## Daffodil Day

### Friday August 19



The Cancer Council Australia is gearing up for another successful Daffodil Day on Friday 19 August, with hopes of raising \$7.8 million. Two million fresh daffodils and a range of merchandise will line stalls at train stations, shopping centres and various community outlets to raise funds for cancer research and support services.

Daffodil Day, now in its twelfth year nationally, remains one of Australia's most popular fundraising events because it inspires belief that one day, cancer will be beaten. It is a day to support those touched by cancer and to focus on hope for a cancer-free future.

Chief Executive Officer of The Cancer Council Australia, Professor Alan Coates AM said, 'Significant advances have been achieved through cancer research over the last decade reducing the cancer mortality rate in Australia by 17%. Continuing your support of an event such as Daffodil Day will ensure that this figure continues to fall.'

At the beginning of last century, people with cancer faced almost certain death. Now, thanks to continuing improvement in research and patient care, more than half of them will be successfully treated. This progress is celebrated on Daffodil Day.

The daffodil was chosen as the symbol of hope for all touched by cancer because of its reputation as a hardy annual flower, pushing its way through the frozen earth after a long winter to herald the return of Spring, new life, vitality and growth. By purchasing a daffodil you are supporting The Cancer Council Australia's members to provide \$25 million to cancer research each year. In Lake Grace, you can purchase Cancer Council Australia merchandise from local banks and shops. The annual Daffodil Day street stall will also raise funds from the sale of fresh daffodils, cakes, plants and craft at the RSL Hall from 9:30am.

Funds raised during Daffodil Day activities will contribute directly to Cancer Council initiatives in cancer research, cancer control programs, advocacy, patient support and education services.

Thanks to continuous improvements in research we now know how to prevent one third of all cancers, and more than half of all cancers can be successfully treated. Although there have been major advances in research, improved detection and treatment, cancer is still the leading health concern in Australia.





# VP Day Celebrations



## Monday 15th August 2005

To commence the celebrations of VP Day, the bell at the Anglican Church will be rung at 7 o'clock in the morning – about the time 60 years ago, word reached Lake Grace of the end of World War 2. It will be rung for 72 gongs, a gong for each of the Service Personnel from this community. On six occasions at half hour intervals, it will be rung again – a token of the six lives lost of local service men, and to represent the six years of war.

A street Parade will start from the School at 1pm, and all citizens are invited to join in, (bring your flags,) and following, at the RSL Memorial Hall, we will have the Bugle Call, unveil a commemorative plaque, and lay a wreath. We then parade to the Town Hall for a Thanksgiving Service. The School Cadets and school children will lead the parade. A small display will be on show, and the day will conclude with an afternoon tea. All are asked to please bring a plate to share.

#### V—P. DAY

"V-P. Day" was enthusiastically celebrated by large gatherings at Lake Grace.

A combined Thanksgiving Service was held in the Hall at 11am, there being a very large attendance. Service personnel, members of the R.S.L., V.D.C., E.S.C. and Scouts met at the Gardens and marched to the Hall, where a very impressive service was conducted by Missioner Hawkins.

In the evening a Victory Dance was held, and once again the Hall was packed, with happy and light hearted throng.

On Thursday a Children's Sports meeting was arranged, and the kiddies had a marvellous time. A fancy-dress football match was held in the afternoon, and caused quite a lot of fun. A barbecue was also held during the afternoon, on the Show Ground, the beast being donated by Mr J Franks (who carried on the tradition established at the end of the last war, when he also provided the beast, and the late Mr Slarke senr., cooked it). This year Mr Bert Slarke was in charge of the cooking, and by all accounts made an excellent job of it.

On Thursday evening, the young folk decided to end the two V- P. holidays with another dance, and once again they had a right royal time, beginning with a torch-light procession marching to the accompaniment of kerosene tin "drums" and any other "musical" instrument available. It was certainly a very happy and bright ending to the celebrations.

# Application for Replacement Ambulance



At the St John Ambulance Sub Centre meeting held on July 14<sup>th</sup>, the committee and sub centre members voted on the replacement of the current ambulance.

The meeting voted on whether or not to change to the new Mercedes technology. Armed with the recent experience of putting the Mercedes 316 through its paces, the debate was healthy. When the Mercedes 316 was returned to Perth, one of our officers test drove one of the 312's Mercedes as a direct comparison. Their assessment was that the two drove very similarly in city conditions.

When put to the vote, the meeting voted to upgrade the Ford ambulance to a Mercedes ambulance with one vote against the motion.

The second motion was with regard to purchasing a second hand ambulance under the new provisions of St John Ambulance. That is Lake Grace Sub Centre can be included on a list for a used Perth Mercedes 312 or a 316. The cost of the van change will be the price for which we can sell our Ford ambulance. Additional costs will include the cost of a roof bar, changeover costs of the radio and phone etc.

After some healthy discussion and points of clarification, the vote was put to the members and was carried unanimously. Members felt that this can be seen as an interim step in moving towards acquiring a new ambulance.

The application to enter the current round of sourcing a secondhand ambulance was due on 15<sup>th</sup> July. The meeting endorsed the application (prepared in advance) which was then lodged on time to St John Perth via the Regional Manager.

## Where To From Here?

We understand that the first of the decommissioned Perth Mercedes are coming off the road now, Gnowangerup and Borden reportedly receiving their replacement vans in recent weeks. It will depend on where St John Executive in Perth place Lake Grace in the "order of necessity" as to how long it may be before we get the first stage of our upgrade underway.

At the time of printing only 12 sub centers have applied for the 20 ambulances being progressively decommissioned. Hence our chance of being one of the twenty should be reasonably high. We have asked to go lower in the list with the aim of securing a 316 model if possible.

In the interim, we still have a highly serviceable ambulance, quality equipment that is checked and serviced regularly, and a dedicated band of volunteers to run the service.

## Other Sub Centre News

Our new reverse cycle air conditioning unit has been installed. This will help make training and meetings more comfortable (not freezing or boiling or full of mosquitos). Thanks to Lake Grace Retravision for helping us make this happen.

Welcome to Tarryn Dowling and Russell Bailey in joining the ranks of St John volunteers. You will see Tarryn helping out behind the scenes and Russell is keen to follow the path towards being an officer. Welcome to both of you.

# OBITUARY – JACKSON CORNWALL CALLOPE

21st November 1940 - 20th July 2005

Jackson was born at Bayhill Mission (now Lockhart River) on 21/11/40, he was 1 of 11 children. His father was Joseph Callope, who was 1 of 9 children of Tom Callope and Mariah Mapoon/Weypa. His mother was Marion Callope nee Charger, 1 of 7 children to Jack Charger and Jessica Shadforth.

Tom Callope and Jack Charger were from the Solomon Islands, while Mariah was from the Weipa area. Jessica Shadforth was a part of the stolen generation, taken from the Lawn Hill area.

He left Bayhill for Thursday Island with his family in the mid 1950's, working on Thursday Island for Terry O'Connor's Bakery and then on Pearling Luggers. After that he spent some time working on Pilot Launches. During this time his 1st child was born Gloria to Rossman Mairu.

In the 1960's he went to Normanton with his bother Henry on a boat called "Cora" and started droving cattle from there, passing through Julia Creek where he had a short stint working on a couple of stations.

He ended up working on Broadleigh Downs and droving around Charters Towers where he had 4 more children, Sandra (penny), twins Graceland (patricia) and Theresa (marie) (dec) and Jackson (bradley) to Alvina Kerr.

Jackson joined Hornibrook Railways Construction from Charters Towers to Cloncurry then transferred to WA with Hornibrook and worked on the line to Kalgoorlie. He eventually met Auntie Gwen.

Came over to Queensland a few times over the years to visit family, but always came back "home" to Lake Grace and his family. He remained in WA at Lake Grace to this day.

Jackson came to Perth where he met Gwen, while he was working on the railways. They stayed in Perth until a job come up on the railways in Lake Grace. Jackson and Gwen found the people here to be nice and friendly, so they thought it would be a nice place to settle down, it was the best thing they ever did.

Jackson and Gwen married in St Anne's Anglican church in 1971 and raised their children Annie, Brado, Joe, Trumby, John and Jackie as well as many other nieces & nephews, Scotty, Michael, Bernadine, Lizzy (dec) and Robert (dec).

Jackson worked on the railways for 13 years before starting work on the 7th February 1981 at the Lake Grace Shire, where he remained for 20 years before retiring. After his retirement on the 14th December 2001, they moved to Perth, but it didn't last long as Jackson just didn't like the city. He wanted to move

back to Lake Grace which he did in 2002 and started working back on the Shire again until he passed away on the 20th July 2005.

Jackson was such a loving husband, father and grandfather and was loved by many. He loved pottering around in the garden whether he was at home or visiting Gwen in Perth. Jackson loved his chillies and you could always guarantee after a visit to Perth one or two of Gwen's plants had gone with him back to Lake Grace.

Visiting Annie and Justin to see his grandchildren and helping out when ever he could on the farm at Southern Cross was something he loved to do. His love for his grandchildren was obvious as he never ever said he couldn't help out when asked to look after them, and the smile on his face when ever their names were mentioned.

His cheeky smile will be missed by us all.

## Vi Barham Award for Excellence 2005

Congratulations to Emily Taylor and Ethan Wallace of Lake Grace District High School on being nominated for the academic section of the Vi Barham Award For Excellence 2005.

The Vi Barham Award will be presented at the Narrogin District Education Awards evening to be held on Friday, 21 October 2005, which will coincide with Education Week 2005.



## OBITUARY – JACKSON CORNWALL CALLOPE (CONT.)

After spending his youth on cattle stations in Queensland, Jackson acquired skills as a horseman and breaker.

He spent some seven years in Tom Price working on the tracks of the iron ore trains, a big project in those days. Somewhat different to the West Australian railways he eventually joined.

Jackson went to Perth in 1967 where he met Gwenny (as she was affectionately known) Jackamarra. They came together to Lake Grace in the same year to make their home and life together.

Jackson joined the railways where he worked for 13 years, his knowledge of track laying and maintenance was put to good use. Gwenny and Jackson's first house was a railway house on the North road, of wooden construction, very basic to say the least.

They were married in 1971 by the then Rev David Murray of the Anglican Church, who has since become Bishop David Murray. Might I venture to say that not too many of us can say that they were married by a future Bishop.

By then they had taken their place in the Lake Grace community raising a family of six children. Educating them, teaching them strong moral values and respect for others, and themselves. Remembering that respect can't be bought, but must be earned, supporting them in all their endeavours and sporting activities. Comforting them after the usual skirmishes that children get in to and just being there for them. This you and Gwenny have done very well. You can be proud of your family and the upbringing you have given them.

Jackson was always good for a laugh and joke and had a good outlook on life which endeared him to all who knew him. I bought an old house half way between the pub and his home. He said to me, "Thielsy, I need a bed and a couple of stubbies put in there so when I come home and can't quite make it all the way I'll be OK". Jackson was known to have a shandy on a hot day, sometimes more than one. I think perhaps that it wasn't fatigue, or the difficulty in walking that would worry him, but what was in store for him when he got home late for tea. We all know, depending on how late we are, that caution is a good idea. A short time planning your entrance and excuses is time well spent, with a little bit of luck no one will be home or perhaps asleep. However we all seem to want to try our luck again and again from time to time.

Jackson left the railways and joined the Shire Council, where he worked for many years while Gwenny worked at the Hospital. In his time he broke in many horses for some of the locals who thought they had a future Melbourne Cup winner on their hands, but even with Jackson's best efforts, and they were considerable, most of them would have been better suited to pulling a milk cart. His love of horses was however an ongoing interest and pleasure, and also a reminder of his youth.

On his and Gwenny's retirement they moved to Perth, to be closer to their families. Jackson found Perth life somewhat limited as he missed the mateship and company that he had in Lake Grace, and of course the odd shandy.

The story goes that one day he said to Gwenny "I'll just go down and get the paper". He must have got lost however as he finished up back in Lake Grace, where he spent most of his final years, visiting his family and his grandchildren who gave him great joy and pleasure.

Jackson, you and I go back a long way and I am proud that you included me as one of your many friends. We always felt privileged, Hazel and I, that we were invited to both your's and Gwenny's daughter's weddings.

Jackson, as we gather to pay our last respects and farewells, may I repeat one of the many bereavement notices you received as it was so aptly put. Thank you for coming with your family to Lake Grace, you have been a wonderful example and role model to your family and us all. Lake Grace can do with many, many more people of your calibre. You have run life's race well.

Go in the certain knowledge that you will be sadly missed and fondly remembered and the World is a poorer place with your passing.



## Drink Driving Facts

- ★ Alcohol affects decision-making, reaction times, speed and distance judgements, concentration and perception, balance (eg especially when riding a motorcycle) and alertness, and can give a false sense of confidence which may increase risk-taking behaviors. *Department of Transport, Western Australia, 2001 Drive Safe Book, Part 1- Safe Driving.*
- ★ Consuming alcohol prior to driving increases one's crash risk. Studies have shown that drivers are twice as likely to crash with a BAC of 0.05g/100ml, seven times as likely to crash with a BAC of 0.08g/100ml, while a BAC of 0.15g/100ml increases the probability of a crash by 25 times. *Roads and Traffic Authority, 2000 Drink driving: Problem Definition and Countermeasure Summary.*
- ★ Alcohol is a major contributor to road crashes in Western Australia. In WA in 2002, 22% of all fatal crashes involved a driver or rider with a BAC of or over the legal limit of 0.05g/100ml. *Legge, M., Gavin, A.L., Cercarelli, L.R.(2004) Reported road Crashes in WA 2002. # SCIENCE AND STUFF

## LIFE UNDER ICE:

An ecosystem has been discovered, quite by accident, thriving under the Antarctic ice. Scientists had been videoing glacial features in the water beneath the collapsed Larsen ice shelf. The scientists discovered mud volcanoes, a thin bacterial mat and a thriving clam community hidden from the sun for 12,000 years by the ice sheet. The ecosystem is fed by subterranean chemical energy rather than by photosynthesis. This is the only such system found flourishing in such extreme cold. But they warn that the life forms will change as they adapt to their new-found exposure. The ice-shelf collapse has opened the system to debris that is rich in organic carbon, and soon the organisms will start using it, and changes will happen rapidly. (New Scientist, 23<sup>rd</sup> July, page 4).



## FJORDS JOIN HERITAGE LIST:

Now we can all join Monty Python's dead parrot in pining for the fjords. Two of Norway's finest, Geiranger and Naeroyfjord, have been elevated to the list of 160 natural World Heritage Sites. Their narrow, steep-sided valleys, gouged by glaciers, stretch from 500 metres below the surface of the Norwegian Sea to 1400 metres above it. The fjords join seven other sites named last week by the World Heritage Committee, meeting in Durban, South Africa. Others on the list are: Wadi Al-Hitan, a desert valley in Egypt that contains fossils of the last whales to have legs; marine ecosystems in the Gulf of Chiriqui in Panama and off the Japanese island of Hokkaido; a nirvana for alpine flora known as the Valley of Flowers National Park in India; and a mosaic of tropical forests in Thailand. The prize has been a particularly long time coming for another new entry, Vredefort Dome near Johannesburg, South Africa. The dome, site of the Earth's largest and oldest known meteorite impact, is all that remains of a lump of rock bigger than Mount Everest that collided with Earth two billion years ago. It is surrounded by a crater 380 kilometres across. According to UNESCO, the collision created "the world's greatest single known energy release" and may have increased oxygen in the atmosphere enough for multicellular life to develop. (New Scientist, 23/7, p. 4).

## BAFFLED ASTRONOMERS:

The Cassini spacecraft's closest fly-by yet of Saturn's moon Enceladus, on 14<sup>th</sup> July, has revealed strange surface features seen nowhere else in the solar system. Its icy surface appears to be strewn with boulders up to 20 metres wide. Astronomers had expected a smooth or cratered surface, and cannot explain the anomaly. (New Scientist 23/7, p.5).

## CLEANER SEAS:

The European Union has adopted a directive to help tackle oil spills and illegal dumping at sea. Member states can now impose penalties that include heavy fines, prevention of access to subsidies and aid, and

even prison sentences. More than 400,000 tonnes of hydrocarbons are thought to be dumped illegally each year in European Waters. (New Scientist 23/7).

## US DOMINANCE IN DOUBT?

The US's world lead in science and technology could slip because too few Americans are opting for science degrees. A study shows 17 per cent of US graduates are scientists or engineers. The World average is 27 per cent. The study predicts that by 2010 Europe will be turning out twice as many science and engineering PhDs as the US. (New Scientist. 16/7, p, 5).



## CONGO RISKS EJECTION:

Garamba National Park in the Democratic Republic of the Congo could become the first World Heritage Site to lose its status if it fails to protect the last remaining northern white rhinos - the rare subspecies that earned the park its title in the first place. Only 10 rhinos are believed to be left in the wild. (New Scientist. 23/July, p.5).

## SKIING IN ANTARCTICA:

The British Antarctic Survey's new base on the Brunt ice shelf will be built on skis. If the base is in danger of being stranded on a section of ice breaking away from the shelf, the 12 modules can be towed to safety.



## EVOLVED THINKING:

Archaeologists have traditionally envisioned Homo Sapiens becoming modern of mind quickly, and recently - sometime in the past 50,000 years - more than 100,000 years after attaining anatomical modernity. New discoveries in Africa indicate that many of the elements of modern human behaviour can be traced much farther back in time. The finds suggest that our species had a keen intellect at its inception, and exploited that creativity in archaeologically visible ways only when it was advantageous to do so - when population size increased, for instance.

Homo Sapiens may not have been the only hominid to possess such advanced cognition: some artefacts hint that Neanderthals were comparably gifted. (Scientific American June 2005 page 66).

## INDONESIA FLU FEARS:

H5N1 bird flu may have killed a father and his two daughters in Indonesia, officials say. If tests confirm their suspicions, the family will be the first people in the country to die of the virus. It is not yet clear how the trio became infected. (New Scientist 23/July page 5).

# Strategic Planning the Focus of Shire Budget

The start of financial year means the presentation of a new Annual Budget for the Shire of Lake Grace. Following community consultation, numerous meetings and budget drafting sessions by councillors and staff, Council has delivered a budget that will initiate major changes in the Shire, particularly in planning.

Whilst the 2005/06 Financial Year Budget contains a number of significant capital projects, the main focus will be a whole shire strategic plan. As part of this process, Council will work with the community on a cultural planning process with the assistance of Community Arts Network Western Australia (CAN WA).

Other significant planning includes development of an ongoing waste management plan, review of the Municipal Inventory, development of a master trails plan and a review of the shires long term road construction and maintenance programs.

"The biggest challenge the shire will face during the year will be completing the \$2.2m road construction program," said Chief Executive Officer, Chris Jackson. "The program includes \$500k of projects carried over from 2004/2005 which was created by a lack of water for road works. The costs of road construction are supported by \$216k from the State's Regional Road Group program and \$520k from the Commonwealth's Roads to Recovery initiative."

After discussions over many years, the Shire Administration building will be renovated to enhance office space, improve public access and upgrade the customer service area. Council has allocated \$650,000 in the budget for the improvements which will be funded through a reserve fund transfer and loan funds.

General rates have risen by 2.4% in line with the Consumer Price Index (CPI). Specified Area Rates (SAR) continue to be used to fund operating costs associated with sport and recreation, town halls,

telecentres and libraries and capital development costs for recreation facilities. Other major items of expenditure include:

- Sealing of the Lake Grace Airstrip \$60,000. A grant application for 50% of this cost to the Regional Airport Development Scheme has been successful
- Construction of a new fire shed at Varley \$55,000 with funding from the FESA Levy
- New public toilets for Newdegate and Lake King
- Replacement of a prime mover and loader
- Commence upgrade works to the Newdegate Hall
- Commence the process of release of residential land for Lake King and industrial land in Lake Grace and Newdegate
- Upgrade of financial and records management software
- Development of a new Newdegate Medical Centre
- Construction of a new house to assist with attracting a tradesperson to the shire with funding from the Country Housing Authority
- Joint Venture Housing for Newdegate
- Recommence work on redevelopment of the Lake Grace Sporting Precinct

"This is a challenging budget that will take considerable effort by Councillors, staff and the community with the establishment of long term plans for the Shire of Lake Grace," said Mr Jackson. "The development of the budget has also identified the need to provide for better reporting processes that will assist both Councillors and staff in management of the shire operations and provide improved transparency for the community."

# NIGHT WATCH



Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 12<sup>th</sup> to midnight Friday 26<sup>th</sup> August. Astronomy is looking up and never look directly at the Sun with the naked eye, use the right equipment.

**The Sun** resides in the Constellation of Leo, shining at -26.72 magnitude for the whole fortnight. The first quarter Moon is at 10:28am on Saturday, reflecting the sunlight at -6.0 magnitude.

On Sunday evening, the **Moon** will be 0.4 degrees (very close), to the bright red star Alpha Scorpii (Antares), the heart of the Scorpion "the rival of Mars". It is the 17<sup>th</sup> brightest star in the sky at 200 light years distant. On Friday 19<sup>th</sup>, the Moon will be at Perigee (closest), at 357,393kms at 2pm.

The **Full Moon** on Saturday 19<sup>th</sup>, will be at 1:43am and reflects the sunlight at -12.0 magnitude. On Friday 26<sup>th</sup> at 11:08pm the last quarter Moon reflects the sunlight at -6.0 magnitude. The Moon will be in Libra on 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup>, Scorpius on 15<sup>th</sup>, Ophiuchus on 16<sup>th</sup>, Sagittarius on 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup>, Capricornus on 19<sup>th</sup> and 20<sup>th</sup>, Aquarius on 21<sup>st</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup>, Pisces on 23<sup>rd</sup> and 24<sup>th</sup>, Aries on 25<sup>th</sup> and 26<sup>th</sup>.

**Mercury**, in Leo, rising in the Saturday morning twilight at 5:58am, shines at +1.2 magnitude. On Friday 26<sup>th</sup>, Mercury rises at 5:37am, and shines at -0.05 magnitude.

On Saturday in Virgo, **Venus** at -4.0 magnitude, sets at 8:20pm and at 8:42pm on Friday 26<sup>th</sup>. The red planet Mars in Aries, rises Saturday evening at 11:35pm and shines at -1.8 magnitude. On Thursday 25<sup>th</sup>, Mars will be 6°, (fist at arms length), of the Moon, and rises at 11:14pm.

**Jupiter**, at magnitude -1.8 in Virgo, sets on Saturday at 9:51pm and at 9:11pm on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup>.

The ringed gas planet, **Saturn**, rises in the Saturday morning twilight at 5:53am, in Cancer at +0.3 magnitude, and rises at 5:07am on Saturday 26<sup>th</sup>.

On Saturday at +5.7 magnitude, **Uranus** rises at 6:59pm. Uranus, on Saturday 20<sup>th</sup>, will be 2° (thumb at arm's length), north of the Moon. On Friday 26<sup>th</sup>, Uranus

rises at 6:06pm.

**Neptune**, in Capricornus, shining at magnitude +7.9 is in the sky all night and will be 5 degrees south of the moon, (about three fingers at arms length), on Friday 19<sup>th</sup>. Binoculars are needed to find Neptune.

The small planet **Pluto** at magnitude +13.9, sets in the morning at 2:50am, and resides in the small constellation of Serpens Caput. A large telescope and a good star map is needed to find Pluto.

**Meteors** can be seen in Aquarius during the night as well as odd meteors picked up by the Earth as it travels through space. Also some satellites can be seen as they traverse the night sky, and if you see flashes, they can be tumblers or planes, and a bright one can be the space station.

With the Moon in the night sky until it starts setting, after it is full on the 20<sup>th</sup>, there is not much to observe, but after that it will improve and here are some objects that can be seen by naked eye, binoculars or telescope.

From around 7pm, and with the Constellations of Ara and Scorpius above, you can easily identify the centre of the Galaxy. Behind the scorpion's tail is the bright open star cluster of M7 and a bit further away is M6 the butterfly cluster. M7 is close to the yellow star G, and with a telescope you can see the globular cluster 6441. The very brightest part of the milky way behind the tail is the centre of our Galaxy, which is in Sagittarius. If you could be above the Galaxy, you would see a great dome of old yellow and orange stars. The bright spots north of the teapot is M20 the trifold nebula, M8 the lagoon nebula and star cluster. If you use binoculars you will see many star clusters and with a telescope many more globular clusters.

In the north west is the bright blue star **Vega**, the brightest star in the constellation of Lyra, and to the south of that is the bright white star **Altair**, the brightest star in the constellation of Aquila, the eagle.





## Court Case Leads to Reminder on Safe Use of Forklifts



A stonemason company has been fined \$5000 for failing to provide and maintain a safe working environment for its employees after two workers sustained foot injuries when a granite slab fell from a forklift.

Marble and Granite Pty Ltd was convicted in the Magistrate's Court of WA Perth last week of failing to provide and maintain a working environment in which its employees were not exposed to hazards.

In May 2003, a company employee lifted a 200kg slab of granite with a forklift in order to move it to a grinding machine in another position.

The forklift had a lifting attachment which comprised a clamp that grabs the slab between two pads to lift it, so the slab was attached only by a small point at the top centre and was free to swing during lifting and transportation.

The floor surface was uneven, so two other employees – one an apprentice – were holding onto the slab to stabilise it while it was being transported.

The slab slipped from the attachment and fell to the ground, landing on one foot of each of the men stabilising it, causing injury to both men's feet despite the fact that they were wearing safety boots.

WorkSafe WA Commissioner Nina Lyhne said today that the case was a reminder of the importance of enforcing safe work practices with and around forklifts.

"Work practices associated with forklifts have consistently shown higher than average rates of workplace injuries and deaths," Ms Lyhne said.

"Forklifts are one of the areas that have been particularly targeted by WorkSafe for education and enforcement action.

"In this particular case, it was very fortunate that the injuries sustained by the employees were not more serious – the slab could easily have fallen on more than just their feet.

"We heard of a court case in Victoria just this week where a glass company was fined \$310,000 over the

death of a worker who was crushed by a one-tonne load of glass that fell from a forklift in a similar fashion to this incident.

"In WA, there has not been a death involving a forklift in a workplace for the past five years, and I see this being at least in part due to excellent proactive work by WorkSafe inspectors and a concerted effort by industry.

"There is no shortage of guidance information available to workplaces on the safe use of forklifts, and I urge any workplace that uses forklifts to ensure they are familiar with the laws and have safe work practices in place.

"This workplace did not have safe work procedures in place, and has suffered the consequences in a number of ways."

Some of the safe work practices that need to be followed when using forklifts include:

- Using the forklift on a hard level surface without potholes to improve stability;
- Pointing the tynes upwards when traveling with a load on a ramp;
- Ensuring a forklift is never turned sideways on a ramp;
- Ensuring forklifts are driven at a low speed;
- Ensuring that forklift operators are qualified and old enough to operate the vehicle;
- Ensuring that proper restraints are fitted and used, and that a rollover protection structure is fitted; and
- Ensuring that systems of work are in place to ensure the safety of pedestrian traffic around forklifts.

"Forklifts can be particularly hazardous, and I strongly urge everyone in workplaces that have forklifts to take every precaution in and around these vehicles," Ms Lyhne said.







# VP Day Celebrations



## *War Time Memories of Lake Grace...*

*John Kellow came to Lake Grace in late 1941 to work for Jack Wilson, who owned a motor garage and the "Pictures", and operated the Electric Light Station for the Road Board. These are his recollections of the War years.*

At the Electric Light Station were large and small oil powered engines which had to be heated with a blow lamp, before being crank started. I learned how to do that, and also learned how to show the Pictures on a Saturday night, which became duties that kept me busy. At the garage Mr Wilson made several gas producers and I helped make his last one, along with the generator and the cleaners, which they fitted to a Ford V8 utility. It was a joyous moment when we eventually had the motor running on gas, and a real sense of achievement, with every thing working fine!

A very important part of my work was to keep the cars going. Parts were scarce, so we had to make them, particularly exhaust systems and mufflers. We used to put a new cover over the mufflers, the inside part being okay, and then make the exhaust system and fit them. We had to weld up parts, and dress them down, and hope they would go another twelve months – it was a challenging task!

Wooden wheels were a problem, the spokes used to come loose in them. We would take them off and repack the spokes, and if we didn't the spokes would break, then the vehicle would be of no use. We had to do these things, you couldn't buy new parts! Sometimes work was short, so we would make 4,500 litre tanks.

Late in 1943, a scare came through Army Intelligence that the enemy was going to land at either Bremer Bay or Hopetoun, so the Army applied blackout regulations to towns within a 150 mile radius. That meant all the windows and doorways had to be blacked out. At sundown the blinds had to be pulled down, or a blanket put over the windows. A tricky part was, you weren't allowed to open the door of the house with the light on in the room. So there was a bit of a "code knock", when a neighbour or a friend came to visit, they were to knock quite loudly, and that told you it was a friend. So you had to make sure to switch the light off, then open the door, talk to the person, or let them in, then close the door before switching the light on again. If you didn't do that you were in real trouble!

We were allowed to carry a torch, though only a few had them, and while walking you had to shine it directly

onto the ground, about half a metre in front of your feet. It could prevent you from tripping over any of the cows that roamed the streets, and may have been asleep on the footpath.

What caused this scare was the Intelligence about the possible enemy landing, which also brought army officers to Lake Grace to discuss their thinking. They had thoughts of putting an army camp at Lake Bryde, and if things got worse, or information became more definite, that is what they would have done. Discussions were held with the Road Board, about the Army Camp, and whether they could get sufficient food and supplies, perhaps beer, and fuel to run the show. Entertainment would be required for the soldiers, so we would be asked to put on dances, pictures and sporting events. Concern was felt by the Chairman of the Management when he asked, "With all these soldiers here, what about our girls, could they retain their freedom they have now?" There was a silence, before the humoured response, "Boys will be boys you know!" They were the types of discussions that were held.

All car headlights had to be blacked out with a cover, so you could only see an area about 25 metres in front. Though it was difficult on the rough roads, you were only doing 30 km's per hour, and there were no accidents and no one came to harm that I knew of. You were then invisible from aircraft. In the event of the enemy making an advance, all road signs had to be taken down and all place names obliterated, such as on the Hotel, Hall, Railway Station, so that they would not know where they were. It all had to happen that way!

To save fuel and economise, the electric light engines were switched off at 11pm, and restarted at 6am. Though it was a bother waiting up late, Vince Lucas stopped and restarted the engines, as he lived next door. On the few times I had to do it, it was awkward finding your way home, finding the door knob, then into bed in the dark. These were things we had to put up with!

One of my biggest disappointments was when I turned eighteen – I applied to join the Air Force, but was "manpowered" for essential services! That really upset me. I wanted to go to the War like everyone else, but couldn't, so I then involved myself with many duties around town. Prior to the War, the Singer sewing machine man would come to town, to sell or repair Singer sewing machines. During the War he didn't

come, so I was asked to see if I could repair a sewing machine. I was successful, so another lady came with a machine to fix. I was able to fix that too, so then others came to be fixed. I then became known as the Singer sewing machine mechanic. It was a nice clean job and easy to do, so I didn't mind doing it.

I must mention the Italian Prisoners of War who came to the district. They were a godsend to the farmers, as they were good workers, good people, and there were a lot of them who helped the farmers no end. They would come to the Pictures in uniform and were very well

behaved. Though Dr Margaret Clarke was a registered army doctor, she did not speak Italian, so she had a job to tell if they had a toothache, headache or what was ailing them, so she took a crash course in Italian, and her diagnosis was much easier after that. The Italian Prisoners of War liked it here, and some did not want to go home, while others who had to, were quick to come back.

## ***From the Archives...***

**From "JOHN & LIZZIE LAY ARCHIVES" – This document, hand written by John in War years, may have been a "procedural plan" or a response to Army Intelligence. It shows a state of preparation.**

**Allan Zweck**

### **LAKE GRACE UNIT**

(Based on the fact that each section of ten men, of all units, will have M.Gun [Machine Gun] in each section).

1<sup>st</sup>. Inform Newdegate and Lake King Units to report urgently to Lake Grace Command, and leave word for civil population to carry on as usual so as to lead enemy to believe that their attack will be the surprise anticipated.

2<sup>nd</sup>. Inform Hyden Unit and report all haste to Lake Grace Command.

3<sup>rd</sup>. Inform Narrogin Command of impending attack, asking that Units from, say Dumbleyung & Kukerin be notified and report to Lake Grace immediately, as stand by men.

4<sup>th</sup>. See Post Master and Station Master, asking them to stand by, & in the event of attack succeeding, of which they would be informed, to disrupt their telephones, in such manner to make them useless to enemy.

5<sup>th</sup>. Two men of Lake Grace Co. with truck or utility to immediately scout round, for shovels, bags, preferably sand bags, & to pick up explosives, fuse wire, & quantity tins, & then proceed to Steep Hill on Newdegate Road.

6<sup>th</sup>. Two men with Utility truck, to pick up first Aid Kit, a few Stretchers, quantity of fresh water, etc. / the men with truck to have knowledge of First Aid, to be able to deal with any minor casualties, that may happen before or after attack.


7<sup>th</sup>. Two men of the Lake Grace Unit to be left at Lake Grace to inform Hyden Unit where to report, in this case, Steep hill on Newdegate Road.

8<sup>th</sup>. Also same men to meet Units from Kukerin & Dumbleyung, and to have authority to place these Units in position immediately surrounding Oil Depots, in the most advantageous & concealed positions possible, men with knowledge of explosives to immediately lay charges of explosives at both Depots, with connections running some distance to well concealed, yet observant positions, so that in the event of all Defences failing, to blow up & so leave enemy stranded, with no communications & with very little petrol as their initial supply was only sufficient for 200 miles. During preparations at Depots, people living in close vicinity of to be warned to leave their homes for few hours, purely as a matter of precaution / and an all clear signal arranged.
