Bibliophiles Very Nearly Up in Arms

It could have become a war of words between State Library users and the politicians who represent them if the State Government had embraced plans to cut funding to Inter Library loans following an independently chaired Agency Expenditure Review which found that the daily delivery service in the metropolitan area was not considered the most effective use of taxpayer's money. It hasn't been clarified as to whether the Independent Chair reads for pleasure.

The matter of the courier service was dealt with in Parliament last week and the Hon John Day, Minister for Culture and the Arts was quick to state that the State Government had always recognised the importance of the concept. Lake Grace Library had their courier service reduced to once a week many years ago and it appears the metropolitan area will have their service reduced from daily to twice per week.

These reductions are understandable and will still meet the needs of most library users. However it is proof once again that it is important to remain vigilant and ready to protest if the government looks ready to reduce services to the community.

For the uninitiated the Interlibrary exchange gives readers the opportunity to access a book, talking book or DVD that may not be held locally but could be a stock item at another library. The book once ordered is then

despatched to Lake Grace and once the customer has finished with it, it's returned home.

It's a fabulous facility for avid readers (who can soon work their way through the shelves of the Lake Grace library) and is useful for anyone doing research. Over the previous 6 months staff at the Lake Grace Library have ordered in 150 books, CD's (talking books) and DVD's for a wide range of customers who will be ordering not just for pleasure but also for their work.

Others who would also be severely disadvantaged if the interlibrary exchange was ever halted would be the vision impaired who may have lost the ability to read but haven't lost the ability to enjoy a good book! The 'talking books' are also a great hit with the farmers during seeding and harvest and also with truck drivers.

Axing funding for the inter-library exchange would significantly reduce the size of the library collection available to people living outside Perth. The Australian Library and Information Association estimated 355,000 books travelled between the Perth metropolitan area and country libraries each year via the State Library courier service.



Septic Tanks, Water Tanks and Cranes

It may not have looked like it this past fortnight, but works are still busily progressing on the new St John Ambulance WA Ltd Lake Grace Sub centre.

While we did not achieve "lockup" by the 24th June, we are steadily working towards that next goal.

On Monday 4th July a 37 tonne crane capable of lifting 50 tonne was on site to lift the 20 metre long roof sheets onto the main floor roof and the 10 metre long sheets onto the garage roof. Oh... and just for fun we swung the crates containing the insulation over the whole main building from east to west.....because that's what you do if you have a big crane on site!

The roof sheeting arrived from Stratco on an extended truck under pilot escort. The truck is able to split in the middle of the tray and extend, and the end of the tray can also extend. Once the truck is unloaded it can shrink back to normal semi trailer size. Clever!

South Coast Cranes owner operator Arron Condren made the task of lifting the roof sheets onto the roof look easy. AK Homes Project Supervisor Matt Cooper and our very own Neville Moulden were in charge to make sure that the slings were positioned perfectly, for a precision touchdown on the roof purlins. Matt and Neville were much more assured about their work than the bystanders, who were more than a little nervous with just two slings holding the roof sheet packs somewhat flat.

Talking of bystanders, who would have thought that Mary Naisbitt was a crane fanatic? It was all we could do but hold Mary back from wanting to clamber up into the crane cab and ride home to Albany with Arron.

Roof sheeting in place, next up it was AK Homes sub contractors, Two Brothers Roofing, and the busy team of Luke Heywood, Nathan Lowe and Caleb Irving. Tuesday saw our intrepid (ex sub mariner) Luke and the team, insulate and install the garage roof (complete with guttering), the sheeting of the front verandah, and the commencement of the main building roof. By Wednesday the 6th July the roof was completed. No fuss, bang, and we're done.

But that is the glamorous part of the fortnight. Lets tell you about the all the hard work out the back of the building, that is somewhat less glamorous, but very important.

The main achievement in the last fortnight is the installation of water to the building, installation of all of the stormwater system, the installation of the 2 * 23,000Ltr CBH "Grass Roots" sponsored tanks (they have arrived, been installed, and been paid for since last LLN, our thanks to Farmworks for donating the balance of \$588 that was owing over the \$5,000 grant funds by CBH), and most importantly the installation of the septic tank system, and pump over system to the main sewerage line behind the Sportsman's Club.

Trevenen Plumbing and their sub contractor S & L Trevenen worked in concert to dig lots of holes and trenches, fill them with concrete objects and pipes, and then fill them in and compact them.

First job. Trench 40 metres and bring the water to the building. While you are at it, install conduit so that the telecommunications can also be run in the same trench, and you may as well install the garage roof stormwater system while you are there.

Second job, dig a hole big enough to put in one 1.50m diameter septic tank and two 1.2m diameter septic tanks. Lift the tanks into place, then compact them in.

Then, dig a trench 23 meters due south of the septic tanks, then dig 65m due east and link the 3 new septic tanks to the main sewer line via a submersible pump. While that is being done, install a new trafficable manhole at the junction of the Sportsman's Club and the new St John input line. (Our thanks to the Shire of Lake Grace for the new trafficable manhole).

If that was not enough, Tiger Spark Electrical were called to site to install power to the submersible pump and also to install a new power supply near the Sportsman's Club Concrete tank. This new supply will operate a pressure pump (gardens) and pressure washer for cleaning the ambulances. Thanks to the boys for getting to site at short notice to make best use of the open trenches.

The next stage was to trench across between the Sportsman's Club Tank (east of block) and the new CBH sponsored tanks (west side of the block). This will allow all 3 tanks to equalise and be able to be used by the new pressure pump.

Then we needed to dig 24 metres of stormwater from the new building, to the Sportsman's Club Tank, and then dig 18 metres from the building to the CBH sponsored tanks so that all the stormwater is captured on site.

Confused yet?? At each stage of the works, photographic records have been taken, and measurements have been scribed. This will mean that all of the stormwater, septic/sewerage water, power supply and telecommunications can all marked up on "as constructed" drawings.

Our sincere thanks to Trevenen Plumbing (Joe, Rohan and Mitch) and S & L Trevenen (Simon) for the efficient and diligent work, including the compacting of all trench lines so as not to compromise the new driveways that will be installed. (Yes Joe, Simon does make you look good!)

We would like to thank those members of the community who have ventured onto site to have a look around. The project team welcomes your visits, but we wish to remind all visitors that this is an active worksite. All visitors please make yourself known to the site foreman/supervisor, if you are on site during active work stages. At all other times please come and have a look but always be safety conscious.

Bendigo Bank Visit Lake Grace

Following the closure of Westpac a meeting was held on Friday 1st July with representatives from Bendigo Bank to give interested parties an opportunity to ask a few questions about what was involved in setting up a new bank in Lake Grace.

Martyn Neville (Regional Manager), Alex Dickson (Community Banking General Manager), Tim Batger (Regional Manager Agribusiness WA) spent a couple of hours at the Lake Grace CWA; eager to answer questions that arose.

The decision for Lake Grace is whether they would want a stand-alone bank, an agency or become a sub branch of another branch, perhaps Kulin. If Lake Grace did establish a sub branch it could then become a stand alone as they grew and fully established themselves.

Bendigo Bank is the fifth biggest bank in Australia with all profits from Rural Bank (the agricultural branch of Bendigo) remaining in Australia. Kulin was the very first community bank in WA, setting up around 17 years ago. Bendigo pride themselves on their community involvement and support and the \$400k that they have given out in Kulin in the way of community grants is testimonial to this.

A community bank is a franchise of Bendigo Bank and has a Board of Directors. The volunteers who form this committee don't have access to private information, they are there to steer the ship. As the branch would come under the umbrella of Bendigo Bank all rules and regulations of banking practise are fulfilled.

A sub branch or agency could be up and running in months, however a full branch would take longer as capital would need to be raised. Bendigo Bank has 500 branches around Australia, 300 of these are community banks; they are proud of their record of never having closed a community bank. This fact along is enough to give any regional community peace of mind.

A community bank gives the community empowerment, the opportunity to oversee the style of banking available within their own town. Sixty million dollars sees most bank branch businesses break even; this is not an unattainable target for Lake Grace. A branch does not make money from an everyday transaction account which sees money come in and money go out. The real money is in lending, term deposits, insurance and superannuation. Bendigo's Rural Bank currently hold 12% of the Agribusiness debt for WA, they would like to grow that to over 20%.

Questions were raised as to whether opening a Bendigo Bank branch could threaten the Bankwest branch and also how well a new branch would go when there was already an established bank in town. Bendigo Bank assured they weren't there to drive Bankwest from the community, simply fill the gap that Westpac had left. Bendigo Bank had set up in other communities where there was already a bank and all of those branches were still running. Martyn Neville felt that competition wasn't a factor, but it was vital for the

community to support the proposal.

A branch in Lake Grace would also be able to support satellite communities such as Newdegate by visiting them on a regular basis and providing a storefront for banking for anyone within their community and surrounds.

Bendigo has banking products for everyone; farming, business, families, children and non profit organisations. The thought of changing banks can seem bigger than Ben Hur, particularly when there are regular direct deposits or debits aligned with an account. Bendigo Bank's Alex Dickson assured those present that they would be able to help any customers through that process.

The next step for Lake Grace is to organise a public meeting where the community can decide what they want. From there they will elect a steering committee that will drive the project forward.

Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC

Each of the soldiers listed on the Lake Grace Honour Roll will be featured in the Lakes Link News, as close as possible to 100 years from their enlistment. It is now 100 years, 2 weeks and 3 days since Stewart McKay signed up.

McKAY – STEWART: Born at Ballater, County Aberdeen, Scotland, he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on 20/06/1916, at the age of 22 years and 9 months, naming his mother Eunice McKay of Cross Hill, Glasgow as his next of kin, his father having been deceased. He was 5 feet 5½ inches tall, (166.5cms.) and weighed 125 lbs, (56.8kgs.), was of a ruddy complexion with blue eyes and light brown hair, and gave his occupation as farmer.

His training was at Blackboy Hill, and he was appointed to the 8/5 Pioneers, stationed with the 73 Depot Unit, and after 3 months training he was promoted to Corporal, and moved to No.7, NCO school. Here he either received further training, or more likely, he became a trainer, (or both), and it becomes obvious his Company is involved with Engineering. After a month, he moved to No. 22 Depot, ten days later to No. 89 Depot, and then in a further three weeks, he was appointed to the 24th / 16 Reinforcements, still as a Corporal, and it is probable he was performing a training role during this period. On the 23rd of December, he embarked the *Berrima* at Fremantle, arriving at Devonport, England, on 16/02/1917.

On marching into the Pioneers Training Battalion at Larkhill, with the 5th Pioneers Battalion, Corporal McKay's rank reverted back to Private. The next day he was made Engineer Division Pioneer Sergeant, (E.D.P. Sgt.) and three weeks later, E.D.P. Corporal, as from 6/03/1917. Two weeks later E.D.P. Corporal McKay was detached for duties to Parkhouse No. 3 Camp. It is most probable that these changes in rank, and periods of service in different places was to do with a role as Instructor or Tutor. Three months later, McKay's rank reverted back to Lance Corporal at Fovant, and a month later he was transferred to Engineer Details, Brightlingsea, at Fovant, where his rank again reverted back to Private while on the march. From here he was 'taken on strength', with Engineers Field Duties.

Some weeks later, on 2/9/1917, Lance Corporal Stewart McKay was accused of the crime of being absent without leave from midnight to 8.30 am, (8½ hours), so he was reduced to the Australian rank of Sapper, by Major Cutler, and had to forfeit one day's pay. On 31/10/1917, Sapper McKay was posted overseas to France from Southampton, after marching in from the Australian General Base Depot, where he was 'taken on strength' with the 5th Field Company Engineers at Rouelles, on November 3rd. Three days later, he was in the Field in Belgium, where he served for a lengthy period of over three months, before having to be admitted to hospital in Belgium, sick, with scabies. A week later Sapper McKay was discharged from



hospital, and rejoined his unit.

On 18/3/1918, Sapper McKay was detached from his unit to the 4th Australian Field Brigade, for duty. After a lengthy period of seven months duty, Sapper Stewart McKay went on leave to the United Kingdom from France for a little over two weeks, before rejoining his Company in the battle Field.

The War was drawing to the end, only a week or two away from the Armistice, but Sapper McKay remained in the Field for another three months, and was detached from his unit on 27/2/1919, and attached to the 7th Field Company for duty. On the 20th of March, Sapper McKay returned to the United Kingdom from France for Industrial Employment.

On 1/4/1919, Sapper Stewart McKay was granted leave for three months. He spent time in the north of Scotland at the Agricultural College, Aberdeen, where he involved himself in farming, and after a further extension of leave, he attended the Aberdeen University, also with a farming interest. When his leave was over, he reported back to headquarters in London, where he was soon to embark the Horse Transport, *Plassy* for the return trip to Fremantle, and disembarked on 25/11/1919. Sapper Stewart McKay received the 1914/15 STAR, the British War Medal and the Victory medal. He gave his religion as Presbyterian, and his regiment number was 3305.

Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC (cont.)

Before going to the War, Stewart McKay had taken up a block of land north of Lake Grace next to Jack Marshall's, and the pair teamed up and lived and worked together, sharing equipment to the advantage of each other in developing their farms. Jack also wished to go to the war, but was unfit, so he watched over Stewart's farm in his absence.

While Stewart was still in England, he became engaged to Constance Thompson who was from a family of 14, having met her manufacturing ammunition. She took him home to "Kilmore", County Tipperary, Ireland, to meet her family, where they found him to be a very intelligent fellow. It is believed that in about 1920, her father paid for her and her sister Mabel, both of them nurses, to come to Australia so Constance could marry Stewart, and they then named their farm "Kilmore". It was not until 1923 that the partnership arrangement with Jack Marshall changed, and to establish a value and sort out the machinery, they held an auction, where each partner bought back the gear they wanted. When Cecil Huggins wished to leave his farm nearby, he sold on terms which enabled Stewart to expand his farming operation.

Stewart McKay with his fiancé Constance Thompson

Stewart McKay was active in Community affairs. He was secretary of the Lake Grace Agricultural Show committee, and the local Race

committee, and he was a member of the first Lake Grace Roads Board, begun in 1923. At Community functions he was often available with an item (including the Burns Club), and contributed with Scottish recitations or songs, a la, Harry Lauder, which received a hearty reception, Constance was also very musical. The McKay's had three children, Betty, Fergus and Peter. Sadly, Constance passed away at a young age in 1941. Later, Stewart married again but the marriage did not last. Stewart McKay left the Lake Grace District in the early 1950s, which is most likely when he became an accountant for the State Housing Commission. He died in 1960 at the age of 67 years, and is buried in the Karrakatta Cemetery.

Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC

Each of the soldiers listed on the Lake Grace Honour Roll will be featured in the Lakes Link News, as close as possible to 100 years from their enlistment. It is now 100 years and 4 days since Francis Griffths signed up.

GRIFFITHS – FRANCIS AUSTIN: Born at Gladstone in South Australia, in June of 1898, he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force a month after his 18th birthday, on the 3rd of July, 1916. He was a farmer, and at a height of 5 feet 8 ½ inches, (174cms) and weighing 140 lbs (64kgs), he had a fresh complexion with brown eyes and brown hair. His address was given as "Collingrove", Bullock Hills Road, East Wagin, and his parents' signature, father George Henry and mother Harriet May Griffiths, had to be witnessed, allowing him to enlist, a requirement due to his young age. His training was at Blackboy Hill, being assigned to the 7th Reinforcement/51st Battalion, and during this period he had a lengthy sickness of 17 days with measles. It is also noted that Private Griffiths did not wish to make a will

It was on the 9th of November 1916 when Private Griffiths embarked the Argyllshire at Fremantle to proceed to England, and he disembarked at Devonport on 10/1/1917 and was immediately admitted to the group hospital of the 13th Training Battalion, Codford, suffering from bronchitis, and on his recovery a week later, continued his training there. On the 19th of March, he proceeded overseas from Folkestone, to France, from where they marched in to Etaples to the 4th Australian Divisional Base Depot. About a month later he was taken on strength, which brought him right into the battlefield, where the 51st Battalion had been holding the line on the Western Front for some months. However, his service only lasted another two months, until the battle of Messines, when he was killed in action in Belgium, at the age of 19 years, on the 10th of June 1917.

Private Griffiths was buried just SW of Messines, in the Messines Ridge British Cemetery, Memorial plot, Row B, where a cross with all details marks the sight of the Late Soldier. Francis Austin Griffiths's name is located at panel 152 in the Commemorative Area at the Australian War Memorial. Also buried next to him in the same row, were three more soldiers of his Battalion who were killed in the same incident. The effects of the late soldier were returned, ex the "Ulysses" to his father Geo Griffiths, while it was four years before he received the Memorial Scroll and Memorial Plaque. His medals, the 1914/15 STAR, the British War Medal, the Victory medal, and King's message had been sent earlier. The late Private Griffiths was of the Church of England faith; service No. 2912.

Following Private Griffiths death, the Red Cross Society released files of three 'witness accounts' of the incident;

 I knew Griffiths fairly well. We often had a talk. He was in the same reinforcement, the 7th and his number would be about right for that re/inf. There was no other Griffiths in that re/inf. He was a dark short man, rather thin, age about 22, clean shaven, regular features. Near Battalion Headquarters at Messines a shell, about June 8th or 10th, killed six, including Griffiths. I saw this happen. He was killed instantly and I was at the spot two hours after. It was extremely bad luck, as it was very unusual for a shell to get near that spot. The cemetery was 2 or 3 miles away and I think the body would be taken there. *Info, Private Agren, No.3015*.

- Griffiths, Bridson, Corporal Henry and another whose name I cannot remember, were killed and four wounded by a shell in a shell hole at the back of Battalion Headquarters at Messines, the 9th got out and told us. I saw the bodies of the 4 who were killed. They were buried in the vicinity of the shell hole where they were killed and a cross erected with the 4 names on it. Info, WH Smart No.2987.
- It was well known in the Battalion that Griffiths was killed by fire at Messines. He would have been buried. Another man Jackson was killed by the same shell, both killed outright. This was back near Headquarters. He was a very nice lad, quite a boy, a good boy. Witness, H Rumbold, No.2973.

Before Francis Griffiths went into Camp, he had a clearing sale at Jaloran, on his farm. Elder Shenton & Co advertised having been favoured with instructions from Mr F Griffiths, who is leaving shortly to join the Australian Imperial Forces, to sell by public auction, date - 22/03/1916. It was a fairly complete farming plant, including 200 ewes and lambs, 4 weaners, 3 sows, 4 horses and horse works, plough, disc cultivator, disc drill, chaffcutter, buggy, sulky, tip dray, and many useful sundries. Also, up-to-date household furniture, sideboards, couches, American leather dining suite, bedroom suite and kitchen utensils and numerous sundries. He was so well established, and gave it all up; one cannot help be astounded at the sacrifice Private Francis Austin Griffiths made for his country!

Census is Coming

Media Release

As Western Australia advances closer to the 2016 Census of Population & Housing night on **Tuesday 9 August**, the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) is finalising its plans to reach more than 2.3 million people and 960,000 households (2011 Census) across the state.

The Tuesday, 9 August Census is predicted to be the largest ever online event in Australia's history, with two-thirds of the population expected to complete the form online, helping to make this Census the most efficient, cost effective and environmentally friendly ever.

Census State Director David Waymouth said it was exciting to see the enormous operation beginning to take shape after more than four years of planning. "We've recruited about 39,000 extra staff and built the systems in anticipation of millions of people logging on to their computers, tablets or smartphones to complete the Census. It will be our moment to pause and play a part in helping shape the future of Australia's education, health, transport and infrastructure," Mr Waymouth said.

"Over its 105 year history, the Census has helped to guide trillions of taxpayer dollars to every corner of Australia, so everyone has an interest in making sure they're counted, ensuring Australia remains a world leader in Census participation and accuracy." Over the next two months the ABS will participate in events around the country to promote the Census and answer questions about how the Census will change in 2016.

"From late July to early August the majority of households across the country will receive a letter from the ABS, addressed 'To the Resident', Mr Waymouth said. "The letter will include a unique login code and instructions on how to complete the Census online. "For those people who can't complete the Census online or wish to complete a paper form, this can be easily requested.

"The Census is compulsory and can be completed securely in around 30 minutes for one person. It's an easy way for Australians to take a moment and make a



CEO's Corner

Newdegate Rejuvenation Committee Newdegate ILU's

At its 27 June 2016 meeting, the Newdegate Rejuvenation Committee resolved to name the four unit development "Arbury Estate". Arbury Estate, in Nuneaton Warwickshire England, is the family home of Sir Roger Newdigate (Newdegate), who inherited the Estate in 1734, after whom the town of Newdegate is named. The property remains in the family and is now the home of 4th Viscount Daventry. The Estate currently comprises of Arbury Hall, park and immediate surrounding farms and includes a mixed portfolio of let residential properties including the majority of Astley village and a commercial estate.

It was further resolved at the meeting to use local flora to name each of the four units. The selected names are Acacia, Melaleuca, Hakea and Grevillia. A name plate on each unit will include a sketch of the flowering plant.

Newdegate Hall

With the completion of the "Well Aged" Units and the Lesser Hall upgrade, the Committee is now seeking comment on the future development of the Newdegate Hall and old medical centre. Over recent years there have been a number of suggestions put forward, namely:

Retain but re-clad (remove the asbestos) and use the Hall for

or,

 Demolish the Hall and use the space as a grassed area for residents of the Units and as a green space entry to the town.

The Committee notes that the relocation of the "old station" building to the Recreation reserve has seen the annual Anzac Service event also move to that location. Moreover, activities undertaken in the Hall could be accommodated within the Recreation precinct. With building maintenance costs escalating and impacting on both general and SAR's rates, one needs to ensure that

all buildings and facilities are delivering value for electors/ratepayers.

- looked at elected members fees being set in accordance with the range determined by the Salaries and Allowances Tribunal;
- prioritised road works following feedback from councillors;
- reviewed insurance cover and maintenance requirements for staff housing and public buildings; and,
- assessed plant and equipment requirements for the coming year.

Organisation Restructure

Officer, will be responsible for Council meeting coordination, agendas, councillor support and governance matters such as Council and Committee minutes, maintenance of policy, delegations and gifts registers amongst other responsibilities.

Community Services Officer, Cheryl Chappell will continue in her role, under the supervision of the Deputy CEO, (when appointed) continuing to provide services to the Shire communities and those opportunities that may arise from the upcoming review of the Strategic Community Plan later this year.

Following the restructure, former Manager Community Services, Lee Holben completed her term of contract on 1 July 2016. On behalf of the Shire, I wish to acknowledge the contribution Lee made to the improvement of community services provided by the Shire over the past four years and wish her well with her future endeavours.

Termite Attack – Lake Grace Townsite Trees

- Local Government Property Local Law 2015;
- Standing Orders Local Law 2015

The purpose and effect of the local laws are as follows: Local Government Property Local Law 2015 *Purpose:* To regulate the care, control and management of all property of the local government except thoroughfares.

Effect: To control the use of local government property. Some activities are permitted only under a permit or under a determination and some activities are restricted or prohibited. Offences are created for inappropriate behaviour in or on local government property.

Standing Orders Local Law 2015

Purpose: Is to provide the rules for the conduct of meetings of the Council, Committees and electors.

Effect: To result in:

- the orderly and effective conduct of meetings;
- greater community understanding of the meeting process;
- better decision making by the Shire; and
- better outcomes from decisions made.

Health Local Law 2016

Purpose:

To provide a statutory means to effectively control issues that have the ability to adversely impact on the health and well being of the community.

Effect:

To allow health related issues to be sufficiently controlled so as to provide an acceptable standard for the maintenance of public health in the community.

New WA Award and Minimum Pay Rates Now Available

Wageline has updated the minimum rates for awardfree employees and the pay rates in Wageline's WA Award Summaries.


