Back In The Driver's Seat

With current network contracts coming to an end Main Roads held an information session in Lake Grace last week for local contractors, local suppliers and Local Government to understand the opportunities that may be available to them to undertake work or to be able to engage directly with Main Roads.

The transition for the wheatbelt is to take place on the 25th October with the intent being for the 26 road workers currently engaged with Lendlease to transfer to direct employment with Main Roads. As part of taking back control Main Roads will be hiring more staff: construction crews are to be established, core operational and technical positions to be filled and additional administration and business support staff will be employed.

This will aid economic growth in the regions with an extra 490 staff to be employed, the construction of four new regional offices and upgrades to depots where needed as well as the acquisition of staff housing and an increase in light fleet. All of this adds up to more people living where they work and the flow on affect to local business, school population and engagement with sporting and civic clubs and organisations.

Eight contractors attended the session held in Lake

Grace to discover what services Main Roads will be needing; this ranges from maintenance grading of unsealed roads through to additional plant for construction work and the supply of road building materials. There will also be regional contracts for roadside vegetation control.

For Main Roads staff bringing the work back in house gives them more control of maintenance and projects as they are happening and a restoration of pride in the organization that they work for and the road network that they provide.



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Country Stargazing

Spectacular Night Skies

We are smack bang in the middle of "Milky Way Season"! That's because, during this time of year, we look towards the centre or core of our Milky Way Galaxy. It is dense with stars and stretches across the dark night sky in country WA. Astrophotographers love it!

The Milky Way is best seen when there's no moonlight and you're away from bright city lights. What you're looking for is a band of cloudy or dusty looking light that stretches in an arc from the south east to the south west. It looks like a cloud, but it's actually billions of stars that make up the Milky Way Galaxy, our home in the Universe. Throughout August and September, the core or heart of the Milky Way is high in the southern sky.

Saturn returns to our evening skies and on the 12th will be right by the Moon with both shining brilliantly.

And to add to this cosmic spectacular, we have another meteor shower to enjoy. The Perseids meteor shower is generated from comet Swift-Tutle and renowned for producing bright meteors. The shower peaks on the night of the 12th/13th of August but can be viewed

several days either side of the peak. The best views will be under dark skies, after midnight. The further north you are in WA, the better you will see this meteor shower.

To See Saturn & the Moon: All night on the 12th, from the early evening, looking towards the eastern horizon.

Enjoy a bumper month of cosmic views.

Free Skin Cancer Screening Saturday 23rd July 2022

Lions Cancer Council Institute Inc.

The Lions Cancer Institute (LCI) will be providing a free Skin Cancer Screening in Lake Grace on Saturday 23rd July behind the driver reviver van on Stubbs Street. This free

service provides for the early detection of skin lesions and where a lesion is identified a referral is made to your GP for further investigation. For booking information contact 0429 917 805.

The LCI is a project of the Lions Clubs of Western Australia. Since early 1990's LCI has been providing full body skin screening clinics throughout Western Australia,

with an emphasis on Screening the remote and rural areas of the state.



From humble beginnings the Volunteers of LCI have screened over 80 000 patients and our records show that with the annual rate of referrals to a GP is in the order of 27% (21,600) and lesions suspected of being life threatening are at 6% (1260). Early detection of lesions will save lives and lessen the need for invasive surgery.

LCI's screening program is supported by qualified volunteer Dermatologists, Plastic Surgeons, Dermoscopists and GP's.

Funding for LCI's screening programs and research grants is provided by donations from Lions Clubs of WA, Business and from the public.

 - The interval recommended between a recent SARS-CoV-2 infection or the first booster dose and a winter booster dose is

now 3 months.

Welcome Hearty And Winston

Lake Grace Daycare have welcomed a new staff member, Hearty Rivera to their ranks. Like many work places, the Daycare has struggled to keep up their staffing levels, and this has had a flow on affect in the number of children they have been able to register. With many households having both parents in the workforce, there is a high demand for placement in childcare.

Lake Grace Early Learning Centre now has four permanent fulltime staff; Vicki Reynolds (Manager) as well as Jackie McGlinn, Latisha McGlinn and now Hearty. All staff are required to be suitably accredited or working toward accreditation; Hearty has a Diploma in Childcare, something that Vicki is working toward. Both Jackie and Latisha are working toward a Certificate III, with Latisha taking two hours off from hands-on work to manage the programming of activities.

The day care also has four casual staff, vital in times when the permanent staff need to take annual leave or are unable to come to work due to ill health. COVID has taken its toll with both staffing and child attendance.

Although the daycare places are predominantly made up of children of a preschool age, they are also able to provide afterschool care in limited numbers. When fully staffed they can have 19 children in their care; a full-on day when a range of activities and learning journeys has been prepared to cover the variety of ages and abilities. All children who attend day care must be fully vaccinated.

Hearty has been welcomed with open arms by the Lake Grace crew, starting at the end of June. Relocating from Queensland, Hearty heard about the position via a friend who works for the Early Learning Centre in Katanning. With housing as scarce as hens' teeth, Vicki was making enquiries far and wide but a phone call to the Shire bore fruit. When Works Manager, Craig Elefson, heard that Heaty's husband, Winston, would be looking for a job he gave him a call and voila, both employed with a roof over their head.

Whilst in Queensland, Hearty worked in childcare but predominantly her time was spent in Aged Care; she has welcomed the opportunity that the position in Lake Grace has given her and both she and Winston are looking forward to their time here.



What is Foot and Mouth Disease?

Foot and mouth disease (FMD) is a highly contagious viral disease of livestock causing fever followed by the development of vesicles (blisters) chiefly in the mouth and on the feet.

FMD is generally not lethal to adult animals, but it can kill young animals and cause serious production losses.

It affects cloven-hoofed animals (those with divided hoofs) including:

- cattle
- buffalo
- camels
- sheep
- goats
- deer
- pigs.

FMD is not considered a risk to public health as infection from animals to humans is extremely rare. FMD should not be confused with the human disease (hand, foot and mouth disease), caused by a different virus which commonly affects young children.

It is not present in Australia but is endemic throughout the Middle East, Africa, Asia and most of South America.

The most significant risk of entry of FMD into Australia is through illegal entry of meat and dairy products infected with the FMD virus and subsequent illegal feeding of these products (swill) to pigs.

Most countries would ban our livestock and livestock products as soon as foot and mouth disease is found. It is unlikely these restrictions would be lifted until Australia could prove that the disease had been eradicated.

The economic effects of an outbreak of FMD, would be enormous to individuals, the farming industry, and subsidiary and support industries.

Australia's major livestock industries would be directly affected from export market closures and the disruption to production associated with the disease and response activities.

There would be significant flow-on economic losses and social impacts to many rural and regional businesses that rely on livestock industry revenue.

The outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease in the United Kingdom in 2001 caused a crisis in British agriculture and tourism. This epizootic saw 2,000 cases of the disease in farms across most of the British countryside. Over 6 million cows and sheep were killed in an eventually successful attempt to halt the disease. Cumbria was the worst affected area of the country, with 893 cases.

With the intention of controlling the spread of the disease, public rights of way across land were closed by order. This damaged the popularity of the Lake District as a tourist destination and led to the cancellation of that year's Cheltenham Festival, as well as the British Rally Championship for the 2001 season

and delaying that year's general election by a month. Crufts, the dog-based festival had to be postponed by 2 months from March to May 2001. By the time that the disease was halted in October 2001, the crisis was estimated to have cost the United Kingdom £8bn.

The consensus is that the probable source of the UK FMD virus outbreak came from infected or contaminated meat that was part of the swill being fed to pigs at Burnside Farm in Heddon-on-the-Wall. The swill had not been properly heat-sterilized and the virus had thus been allowed to infect the pigs.

Foot and mouth disease virus is carried by live cloven-hoofed animals and in meat and dairy products, as well as in soil, bones, untreated hides, vehicles and equipment used with these animals. It can survive in frozen, chilled and freeze-dried foods including meat and dairy products. It can also be carried on people's clothing and footwear.

The virus has not been detected in Australia for more than 100 years. But we should be aware of the risks of FMD arriving on our shores. FMD can be transmitted in air particles between animals housed closely together.

With the recent outbreak in Bali, Indonesia it is a high priority for Australia to keep the disease from breeching our shores. Although confident in Australia's strong biosecurity measures, no one should take anything for granted.

The Australian government has announced a range of new measures for travellers from Bali into Australia. These include biosecurity detector dogs at airports, additional signage and information about FMD for travellers and staff, as well as biosecurity officers present on all flights from Indonesia to Australia.

What makes FMD virus so remarkable is its environmental resistance. It can persist on many inanimate objects, such as equipment used with livestock, people's clothing and shoes, on the tyres of vehicles and in livestock transport. It has been shown to survive for more than 6 mo on the soil surface under snow.

It can also persist in livestock feed and livestock products, such as meat and hides. It can even remain infectious on the hands and within noses of those in contact with infected livestock.

The nature of this virus is what scares agricultural industries. FMD virus could plausibly be introduced via a tourist's contaminated shoes, or through smuggled meat products in a passenger's bag or the mail. There is a plethora of incursion pathways.

If Australia's feral animal population gets infected, it might mean we can never eradicate FMD, should an incursion occur.

The Astonishing Story of Harry Butler—Pt 2

State Library of Western Australia

My wife and I lived in a little place out of Inglewood, which was an outer suburb of Perth then. Just behind our house was a big pine plantation and I used to supplement our income by going over there with the rifle and shooting kangaroos. In 1949 it was quite easy to go and get a feed in the bush next to Perth. I don't know whether it was legal or not but there wasn't a Ranger who could come near me in terms of that.

In those days my conveyance and only luxury, was a bicycle - a beautiful lightweight racing machine. I used to ride on weekends sometimes long distances down to Albany or up to Geraldton. Ride up one day and ride back the next. But usually, I'd just ride up into the hills with the Naturalist Club, on my own, or with my wife.

A little later we moved to Bayswater, and I used my skills there to illegally poach fish in the river. Among my very close friends were the Fishing Inspectors of the area and they'd come over and have a cup of tea, a yarn, and sometimes to even eat the fish! They were all good bushmen. They knew I was poaching fish and I knew they knew, but we respected each other. It was one of those things.

At the time things were changing in Perth. During the war, the suburbs had sort of frozen. In the post-war period, there were new housing estates spreading out all over the region I knew as bush.

In 1952, I was studying for my Leaving and Teaching Certificate, and lecturing one day a week in Natural History. I was rushed through as a mature-age student and came out with very high marks. - strange for someone with such a low IQ (see Part One).

The psychologist on staff Bob Peters had become a close friend of mine and because I still had this enormous chip on my shoulder, I asked him to do an IQ test on me "just for the hell of it". He did a test and it was considerably higher than 80 minus.

Bob was curious enough to go back into my school records from Northam High School and discovered that within the IQ test, some pages had been omitted from my total score.

That simple human error had changed my life (see Part One). Had it not been made I would have got a Degree, and probably would be sitting somewhere, discussing learnedly, the blood chromosomes of antechinus or whatever I happened to do. It would have been a very, very different world.

Having got my Teaching Certificate I was appointed to the West Australian Correspondence School, with a twin role. One day a week I was the Gould League of Western Australia Organiser - a Natural History Club run by the Education Department for school children.

On the other four days, I was the Museum Classes Teacher. Initially, this involved having children (about 4,000 a year) coming in and talking to them about wildlife and the Museum, and visiting perhaps 40 schools a year. But this was just hopeless - I just wasn't reaching enough people - so I upgraded it to 28,000 children a year coming through, with visits to 220 schools a year.

While doing this I was also organising the Wild Life Show in Perth started by the Naturalist Club in 1941. It ran for two days but once I got my hands on it, it went for a week and attracted 20,000 to 30,000 people. The



show became the main source of income for the club and the money turned what was a nice sort of polite friendly little body, into a powerful force - producing handbooks, naturalist guides and subsidising excursions to encourage people to take up National History.

Eventually, I became the President of the Naturalist Club to make sure I could push through my ideas - "a complete dictator, lovely stuff!"

To spread the word even more, I began The Mobile Wild Life Show in the country. I'd pack up a truck with things from the Wild Life Show and show people that they should be proud to be Australian. That it was a good country. Don't knock it, don't rubbish it, don't put it down, don't destroy it - it's worth saving, and this sort of thing.

I reached out to the kids but then learned a very important lesson. That it was useless to reach the kids unless you reached the adults at the same time. Because while you can influence children, you can educate children, you can bring children to the point of total awareness, the moment they leave your influence and go back to their parents who say "Never mind that crap, that guy doesn't know what he's talking about", they are re-influenced by them.

Well, this went on, and about the same time, there were a lot of rumblings in the Education Department, because there was this unqualified guy who was making himself an empire. So as a result my job was advertised and naturally, I didn't get it - someone with a university degree got it.

For two years after that, I worked with handicapped children, using music, colour, art, sound, and nature study, to bring them into a world of comparable awareness with more fortunate people. People from all over the world looked at my techniques and they are

still in use today. I am very proud of them. I was also given Aboriginal Education for a year and able to reorganise it to a point that at least the kids were not being "crushed into an alien mould".

Then I became Camp School Headmaster for the North West Camps, and do you know in all those months I never found a bad child. I only ever found bad teachers - lacking in compassion, awareness, or ability. Every time my report went in, the teacher was the culprit, it was never the child.

About the same time, I met a fellow convalescing at Rottnest. He had come down from New Guinea and was covered in tropical ulcers. A big moon-faced bland American, he was a naturalist by the name of Hobart Van Deusen. We got talking and he said...

"You know, I've been hearing a lot about you, everywhere I go your name keeps cropping up, why don't you work as a naturalist?" I told him that I couldn't get a job as a naturalist.

In 1962 Hobart wrote me a letter from the American Museum of National History, formally offering me the position of Collector of West Australian Mammals, for three years. The money was peanuts - fifteen hundred a year plus fifteen hundred expenses - but I was sick to the back teeth of the Education Department's attitude that you had to have a piece of paper to prove you could do what you could do.

So I accepted.

During my time as Collector of West Australian Mammals, I added seventeen species to the list of known mammals in Australia. Of which at least three were new to science. Reptiles, we lost count, it was something like fifty new species of reptiles and new species of fish.

It was a very good, very full, very poor three years! My wife and three children worked with me part of the time but mostly they stayed at home in Perth because they had their schooling to consider.

In 1966 I worked overseas in Washington State and Canada earning an Honorary Doctorate. Then while coming back through England, a "little, fat man" named Peter Scott (an artist, conservationist, broadcaster, and a founder of the World Wildlife Fund) bounced into my carriage at Reading Station. Then dragged me off to stay at his Slimbridge House, where I had a glorious weekend with him, his wife, and their house guest the Duke of Edinburgh.

So it was a very 'nobby' sort of thing.

Anyway, the high life ended and I came back to Western Australia, to discover my wife had got sick of my wandering around and she'd opted for a quieter life with somebody else. So we divorced. The children were all grown up so I walked out of the house with a suitcase full of clothes, all that I had in my head, and nothing else.

At the beginning of 1967, I literally started life again, and it was not easy with no qualifications or assets whatsoever.

So I worked as a builders labourer at the Bruce Rock Hospital. When the foreman was badly damaged in a car accident I was the only bloke who could read a blueprint, so I became the foreman of the job! Crazy place.

Then the builder who was Russian with ambitions of getting into the film industry, said he offered to pay me fifty dollars a week and give me a verandah to live on if I would make some films for them. I made one film for them, then they went broke and nobody ever ever saw if

Then a whole host of things came in - a whole lot of "little bitty things", but all very good, very exciting, all making full use of my field expertise.

One of the jobs was setting up a program of conservation for the gas line that went from Dongara to Pinjarra. Having had some background in engineering I was able to ask some very pointed questions like "Why don't you grow trees on pipelines?" They answered that the roots would damage the pipe but I knew that roots only damaged pipes where there was leaking water and that there was no evidence in the world of roots damaging natural gas pipes. Coatings yes but pipes no.

After that for the first time in the natural gas industry, trees were allowed to re-grow over a natural gas

pipeline.

Around this time I became totally engrossed with Barrow Island. A commercial oil field with five hundred oil wells on it and the richest assemblage of natural fauna in any one place in Australia.

I was retained by West Australian Petroleum Pty Ltd (WAPET) who wanted advice on how to preserve the wildlife on the 100-square-mile island while continuing to extract hydrocarbon resources.

And as a result, an environmental code was formulated for the entire Petroleum industry. When asked at first if I wanted specialist staff I said "no". Because I believed that everyone on the staff should be an environmental officer, in the same way as everybody should be a safety officer. This approach worked and it worked very well

My first television appearance had been in Perth in 1963 when the first commercial television station opened. I did a segment called Nature Parade in The Mickey Mouse Club. I became their "nature man" and it ran for something like eight years, but when I asked them for money, that was a dirty word and they threw me out. I simply couldn't afford to subsidise the station any longer, that's what it came down to.

The ABC did two or three local programs based on my

trips in Western Australia, but they didn't create any sort of a ripple and just disappeared into the moors of mediocrity.

After a few false starts, ABC Executive Producer Alan Bateman decided to go it with me alone - six programs at a couple of hundred dollars apiece. Contrary to the predictions of everybody, they took off like rockets.

People just went wild over them, and there was no way that anybody can ever say that the script was written (although the Director tried), it just happened. It just came out, me talking about the things I love and believe in

William Henry "Harry" Butler AO CBE went on to write many books, and became best known as the presenter of the popular ABC television series In the Wild from 1976 to 1981. He was named Australian of the Year in 1979 and died in Perth aged 85 years.

A great bloke and West Australian.

From the CEO

It is unfortunate that the Shire of Lake Grace did not receive any nominations to fill one (1) councilor vacancy. We are now seeking approval from the WA Electoral Commission if the Shire can continue with only eight (8) councilors until next year when the ordinary biennial council elections are held at which time some of the other Councillor terms of office expire.

The Minister for Local Government, John Carey, announced on 3rd July new reforms to the Local Government Act designed to strengthen the sector and better serve ratepayers in the long term.

Some of the major reforms to note are:

- · Council meetings will be required to be recorded and stored appropriately.
- In future, councils with populations of less than 5,000 people will have a cap of 7 Councillors.
- The introduction of an independent Local Government Inspector which would give ratepayers confidence that all local governments were serving their communities responsibly and would result in a faster and less costly process in resolving complaints.
- Unnecessary red tape across a range of areas of local government responsibility will be reduced which would be beneficial for ratepayers.
- To support the transparency of decision making by councilors it is proposed
 that the individual votes cast by all councilors for all resolutions be required to
 be recorded in the council minutes to identify those for, against, on leave, absent
 or who left the chambers.
- It is proposed to introduce a requirement for local governments to prepare a community and stakeholder engagement charter which sets out who local governments will communicate processes and decisions within the community
- Local governments differ significantly in the complexity of their operations. At
 present small local governments have the same reporting requirements as those
 in the city. Improvements will be made to make the statements clearer and
 reduce unnecessary complexity for the smaller local governments.

These are only some of the reforms proposed and not all the reforms will have an impact upon our shire operation. There is still a fair bit of work to be undertaken into how the proposed reforms will be finalized however, some will be brought in during this financial year.

The Shire of Lake Grace along with the Shires of Dumbleyung, Wagin and West Arthur recently commissioned a study into short stay tourism accommodation within the shires. The draft report has been received and some of the findings are most interesting. Several gaps have been identified throughout the shires and I am sure that the Shire of Lake Grace will be keen to work with interested parties to fill some of these gaps. Details will be released once the report is finalized.

- · All external doors are closed and locked;


This is most important as often doors are not locked when cleaners arrive.




'We are each our own devil, and we make this world our hell.'



Quick Facts from the Census

Our population has dropped, but become younger with a greater percentage of males. There are more families and private dwellings, we're getting paid more, our mortgage repayments have decreased but we're paying more in rent.

At first glance we would describe Lake Grace as an aging population, however the census shows that this isn't quite true. Some of our biggest shifts have been an increase in the 20-24 (up 14) and the 35-39 (up 10) age group s. Interestingly the 40-44 and 50-54 age groups were down 24 in each section and the 55-59 age group were down 12. This is what has contributed to a shift from 40 to 38 for our median age.

More than half of the population are married, around 30% have never been married; while the remaining population are divorced, widowed or separated.

Eighty percent of our population were born in Australia; significantly higher than WA (62%) and Australia (66.9%). With respondents having the option of being able to report up to two ancestries the top responses were Australian (243), English (220), Irish (60), Scottish (44), and Australian Aboriginal (16).

As reported in the mainstream media religious affiliation has taken a hit with 42.6% selecting no religion (in 2016 this figure was 27.1%.

152 or 36.9% of our population did voluntary work through an organization or group in the 12 months previous to census night.

We tend to be healthier in Lake Grace compared to state and national statistics except for diabetes (5.2% compared to 4.4% and 4.7%) and arthritis where we lead the state average by 0.2%.

More of us own our homes outright (34.8%) than the state and national average and we have a greater percentage of single or lone person households. The median rent is significantly lower in Lake Grace (\$180) compared to state (\$340) and national (\$375) - this excludes dwellings being occupied rent free. Our monthly mortgage repayments are also much lower (\$1,083) compared to state (\$1,842) and national (\$1,836).



Banks and Deceased Estates

The Banking Code Compliance Committee's (BCCC) Inquiry into Code-subscribing banks' compliance with Chapter 45 of the Banking Code of Practice (the Code) is one of its current major monitoring activities. The obligations under Chapter 45 of the Code are key consumer protections for the representatives and next of kin of deceased customers.

The Inquiry scope gives a general overview of the areas that will be covered in the Inquiry.

The Inquiry will cover how banks comply with their obligations under Chapter 45 throughout the entire process of managing the accounts of a deceased customer, including, but not limited to:

- Treating customers' representatives and next of kin with respect and compassion
- Providing clear and accessible information on how to manage a deceased customer's account
- Identifying and ceasing the charging of fees for banking services that are no longer to be provided to a deceased customer
- Acting on instructions from a customer's representative within 14 days of receipt of those instructions
- Providing information about a deceased customer's

accounts to their representative or next of kin prior to the grant of probate or letters of administration

- Accepting payments on debts owed by a deceased customer from their representative or next of kin prior to the grant of probate or letters of administration
- Allowing customers with joint accounts to continue to operate said accounts in the event of the death of their fellow joint account holder

The scope of the Inquiry will cover banks' internal frameworks and <u>organisational capability</u> to support compliance with Chapter 45 of the Code, including staff training, systems, procedures and monitoring of customer outcomes.

The BCCC will be collecting information from a limited sample of six banks in two separate tranches over the course of the next nine months.

It also invites those who have acted as the representative or next of kin of a deceased customer, or their representatives, to engage with us throughout the Inquiry – to share any insights, case studies, areas of concern or examples of good practice.
