Getting In a Knot at the CRC

What do you call a room full of crocheters? It's a knot. And some were getting in a knot trying to work out where to put their hook and how to hang on to the wool as they took part in the Lake Grace CRC's crochet workshop last Friday.

Believed to have originated in Europe, crochet first appeared in the early 19th century. While seemingly more complicated than knitting, crochet has the advantage of having only one stitch open at a time, therefore avoiding the agony of discovering a dropped stitch 5 rows back.

With the craft having become quite trendy in recent years, crocheters no longer have the fear of being pushed into the dorky corner and can now freely flaunt their affection for the artistry involved. Materials used can range from 12 ply wools through to the finest of cottons used in filet crochet.

The lure of crocheting a beanie brought forward a dozen people interested in learning crochet technique, however like everything you must learn to crawl before you walk. Therefore the first lesson centred around four of the most used stitches; chain, slip stitch, double crochet and treble, that form the base of many projects. Where crochet was once centred on doilies, blankets and baby clothes; creative minds have brought forward many new ideas and it's these new ideas that have brought a resurgence in interest in the craft.

Having said that, the Lake Grace knot of crocheters will be arriving at the CRC every Friday to practise

Managing Your Ferals

With our native fauna under continuous threat from feral predators the Natural Resource Management's 'Fighting Back Against Wheatbelt Ferals' was an ideal opportunity for landowners and community members to share pest management successes (and failures) with other farmers.

Held on Wednesday 17th June the workshop not only covered vertebrate pest management but also weeds in bushland and 1080 accreditation. Feral control isn't just about protecting livestock; it plays a vital role in improving bushland and ensuring that the Wheatbelt's unique native plants and animals are there for future generations to enjoy.

Project Delivery Officer, Jacquie Lucas discussed current control methods which include toxins, trapping, shooting, habitat modification, revegetation with poison bush, aversion, exclusion fencing and bio control. Feral cats are thriving in the Wheatbelt

bushland and are notoriously difficult to trap and bait. It is hoped that the new sausage baits that are currently being trialled will help in the fight.

Cage trapping has the advantage of giving non-target captures a second chance however success does take some practise. Jacquie did say it was advantageous to have the wire base covered with soil, making it more

natural on the feet of the target and that it was important to use bait that the target really wouldn't be able to ignore. Traps are available from the Lake Grace Shire and can also be accessed through NRM grant programmes.

Landholders asked to help control wild dogs.



CBH Group Supports AED Installation in Lake Grace

For every minute a person waits for defibrillation, the chance of survival decreases by 10%.

You may have noticed a new Automated External Defibrillator (AED) *(pictured right and below)* located at the Lake Grace Plaza IGA. Generously funded by CBH's Harvest Mass Management Scheme (HMMS) it is one of two to be installed in Lake Grace. The other will be installed at the Roadhouse during July.

The CBH Group donated \$153,000 to charity through the (HMMS) for the 2014-15 season.

The HMMS was developed by the CBH Group in conjunction with Main Roads Western Australia and allows trucks that are loaded above their legal tolerance limits the option to forfeit the overloaded tonnes. Forfeited grain is then sold and the proceeds donated to charities working in regional WA.

CBH Group Chairman Wally Newman said, "This year nine organisations were selected because of their work helping rural communities and families. The money is





distributed based on recommendations from CBH employees. The charities were chosen because they support the grain growing regions of WA."

This year the HMMS will support Ronald McDonald House, St John Ambulance, Wheatbelt Men's Health, Australian Men's Shed Association, SolarisCare, Princess Margaret Hospital Foundation Charity, Camp Kulin, Red Cross and Youth Focus.

Through the donation to St John Ambulance, with the proviso being that the money was spent in grain growing areas, there were six AED's purchased to be installed in the communities of Lake Grace, Beacon, Dumbleyung, Dowerin, Tambellup and Perenjori.

The Plaza was selected as it is a high traffic area and open for trading 6 ½ days per week. The AED is in a visible location just inside the main entrance near the fruit and vege section. Training is not required to use the machine as it will instruct you as you go and will not work if the patient doesn't need defibrillation.

RAC Western Australia is not just about insurance, finance and roadside assistance; it is also an advocate for WA motorists, representing them on such issues as road and vehicle safety, fuel pricing, road funding, transport planning, energy and the environment. RAC's vision is that by 2020 they want Western Australians to rate them as their most valued organisation.

As a part of its community commitment RAC have a comprehensive sponsorship and community grants programme. It was through RAC's community sponsorships programme that Lake Grace's Roadwise group were able to receive a grant of \$1,800 in funding to produce and print 350 copies of the budget for the recent Colts Carnival.

Specifically aimed at the under 19 yo's that would be playing, eight pages of road safety messages were inserted into the booklet. With the Wheatbelt having the dubious honour of the worst rate of 'Killed and Seriously Injured' in road accidents in WA, it was a golden opportunity to capture the attention of a large audience of young people.

As an added bonus the Elephant in the Wheatbelt was also brought to town; visiting

the Lake Grace Shire Council and also the local school before settling in at the sporting precinct for the Saturday of the Carnival. The Elephant became a talking point, bringing forth memories of recent and not so recent accidents and the catastrophic affect that it had on not just the victim but also the family and friends.

Lake Grace Roadwise is made up of representatives from the emergency services, shire, school, main roads, WALGA and health services. It is a community based organisation with a focus on road safety primarily within the Lake Grace townsite and its

Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC

Each of the soldiers listed on the Lake Grace Honour Roll will be featured in the Lakes Link News, as close as possible to 100 years from their enlistment. It is now 100 years, 3 months and 3 weeks since David Leonard Elliott signed up.

Born at Port Germaine, the small seaside town of South Australia, where there is one of the longest jetties in the Southern Hemisphere. He enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on the 12th of March 1915, and trained at Blackboy Hill, where he was assigned to the 1st Reinforcement / 28th Battalion. At a height of 5 feet 10 inches, (178cms) and weighing 155 lbs, (70.5kgs), he was of dark complexion with brown eyes and dark hair.

He was a farm hand, at Cartmeticup, where he worked for an uncle - William Henry Hobart, or better known as Uncle Harry. His mother, Edith Hobart, of Purpledowns Station, Port Augusta, South Australia, was given as next of kin. David was the eldest of a family where he had four half brothers and four half sisters and as much of his growing up years were spent at his Uncle Harry's place near Katanning, Western Australia, some of his siblings from South Australia never got to know him, or even knew of him.

He was an unmarried man when he enlisted, though during the war, he met and married his wife, Helena Louise, nee Rawlings in England, who then became next of kin. Before his enlistment, he had already acquired a farm south east of Lake Grace, taking over the property originally selected by a Mr Filmer, but the onset of war delayed the progress of its development.

Private Elliott embarked the *Geelong* on the 5th of June, 1915, at Fremantle. After a further period of several months training near Cairo, he joined his Unit and reembarked the Ivernia with his Battalion for Gallipoli, on the 4th of September, 1915, landing there on the 10th of September. (The Australians landed at what became known as ANZAC Cove, where they established a tenuous foothold on the steep slopes above the beach). On the 28th of October he was admitted to hospital. having to be transferred to Gibraltar with Enteric fever on 7/11/1915, and later was transferred to England by Hospital ship. (Soon after this, the AIF began evacuating troops from Gallipoli, and after reorganizing Infantry divisions, were progressively transferred to France, beginning March 1916).

When Private Elliott arrived at Portsmouth he was admitted to the 5th General Hospital where he was declared temporarily unfit, and it was June before he was able to march in to the Training Depot.

On the 7th of August, he proceeded to France, rejoining his Unit, the 28th Battalion. Three months later Private Elliott was again admitted to hospital, though rejoined his unit two weeks later. It would seem as though another six months elapsed in the Field, in France,

before he was again hospitalised. While being kept under observation, he was then moved through several Casualty Stations before being transferred back to England, his sickness being described as Trench Fever. On recovery, Private Elliott was entitled to 3 Blue Stripes.

On resumption of duty, he was detached from his Unit for temporary duty with the Anzac Provost Corps. This was a voluntary organization, made up of 'injured' Anzac soldiers, and they performed similar duties to Army Police. He was later taken on strength and returned to the 28th Battalion, the transfer being effective 9/9/1917.

A year later Private Elliott was married to Helena Louise Rawlings, at St Paul's Church, Salisbury, Wiltshire. On the 4th of October 1918, Private Elliott proceeded back to France, and shortly after, the war was over. However, it was another nine weeks, on the $18^{\mbox{th}}$ of January 1919, before he returned to England from the Australian Infantry Base Depot. On his return in February, he was promoted to

Dash 8 Plane With 31 on Board Crashes at Cosmic Boy Mine

At least that is what the news headline would have been, if this was real and not a training exercise.

On Wednesday the 17th June 2015 four of the Lake Grace Ambulance Team (Fr Gayan Thamel, Aileen Winchester, Diedre Trevenen and Amanda Milton) made the two hour drive to the Western Areas Nickel Mines of Cosmic Boy, Spotted Quoll and Flying Fox. The mines lie approximately 50km east of Varley beyond the Rabbit Proof Fence.

Western Areas employ

approximately 300 people at the mines, and workers are encouraged to fly in/fly out versus drive in/drive out. Employees come from as far afield as Geraldton to work at the mine.

As the mine has planes regularly arriving and departing, it is part of their annual safety protocol to run a disaster exercise to test their skills, systems and processes.

This is the second year that the St John Ambulance Lake Grace Sub Centre has been invited to attend, joining Community Paramedic David Allen, and crews from Hyden and Varley. DFES and Silver Chain volunteers from Hyden also attended to complement the Emergency Response Team (ERT) members of the skills, communication and how to mesh mine rescue protocol with "outside" emergency services protocol.

On such a bitterly cold day with rain, the exercise was undertaken in a large sandpit with no protection, so the emergency responders had earned their lunch by the time the exercise ended.

The exercise simulated a Dash 8 plane crashing with 28 passengers and 3 crew on board. A simulator was brought in to allow the ERT crew to actively fight a fire, whilst extracting crash victims from the fuselage of the plane. The patients were made up to simulate real injuries complete with severe burns and badly broken limbs, or with significant un-survivable traumatic injury.

Working With Warriors - Understanding Anxiety

Tim and the Team - The Regional Men's Health Initiative

Anxiety is an umbrella term for feelings of fear, nervousness, apprehensiveness or worry such as negative thoughts and seeing potential threats where they don't exist.

Everybody gets anxious at times and some anxiety actually helps us to function well BUT anxiety can become a problem when:

- It happens too often;
- It goes on for a long time;
- it stops us from doing things that we want to do.

Symptoms can be *psychological* (feeling frequently worried, tired, irritable and weepy with difficulty concentrating) and/or *physical* (including rapid breathing, rising blood pressure and pounding heart, a sense of restlessness or feeling on edge, muscle tension, sleep disturbance and nausea/sickness).

There is no single cause for anxiety but there are several factors that may contribute to its development:

- Brain Chemistry most strongly implicated here are imbalances of serotonin and dopamine that regulate thought and feeling makes for feeling depressed and anxious;
- Heredity anxiety disorders run in families. Children are at higher risk if parents have an anxiety disorder- learned behaviour;
- Life Experiences any distressing or traumatic experience may be grounds for the development of anxiety. Exhaustion and certain medications can also be triggers for anxiety;
- Drug Use stimulant drugs like amphetamines and caffeine can trigger anxiety. Prolonged amphetamine use can cause feelings of panic and anxiety that last for years after the drug is stopped.

Some tips that may help you deal with your anxiety include:

- Self-awareness identify the symptoms early. Ask yourself "what is making me feel this way?" You may be able to change the "anxiety-making circumstances" but if not you can deal with it better if you acknowledge it;
- Interpret it positively anxious about a situation? Instead of viewing as threatening put a positive interpretation which will reduce the anxiety to a more manageable level;
- A little anxiety is a good thing too much is damaging but too little can mean you may not perform to your best ability. View anxiety as a resource you can manage;
- Diet the gut flora can get out of balance eg. use more probiotics and omega3 foods. Research has shown maintaining a balanced diet can reduce anxiety symptoms.
- Exercise boosts levels of vital brain chemicals like serotonin, dopamine and norepinephrine that may

reduce stress and anxiety.

- Relaxation and meditation programs can help reduce stress, anxiety and depression. You can find many resources for these online eg. progressive muscle relaxation.
- Therapy there are some good programs that are offered by psychologists/counsellors that help to re-program those unhelpful and negative ways of thinking that underpins anxiety.

Situations, or life events, can come from many places including relationship issues, financial burden, physical health, trauma, or just dealing with difficult times. As these situations develop we need to take steps to reduce anxiety for ourselves and for those close to us. *Remember …before it all gets too much… Talk to a Mate!*

CEO's Corner

The end of financial year has arrived and Council is soon to adopt its 2015/16 Budget. The main focus for the coming year will be the roads programme given that we have received an additional \$527,000 under the Roads to Recovery programme. Hand in hand with this focus will be some Plant renewal, in particular a new replacement grader and change-over of two of the heavy trucks. The final determination of this year's rate increase will not be made until late July, once all of the end of financial year accounts have been calculated.

Council, at its 24 June 2015 Ordinary Meeting considered the following matters:

- Request for a Road Name Change A request has been received to rename a portion of Kent Road to Crook Road, and Council has agreed to advertise the proposal and request submissions.
- Planning Application Proposed Storage Shed at 68 Absolon Street, Lake Grace - Council has approved this application subject to a number of conditions.

In addition to the above, Council resolved a number of administrative matters including the write-off of unrecovered debts amounting to \$14,888, appointed its Bushfire Control Officers for the 2015/16 season, including Chief Bush Fire Control Officer Brad Watson and Deputies (Lake Grace) Doug Dunham, (Newdegate) Wes Hall and (Lake King) Richard Metcalf.

Furthermore, Council completed a review of its Policy Manual, Delegation of powers to the Chief Executive Officer and appointment of required Authorised



persons. Each of these can be found in the minutes of Council's 24 June 2015 Ordinary Meeting.

Local Laws Review

Over the past eighteen months, Council has undertaken a review of its local laws which has resulted in proposed new local laws, the amendment of some existing local laws, and is proposing to repeal the existing Pest Plants Local Law. At its 24 June 2015 Ordinary Meeting, Council approved the giving of state-wide public notice of the local laws to seek public comment. The formal notice will be published in next fortnight's edition.

2015 Local Government Elections

The election will be held on Saturday, 17 October 2015 and whilst that it still some time away, it is opportune to remind everyone to ensure their enrolment details are up to date. Remember, you may be eligible to vote in more than one Ward or as a nominee of an enterprise. If you are unsure, please contact Peter Dittrich, Manager Corporate Services, at the Shire on 9890 2500. The close of enrolment is 5:00pm on 28 August 2015.

If you are considering nominating for Council, the first day for candidates to lodge completed nominations, in the prescribed form, with the Returning Officer is 3 September 2015. Nominations close seven days later on 10 September 2015 at 4:00pm. Further details regarding these matters will be made available over the coming weeks by the Returning Officer, Mr Terry Gladish.

That's Legal

Can you give me information on landlords' rights to remove tenants?

For many reasons, a landlord/property owner/ manager may wish to remove a tenant from their property. There are a few factors which influence how this can be done.

For a periodic tenancy (this is a more 'ad hoc' agreement which continues indefinitely, rent can be payable at any increment of time), unless landlord and tenant agree to end the tenancy, notice of termination of the tenancy must be in writing and in the correct Notice of Termination form as

required by the *Residential Tenancies Act 1987* (WA). Three forms exist; Form 1A: Notice of Termination for Non-Payment of Rent (where notice has been given to the tenant of breach due to non-payment of rent); Form 1B: Notice of Termination for Non-Payment of Rent (where no such notice has been given); Form 1C: Notice of Termination (if the property has been sold [requires 30 days notice], destroyed [7 days], if tenant has not remedied a breach [such as drastic

uncleanliness] which has been brought to their attention in writing, within at least 14 days, or no reason [30 days notice]).

An owner may issue a termination notice if a tenant is in rent arrears, but this is not an eviction order – a tenant may only be evicted under a court order (a tenant can avoid this order by, for example, paying rent arrears one day before court hearing).

For a fixed term tenancy, the agreement ends on the date given on the agreement, and tenants must vacate the property on that date if alternative arrangements have not been made.

Owners must be cognisant that, even if their property is managed through an estate agent, they are ultimately liable for the tenancy and may be liable for wrong actions of the agent. If the tenant lodges an action regarding the property, it will name the owner rather than the estate agent.

This is a very brief overview of some applicable rules. Further information should be sought about specific circumstances. For general advice, you can consult the Tenants Advice Service WA.

"The SWCC Community Groundworks Grants will help local groups look after their patch and support work they know will make a difference," Mr Wilson said.

Activities that produce tangible environmental or sustainable agricultural on ground outcomes will be a central part of all successful projects.

"We are looking for projects which engage the community, while providing real outcomes for the local environment" said Damien Postma, SWCC CEO.

These can include activities such as tree planting, fencing off remnant bushland, on ground demonstration of sustainable agricultural practises, restoring a local wetland and erosion management.

Federal Member for Forrest, Nola Marino said that building awareness and engaging community members to understand the value of our natural areas and sustainable agriculture will also be a key component of the funded projects.



Lance Corporal, his duties continuing for several more months. Six months later he embarked the *Prinz Ludwig*, with his wife and their child for the return trip to Australia, and disembarked at Fremantle on the 3rd of September 1919. He received the 1914-15 STAR Medal, the British War Medal and the Victory medal, and later, by request of his wife, he received the Anzac Memorial Medal. This medal was issued to surviving Anzac Veterans, by request, 50 years later in 1967.

This medal was instituted by the Prime Minister of Australia, Mr Harold Holt. Private Elliott gave his religion as Baptist.

After the war, on return to his farm, David found that a shed he had purchased had been stolen, however, a more immediate requirement was to build a home for his wife and family, who remained with their Uncle Hobart, near Katanning until it was built. Their home was built of bricks, made at a brickworks a mile or two away. David Elliott became a very distinguished citizen in the area, serving the Roads Board from 1925 to 1958, eight years as Vice Chairman and 23 years as Chairman, guiding its development through early ng 7. 
