Changes for Waste Management in the Wind

A councillor's job is varied and challenging. Early this month, Councillors Darcy Roberts and Andrew Walker, with Shire of Lake Grace CEO, Neville Hale and Manager of Works, Ian Bartlett, took off on a tour of the region's waste management sites. The team viewed sites at Dandaragan, York, Cervantes, Cunderdin and Wickpin that ranged from controlled access managed tips to uncontrolled transfer stations.

Over the next twelve months, council will review its existing waste management practices to meet new Environmental Protection Authority standards. Western Australia's key environmental regulatory body has released key reviews into licensing, enforcement and management structures and local governments State-wide are now implementing those changes.

"Consequently," said Mr Hale, "Council will investigate alternative waste management systems and seek community input. Regrettably

there will be increased costs but Council will endeavour to limit these."

The Shire of Lake Grace is responsible for waste management sites at Lake Grace, Newdegate, Varley and Lake King, and is working to control windblown waste, burning and seepage at these tips. This could mean controlled access at staffed sites, with the most appropriate opening hours determined by a community survey.

Council is also considering extending the existing recyclables collection station at Lake Grace and setting up stations at Newdegate, Varley and Lake King, targeting bulk waste – glass, cardboard, newspaper and plastics. The aim is to reduce landfill and the potential for contamination to sites. The current Newdegate tip is located close to a lake and so Council is looking at alternative sites and/or a transfer station for that area. The Shire will continue to make bi-annual kerbside collections of bulky materials.

Grower Inquiries Regarding Iraq Wheat Debt

Growers can contact the Customer Call Centre – 1800 054433

- **Provide Trading Name** (used at the time of delivery for years 1987/8, 1988/9, 1990/1)
- **State Gross Tonnage delivered for those years.**
- **State Grower Numbers** (used at the time of delivery for those years)
- **Request value of gross dollars owing**
- **Request dollars per tonne at the time of delivery for those years.**
- **Advise the Customer Call centre** that you are making an enquiry regarding the tonnage you delivered into the pools at the time of delivery for those years.

The expected advice should take two to three working days to extract the information from the old main frame. The call centre will then either fax or e-mail the required information to the Grower.

The Prime Minister has written to all growers. It would be to your advantage to write back stating your issues and concerns with reference to the Iraq Wheat debt.

ATO information

Prepare your tax return electronically and lodge online

Last year over 800,000 people lodged their personal tax online using the Tax Office's free e-tax facility. That means one-third of all self-prepared tax returns are lodged online with e-tax.

e-tax will help you prepare your tax return and baby bonus claim easily, quickly and securely by asking you questions that are then used to complete and lodge your tax return.

e-tax can estimate your tax refund or tax debt, and help with items such as capital gains or losses. It also gives you access to Tax Office publications, rulings, help screens and examples.

e-tax 2004 will be available for use by vision-impaired people. All you need is access to a personal computer and the internet.



e-tax has four steps ...

1. Go to the Tax Office web site www.ato.gov.au and download e-tax.
2. Save the e-tax software to your computer.
3. Complete your tax return by following the step-by-step prompts.
4. Then the tax return is complete, verify your identity using your Tax File Number and your notice of assessment; then lodge.

You don't need to send your payment summary or any other documentation to the Tax Office – but you should keep your tax records for at least five years unless the Tax Office advises on the notice of assessment that you only need to keep your records for two years.

Most refunds are received within 14 days.

EULOGY – EILEEN JEAN TRAVES

30th October 1909 - 25th June 2004

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you for being here today.

I am just going to skim over the 94 years and 8 months of my mother's life.

My Mother, Eileen Jean, was born on 30th October 1909 at her parents home in East Perth. She was the first child and only daughter of Godfrey and Jeannie Rattigan. They later had three sons.

When Eileen was quite young her parents moved to Kalgoorlie where they lived in Dugan Street. Two of her brothers were born there. Her memories of Kalgoorlie were starting school, searching for gold in the street after rain and playing among the open mine shafts without disaster.

They returned to Perth where her youngest brother was born in 1917. Over the next couple of years they lived in Port Augusta and Adelaide and while over there visited my Grandfather's family in Melbourne. Her most vivid memory of Melbourne was that they didn't have electricity in their houses whereas Perth did.

They returned to Perth while my mother was still in Primary School. Being a serious and academic child she was able to get an entrance into Modern School which was 'the' school of the era. She excelled at her studies as well as playing tennis, women's cricket, swimming and dancing. At the age of twelve she waltzed on the stage of the Perth Town Hall.

After Modern School, Eileen went to the University of WA to study science. As the university wasn't completed when she started, some of her lectures were in a building in Irwin Street Perth. She left the University with a science degree and went into teaching.

She taught in a few schools around the metropolitan area before being posted to Meckering. The next year she was sent to the 89 gate school which was a one teacher school on the Rabbit Proof fence road. While there she met my father and they were married in February 1937.

My father started working for the railway in the mid-forties and that's how we came to move to Lake Grace in May 1951.

Mum joined various organizations including CWA, Hospital Auxiliary and usually took on the treasurers' job. She also worked at a number of jobs - Clarke's Electrical Shop, the baker's shop, the Post Office and as a relief teacher - not all at the same time.

When the Shire opened the Caravan Park my parents were offered the job of live in caretakers, which they did until they retired up to Wattle Drive. My father died in February 1986.

Mum always said she was very happy in Wattle Drive. She had some good friends there. My Mother always did the crossword in the West Australian every morning, and there were some very competitive scrabble games with friends.

When the bowling club opened both my parents played. Mum really loved her bowls. To the consternation of the other ladies she was quite convinced she could still play pennants at the age of ninety even though she was frail and shaky.

My mother had the ability to make the best of most situations and maybe she was the original Pollyanna. However in her final illness she was unable to do that and made things more difficult for herself and those near her.

She was proud of her grandchildren and great-grandchildren and never passed up an opportunity to brag about them. She is still with us in some of the characteristics that are showing up in some of her great-grandchildren.

My father had a very good singing voice and when I was a child was often asked to sing at parties. When an elderly lady was the birthday girl he usually sang this one song (Mother Machree) which I think is fitting for us to listen to today.

Hopetoun Kitchen 1949

The Hopetoun story is one of a brave little band setting out to meet a community need. Hopetoun, which started as a mining port, suffered eclipse when the mines closed, yet the farming community valued the coast for camping and fishing. No permanent shelter was available.

Members of Lake King Branch, 90 miles away, with Mrs D. McLean, President, Mrs Poulson, Secretary and Mrs Warneford, Treasurer, worked for three years, catering for sales, Farmers Union meetings and serving refreshments to Gov. buses that plied between Perth and Ravensthorpe.

It was a team effort, as then the husbands took over!

In 1949 they dismantled a lean-to building bought in Ravensthorpe for 25 pound, carted it over 30 miles on very rough roads and re-erected it as a community kitchen on a block in Hopetoun.

Equipped with cooking and laundry facilities, tables and stools, many campers had reason to bless the kitchen as they yarned over a hot drink while their clothes dried.

Winter storms damaged the building and over the years considerable repairs and improvements were made chiefly due to the efforts of the Poulsens. Later Mr and Mrs McCulloch looked after the building.

When Lake King branch disbanded in 1958, Ravensthorpe branch agreed to take over the supervision. Sad commentary on human nature, a collection box left in the building yielded little and was often raided.

In 1966 the Kitchen was designated a Rest Room and is still in use today.

WHAT CAN FARMERS LEGALLY BURY ON THEIR FARMS?

New regulations have recently come into force to assist the Department of Environment in preventing long-term damage to the environment. These new regulations will have an impact on the farmer.



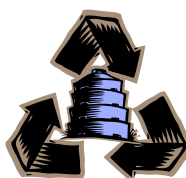
So what can you now bury on your land?

Mr Ken Raine, from the Pollution Control branch of the Department of Environment, has advised that most wastes generated on farm could be buried on site. The new Unauthorised Discharges Regulations were not intended to capture farmers but could be applied, as can the New Contaminated Sites Regulations.

Farmers would have to be careful how they disposed of materials such as pesticide wastes, spray tank washout water and pesticide containers. If levels of certain substances are found to be higher than background levels the farm could potentially be listed as a contaminated site. If material is found to be moving off site the farmer could be charged under the Environmental Protection Act 1986 as a polluter.



Mr Raine also stated that farmers could not accept material from another site, as this would make them an unlicensed (illegal) landfill site and that material pumped out of septic tanks cannot be spread onto paddocks as has occurred in the past. This is covered by the Health Act 1911. Such material can only be discharged at an approved sanitary facility.

An Introduction to the Western Australian Demand Aggregation Broker

The Western Australian Broadband Demand Aggregation Broker is an initiative jointly funded by the WA Government and the Commonwealth with the aim of raising community awareness and to drive the demand and supply for broadband across WA.

Jamie Robertson has been appointed to the position. In addition to Jamie Robertson, three additional Brokers will be appointed with Commonwealth funding to service the Goldfields Esperance region, the South West and Peel regions.

The Demand Aggregation Broker Program is a two-year initiative from the Commonwealth's National Broadband Strategy and builds upon the State Government's Telecommunications Needs Assessment, completed in 2003. This study showed that 46 per cent of businesses and 37 per cent of households with the Internet were dissatisfied with their Internet speed.

The WA Broadband Demand Aggregation Broker will focus on regional areas where affordable broadband is currently unavailable. The Broker's primary role will be to meet with business and

community representatives in the target regions, raise awareness of the benefits that broadband offers, and coordinate and package community demand for broadband.

Information provided to the Broker that is identified as confidential will remain confidential. The Broker is also required to be technology and carrier / internet service provider neutral – advising communities of the benefits of broadband, not a particular method of receiving the service.

Once the Broker has packaged and distributed a particular community's demand, carriers and internet service providers will be invited to review the information in light of their business plan and available subsidies such as the Commonwealth's Higher Bandwidth Incentive Scheme (HiBIS).

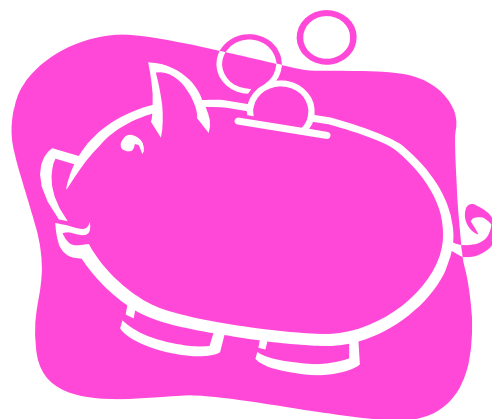

SCIENCE AND STUFF



How Do You Trap An Atom? Make it look at itself in a mirror. That's the odd conclusion from physicists who used an atom's mirror image to freeze it in place. But the result is not just a curiosity - the mechanism gives physicists perhaps their best means yet of controlling the motion of trapped atoms. Physicists have been using light to hold atoms in place since the 1970's. For instance, so called optical tweezers work by using lasers to create an interference pattern of light and dark fringes. Atoms can be trapped in the 'wells' of low energy much like eggs in the hollows of an egg carton. Trapped atoms are used in atomic clocks and could be essential for building quantum computers. Now physicists have shown how an atom can be trapped within its own interference pattern. First they illuminate a single barium atom with a laser, causing the atom to fluoresce. They place the fluorescing atom about 25cm in front of the mirror and then align it so that we no longer see its reflection. When the atom is accurately positioned, its emitted and reflected light create an interference pattern that holds the atom in place.

Mars Marbles Found On Earth:

Odd looking spheres similar to those found on Mars by NASA's opportunity rover - probably formed by water soaking through the rock - have been discovered in the deserts of Southern Utah. The Martian marbles, about 0.5cm in diameter, are made of an iron-rich mineral called haematite. It has been confirmed by testing that the spheres in Utah formed when iron rich water seeped through sandstone. The process is known to occur only in rock that does not have joints, fractures or faults. The pH and chemical composition of the water determine the size and spacing of the terrestrial spheres.

Paint On A Hot Tin Roof: Painting roofs white is a simple way to cut the massive amount of energy used to run air conditioning units in hot weather. But for some reason people just don't like white roofs. A

paint has been developed that will increase the reflectance of a house roof without painting it white. White roofs usually remain close to the air temperature, whereas dark roofs can be as much as 40°C hotter on a sunny day, raising the temperature inside. To get around people's aesthetic objections,

paint was developed with pigments made from a mixture of iron and chrome oxides. These absorb visible light and so look dark, but reflect infra-red radiation so stay much cooler. Lower air-conditioning bills could pay for the cost of applying the paint in just three years.

Super-bug Threat: Several strains of the MRSA super-bug are becoming resistant to the last-resort antibiotic, vancomycin, and the problem is much more serious than was previously thought. Until now the resistance to vancomycin was thought to be

emerging in only one type of the MRSA bacterium. But when studied 101 samples of MRSA known to be at least partly resistant to vancomycin, from eight countries, they found that vancomycin resistance is evolving in all five major types of MRSA. If vancomycin fails, the number of deaths from MRSA will rise yet higher. Doctors can still try various combinations of antibiotics, and there are some new antibiotics, but their effectiveness against MRSA is not yet clear.

Seed Cuisine Shows Up In Prehistoric Leftovers:

Stone age foragers gathered small grass seeds before they began cultivating larger cereal grains, an excavation of an Israeli site shows. The discovery fills in a crucial gap in the development of agriculture. Bones preserved at ancient campsites allow archaeologists to trace changes in the meat composition of stone age diets. Excavations of 50,000 year old sites indicate that people initially ate small to medium hoofed mammals, like goats or sheep, then turned to other small mammals, birds and fish as food resources grew short. But plants preserve less, making it difficult to document their use before about 12,000 years ago. Now nearly 19,000 well preserved grass seeds have been found at the Ohalo 11 site on the sea of Galilee dating back 23,000 years. Over 16,000 seeds came from small grained grasses such as brome, and only 2,600 from wild cereals. That means diets based on a broad range of grains evolved some 10,000 years earlier than had been recognised. The small grained grass seeds faded from the diet between 12,000 and 8,000 years ago as people turned to cultivating larger cereal grains that yielded more food value for less effort.

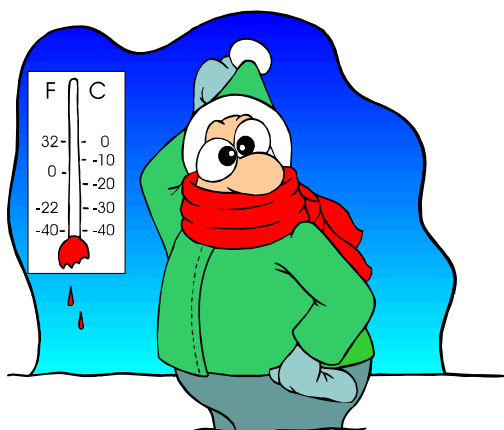

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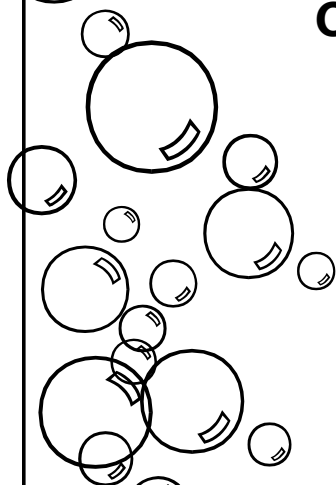
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BAKING WITH PAMELA

It has become a tradition in our family (on both sides) that the male of the household cooks breakfast on the weekend. I am happy to see that my son-in-laws have continued this custom into the third generation.

Like all families our girls have developed a special favourite - their's is Pancakes. The request for pancakes has continued over the years, and Kim has become known by many young people for his yummy Pancakes. It is a delight to us to have young (and not so young) come and stay and request our family specialty for breakfast.

We especially love it when we hear a knock on the door early in the morning, to find a couple of young teenagers who have ridden their bikes out to the farm for a visit. I am sure they plan their visit to coincide with breakfast in the hope they'll be treated to "Kim's Specialty". It never fails, as Kim always cooks for them. We really look forward to these spontaneous visits.

Pancakes

1 cup plain flour 1 egg
pinch salt 1 ¼ cups milk

- Sift flour and salt, make a well in the centre.
- Drop egg into the well, and using a wooden spoon stir lightly, adding half the milk gradually.
- Beat for a minute or two making sure the mixture is smooth.

- Cover and allow to stand before cooking (can even be made the night before).
- Heat a little butter in a small pan – pour off excess.
- Pour in enough batter to thinly cover the bottom of the pan.
- Cook till set, gently shake the pan and loosen edges with a knife.
- Drain on kitchen paper.
- Serve piping hot with lemon and sugar or maple syrup.

Another custom we had in our home was to have a, "Mother and Daughter," time away just before the girls went to make their own mark on the world.

Rebecca and I went out to breakfast before we headed home after our special time together in Esperance. We both enjoyed "Ricotta Hotcakes with Caramelised Banana," so much, that on our return to the farm I spent many days experimenting until I was sure I'd perfected the recipe.

Kim has now become an expert at including these in his breakfast menu. Not only is it now a request when the family come home but is also a popular choice among our Bed and Breakfast guests.

Ricotta Hotcakes

250g ricotta 1 teaspoon baking powder
2 eggs 2 tablespoons sugar
¼-½ cup milk 1 ½ cups SR flour
1 teaspoon salt ½ cup natural yoghurt
¼ cup oil

- Sift together flour, salt and baking powder.
- Beat ricotta and eggs together until well mixed.
- Add milk, yoghurt, oil and sugar.
- Add flour mixture and stir in well until combined.
- Heat a little butter in a pan, pour off excess.
- Pour in the mixture to make 12cm rounds.
- Cook until slightly bubbly on top, flip over and cook until light brown.
- Serve piping hot with Banana Butter or Caramelised Banana.

Banana Butter

100g butter
1 medium banana (cut into small pieces)
juice 1/2 lemon 2 tblspn icing sugar
Whip butter until creamy, add banana, icing sugar and lemon juice. Mix well.

Caramelised Banana

3 bananas ¾ cup cream OR evaporated milk
1 tspn butter 3 tblspn brown sugar

- Heat butter in a frypan.
- Peel and split bananas lengthways, add to pan.
- Immediately sprinkle the sugar over the top.
- Turn bananas as they brown, only takes about 10 seconds.
- Add cream or milk.
- To serve, place a banana piece and a spoonful of sauce between two hotcakes.

Think you're right to drive?

Think again.

Drink driving contributes to one in every four fatal crashes. Most people do not drink and drive on a regular basis, however, 2001 research shows that around 27% of WA drivers lapse occasionally and drive home after drinking.

(NFO Donovan Research 2001).

Community education campaigns over the past five years have contributed to an increased awareness about the trauma associated with drink driving, with an emphasis placed on the negative and often tragic consequences. More recent campaigns have focused on factors deterring drink driving, specifically, the likelihood of encountering a random breath test (RBT).

The July to August 2004 phase of the 2003/04 community education campaign about drink driving needs to build on the positive performance delivered by the first phase of the campaign to achieve changes in attitudes and behaviour.

Overall Goal of the Drink Driving Campaign

The overall goal of the campaign is to contribute to the reduction of drink driving in Western Australia.

Aim of 2003/04 Drink Driving Campaign

Consistent with the overall campaign goal to educate the community about the risks of drink driving, the second phase of the Road Safety Council's Drink Driving campaign aims to:

- Increase awareness and perception of the increased risk of having a serious crash, which may result in harm to others, if you drink and drive (with particular reference to rural areas);
- Emphasize the moral unacceptability of drink driving;
- Emphasise the social norm of not drinking and driving; and
- Enhance and maintain the deterrent effect of drink driving enforcement.

Primary Target Audience

The primary target audience will be 17 to 39 year old male drivers in metropolitan and regional Western Australia.

Drink Driving Facts

- Alcohol affects decision making, reaction times, speed and distance judgements, concentration and perception, balance (eg especially when riding a motorcycle) and alertness, and can give a false sense of confidence, which may increase risk-taking behaviours.
- Alcohol is a major contributor to road crashes in WA. In WA in 2001, 26% of all fatal crashes involved a driver or rider with a BAC of or over the legal limit of 0.05g/100ml.
- In WA in 2002/2003, 14,325 drivers were charged for drink driving. Previous research has shown of these, approximately 60% are under 30 years of age.
- Intoxicated drivers involved in fatal crashes are three times more likely to have been speeding than sober drivers.
- In an ongoing survey of community road safety attitudes, 10% of young (17-39) male drivers said they believed that even if they always kept their BAC under .05 while driving they would be unlikely to reduce their chances of having an accident. In the same survey, 20% considered it was 'morally acceptable' to drive when their BAC was between .05 and .08. Approximately 55% of the same group considered drink driving 'completely or largely unacceptable among their circle of friends' and 12% were categorized as high frequency/high amount drink drivers.
- The initial introduction of RBT in Western Australia is reported to have had an immediate impact on road crashes, decreasing the number of fatal crashes by approximately 25%.





Night watch



Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday, 30th July. Remember Astronomy is looking up.

The Sun this fortnight starts off in Gemini and then is in Cancer from Tuesday 20th and is at magnitude -26.7.

The New Moon is, on Saturday 17th at 7.14pm in Cancer. The first quarter Moon is, on Sunday 25th July at 11.27am, in Libra at magnitude -6.0. On Friday 30th, the Moon is at perigee (closest), at 360,324kms in Sagittarius at 2pm.

Mercury, low down in the evening sky, sets around 7.20pm in Leo, and sets around 7.37pm on the 30th. On Monday 19th mercury will be 5° south of the moon. Mercury, on Monday 25th, will be 1.5° south of the bright star, Regulas, and just ahead of Jupiter. On Tuesday 27th, Mercury will be at its greatest elongation east at 27°.

Venus, in the morning sky in Taurus, at a very bright -4.5 magnitude, rises around 4.05am and rises 1 minute earlier each morning.

Mars, the red planet, sets around 6.50pm in Cancer, and is 4° south of the Moon on Monday 19th. Mars moves into Leo on Tuesday 22nd.

The giant gas planet, Jupiter, in Leo at -1.8 magnitude, sets around 9.20pm and will be 3° south of the Moon on Wednesday 21st.

Saturn, the ringed planet, is now in the morning twilight in Gemini.

The blue/green planet, Uranus, at 5.7 magnitude rises

around 8.30pm in Aquarius and rises 4 minutes earlier each night.

The grey/green planet, Neptune, at magnitude 7.8, rises around 6.50pm in Capricornus, rising 4 minutes earlier each night. Binoculars are needed.

Pluto, at 13.8 magnitude is in the sky all night and a large telescope is needed to see this small, distant planet in Serpens Caput (the tail). Meteors can be seen in Pisces Australis (the second fish), on 27th and in Aquarius on 28th at 20 per hour, and also Capricornus on 29th.

Comet Linear (2003 k4) at magnitude 6.6 in Bootes (the herdsman). The bright orange star in the northern sky is Arcturus and is the main star in Bootes, and the comet is about 3° north east of it. Binoculars are needed as it is just out of naked eye range.

The Moon this fortnight is in Cancer on 17th and 18th, Leo on 19th, 20th and 21st, Virgo on 22nd, 23rd and 24th, Libra on 25th and 26th, Scorpius on 27th, Ophiuchus on 28th and Sagittarius on 29th and 30th.

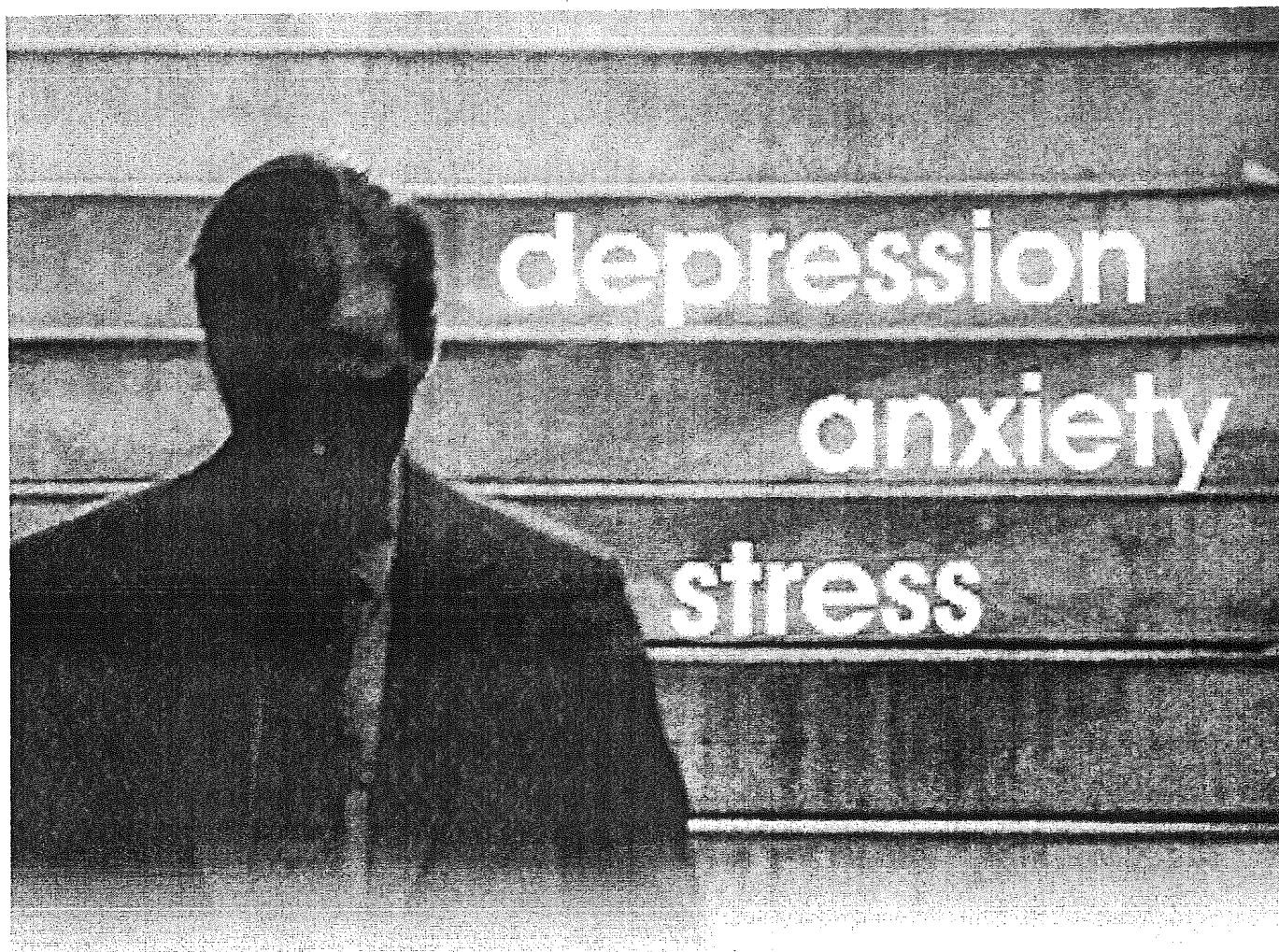

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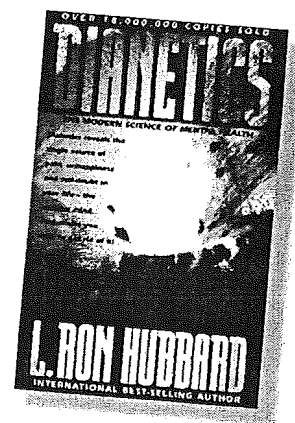
