To the Politician Concerned About Live Export

It is just before 7am on a Monday and I've already responded on social media to yet another member of the wider community calling for a ban of the Live Export Industry of sheep in Australia. Comments such as, "Ban this barbaric industry", "farmers should rot in the same squalor as the poor sheep", "why doesn't our government shut down this trade and send meat frozen?" plague all social media platforms at the moment. They are coming from animal activist extremists, the very people focused on an entire ban of the production of animals. Yet what is more insulting is the greater lack of support from our political decision makers of the \$250 million industry that is Live Export (LE), one that keeps rural communities afloat in WA, and one that is not reflected by the Awassi Express 60 Minutes footage from April, but rather the successful industry it is, achieving lowered mortality rates (0.3-0.7%) and global food supply.

I could use my time to do other things than present facts on social media, after all I am not only a woman working in agriculture but I am a mother of a busy two year old who might one day be a farmer himself. I could ignore the extremist views as I wont ever persuade them with facts of LE anyway. But unfortunately there is a growing percentage of the wider population supporting an Animals Australia campaign because they are inexperienced and ill informed of the LE industry and are now being influenced by some politicians weighing in on their emotional argument, and also calling for a ban and THAT is something no one passionate about agriculture like myself can ignore.

I would expect that in your position you should be well informed of the facts that I present to what seems to be the 'converted against farming' when responding to

degrading comments on social media, like the importance of Australia in the LE Industry for global welfare standards with a ESCAS system no other trading country with the Middle East has. Or that the demand for the 1.7 million sheep exported live each year to be sent chilled or frozen is insignificant, and does not present a viable "plan B". And that the LE market presents a viable opportunity to move sheep off farm not demanded locally for age, genetic gain or seasonal conditions all while supporting the building of the national flock number to support the growing wool and lamb markets. This point might I add being crucial for tough seasonal conditions like we saw across WA this year, with a dry start where feed shortage created an animal welfare stress in itself and being able to off load sheep promptly eases both the welfare and financial burden on farm in these times. Most importantly the fact that it is farmers actually caring for sheep and providing animal welfare not someone

First Regional Community Mental Health Service to Open in WA

Media Release

The first regional community mental health step up/step down service is expected to open its doors to consumers in October 2018.

Community mental health step up/step down services are a State Government initiative to provide vital short-term residential support and individualised care. They can reduce hospital admissions by providing support to people experiencing a mental health episode in the community, they also serve as a transition for people being discharged from hospital.

The aim of the publicly funded step up/step down service is to support people in the community, in areas close to their personal network of family and friends. The new service will benefit people already living in Albany, but who currently don't have access to comprehensive support.

The State Government will invest over \$21 million in capital funding over the next three years in community mental health step up/step downs to progress the establishment of the services in Broome, Bunbury, Geraldton, Kalgoorlie and Karratha. This funding is in addition to almost \$6 million in 2018/19 provided for the existing step up/step down services in Joondalup and Rockingham, and the new service in Albany.

The Mental Health Commission has appointed Neami National as the service provider to operate the Albany service. Neami National has been operating the Joondalup Community mental health step up/step down service since 2013.

To assist in developing greater understanding of the Community mental health step up/step down services within the community, the Mental Health Commission has produced five short videos that demonstrate the value of the service from the perspective of people who have used the service and from people who work within the services.

"Offering appropriate community mental health services is vital to ensure people who need help get the best possible treatment, it also frees up beds in our hospitals.

"The McGowan government has committed to spend over \$21 million on new mental health support services for regional communities in WA. This is in addition to the recently announced Geraldton Health Campus expansion, which includes an acute psychiatric unit and a mental health observation area.

"The videos released by the Commission give the public a valuable insight into just how much these services support people in the community. As Minister for Mental Health I will continue to work towards improving the mental health and wellbeing of all West Australians."

What Eclipse?

The longest total lunar eclipse of the 21st century took place last Friday, 27th July. It was a total lunar eclipse, where the full moon passed through Earth's shadow; the entire celestial event lasted nearly 4 hours.

Perhaps you missed it? I know I did, however local photographer Peter Stoffberg was prowling the streets in the wee hours of the morning and snapped this fabulous photo in the main street of Lake Grace. The photo was taken 15 minutes before total darkness.

There will be some eclipse envy as in many places of WA cloud cover prevented stargazers from getting a good view.

Lunar eclipses are visible from anywhere on Earth where it is night time. However, the duration of the eclipse you see will depend on how close to moonrise or moonset the eclipse starts in your location. During total lunar eclipses, the moon turns a deep red colour when it enters the depths of Earth's shadow. So why doesn't the moon just look like it's in darkness? The colour change happens because Earth's atmosphere acts as both a lens and a scattering medium for the sun's light.

Have Your Say on Fitness Industry

Many of us know someone who has signed up to join a gym and then fails to use their membership - but just what are your consumer rights and does the Fitness Industry Code of Practice need to be updated?

The fitness industry in Australia is growing and generated an estimated \$229.2 million in profits in 2017-2018 alone, with about 450 gyms and fitness centres operating in WA.

Attending a gym or fitness centre is the second-most popular form of physical activity for Australians, particularly among consumers aged 18-34 years, with walking for exercise being the most popular option.

The current code, introduced in response to misconduct by some operators in 2004, governs how the fitness industry deals with consumers and their membership contracts in Western Australia.

Consumer Protection is reviewing the code and seeking input from consumers and industry. Consultation closes on 27 August 2018. We want to ensure the code remains appropriate and necessary for this rapidly growing industry.

- A requirement for honesty and full disclosure when selling fitness services.
- A requirement for membership agreements to be in writing.
- A 48-hour cooling off period for membership agreements.
- A 12-month limit on prepayments for membership agreements.
- Rules on how to handle requests to terminate membership agreement.
- Rules on how to handle complaints from clients.

Since the last review in 2010, the Australian Consumer Law has come into effect which provides wider protections for consumers - except for the 48-hour cooling off period and 12-month limit on prepayments for memberships.

Between July 2012 and June 2017, Consumer Protection received 466 complaints about the fitness industry.

Most of those complaints related to membership cancellations, specifically unfair cancellation terms and conditions, ongoing fees and charges after cancellation, and extending membership agreements past their expiry date.

We want to know if you think there continues to be a need for a separate Code of Practice and, if so, what the new code should include to address issues that are unique to the fitness industry.

We've all heard of the hormone testosterone, but we might not know just how important it is that we look after our testosterone levels for our physical and mental health and wellbeing. Hormones themselves are the chemical messengers that the glands in our body send through our blood to our organs. They are necessary for growth, reproduction and wellbeing. The ones that are particularly important to men are the male sex hormones called androgens. Testosterone is the most important androgen and affects everything from our metabolism, our recovery time after physical exertion, our mood and of course our sex drive, performance and health. All things that we care about, that help define us as men and that we don't want to compromise on.

normal puberty, including not having our voice break, not getting a normal growth spurt or even developing breasts. This is all to be avoided if possible! In adults there are a range of potential symptoms including weight gain, mood changes, reduced strength, difficulty getting erections and a lower sex drive. These symptoms and others can have a detrimental impact on our health and quality of life so being aware of testosterones' role in our lives and the difficulties we can have with it is important to all men.

If we find ourselves experiencing these issues we should go to the doctor and have a simple blood test that will check our testosterone levels. If we are suffering from a severe deficiency it is likely we will be administered Testosterone Replacement Therapy (TRT) in the form of injections, gels, lotions, creams, patches and tablets; some of which can come with negative side effects. Fortunately, there are ways to increase our testosterone short of pharmaceutical help. Primarily through lifestyle choices. That is getting enough sleep, avoiding alcohol and drugs, staying active; especially through weightlifting, minimising stress levels and getting all our vitamins and minerals through a balanced diet, will all have a significant impact on our testosterone levels and general health.

Like with most aspects of our health the same fundamentals affecting everything else also affect testosterone levels. A Fairer GST System For All

THE WA members of the Turnbull Government have long recognised that the state's share of the GST is unfair, unsustainable and needs to be addressed.

The proposition that stronger states should support others, so that all have the capacity to provide similar outcomes for their communities, is an important principle of our federation which we must continue to protect and preserve. However, an arrangement which allows any one state to receive less than 30 per cent of its GST share back because of fiscal equalisation cannot be sustained.

To ensure GST is fairly distributed, the government is proposing to adopt an updated horizontal fiscal equalisation (HFE) model, which will balance out the inequality and support the services all Australians rely on, especially in smaller states. Under the HFE every dollar collected under the GST is returned to the states to spend on essential services as they see fit.

Distributing GST revenue amongst the states is how the government ensures that no Australian is disadvantaged because of the state they live in. Through this system, the less financially independent states receive relatively more GST, to assist them to provide government services.

This system of HFE distribution is managed by the independent Commonwealth Grants Commission (CGC), which distributes the GST using a complex formula. The government also ensures that living standards are maintained through other mechanisms, such as the tax/transfer system, which provides a safety net for everyone, as well as through the guaranteeing of essential services such as Medicare.

The government's proposal will involve transitioning to the new HFE system in a way that is fair, reasonable and sustainable and that will ensure all states are left financially better off.

This process will begin at the start of the 2019/20 tax year. The preferred model will involve moving towards a new benchmark that will ensure the fiscal capacity of all states is at least the equal of New South Wales or Victoria (whichever is higher). Benchmarking all states and territories to the economies of the two largest states will remove the effects of extreme circumstances – such as a mining boom, from Australia's GST distribution system.

From 2022/23 the government is also proposing to implement a floor of 70 cents per person, per dollar of GST, below which no state's relativity can fall. This will rise to 75 cents from 2024/25.

In 2017, at the request of WA Liberal members, the independent Productivity Commission (PC) examined Australia's HFE system of which had determined the allocation of GST since it was introduced in 2000. The inquiry was commissioned in response to volatility in the distribution and resulting declining community confidence in Australia's HFE system.

The PC found that although it has resulted in perverse outcomes when there is a significant shock to our economy. This occurred in WA in 2015/16 when the effect of the mining boom resulted in a fall in its relativity and the GST reached 30 cents in the dollar. To put this into perspective, the lowest any other state's share had fallen since the GST was introduced was 83 cents.

The next stage of the process is for the government to consult with all states on their agreement so that any alternative transition arrangements may be proposed. This is an opportunity now for the WA Government to put politics to one side and join the federal government and urge other state governments and the Federal Opposition, to get on board in support of this plan which is clearly good for WA.

Live Exporters Must Lead

Live exporters must show their Middle East customers - and Australia - the live sheep trade can be done properly, Minister for Agriculture David Littleproud said today.

Minister Littleproud has recently travelled to the UAE, Qatar, Kuwait and now Israel to support the live export industry. Government is doing all it can but that effort will come to nothing if no exporter steps up and takes the sheep which are currently in Perth to the Middle East, where customers need to know Australia can supply sheep through the northern summer.

"The Australian Livestock Exporters Council have for years said they're the world leaders in live export and now is their chance to prove it," Minister Littleproud said.

"ALEC members need to show us they haven't been taking us for mugs the whole time.

"Let's talk straight. The current situation is the result of the alleged actions of an exporter. Exporters have made millions of dollars off sheep farmers. It's time for an exporter to step up. Farmers should not take the fall. "An exporter needs to take these sheep to the Middle East. Exporters who value the trade know we need to show Qatar, Kuwait and the UAE we can give them supply through their summer. We also need to show Australians the trade can be done properly through the Middle Eastern summer and rebuild public support for this industry.

"When an exporter is suspended, it is not the fault of the Government nor of the regulator. It is not the fault of farmers.

"Letting exporters do the wrong thing without serious consequences would eventually see the trade shut down forever. Suggestions the independent regulator should look the other way to ignore allegedly dodgy behaviour are dangerous. Suggestions I should hold talks with suspended exporters to broker a deal with them are equally dangerous."

August Gardening Tips

It's August, the weather is still cold and windy but the end of winter is drawing near, the days begin to grow noticeably longer and the change of season is not too far away. This month is the last chance to complete the pruning of deciduous trees and shrubs and for planting raspberries and brambleberries (such as blackberries and their hybrids). It's now time to sow the first summer vegetable seeds. Where there's a danger of frost, sow seeds in trays and place them in a protected area such as a veranda, greenhouse, or indoors near a sunny window. Towards the end of August, feed fruit trees with organic fertiliser, manure and compost. Also dig these into the soil when preparing new garden beds. The soil life will begin working on the organic plant food and will begin to slowly release its nutrients into the soil after a week or two, ready for the beginning of new spring growth in September. If fruit trees need a feed of potash, late autumn is also the time to do that.

Things to Do This Month:

Continue planting deciduous trees, shrubs, vines and cane fruits (and roses!). Wait till spring for planting citrus.

- Continue pruning deciduous fruit trees (not apricots, best to prune these in late autumn).
- Continue pruning deciduous shrubs (and roses if you didn't prune them in July).
- Prune dead seed-heads, stems and branches on herbaceous perennial plants.
- Relocate any deciduous plants (trees, shrubs, vines) or herbaceous perennial plants growing in the wrong place in winter. (Evergreens can only be moved in autumn and early spring, where they have time to regrow roots - remember, they retain leaves in winter which transpire and lose
- Apply organic fertiliser to fruit trees, so that the slowly released nutrients will become available when the new growth commences in spring.
- Spray peaches and nectarines to protect against leaf curl fungus. Use lime sulphur or a copper fungicide at the bud swell stage (just before the buds begin to open) but before pink bud stage or colour shows. It is too late to spray once flowering occurs.



Stroke detection through gaming, immersive virtual technology and 3D holograms of general practitioners were among the digital advancements on display at the 'Art of the Possible' expo held in East Perth today.

Initiated by the Sustainable Health Review (SHR) Panel, the mini digital health and innovation expoinvolved 20 WA and national innovators showcasing leading-edge digital technology for the health sector.

The expo also showcased independent living technology to assist people stay safely in their own home, an app to help delay the symptoms of Huntington's, and an unobtrusive and easy-to-wear monitor to measure heart rhythm and detect potentially deadly cardiac problems.



To the Politician Concerned About Live Export (cont.)

sitting behind a keyboard supporting Animals Australia.

While attending the LE meeting in Katanning on July 20, I learnt just how insignificant the activist view is in this debate, only one person stated on record they didn't agree with the industry. Not one activist was there. If they are so concerned about banning the industry why weren't they there? Because LE doesn't affect their livelihood or community, that is why. They are rich with social media emotions and poor with experience and facts of the industry. If you did attend you would have seen the almost two thousand passionate sheep producers and those involved in the industry attend, those who know the importance of the LE Industry and those really concerned about animal welfare.

Despite this, it is clear that some of our politicians are being greatly influenced by the ill informed percentage of Australians so hell bent on seeing LE Industry banned. What gives politicians the right to ignore the facts and be influenced by what is only an emotive response to footage that does not reflect an industry from people who have never stepped foot on a farm or boat? What gives those politicians the right to not support farmers; the people who put the food on their table? This attitude was so clearly evident when the WA Minister for Agriculture Alannah MacTiernan addressed some third generational sheep producers in Katanning and was responded to rightly so for the uneducated embarrassing points she made about agriculture in WA, and her direct lack of support for farmers when questioned about it. If Alannah herself has failed to acknowledge the facts and value of the LE industry suggesting that it will be phased out and referring to her "plan B" which offers no sound animal welfare or economic outcomes as her only opinion, it shows directly that she is hearing Lynn White and the converted loudly, but failing in her objectives as the Minister of Agriculture. If you are Alannah MacTiernan or the Premier Mark McGowan I encourage you first to carry out your Ministry objectives, stop fuelling the emotional argument to ban LE in WA to boost your popularity at the cost of destroying the future of farming and rural communities. Australia has a duty to get this right, to fix the industry and continue to improve and set an example of systems of welfare around the world.

If you are a politician already supporting farmers and the LE industry let your actions speak louder than your words. It should not just be the hardworking people involved in the LE industry defending it. You have the ability to use your position to educate the wider community on the importance of this industry and help to dissolve the threat of popularity seeking political decisions that will destroy its future. Furthermore don't let the voice of activists and Animals Australia bully the future of this industry.

The McCarthy review which took only 28 days to complete now leaves the industry not necessarily a best practice regulation but more of an over regulation of the system allowing well funded groups like Animals Australia to have a choke hold strategy over the

industry to pursue legal action. Is the intention of that legal action to improve welfare? No, it is just a popularity and funding fight for the group and its supporters, all while the industry suffers, producers continue to feed animals with no other market fast becoming of no value, and 60,000 sheep still sit in a feedlot with no where to go. The twenty three recommendations being carried out by the regulator (DAFA) it seems gives strength to a campaign of Animals Australia and their goal at taking out an industry one step at a time. The reform of LE which the industry knows must be made to move forward should not overshadow what is successful about this industry, it must allow for the best animal welfare outcomes cohesively. It must not halt trade and remove exporters from an industry not prepared to battle Animals Australia, close markets for producers, destroy trade relationships, cause feed shortages on farm so welfare on farm is stressed, keep business out of work, because the regulator is not prepared with support of the federal government to step up and release permits knowing best practice will and should occur, and remove the threat Animals Australia and groups alike have on the future of the industry. The regulator and Ministers involved must support the improvements to the industry and work to further improve the systems with those involved in the industry while moving forward with trade. Ministers of Parliament who support Agriculture and the LE industry must not be threatened by what Animals Australia can do legally to destroy it.

Sheep producers and all those involved in the LE industry find themselves squeezed between the politicians who do not support them and while seeking votes are pushing for a ban to the industry with no solution. And those politicians and the regulator who state that they support the industry yet are allowing Animals Australia by way of time and over regulation to mount legal action to halt trade, which is hindering an effective reform of the industry for the best welfare outcomes and future of sheep production and global welfare. We need those politicians supporting the industry to do more.

To all those involved in the industry you must keep contacting the said politicians in Australia regularly. The value of LE to your business must be heard. We are those passionate and experienced in this industry, we know the facts and what animal welfare and caring for sheep is. Take action now www.liveexports.com.au follow the send email link.




Lake Grace Pingrup Junior Netball Notes
