

Mercedes Mark V Ambulance on Display



If you have driven down Bennett Street at night in the last week you would have noticed the very bright signage on the Mercedes Mark V ambulance parked in the driveway of the sub centre.

This Mercedes 316 CDI "Sprinter" is one of the newest in the fleet for the Metropolitan area. It came into service in December last year and has completed 28,000km to date. Under special provision, St John Ambulance have loaned this fully operational ambulance to Lake Grace for 2 weeks to allow us to evaluate the suitability of this type of vehicle for our community needs.

The Mercedes are a 4 cylinder, 5 stroke, 2.5 L turbo intercooled diesel, 4 speed automatic with high driver position and vision. The van drives more like a small coaster bus compared to the current Ford F150, V8, petrol, Mark IV which drives more like a small truck. Hence on first drive they are difficult to compare because of the large difference in vehicle handling. The Ford achieves 4 – 5km/L of fuel compared with the Mercedes at around 10km/L.

The Ford ambulance has one stretcher with the fold down legs (Ferno stretcher) and one stretcher which does not have fold down legs (trundle stretcher). There is seating for two people in the rear on small cushion seats with lap seatbelts, and two people in the front (driver and passenger) in bucket seats with lap/sash seatbelts. The scoop stretcher is mounted next to the trundle stretcher in the rear of the vehicle. Access to the rear of the vehicle is via the rear doors only.

The Mercedes has one Ferno stretcher and bucket seats for 3 people in the rear of the ambulance with lap or lap/sash seatbelts. There are also driver and passenger bucket seats with the lap/sash seatbelts. Two of the rear seats can be laid flat and are equipped with harnesses to become a second bed. They also provide a surface for the scoop stretcher to be placed and secured for transporting a second stretcher patient. The scoop stretcher is located next to the large oxygen cylinders behind the drivers side sliding door. Access to the rear of the ambulance is through the rear doors or the passenger side sliding door.

The ambulances are very different in design and markings. However, they carry all the same equipment, just in different locations within the ambulance.

So why do we have this Mercedes here? Firstly to give the current ambulance officers and other interested parties the opportunity to drive a new ambulance and to test all of the positive and negative press about these new ambulances. Secondly this is an opportunity to demonstrate to the community the change in technology in ambulance emergency transport over the last 13 years since our 1992 model was purchased.

Want to have a look? On Saturday 2nd July and Sunday 3rd July from 9 – 12pm both ambulances will be on display in the Co-op car park (off Bennett Street). You will be able to sit in, look through, and ask questions about the ambulances.

On Sunday 3rd July we will bring both ambulances to 4 locations around town for you to come and have a look at the vehicles. We will sound the sirens and flash the lights to let you know we have arrived.

VP Day Commemorations

Fellow citizens, the war is over."

Few announcements in Australian history have provoked such spontaneous displays of emotion as Prime Minister Ben Chifley's on 15 August 1945. On that day, Japan announced it would surrender to Allied forces. Victory in Europe had been achieved on 8 May 1945 and Japan's surrender ended World War II, which had raged for almost six years.

Finally, the war was over and, for Australians at home and those serving abroad, it was a time to rejoice. Australians poured onto the streets, dancing, waving flags and enjoying the freedom for which they and their servicemen and women had sacrificed so much. Those famous scenes of people dancing in the streets still resonate today, epitomising the relief felt by Australians at the end of the war.

VP (Victory Pacific) Day signalled a time of renewed hope and enthusiasm after the dark years of the war. In the months following, Australian servicemen and women returned to Australian shores. More than seventy people from the Lake Grace district served in the war and the town held a two day celebration marking the end of hostilities.

On August 15, a national public event will thank Australia's World War II veterans for their contribution, achievement and sacrifice on the 60th anniversary of Victory in the Pacific.


Lake Grace Lions Club, with other local organizations, is planning a commemorative event to acknowledge Australia's World War II veterans, and to say thank you to our local service personnel.

LAST CALL: Is your incorporated club or association still active?

The Department of Consumer and Employment Protection (DOCEP) is responsible for administering the Associations Incorporation Act that allows not for profit organisations, like sporting clubs, churches, art groups and community associations, to become incorporated. DOCEP is required to maintain a register of all clubs and associations that are incorporated.

A number of registered clubs and associations have not made contact with DOCEP for many years. Over the last 2 years DOCEP has identified contact information for approximately 11,000 of the 19,000 associations on the register.

Indications are that as many as 8,000 registered associations may be inactive and DOCEP is seeking to cancel the incorporation of those that are no longer operating.

A list of the incorporated associations for which DOCEP has no contact details and which may be subject to cancellation is available for viewing at www.docep.wa.gov.au/associations/cleanup.

 **If your association is on this list and is still active please contact us NOW!**

IMPORTANT: If DOCEP has no confirmation of the active status of your association by the end of July 2005, a cancellation notice will be sent to the last known address. If no response is received, action will be taken to cancel the association's incorporation.

DOCEP is also calling upon all active incorporated associations to confirm a current postal address to which notices and information can be forwarded.

PLEASE contact DOCEP if you wish to confirm your association's active status; or you wish to register or update a contact address, or you know of any incorporated clubs or associations that are inactive. You may do this by using any of the following-

OR Call: 1300 79 04 50 (during office hours 8.30am – 5.00pm weekdays).

Please note: If an association's incorporation is cancelled and it is later shown to be active, the Commissioner for Fair Trading can reinstate the incorporation without legal consequence for the association.

Smarter Than Smoking Regional Art Scholarship Program

Healthway is offering young WA artists who live outside the Perth metropolitan area an opportunity to obtain financial assistance to help further their interests and develop their artistic skills.

For the first time, scholarships of up to \$3000 each are being offered to young regional artists under a new Healthway program.

The Smarter than Smoking Regional Arts Scholarship Program aims to assist young artists to advance their artistic careers in whatever their chosen art form, including visual, performing and youth-hybrid arts, by studying, practising or by gaining more public exposure for their activities. In particular, the scholarships are designed to support skills development activities directly associated with the performance or execution of their discipline, beyond what is available locally. For example, additional tuition sessions, workshops, master classes and auditions and for involvement in approved state, arts and cultural activities.

Applicants must apply through an incorporated organisation such as a local government, community, regional or state arts organisation, which has agreed to submit an application to Healthway, under its own name, allowing its incorporated status to be used on behalf of the applicant.

The program is targeted at young artists who live outside the metropolitan area and who:

- are aged 12 to 25 years;
- have shown potential for significant achievement in their chosen art form;
- are disadvantaged in this endeavour by their regional location; and
- have some restrictions in terms of ability to achieve their full potential due to decreased access to facilities, travel, programs and expertise.

In return for the scholarship, young artists must

help to promote Smarter than Smoking, Healthway's non-smoking message for young people.

Healthway's Arts Program Manager, Lindsay Lovering, said: 'Smarter than Smoking Regional Arts Scholarships will help to develop young artist's careers and are also expected to have a flow on effect to develop the arts and culture in the home communities of the scholarship winners. Art activities include rap dancing or any mix of visual and performing arts enhanced by computer technology.'

SCIENCE AND STORIES

SHINGLES VACCINE:

People given an experimental vaccine against shingles had 51 per cent fewer outbreaks and the episodes were less painful. The drug company Merck has applied to market the vaccine in the US.

TEETH BACTERIA:

Brushing your teeth does more than clean them, it also wreaks havoc on the social lives of the bacteria that are left-and this familial disruption probably makes them less able to rot your teeth. Oral bacteria, like many other microbes, live in a protective chemical matrix called a biofilm. The biofilm restricts their movement, so bacteria tend to grow in family groups. This allows them to thrive by evolving cooperative relationships with neighbouring kin. Brushing disrupts these cosy relationships, leaving the bacteria surrounded by strangers and leaving them with less cooperative bacteria neighbours.

This evolutionary perspective may also suggest new ways to deal with other problem biofilms, such as those that can clog up catheters, contact lenses and the hulls of ships and submarines. (Science, DOI:10.1126/science.1108158). That's good news for your teeth.




EL NINO HELPED BEETLES BEAT INVADER:

One of biocontrol's celebrated successes may need to share the glory. In the late 1990s, beetles imported to Lake Victoria, which borders Kenya, Tanzania and Uganda, were credited with clearing water hyacinth, an introduced plant that was choking both the lake and the economies of surrounding countries. But now it seems the beetle might have had some help. The collapse of the hyacinth population coincided with an unusual EL Nino event in 1997 that meant more rain and less light reached Lake Victoria. Water hyacinth grown under comparable low light levels in a lab found the plants grew poorly and in a taller form that required more energy to maintain. This makes them more susceptible to the beetle's depredations. Also the hyacinth is spreading again and scientists say that countries should focus on better land-practices to keep nutrient-laden run-off from boosting the hyacinth's growth. (Aquatic Botany, DOI:10.1016/j.aquabot.2005.01.003).

ANCIENT DNA BARES ALL:

Two cave bears that died in Austria more than 40,000 years ago have had their nuclear DNA sequenced. The technique used to recover sequences from a tooth and a bone has more than doubled the age at which this kind of DNA can be recovered-and could mean Neanderthals are next.



BELLAMY BOWS OUT:

A retraction of controversial claims about climate change does not appear to have saved leading British conservationist, David Bellamy, from the imminent loss of two prestigious posts. Bellamy claimed man-made climate change was "poppycock", and in a letter to New Scientist Magazine claimed that most glaciers are advancing and not retreating, but has since admitted his figures were wrong. Two leading conservation organisations have confirmed that they intend to go ahead with plans to replace him later this year.

CREATIONISM GAFFE:

There is egg on the faces of the management of the Smithsonian, in Washington DC, over the screening of a creationist film in one of its museums. The Smithsonian is the largest museum complex in the world and describes itself as "America's museum". It rents out the 565-seat Baird Auditorium at its National Museum of Natural History for events ranging from scientific conferences to concerts. But "events of a religious or partisan political nature" are banned. Nothing amiss was spotted when a public-relations firm booked the room for 23 June for the Discovery institute, a pro-creationist think tank in Seattle. The event was an invitation-only showing of The Privileged Planet, described as a "scientific documentary" that ponders "purpose within cosmic evolution". Scientists say that it advocates creationism. They have now withdrawn their sponsorship.

SEEDS IN SPACE:

China is launching a satellite carrying plant seeds into space and bringing them back to Earth for planting. NASA has already tried this with soybean plants but, when grown, it was found that they had slightly more carbohydrate and a little less oil. The figures were within normal range and are now being tested for any genetic changes. The Chinese say they have already done space-based experiments, including trees that are more resistant to disease or vegetables that taste better.



SUPERCOMPUTER TO COPY HUMAN BRAINS:

The first attempt to build a complete simulation of the human brain has begun. The Blue Brain Project is an attempt to model the entire electrical circuitry of the brain from more than 10 years of study of how the brains 10 billion neurons behave individually and how they are wired together. The simulation will give scientists an opportunity to study how parts of the brain respond to different stimuli. The hope is that the virtual brain will help our understanding of aspects of human cognition, such as perception and memory. Also how malfunctioning neurons can cause psychiatric disorders such as autism and schizophrenia.

NIGHT WATCH



Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 1st July to midnight Friday 15th July. Remember Astronomy is looking up and never look directly at the Sun without proper equipment.

Highlights of the fortnight are on Monday 4th at 2pm, Comet 9p/Tempel 1 will be hit by a 372 kilogram "impactor", striking the 14-kilometre-long potato-shaped nucleus at 37,000 kilometres per hour. The kinetic energy will be about the equivalent of five tonnes of TNT and will produce a crater of about 200 metres wide and 50 metres deep. Photo's will be sent back to Earth.

On Tuesday 5th at 1pm, Earth will be at Aphelion (furthest), at 152,104,000 kilometres from the Sun.

On the 7th and 8th, Mercury and Venus are close together and on the 9th the Moon joins in within 5° of each other in the west north west low down. (5° is two thumbs at arms length).

The Sun resides in the Constellation of Gemini all this fortnight at magnitude -26.72.

The new Moon is on Wednesday 6th at 7:52pm. At 2am on Saturday 9th the Moon will be at apogee (furthest), at 406,363 kms. The 1st quarter Moon is at 11:10pm on Thursday 14th at magnitude -6.0.

On Saturday the moon is in Aries, on 3rd, 4th and 5th in Taurus, 6th, 7th and 8th in Gemini, Saturday 9th in Cancer, Leo on 10th, 11th and 12th, Virgo on 13th, 14th and 15th.

Mercury, in Cancer, sets on Saturday at 7:09pm at magnitude +0.1 and is moving towards the open star cluster M44 (the beehive). On Friday 15th, Mercury sets at 7:21pm at magnitude +0.8, and is close to Venus this fortnight as they pass each other during the fortnight.

Venus, also in Cancer, sets on Saturday at 7:05pm at magnitude -4.0. On Saturday 9th, Venus will be 3° south of the Moon with Mercury. On Thursday 14th Venus will have moved into Leo, and on Friday sets at 7:30pm at magnitude -4.0.

In Cetus, Mars rises at 12:25am at magnitude -0.2 on Saturday morning. On Sunday Mars rises in Pisces.

Mars rises on Friday 15th at 12:13am and shines at -0.4 magnitude.

Jupiter, in the evening sky at a bright -2.6 magnitude in Virgo, sets on Sunday morning at 12:12am. On Thursday 14th, Jupiter will be 0.8° north of the Moon setting at 11:26pm on Friday 15th.

The ringed planet, Saturn, in Cancer, sets on Saturday at 6:34pm at +0.2 magnitude, and at 5:51pm on Saturday 15th as it slowly moves out of view before rising in the morning twilight.

Uranus, in Aquarius at +5.7 magnitude, rises at 9:50pm on Saturday and 8:58pm on Friday 15th.

In Capricornus, Neptune rises at 7:59pm on Saturday at +7.8 magnitude, and at 7:06pm on Friday 15th.

Pluto, in Serpens Caput, at +13.8 magnitude, resides in the sky all night.

Some meteors can be seen in the northern sky on the morning of Saturday 9th in Pegasus at 70 kms per hour and in the southern sky on the morning of Wednesday 13th in Phoenix at 47 kms per hour.

Comet 9p/Tempel at magnitude +10.0 is just east of the bright blue star Spica in Virgo.

The great red spot (storm) on Jupiter can be seen at 10:13pm on 3rd. 6:04pm on 4th. 7:43pm on 6th. 9:22pm on 8th. Jupiter's moons, Ganymede and Europa reappear from behind the planet at 6pm and 6:12pm on Sunday 3rd. On Monday 4th all moons are east of Jupiter. On Tuesday 5th, Io and Ganymede are close together in the west with Europa and Callisto in the east as seen through a telescope. On Friday 8th Io transits across the planet from 5:52pm and the shadow follows at 7:57pm. and finish at 9:54pm and 11:18pm. After that the moonlight floods the night sky.



Breast Cancer Foundation of WA Inc

As you may have already read in the Lakes Link News, a few local citizens have formed a group to raise money to support breast cancer awareness, following an Australia-wide campaign. These campaigns have been successfully embraced by high profile bodies including, recently, the AFL.

We would like to point out a few frightening statistics on this deadly disease, (from the most recent survey done in 2001).

1. **A staggering 1 in 11 women will be diagnosed with breast cancer before the age of 75!**
2. **Breast cancer is the most common cancer-related of death in women!**
3. **In 2001, 2594 women died from breast cancer!**
4. **In 2001, 11,791 women were diagnosed with breast cancer!**
5. **Whilst the incidence of breast cancer does increase with age, there are still about 700 women under the age of 40 diagnosed every year!**
6. **Another scary fact: Of those younger women diagnosed, tumours are generally larger and more aggressive, with a smaller rate of survival of the patient! (Is this due to the lack of awareness and regular surveillance, leading to early detection)? Sadly, the incidents to drive the message of awareness to us all have been when famous people we all know of have been diagnosed (eg. Olivia Newton-Jon, and more recently, Kylie Minogue.)**

There will not be one of us who will not be affected in some way by breast cancer, whether it be ourselves, a friend, sister, wife, girlfriend, mother or relative. Some **people we know** will suffer from this disease during our lives!

It doesn't end there. Breast cancer is also detected in about 100 males every year in Australia! As with younger women, males are usually detected later, with larger tumours! Sound familiar? Is it again lack of surveillance and awareness?

Early detection?

Suddenly it could also be your husband, son, boyfriend, mate or father!

At this moment, there is **no known method of preventing** breast cancer. However, with campaigns for national awareness, the chances of survival are increasing by around 2.2% per annum; by far the best chances of survival are from EARLY DETECTION.


