Fine Conditions for 2004 Turkey Day

What started out in 1960 as sponsorship by Jack McMahon and Jim O'Neill with the practical idea of a 'couple of turkeys', has turned into the 'Holy Grail' of the Lake Grace Golf Club.

Initially this was a men's only competition, with winners receiving a live turkey hen and a bottle of wine. Women were invited to take part in 1974 with Esther O'Neill providing the sponsorship. By this stage the sponsorship had evolved into men receiving a dressed turkey gobbler and a bottle of wine while the ladies received a dressed turkey hen and vegetables.

By 1990 Peter and Lyn Taylor, avid golfers themselves, had taken on the sponsorship of what had become one of the Club's main events.

According to local folklore, when Peter Taylor and his partner won in the 1960's Peter, who was living with and working for Jim and Esther O'Neill at the time, took his hen home where she promptly laid and hatched a number of chicks. These young turkeys were then fattened up and fed to the guests at Peter's 21st birthday in 1965 - no Presidential pardon for those turkeys.

In later years another winner is rumoured to have

ABCDE

Asset Based Community Development through Education

A project that opens the doors of Lake Grace District High School to adult learners is just one concept proposed for the ABCDE pilot program.

The ABCDE reference group met last week to outline their ideas to the local community and visiting district school principals. Students from Lake Grace District High School gave an impressive presentation of their surveys of local business and our natural assets.

Guest speaker Dr Rick Battistoni, director of Project 540 talked about his experiences with American secondary students and shared his ideas for ABCDE. Since 2002, more than 140,000 students in 250 schools have participated in Project 540 which asks students to talk about what matters most to them and to work together with adults for positive change.

The aims of Project 540 relate well to the ABCDE pilot as a way for young people to influence and be involved in their communities as decision makers. ABCDE also aims to bring the community into the school and, with that in mind, the reference group discussed the direction of the project and how to 'move from talk to action'.

The group's ideas for the project include an intergenerational Community School Week, a Vocational Education Program and a Regional Students Forum. Another suggestion was to involve students in recording and interpreting the histories of local one-teacher schools.

The most feasible concept was a Community School Week which could provide instructional and information sessions for both school students and adult learners.

A Community School Week could also give local people the chance to demonstrate their talents, interests and hobbies. The ABCDE survey has identified many local skills ranging from cooking to camp-drafting which, with the addition of specialist instructors, could provide an exciting and engaging program.

Ms Margaret Banks, Acting Director General of Education and Training will launch ABCDE this Friday. All community members are invited. Survey forms will be available for those who wish to be added to the skills register.

Local Partnerships Give Young People The Edge!

Gaining the required experience, developing the necessary employability skills or trying to decide what career path to take can be a daunting task for young people in their final years of schooling.

The Schools of Isolated & Distance Education (SIDE), which ranks as one of the biggest schools in the world, and local business organisations throughout the state, are making this process easier for some of these Year 11 and 12 students. The workplace learning program including Structured Workplace Learning (SWL) and School Based Traineeships (SBT) is second to none in assisting students achieve the above three aims.

A simple explanation of the program is to say it is on the job training, enabling the student to experience, first hand the world of work. The beauty of it is they also combine this with their Secondary School Graduation (WACE) so it's a win, win situation all around.

Don Gardiner from Gardiner's Meat Supply and Kim Allen from Lake Grace Mobile Childcare are examples of enthusiastic employers who become involved. Comments from them and other employers indicate the benefit... "It provides a wonderful opportunity source to employees.", "It made my staff contemplate their performance and helped improve productivity, as they teach young people about the industry!", "It has helped me keep up to date with today's training methods and expectations of youth.", "We found an apprentice and are happy with him.", "Its about time this was part of every student's Upper School education! It's a win, win for everyone."

It has relevancy to their lives. Peter Drinkwater and Shane Murray believe it has many hidden advantages to all stakeholders ... students, parents, the school and community.

99 Towns Take Fast Track to Broadband

More than 106,000 customers in 99 towns, most in rural areas, are set to gain broadband ADSL access for the first time. Unfortunately Lake Grace is NOT one of these towns.

The exchange upgrades have been made possible following Telstra's approval as a provider of ADSL services under the Australian Government's Higher Bandwidth Incentive (HiBIS) Scheme.

Telstra is using the incentives offered by the scheme to reduce the required level of interest on its ADSL Demand Register by between 40 and 60 percent, with the result that these exchanges have automatically exceeded their demand threshold for ADSL delivery.

The required level of demand will depend on the extent of modifications necessary to enable ADSL. Prior to HiBIS Telstra required a registered interest of 60 for Lake Grace, we are currently sitting on 61. This should stand us in good stead for an assessment of our exchange by Telstra.

Telstra has rolled our ADSL to more than 1000

telephone exchanges over the past four years, making it available to more than 75 percent of premises. Australia's geography and population distribution mean that we have a telecommunications network characterised by a large number of small exchanges serving small communities.

The ADSL demand registere was introduced last October as a means of empowering communities, allowing them to directly influence the further allocation of ADSL resources, and already 81 communities have triggered the process to obtain an ADSL upgrade for their towns.

Confirmation of required demand can take several weeks, with the process to enable an exchange usually a further two to three months. In some exceptional circumstances where additional construction is required to support ADSL, the upgrade may take longer. These cases will be annotated on the ADSL Demand Register.

This is an ongoing program, and people who live in towns without ADSL can go in and register their

Now imagine a giant man, over six foot, continually drilling this word with force into the minds of the students, and tell me you wouldn't have recurring nightmares about it. To dream in another language is the most amazing feeling, and for me the most exciting thing about sleeping; but to have my first real French dream with a math-amagician pounding the word 'STRICTEMENT' is an experience I will never forget.

Its hard to believe I have been here almost six months, and it is very difficult to keep in contact with everyone as time is passing by so quickly, but I hope that with these reports you feel you are taking this journey with me, as I feel I am part of your year when you update me on all the *goss* from the land of Oz...

Some advice for all you intended travellers out there: I have found that a *Bonne sourire* (smile) *et une petite bonjour* (and a 'hello') is the best way to make someone's day, and a new friend. Okay, so sometimes I overdo the smile and scare people to death, but more times than not I will end up having a great conversation about Australia and land an invitation for dinner... that is how friendly people are. I did also mention before that our house in Perth will become a backpackers hostel. I am sorry, Dad, but I think we will need to invest in something larger!

As mid year approaches, we are forced to say goodbye to the "exchangees" who leave us in July and August. These are the same people who happily adopted us as their 'newies' back in January, taught us about the Belgium transport system, lifestyle, specialities, great tourist experiences, all the secret pathways out of school (which of course I have never used!), and the most

important French words, please, thank you, I would like that very much, can I have one beer please... As I eagerly await the next wave of students, my thoughts are of how many close friends I will never see again in my life. It is definitely a world like nothing I have experienced before but I reflect back to this quote by Deng Ming-Dao.

"Those truly linked don't need correspondence. When they meet again after many years apart, their friendship is as true as ever."

I have no idea who this dude really is or what he stands for, but his words are fairly spot on I find. I am thankful to them all for the amazing experiences we have shared in the past six months. One fantastic memory for me is the Europe tour 2004, from which I have just come home. So, it starts with 75 exchange students from 14 different nationalities, 4 fantastic chaperones and a bus driver, Mustafa (or for those fans of The Lion King we nicknamed him Mufasa!).

In his President's Report of 5th May 1987, the then President Mr Phil Franks commented on the amount of work involved in being secretary, and that Shirley was always available to do the task.


From 2nd May 1972 to date there have been 94


meetings held. Mrs Elliott has attended all but four of these meetings.

Healthy Club Sponsorship Program

Most Men Take An Interest In Maintaining Their Vehicles. How About Their Bodies?

Men are the sickest group in society after Aboriginals and are more likely to die of all selected causes than women. Self maintenance does not seem to be a part of men's agenda. To promote the idea of men maintaining their body at an optimum performance level the Lake Grace and District Health Service will be inviting men to put their bodies over the Pits at the Newdegate Field Days $1^{st} - 2^{nd}$ September 2004

Pit Stop for men is based on a mechanical concept likening parts of the body to an engine. Men can have their oil levels (blood pressure) tested, their duco (skin) checked and will be asked if they check their spark plugs (testicles).

The mechanical concept brings an element of humour to men's health and removes it from a clinical setting. The challenge is on the men to see if their body will pass the pits with flying colours or be issued with a yellow sticker for follow up maintenance.

Make Pap Smears a Routine for Life

In Western Australia more than 90 women develop cervical cancer every year and more than 30 women die from this disease. One of the answers to reducing the risk of developing cervical cancer is to encourage women to participate in regular two-yearly Pap smears, and to maintain this behaviour throughout the course of their adult life. A Pap smear every two years can help prevent up to 90% of the most common type of cervical cancer

Sometimes women aren't sure whether they need to have a Pap smear or not.

Margaret only ever had one partner and hasn't had sex for a long time. She thinks she doesn't need a Pap smear.

If you have ever had sex, regardless of how long ago the last time was, you should have a Pap smear every two years. This includes women who have only ever had one partner.

Pauline had a hysterectomy eight years ago and her friends told her that she wouldn't need Pap smears anymore.

Whether you need to have Pap smears after your hysterectomy depends on:

- **曾** If you still have a cervix
- 와 And whether your Pap smears were normal before the operation

Pauline should check with her doctor to see if she needs to have a Pap smear.

Maggie (aged 63) says she's too old to bother with Pap smears.

Increasing age is a major risk factor for developing cervical cancer. It is important for women to continue having Pap smears until they are 70.

Joan thought that the purpose of a Pap smear was to detect cancer.

The purpose of a Pap smear is to detect any abnormal changes in the cells of the cervix

long before cervical cancer develops. The majority of such changes do not develop into cancer, but sometimes these changes need to be monitored or treated.

So if you are a woman aged between 20-69 years, ask yourself this question - when did you last have a Pap smear? Make an appointment with your doctor, community or women's health centre. It's up to you; regular Pap smears could save your life.

Baby Bath Seats Drowning Risk

Never leave children in a bath without adult supervision for any reason is the urgent message from Consumer Protection.

While swimming pools are understandably singled out as dangerous to young children, parents don't realise that approximately 20% of infant drownings in Australia occur in baths.

Consumer watchdogs around Australia have moved to consider the need for Government regulation to address the hazards associated with 'frames' in which a baby is placed in a bath of water, following a drowning in NSW. "Water and children can be a deadly combination with even the briefest lapse of supervision", Consumer Protection Commissioner Patrick Walker warns.

"Regardless of children being in bath seats, supports, harnesses or inflatable devices they should never be left unattended. Children should never supervise other children in a bath", he said.

A review by the Victorian Coroner found that of 22 bath related drownings in Victoria, 64% occurred when at least one other child was present.

Western Australia and NSW have both had labelling standards in place for baby bath seats since 1987. Western Australia has decided to introduce a new substantially enhanced Safety Order developed by

NSW. The new Order came into force on 1st August 2004 and requires bath seats to have a prominent warning displayed on the goods in a position visible at all times during usage.

The use of baby seats in baths continues to be monitored. While data on the dangers of bath seats in Australia is limited, information from the US Consumer Product Safety Committee is that there is no evidence that children being bathed with a baby seat are at greater risk of drowning than those without them.

"There is no substitution for adult supervision. Children have drowned in the time it takes to answer a telephone or get a towel", the Commissioner said.

General safety tips:

- Never leave babies alone in a bath not even for a second.
- Never use bath seats or supports in non slip baths as suction caps can detach suddenly.
- · Never leave water in a bathtub that is unattended either while filling the bath or after bathing.
- Never leave buckets of water such as nappy buckets or eskies around young children.
- \cdot Keep toilet lids down. Consider using a clip to secure the lid.

How plants evolved big broad leaves: Falling levels of atmospheric carbon dioxide gave primitive land plants the cue to spread their leaves and soak up the sun. In the early

Devonian period, 400 million years ago, leaves were tiny stick-like projections called microphylls and plants were far less efficient. Those ancient plants had the genes and physiological machinery to produce those big leaves but they did not do so for at least 20 more million years. It was wondered whether high levels of CO² at that time were what held back leaf development, and a computer model was devised to simulate leaf behaviour.

In the early Devonian, the level of atmospheric CO² was ten times today's, and plants required far fewer pores, or stomata. However, there was a downside to having so few stomata. Their model showed stomata also act like sweat glands, cooling the leaf by releasing water. If the leaves had grown much larger they would have soaked up more of the sunlight but would not have had enough pores to prevent overheating and cook the leaves. The drop in CO² levels 370 million yeas ago might have forced plants to increase the density of stomata, which would in turn have allowed them to grow large leaves while keeping cool. To test the idea, researchers looked at the fossil record and measured the leaf area of 300 plant species, as well as the number of stomata on a few rare specimens with intact outer cuticles. They found that the rapidly dropping global CO² levels were matched by an increase in pore density, and increasing leaf area. It is the first convincing evidence that explains the time lag in leaf evolution. National Academy of Science, Vol. 101, pg 10360



We've Given Oceans Acid Indigestion: The world's oceans have soaked up half of the carbon dioxide pumped into the air by

human activities since the beginning of the industrial age, according to two new studies. The gas is acidifying the seas and may harm marine life. Atmospheric CO² had shot up from 280 parts per million in 1800 to 380 ppm today. But the studies conclude that figure would be 435 ppm were it not for the oceans. The oceans are doing a good job, but it is changing the chemistry of the oceans and may have consequences for marine ecosystems.

Bursting Balloons: The rips that tear through a rubber balloon when it is popped travel faster than the speed of sound in rubber, creating waves similar to the sonic boom

made by an aircraft when it breaks the sound barrier. The finding contradicts current theory, which says that cracks cannot, propagate faster than the speed of sound in a material. When a balloon is popped, it leaves wavy edges, which no existing theory of how cracks propagate can explain, so researchers used a high speed camera to watch a crack as it tore through a stretched rubber sheet. They found that the crack travelled faster than sound, sending a shock wave through the material.

The First Pet Cats: Ancient Egyptians may have had to shoo their cats away to read the morning papyrus, but historians have long suspected that the sphinx builders were not he first cat owners. A burial site in Cyprus now provides solid evidence that another civilization cleaned up after Felix's hairballs 5000 years earlier. Found was the complete skeleton of a cat lying near the bones of a human. Both sets of remains were in the same sediment and at the same depth and showed the same degree of preservation, suggesting that feline and human were buried together about 9500 years ago. Evidently, then the domestication of cats occurred about 3000 years after that of dogs and close to the time when farming began - when cats would have been useful in protecting stores from mice. (Science 9th April)

Record Raindrops: You wouldn't want these raindrops falling on you head. Measuring up to 8.8 millimetres across, making them the largest ever recorded. They were discovered in

clouds over a burning rainforest in Brazil and over the Marshall Islands in the Pacific. Typically, raindrops never grow to more that 5 mm across. Beyond that size they break into smaller droplets when they crash into each other, or disintegrate during free-fall. The droplets were found when researchers were going through atmospheric data from 1995 to 1999. Some may even have been as much as a centimetre across. The droplets may have formed around ash particles over the blazing forests.

Baking With Pamela

Lemon Marshmallow Slice

As I have said before, "I love lemon". Hence, this is another favourite recipe, which was given to me by a dear aunty when I was only 11. She also bought me my first Cake Decorating book for my tenth birthday and was a great teacher of all home craft. This slice will always remind me of "my kids" I taught at Lake Grace as it was always a winner when I made it to take on an excursion, sleepover or camp.

Biscuit

120g butter

180g flour

3 tablespoons water

Set oven at 190C. Use a tin 28x18cm (make $1\frac{1}{2}$ quantities for a larger tin).

Rub butter into flour until it resembles breadcrumbs, add water until a pastry consistency.

Press into slice tin. Bake until crisp and light brown.

Filling

1½ cups water
½ cup sugar
60g butter
juice 1-2 lemons
60g cornflour

60g custard powder

Blend together over a low heat in a saucepan. Boil 2-3 minutes. Cool and spread over cooked base.

Topping

½ cup sugar ½ cup water

1 dessertspoon gelatine

2 tablespoons coconut

Boil sugar and water for 5 minutes. Add gelatine then mix until it is dissolved. Cool. Beat with a mixer until thick. Pour topping over slice, sprinkle with coconut.

HINT

If you are like me and seem to have trouble quickly dissolving gelatine without the lumps, then try using gelatine leaves. They are magic to use and are available in specialist grocery stores.

Hazelnut Chocolate Slice

This is one of the yummiest slices I have ever tasted. I usually call it "Michelle's Slice" as it is another one of those acquired from a colleague. Not only is it delicious but also very easy. I usually triple the quantity as then I have a freezer full of gifts to give friends if we are visiting. If you want something for a special occasion then this one wins.

Base

1 pkt milk arrowroot biscuits - crush roughly

1/2 tin condensed milk

2-3 dspns golden syrup

3 dspns butter

Melt ingredients and combine with crushed biscuits

* Refrigerate base while making topping.

Topping

1 Family block hazelnut chocolate 50g copha

Melt together and pour over cooled base.

This mixture makes a tin 28x18 cm Use 1 1/2 quantities for larger tin.

Don't Let Itinerant Traders Fleece You

The Department of Consumer and Employment Protection (DOCEP) and the Painters Registration Board are warning consumers to be on alert for itinerant traders, or risk being ripped off.

Consumer and Employment Protection Minister John Kobelke said itinerant traders were often roof painters, bitumen layers or carpet cleaners who worked over a district leaving behind shoddy work, counterfeit goods, overcharged customers and false contact details.

"Do not be dazzled by the supposedly fantastic prices offered by these unscrupulous rogues, as in most cases these jobs end in heartache and disaster for consumers who can afford it the least," Mr Kobelke said.

"These shonky tradesmen make unsolicited approaches to consumers with the offer of a cut price deal for cash to lay bitumen, or perhaps paint roofs and gutters, using materials supposedly left over from other jobs.

"A big concern for us is that these crooks often target the elderly and people on low incomes, almost using stand over tactics to get cash payments up front."

The Minister said in the past some elderly people had even been driven to banks or ATMs under duress, to get the cash.

These itinerant traders breach the Door-to-Door Trading Act that gives consumers a 10-day cooling off period to change their mind or shop around to get advice, without having to make any payments within the cooling off period.

"Although they start off portraying a friendly image, this will quickly turn menacing if challenges to their workmanship or identities are made," he said.

"The unlicensed itinerant traders use posters and signs advertising for 'house roofs painted' or 'roof restoration and cleaning' and 'bitumen laying', listing hard to trace mobile phone numbers."

Consumer Protection has advised these types of signs have recently appeared in the Cannington, Thornlie, Belmont, Guildford, Midland, Ferndale, Lynwood, Gosnells, Bull Creek, Rivervale, Leeming, Forrestfield, High Wycombe and Toodyay areas.

Mr Kobelke warned that consumers should avoid getting trapped by anyone who came door-knocking, touting for such work.

"If it is safe to do so, consumers should record the itinerant trader's vehicle registration number and, as soon as they depart, contact Consumer Protection," the Minister said.

"When it comes to painting, always demand to see the painters registration card of any trader you deal with.

"It is better and safer to do your homework and it is recommended you get at least three quotes from trusted local trades people.


"Painters must be licensed by the Painters Registration Board to conduct work valued at more than \$200.00."

Anyone approached by suspicious trades people should call the Consumer Protection Hotline on 1300 30 40 54.

Incidents can also be reported to the Painters Registration Board on 9476 1212, which can also advise consumers if a trader is licensed or not.

The ADSL register is open to anyone who wants ADSL from Telstra or any other participating internet service provider (ISP) that provides broadband via the ADSL network.

When the set level of required interest is reached of the particular geographical area Telstra will confirm the interest shown by residents and examine whether the exchange should be upgraded.

To determine the 'required interest' levels for exchanges, Telstra will carry out a detailed review of the costs involved in providing ADSL. The required interest levels will vary depending on a number of factors, including the size of the exchange, expected market growth, and technical issues such as the cost of ADSL exchange equipment required.


The August meeting of the Lake Grace Development Association proved to be as interesting as usual with a large number of topics covered. Some of the items are listed below;


