hour. Effects include bone-rattling vibrations and the ear-shattering roar of engines.

GREAT LAKES IN CRISIS:

Tom Mackay reckons his backyard in Duluth shows what is happening in Lake Superior as well as any place. In November 2005, the metre-tall wooden "Bay Ness Monster" statue he installed in the water just off his home dock was submerged up to its gaping mouth. Today, his would-be water serpent is high and dry. For residents of this lakeside Minnesota city, located more than 3000 kilometres by boat from the open Atlantic, the transformation is disturbing.

Lake Superior, the largest body of fresh water in the world by surface area, is experiencing its lowest water levels since the record set in 1926. Lake Superior's surface waters have warmed by about 2.5°C since 1979, far more than average

air temperatures in the region during the same period (Geophysical Research Letters, vol 34, p L06604). While the lake's level has dropped precipitously since last year, there has been a longer-term decline of an average of 10 millimetres per year since 1978. Evaporation has increased by an average of 4.6mm per year over the same period, while precipitation has decreased by 4.1mm.

DID YOU KNOW:

Forty billion computers are expected to be embedded within devices such as cars, home appliances and office machines by 2020.

The computer mouse is under threat from the computer ring. Created by a team of students at the Worcester Polytechnic Institute in Massachusetts, the finger ring emits ultrasonic pulses that are picked up by five receivers on a computer monitor. Based on the delay in the pulses' arrival at the different receivers, a processor determines the position of the wearer's finger and converts it to a curser position on screen.

THE PERFECT SPOT FOR OTHER EARTHS:

Water vapour and hydrogen gas have been found around a young star in exactly the place you'd expect to find Earth-like planets. Josh Eisner at the University of California, Berkeley, looked at the spectrum of light coming from the protoplanetary disc around a star approximately 500 light years away and found spatially distinct rings of gas, water vapour and dust orbiting the star. The study is the first to find water vapour in the region where wet Earth-like planets are thought to form. The idea is that water sticks to dust grains, which accumulate to form planetesimals and eventually planets.

Introduction to New Liquor Legislation

Background to Liquor Reform

In 2006, the State Government initiated the most significant package of reforms to liquor licensing in more than 100 years.

The reforms focus on providing more choice for consumers, but not necessarily more licensed venues; promoting greater levels of innovation within the liquor and hospitality industries; providing opportunity to the small business sector; assisting the tourism sector cater for thousands of visitors to Western Australia; focussing on and promoting harm minimisation principles; and creating a safer liquor environment.

WA Premier Hon Alan Carpenter unveiled the Government's reform package on 28 March 2006.

"The Government would put in place tough safeguards against anti-social behaviour and alcohol-related harm, while reducing bureaucratic red tape for licensees. These changes will give people more choice and encourage tourism. They will also balance people's expectations of being able to enjoy a drink responsibly with the community's right to enjoy themselves in safety," Mr Carpenter said.

Training

Mandatory Industry Training

Any person engaged in the sale, supply and service of liquor on licensed premises in Western Australia will have to complete <u>responsible service of alcohol</u> training.

Mandatory server training programs have proved successful in other jurisdictions of Australia because alcohol servers have the ability to decrease the level of intoxication of patrons by identifying when they have had enough, and therefore reducing the levels of harm, or ill-health caused through alcohol consumption.

All licensees and approved managers must undergo training in Western Australia's liquor laws as well as responsible service of alcohol training.

Bar staff will only be required to undertake an approved course in responsible service of alcohol, which is expected to include CD and web-based training provisions.

In conjunction with mandatory training requirements, all licensees will be required to maintain and make available to an inspector a register that contains each staff member's details including a copy of their training certificate.

Transitional provisions

All staff members who were employed at licensed premises **before** 7th May, 2007 will have a period of 12 months to complete the mandatory training requirements.

Staff employed **after** 7th May, 2007 will have four weeks from commencing their employment to complete the mandatory training requirements.

Body corporates and clubs

In the case of licensee where that licensee is a body corporate or a club, then only one company director or member of the management committee is required to undertake training in Western Australia's liquor laws and responsible service of alcohol. That person could also become the primary or principal 'Approved Manager'. Supervisory staff and bar staff will be required to undertake the training as explained above.

Occasional licences

In terms of occasional licences, the licensee, approved manager and any person engaged in the sale, supply and service of liquor will be required to undertake an approved course in the responsible service of alcohol depending on the size and nature of the event.

The Director of Liquor Licensing has the discretion to waive this requirement and determine the level of training required on a case-by-case basis.

Individuals were given an opportunity to have their service details excluded from the website prior to it being published. More detailed information about this, and is available at the roll. www.ww2roll.gov.au.









Farm Organisations Memberships Decline

Farm organisations who claim to represent wheat growers now admit their membership is so low they cannot afford to affiliate with their national body the NFF.

The announcement by Simon Ramsay of the Victorian Farmers Federation that state groups will need to cut finding for the NFF's Canberra operations and some of its peak commodity councils (Funding for farming groups in doubt ABC Rural News 13 June 2007) and farm groups saying they cannot afford to keep the NFF afloat, with membership income down to the drought and apathy (ABC Rural News 14 June 2008) has drawn comment from Wilson Tuckey.

State farm organisations who have promoted 1930s responses to today's market place are losing members rapidly but still claim the right to be heard in the halls of Canberra as the voice of the people who decline to be members.

"They might ask themselves if their support for a company, whose mismanagement of the 15m tonne 05/06 pool has denied their few remaining wheat members the opportunity of receiving a fair price, which should be approximately \$100 per tonne more than the \$192 per tonne on offer, has damaged their membership rather than "drought and apathy" Wilson Tuckey said

"All of their previous and present members have suffered equally and some may have retained their membership and farm viability had AWB paid them a competitive price for their 05/06 wheat" Mr Tuckey said.

"Furthermore some of those lucky enough to have received rain are being prevented from sowing a crop due to financial pressure because AWB has declined to pay the final instalment on that 05/06 pool, having however made sure it paid itself over \$60m as a reward for its disastrous performance. It is time farmers recognized the failure of those who, like trade union bosses, impose their outdated policies upon them even through Government legislation."

Lake Grace Flood Experience Informs Disaster Relief Report

Lake Grace farmers, Shire of Lake Grace staff and Roe MLA Graham Jacobs have had vital input into a parliamentary report into natural disaster relief funds released last week. The report examines the effectiveness of Western Australian Natural Disaster Relief Arrangements (WANDRA), a range of State government relief measures to assist communities severely affected by a natural disaster.

Following the Lake Grace flooding of January 2006, Roe MLA Graham Jacobs presented a Private Members Bill, 'that the government plans to make real contributions to flood-stricken farmers in any Western Australian natural disaster assistance program'. The local member said his recommendations were already taking effect because people affected by the Esperance floods – 12 months later – were able to access a \$5000 clean up allocation to deliver practical help.

The Community Development and Joint Standing Committee *Inquiry into Western Australia's Natural Disaster Relief Arrangements* (WANDRA) found that a \$1500 consultation fund was totally ineffective and better spent on fixing boundary fencing.

Submissions to the Standing Committee Inquiry were invited from State Government Departments, local governments, farmers, business people and other relevant stakeholders. The Committee received 28 submissions including one from Shire of Lake Grace CEO, Chris Jackson outlining the experience of the Lake Grace community following the 2006 flood

Seven public hearings were conducted in Perth, Albany, Lake Grace, Mullewa, and Bunbury between 5 September 2006 and 21 March 2007, taking evidence from 53 witnesses. Mr Jackson, with Lake Grace district community members Bruce Duckworth, Helen Bennett, Scott Strevett, Donald Wallace, Leanne Grant-Williams, gave evidence at the public hearing in Lake Grace.

A common theme was the inadequacy of the financial relief package for farmers and businesses, that is, the grants to obtain professional advice of \$1,500, and a 4% interest rate subsidy on loans.

Mr Jackson described how a misperception of WANDRA arose after the floods of January 2006 were declared a natural disaster. There was relief among the community due to a perception of extensive financial assistance. This was not the case however, as according to Mr Jackson, there was "no real assistance available, particularly for farmers".

A major issue effecting farmers after the flood was the need to repair fencing so farms could become operational as soon as possible. In most cases fencing was not covered by insurance. Recommendation 9 of the report recognized: 'That the guidelines of the WANDRA be revised to provide for the inclusion of the cost of materials expended in the repair of boundary fences'

Recommendations 1 and 6 provide Fire and Safety Emergency Authority and Main Roads more scope to consult with the WA Local Government Association to assist local shires.

The first is to investigate more equitable means of calculating the local government contribution to road and infrastructure restorations costs and the second allows these organizations to establish 'exceptional circumstance' criteria to provide for additional assistance to local government.

"Council's submission and persistent lobbying of the State government for additional funds to repair flood damage to roads has greatly contributed to this first recommendation," said Mr Jackson.

Establishment of the Lakes District Youth Care Council

On 10th January this year, people representing a number of different churches from across the region gathered in Newdegate. Their purpose was to discuss the establishment of the *Lakes District YouthCare Council*. Revd John Clapton from *YouthCare WA* (also known as The Churches Commission on Education) was also present.

At the conclusion of the gathering, it had been decided to press ahead and form the YouthCare Council which would initially cover the regions surrounding Lake Grace including Pingrup, Newdegate and Kukerin.

The Lake District YouthCare Council is affiliated with YouthCare WA which has been set up to oversee and encourage Special Religious Education in Schools (SRE) as well as providing and supporting Chaplaincy in Government schools. The dream would be for SRE to be operating in all Government schools in the district and eventually to enable the provision of a Chaplain as well.

YouthCare WA through its District Councils is the only provider of Christian chaplains to Government schools recognized by the Education Department. At present an opportunity exists for schools to apply for Federal Government funding to help support chaplaincy. It may be possible for a number of schools to share a chaplain

throughout the district. The Lakes District YouthCare would be eager to discuss this opportunity with local schools.

In the meantime, the Council supports SRE teachers in schools around the district. Again with the backing of *YouthCare WA* and the Education Department, this gives credibility to the teaching of religion in schools. *YouthCare WA* oversees and conducts courses which aspirant SRE teachers must complete in order to be qualified to teach SRE.

Of course SRE was existent in some schools within the region before the founding of the *Lakes District YouthCare Council*. However, not since Pastor John and Chris Butler left Lake Grace around 7 or 8 years ago, has there been religious education taught in the Lake Grace District High School on any regular basis. At that time Lilia Nolan also taught at the LGDHS and we are delighted that Lilia is part of the newly formed District Council.

But in other schools around the area, SRE has been faithfully carried out for some years: Phyl Howatson has been teaching at Newdegate Primary School, Mary Bock and Alison Furphy have been a welcome twosome at Pingrup Primary, and Amanda Nenke and Jasmine Mycock have taught at Kukerin. More recently (since the commencement of the LDYCC), a trial has begun at the Lake Grace District High School to recommence SRE with Mary Bock, Alison Furphy and Amanda Nenke teaching some classes.

The Lakes District YouthCare Council believes that the presence of SRE in Schools can have a very favourable effect on a student's physical, emotional, mental and spiritual development. SRE offers confidence through life messages which affirm positive life values, offers spiritual understanding and development, encourages good self image and assists the building of sound and affirming relationships.

NIGHT





Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight, from midnight Friday 22nd June, to midnight Friday 6th July.

Astronomy is looking UP. Never look at the Sun without a proper solar filter and preferably one that fits over the skyward end as your eyes can be quickly damaged beyond repair.

On Monday 2nd of July, in Leo, the two planets Venus and Saturn will be within 0.8° of each other, with Venus the brightest in the south.

Our local star, the Sun, resides in the constellation of Gemini shining at 26.72 magnitude. Morning twilight begins at 5:40am and evening twilight ends at 6:38pm. Light takes 8.5 minutes to reach the Earth with the Sun rising 10 minutes earlier in Lake Grace than Perth.

The Moon on Sunday 24th will be at <u>Apogee</u> (furthest) at 404,540 kilometres from Earth at 10:15pm. On Thursday 28th, the Moon will be 0.5° south of the red supergiant star Antares (the heart of the Scorpion). The full Moon (blue moon), will be at 9:48pm on Saturday 30th June. The moon resides in Virgo on Saturday 23rd at 51%, 24th at 61%, 25th at 70% and 26th at 78%, Libra on 27th at 85%, Scorpius on 28th at 91% and 29th at 96%, Sagittarius on 30th at 99% (FM), 1st July at 100% and 2nd at 99%, Capricornus on 3rd at 95% and 4th at 89%, Aquarius on 5th at 82% and on 6th at 72%. You will notice that the Moon will spend most of the time in the night sky this fortnight.

MERCURY is in inferior conjunction (between Sun and Earth) on June 29th in Gemini and out of view. On Tuesday 3rd July, Mercury will rise in the morning twilight at 6:28am in constellation of Orion (the hunter). On Friday 6th July, Mercury rises at 6:12am at magnitude +1.0.

The very bright planet **VENUS**, at magnitude -4.5, is residing in Cancer in the north/west and sets Saturday evening at 8:36pm. On Tuesday 26th, Venus rises in Leo not far from Saturn. Venus sets at 8:32pm on Friday 6th June at magnitude -4.7 with a 36% disc.

MARS the red planet in Pisces rises at 2:14am Saturday morning at magnitude +0.7 with some surface detail starting to show. On Thursday 28th Mars rises in Aries. Mars rises at 2:07am on Friday 6th.

JUPITER, the giant gas planet at magnitude -2.6 in the constellation of Ophiuchus rises now well up in the evening sky after rising at 3:47pm on Saturday and setting at 5:55am on Sunday morning. Jupiter will be 6° (3 fingers at arms length) north of the Moon on Thursday 28th. On Friday 6th Jupiter sets at 4:53am and rises again at 2:51pm and can be viewed twice in one day.

SATURN the ringed planet in Leo at magnitude +0.6 sets at 9:02pm east of Venus on Saturday evening. On Friday 6th July Saturn sets at 8:17pm just before Venus.

URANUS the blue/green coloured gas planet at magnitude +5.8 resides in the constellation of Aquarius and rises at 11:05pm on Saturday evening. On Friday 6th of July, Uranus rises at 10:13pm and will be 1.9° south of the Moon.

NEPTUNE the grey/green coloured gas planet at magnitude +7.9 in the constellation of Capricornus, rises at 8:58pm on Saturday evening. Neptune will be 1.3° north of the Moon on Wednesday 5th July. On Friday 6th Neptune rises at 8:06pm. A telescope is best but a good pair of binoculars will find it.

Jupiter's great red spot is visible on Thursday 5th July for telescopes from 9:51pm to 10:51pm. The moon Ganymede will appear from behind the planet disc at 7:57pm on Wednesday 4th. On the 5th July ,at 8:47pm, the Moon Europa will appear from behind Jupiter's disc. Remember Jupiter and its moons are good viewing at any time of the night as they change positions around the planet.

On the 1st of July at 6pm, CRUX (the southern cross), will be due south, high in the evening sky. The constellation of Corvus (the crow), will be high in the north sky at the same time. Corvus is the out of shape square. The stars just south of the cross is the Constellation of Musca (the fly).

He was in his fifties when he started writing his story with a pen between his toes, taking a year to painstakingly cover 30 pages of a school exercise book. When he graduated to a computer, it was his big toe that tapped away at the keyboard, re-writing his memories.

Eventually a friend offered to help, and together they trawled through the pages of Maurice's amazing life. Here is a tribute to a man who faces daily challenges that most of us would never envisage, who hears a 'no' and decides on a 'yes', and who has achieved more than even he might have imagined.

Maurice shares with us his difficulties and triumphs, and seeks to raise our awareness. His wish is to encourage other people with a disability to pursue their goals and dreams. We hope that this book gives them every encouragement.

Here's part of an interview that Maurice had with Stephanie Painter from the Albany Advertiser.

This resilience, unwavering independence, has been a constant theme in Maurice's life.

When he was nearly 10, Maurice's parents left him in a South Australian nursing home while they came to WA with their four other children to look at buying a farm.


While Maurice was on his own a polio epidemic broke out in SA and the nursing home needed more beds.

The matron, in all her wisdom, decided to send Maurice on a plane to Perth - without telling his parents or grandparents.

Maurice arrived at Perth airport with nobody there to welcome him, a little note placed in his pocket by the matron reading: "Hi, I'm Maurice Lock".

Little Maurice, all by himself in a foreign place, went into care while people tried to find his parents, who had just purchased a property in the Porongurups and didn't have a phone.

Carer and friend, Maggie Greathead, said that certainly wouldn't happen these days.



Maurice has since traveled on planes by himself, though with a little more forethought and planning than his first trip.

Nick Maalouf then explained what happens to a vehicle after it has been in an accident, the panel beating and spraying that is involved. With a yard of vehicles that have been in accidents, the students were able to see how a moment of inattention can have devastating results.

While one half of the high school was deliberating over the results of an accident, the other half were finding out about keeping their vehicle on the road courtesy of Ray Bird from Stevemacs. With both a 4WD and station wagon on hand, students were shown and given the opportunity to participate in changing a tyre, checking the oil or topping up the water. Throughout there was emphasis on safety while carrying out these tasks.

Travel Diaries

We continue on from Day 10 of Joe and June McEncroe and Helen and Clem Bennett's travels through Africa and Barcelona.

Day 10 - We still had three days left of our hire car so we decided to make use of it and being a Sunday we hoped the roads would be quieter. So we headed into the famous wine growing region and in particular the town of Stellenbosch. It was an extremely pretty town with a major university so we drove around for some time to try and get a picture of what it would be like to live in that part of the world and it would appear that it would be a very good. The wineries spread out in all directions from the town, a bit like Margaret River so it was very difficult to choose one (or more) to visit. We ended up going to one called the Camberley because it reminded us of the Amberley down at MR. They all had elaborate security arrangements but once you got through, it was all systems go. The host was a very likeable fellow by the name of John Nel (a very good cricketer in his day) who proceeded to get us into the serious business of wine tasting. He had a variety of reds and whites and a bubbly red champagne which were all very nice but overall we thought the WA wines were better - maybe we're just biased.

We left the wine growing region and followed the coastline all the way back into Cape Town. Some of the bays and general coastline were absolutely spectacular and for anyone who has been to the Amalfi coast in Italy, this coastline would be right up there by way of comparison. Some of the built up areas reminded us of Cottesloe being that there were many beautiful houses and seaside café's etc where people were relaxing with a meal or a drink. At one point we passed by the house where the famous Cecil Rhodes once lived. Later in the drive we stopped at one of the many roadside markets where the girls bartered and purchased some wooden stick figures. We had lots of fun packaging them up and posted them home from the main Cape Town post office on the 20th February - as at the end of May we were still waiting for them to arrive!!! Finished the day once again at the waterfront where we tried to purchase

tickets to go to Robben island (where Nelson Mandela was imprisoned for 27 years) but were told that there was nothing available for about a week but if we cared to present ourselves early in the morning in the next day or two we might be lucky to get tickets due to cancellations.

Day 11 – Helen's Birthday (19/2/07) - We headed down to waterfront at 7.00am and managed to get our tickets to Robben Island. The island which is about 40 minutes off Cape Town in a fast boat is not in any way pretty, in fact Rottnest island would be a paradise in comparison. We were given a full tour of the island and the prison including the actual cell in which Nelson Mandela was interred. Our guide for the prison section of the tour was actually one of the inmates, so that was particularly interesting for us. The excursion was well worth the time and effort plus it was a real learning experience for us all.

Back on the mainland we took to our hire car again and headed off to Table mountain where we caught the cable car to the top. Footnote: Helen hates this type of transport with a vengeance so she did really well to overcome her fears. What a speccy ride it was but the views from the top were even more speccy. It was a magnificent day for viewing and photography which is quite often not the case due to cloud cover. The rest of the day was devoted to domestic requirements i.e. washing but we did manage to celebrate Helen's birthday that night.

Day 12 - Our last day in South Africa - The hotel organised a tour for us of the black townships so we were away fairly early. We started at what is called the district 6 museum The museum portrayed the events of people (mainly black) who were uprooted from their homes and moved out of the city. The houses etc were then completely demolished and the land used for other purposes.

Our tour took us into various black township areas including what we came to know as shanty towns – to say it was an eye opener would be the understatement

of all time. We were taken into a fully secured kindergarten where the children danced and sang for us. They were really cute little kids, full of life and reasonably well dressed considering the level of poverty in which they existed.

Our guide also took us to see a traditional witch doctor but we only stayed long enough to be courteous as we reckoned there were better places to be than surrounded by all sorts of potions and bones and unmentionables hanging from hooks etc.

Went to a restaurant that night where we sampled many of the African wildlife such as ostrich, warthog, springbok, wildebeest, kudu and crocodile. Most of it was OK but probably won't need to do it again – Joe didn't go too much on the Springbok.

Day 13 - Our parting impressions of South Africa judging from the small part of the country that we saw is that it has a lot to offer but we always had in the backs of our minds the need to be very cautious about what we did and where we went because of the high crime rate. However in saying that we saw nothing to particularly worry us other than one incident in Kynsna that did give us a bit of concern for the safety of our hire car. Overall we left South Africa with mixed emotions in that it has a vast discrepancy between the have's and the have not's. Many of the people we spoke to said that the government is endeavouring to correct the imbalance but from what we witnessed it will take some considerable time. Perhaps the forthcoming soccer World Cup in around three years time could be a catalyst for an improvement to the general living standards. So as much as we could have easily stayed longer, it was bye bye to S A and hullo to Zanzibar. We drove our great little(ish) hire car to the airport where we left it with the hire car company. The car at around \$200.00 a day was reasonably expensive but we all thought it was worth its weight in gold just for the freedom of movement it gave us, plus almost all the roads we travelled on were A1

Zanzibar - After a two hour flight from Cape Town to Jo'berg and a five hour flight from Jo'berg we arrived at the island of Zanzibar which is part of Tanzania. There were no problems whatsoever here with security or customs as everything was very simple and relaxed.

A driver with a small bus was there to meet us and to take us to our accommodation at the Casa Del Mar hotel on the south eastern coast of the island, in an area called Jimbiana. The initial part of the drive was through fairly crowded rough streets but we were soon out into the less populated areas. It was dark by this time and there were no street lights and there were still many people walking, riding bicycles or moving animals, how the driver never hit anyone remains a mystery.

The trip took over an hour and we were starting to wonder if we were being hi-jacked, when we arrived at what appeared in the night to be the back of nowhere. Anyhow the accommodation turned out to be very good but when we were informed that it was a no alcohol

area, Clem and Joe almost had a coronary. It did not take them long to find a source to acquire a cold beer so they ended up happy. Note: Alcohol is not readily available in most areas of Muslim counties as we were to also find out in Morocco and Egypt.

Day 14 - We had planned to have a look around the island but being that we were so isolated we decided to make the most of where we were and just relax for two days. Unfortunately there was no pool and we soon found out that it was not possible to swim during the main part of the day as the tide took the water way out to bilio. The temperature was bearable at the resort (no air conditioning) but once you moved even 100 metres from the coast it turned into a veritable spa.

So we laid around read books did the post card thing. June had a massage for 10,000 shillings, about 10 bucks. She said it was OK but nowhere near as good as Narelle's.

Day 15 - We went out on a dhow which is the local form of sea transport. They are canoe like vessels that are hollowed out of mango trees and fitted with outriggers – quite ingenious how they are put together. The crew (2 guys) took us about two kms off shore where we all had a snorkel around in the most crystal clear blue waters that you are ever likely to see. Lots of colourful fish and generally very enjoyable

Rest of the day was a bit of a bludge but June and Clem learnt how to play a local board game called – BAOO.

Day 16 - After saying our farewells to the friendly staff at the hotel we were driven to Stonetown which is the population centre of Zanzibar. We had organised a day room where we could leave our back packs while we went touring, We found ourselves a guide who's name was Ali – it seemed that every second person that you met was either an Ali or a Mohamed. Stonetown has a very colourful history although not necessarily for all the right reasons as it was considered to be the centre for the black slave trade. The city itself apart from being very hot was also quite untidy and dirty plus the

hawkers were constantly at you to sell you something. Ali walked us around and showed us the "House of Wonders" which was built by Sultans in 1800's. He also took us to the where the slave markets were held in the earlier days. There we saw where they would hold 70 or 80 blacks all chained together in these tiny little dungeons. Mans inhumanity to man never ceases to amaze.

By this time we were very hot and thirsty so we headed for a restaurant/bar called Mercury's — Named after Freddy Mercury. We had only just had our drinks served when in walked Chris and Chelsea. We only had a couple of hours with them before we had to get organised to go to the airport but it was a great to exchange notes on what everyone had been doing. Amazing to meet your son and his girlfriend in a bar halfway across the world!!!

Impressions of Zanzibar: From what we came across we were a little disappointed as the beaches we saw weren't as good as we thought they would be and Stone Town was quite grubby. We have heard that the beaches and the accommodation at the northern end of the island are very good so we will just have to re-visit and find out for ourselves.

<u>Tanzania</u> - After a 50 minute flight we landed at the Kilimanjaro airport and were then driven to our accommodation at the Imperial hotel in the city of

Arusha.

Day 17 - The hotel was a starting point for many of the safari companies and was busy with the various guides meeting up with their tourist groups. Our guide for the next 5 days was "Zuberi" who worked for a company by the name of Leopard tours. Anyhow after a brief getting to know each other, we headed off into the city to pick up some supplies with the main one being umpteen litres of bottled water. We also had lots of fun trying to find an ATM that would dispense money. Being only a small group - 5 including Zuberi has its advantages over larger groups in time savings and we were able to get on the road to Lake Manyara which is about a 4 1/2 hour drive to the south east. When we arrived, Zuberi popped the roof of the land cruiser so we could stand for viewing and taking of photographs. We then drove into the park which was partly beautiful rain forest and partly plains surrounding a lake. There were so many animals in here there would be too many to name. They ranged in size from tiny baboons to elephants and hippo's.

We were then taken to our tented accommodation where we thought we were going to rough it for a night but this wasn't to be as it turned out to be 5 star. The tent had an en-suite with all the trimmings and was set in a marvellous location, with an excellent open restaurant. A real pity that we only had one night here.

Rural Crime Prevention- Farm Machinery Theft

The theft of farm machinery causes huge personal and financial losses for farmers. Tractors, ploughs, headers, augers, generators, welders, motor bikes and quad runners are attractive targets for thieves. The theft of machinery parts, such as header lights, batteries and radios from tractors is also a problem for many farmers.

The costs are high for farmers in replacing stolen equipment. If the theft occurs during the critical periods of planting or harvesting, loss of productivity can compound the total financial damage.

What can you do.

There are some things you can do to reduce the opportunity for theft. Although several of the following suggestions may seem somewhat drastic and time consuming they are worthwhile if a theft is prevented. You are the best judge of whether it is worth the time and trouble in your particular situation.

Protecting Farm Equipment

It is sometimes necessary to leave equipment in a paddock overnight. If it is possible, park machinery out of sight of a public road, behind trees or a hill. Proximity to roads increase the probability of theft or vandalism. If possible, position machinery so it can be seen from the farm house or alternatively, park it near a neighbour's house.

- Never leave keys in machinery.
- The doors of machinery with cabs should be locked
- To prevent thefts of radios from machinery, try to have radios installed that operate only with a security code that is connected to the auxiliary power of the machine.
- When there is a break down, if possible return the machinery to the main shed area. Too often farmers pull down a tractor in a paddock, leave it unattended while seeking replacement parts, and return to find several parts missing.
- Always know where your equipment is located on farm.
- Try to secure or immobilize vehicles or equipment when not in use. Machinery left in paddocks overnight or for longer periods should be disabled by removing the distributor cap or battery. Machinery stored outside or in remote sheds and only used in certain times of the year should also be disabled in this way.
- You can chain machinery together or to a tree or other strongly anchored objects.
- You can chain and lock the front wheel to the rear wheel or axle.
- Where possible, large farm machinery not in use should be stored in a secured shed, preferably in sight of a farm house or grouped in a highly visible area.
- Build a fence enclosure that can be padlocked shut for heavier equipment that cannot be

secured in sheds.

- Ensure all machinery and pieces of equipment are marked with identification and maintain an inventory with a description, a record of the serial number, chassis and model numbers of machines.
- Use metal engravers or a welder to mark machinery, vehicles and equipment with 'WA' for your state and your driver's license number or your stock brand.
- Photograph or video machinery and valuable items of equipment and store them with the inventory.
- Use lockable fuel caps
- Secure tools and tool boxes.
- Stolen goods need a ready market. Be wary of offers that are too good to be true - they usually are! Report all suspicious incidents to Police
