Committee Changeover for Community Bus

A quarter of a century after Lake Grace gained their first community bus the facility is as valuable to our community as it ever has been. Although not used as much as in the early days it still gets out most weeks of the year. Sitting on 105,000 km, the current bus is the third community bus for Lake Grace.

The bus has transported sporting teams, gone on crop inspections, taken part in school camps and sporting days, been a part of the seniors adventures, delivered a skipper service to keep our community safe and also provided a backup service for the school buses. Not just delivering its occupants where they needed to go but building on the fun, excitement and team spirit before and after the event. It's probably a good thing that the bus can't reveal all of its secrets!

Lake Grace Lions were a driving force behind the acquisition of the bus with Lion Ray Hancock providing steerage. Funds to purchase the bus came from donations, funds from clubs that were wound up, the Shire and also the Lions with the first bus rolling into town in 1993. Throughout that time there has been one person who has

been consistently involved with the community bus; Kevin Seaman is probably due for some long service

Both Kevin and Jean have been caretakers of the bus for many years, taking bookings, managing maintenance and ensuring that users looked after the bus therefore keeping it to a high standard at all times. Backing them up has been Neil and Elsie Bishop, who were caretakers of the bus prior to the Seaman's; and according to Kevin taught them all they knew! Thank you to the Bishop and Seaman families for all they have done; although they

have now all formally retired from the bus committee they are still available for advice.

From now on all bookings for the community bus will be done through the Lake Grace CRC, so if needing the bus please ring 9865 1470. Committee members are Suzanne Reeves (Chair/Sec), Annette Argent (Treas), Rosemary Bywater, George Chircop, Nat Gambuti and Peter Stoffberg. I'm not sure if any of us will be able to beat Kevin's 25 year record for staying on the committee but we're hopeful that they we can do as good a job as our predecessors.

- I know the weather wasn't conducive to go outdoors last Wednesday (great for farmers and ducks), however I'm hoping everyone took the opportunity to get any Centrelink/Medicare/DVA business done that they needed to do. I haven't had feedback as yet from the Department of Human Services mobile service centre but I'm hopeful that the numbers were up as we don't want to lose this valuable service.
- Sorry still no news from the government as to what funding we will receive for the 2019/2020 financial year. Maybe by the end of this month??? However we still have bumper stickers available for anyone who wants one (I ♥ my CRC). For those of you on social media please like the Lake Grace CRC Facebook page and while you're at it like the CRCSaretheanswer and participate in the campaign.
- We just held our first LDAG (Local Drug Action Group) meeting for a few months this week and we have a number of activities on the go. 
Thanks to the generosity of the Western Australian community, all services are free of charge and tailored to meet the needs of each individual.

William James Walker

4th July 1935 - 11th June 2018

The Walkers arrived at Lake Grace in February 1935 - Allan and Clara, with Vera, Doris and Mary - to sharefarm at Ashfield, South Lake Grace. They welcomed Bill (William) on 4th July to the world. In 1938, twins Ian and Margaret arrived and in 1941 the Walkers leased Colovale at North Lake Grace and the family moved. Bill had started school at the Little Red School at South Lake Grace and after the move attended Lake Grace school. He made many lifelong friends from these school years, including Angela, his future wife.

In 1948, the family moved closer to town to Lucas', when both it and Colovale were purchased, and in 1949 Bill left school to work on the farm with Allan. He put in his first crop in 1950 on Allan's first return to Scotland.

Bill was athletic and a keen sportsman. He put in a lot of time on the running track and ran at various picnic meets around the district throughout the 1950s. He played football and tennis but was especially drawn to cricket, beginning a distinguished 30-year career with the Lake Grace Cricket Club in 1950 - 51. He also attended 20 years of Countryweek cricket. Later, he became a champion golfer and played a bit of bowls.

Bill did his stint with National Service (Nashos) in the mid 1950s, and in 1956 he joined the Freemasons, joining his father in the local lodge.

Bill took a trip to the Eastern States in 1956 and took his running shoes. A former publican from the Lake Grace Hotel was now at the St Kilda Football Club, so it was that Bill ended up training with St Kilda, to keep up his running fitness - running as "Don Campbell" in country events. He had no football boots, so wore his running shoes, with the stipulation "No marks".

Angela Carruthers was a fast runner too, but Bill must have caught up with her! In 1959, they married and began married life at Colovale. The family grew with Andrew in 1960 and Rodney in 1962 and the farm grew with the purchase of neighbour Gniels' in 1964. Mark arrived in 1966.

Bill enjoyed music. He bought all the singles of The Seekers and went to see them in concert in Perth. He liked The Beatles, Simon and Garfunkle and the Scott McKenzie hit 'San Francisco'. At the same time, he was a big fan of Australian opera diva Dame Joan Sutherland. Alan Thiel played the organ and piano accordion on many family visits resulting in we three boys being unsuccessfully recruited as piano accordion players. The Thiels ran the Hillcrest Drive-In at Lake Grace, and we were frequent attendees.

Life on the farm followed the cycle of ripping up, working back, seeding, shearing and harvest.

Bill was involved in lobbying for a second licensed premises in Lake Grace, culminating in the Lake Grace Sportsman's Club opening in 1973. It became Bill's

second home.

Angela returned to work in 1975, where she worked for the next 33 years. At this time, the family set about designing a new home, to be built in town. It was begun in 1976 and completed in 1977, with Bill proudly credited as



the builder, albeit with expert help from John de Vree.

Bill took trips to the Eastern States in 1976 and 1977 and the farm was enlarged with Dunham's and Lucas' in 1980.

Bill was a good cook. He loved making stews (particularly kangaroo tail), soups, pickling, jam, brewing beer and - mushrooms!

On one occasion, there was an abundance of mushrooms in the paddocks. We picked buckets and buckets of them, and Dad cooked them every known way until we had all eaten enough mushrooms for quite some time. There was still quite a lot left, and when Mum suggested that he just thrown them out, he would not have a bar of it. "I'm going to eat them all – I don't care if it makes me sick," he said. Needless to say, it did make him sick for a day or two, and we had many laughs for many years recalling those fateful words: "I don't care if it makes me sick".

A creature of habit, Dad's day began with the newspaper, which he would scour for items to cut out and discuss with the long-suffering John Griffin at the daily pre-dinner drink at the Club.

Bill and Angela's first overseas trip was in 1981 to Singapore.

Andrew married Kim in 1983 and grandchildren came with Brooke, Chelsea and Zoe. Rodney married Stacey and had Beau, Cameron and Dean. Life continued happily as grandparents. Dad discovered new music he loved in Dame Kiri te Kanawa and Aled Jones.

Bill developed various enthusiasms over the years. For a time, it was Consuming Passions, a five-minute cooking show before the religiously-observed seven o'clock ABCTV News. Songs of Praise on Sundays at 11.00 was another show he never missed.

Bill was curious and experimental, with a quick mind, and an enduring interest was Get Rich Quick schemes. He was somewhat successful with a gambling method he trialled at Wrest Point Casino, and, while never parting with any money for these schemes he encountered, he would try to find a way to hit the jackpot.

Bill and Angela travelled to the UK and Sydney in 1989,

and took a trip on the Ghan with Aunty Vera and Uncle Bill and Uncle Ian.

Further visits to Sydney came in 1993 and 1994 when Mark and partner Heather had Ceri.

In 1995 Bill planted 250 vines on ironstone country in the corner of Gniels'. He had gotten the idea when talking to Swan Valley winemaker Peter Talijancich who he got to know over the years from picking us boys up at Swanleigh, the boarding hostel we attended.

From 1997, Bill helped Angela through successful chemotherapy treatment for breast cancer and in 1998 they drove across the Nullarbor and back to visit Mark, Heather and Ceri.

In 1999 the first wine was released, and after a final wheat harvest, Dad moved from being a farmer to being a vigneron. He loved it. It combined a love of wine with a passing parade of customers. He built a shop at the vineyard, and that became part of his new daily routine.

He had great success with the vineyard, winning many awards for his Lake Grace Shiraz. His hunch that Lake Grace could be good vine-growing country was correct, as the two continuing vineyards will attest.

In 2006 Bill had a close brush with death. However, six days in intensive care with multiple organ failure did not dent his determination to live. It took some months to fully recover, but Bill was soon back to his old life.

In 2008, soon after the death of brother Ian, Bill lost his lifelong love when Angela died.

Many here today will not have seen Bill since Angela's funeral. The ten years since are the final chapter in Bill's life. He continued on at the vineyard for a couple of years before selling it, whereupon he continued on as a sort of consultant and part-time helper at the vineyard.

Bill was now retired, and his daily routine continued: the newspaper and his new passion Sudoku, a bit of pottering around at the vineyard, then off to the Club, to irritate not just Griff but whoever was there, with his observations of the day, usually regarding the correct usage of words. Some here will raise a smile when I say now that Bill had a big impact on the community.

Andrew and Kim lived with Bill for a year, after which he had a couple of falls down the cellar stairs. These were temporary setbacks, and he was able to celebrate his 80th in 2015 with family in Perth. Soon afterwards, however, a blood clot in his left eye left him with 85% vision loss in that eye.

Still determined, he adapted to life with one eye, including driving. Bill's sister Doris died and Bill had some health complications of his own, which saw him in hospital a couple of times. The family realised Bill couldn't live on his own any longer, so in 2016 Jane lived in the house as his carer. After a final family Christmas together in 2016, Bill entered Lake Grace Hospital for the final time.

Bill was a devious patient. He managed to escape a few

times, including getting as far as the Club and having a beer! The hospital staff deserves commendation for their exemplary care of Dad.

As Dad declined, his essential self remained. Even with dementia, he was ready to go to work every day, hair neatly combed.

We had to tidy up the house for him and in doing so we sorted through a pile of papers next to his desk. It took several days, making sure that everything was filed away appropriately, until we got to the very bottom. At the very bottom was a collection of Mum's death notices. These had evidently been placed on a bare counter. After Mum died, things piled up for Dad. They were the world to each other; they sorted out each other's lives in many ways.

Dad died 11 June 2018 at the Lake Grace Hospital, about 50 yards from where he was born 82 years earlier.

From the Grandkids next door:

We all loved growing up so close to our grandparents, being able to pop over every other day for no particular reason except to say hi has left us all with some very special memories. Grandad always encouraged our 'artistic' sides and would ask for us to kindly sketch a portrait of him while he sat ever so still at the kitchen table. We also grafittied all of the photos in his daily newspaper, with unsuspecting individuals receiving a 'makeover' as such. Being able to watch and support him in starting up his beloved vineyard and see his wines be so well received is something we will always be grateful to have been a part of. Above all, we will always remember Grandad as a kind and caring man with a cheeky smile and eyes that twinkled. Thank you for showing us what unconditional love means through the way you love 'The Didi' as well as all of us.

11.5 Kg Cat Captured in Koorda

Media Release

It is evident that there are some massive feral cats out in our Wheatbelt, particularly in the shire of Koorda. Last month an 11.5kg feral cat was captured by John and Madeline Hayles, who are working with Wheatbelt NRM to implement a feral control and revegetation management plan. It was around this time last year, that they captured a male feral cat weighing in at a whopping 13 kg. The sheer size of these cats is difficult for some of us to imagine, bearing in mind, that the average cat weighs only 4 to 6 kgs.

Feral cats in Australia, which were introduced by the first European settlers and established in the wild by the 1850s, continue to be a huge threat to native wildlife. In fact, they play a large part in the extinction of several species unique to our country.

Scientists estimate that Australia is home to between 5 and 20 million feral cats, and that they kill an average of five animals — bugs, lizards, small mammals and birds, and so on — each night. Feral cats are preying on some of our most at risk species, but they can also cause harm through disease transmission and competition with natives for habitat and food.

However, no one can accurately estimate the number of feral cats, because the numbers fluctuate considerably with climate and the availability of prey. As an example, cat numbers can increase significantly within a few months, during or after a rat, rabbit or mouse plague.

An average feral cat requires about 300 grams of prey per day. If they eat a small marsupial with an average weight of 40 grams, then they would need to consume about eight of them per day. If the cat is eating larger marsupials, with an average of 140 grams, then they would require about two.

Steps to Support WA Sheep Producers

Media Release

The McGowan Government is taking steps to support WA's sheep industry as it prepares for a drop in live exports over the northern hemisphere summer months.

Agriculture and Food Minister Alannah MacTiernan and senior Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) livestock staff met with producers and industry representatives on Friday to discuss activities to help sheep producers over coming months.

DPIRD's immediate activities will focus on modelling feed requirements and reserves so producers are able to manage their flock to respond to alternate market and processing specifications.

Further economic modelling is planned to evaluate the profitability of different sheep management options for the longer term.

DPIRD will run workshops for producers in coming weeks to address seasonal issues including feed budgeting and sheep management.

Minister MacTiernan will visit Qatar tomorrow to meet with chilled meat importers and transporters to discuss options for more export of West Australian processed meat, particularly during the northern summer.

Comments attributed to Agriculture and Food Minister Alannah MacTiernan:

"Around 300,000 sheep were destined for live export over the high summer months and it is vital that we work closely with industry to find the short and long term solutions to deal with the expected reduction in the live sheep trade.

"The Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development is taking steps to give sheep producers the tangible support they need to adjust to this new environment.

"While this will be an adjustment for industry, there are opportunities to boost local processing, creating more regional jobs for West Australians and getting more value out of our sheep meat.

"I am meeting with major processed meat importers in Qatar tomorrow to give our local processing industry and sheep producers the best shot at managing this transition."

Impetigo can be uncomfortable, and if left

untreated can lead to larger lesions, swollen glands and fever. If treated in the early stages the blisters leave no scarring when healed.

- Don't touch or scratch the sores
- Keep infected skin clean and covered
- Change linen daily and wash in hot water
- Throw all used dressings in the bin then wash hands well with soap and water
- Keep infected children at home until they are no longer infectious

Washing Hands is the best way to prevent ANY infection.

Remember to ALWAYS wash hands well.

If you use correct hand washing techniques you can protect yourself from contagious diseases like colds, influenza, impetigo and gastroenteritis.

Hands should be washed with soap and clean water before and after eating or preparing food, after going to the toilet and after nose blowing.

Alcohol based sanitisers are useful when soap and water is not available (and hands are not visibly dirty). Use half a teaspoon of the product and rub hands together until they are dry.

Impetigo Infections

Impetigo is a highly contagious skin infection causing red sores commonly known as 'school sores'.

Impetigo usually starts as an itchy red blister, then breaks out into a rash before being covered by a yellowish crust. Impetigo sores are commonly seen on the face, arms and legs.

Impetigo is a bacterial infection (Staph. Aureus) or Strep. Pyogenes) that mostly affects young children but can be transmitted to people of any age by skin-to-skin contact.

Impetigo requires a medical diagnosis, so get any suspicious sores checked by the doctor. Impetigo is easily treated with antibiotics, which speeds up healing and can reduce the spread of infection.

More than 99% of Western Australian cattle, sheep and goat producers and grain, seed and hay growers actively support the biosecurity of their industries by making financial contributions to WA's Industry Funding Schemes.

Farmer contributions to Industry Funding Schemes will support a range of priority animal disease and pest control programs next financial year. Executive Officer for the schemes, Rebecca Heath, said three-horned bedstraw, skeleton weed, virulent footrot and several cattle diseases were among the key issues to be targeted by the schemes in 2018/19.

for bovine tuberculosis, enzootic bovine leucosis and Johne's disease in cattle.

Sheep and goats: Producers pay a 10 cent contribution on the sale of each animal/carcase produced within the State, to fund a program to control virulent footrot. The Sheep and Goat Industry Funding Scheme management committee also anticipates funding a new program to address the impact of wild dogs on the industry. More information will be provided over the coming months.

Grains and seed: Growers pay a 25 cent contribution on the first sale of every tonne of grain and seed grown within the South West Land Division, to fund continuing programs to control skeleton weed and eradicate threehorned bedstraw.

Hay: Growers pay 12.5 cents per tonne on the first sale of hay grown within the South West Land Division, to fund the skeleton weed and three-horned bedstraw programs.

Producers/growers who wish to opt out of the scheme/s must submit a 2018/19 Notice of Opt Out form by 30 June 2018. Producers that opt out lose all entitlements to assistance and compensation via the scheme.

The continued support of producers for the schemes enables the WA livestock and grain/hay industries to identify and invest in biosecurity activities that help maintain our market advantage and the sustainability of the industries in Western Australia.

Half Price July

Dog and cat registrations due to expire on the 31st October 2018 are now half price.

Please note this is only for one year registrations and does not include three year or lifetime registrations. For all new applications please bring proof of sterilisation and microchip number when you come to the Shire.

It is a legal requirement to have your cats and dogs microchipped and registered, and also helps the shire identify any found pets quickly to reunite them with their owners.

Cats must also be sterilised and can be registered from six months of age.

If your pet requires microchipping, this can be done by our ranger, please notify the shire if you would like to arrange this.



Pension and Senior Card Advice

Under the Rates and Charges (Rebates and Deferments) Act 1992, the Local Governments are required to periodically review all pensioners.

If any of the details checked do not match, the claim may be rejected and concessions may be amended or cancelled.

Therefore, some things that pensioners and seniors may need to consider and advise the Shire about are:

- Do I hold a Commonwealth Seniors Health Card as well as a Seniors Card and am I only registered at the Shire with my Seniors Card?
- Has my partner also now received a card and we have not completed a joint application yet?
- As I am now not working more than 25 hours per week and am over 60, have I applied for a Seniors Card yet?
- Has the ownership of my property changed recently?
- Have I moved from one property to another and not made a new application for concessions with Water Corporation yet?
- Has my spouse ceased occupation of the property and I have not completed a new application?

If you work more than 25 hours per week, you are no longer eligible to have the Seniors Card and must return the card to Department of Community Services with a note advising them of your situation.

Unfortunately if concessions are cancelled, pensioners/ seniors do not get their rebates again until new applications are made.

Making Sense of Diabetes

Warrior Wellbeing



The cells in our bodies such as those found in our muscles need energy to grow and do what they do. One source of energy starts when we eat carbohydrate rich food such as bread, pasta, rice, potatoes, fruit, milk and yoghurt. In a normal situation these foods are broken down in our digestive system into glucose, a sugar. This sugar is what is needed by the cells, but it can't get into them without a special key *insulin*. Insulin is a hormone produced in the pancreas and its job is to regulate the amount of glucose in the blood.

In a person who has diabetes one of two things happens. Either they do not produce enough or any insulin to regulate the amount of glucose (Type 1) or their body's cells don't respond to the insulin *key* (Type 2). The result for both these events is the same, there is a back-up of glucose in the bloodstream *high blood sugar*. If our cells aren't getting the energy they need then we will naturally feel tired and rundown. Prolonged high blood sugar can cause serious complications resulting in damage to the organs of our body (the heart, kidneys, nervous system and eyes).

Type 1 is the least common form of diabetes and characterised by an early and sudden onset usually before the age of 20. In this instance a person's immune system destroys the cells in the pancreas that create insulin. As a result, these people need to inject insulin regularly to supplement the deficiency.

Type 2 is the most common form (above 80%) and usually a late gradual onset affecting adults. People with this condition produce enough insulin but their cells are not responsive and can't take up the glucose. There is usually a genetic link to the development of this form of diabetes, but there is also a strong link with unhealthy lifestyle factors such as poor diet, smoking and being overweight (having a beer gut) and being inactive. Medication is available to treat this form of diabetes alongside recommended lifestyle changes.

We always encourage blokes to go and see their GP if they fit any of the above categories and/or have a family

history of diabetes. This is especially important if they are experiencing any of the common symptoms of diabetes including constant thirst and peeing a lot, feeling run down a lot of the time, headaches, blurred vision and cuts that take ages to heal properly. Sometimes these symptoms can be quite mild in people who are in the early stages of developing diabetes (prediabetes).

If you have a family history of diabetes or concerns about any of the above symptoms don't wait, go and chat with your GP about having your blood sugar checked. It could save you a lot of grief down the track.





What is diabetes?

Diabetes is a serious complex condition which can affect the entire body. Diabetes requires daily self care and if complications develop, diabetes can have a significant impact on quality of life and can reduce life expectancy. While there is currently no cure for diabetes, you can live an enjoyable life by learning about the condition and effectively managing it.

There are different types of diabetes; all types are complex and serious. The three main types of diabetes are type 1, type 2 and gestational diabetes.

How does diabetes affect the body?

When someone has diabetes, their body can't maintain healthy levels of glucose in the blood. Glucose is a form of sugar which is the main source of energy for our bodies. Unhealthy levels of glucose in the blood can lead to long term and short term health complications.

For our bodies to work properly we need to convert glucose (sugar) from food into energy. A hormone called insulin is essential for the conversion of glucose into energy. In people with diabetes, insulin is no longer produced or not produced in sufficient amounts by the body. When people with diabetes eat glucose, which is in foods such as breads, cereals, fruit and starchy vegetables, legumes, milk, yoghurt and sweets, it can't be converted into energy.

Instead of being turned into energy the glucose stays in the blood resulting in high blood glucose levels. After eating, the glucose is carried around your body in your blood. Your blood glucose level is called glycaemia. Blood glucose levels can be monitored and managed through self care and treatment.

Three things you need to know about diabetes:

- It is not one condition there are three main types of diabetes: type 1, type 2 and gestational diabetes
- All types of diabetes are complex and require daily care and management
- Diabetes does not discriminate, anyone can develop diabetes

Diabetes is serious

Diabetes can be managed well but the potential complications are the same for type 1 and type 2 diabetes including heart attack, stroke, kidney disease, limb amputation, depression, anxiety and blindness.

We know diabetes:

- Is the leading cause of blindness in working age adults
- Is a leading cause of kidney failure and dialysis
- Increases the risk of heart attacks and stroke by up to four times
- Is a major cause of limb amputations
- Affects mental health as well as physical health.
 Depression, anxiety and distress occur in more than 30% of all people with diabetes
- Early diagnosis, optimal treatment and effective ongoing support and management reduce the risk of

diabetes-related complications.

Why is diabetes increasing?

All types of diabetes are increasing in prevalence:

- Type 1 diabetes accounts for 10% of all diabetes and is increasing
- Type 2 diabetes accounts for 85% of all diabetes and is increasing
- Gestational diabetes in pregnancy is increasing

Type 2 diabetes is increasing at the fastest rate. There are large numbers of people with silent, undiagnosed type 2 diabetes which may be damaging their bodies. An estimated 2 million Australians are at high risk of developing type 2 diabetes and are already showing early signs of the condition.

Type 2 diabetes is one of the major consequences of the obesity epidemic. The combination of massive changes to diet and the food supply, combined with massive changes to physical activity with more sedentary work and less activity, means most populations are seeing more type 2 diabetes.

Genes also play a part with higher risk of type 2 diabetes in Chinese, South Asian, Indian, Pacific Islander and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander populations.

Symptoms

In type 1 diabetes, symptoms are often sudden and can be life-threatening; therefore it is usually diagnosed quite quickly. In type 2 diabetes, many people have no symptoms at all, while other signs can go unnoticed being seen as part of 'getting older'.

Therefore, by the time symptoms are noticed, complications of diabetes may already be present.

- Common symptoms include:
- Being more thirsty than usual
- · Passing more urine
- · Feeling tired and lethargic
- Always feeling hungry
- Having cuts that heal slowly
- Itching, skin infections
- Blurred vision
- Unexplained weight loss (type 1)
- Gradually putting on weight (type 2)
- Mood swings
- Headaches
- Feeling dizzy
- Leg cramps

Apple Crisp

Full of healthy walnuts rich in omega-3 fatty acids, this delicious and timeless classic is perfect for a cold winter's night.

Ingredients

- 1 cup SPLENDA low calorie sweetener

No More Lightweight Plastic Bags in WA

Media Release

Western Australia's lightweight plastic bag ban regulations commence today.

Announcing the ban at The Market Place Ballajura IGA today, Environment Minister Stephen Dawson said taking lightweight plastic bags out of circulation had strong community support and was a significant win for the environment.

The State-wide ban will bring Western Australia into line with South Australia, Tasmania, the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory which already have similar bans in place. Queensland's ban also starts today and Victoria has announced its intention to ban lightweight plastic bags from the end of 2019.

The ban applies to all retailers currently supplying lightweight plastic bags with handles - 35 microns thick or less. These bags are commonly provided by supermarkets, restaurants and other retail stores.

It includes degradable, biodegradable and compostable plastic bags because these also breakdown in the environment and pose a threat to wildlife.

Plastic bags make up a relatively small portion of solid waste and litter in WA but can have significant impacts on marine wildlife and birds, which may eat them or become entangled in plastic bag waste.

WA's plastic bag ban has widespread support across the community, local governments and major retailers which are big users of plastic shopping bags.

The major supermarkets have all indicated their intention to stop supplying lightweight plastic bags from today.

Comments attributed to Environment Minister Stephen Dawson:

"Today marks a significant milestone in Western Australia to reduce the impacts of lightweight plastic on our environment.

"Studies have shown significant damage caused by plastic pollution - seabirds have been found with their digestive tracts filled with plastic fragments and turtles can confuse plastic bags with jellyfish.

"We will continue our efforts - under Western Australia's Waste Strategy - to reduce the amount of waste generated, prevent littering, increase material recovered from the waste stream, and reduce waste destined for landfill.

"Banning lightweight plastic bags is a significant step in the right direction.

"Retailers will have until December 31, 2018 to phase out their existing stocks of banned bags. I encourage all retailers to move to alternatives as quickly as possible to align with national initiatives and community sentiment."







Don't Be Blind to Smoke Alarm Laws

Media Release

Residential property owners in WA need to be on the ball when it comes to smoke alarms and the laws governing them.

The recent house fire in Thornlie, where two lives were lost, is a tragic and timely reminder of the importance of the alarms as in that case the alarm was found not to be working.

Western Australian laws require the owner of a dwelling to have compliant smoke alarms and residual current devices (RCDs) installed before selling, transferring ownership, renting or hiring the dwelling.

The smoke alarms must be in working order, less than 10 years old and in most cases, permanently connected to mains power.

"If the vendor of a dwelling has failed to comply, the laws allow the new owner to have compliant smoke alarms installed and can recover the costs of doing so," Building Commissioner Ken Bowron said.

Smoke alarm laws also apply to residential buildings hired out on a casual or short-term basis such as those through the Airbnb website and other similar tourist accommodation.

Landlords of rental properties must also ensure there are compliant smoke alarms fitted and maintained.

"Tenants should report any concerns they have about smoke alarms to their landlord or managing agent in the first instance," Mr Bowron said.

"Owners intending to sell rent or hire their dwellings also need to ensure that there are at least two RCDs installed to protect all power points and lighting circuits."
