

PS. They cost the ratepayers \$3,800 each.



Tax Time Deductions for Small Business

With 30 June comes the end of the financial year and that means it's tax time for all of us who earn income, including business income. To get your tax right, you need to work out income and any deductions. Here we outline the kinds of deductions a small business may be able to claim.

To be able to claim business deductions you must be carrying on a business. If you are not carrying on a business, your activities may in fact be a hobby, sport or recreational activity. So the first thing to do is to establish that you are indeed carrying on a business.

Assuming you are running a business, you can generally claim:

- a deduction for expenses you incur in the everyday running of your business, in the same income year you incur the expenses, and
- a deduction over time for some capital expenses incurred by your business.

You cannot claim a deduction for an expense relating solely to private use. If an expense relates to both business and private use, you have to work out what proportion of the expense is related to your business and claim only that amount.

Expenses you can claim in the year they are incurred

Work or operating expenses that relate to the everyday running of your business, for example, office stationery, rent of business premises, or salary and wages, are called revenue expenses. You can generally claim a deduction for these expenses in the income year in which they are incurred.

Some examples of allowable deductions include:

- advertising or sponsorship expenses
- bad debts
- bank fees and charges
- business motor vehicle expenses
- business operating expenses
- business travel expenses
- clothing (corporate wardrobes and uniforms, occupation-specific clothing, protective clothing)
- education, technical or professional qualification expenses
- electricity costs
- cost of any fringe benefit provided and fringe benefits tax on the benefit
- home office expenses, where the home is used as business premises
- insurance premiums
- interest on money borrowed for purposes relating to the business
- land tax on business premises
- legal expenses, incurred, for example, in defending future income-earning capacity, borrowing money, discharging a mortgage, or obtaining tax advice
- losses from previous years

- luxury car lease expenses
- office stationery
- operating a commercial website, for example, site maintenance, content updating, internet service provider fees
- parking fees
- payments – advertising or public relations
- phone expenses
- rates on business premises
- registered tax agent/accountant fees
- rent or lease of business premises
- repairs and maintenance of income producing property
- replacement of income-producing property costing \$300 or less
- salary or wages, bonuses or allowances paid
- subscriptions to business or professional journals, information services, newspapers and magazines
- superannuation contributions, up to age-based limits
- tax preparation costs
- tender costs (even if the tender is unsuccessful)
- trading stock, including delivery charges
- transport and freight
- travel expenses related to relocation of employees
- union dues and periodical subscriptions to trade, business or professional associations, and
- water rates on business premises.

Expenses you can claim over a number of years

The cost of assets that have a longer life (usually more than the income year in which they are purchased) and that relate more to establishing, replacing, enlarging or improving the structure of your business are called capital expenses. You also have a capital expense when you buy capital assets such as computers and office furniture.

Generally you cannot claim a deduction for the full cost of a capital asset in the income year you purchase the asset. Instead, you can deduct part of the cost of the asset each year over a number of years. The part you can deduct each year represents the decline in value of the asset for that year.

These assets are called depreciating assets. They have a limited life expectancy (effective life) and can reasonably be expected to decline in value over the time they are used. Depreciating assets include items such as computers, electrical tools, furniture, carpet and curtains, and motor vehicles.

The Youth Station will continue to open Wednesdays after school until the members decide otherwise. Supervisors please remember to arrange your own swap if you can't make it.


No Friday afternoon activities have been organized for this term as yet. However if any members wish to have an activity, and know of another 5 or 6 members that are also interested then please let me know.

- Step 4: Improve Your Balance
- Step 5: Walk Tall
- Step 6: Foot Care and Safe Footwear
- Step 7: Regularly Check Your Eyesight
- Step 8: Eat Well for Life
- Step 9: Identify, Remove and Report Hazards—*eg. remove floor mats*

These steps are explained in the FREE Stay On Your Feet WA booklet. This booklet will help you understand the issues and guide you in making simple and effective changes in order to reduce your risk of falling.

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight, from midnight Friday 13th August to midnight Friday 14th August.

Astronomy is looking up. Never look at the Sun without the proper solar filters and preferably with one that fits over the skyward end as your eyes can easily and quickly be damaged beyond repair. Good solar filters are not that dear and viewing the Sun with a telescope is great as it shows Sunspots and Faculae, also there are filters for the Moon and planets. Oxygen and hydrogen filters are also available, these are useful for viewing planetary nebulae, emission and reflection nebulae; as in the handle of the saucepan, the lagoon, trifold and omega in Sagittarius and the big eta carina nebula which lights up the bright patch of milky way in front of the Southern cross.

All times in Night Watch are based on the time the Sun, Moon, Planets and stars rise in the East of Lake Grace, which is 10 minutes before Perth.

Our local star, The Sun, rises in the constellation of Cancer on Saturday morning and resides there until Tuesday 14th when it will rise in the constellation of Leo.

The magnification of the Sun is -26.72. Morning twilight starts on Saturday and evening twilight finishes at 6:56pm. Morning twilight begins on Friday 17th at 5:19am and evening twilight ends at 7:03pm.

The Moon on Saturday morning at 5:40am will be at Perigee, (closest) at 368,891 kilometres from Earth in Pisces. On Monday 6th at 5:10am in Aries, the Moon will be at the last quarter Phase. The New Moon will be at 6:52am on Monday 13th in Cancer. If you happen to be up early on the morning of Tuesday 7th, the Moon will be 6° north of the red planet Mars in Taurus.

On Saturday evening the Moon will be in Pisces at 75% illumination and 63% on 5th, Aries on 6th at 53% and 41% on 7th, Taurus on 8th at 30% and 21% on 9th, Gemini on 10th at 12% and 11th at 6%, Cancer on 12th at 2% and 13th at 0%, Leo on 14th at 1%, 15th at 3% and 16th at 3%, Virgo on 17th at 13%.

Mercury in Cancer rises on Saturday in the morning twilight at 6:14am at magnitude -1.4 in front of the Sun's position. Mercury is slowly moving back towards the Sun and will be at Superior Conjunction at 4am on Thursday 16th where it will be on the opposite side of the Sun to Earth.

Earth's sister planet, **Venus**, in the constellation of Sextans, sets on Saturday evening at 7:12pm shining brightly at magnitude -4.5 in the north/north-west and south of the blue star Regulus. On Friday 17th Venus will be in the largest of the 88 constellations in the sky of Hydra (the water snake), and north/east of the orange star Alphard sets at 5:53pm. Venus will be rising in the morning twilight next fortnight.

Jupiter the giant gas planet in the constellation of Ophiuchus at magnitude -2.5 and is in the evening sky setting on Sunday morning at 2:48am. Jupiter will be high above at 7:45pm. Jupiter is still in the sky until after midnight on Friday 17th and is not far north west of the red star Antares (the heart of the Scorpion). The scorpion is the easiest constellation to recognise with the four stars in a line at the head, the curve of the body and the stinger almost in a circle.

The ringed planet **Saturn**, in the constellation of Sextans, at magnitude +0.6 sets at 6:39pm in the evening twilight and will become a morning planet on Friday 24th.

Uranus at magnitude +5.7 in Aquarius rises at 8:17 with a blue/green disc and lies near the orange star Theta Aquarii (Ancha). On Friday 17th. Uranus rises at 7:24pm.

Neptune at magnitude +7.8 in Capricornus rises at 6:09pm with a grey/green disc and lies between iota and gamma and 1° north. On Friday 17th Neptune rises at 5:16pm and is in the sky all night.

Uranus and Neptune can be hard to find but that is the fun of astronomy. Use your binoculars with your telescope or come for a viewing. You can also ring and go outside with the phone and I'll direct you.

For telescopes the red spot on Jupiter will be on view at 7:42pm on Wednesday 8th for about one hour.

If you need information or anything on Jupiter views please ring.

Travel Diaries

We continue on from Day 25 of Joe and June McEncroe and Helen and Clem Bennett's travels through Africa and Barcelona.

Day 31

Our drive to the train station was an experience we will remember for a while. In the little red Fiat taxis with all our luggage piled on the top in the roof racks (not tied down) we zoomed in and out of traffic expecting at any moment for one of the bags to go crashing to the ground! But we got there in one piece and so did our luggage.

It was a bit of bun fighting getting our designated seats on the train. Dave had warned us that almost without exception there would be people sitting in them and he would have to politely ask them to move on. The train journey was about five hours and took us north to the capital city of Rabat before turning east and arriving in Fes late in the afternoon.

After settling into our accommodation, the hotel Moania, we all followed Dave, who was like the pied piper, on a 60 minute walk through various parts of the city, including amazing markets to a traditional Moroccan restaurant. We all generally decided the meal was a bit disappointing [June had a strange chicken pastilla [pastry] which was OK till they dusted it with icing sugar!!] – can't win 'em all.

Day 32

We had three nights in Fes but effectively only one day to see the sights, so there was a lot to see and do on this day. Fes is steeped in ancient charm and is the oldest of the imperial cities as well as being one of the oldest in the Islamic world. The city is divided into three distinct parts, Fes el Djedid (Fes the new), created in the 13th century and where most of the royal palaces, gardens and museums are located. The Ville Nouvelle, the modern city built by the French in the 20th century and the 3rd and without doubt the most interesting – Fes el Bali (Old Fes). This is considered to be the real Morocco, which takes a step back into the middle ages, where the locals go about their business much the same way as they have for the last 1200 years.

Dave introduced us to our local guide "Hafeed" who arrived dressed in the traditional Moroccan cloak called a "djellaba", much like a monks habit. Hafeed was a real character, who spoke English well and had a great sense of humour.


Our first place of call was Royal Palace which is situated on 83 acres of land. Unfortunately the king would not let us in for a look inside the walls, so we had to be content with the outside—what a spoil sport he was. It was then onto the fortress that overlooks the city. This site really gave us a great view of all parts of the city.

After the fort we were taken to a workshop that made pottery and mosaic products. It was very labour intensive and it was just fascinating watching the workers performing their crafts. We would like to have thought that they were multi-skilled but we suspect that many of the workers would do the same job day in day out. The girls had fun choosing some traditional

Moroccan pottery. Great for the back packs!!.

It was then onto the old city or the medina as it is commonly called. A medina is a walled city with a minimal number of entry/exit ways. Before we entered the medina, Hafeed advised us to keep together and on no account to wander off. He said that if we got lost we may not be found again until 2010. At the time we thought 'what a funny man' but after seeing what was inside the walls we're not so sure if he was being funny. The medina is a labyrinth of almost 10,000 narrow twisting, turning alleys and laneways. There are no motorized vehicles of any sort and the main form of heavy transport is by donkey. A fair degree of caution was required when the loaded donkeys came through the narrow alleyways as there was very little room to move out of their way and they tended not to move off the line they were moving on. You could hear the donkey drivers calling "balak balak" which means "move away".

The markets, or souqs as they are called were simply amazing, thousands of stalls selling everything and anything imaginable. We stopped at a traditional tannery and witnessed the dying process. The skins are limed to remove the wool, then men would scrape off any excess fat and then soak them in huge dying vats. These dying vats are ancient and have been handed down from father to son for centuries. It looked like pretty hard work and the smell was a bit on the nose, so it's a fairly safe bet that there will not be any job applications coming from our group.

After lunch we went into a looming workshop and were able to witness the looms in action, the same process that has been used for centuries but still with the same immaculate quality of end product e.g. tablecloths, scarves, carpets and many more. The temptation to buy was extreme but when you think that what you buy you have to carry, you try to delay the inevitable. Unfortunately, often the girls didn't see it that way!! It was then onto to a traditional herbalist, a young guy probably only in his mid teens. He sat us all down and

proceeded to tell about all the herbs and such like that were available in the shop and how they could make us more healthy, less wrinkly, increase our libido and generally put a spring in our step. His presentation was absolutely hilarious and he had us all in stitches. We ended up buying stuff we probably don't need but it was worth it just for the entertainment value.

Hafeed then took us to a traditional house that had been converted into a hostel. From the outside it looked very ordinary but on the inside it was something else. The furnishings and general décor were marvelous and all the rooms led off from a beautiful central atrium which made the whole house very light and airy.

The muslim religion regards outward displays of wealth as improper, hence almost all the residences have a look of sameness about them but inside is another story.

All in all day 32 was a very full and very enjoyable and one that will be remembered as one of the highlights of our trip.

Day 33

At 8.30am we were on our bus to Meknes which is about a two hour drive west of Fes. Meknes is the heart of the Sultanate with some very impressive buildings and a vast array of souqs (markets). A place where you could see many forms of craft in operation e.g. woodworkers carving elaborate tables, metalworkers and coppersmiths. The city was founded by a very cruel sultan by the name of Moulay Ismail. He used white slaves captured from Spain, France and England by barbarians and sold to Ismail to build 50 palaces and other major structures. He had an army of 15,000 black slaves all with horses and both superbly trained. We were taken to one of his massive granaries where he would store fodder for the thousands of horses he had. From the granary it was about a 2 km. walk to where Ismail is buried with one of his 500 wives and two of his 1000 children.

After a light lunch seated in a large open plaza we headed for the ancient Roman city of Volubilis. The city dates back to the 2nd and 3rd centuries AD and is set in the midst of picturesque hills and valleys. It was Rome's most distant outpost and at it's peak supplied 60% of the empires, cereal and olives. Many of the old buildings were badly damaged or destroyed in the Lisbon earthquake of 1755 but there was sufficient left in it's original state to get an appreciation of just how advanced the Romans were as a civilization. The city was located on a hill for security purposes and was situated close to a natural spring. Amazingly many of the mosaics were still intact, including the colours. One of the buildings housed an olive press, which looked like it was still quite capable of fulfilling its duties after 2,000yrs. The streets were wide and all led to the central part of the city, plus there was still clear evidence of how they dispensed water throughout the city and how they handled drainage and sewerage. Amazing.

Our last stop on this day was at a fascinating and very religious town, called Moulay Idriss. The town was set in amongst lovely green hills and almost had a feel of fairytale about it. We were given a cooks tour, including a long walk up many steps to a Mosque that holds the tomb of Moulay Idriss. Most of the town was off limits to motorized vehicles, due to the narrowness and steepness of the walkways.

Day 34

We boarded our small bus at around 8.00am for our trip to our two night stopover in the desert but as usual there was much to see on the way. The main mountain range in Morocco is the Atlas mountains and today we would be travelling through parts of this range. Our first stop was at a town called Ifrane and one could be forgiven for thinking that they had suddenly left Morocco and arrived in France as the buildings had a distinct French look about them. The town must have been situated at a reasonably high elevation as the roofs were all built with a very steep pitch to allow for snow run off. The temperature was quite low while we were in this town and everyone was grabbing for their jackets.

Joe went off and brought a beanie to keep his follically challenged noggin, warm. It was then back onto the bus for our drive through a lovely cedar forest and a stop to witness a small number of Barbary apes. They are very distinctive looking animal without being particularly pretty. The countryside changed so quickly once we left the mountains and before we knew we were in very desolate (wonder how anyone could live there) country where we stopped at a town called Midelt and had lunch in a Kasbah.

A Kasbah is a settlement, surrounded by walls, that in the past were used by travelling merchants as stopover points but at the same time they gave protection from war like people and tribes. The lunch was good but most importantly the toilets were clean.

Later in the day we stopped for photographs of the Zis gorge. It was very interesting as the bottom of the gorge was a veritable oasis of greenery and date palms etc set into desolate surroundings. It was obviously a real haven for the locals.

As we drove further south it was amazing to see people and even the odd child walking or riding a bike and we would wonder where the hell they were going to and what on earth they were doing in the middle of nowhere.

Fairly late in the afternoon we arrived at a town called Erbud where we changed into two 4 wheel drive land

rovers, as where we were going was not suitable for our bus.

We drove for about an hour through non descript looking country and then as like a mirage we came to our accommodation which was called the Yasmina Auberge [hotel]. It was built on the edge of a large fresh water lake, which in turn was surrounded by massive sand dunes. After a brief look around we were given a cup of traditional mint tea (can be a bit sickly sweet) and then we were taken to a Berber camp which was to be our accommodation for the night. The camp was around 200 metres from the main buildings and consisted of a dozen or so goat hair tents set in a circular fashion. Each couple or individual had their own tent with the separation being a goat hair screen wall, so there was no room for any misdemeanors.

That night we had a very traditional Moroccan meal consisting of soup, beef and chick pea tagine followed by bananas and oranges. After the meal the staff entertained us with some really fabulous bongo drumming. Later on after the locals had finished our guys all tried their hand but somehow it just didn't sound quite the same.

Day 35

It's hard to believe that the desert can be really cold at night but cold it was, which did not make for the best

nights sleep. Brekky was basic to say the least, bread, thick cold pancakes, jam and cheese but the orange juice was great.

We loaded ourselves into the land-rovers and headed to the Palmery which is an irrigated oasis where the locals grow their veggies and cereal crops. Our guide was Hassan who spoke quite good English, he told us how the government provided the water by means of piping it underground to a series of wells and from there they would run small above ground irrigation channels to the little plots owned by the villagers. While we are at a well we witnessed some young girls filling plastic containers with water, then loading them onto a mule to transport them to their village about a kilometre away. We would have liked to have taken some photos (or even a video) of this but had been pre-warned not to. Apparently if a photo is taken of a female, even without her knowledge and it should find its way into a magazine or such like then she is indelibly disgraced.

Hassan then took us to a nearby village and showed us the school. It was a tiny one room building with a fair number of children inside, but they all seemed to be happy and well fed. He then led us into another building where he asked us all to be seated on some mats on the floor. We were then entertained by 5 or 6 men all dressed in long white robes. One played an intriguing self made guitar like instrument while the others played drums and castanets. The castanet players all danced a rhythmic Moroccan dance while they played. Joe took a short video of the musical dance as it was truly fascinating and of course you wouldn't believe it, they had a CD for sale, so we purchased one of those.

The afternoon was ours to relax and to get ready for our camel ride into desert. While we waited June and two of the other ladies in the group brought long scarves [firbal] and had them fitted in the traditional Moroccan way – twisted around their heads with the tail used to cover the lower part of the face - very enchanting.

About 2 hours before sunset the camels arrived with our new guide "Addi" for the desert excursion. None of us had ridden a camel before so there was a little bit of trepidation but it all turned out well. Addi led (he walked) his small camel train of 9 riders for about an

hour, up, over and around a variety of different sized sand dunes until we eventually arrived at our overnight camp. We had a little daylight left so we scampered up a huge sand dune to take in the sunset, unfortunately there was a cloud bank sitting on the horizon which spoilt the best effect but it was still worth the effort. After getting back down from the dune we really started to realize how multi skilled Addi was. He not only maintained the camels (they had to be hobbled for the night), he prepared the camp, cooked the meal and finished off by entertaining us with another Berber chap called "Omar" who just appeared out of the night desert. The two of them played drums with fantastic rhythm and Addi vocalized in Arabic. We had managed to smuggle a couple of bottles of wine into the camp in one of the saddle bags, so with the mixture of being in a Berber tent in the middle of the desert with good food, wine, and great entertainment, it will be something we will never forget. There were also some mumblings from the females that Omar was a bit of hunk but unfortunately for them he disappeared back into the desert night as quickly as he had arrived. Before retiring to bed we conducted a brief study into astronomy, as the sky was just alive with stars. It rarely rains in this part of Morocco, so it was a star gazers delight with very clear skies, as good or quite possibly even better than we have in good old W A.

Women's Community Awards - New community grants a boost for women

Nominations opened this week for the inaugural Women's Community Awards which offer five financial grants of up to \$5,000 each through the Office for Women's Policy.

The awards are open to women undertaking projects relevant to at least one of the State government's five priority areas for women: economic independence, gender equality, safety and justice, leadership and governance, and community participation.

The grants will enable five women to work or research overseas, interstate or within WA and subsequently apply knowledge in their own communities. They specifically target women who work in either a voluntary or paid capacity in the non-government community sector, where funding opportunities for this purpose are not otherwise available.

"We want to see the grants used for a wide range of research, projects and learning activities that achieve positive results and help address important priorities for women in the community," Minister Ellery said. "Importantly, we want to see this opportunity taken up by women from an array of backgrounds, including young and senior women, indigenous women, culturally and linguistically diverse women and women with disabilities."

Women aged 18 or over who have lived in WA for at least the last two years are eligible to apply. Applicants need to show how their project or research would improve the status of women in the community, the workforce or at home. Tenants Warned on Defaulting Leases

Breaking leases before the expiry date could see tenants paying hundreds or thousands of dollars for out of pocket landlord expenses.

The Western Australian Government recently abolished "letting fees" charged to tenants as of 5 April 2007 and any real estate agent caught charging this fee would risk prosecution by Consumer Protection and a fine of up to \$5,000.

Although this is great relief for new tenants, it is important for them to be aware of the financial implications for breaking their tenancy agreement before the expiry date.

If a tenant breaks a fixed term agreement, without the written agreement of the landlord, they may be liable for "liquidated damages" such as rent on the property until the landlord finds a new tenant.

Tenants may also be liable for reimbursement to the landlord of the advertising costs of finding a new tenant.

However, the landlord has a duty to take necessary

steps to reduce any losses, such as advertising to find a new tenant straight away.

If the lease agreement was signed before 5 April 2007, real estate agents may also charge tenants for the unexpired portion of any letting fee.

If tenants do need to break a lease, they can reduce the likelihood of hefty charges by giving the agent or owner plenty of warning of their moving out date.

Tenants could also try to re-negotiate their contract end date with the owner or agent and should make sure any variation of the agreement is in writing signed by the tenant and the owner or agent.

SCIENCE AND STUFF

HUMANS DEFIED STONE AGE 'VOLCANIC WINTER':

In the face of global climate change 74,000 years ago, humans came up trumps. Evidence from India shows the global cooling following a massive volcanic eruption at the time, did not decimate human populations as originally thought. The eruption of Toba volcano in Sumatra, Indonesia - the largest of the past 2 million years - coincided with the onset of glacial conditions. This has led some people to link the two, says Michael Petraglia of the University of Cambridge. Some have proposed that human populations shrank during the "volcanic winter" following the eruption, but Petraglia's team thinks otherwise. At the study site in southern India, the team found stone artefacts immediately above and below a 2.5-metre-thick layer of Toba ash (Science, vol317, p114).

"The stone tool assemblage surprised us because there was no dramatic technological change across the ash," says Petraglia. "Our conclusion was that the eruption didn't necessarily wipe out populations." The first modern humans shared their world with a number of other human species, he says. Homo erectus was among the oldest, having first appeared two million years ago. All these species lived through the Toba volcanic eruption. "There is evidence of Homo erectus at 50,000 years ago, and Homo floresiensis appeared 90,000 years ago. So archaic human species survived the event too," Petraglia says.

BLOWN UP IN SPACE:

Bigelow Aerospace launched its second inflatable spacecraft on 28th June. Genesis 11 takes the company further towards its goal of building an inflatable space station. The spacecraft beamed back images showing it had inflated and was functioning well.

IS THE NORTH POLE PART OF RUSSIA:

In 2002, the UN asked Russia to provide evidence to back an audacious territorial claim on the North Pole and 1.2 kilometres of oil and gas-rich Arctic sea floor around it. Now geologists in Russia say they have found that evidence. According to Komsomolskaya Pravda - a newspaper owned by energy and gas interests - recent acoustic scans show that the Lomonosov ridge, a 100-kilometre-wide seabed mountain range, extends from Russia's eastern Arctic coastal shelf all the way to the North Pole. Under the UN Convention on the Law of the Sea, Russia could argue that this gives it territorial rights to the pole. At present, no country is deemed by the International Seabed Authority to have geological structure beneath the pole, so no country owns it. While Russia has yet to restake its claim, news that it might has already provoked protests from Canada, the US, Norway and Denmark.

HOUSE CATS UNITED UNDER ONE CLAN:

A new feline family tree gleaned from DNA shows that cats were domesticated from local wildcats in the region that extends from Turkey down into Mesopotamia

(Iraq). Carlos Driscoll at the US National Cancer Institute in Frederick, Maryland, and colleagues studied DNA from 979 domestic cats and wildcats from across Europe and Asia.

The wildcats broke down into five groups, or clades, of the wildcat Felis silvestris: the European wildcat, the southern African wildcat, the Central Asian wildcat, the Chinese desert cat and the Near Eastern wildcat. All of the domestic cats, from fancy breeds to feral tabbies, fell within the Near Eastern wildcat group (Science, DOI: 10.1126/science).

FOSSILS SHOW DINOSAURS ROSE GRADUALLY:

Fossils found in the United States show dinosaurs lived alongside their ancestors for tens of millions of years, disproving long-held theories assuming they quickly replaced their predecessors, according to a new study. Dinosaurs appeared at the end of the Triassic period about 235 to 200 million years ago and came to dominate the planet during the Jurassic period about 200 to 120 million years ago. Palaeontologists have thought that dinosaur precursors died out long before the dinosaurs appeared, that their ancestors probably were out competed and replaced by dinosaurs and didn't survive. Now evidence shows that they may have coexisted for 15 to 20 million years or more. The study was based on an analysis of fossils discovered in the desert of New Mexico. The bones reveal anatomical information that sheds light on the evolution of dinosaur ancestors. The newly-discovered fossil, some 235 million years old, is a dinosaur predecessor called Dromomeron romeri.

The new fossils shed light on anatomical evolution in dinosaur ancestors, their transition into dinosaurs and the ways in which dinosaurs diversified. Finding dinosaur precursors, together with dinosaurs, tells us something about the pace of the changeover. If there was any competition between precursors, then it was a very prolonged competition. Dinosaurs and many other animals including mammals, lizards, crocodiles, turtles and frogs appeared toward the end of the Triassic, 235-200 million years ago. But it was only during the Jurassic period 200-120 million years back, that dinosaurs dominated the Earth and their predecessors died out. Dinosaur fossils from the Triassic period were rare until 2003 when a creature dubbed the Silesaurus was found in Poland. (Big Pond News source ABC for Science Journal July).

Colon cancer clue: A gene variant carried by half the population may increase the risk of developing colon cancer by 20 to 30 per cent. The gene, yet to be identified, sits in a region of human DNA called 8q24, three teams report in Nature Genetics (DOI: 10.1038/ng2085; DOI: 10.1038/ng2089; DOI: 10.1038/ng2098). They hope the discovery may one day be used to help screen people to find those most at risk.

The white mushroom, macrocybe titans, measuring a towering 70 cm tall, was found near Tapachula, near the Guatemalam border, according to the Southern border University Centre.


