My Health Record - Your Health in Your Hands

Media Release

Making notes about medication, trying to remember test results and carrying paper records when visiting healthcare professionals will be simpler with My Health Record.

Having a My Health Record places your health in your hands. My Health Record is a digital summary of your key health information being created for people who choose to have one to improve their healthcare.

It means your important health information such as allergies, immunisations, current conditions and treatments, medicine details, pathology reports or diagnostic imaging reports can be digitally stored in one place. It allows your nominated health care providers access to a summary of your health record when needed.

Real and ongoing benefits from My Health Record will be felt over time as more and more health information is added to a person's My Health Record.

Already 5.8 million Australians have one, and by the end of 2018 a My Health Record will be created for every person with a Medicare card or Department of Veterans' Affairs card, unless they choose not to have one.

How Will My Health Record Help You?

Some of the benefits include convenient access to your healthcare information in one place which can be accessed by doctors, specialists or hospitals that you choose to authorise. It can also be accessed when travelling around Australia.

In a medical emergency and you are unable to communicate, healthcare providers can quickly access health information they need to give you better treatment.

My Health Record can also include an Advanced Care Plan document outlining your wishes in the event you become very ill. This way your authorised healthcare professionals can view the plan and act according to your wishes.

Privacy

The protection of patient information and privacy is critical and there are strong safeguards in place to protect health data in Australia.

Data cannot be used for commercial and non-healthrelated purposes, including direct marketing to consumers, insurance assessments, and eligibility for welfare benefits.

Insurance companies will not be able to access the data. Strict privacy controls, set by the individual, are a key component of My Health Record. Individuals may set controls on their entire record, with a Record Access Code (RAC), or on particular documents within the record with a Limited Document Access Code (LDAC).

A person can also choose, through their My Health Record settings, to be notified by email or SMS when a healthcare provider organisation accesses their record for the first time.

Security

My Health Record has security controls that protect health records from unauthorised access and guard against cyber-attacks including secure gateways and firewalls, encryption, authentication mechanisms, and malicious content filtering.

The Australian Digital Health Agency's Cyber Security Centre monitors for suspicious activities.

During the opt out period – 16 July to 15 October - individuals who do not want a record will be able to opt out by visiting the My Health Record website or by calling 1800 723 471 for phone based assistance.

The new records will be activated when an individual login for the first time or when healthcare providers access records in treating their patients. Two years of Medicare and PBS data will be uploaded, unless an individual chooses not to include this information.

An edited eulogy / service as read by civil celebrant Bridget Williams-Stephen.

Good morning everyone... on behalf of Tameka, Brax, Kelsea, and Jordon and John Vicki and Rob'... welcome... we all know why we are gathered here today...we are here to say farewell to Pete, the most loving ...and the most loved man in the worldand more importantly we are here to celebrate his life.

I didn't know Pete but I met and spoke with his family to help me to see him through their eyes ... having spoken to Tam, I understood entirely why they chose not to have a traditional funeral for Pete today and instead hold a private cremation for Pete beforehand. The reasons are simple. Pete always walked tall and proud and he would hate to have to be "carried" in here to the pavilion. Doing it this way means that he arrives here in Lake Grace and he stays here in Lake Grace, with Tameka and the children.

After this ceremony, you are all invited to stay on here to continue sharing stories and memories ...

Pete's unexpected passing will have left such deep feelings of loss and grief amongst you...especially those who were closest to him. This morning is about supporting each other in acknowledging those feelings which may also help in finding some comfort and some peace.

We will make space for all the emotions that cascade over us in this moment ... inevitable sadness but also light heartedness and laughter and that's important! Tameka said that Pete would be so happy if he knew that today people would be smiling.

Talking to Tam, Vicki, John and Rob, I sensed very quickly that if we are to truly pay tribute to Pete, we must steer clear of long drawn out sad speeches if we can... and focus upon the things about Pete that will make us smile and create happy memories... and there are so many of those.

Pete had a unique combination of characteristics and skills. He was a gentle giant who worked hard and lived by strong values of honesty and loyalty and family love. He was very practical and there was nothing he couldn't turn his hand to, and he was also creative and artistic.

Pete was born on 10th June 1982 in Mount Lawley. The first born child of Vicki and John Roukens. It won't surprise you I'm sure to learn that Pete was long and skinny...and a beautiful placid and happy baby... because he pretty much always remained that way!

John and Vicki shared a lovely story about how one morning when he was only 6 weeks old, they woke up after an undisturbed night's sleep, and at a normal time in the morning and heard...nothing! They flew to his cot with that 'what's up urgency' and there he was ... sleeping oh so peacefully! ...He slept through the night from 6 weeks and parents amongst you will know how unusual that is!

Pete's first school was in Bassendean Perth...and that's

about as much as we need to say about school really because it wasn't a highlight for him...Pete thought that school was just somewhere to go between weekends!



In February 1985, baby brother Rob was born. Pete was 2 and three quarter years old at this time, and in preparation for becoming a 'big brother' Pete had had his dummy confiscated... But wait! He could see that this little baby that was now living in their house with them... had his dummy! (of course it was a different one but he was only 2 and three quarters and it looked the same!)

Pete saw this as an opportunity to get his fix of dummy sucking, and used to sneak under Rob's cot blankets head down and bum upgrab the dummy...get his fix...pop it back into Rob's mouth and go back to bed with Vicki and John looking on smiling!

Now that pretty much summed up the relationship between Pete and Rob from then on! ...Pete did things his way and that didn't usually match Rob's way of doing things from breakfast time onwards!

Sport played a big part in Pete's life from a young age... as a child, having joined the cubs, he loved soap box racing with his best mate Kass Paans ...they competed together and their claim to fame was Kass coming first and Pete second in the Australian Soap box championship! Pete loved going fast!

He began playing basketball at 8yrs old - he went on to become a very skilful player and loved it! He was a member of the Great Southern Development Squad and played at the Lake Grace and Newdegate Country week festivals. Pete was also a footballer and was awarded the fairest and best for Railway's club in Albany.

When Pete left school he went to Tec and did aquaculture, he then went to work pruning grape vines in Franklin. He also went to work at the port in Albany... now if this job doesn't epitomise Pete's amazing work ethic his resilience, and his tolerance... nothing does.....his job was to go down into the hull of the fishing trawlers where the temperature was minus 37 degrees... and then lug 20 kg Pategonian tooth fish up onto the deck and the awaiting transport!

In those days he had dreadlocks which would freeze in that temperature and his work mates used to snap them off! Pete's creative spirit took over and he glued them to a portrait he painted of himself at the time!

Pete used to do seasonal harvest work for CBH at Lake Grace, of course they loved him there and at 23 they offered him a full time job and he became a pest

controller for CBH ... otherwise known as "Pesty Pete." His loyal and dedicated brilliance over the years has been rewarded ten-fold by the respect and friendship and high regard he is held in, by his bosses and peers alike. His hard work and dedication to his job is evidenced by the support CBH is giving to his family... and they want you to know how much they appreciate that.

Family meant absolutely everything to Pete. His loving Mum and Dad Vicki and John, and his brother Rob, his aunts, uncles and cousins and his Oma and Opa must be mentioned because they were so very important to Pete during their lives...may they both rest in peace.

There are of course all Tameka's family who played a big part in Pete's life ...Here is what Tameka said about this...

"Pete's first time meeting my family was when we had a dress up party for an 18th. Mum had organised the costumes... we were running late, so it was "Hi Pete nice to meet you .. here's your costume ... you are Bam Bam". (from the Flintstones).. you will see a pic in the slide show it's a ripper..)

"Pete treated my 4 sisters as his own, which was another reason I loved him.

My mum Sandy always held Pete in the highest regard. She said "When she had her 5th child Brittnee, people said .. aren't you sad you haven't had a son? And my mum always said no.. because I have 5 daughters, and one day I will have 5 sons. She knew I could not do better in life than Pete .. he was my man.

"My Dad Dennis, loved to have a beer with Pete and enjoy a bit of man time. Dad treated Pete like a son too.

"My Father Jim, says that I had the best man ever, one in million even though they rarely caught up .. he knew Pete was just such a nice guy and perfect for his only daughter. Jim also commented on how good looking and handsome Pete is .. AND HE SURE WAS !!!!

"Grandparents and cousins all got to know Pete .. as you do .. and like everyone in Pete's life people quickly realised what a great guy he was and how dedicated he was to me and the children and they loved him as part of our family."

It was in 2005 that Pete and Tameka first crossed paths, here in Lake Grace. They say best friends know you better than you know yourself ...well, the next time they met was when Tam's best friend Karissa set them up to meet at the Kulin Bush Races....their relationship blossomed and they fell in love and married in 2010. Their wedding car was Pete's first ever car bought when he was 17...his '73 Kingswood.

Then Pete and Tameka went on to have the 3 lovelies here in the front row... Brax was born first and he will be 5 in July, then Kelsea who was 3 in March... and then came the baby of the family Jordon who will be 2 in October...

Let's stop there for a moment and focus on these three...there is a lot of love in this family... Pete was the best dadand love doesn't stop because we do ...

love is endless and it is important that the children continue to hear and feel that here...we want them to have happy memories of today ...

We are coming to the end of this part of the celebration of Pete's life.

Everyone will always wish that Pete had stayed much longer with us and that he had not left so soon. We will always remember him and all that he has given to us in his life and we will value who he was for us. He will always be with you... be in your hearts.

Pete's gift to the world is undoubtedly his loving family, they are his legacy, and it's at times like these that we appreciate the wisdom and innocence of children...and when Brax saw that his mum was sad he didn't want her to be sad and he said "Mummy.. Daddy wouldn't want you to have sad eyes, Pappy has sad eyes and Daddy wouldn't want that".

We are going to have some quiet time now, while we listen to some music and everyone has an opportunity to spend a few minutes with your own special thoughts and memories of Pete.

Some of you may wish to use this time for your own private prayer, or to share a silent word of unfinished conversation...

Looking After Yourself

Life needs balance; this is the lesson I learnt, when caring for a loved one who had an addiction. By looking after ourselves we "don't fall apart at the seams." When we look after ourselves, we can continue to care for the one we love.

Loving another who has an addiction takes much of our emotional and physical energy. The art of balancing life is what you do and what you want to do sorted into priorities. Simply; life revolves around work, rest and play. When we balance work, rest and play in our lives, we are taking the best care of ourselves possible. But, life is not always this simple. Circumstances beyond our control will prevent us from taking time out for rest and play. When we are in the midst of caring for our loved one we will often not realise that we have forgotten to take some time to care for ourselves.

Work needs to remain in its proper place; work is not only being employed. Work includes volunteering, working on the family farm, being a stay at home mum, household chores, caring for a family member. All these fall under the heading of "work" and it requires time and energy from us. It is also the biggest chunk of our waking hours in the day, if we are not careful all of our waking hours can be spent on "work". To be at our best we need to balance work with rest and play, sometimes both of these can be put aside for various reasons.

Play is anything that energises us. Gardening does this for me, but you might consider gardening work. I'm not a sporting person, maybe you are and this energises you. If it is then find a sport you enjoy or join a team — or join the gym if that is what you love to do. Play should include some form of physical activity, as much as we can. Play takes up the smallest chunk of our waking hours, but has the most physical benefit to our bodies.

Rest can include a lot of different things; rest rejuvenates us, so that we can be at our best emotionally. What can you do for you?

- Take time out for yourself; this can include joining a community group (local papers have lists of groups that meet in your area). Visit local craft/sewing shop or church they will often run groups. The most important thing I found in my personal experience was not to break connections with the community you belong to.
- Going for a walk: while walking reflect on what you see, hear, feel, and smell so your mind is not concentrating on the problems associated with the addiction.
- Have a "cuppa" with a friend regularly
- · Reading a book in a quiet and tranquil spot.
- Watching TV and/or playing games on electronic devices are good for chilling out, they are useful for short periods of time, but shouldn't make up the bulk of your rest time, as these activities don't rejuvenate us.

- Have a "date night" (or afternoon), if you live with your partner or significant other, this time provides a special place that both of you can connect and build each other up. (if the partner/significant other has the addiction then you need to set up boundaries while on the "date")
- Sleep is an essential part of our rest. Our bodies need on average 8 hours of restful sleep. Restful sleep relies on a good pre-bedtime routine. Switching off your T.V. is important as research shows that the light emitted from electronic devices in the last 10-15 minutes before retiring to bed hinders a restful sleep. Your routine can include shutting the home up for the night, turning off lights, personal hygiene, setting the alarm, then retiring to bed. By following a routine your body adjusts and follows the routine leading to restful sleep. (If you suffer from continued sleep disturbances please seek professional help)

Another area that is often ignored when we are caring for another is our diet. This article doesn't have the scope to address everything diet, but what I will encourage is this, as much as possible don't consume "fast or convenience" foods on a regular basis. Our diets also need to be balanced with proteins, carbohydrates (fruit, vegetables & grains), and healthy fats (e.g.: olives, olive oil, and avocado, fatty fish like salmon). A balanced diet enables us to work, rest and play.

This list of caring for ourselves is not exhaustive there are many things that can be done that is right for you. Seeking professional help is quite possibly the hardest thing to do for many of us. Speaking of what is not right in our lives is hard and takes courage. Counselling gives us an advocate who sits with us in a safe environment, where we can offload all our problems in a confidential space. Counselling can assist us to care for ourselves by offering non-judgemental options that we may not have thought of. They will journey with us for as long as we need them.

Upgrade to the Amelup Curves Complete

Road safety upgrades to improve heavy vehicle operations on Albany Lake Grace Road (Chester Pass Road) at Amelup Curves – in Western Australia's Great Southern region are now complete, ensuring freight movements are safer and more efficient.

Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for Infrastructure and Transport Michael McCormack said the popular tourist road was on a major freight route and had seen a number of incidents in recent years, including heavy vehicle roll-overs.

"Around Australia, the Liberal and Nationals' Government is investing in road projects to ensure people can get home sooner and safer, as well as boosting productivity, especially in the regions," Mr McCormack said.

"Chester Pass Road is a key transport corridor linking Albany to the Southern Wheatbelt, so these upgrades will significantly increase road safety for heavy vehicle operators - as well as for locals and tourists travelling to the Stirling and Porongorup Range."

Western Australian Minister for Transport Rita Saffioti said the construction of two new bridges would increase

efficiency for freight operators as well as greatly improve safety for all road users.

"Two new bridges were constructed over Martaquin Creek and Ongerup Creek to help mitigate the effects of flooding, which had been causing significant disruption to freight operations," Ms Saffioti said.

Member for O'Connor Rick Wilson said the upgrade included widening and realigning four kilometres of road and improving drainage for two intersections between North Stirling Road and Smith Road.

"I believe many road users will be thrilled to see these vital upgrades now complete and I thank local residents for their patience and cooperation during this time," Mr Wilson said.

The \$11 million project was jointly-funded, with the Australian Government providing \$8.8 million and the Western Australian Government providing \$2.2 million as part of the \$55.25 million Western Australia Regional Road Safety Package.

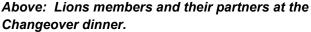

Protect Yourself From Scams

Media Release - NBN

NBN Co is alerting the community to be aware of scammers asking for personal information and financial details.

Scammers are increasingly taking the opportunity to impersonate NBN Co and take advantage of consumers, including those living in retirement villages.

NBN Co Chief Security Officer, Darren Kane said:

"It is important to be aware that NBN Co will never make unsolicited calls or door knock to sell broadband services. NBN Co may make calls to individuals registered on our Medical Alarm or Fire and Lift registers but will never request payment or bank account details during these calls.

NBN Co also does not request payment in relation to matters relating to medical alarms.

"NBN Co is the company building and operating Australia's wholesale broadband network, and as a wholesale-only company we do not sell broadband packages directly to consumers. There are times when NBN Co may contact you directly as part of the network rollout, but never to request payment for services over the **nbn**™ network.

"Protect your personal information by being on guard, verify who are you are talking to and do not give your personal details or bank account details to an unsolicited caller."

NBN Co advises the following steps be taken to help protect yourself from scammers:

- Do not share your bank or personal details with an unsolicited caller or with those who door knock claiming to be from NBN Co and trying to sell you an nbn™ service or seek payment for related services;
- If you think you have been a victim immediately report the scam to your bank or financial institution, and the police;
- If you have any questions about how these types of scams relate to you or would like further assistance please contact IDCARE on 1300 432 273; and to protect others, report scams to the ACCC via the <u>SCAMwatch report scam page</u> (<u>www.scamwatch.gov.au/report-a-scam</u>) or by calling 1300 795 995.

G'day all,

This newsletter's theme will be mostly around public safety and the reason I have chosen to write about this is because there has been little in the way of crime and disorder in recent weeks – you should all be pleased to hear!

In small towns such as ours an incident of any kind is amplified by the compact nature of our communities. A burn out in the street is far more commonplace in a place like Midland than it is in Varley or Pingrup, but when they do happen we all get to hear about it in one way or another. In Midland and other highly urbanised areas they'd happen most days of the week. It's just that people that live there are almost used to it.

Now, my job isn't really to update you every time a crime occurs in one of our towns, however it is my job to keep you all safe which is why I do write about incidents that may be of public interest or of a significant arrest. So, from a local perspective some of you may hold the view that Lake Grace is under siege from drug addled burglars and that practically everyone under 60 has a weed habit to rival Snoop Dog.

Western Australia Police now has local crime statistics on a page that all of you can view and see how safe (or not) your suburb is.

It makes for interesting reading and will surprise and reassure you at the same time I hope. Lake Grace had a total of 9 offences reported to Police last year, Newdegate had 6 reported crimes in the same period. This obviously doesn't take into account unreported matters (for which there is clearly no data) and overall perceptions around community safety. But looking at comparable towns nearby you'll see that we have significantly lower crime than Ravensthorpe or Gnowangerup. It isn't down to me alone, as you'll see that historically Lake Grace and Newdegate are safe places to live. And long may that continue.

That said we still need your support and information and we appreciate the calls that we do get – and we try and act on them as best we can.

With the end of the winter sports season in sight we will be upping the number of afternoon patrols we conduct and be out breath testing as much as we can. Drug testing is being rolled out to smaller sub districts and we will soon have the equipment to perform drug testing on the side of the road. We had our "Cuppa with a Coppa" at the Newdegate CRC today and took away some feedback on how we can do better. Thanks to those that took the time to drop by and also thanks to Clare and Hope for organising the CRC venue. We will make it a regular thing and hopefully do one again in the coming spring.

As always we can be contacted at the station on **9890 2000** and in the case of an emergency dial **000** as per normal. If you get Albany Station a message can be left for us with them – please be patient!

Free Mammograms For LAKE GRACE Women

Media Release

If you are a woman aged 40 or over you can access the FREE screening mammography service in Lake Grace. BreastScreen WA's mobile service will be located at Lake Grace Shire Hall, Bennet Street from 14/08/2018 to 21/08/2018.

Breast cancer is the most common life threatening cancer for women and one in eight women in Australia will develop breast cancer in their lifetime.

Having a screening mammogram (breast x-ray) every two years significantly increases the chance of a woman surviving breast cancer and reduces the amount of treatment required. More than 75% of breast cancers occur in women over the age of 50. Research shows that screening is most effective for this age group.

BreastScreen WA's Medical Director Dr Elizabeth Wylie, said screening mammography was the most effective method for early detection of breast cancer.

"Screening every two years is vitally important to increase the chance of a breast cancer being detected when it is too small to feel or be noticed. Finding a cancer at this early stage often means that the breast cancer is small and more treatable".

"A free screening mammogram is one of the best things that women can do to look after their health. Breast screening saves lives and only takes 20 minutes," said Dr Wylie.

Screening mammograms may detect 70-90% of breast cancers.

Any woman with a persistent change in a breast should see her doctor immediately.

The mobile service will then be moving to Dumbleyung and Wagin.

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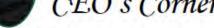

CEO's Corner



Flooding Event

The contractors are estimated to have completed 49% of outstanding works, and we are officially at the half way mark of our designated timeframe to complete the works.

There are a number of roads on which the remediation works have now been completed, if you have any concerns with the completed works please let us know and the quality of work can be inspected and repaired if required.

As at 30 June 2018, the Shire has spent \$5,121,728 on repair works to reinstate the road network as a result of February 2017 Flood Event. This figure doesn't include work undertaken throughout June. As a result of the WANDRRA claim, \$153,400 is the minimum contribution our local government has had to make towards the repair works. On top of that figure we also spent \$78,578 using our own works crew, these funds are not eligible to be refunded.

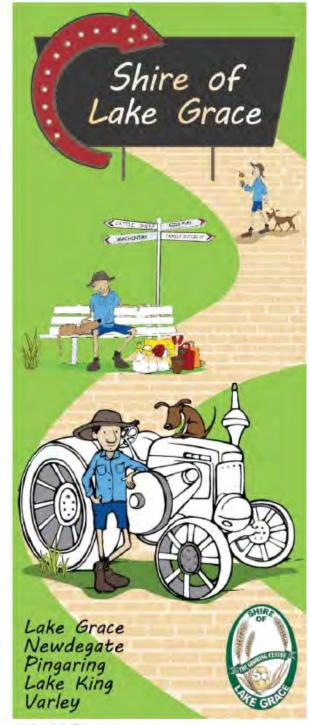
Currently Main Roads WA has reimbursed the Shire \$3,133,395 to June 30. We have Claim 6 with Main Roads totaling \$911,450 awaiting approval with Claim 7 being \$844,904 being prepared for submission to Main Roads.

As this work is being carried out, the Shire would like to remind road users to be courteous and slow down within the areas that crews are working, this will allow them to do their job in a safe manner and complete it sooner. Unfortunately we continue to have had a number of reports of vehicles speeding through road works.

The Local Government Convention brings together local governments from all over WA and is an important event on the Local Government calendar. Hirer Responsibility when using Shire Public Buildings

All people, groups, sporting clubs who hire public buildings are responsible for the cleaning of the facility once used.

If tables and chairs are set up by the group they must also be packed away. All rubbish is to be put into bins provided. Hirers are responsible to ensure all stoves are turned off. Hirers are responsible for any damages incurred while hiring facility.

Shire employed cleaners are responsible for the general cleaning of a facility, they are not responsible for cleaning up and putting away tables and chairs after a function by a hirer.

Affiliation fees are set up to help cover some of the costs in maintaining the buildings for the hirers use which includes but not limited to; general cleaning, water and electricity usage.

Pension and Senior Card Advice

Under the Rates and Charges (Rebates and Deferments) Act 1992, the Local Governments are required to periodically review all pensioners.

If any of the details checked do not match, the claim may be rejected and concessions may be amended or cancelled.

Therefore, some things that pensioners and seniors may need to consider and advise the Shire about are:

- Do I hold a Commonwealth Seniors Health Card as well as a Seniors Card and am I only registered at the Shire with my Seniors Card?
- Has my partner also now received a card and we have not completed a joint application yet?
- As I am now not working more than 25 hours per week and am over 60, have I applied for a Seniors Card yet?
- Has the ownership of my property changed recently?
- Have I moved from one property to another and not made a new application for concessions with Water Corporation yet?
- Has my spouse ceased occupation of the property and I have not completed a new application?

If you work more than 25 hours per week, you are no longer eligible to have the Seniors Card and must return the card to Department of Community Services with a note advising them of your situation.

Unfortunately if concessions are cancelled, pensioners/ seniors do not get their rebates again until new applications are made.

Leukaemia Foundation officially launches new home base in WA

Media Release

Australians diagnosed with a blood cancer such as leukaemia, lymphoma or myeloma, will now be able to stay at the Leukaemia Foundation's brand new purpose -designed self-contained accommodation units located in Stirling Cross, close to Perth treatment centres and Leukaemia Foundation services.

It's the first time all of the Leukaemia Foundation's essential services will be based in one central location in the organisation's 25 year history in Western Australia. In the past ten years alone, the Leukaemia Foundation in Western Australia has provided more than 27,000 free nights of accommodation, as well as more than 12,500 trips through its patient transport service. There are ten fully equipped one and two bedroom apartments as part of the new Stirling Cross facilities which will now provide families from regional Western Australia and other states with vital accommodation when they are forced to relocate to Perth for life saving, blood cancer treatment.

Leukaemia Foundation CEO Bill Petch said the new units represents a significant milestone for the Leukaemia Foundation supporting West Australians living with blood cancer.

"For the majority of people living in rural and regional areas of Western Australia, a blood cancer diagnosis

means they have to move immediately to Perth and begin treatment; for many, within 24 hours of diagnosis," Mr Petch said.

"To relieve this stress and financial burden, the Leukaemia Foundation offers free accommodation to these people and their families while they are undergoing treatment in Perth.

"With the co-location of accommodation with our blood cancer support services and administration office, we will be close at hand in a brand new, safe and secure 'home away from home', with incredible amenities and, importantly, all major treatment hospitals accessible within 25 minutes of the complex," Mr Petch said.

The Leukaemia Foundation will lease 10 apartments for accommodation after the generous support of former West Australian and Businessman of the Year Adrian Fini. The services include a ground-floor commercial space where the fit out and furnishings were supported through a personal donation by Mr Fini and his wife Michaela as well as funding from the Western Australian Government through Lotterywest.

"This is an exciting outcome for the Leukaemia Foundation and will help ensure people living with blood cancer in Western Australia are able to access highstandard accommodation options," Mr Petch said

"The Leukaemia Foundation receives no direct or recurrent government funding, so we are very mindful of how we spend the money we raise. This is a cost-effective accommodation solution allowing us to be responsive in delivering a vital service, close to essential amenities and accessible to the major treatment hospitals of Perth.

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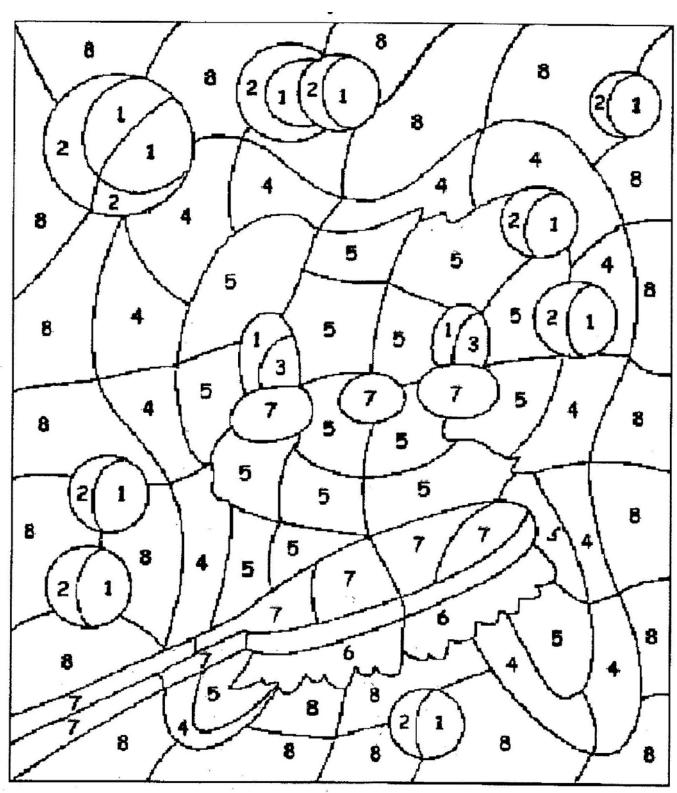

Diabetes: Differences and Myths

Top Five Differences Between Type 1 and Type 2 Diabetes

1. CAUSES

Type 1 Diabetes is an autoimmune disease. The immune system mistakes the insulin producing cells in the pancreas as "invaders" and attacks them. Once this happens, the cells can no longer produce insulin and a person is therefore insulin reliant for life in order to stay alive.

Type 2 Diabetes is a metabolic condition. It's when the body doesn't produce enough insulin or becomes resistant to it. The condition can sometimes be controlled with proper diet and exercise, or a drug to enhance sensitivity to the body's insulin production. But sometimes natural insulin production is insufficient and insulin injections are then needed to sustain normal blood glucose levels.

2. INSULIN PRODUCTION

People with Type 1 Diabetes DO NOT produce insulin. Insulin is a hormone that a working pancreas releases to allow glucose (sugar) from carbohydrates that's eaten to be absorbed for energy. Without this hormone, the body starves and eventually dies. This is why everyday insulin injections is necessary for survival and early diagnosis detection is so important.

Insulin is normally still produced by people with Type 2 Diabetes. In order to regain sensitivity to insulin, proper diet and exercise is recommended. In some cases, insulin injections are needed to keep diabetes in better control.

3. PREVENTION

Currently, there is no prevention for Type 1 Diabetes. Researchers are hard at work and there are preventative studies being done to find answers (https://www.trialnet.org/). Type 2 Diabetes is not always preventable but by staying active and eating healthy it can lower the risk of developing.

4. TREATMENT

The treatment for Type 1 Diabetes is insulin injections and constant blood glucose monitoring. There is no diet, exercise, or any amount of weight loss that will cure Type 1. Type 2 Diabetes has a few options available, ranging from lifestyle changes, oral pills, and/or insulin injections. Both require careful vigilance in order to obtain good control.

5. RISK FACTORS

Risk factors for Type 1 Diabetes include: Family history, genetics, and environmental factors (such as a virus). Risk factors for Type 2 Diabetes include: Genetics, lifestyle choices, and being overweight.

Myth - Diabetes can be prevented

Fact - Not **all** types of diabetes can be prevented. Type 1 is an autoimmune condition, it cannot be prevented and there is no cure. The cause of type 1 diabetes is still unknown.

Strong international evidence shows diabetes prevention programs can help prevent type 2 diabetes in up to 58 per cent of cases. There is no single cause of type 2 diabetes, but there are well-established risk factors. Your risk of developing diabetes is also affected by things you cannot change such as family history and ethnicity.

Myth - You have to be overweight or obese to develop diabetes

Fact - Being overweight or obese is a risk factor for type 2 diabetes but it is not a direct cause. Some people who are overweight may not develop type 2 diabetes while some people who are of a healthy weight will develop type 2 diabetes.

Type 1 diabetes is not preventable and not associated with weight, physical inactivity or any other lifestyle factors.

Myth - You only get type 1 diabetes when you're young Fact - The onset of type 1 diabetes occurs most frequently in people under 30 years, however new research suggests almost half of all people who develop the condition are diagnosed over the age of 30.

Myth - You only get type 2 diabetes when you're old Fact - Type 2 diabetes usually develops in adults over the age of 45 years but is increasingly occurring in younger age groups including children, adolescents and young adults.

Myth - Only people with type 1 diabetes need insulin Fact - Type 2 diabetes is a progressive condition. 50 percent of people with type 2 diabetes will need insulin after 6-10 years of being diagnosed with diabetes because the pancreas produces less insulin over time. Taking medication when required can result in fewer complications in the long-term and is part of managing type 2 diabetes.

People with type 1 diabetes depend on insulin replacements every day of their lives. They must test their blood glucose levels several times throughout the day.

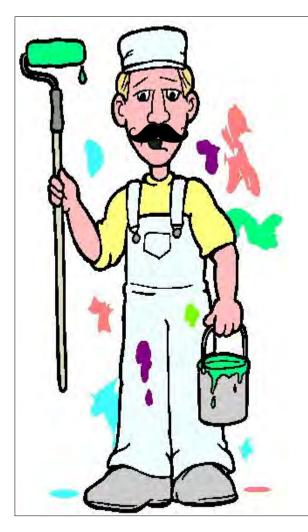

So What is an LCDC?

Land conservation district committees (LCDCs) are statutory committees appointed by the Commissioner of Soil and Land Conservation to administer land conservation districts in accordance with an Order proclaimed by the Governor. Their main function is to promote sustainable land management and undertake projects.

Well that sounds a bit dry and boring doesn't it? It shouldn't be; soil is the lifeblood of farming and if it's not looked after then 'growing stuff' is only going to get harder. A staple part of looking after your soil is growing trees and encouraging people to not knock over what they have.

Since LCDCs were first established in 1982, their roles and functions have evolved with some becoming incorporated groups focusing on issues wider than land degradation and soil conservation. Others have maintained their strong traditional 'Landcare' focus.

Lake Grace's LCDC has been around for 20 years; their

primary focus in the early years was salinity, protection of remnant vegetation and planting of more trees. Over those years thousands of dollars have been obtained in grants that went toward tree planting programmes and the protective fencing that was needed.

Busy timetables have seen numbers drop away from the committee with their last project being a community based venture at the Jam Patch.

Although many landowners forge ahead with their own projects, a collaboration (such as the LCDC) tends to be viewed with great respect by funding bodies and is a great repository for ideas and round table discussion.

Following on from the AGM held on the 5th July the LCDC will be getting together on Wednesday 8th August. Kent Shire's Landcare Officer Paul Leoni will be in attendance and keen to talk about what's happening in Landcare at the moment.

Lake Grace LCDC is looking for new members, anyone is welcome to attend the next meeting.
