Life member Ray Bird and Narelle made the trip down from Perth to join in the celebrations. Brigade Captain, Marcus Owen, had the privilege of presenting a 30 year Service Medal to our only active female member, Di Desmond. Thirty years of voluntary service is an outstanding commitment and achievement, congratulations Di.

This year's Captain's Award was awarded to one of their newer and younger members in Sam Stubberfield. Sam has been in the brigade for over twelve months and has taken on the position of Apparatus Officer, taking over from his brother, Reid Stubberfield. It's great to see these guys stepping up and taking on a role.

Special awards went to Ric Sutton (a rugby) who fell asleep under a pool table whilst away at a training course, Lawrie 'The Dentist' Dickins (toothbrush & paste) who discovered he was good at cleaning teeth on gear box cogs and Reid who received a complimentary bundle of blank wedding invites, for those members who haven't already received one.

This past twelve months a lot of training has been undertaken; seven volunteers completed the Introduction to Firefighting Course, five volunteers did the Structural Firefighting Course and more recently six volunteers completed the Breathing Apparatus Qualification Course; this brings the number of BA qualified members to eight, which is the most the brigade has ever had.

Unveiling of History

A very busy day for Lake Grace began with the unveiling of the Lake Grace District 1911-2011 Historical Map at the Visitors Centre at 10am on Saturday the 25th June.

The unveiling was the culmination of two years research and consultation by members of the Lake Grace 100 Years Committee. The map shows Lake Grace district farm allocations and locations of roads, schools, railway sidings and other community sites over the 100 years since settlement.

The team of individuals who worked for many hours researching and collating the information for the map were Debby Clarke, Allan Marshall and Alan Zweck; this was done from historical documents, living memory and local knowledge. They then passed this data to local graphic artist, Melissa Cugley, who had the task of redrawing the map from a digital copy and physically entering road names, farm allocations and allocation numbers.

The computer component of the map will be installed inside the Visitor's Centre soon; this consists of an electronic copy of the map linked to the history of each block showing who has owned them in the last 100 years.

Local resident, Mr Neil Bishop, was invited to unveil the map, as the oldest direct descendent of the original Bishop family who came to Lake Grace in 1911. The map was sponsored by descendants of 1911 settler families, who remain in the area, Bennett, Bishop, Carruthers, Franks, Griffin – Stidworthy, King, Marshall, McMahon, Naisbitt – Stacey, Slarke and Willock.

A delicious morning tea was served and shared by those present, being supplied by people who attended the morning.



MoneySmart covers not only the basics such as budgeting, saving, credit cards and loans, but also more complicated issues like superannuation contributions, margin loans and income tax.

There is information for people at particular turning points in their lives; starting work, buying a home,

losing a job, having a baby, saving for a holiday, getting divorced or retiring.

Whether you're young or old, rich or poor, investing or paying off debt; the site offers uninfluenced free-of-charge guidance, so that you can pick the best options for you.

For example: if you are planning for retirement, the 'retirement planner' estimates what your income will be after you retire and what you can do now to boost it. It demonstrates how increasing employer contributions would give a big boost to income in retirement.

From the CEO's Desk

Meeting with the Western Australian Grants Commission

The Shire President, Cr Walker and I along with the Shires of Gnowangerup and Jerramungup met last Friday with the Grants Commission in Lake Grace. The Grants Commission is responsible for handing out the Commonwealth's Financial Assistance Grants to all local governments in WA. For the Shire this is \$1.7M+ per year. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the Shire's submission seeking additional funding from the Commission along with looking at the new methodology that will be used from 2012/13 for handing out the money.

Lake Grace Centenary Map

Well done to the Lake Grace Centenary Committee regarding the unveiling of the Lake Grace Centenary Map on Saturday 25 June 2011. Both my family and I had the opportunity to attend the unveiling of the map which was a very successful event with the map depicting the first farming families and their properties in and around the Lake Grace area.

Newdegate Rejuvenation Committee Meeting

The first meeting of the Newdegate Rejuvenation Committee was held in the Newdegate Community Resource Centre (CRC) on 29 June 2011. Cr Len Armstrong was elected Chair of this committee of Council. Future meetings of this committee start at 4:00PM and will be held at the Newdegate CRC on the following dates:

- 29 September 2011;
- 30 November 2011.

Regional Aged Housing Accommodation Project

The Shire along with the Shire's of Williams, Woodanilling, West Arthur, Wagin, Dumbleyung and Kent received funding approval to construct up to 38 aged accommodation units across the seven shires. The Shire of Lake Grace will receive at least \$1.9M over four years to build 7 — 10 aged units. As such two to three units will be built first on the Shire's Bennett St block in Lake Grace during 2011/12. I will hold a community meeting in Lake Grace shortly to bring interested persons up to date on the Bennett St project. The next two units are scheduled for Newdegate 2012/13.

Katanning Sale Yards

I had the opportunity last week to attend a briefing on the new Katanning Sale Yards. This is a \$21.5M project that will be completed by 1 July 2013. The sale yards will handle selling 50-60% of the State's sheep. The Shire of Katanning is building the new sale yards including making the sheep panels and pens on site.





Newdegate Medical Centre Update





The Appearance Experience:

The Lake Grace Magistrate's Court sits every two months and deals with most offences that occur in the Lake Grace / Newdegate Police Subdistrict. Our Magistrates Court is presided over by two local Justices of the Peace as opposed to the circuit Magistrate from Albany who visits the major centres such as Narrogin, Katanning etc. Any serious matters or pleas of not guilty will be remanded through to the Magistrate at Narrogin whereas our local Justices will deal with guilty pleas and requests for remands for legal advice etc.

For one reason or another our recent court lists have been larger than usual so I thought it timely to pass this information on for those who haven't previously been exposed to the court appearance experience.

I'll use a very topical example and say that you've been detected for driving your vehicle which has become unregistered. This offence cannot be dealt with by way of an infringement so you would receive a court summons. The summons will allow you to nominate your plea in writing if you wish. If you plea guilty in writing you may also attach any relevant mitigating factors that you would like the Justices to consider in your absence. Personally I would always appear in person as a sign of respect and to ensure the Justices could view my demeanour, hear my explanation / see my remorse. It would also give me the opportunity to offer my mitigating circumstances and any additional information requested by the Justices before handing down their penalty.

You would be seated in the waiting room prior to your matter being called. At this point you should turn off your mobile phone and remove sunglasses etc from view. When called, you would be shown to the left hand side of the Bar Table and should remain standing. You should address the Justices as "Your Honour" or at least Sir or Ma'am regardless of how well you may know them personally. Also avoid using any slang

terms. Remember you are addressing 'the position' not just the person. If there is evidence of extreme familiarity the matter could be remanded to another court location by the Justices or on application by the prosecution.

You will be asked if you are the person (by name) named in the Prosecution Notice. The charge will then be read and you will be asked how you plea. You can plead Guilty or Not Guilty, or alternatively request a remand to a date to be fixed if you have a good reason, most commonly to obtain further legal advice. A guilty plea will see you allowed to be seated whilst the police prosecutor reads out the facts as recorded on the police brief. (you will already have received a copy). You will then be asked to stand and given the opportunity to respond or comment on what was read out and this is when you should offer any relevant explanation, mitigating circumstances, clarification or apology in taking responsibility for your actions as the case maybe.

The Justices will ask if there is any previous record. If there is it will be shown to you to check before being handed up to the Justices to consider in the light of the current offence. The Justices will then hand down their penalty along with any costs. e.g. a summons cost is \$121.95. The Justices will then stand your matter down which means you are free to leave the bar table and court room. You will receive a written notice in the mail of your penalty and associated costs so advise the prosecutor of any recent change of address.



This month regional Australians have found themselves in the middle of a political debate that everyone has an opinion about. No-one involved in the cattle industry condones the cruelty displayed in the Four Corners report. The Federal Government's response to this needed to be measured and diplomatic. Grants Available for Healthy Community Projects

Small Community Healthy Eating and Physical Activity Grants are now available to WA organisations who want to run community physical activity and/or nutrition projects targeting adults.

The grants are being offered as part of the Swap It, Don't Stop It campaign, a Federal Government initiative which the Heart Foundation in WA is involved in promoting. The aim of the campaign is to raise awareness of the healthy choices that can help protect people from lifestyle related chronic diseases, beginning with an increase in physical activity and healthy eating. The campaign encourages people to make simple swaps such as 'swap watching for playing', 'swap big for small', 'swap often for sometimes' and 'swap sitting for moving'.

All projects should target West Australian adults aged between 25 and 50 years of age, particularly those with children.

Preference will be given to projects that target those living in low socio-economic areas, regional communities, Aboriginal people and people from non-English speaking backgrounds.

Applicants can apply for funding to enhance an established program or to establish a new program.

Examples include, but are not limited to the following:

- Setting up or expanding a walking group (eg. Heart Foundation Walking group)
- Conducting healthy eating supermarket tours or workshops (eg. FOODcents)
- Running 'Catch and Cook' or other cooking workshops/cook offs
- Developing local resources to support activities (eg. walking maps)
- Running local events relating to physical activity, healthy eating and/or healthy weight
- Promoting local participation in healthy lifestyle programs (eg. Diabetes WA Get on Track Challenge)
- Modification to local conditions or culture
- Adapting an existing program for a specific target group.

The Australian Government is funding Swap It Don't Stop through the National Partnership Agreement on Preventive Health, aimed at addressing the rising prevalence of lifestyle-related chronic diseases such as some cancers, heart disease and Type 2 diabetes.

The Community Healthy Eating and Physical Activity Grants aspect of Swap It Don't Stop It will provide up to \$5000 to incorporated community groups, not for profit organisations, general practice networks, government authorities and others to implement healthy eating and physical activity projects targeting adults.



FarmReady Reimbursement Grants Program

The Minister for Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry, Senator Joe Ludwig, has recently announced the expansion of the FarmReady program to include agritourism and food tourism training. A co-contribution from primary producers will also be introduced to provide more opportunities to access the program within the program budget and to encourage producers to invest in their own training.

Agritourism and Food Tourism

The Australian Government is making the successful FarmReady Reimbursement Grants Program accessible to primary producers and Indigenous land managers who wish to undertake training in agritourism and food tourism. Supporting training in agritourism and food tourism will build knowledge and create benefits for primary producers and their communities.

Agritourism and food tourism management – its marketing, customer relations, product development and coordination has been added as a new key learning area. Training providers are encouraged to register any relevant courses with FarmReady as soon as they are able.

65 per cent reimbursement

When FarmReady Reimbursement Grants reopens on 1 July 2011 primary producers and wild game harvesters will be reimbursed 65 per cent of their training course costs, up to \$1500 per financial year. Primary producers and wild game harvesters will be required to contribute the remaining 35 per cent to the cost of the approved course costs. This requirement does not apply to Indigenous land managers.

Individuals will still be able to access up to \$1500 per year for eligible training courses and the contribution by farmers will:

- encourage primary producers to invest in their own training
- make the available funding last longer
- and give an opportunity for more primary producers to access funding.

To assist people from more remote areas the additional

funding of up to \$500 per financial year is still available for associated reasonable travel, accommodation and childcare expenses.

Continuing on from last fortnight we had just dropped into the Adelaide River Inn.

After this we had a quick stopover at Pine Creek, a lot of these northern territory communities are steeped in war time history as they were bases for the armed forces during World War II. Pine Creek has a series of water gardens in the middle of town with lilies, fish and plenty of birdlife. There was also a large population of bats living in one of the trees in the main street. I'm not sure if I could put up with a tree full of squealing bats outside my place of residence or work as the noise was non stop and quite horrendous. We noticed that a few of the bats were motionless, we then realized that they must occasionally die in their sleep also.

Stopped at Edith Falls to have a quick dip, the water was cold and we figured anything could have been lurking in the undergrowth so it was time to get out. We did work on the theory that plenty of swimmers were already in the water and that if there were crocs, chances are they'd already eaten.

Was interested in kayaking in the Katherine Gorge, however they haven't flushed all the crocs out yet so that was off the agenda. Had a look at the hot springs, nice but not as beautiful as Mataranka.

Katherine Gorge was beautiful with a plentiful supply of water and ample grassed areas to laze around on. There are plenty of walks (especially for the serious bush walker) in Katherine Gorge with some of them being up to 50km. We did the walk to the top of the gorge which gave a great view and then wandered

back through the bush to the camp. Craig was going to purchase a sausage roll prior to our walk but it was more than the \$5 he had in his hand and he couldn't be bothered getting the back pack off and sorting through to find more money. So we decided on a choccy bar. Two turkish delights at the visitors centre at Katherine Gorge set us back the princely sum of \$7.70 (you'd think I would have learned from the Border store) so I then had to forage through the backpack looking for more money.

After a couple of days in Katherine we were on the road again with the aim of stopping in Tennant Creek that night. Stopped at the Daly Waters pub for lunch, fantastic meal and quite a quirky pub to have a look at. The following day we travelled to Alice Springs, booking in for four days. We would definitely go back to Alice Springs again, it had a lot of atmosphere with plenty of 'stuff to look at'.

While there we went to the Desert Park, \$20 per head but well worth the visit as you can spend hours looking around. We had elected to do a day tour of the West MacDonnell ranges, that way we could both look at the scenery. Our driver was to pick us up at 6:40am from the park. Alice had been in the grip of a cold snap and that morning was no different; we were about frozen by the time we got on the bus. After the pickups we made our way out along Larapinta Drive, stopping first at the Reverend John Flynn's gravesite. Pleasing to see on the signage that Lake Grace was included, we are one of two sites of the Rev Flynn's AIM Hospitals left in Australia. Following this the driver had to head back into town as apparently four travellers had been left off his manifest; after doing the pickup we headed to Simpsons Gap. If we thought we had been cold before we were mistaken; it was absolutely freezing at the gap as a lovely cold wind blew through it toward us. No wonder the tour guide had on a beanie, coat and gloves.

From Simpsons Gap we headed to Standley Chasm (named after the teacher Hilda Standley who apparently loved the spot); which is apparently best seen at noon as the sun penetrates to ground level. After getting back to the bus there was a cuppa to be had and some biccies and cake. A man walked around the side of the bus and I thought it must have been another driver for another tour bus. It wasn't; Colin (the driver) had simply taken off his beanie, coat and gloves and we now knew what he looked like.

We then drove to Ellery Creek Big Hole, which looked beautiful until you got close and you could see all the dead fish. Apparently the oxygen levels in the water had dropped too low for the fish to survive. From here we drove to the lookout by Glen Helen where you have a spectacular view of Mt Sonder. Then it was onto the bus and time for a leisurely lunch at the Glen Helen station; following lunch we were able to walk down to the Glen Helen gorge...quite beautiful...which has the Finke River flowing through it. Glen Helen had a good display of Albert Namatjirra prints.

Following from here we travelled to Ormiston Gorge where we could climb to the lookout, go down to the water or do both. We did the climb up to the top...by then it was hot (shorts weather) and we felt we'd seen enough water for the day so elected to sit in the shade shelter and talk to other tourists.

There were only 14 on the coach, quite a good mix, one of the pommy girls had amazing stamina because not only could she climb everything but she could talk at the same time. She must have had amazing lung capacity. There was another older couple (late 70's at least) who put us all to shame; they had done a day trip to Uluru the day before; getting back after midnight, before embarking on that day's trip. Our tour was run through AAT Kings and was well worth the money (\$116 per head).

The next morning the caravan park we were staying at put on a free breakfast of pancakes; they apparently do this every Sunday. They served just fewer than 400 people that morning; their record has been 900+. All the toppings were there to be put on. Once fed we adjourned to the Telegraph Station, this is the site of the Alice Springs (not really a spring just a puddle of water). The station was quite good to look at but it was interesting in the comments to read that some more cleaning was in order. We wandered from there to the spring; you only have to dig a couple inches into the Todd River to get water in that part of the river bed. Being a Sunday there were plenty of families enjoying the grassed areas and BBQ's.

The caravan park put on a variety of entertainment most nights of the week and that night was no different with a man playing his large selection of didgeridoos. Proving that you didn't need to spend a lot of money, he could even get a tune out of a length of PVC or a postal cylinder.

Although the MacDonnell Range caravan park was one of the dearer ones we stayed at (\$45 per night) it was an excellent park. The shower blocks were large and clean, the campers kitchens were excellent, plenty of seating and great cooking facilities. The site we were on was quite large with plenty of room to spread out and separated from the next site by shrubbery.

The next morning we left Alice Springs to travel to Kings Canyon via Hermansberg. When fueling up before leaving the woman serving behind the counter noticed our Lake Grace number plates, she was Yvette Sandells who grew up in Lake Biddy. Doesn't matter where you go!

Once on the road we considered going into Palm Valley which has the only growth of red cabbage palms in the world. We needed a permit to travel the Mereenie Loop so stopped at Hermansburg to get one, Craig asked the attendant at the service station what the conditions were like into Palm Valley. He said it was only 22km in, but quite rough road which would take about an hour to travel. He wasn't exaggerating. The first 18 were almost passable but the last 4 were horrendous...

thankfully when we arrived at the campsite (the 18km mark) Craig elected to unhitch the camper trailer for the remaining 4km. Thank goodness he did otherwise all the other travellers would have been talking about us (ie laughing at us) for years to come.

By this stage we weren't all that fussed about the rarity of the red cabbage palm and settled on doing the shorter walk. The road out seemed better, probably because we knew we were getting out of there!! From there we set out on the next 200km of gravel (with some small sections of bitumen) to Kings Canyon. There was grading on the road, some of it looked like it might have been going to be bitumised. Saw some dingos and some wild horses that looked to be in excellent condition. Prior to a quite sharp bend some roadworker with a sense of humour had placed a 44 gallon drum with the words "Liftum foot" written on it; following the bend there was another drum with "Put em down". Must have been a few upsets on that corner.

Kings Canyon Resort wasn't a patch on some of the other parks we'd stayed at. The sites were small, lighting around the camp was poor and quite a few of the amenities seemed to be out of order. Once we sat down for a quiet drink after setting up we found that the mouse plague had reached Kings Canyon. I have never seen so many mice running around, they were climbing over our feet and attempting to get into everything; we made sure we didn't give them anything to climb up to get into the camper or the vehicle. One man said that another camper who had spent the previous night in Erldunda (intersection of Lasseter's Way and Stuart Highway) had caught nine mice during the night in his caravan. You could hear everyone in tents squealing as the mice made themselves at home. While eating our tea we felt the odd spot of rain; once retired for the night a soft drizzly rain settled in.

After a night of steady soft rain it was time to get up and conquer the Kings Canyon. The pathway to the rim walk looked a bit like a goat trail so we elected to do the palm walk at the base of Kings Canyon; not sure that we would have seen any more from up top!! We will never know!! Pleasantly surprised as we ran into our tour guide, Colin Norris from ATTKings coach tours, who bussed us around the McDonnell ranges; he was out with another group showing them the sights.

The cooler weather was pleasant, however the colours of the ranges aren't as spectacular under grey skies. The range of flora is amazing and the birdlife quite prolific, though hard to get a look as they're always on the move. Have been a little disappointed in the facilities at this 'resort'; the toilets had obviously run out of water at the Canyon...all were full and unable to be flushed! The rain kept going all day.

The next morning we set out from Kings Canyon to make our way to Yulara, we had planned on camping there for the night and spending the following morning at the Olgas before heading out on the Central Road.

However the rain kept going and we were concerned that the Central Road may be closed (it had been closed between Laverton and Tjukayirla Roadhouse for anything 3 tonne and over) before we got on it. We had made a brief stop at Curtin Springs to ring up for road conditions. So after fueling up at Yulara and making a brief photo stop at the viewing carpark for Uluru (not often you see rain on the rock apparently) we made our way onwards. Needless to say the dirt had changed to mud and the slip sliding began.

On our way over we hadn't taken the opportunity to stop and look at Lasseter's Cave so we were determined to stop on the way back. Lasseter (of lost reef fame) had sheltered in this cave for approximately 25 days during January 1931 after his camels bolted with all of his provisions. Weak from starvation he set out hoping to meet up with his relief party (he had water) at Mt Olga but died at Irving Creek. It was a sobering thought, even in this day and age, to face the thought of being in such an isolated place with little in the way of provisions. After reading the plaque and looking for any clues pointing toward Lasseter's Reef we made our way back to the Patrol to discover the radiator was leaking.

Our camel hadn't bolted, in fact it was looking like it was going nowhere. While I quietly pondered where the nearest mechanic would be situated (Docker River was the nearest community and by the number of vehicles up on blocks I came to the conclusion there was no great depth of mechanical knowledge to be found there) Craig read up his 'book of quick fixes for keeping your vehicle on the road'.

Apparently there are three quick fixes for a leaky radiator; an egg white, pepper or a tablespoon of flour. So we separated our egg and added some pepper (figured that we doubled our chances) and poured it into the radiator and would you believe, the book was right and it fixed it!! So holding our breath we got back in the wagon and made our way toward Warakurna Roadhouse.

Possibly due to the damp weather we were the only tenants in the caravan park that night, however the lady from the Roadhouse was only too happy to chat about her favourite TV show, her children and internet gambling while we cooked our tea. After she mentioned how thoroughly she had cleaned the kitchen I left my crocs (footwear) outside not wanting to track dirt in, however the dingo must have thought they were tea so made off with one of them before realising it's mistake and dumping it in the dirt.

Giles weather station is situated at Warakurna, something else we had promised ourselves to look at on the way back. We fronted up in the morning for the guided tour and the opportunity to see them release a weather balloon. Giles is one of the most remote of the weather stations and their interest is what is happening in the upper atmosphere so they release the largest of the balloons out of all the weather stations in Australia. They release three per day (as opposed to four in other weather stations), each balloon has a device attached

to it that records data that it sends back to their computers. The weather balloon wouldn't be a metre across but expands to 15 metres (due to the thinner atmosphere) and rises to a height of 33 kilometres. It's lifespan is about 1.5 hours in the sky before plummeting back to earth. Instructions are on the device telling anyone who finds it how to dispose of it safely.

Giles was established in 1956 to provide weather information for the atomic weapons testing that was happening at Emu Plains and Maralinga; apparently they didn't want any nuclear drift making its way to the more built up areas. They have 55 years of records on site and although many of the devices are electronic they still have the 'old stuff' providing readings to make sure the 'new stuff' is working OK. Weather bureau staff volunteer to spend time at Giles weather station, usually for stints of six months. Craig, our tour guide of the facility, was a maintenance/cook person on a nine month contract, he apparently had 71 days to go. He reckoned that most of the bureau staff nodded off at the desk as generally there were blue skies and not a lot to report, however on the day we were there, there were plenty of clouds and wind so the meteorologist was busy recording data.

From Warakurna we continued to travel westward on the Central Road, travelling through Warburton, Tjukayirla arriving in Laverton at 6:20pm. Twenty minutes after the roadhouse (fuel) closed. However we still had full jerry cans so topped up the tank and made our way to Leonora where fuel stations were open. From there travelled through Menzies, Kalgoorlie and Coolgardie; before stopping for the night.

In the morning it was back on the road before stopping at Yellowdine for brekky (and coffee which is apparently quite important). Upon arrival back in Lake Grace at midday we showed our gratitude to the old Patrol for getting us back home (patched radiator and all) by giving her a wash. Many litres of water later you wouldn't have known she'd been anywhere.

In our modern world and with the rapid transmission of information globally, we are often required to make instant decisions on matters that we would be better off to consider for a while (to weigh up the implications) before we commit one way or the other.

How often do you get a phone message or email that requires this type of action? Alternatively we see a reporter put a microphone or camera in front of a politician, accident victim or disaster victim's face wanting an instant comment.

Although some of this instantaneous access to information has advantages we should also consider the downside consequences of inappropriate reactive responses. We see a person cornered and desperate when confronted.

One of the worrying things about the trouble we are experiencing at present with the cattle trade and now the questions about mining in the Mid-West is that we can find ourselves losing our cool and not taking time to clarify the issues. Situations like this need clear heads and well thought out resolutions.

On a personal level the mental stress is phenomenal. Men in particular are very focused on solving the immediate problem, seldom giving consideration to the peripheral issues ie. impact on families, communities, or the long term implications. If we are in this place, no matter what the problem, it is normal to search around for alternative solutions or options. These options are usually random, and at this stage, in no particular order. Research tells us that while we are in this state one proposition that will more than likely come into our thinking is suicide (it is estimated that as many as 80% of the population will think this way). It is also true that the vast majority will also put the thought aside very quickly. We realise this is not a good option, life is too precious, and no matter how bad the problem this isn't the solution. The problem is that a small percentage of us won't be able to get past the thought.

It is really important in times of distress and difficulty to keep asking our friends and loved ones "Are you OK?"

and if you feel it is necessary ask "are you having suicidal thoughts?". We know from research that talking about these things won't make it any worse and if a person is having dark thoughts they will feel relieved that someone has had the courage to ask "Are you OK mate?"

In many ways this is similar to first aid. With first aid we are taught to stabilise people, reassure them and get them to professional help.

Often people need professional help with their problems, as a first aider get people in contact with that help, but be assured that by you taking the trouble to be a mate who cares, can save a life. We all need this support and taking the time to do it in our busy world is really important.

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Solar Water Processor Pure Joy for Wayne

A Victorian company, F Cubed, has developed a world first in solar water desalination with a maintenance-free system that operates on solar energy.

F Cubed chief executive officer Peter Johnstone said the system should not need any maintenance over its lifetime with polycarbonate sheeting and panels providing a working life of 20 years.

Being a modular unit the Carocell system can be installed as a single panel for a family or in multiplied units for larger production volumes, based on your water requirements. It provides a flexible solution which allows the opportunity for additional units to be add on at a later date if required.

Mr Johnstone said the panels had a solar efficiency of 65 per cent which was double anything that had been achieved before using a direct solar distillation system. One of the uniqueness of the Carocell units is that is it not reliant on filters or membranes. This allows the system to process any water type including waste water, which previously could only be sent to evaporation ponds.

According to Mr Johnstone, water issues were a global concern and the development of the Carocell system provided a solution. "It is surprising how other government's have had a positive position in taking up alternative solutions in this area compared to Australia," he said. "We have more overseas interest and have been asked to consider moving our production plant overseas."

WA manufacturer Wayne Phillips has underground and scheme water on his 6.5 hectare rural property at Clackline but with varying water quality he installed a F Cubed system three months ago. "We like to rely on our own bore water for washing and domestic appliances but we don't drink it," Mr Phillips said. "You can drink the scheme water but it's not the best."

Not only can the hint of salt or chlorine interfere with its taste but his water bill even contains a disclaimer saying the water may not be drinkable. "We don't want to drink potentially contaminated water," Mr Phillips.

With the F Cubed system, bore ware is pumped into an 800 litre tank and gravity-fed through a standard 12mm reticulation pipe to two desalination panels. The two 1.1 metre wide by 2.9m long panels purify about 100 litres every day to provide 50 litres of safe, high quality, potable water. The water evaporates onto a UV resistant film and runs down to a channel at the bottom which is piped into the drinking water containers.

Excess water runs into a separate channel and the excess salts are flushed out of the system. Mr Phillips said the water was pure enough to use in batteries and the radiator although he had only tried the radiator option so far.

"If there's no sun, it will run slower but it still produces on days with a bit of cloud," Mr Phillips said. "The water flow through the desalination unit can be adjusted and the unit needs no maintenance as there are no filters." His unit did not need any restrictor valves or a regulator as it did not have to cope with mains water pressure but the panels did come with a check valve for use on mains pressure.

Mr Phillips said when he set up a larger holding tank, the purified water could also be used on the vegetable garden, either on its own or as a shandy, as some plants were not salt-tolerant and died quickly with bore water use. He said the units did not cost anything to run and had many practical applications. "I think the units will be especially useful in tropical areas where there's a high chance of water contamination with things such as cholera or dysentery," Mr Phillips said.

"It's a shame so much energy is put into bottled water because it's dysfunctional, especially with the wasted plastics." Mr Phillips said excess water could be processed and stored in sealed tanks until needed.

"Everybody should have one on their roof," Mr Phillips said.

Murray Stanton went delving back into the old records to remind everyone present at this year's Turkey Day event of golf club members past achievements, embarrassments and points of interest.


For the Women:

- In 1986 Ned Dixon and Allan McWhirter lost by default while Peter Taylor and Geoff Houston were in third place with a massive 50pts.
- In 1989 Phil Clarke and Lee Edwards were runners-up with 51pts
- In 1990 Phil Clarke and Brian Bidwell were runners-up with 48 pts. Seventeen out of that year's field played in 2011.
- In 1991 Chris Carruthers and Dogga Taplin won the feathers with 32pts.
- In 1992 Greg Thornton and Fred Eggert were runners-up while Steve Harvey and Allan McWhirter won the feathers with 33 pts.
- In 1993 Ed Naisbitt and Greg Thornton took home the turkeys with a whopping 55pts while Rex and Bob Walker got the feathers with 33pts.
