Maria Regina Church turns 50



Lake Grace Catholic Community is celebrating the Golden Jubilee of *Maria Regina* Church. Opened and blessed at 10.30 in the morning of the 31st of July 1955 by the late Bishop L.J. Goody, then Bishop of Bunbury, the church has always stood as a vibrant symbol of the faith of the community. It was through the inspiration of Fr J.J. O'Mahony, who was then administering Lake Grace as Parish Priest of Wagin, that the need of the community to have a permanent place of worship became a reality. The beautiful brick church was built under the supervision of Mr Stan Cost, architect and builder. Funding for the church was generated through donation from generous people.

The opening and blessing of the church took place in the presence of a large crowd of

parishioners, Members of Parliament, local town officials and visitors. During the ceremony, Bishop Goody described the great importance of the event for the district and commented on the significance of the chosen title of the church, *Maria Regina*, a Latin phrase which means Queen Mary.

After the 10.30 am ceremony, luncheon was served in the Lake Grace Hall catered by the Catholic Ladies. Invited guests, Senator Seward and the Hon. J.M. Thomson M.L.C., spoke of the significance of that great occasion and of the honour they felt at attending the ceremony of the blessing and opening of such an important and imposing building.

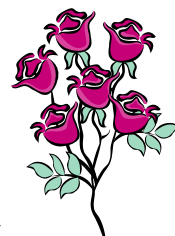

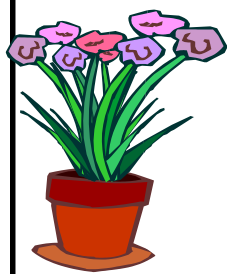

Former Lake Grace C Grade Hockey Player Brings Home State Gold Medal

Congratulations to Matthew O'Neill for his selection in the "Under 18 Men's State Hockey Team". This was the last of the state hockey teams selected. All the others had been training for several weeks by the time W.A. picked theirs. In fact some state coaches thought W.A. was keeping the team a secret!! Trials for this team lasted 7 anxious weeks; Matthew's goal was to make it through the first cut! This was followed by 6 weeks of training 3 times a week in Perth.

On one 06:30 training three state teams trained on the same turf - under 18 men's with Matthew, under 16 state school girl's with cousin, Fleur O'Neill and under 21 women's, with 2nd cousin, Courtney Gray! All three started their hockey with Debbie Cummings as coach in Lake Grace "C" grade - I wonder how often this scenario has happened to any other team or club in Lake Grace?

The team flew to Sydney and went on to Wollongong on July 2nd, starting the tournament on July 5th. The team started well with two wins, then slowly regressed to two draws and two losses, finally pulling their finger out for a further win which scraped them into 4th place.

WA then faced Queensland who had previously beaten them 8-2 and had only been beaten once in the lead up. What a match - the crowd were on their feet, then on the edge of their seats as half time came with a score of 1-1. Mobile phones from anxious families rang as they went into the second half and scored the necessary goal that took the under 18's into the grand final.

The team then drew Victoria in the grand final and beat them 4-2, winning back to back gold medals for some of the team.

The tournament finished with an ecstatic group of

young talented men on July 17th, then straight back to school and study for half the team. A great experience. Thank you to Lake Grace Hockey Club for the excellent foundations you obviously laid.

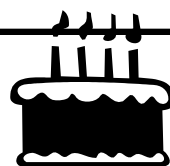

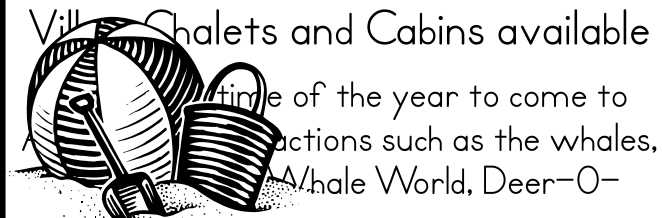

The “Happening” Comes to Lake Grace

On Thursday 21st of July, a group of South Africans visited Lake Grace on their way through to Hyden. They were a team from Johannesburg who had come to Bunbury for a Christian Youth Retreat known as “Happening”. Youth from around the Anglican Diocese of Bunbury joined them for three days at the Bunbury Cathedral Grammar School where they continued a spiritual journey that began last year when a group of youth from Bunbury went to Diocese of the High Veldt in South Africa. Therefore, the three days in Bunbury was also a time of the renewal of friendships and the making of new ones.

Each of the visitors was presented with a forged gum leaf by ‘Smith’ Peter Cumming from Wagin, whose message to each was, “Let God be the anvil on which your faith is shaped”. Tania Spencer proved to be a great ambassador for the town as well as for the sheep project and many of our guests were blown away that such a small community could achieve something like this. Thanks also to the RSL who allowed us to use the Memorial Hall for the provision of refreshments which consisted of Tim Tam’s and Coca-Cola. Apparently the South Africans could not get enough of these.



VP Day Celebrations



As this year is the 60th year since VP DAY was declared, plans are being made for the Lake Grace Community to celebrate the occasion on Monday 15th of August.

A street parade, from the school to the Memorial Hall is planned, where we will have the Bugle Call, and unveil a commemorative plaque. We will then go to the Town Hall, for a Thanksgiving Service

and to honour the men and women who served in the War from this district.

A small display is being arranged, and all are invited to bring and share afternoon tea. The whole community is invited to attend. Further details will be given next issue. A request is also made for any memorabilia or photos to display, these can be left at the Telecentre.

Memories...

There are only a few people local who remember the first VP Day – here are some of their memories.

Alan Thiel - "At 7 o'clock in the morning while trying to burn up some wood from an old tree, the neighbour came over and told me, 'You don't have to go to school today – the war is over!' Later the town began its celebration, Mr Franks having donated a beast, which was barbecued on a rotisserie at the Show Grounds, about where the tennis courts are today. You could get a piece of cow meat cooked to what ever colour you wanted, from black, red or just right!"

Joyce Gilson - was a teenager at Kadina S.A., just coming into the workforce as a telephonist, and the town went wild with excitement, with dancing in the streets and much joyous celebration. She hated having to leave at 3pm to go to work on the exchange. However, more vivid in her memory was the celebration at the homecoming of the many prisoners of war and service people, later. At the Victoria Square by the Memorial, a dais was erected, and "Oh, I felt so sorry for the returned Prisoners of War, some of them so sick they were carried in their beds. Their limbs had shrunk so small, and they took a long time to get better".

Laurence Oliver - does not remember VP Day, but still has two VP medallions from school given to him almost 60 years ago. The Tarin Rock school was closed and doing lessons by correspondence. He thinks the medals were sent to him. He also still has an identity card issued from Bunbury, and some unused ration tickets. (Tea, sugar, clothes, butter and petrol were some of the goods rationed at the time). Ration tickets were only good for a certain time, and the next issue would be a different colour. Oliver's were rationed 4 gallons of petrol per month to start

their Case petrol / kero tractor! Laurence also brought to mind "Price Fixing". Now unused, he told of a set of harrows which reached the fixed reserve price at auction. Eight people were still in the bidding for it, so their names were put in a hat, and the winner of the draw was allowed to purchase it!

Allan Zweck - I was a 7 year old in grade two, (at Blyth, S.A..) and arriving at school we were told the war was over, so we were allowed to do as we liked. The four bells in town were kept ringing most of the morning. I went with an older brother to firstly ring the fire bell, then we helped with the big bell at one of the churches, ironically, a gift from the Kaiser 1, in 1888, and it almost lifted my brother off the ground! There was a street parade, and festivities combined with a picnic at the oval. During the war, I remember many times the big yellow aeroplanes that would fly over our place, so low that they appeared to just miss the top of our barn – they were pilots in training from Mallalla.

Don Chappell only remembers a little of the celebration at the Show Ground, though at war time he remembers the "black-outs", the burning of charcoal for gas producers, and that there was a committee who arranged a "send off" for all who were called up and went away. The cows would get milked early and, at a dance arranged for the farewell, the copper would get boiled to make coffee and tea. He often remembers though with much sadness the loss of his brother Jack. Jack was a pilot in the Air force and was on his 25th bombing flight – it was the last operational flight he was expected to do, and also the first of the "1000 Bomber" raids over Germany. (From England, they put 1000 Bombers in the air that night!) His plane was one of 31 brought down in that raid, and he lost his life over Munich. Jack's dedication to serve is an inspiring story

Lake Grace Sub Centre Nominated for Top Awards

Eddie McGuire might have coined the phrase "and what another exciting week it has been in football". Well what an exciting week it has been in St John Ambulance.

It was confirmed recently that the Lake Grace Sub Centre has been nominated as Sub Centre of the Year in the annual St John Ambulance Awards. In a field of 112 volunteer sub centres, Lake Grace has been short listed in the final six.

To add to the surprises, Ambulance Officer Meg Marshall has been nominated for the St John Ambulance Volunteer of the Year Award. At any one time there are 1600 St John Ambulance volunteers and Meg has been confirmed as one of the six finalists for this award.

It will be a big year for the Lake Grace Sub Centre at the annual conference as there will also be the presentation of service medals to eight of our long serving sub centre members. Shirley Elliott, Lois Dickens, Henk Doelman, Ray Bird, Terry Gladish, Phil Franks, Lesley Duckworth and Oliver Farrelly will each receive their service medals for 12 years of service, and some will receive a 'bar' that signifies an additional 5 years of service.

SCIENCE AND STUFF

The Nobel Prize winner, Jack Kilby, died at the age of 81 in June. Jack played a key role in the invention of the "monolithic integrated circuit", now better known as the microchip.

DID YOU KNOW lightning strikes the Earth about 8 million times a day? The temperature of a bolt of lightning is 30,000°C. That's five times as hot as the surface of the Sun. The estimated risk of the average person's risk of being struck range from 1 in 5 million to 1 in 600,000. The Guinness world record holder for lightning strikes is a Virginia forest ranger named Roy Sullivan, who was hit by lightning seven times over a 35-year span.



EARTH TREMBLES: When Hurricane Charley hit Florida in August 2004, a seismometer recorded a series of "micro-tremors" from the Earth's crust. Also more surprising, the storm also caused the Earth to vibrate and may have caused a subterranean landslide. (www.arxiv.org/physics/0506162).

NON-SMILING PHARAOHS: Life in ancient Egypt was very civilised-until you needed a dentist. Serene portraits of Amenhotep III failed to show that his teeth were rotten to the pulp, and even the greatest of all pharaohs, Ramesses II, had gruesome gnashers. Feasting on sweet foods and gritty emmer bread, they suffered abscesses, bone loss and severe periodontal disease. Emmer (*Triticum dicoccum*), the small-grained ancestral species of wheat was used for bread and was shown to be contaminated with grit.

DID YOU KNOW that the famous Cleopatra was Cleopatra the VII and reined between 51 and 30 BCE between Ptolemy XIII and Ptolemy XV (caesarion).

SHARK SOUP: The Walt Disney Company has been forced by the Hong Kong Conservation Society to take Shark Soup off the Menu at Hong Kong Disneyworld wedding banquets from September.



SUGAR SUBSIDIES ARE TO MELT AWAY: The World Trade Organization ruled in May that sugar subsidies were illegal. The EU pays its producers three times the going price for sugar and exports the resulting surpluses very cheaply. That kept the market price low and makes it hard for non-subsidised farmers to compete. In 2009 the EU would open its borders to exports.

DID YOU KNOW that baby killer whales and Dolphins do not sleep for the first month after birth. Unlike all animals studied before, killer whales (*orcinus orca*) and bottlenose dolphins (*tursiops truncatus*) do not maximise rest and sleep like other animals do after birth.

THERE SHE BLOWS: A kilometre-high plume of

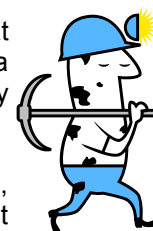
vapour that erupted up from the Pacific Ocean near a remote island off southern Japan on Sunday 3rd, was caused by an underwater volcano. Officials said that there was no danger of a tsunami, but asked ships to avoid Fukutokuoka-no-ba, where an undersea volcano erupted in 1986.

TSUNAMI WARNING SYSTEM: On June 30th the UN created an agency to set up and run a tsunami warning system for the Indian Ocean. The body will coordinate the various countries working to build the system, which is expected to be working by July 2006. It will have networks of seismographs, real-time sea-level gauges and deep-sea ocean pressure sensors.



DOLPHIN DISCOVERY: The Australian snubfin is the World's newest dolphin. *Orcaella heinsohni* has been recognised as a different species to the Asian Irrawaddy dolphin (*Orcaella brevirostris*), named after a river in Burma. The snubfin dolphins live in shallow coastal waters and are said to be shy of boats. It is not clear how many there are. The latin name honours George Heinsohn, who studied the dolphins intensively in the 1960's and 1970's.

SUSTAINABLE MINING: What does that mean? Could it be digging up minerals at a rate not to exceed the rate at which they are formed within the Earth.

BIRD FLU ALERT: H5N1 bird flu has killed more than 5000 migratory birds on an island in Qinghai province in north-west China, according to UN officials who visited the area. It is not clear if it is the same strain of H5N1 that has been killing poultry and people elsewhere in Asia. The officials have called for urgent studies within the next six weeks, after which the surviving birds will start to migrate, possibly carrying the virus with them.

CHICKADEE'S PRECISION TUNING: Hardly bird-brained, the black-capped chickadee has one of the animal kingdom's most intricate alarm calls. The palm-sized puffballs vary the number of syllables in their battle cry depending on the predator. After hearing 5000 calls, the number of "dees" in the bird's call corresponded to the size of the predator. The smaller manoeuvrable got a more vociferous response.

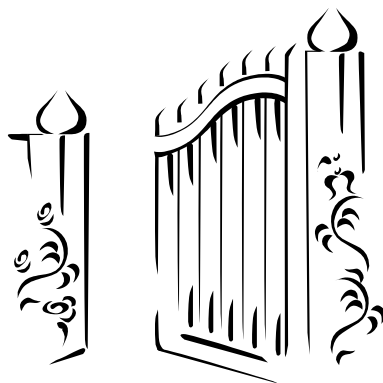

NIGHT WATCH

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 29th July to midnight Friday 12th August. Remember, Astronomy is looking up.

On Thursday morning at around 5am low down in the northern sky, there was a bright light for about 20 seconds. There was no movement of the light, but it was brighter than Venus, and then quickly faded and disappeared. Did anyone else see it?

The Sun resides in Cancer at -26.72 magnitude until Thursday 11th when it will have moved into Leo.

On Friday 5th, the new moon will occur at 10:55am and will also be at Apogee (furthest) at 406,632 kms distant. On Saturday 6th, the moon will be 3° north of the bright star Regulus and on Wednesday 10th 1.3° off the bright star Spica. The moon resides in Aries on 30th, Taurus on 31st and 1st, Auriga the Charioteer on 2nd, Gemini on 3rd and 4th, Cancer on 5th, Leo on 6th, 7th and 8th, Virgo on 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th.

Mercury, in the evening twilight in Leo, sets at 6:26pm on Saturday, and will be at inferior conjunction on Saturday 6th, which is between the Sun and Earth. From then on Mercury will rise in the morning twilight at 6:02am on Friday 12th at magnitude +0.5.

In the evening sky the very bright planet Venus, at magnitude -4.0 in Leo, sets on Saturday at 7:57pm.

Venus will be 1.2° south of the Moon on Monday 8th and sets at 8:19pm on Saturday 13th.

The red planet, Mars, rises at 11:56pm in Pisces on Saturday at a bright -0.7 magnitude. On Thursday 4th August, Mars will have moved into Aries and rises at 11:37pm on Saturday 13th.

Jupiter, the giant gas planet in Virgo, sets on Saturday night at 10:36pm shining at -1.9 magnitude. On Wednesday 10th Jupiter will be 1.3° north of the Moon, and sets at 9:54pm on Saturday 13th.

Saturn, the ringed planet in Cancer at +0.2 magnitude, rises with the Sun on Saturday morning and at 5:57am on Friday 12th at 0.3 magnitude.

In Aquarius, Uranus rises at 7:57pm at +5.7 magnitude, and at 7:04pm on Saturday 13th.

Neptune, in Capricornus, rises at 6:06pm on Saturday at +7.8 magnitude, and will be directly overhead on Monday 8th at midnight. From then on Neptune is in the sky all night.

Pluto in Serpens Caput sets on Saturday at 3:46am and on the 12th at 2:54am, and shines at +13.8 magnitude.

There will be some meteors in Aquarius during the fortnight with the Perseids at 110 per hour on the morning of Friday 12th. We never see them as they are too far north, but they could be shown on TV.

The Great Red Spot (storm) can be seen on Jupiter on Saturday at 7:50pm, Monday 1st at 9:19pm, Thursday 4th at 7pm, Saturday 6th at 8:39pm, for about one hour with a telescope.

Jupiter's moon, IO transits the planet from 8:01pm and the shadow from 9:10pm on Sunday. Europa transits at 6:41pm and the shadow at 8:51pm on Tuesday 2nd. The four moons can be seen at any time when Jupiter is in the night sky in different positions unless eclipsed. A telescope is needed.

At this time Constellations above are Scorpius, Ophiuchus, Ara, Triangulum Australe, with Hercules in the north and surrounded by Libra, Lupus, Sagittarius, Serpens, Pavo and Corona Australe.

St John Ambulance emergency phone lines in Lake Grace have been streamlined with the Triple Zero (000) emergency number, making the ambulance service more efficient and easier for the local community to use.

The move will provide residents with a direct connection to the St John Ambulance Communications Centre, creating potentially life-saving advantages.

Until recently, residents have called a local number in emergencies; however, St John Ambulance is now advising people to commence using the new system.

Other major regional areas who have already switched to the Triple Zero (000) system include Albany, Bunbury, Broome, Hedland, Kalgoorlie, Collie, Australind, Pinjarra, Dwellingup, Brunswick, Waroona and Yarloop.

Phil Benbow, Manager Volunteer Country Ambulance Service said, "The Communications Centre is staffed 24 hours a day to specifically receive emergency calls.

"St John Ambulance Communications staff have been trained to assess the nature of each call, provide advice when necessary and dispatch the ambulance with the appropriate priority. Streamlining emergency calls to the one number; Triple 0 (000) makes things so much simpler, faster and better coordinated.

"We need everyone who requires an ambulance for emergencies in Lake Grace to call Triple Zero

(000) or 13 12 33 if the ambulance call is not urgent. In emergency situations when time is critical, calling triple zero enables us to reach our patients with minimum delay. This is much preferred to people calling their local Ambulance Sub Centre administration number or visiting the centre itself.

"People must remember that in an emergency, every minute counts, and by calling Triple Zero (000) they are helping us to reach them faster," Phil said.

When calling Triple Zero (000), Ambulance Communications Centre staff may ask the following questions:

- Location of the emergency?
- Nearest cross street or landmark?
- Call back phone number?
- Nature of the emergency?
- Number of people involved?
- Is the patient conscious?
- Is the patient breathing?

All 000 calls are free.



You may be asked the following questions while an ambulance is being dispatched:

1. Location of the emergency?
2. Cross street or landmark?
3. Call back phone number?
4. Nature of the emergency?
5. Number of people involved?
6. Is the patient conscious?

though. When the Chappells came to live here, the school at Lake Grace North only went to grade 6, had room for only 20 students, so Jack, being the 21st student, had to sit on a bench in the porch, with a large box as his desk, where the teacher supervised correspondence studies, which were then marked in Perth. Jack's grades were not adequate to become a pilot (Don thought it was algebra mainly) so while training, his mates would give him coaching after "lights out" by torch light. His instructor inspired his determination by saying, "It is not what you know, but what you are capable of learning".

Beth Chappell was working in an office in Perth and although she went to work, no work was done because the people crowded into the city and celebrated. "We danced in the street and everyone was so friendly. Hay Street was "choked" with so many people. It wasn't arranged but we met up with so many friends and we had great celebrations. Perth was just like a big town then".

John Kellow also remembers cooking the beast, and pointed out that Mr Franks, who donated it, and Mr Slarke, who barbecued it, were replicating their fathers' efforts at the First World War celebration. It was a very cold day and everyone wore overcoats. After a sports day for the kids, a dance at night went

till 3am. John recalled the blockade in the Pacific that prevented supplies reaching Japan and was instrumental in ending the War. And the "send offs", as they were called - John was one of the group who prepared the Hall. "We would put the seats around and polish the floor for dancing. It was our job, and we just did it, sometimes one a week! This was also done when people went back after leave".

ONE FAITH, ONE JOURNEY, ONE JUBILEE



*Maria Regina Church, Lake Grace and St Thomas á Becket Church, Kukerin
celebrate 50 golden years*

The Catholic communities in Lake Grace and Kukerin are joyously celebrating the Golden Jubilee of their churches. Fifty years ago, on the 31st of July 1955, the late Bishop L.J. Goody, then Bishop of Bunbury, opened and blessed Maria Regina Church in Lake Grace and St Thomas á Becket Church in Kukerin. The Sunday celebrations in 1955 significantly marked their 'one faith, one journey, one jubilee' as God's people. The churches stand at present as living witnesses to the communities' desire to offer God a 'home' and as inspirational symbols of their commitment to live the faith.

ONE FAITH. The history of the Catholic communities in both districts owed their humble beginnings to the European settlers who brought their faith into their newly found land. From their arrival right up to 1955, both communities had been enthusiastically growing in faith and in number, yet were still searching for a distinctive identity in their own communities. Their common faith in Jesus Christ held them together, notwithstanding the difficulties they had to face living in a foreign land. To keep the flame of their faith alive was evident in their day to day lives, providing the much needed comfort and close links with their ancestors and relations abroad. The prayer in Psalm 113:3, *"From the rising of the sun to its setting, may the name of the Lord be praised!"* aptly characterised their faith-life, vowing never to wane nor to be ashamed of their belief in Jesus Christ. There was no doubt that the new settlers had the undeniable desire to live their faith and to sow the seeds of faith in their communities. Through God's providence, this search for identity became the driving force towards sharing with one another their 'one faith, one journey, one jubilee' in God's newly found home.

During this period, their search for a common identity had been the well-spring that gave them a renewed appreciation of life and a stronger hope in the power of the Risen Christ. This lent towards deeply bonding them together as communities, single-minded in their love for Christ. They sought and found their identity nowhere but in Christ and, through their frequent religious and social gatherings, realised that they had been all along journeying as a 'church' - a church primarily made up of God's faithful people. It was a vital realisation that influenced dramatically the dynamics of their communities in the ensuing years.

This realisation of being a 'church' stirred

unparalleled and growing enthusiasm within the community. It attracted a common desire to build a church that reflected their profound sense of unity in Christ. The Spirit of the Lord was obviously at work during this time to give them encouragement and the will to achieve. And the Spirit's presence was felt by the community and moved them beyond compare. Their enthusiasm, sealed by the Spirit, became the foundation stone of what is now called Maria Regina Church and St Thomas á Becket Church.

There is truth in the saying that "there's more to it than meets the eye." Both churches, as they stand today, reflect the rich and glorious yester years of both communities. Those years laid the foundation for the growth of the communities in the years to come. Fifty years have gone by since it was built and still the richness of its past continues to inspire both communities. The thoughts of Nathaniel Hawthorne fittingly capture what these churches really stand for: *"Christian faith is a grand cathedral, with divinely pictured windows. Standing without, you can see no glory, nor can imagine any, but standing within every ray of light reveals a harmony of unspeakable splendors"*.

ONE JOURNEY. After the historical event in 1955, the enthusiasm and faith of both communities remained firm. The sight of their churches gleaming before their eyes bolstered their commitment to permeate their newly found home with the ray of God's presence. Nathaniel Hawthorne is correct in saying that the glory and splendor of any church rests in the ray of light that comes from within. A new phase in their religious life had begun - a new spiritual journey that drew strength and encouragement from within their experiences of being a 'church'.

A 'church' had been born giving life and hope to people by leading them to God. From 1955 until the present time, both churches have been the 'holy places' for more than 374 baptisms, 382 confirmations and 49 marriages. On the same day Maria Regina Church was opened and blessed, Dianne Gayle O'Neill, daughter of George and Gertrude O'Neill, received the light of Christ in baptism. A week later, on the 7th of August 1955, Neil Kevin Joyce, son of Thomas and Mabel Joyce, was christened. At St Thomas á Becket Church, Kerry Anne Ditchburn, daughter of William and Patricia Ditchburn, was the first child to be christened on the 13th of November 1955. They, and many others, became the new bearers of the light of Christ, sharing in

the privilege to pass on to their children's children the inspirational story of a 'church' within Maria Regina and St Thomas a Becket.

Under the patronage of Maria Regina, the mother of Jesus, Lake Grace Catholic Community will continue to be inspired by Mary's faith in her Son, Jesus. This faith has been and will always be the essence of the community in giving witness to the love of Christ. They continue to journey in faith knowing that Mother Mary will only lead them to the heart of her Son, Jesus.

For the Kukerin Catholic Community, St Thomas á Becket of Canterbury will always be a living inspiration to bring the light of Christ to the world. St Thomas lived and died with his heart set on Christ. They unceasingly march on with St Thomas as their friend, guide and protector.

ONE JUBILEE. The journey may have begun in time, but it actually began in the hearts of those who were passionate about Christ. Time flies but love remains in the heart of Christ. This love has conquered time and has spurred them to celebrate not only in time, but more appropriately, in jubilee.

It is a fact that the number of community members has apparently dropped through the years, yet in the hearts of all those, who in one way or another have been part of this glorious journey, the flame of faith will be kept alive. The journey has been made possible because of faith, and faith has been and will always be the key to the success of their continuing journey. And there is indubitably only ONE JUBILEE and that jubilee is a toast to the faith of the community.

After 50 years, they are still celebrating. Why? The reason is **JESUS CHRIST**.

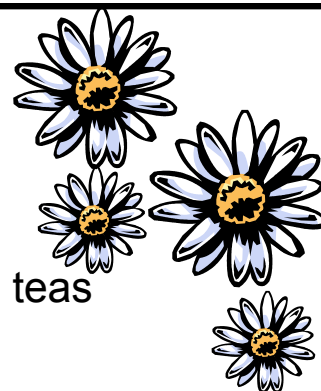

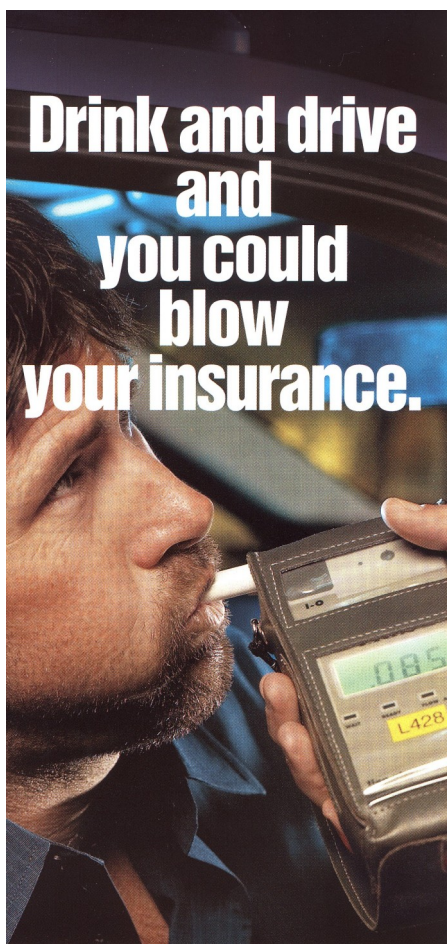
