Ride for a Reason

Tameka Roukens and Karissa Pelham also did the ride but are not in the photo.

Last September Darren Clifford, Lake Grace local and Lake Grace/Pingrup Senior Hockey team coach, was diagnosed with Non-Hodgkins Lymphoma, cancer of the Lymphatic system. The lymphatic system forms part of the immune system and contains specialised white blood cells called lymphocytes. Lymphomas occur when B and T-lymphocytes multiply in an uncontrollable way, causing tumours in lymph nodes and other parts of the body.

Darren underwent eight months of chemotherapy and another month of radiation therapy to remove

his cancerous tumours. While undergoing his therapies Darren continued to go to trainings and games to support and encourage his team. Some of the symptoms for Non-Hodgkins Lymphoma include: recurrent fevers, persistent fatigue and lack of energy, so just getting to these games and coaching a team would have been a struggle on its own. Fortunately luck was on Darren's side in this and he finished both therapies in June this year.

Darren Spencer

Shearing has been a big part of Darren Spencer's life. At the ripe age of 17, he scored his first stand while home from Narrogin Ag School during the September school holidays. Once school days were over, he worked on the family farm for 12 months before once again picking up the handpiece and cocky shearing for the next four years in the Lake King area.

In 1985 Darren met north-east Newdegate girl, Tania Richter. The two of them made their way from Lake King in January 1987 with the view of travelling around Australia. They spent five weeks in Geraldton but only managed eight days work before Darren picked up a stand at Warroora Station, south of Coral Bay. Darren and Tania spent two years shearing in the pastoral areas, working in sheds from Carnarvon through to Karratha. Some of the larger stations ran up to 45,000 sheep, employing up to nine shearers for six weeks to get the wool off.

In 1989 Darren and Tania were married with Darren shearing out of Perth for a few years. In 1991 he was shearing with Bill Adriaens at Hopetoun when Bill asked when Darren was going to take over his run. Darren's reply was when Bill was sick of it! Well Bill was obviously sick of it and said he'd like Darren's answer that night. So in July of 1991 Darren took on his first shearing team.

Currently Darren has two teams but in the busy season he can have three to four teams. He no longer shears but there's no idle time as he's kept busy with the management of his teams, his WestCoast Wools agency and his Lake Grace Transport business.

What does Darren love about the industry he's devoted a huge chunk of his life to? The camaraderie of being a part of a team and meeting people. So what are some of the challenges? Finding enough staff to work in an industry that has suffered neglect from many factors; such as the competition of the mining industry, wool and sheep prices and the lack of money being spent on infrastructure. Like many industries and workplaces the shearing shed is also facing the problem of drug abuse; "this is a societal problem however because shearers tend to work, live and socialise together there is a greater knowledge of what is going on", said Darren.



It's through his love of the shearing industry that Darren got involved with the West Australian Shearing Industry Association (WASIA formerly known as WASCA). A not -for-profit industry association, representing the interests of the WA Shearing industry, WASIA provides vital information and support to all shearing industry members, including shearing contractors, wool classers, Shed Hands/Wool Handlers, Wool Buyers/ Wool Brokers and other interested WA Shearing industry stakeholders.

Established in 1987, WASCA as it was originally known, transitioned to WASIA in recent years to make it more inclusive of all industry stakeholders and supporters. WASIA fulfils a vital role in furthering the development of the WA Shearing Industry and promoting and developing a legislative, economic, administrative, training, working and social environment to ensure a safe, responsible and profitable shearing industry in Western Australia.

Darren is a long time member of WASIA and has been President for the last eight years. At the recent WASIA AGM in June, he joined a small and very elite group by being awarded Life Membership for his outstanding service to WASIA, the shearing Industry in general, and contributions to rural and regional WA. He was presented with his Life Membership by former WASIA President and Life Member, Mr Peter Letch and WASIA Life Time Observer Mr Doug Kennedy.

Unaware of what the committee had been planning, Darren became a little emotional when realising his recognition via the Life Membership award. 'You could have knock my socks off. I have a lot of passion for the shearing business and I am doing what I think is right for the industry and would like to thank you for recognising that', said Darren upon receipt of the award. Darren reflected to those present at the AGM that shearing had given him a great deal; that it was an awesome industry and those people present were testament to that.

Mr Spencer has represented WASIA at State, National and International levels and has been responsible for a multitude of industry initiatives. These include the

instigation of a transition process and succession plan from the previous WASIA Executive Officer; arranging Governance training and workshops for the WASIA executive members, organising executive strategic planning workshops for the implementation of the WASIA strategic plan, establishment of a member's psychological counselling service, risk assessment and shed safety initiatives, a full review of the WASIA constitution, chairing the selection committee panel in the appointment of the new WASIA Administrative officer (Valerie Pretzel) and her induction into the new role at WASIA, including operational shed site visits and the introduction to industry stakeholders. These duties were all voluntary and self-funded.

Currently Darren is representing WASIA on the national Shearing Industry Drug & Alcohol Stakeholder Group dealing with drugs and alcohol in the industry. The group consisting of representatives from AWU, Farm Lobby Groups and Shearing Industry recently held a summit in Adelaide in conjunction with Shearing Contractors Association Australia. From this summit a Drug and Alcohol Policy for Industry is being formulated to give industry direction and knowledge of obligations and strategies to combat drugs in the workplace.

Money to Give

Lotterywest Grants Development Officers Linda Pomare and Shireen Watson were recently in Lake Grace to meet with the community and talk about funding opportunities for local clubs and organisations.

In 2015/16 Lotterywest's customers bought lottery products totalling \$889.5 million. Almost 60% of sales goes in prizes to players, in 2015/16 this totalled \$600.1 million, including 99 lucky players who won a Division 1 Lotto prize.

Lotterywest's operating costs account for around 7% of their revenue. Another 8% is paid in commission, which is added to the price of the tickets, and subsequently to the Lotterywest retailers. The remainder (approximately a third of every dollar spent on lottery products) is dispersed to the West Australian community.

In 2015/16 over \$130 million was given to WA's public hospitals; the arts community and sports organisations (DSR) were each given \$16.26 million; local governments are another big winner. A further \$118.9 million was given in direct grants.

Lotterywest are keen to give the money away and with only a tiny percentage of grants unsuccessful the development officers will work with you until the grant is at an ideal point to be submitted. The key is to involve Lotterywest in the very early stages of your application so they can help you across the line.



Recognising Knowledge Can Lead to Support

Information is power. This is the sentence that resonated with many who attended the Recognise and Respond to Amphetamine Intoxication/Toxicity & Opioid Overdose training event. An informed and knowledgeable decision is more likely when people arm themselves with the correct information.

The 26th July workshop, held at the Lake Grace St John Ambulance Sub Centre and co-facilitated by the Mental Health Commission and Holyoake, was excellent. The workshop was aimed at front line workers but also anyone who was interested in learning more about the harmful effects of amphetamines and opioids and the identifying signs of toxicity and overdose. With 'ice' continuing to be a heavy presence in our society, and opioids which include prescription drugs, being mishandled - often accidently, this program was effective in helping to reduce the impact that overdosing can have. This was achieved by educating attendees with effective responses including skills that can deescalate the situation and also how to administer Naloxone in the case of opioid toxicity. The process in which drugs can alter the brains neurotransmitters, affecting the way the person thinks, feels and behaves, was an eye-opener.

"Always help someone.

You might be the only

one who does."

Drugs and addiction do not discriminate. For some, it may be easy to think drugs are not in their world if they do not have a friend or a loved one affected by them. But it does not matter who you are, how much money you make, your race, gender or age. It can happen to anyone - from the young homeless girl to the white collar professional. They can be good people who end up becoming a victim to the disease of addiction.

Addiction will rob you of your money, your memories, your life and your spirit. Drugs can hurt not only the one addicted to them but also the family and friends of the victim. While we may not eradicate drugs completely from our world, if someone is willing to help themselves, we can at least try to help them on their journey to recovery. So instead of judging someone, perhaps think about helping them. If you can't help them, at least don't hurt them.

Charles Henry Lucas

Records are not available for Charlie, (as he was known), from the Defence Service Records. However, it is certain that he was enlisted with the Australian Imperial Force, as he did attend camp at Blackboy Hill for training on at least two occasions, and judging by the group who went to camp at the same time, which included IB Rose, and an unknown identity of Lake Grace, J Caleuse, he would have enlisted September 1916, having passed his medical test on the 20th. From "Across the Lake" we learn that, "By 1915 Lucas had his first crop in at "Kingswood", but like many others, joined the Australian Army. To assist the war effort, farmers were given leave to harvest their crops. While doing this, Lucas was kicked in the leg by a horse which rendered him unfit for war service". Incidentally, it was also reported, "among the fine crops worthy of mention, were the Lucas Brothers" - expected to yield 30 bushels.

Later, in January of 1917, it is also recorded that Lucas, along with others from Lake Grace, was to return to Camp "shortly". It may be that after the occasion of his return he was "rendered unfit", and it is unclear what further role he had in the war effort, if any, but it is most probable he was then ruled out of consideration for any further training. However, he is recognised on our Honour Roll for his contribution to the War effort, so this

story is compiled from what we know of him. Most information about him is taken from "Across the Lake". The fact that he and his father both had the same names of Charles Henry, adds to the confusion of the roles each of them played in the community, though the father had a third name, and when the initials CHF prefixed the Lucas name we know for sure it was the father. This story is meant to be about Charles, the son, though notes about the father are included to clarify their respective positions at Lake Grace.

In July of 1911, Charlie Lucas, the son, was among the group of recipients for the 18 locations made available in the Lake Grace district on the first big allocation, his location being, 10158. It was four kilometres north of where the town would one day be, and he called his farm "Kingswood". He was an immigrant from Devon, England, and was accompanied by his brother Fred when they came to Western Australia. Fifteen months later, in October of 1912, the adjoining southern location, in the name of Joseph Eric Ogle was transferred to Frederick and Charles Lucas (the father, CHF Lucas Senior, who had arrived in Australia later, and his other son), and was called "Black Hill". Although Charlie had his block quite some months before his fathers' acquisition, it is recorded, "As soon as Black Hill farm was underway, Charlie Lucas started

clearing his own 1,000 acre block".

Charlie Lucas was a civic minded person and was well to the fore in advocating progress for the Community. At one time until mid 1914, he was the Lake Grace secretary of The Farmers & Settlers Association of Western Australia, and he proposed that John Franks be accorded a vote of thanks for the able manner in which he placed the claims for the railway line to Lake Grace before the Premier. He was also involved in supporting the Progress Association in its endeavours to progress the lot of the new community. In 1914 he requested permission from the Dumbleyung Road Board to erect a gate on the road running through his location. Permission was granted on the usual conditions, vis. standard gate and registration. This road was the route originally taken by the setters on the eastern side of the lake, who had to travel right around to the top of the lake, to reach their destination, and later, in 1923 he requested the Road Board to survey a road through his location, which they did. His farm became a freehold title in November 1940, when records show 3 acres deducted for the road, now called Walker Road.

It is recorded that Charlie became involved in the establishment of the Lake Grace and District Cooperative Company and was a director from its beginning. He was also on the Building Committee of the Methodist Church, and on its completion, became the secretary of the Methodist Church Trust, however, it is more likely it was CHF Lucas, the father, as he was known to be a director of the Co-op, and after being appointed secretary and Manager of the Co-op, had to resign his position as Director. Furthermore, it is known CHF Lucas had other appointments in the Methodist Church, and the Agricultural Hall, so it is most likely most of the "secretarial" type roles about town attributed to CH Lucas, were carried out by the father.

Digressing, it is also recorded that CHF Lucas and family (including daughters, Alice and May), were pioneer settlers, though in his obituary of his sudden death in October of 1926, it states that: "The late Mr Lucas was born at Exmouth, England, and for 28 years was employed as a cabinet maker. At age 21, he married Martha Ann Long, and came to Western Australia in 1911, where he resided in Perth, still following his trade as cabinet maker. About 1917, he took up farming at Lake Grace, and resided there until about two months ago", though one Lucas student was on the 1913 school list. During these years he held many positions in Lake Grace, especially with the Methodist Church. He was also a butcher in the early 1920s, and in this regard, remains of stock yards, where slaughtering may have been done are visible, at the north west corner of his location – possibly to comply with the 3 mile limit imposed by the health department.

On 19 October 1918, the son, Charlie Lucas, married Helen Phillips, an English girl from Somerset. He built a house about 1920 on Kingswood farm, where they raised their three children, Vincent, who became an

electrician, and showed the town pictures at one time, Ray who went to World War II, and was badly effected by it and Val. The early settlers were making good progress with their ventures during the 1920s, and when a list was produced it revealed a degree of affluence, showing many of them having acquired motor cars, both of the "Charles Lucas" also on the list with a Chevrolet, and Overland. In July of 1926, "Black Hill" was sold, and Robert Carruthers Junr took it over, while the unmarried son Frederick left the district. Charlie remained on his farm "Kingswood", and he and Helen remained in the district another 20 odd years. It was 1948 before they sold their farm to Allan Walker and left the district. Their farm remained with the Walker family until 2006, when Bill and Angela sold to Greg and Paula Carruthers.

Charlie Lucas and his wife left the Lake Grace district, and bought a mixed farm at Kendenup, before retiring to Albany, where Helen later died. Charlie Lucas spent his last years at Safety Bay, where he died on 8 March 1980, at the age of 93 years. He was buried at Karrakatta Cemetery.

Pull Your Socks Up, But Don't Claim Them

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) is increasing attention, scrutiny and education on work-related expenses this tax time.

Assistant Commissioner Kath Anderson said that last year over 6.3 million people made a work-related expense claim for clothing and laundry expenses, totalling almost \$1.8 billion.

"We have seen claims for clothing and laundry expenses increase around 20 per cent over the last five years. While this increase isn't a sign that all of these taxpayers are doing the wrong thing, it is giving us a reason to pay extra attention," she said.

Ms Anderson said common mistakes the ATO has seen include people claiming ineligible clothing, claiming for something without having spent the money, and not being able to explain the basis for how the claim was calculated.

"I heard a story recently about a taxpayer purchasing everyday clothes who was told by the sales assistant that they could claim a deduction for the clothing if they also wore them to work," Ms Anderson said.

"This is not the case. You can't claim a deduction for everyday clothing you bought to wear to work, even if your employer tells you to wear a certain colour or you have a dress code," she said.

"For your clothing to be eligible for a deduction, it needs to be occupation-specific clothing, protective clothing or a uniform that is unique to the organisation you work for," she said.

Ms Anderson said it is a myth that you can claim a standard deduction of \$150 without spending money on appropriate clothing or laundry. She said that while record keeping requirements for laundry expenses are relaxed for claims up to this threshold, taxpayers do need to be able to show how they calculated their deduction.

"Over 1.6 million taxpayers claim a deduction of exactly \$150. We expect many of these claims to be legitimate but the results of our random audits show that people are making mistakes." Ms Anderson said there are three golden rules to follow which will help taxpayers to get their deductions right.

"One – you have to have spent the money yourself and can't have been reimbursed, two – the claim must be directly related to earning your income, and three – you need a record to prove it," she said.

"The myDeductions tool in the ATO app is also a great way to make keeping records for your deductions easier. If you start using it now, next tax time will be a breeze because you can send your deductions to your tax agent or upload them directly to myTax."

It is important to remember, whether you lodge your own tax return or go to an agent, you need to be aware of what you can and can't claim. If you use an agent, you are still responsible for making sure your deductions are correct.



Cardiovascular Awareness - "How's Your Pump and Pipes?"

Warriors Wellbeing Article

This year the team at Regional Men's Health is focusing on Cardiovascular Awareness and encouraging blokes in Regional WA to have a think about their "Pump & Pipes".

It's no surprise that when we combine disease associated with the **heart** (pump) and **blood vessels** (pipes) it's our biggest killer, largest health problem, and places a great burden on our economy and health system. This of course is without even considering the issues around grief, loss of function and care requirements that can also impact individuals and families.

SOME STATISTICS:

Cardiovascular Disease (CVD) is the major cause of death in our country. It kills one Aussie every 12 minutes, which equates to just over 45,000 deaths (2015). It affects one in six of us (4.2 million) and was the main cause for 480,548 hospitalisations and a contributing factor in a further 680,000 in a single year (Heart Foundation Aust).

WHY PUMP & PIPES?

If you think about a pump moving water through a series of pipes, over time sediment can slowly build up and slow the flow of water or even cause a blockage. Most blokes would understand this would result in the pump having to work harder which can cause it to eventually fail or blow a hose.

This is no different to coronary heart disease, which occurs through the build-up of fatty deposits (plaque) in the arteries that feed the heart. Narrowing reduces the supply of blood and oxygen to your heart and if this becomes too narrow it can cause angina (pain/discomfort in chest) or if a blood clot causes a complete block then this can cause a Heart Attack. This is similar to when a clot occurs in blood vessels to the brain causing a Stroke.

Factors that contribute to CVD include family history (which we can't change) but some of the other risks we can manage by making healthy lifestyle choices:

- · maintain a healthy diet
- do regular exercise
- reduce our alcohol intake (take a couple of days off a week)
- monitor our body weight
- don't smoke
- · reduce our salt intake
- · look after our mental health & wellbeing

It's important we acknowledge that a lot of CVD is preventable but it's essential that we understand our individual risk factors that may impact on us developing diseases associated with our heart and blood vessels. The onset of other health issues such as diabetes, obesity, poor health, even erectile dysfunction can be an indicator that our pump and pipes could be under pressure.

So just remember like any good piece of machinery, there are some basic **Operating Tips** to keep things running at optimal performance!

Growing Up in Lake Grace Part V

John Dyke

A former resident of Lake Grace, John Dyke was born in King Edward Memorial Hospital in Subjaco, on 24 April 1935, to Noel Frederick Dyke and May Dyke. Dad had gone ahead to Lake Grace as Secretary to the Road Board. They had come to West Australia from Wales, UK, in 1926, paid their own way, and were sent to the South West, south of Bridgetown, to one of the Group Settlements, No's 126 and 127. The whole thing was a complete con between the British and Australian Governments, promising the new settlers a house, good land to cultivate, and the promise that within a few short years, working hard, they would be wealthy enough to return to the UK and have a good holiday. John and his wife Cheryl currently live in Albany. The following is the fifth part in a series detailing some of John's earlier adventures.

On the next camp we did, still with National Service on Garden Island Ernie Butson and myself were called in by the C.O. as there had been a traffic accident on the Island and we were the only Police available. On making our enquiries, we found out that a truck that had two occupants, both Army Personnel, were both drunk and the truck had no doors on it. The driver was swerving all over the roadway and at one point to stop the truck from leaving the roadway and plunging down a steep embankment, the driver had swung back so hard to the middle of the road that his passenger had fallen out and landed on his head killing him instantly. We put the driver through a sobriety test, which he failed to pass, and then charged him with drunk driving and had him transferred back to Fremantle Police Station where he was formally charged with drunk driving causing death, this charge later being upgraded to manslaughter. At a later date I attended Court and gave evidence as did Butson. He was convicted and sentenced to prison for a considerable time.

In 1958 Sir Robert Menzies, Australia's longest serving Prime Minister and the most popular came to Perth for several days. Myself and three other patrolmen were given the job of escorting him to all of his official engagements. To watch Sir Robert give his regular speech on the back of a truck in Forrest Place surrounded by hundreds of people was an event not to be missed and from time to time a heckler would interrupt him. The Prime Minister never tried to stop the

heckler from saying his piece but at the conclusion would verbally put him down in such a manner and choice of words that the person would crawl away amongst the crowd who were laughing at him, never to be seen again.

Sir Robert was staying at the Esplanade Hotel overlooking Langley Park to the Swan River. The Esplanade only catered for the very, very respectable and you could not get into the lounge for a drink without wearing a respectable tie. If you looked respectable but had no tie the doorman would offer you a tie to put on and then let you in. On one occasion a man was offered a tie but declined and left, he returned about 20 minutes later wearing a tie but no shoes, the doorman did not bat an eyelash simply said good afternoon Sir and let him through.

On the last day of escorting the Prime Minister we pulled up outside the Esplanade climbed off our bikes and stood smartly to attention. Sir Robert got out of the rear seat of the car, but as would normally happen with dignitaries they ignore the escort and go on their merry way – not so Sir Robert. He walked up to us thanked us for looking after him shook each of us by the hand and then said, "would you gentlemen like to join me for a beer?" As the senior man at the time I said that would be very much appreciated Sir Robert and we followed the Prime Minister in past the doorman who once again

never batted an eyelash and said, "good afternoon Prime Minister, good afternoon gentlemen," referring to the 4 Police Patrolmen following.

Did anybody in the lounge show any surprise at seeing us with the Prime Minister. Not a bit, far too respectable. As we walked between the occupied tables, a waiter appeared at Sir Robert's side who said "a table and a round of beer for my friends here and I will have a beer myself thank you." So we sat and for the next 15 or 20 minutes drank our beer and had an interesting chat with the Prime Minister of Australia on several subjects. Sir Robert then said "Gentlemen you must excuse me I have a very busy evening ahead of me so I can't stop for another drink but it has been a very busy day and I am sure you would all like another beer", to which I replied "thank you Sir." Sir Robert stood up, we all stood up and he again shook us all by the hand, a good strong handshake. The waiter appeared alongside Sir Robert who said "another round of drinks please but not for myself, goodbye Gentlemen," to which we responded and he left us. We then sat down again enjoyed our second beer and walked out to return to the office; and there is the difference between Australia's most loved and popular Prime Minister and the rest of them.

Also in Perth in 1958 was the Queen Mother, she stayed at Government House for a few days. There were several high profile visitors in Perth at that time

and around 20 Police Patrol Officers were allocated to escort them to the various events attended. On the last day we all went to Government House in St George's Tce and lined up in two rows and the Queen Mother inspected us, and as is frequently the case, stopped in front of several of us to say a few words. I can recall as if yesterday she stopped in front of me and said "you are very young officer what age are you and what is your name." It was then that I looked into her eyes and I honestly have never seen a more beautiful pair of blue eyes. "I am 23 years of age Your Majesty my name is John Dyke." She then said "and do you have a wife or girlfriend young John." I replied "I do have a girlfriend your Majesty." She then said to me, "Well young John I want you to marry that girl and have lots of children, we have to populate the Commonwealth young John." I replied "yes Your Majesty I will do my very best" and she moved on never to be forgotten. It took me another 17 years before Cheryl and I had our first daughter Tammy and 20 years for our second daughter Serena. Tammy is now a Vet Surgeon married to an Englishman who is also a Vet living in Hyde just south of Manchester United Kingdom. Serena, an Organ Detoxifier and Beauty Consultant, lives in Brentwood California USA and is a single Mum of four and a half year old Cruz. Cruz is currently staying with Cheryl and I, his Grandparents caravanning in the North of the State.

Flooding Event - February 2017

The Shire received notification from Main Roads WA (MRWA), that our Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements cost estimate of \$10,607,882 for AGRN 743 has been approved. This is based on the use of contractors for the re-instatement works for the local roads.

WML Consulting Pty Ltd has now been appointed as the successful Project Manager, and is currently producing the documentation of tenders for supervision services, plant, equipment and materials. It is intended that these services will be advertised next week. There will be two tenders issued, with a number of packages within each tender. The tenders will then be assessed and once a successful tenderer is appointed the aim is to commence works in mid-September, all things going to plan.


Road Classifications for Construction and Maintenance

Road construction and renewal works are to be undertaken in accordance with our current policy and in accordance with the guidelines set out in the Unsealed Roads Manual produced by the *Australian Road Research Board*. The objectives of these standards are to construct and maintain safe roads within the district.

The diagram below depicts the standard profile for 'A' and 'B' class roads. The maximum width of these roads is 18m from the top of the backslopes; the minimum allowable width is 16m.

The following work criteria is attributed to both 'A' and 'B' Class Roads;


- Formation to be 10m width;
- Carriageway to be 7m with 200mm gravel sheet;
- Shoulders to be 2 x 1.5m;
- Crossfall to be 4%;
- Floodways to be equipped with a minimum of 2 x 237mm culverts and headwalls; and,
- Backslopes to be cleared annually of all regrowth.

In addition for a 'B' Class Road;

One additional grading before harvest, if necessary.

'A' Class Roads are recognised as major regional routes and are sealed or planned to be sealed with 'B' Class Roads being recognised as major feeder roads and are built to a pre-seal standard.

The diagram below depicts the standard profile for 'C' class roads. The maximum width of these roads is 16m from the top of the backslopes; the minimum allowable width is 14m.



The following work criteria are attributed to 'C' Class Roads;

- Formation to be 8m width;
- Carriageway to be 6m with 150mm gravel sheet; and,
- Shoulders to be 2 x 1m.

'C' Class Roads are low volume farm access roads.

Please contact the shire office for further information on what classification your roads are.

It is the intention of Council to commence addressing the regrowth issues that we have between the top of our backslopes. The area between the top of the backslopes should be kept clear of vegetation, including tree canopies to be clear vertical at the top of the backslope. These works are to ensure that we have safe carriageways for our vehicular traffic. Given the back log of works required it will take some time to undertake all works required. When re-sheeting works are being undertaken, the works will be undertaken to comply with these specifications.



G'day all,

It's been a relatively eventful past month since I last wrote. In particular we've had a few instances of hoon type driving in Newdegate culminating in some damage to the football oval last weekend. I understand the community's frustration with such behaviour and we are following up a couple of leads that we now have. I will reiterate that we need to ask members of the public to try and identify the driver and occupants or better yet capture footage of these idiots when they pop up. Telling us 2 days later is neither especially helpful nor evidentially useful – the time involved for us to intercept these people means they are long gone before we get there hence why we need your help.

I have applied for use of covert cameras normally held in Albany and I will be placing them at likely locations in Newdegate, and if the need arises in Lake Grace also. The footage from these cameras is outstanding and drivers will be easily identifiable.

As many will know the Lake Grace Sports club had a break in a couple of weeks ago, and we were able to obtain some finger marks at the scene. Pingrup also had a similar incident the same weekend and appears that the 2 may be linked. Analysis of the marks will hopefully produce a suspect for arrest. In isolation these incidents are worrying, however the overall trend is that all types of crime are on the decrease in the Shire of Lake Grace, and we live in one of the safest communities in the state. Some improved lighting and an alarm will ensure next time won't be so easy for the wrongdoers.

The firearm amnesty continues, so please use this opportunity to dispose of any unlicensed relics sitting in the shed or gun cabinet.

Finally, can I ask that people start turning off their engines when leaving a vehicle unattended? I'm not sure why people do this, but we have seen \$100,000 cars with kids strapped in the back while Mum or Dad is in the Post Office. It only needs one criminally inclined person to drive or walk past and we could have a very serious incident on our hands. It was only last year that the same thing resulted in a Subaru being stolen In East Vic Park with a 3 year old boy still in the back. A massive Police operation commenced and luckily the young boy was found unharmed. I understand we are all in a hurry but the least you can do is take the keys out of the ignition, and make it harder to steal. There's no problem leaving the kids in the car for a short time, but in the summer months I think this is not advisable even for the shortest of periods. It just seems to be a hugely unnecessary risk for the sake of the turn of a key!!

As always we can be contacted at the station on **9890 2000** and in the case of an emergency dial **000** as per normal. Please be patient if you ring the station and get through to Albany – the call taker will help you and make contact with me if they deem the matter to be urgent.

Farmers and the Australian Consumer Law

Media Release

Farmers may not be aware that the price of the item or the service you purchase for the farm may affect whether you are considered a consumer or a business under the Australian Consumer Law.

On the surface it may not seem like any big deal but it is when it comes to the avenues that are open to you when something goes wrong with that piece of machinery you have bought or the service you contracted to the farm.

If an item or service is under \$40,000 you are considered a consumer and all the benefits of redress under the Australian Consumer Law are available to you. Above \$40,000 and it is considered for business unless you can show that the item is ordinarily for personal, domestic or household use such as a car.

When it comes to purchasing equipment and machinery, especially where new cutting- edge technology is available overseas, there is always the temptation to cut out the middle man and import the item. This practice comes with a word of warning.

By becoming the importer it becomes your responsibility to make sure the item is safe and meets any mandatory Australian Standards. So you need to weigh up the issues, who will you turn to if it does not function the way it should or it presents a significant safety risk.

If not buying from an Australian supplier it is often very difficult to make any warranty claims. The Australian Consumer Law may not even be enforceable against an offshore distributor.

Acting Commissioner for Consumer Protection David Hillyard said that the Western Australian legislation that establishes Consumer Protection specifically enables the agency to provide help and assistance to primary producers.

Farmers are welcome to contact Consumer Protection when it comes to matters of the Australian Consumer Law and their entitlements.

"We are here to help," he said.

"With some pieces of farm machinery costing many thousands of dollars and often key to enabling the farm to operate efficiently and profitably it is important for farmers to know their rights and to insist on appropriate remedies from suppliers.

"Just remember that if you become the importer by purchasing it direct from overseas there are often some hidden implications that may be lost in the pursuit of saving some costs in the purchase price.

"Some may see these regulations as just more bureaucratic 'red-tape' but they are there for a reason

and that is often related to safety."

I am sure that farmers are more vitally aware than most people in the community about the dangers of machinery. Commonly, as it becomes more efficient it also becomes larger, faster and heavier which can increase the potential danger for operators, workers and even visitors on the farm.

Sadly, statistics show there have been 46 farm workrelated deaths in the past ten years in WA and of course the injuries and close misses are the grim reality if equipment is not operated in a safe manner.

Increasingly reports are reflecting that it is not only the farmer or operator who is put in danger but also the rising number of children who are sustaining injuries.

Around 20 children under 15 are fatally injured on Australian farms every year and many more are hospitalised or treated by General Practitioners across rural Australia. Around 25 per cent of all child deaths were visitors to farms.

Quad bikes often misnamed as "All-Terrain-Vehicles" have been in the spotlight recently because of their poor safety record in recreational use but also their use on farms.

There have been nine deaths including three children killed using quad bikes on farms so far in 2017. There were six deaths in the first quarter, two of which were

children under the age of 10.

Acting Commissioner Hillyard urged farmers to check the Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) website if they have any doubts about a product's safety or any market recalls.

"In June, quad bike supplier Polaris recalled 12 models of quad bikes due to the presence of asbestos in component parts," he said.

"While the asbestos is a more long-term safety issue for quad bikes, it is an example of how departments like the ACCC and Consumer Protection act together when it comes to informing consumers about their safety."

KidsafeWA recently put out a very useful animated video about keeping children safe on farms and includes a section on quad bikes. Have a look and also show your children as it will only take a few minutes www.kidsafewa.com.au

Just remember, that no one expects an injury to occur, it is that momentary lapse of concentration or someone with little experience using unfamiliar equipment that can lead to a tragedy.

Don't Be The Next Scam Victim

Media Release

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) is urging all Australians to keep their personal information secure and to report any suspicious activity immediately this tax time.

Assistant Commissioner Kath Anderson warns that identifying information like tax file numbers, bank account numbers or your date of birth are the keys to your identity, and can be used by scammers to break into your life if they are compromised.

"We cannot stress this enough – your personal information must be treated like your bank PIN. If someone knew your PIN, they would have access to your hard-earned income, and it's the same with your personal information and tax return," Ms Anderson said.

"The ATO works really hard to maintain the highest levels of security, but if someone gets your personal information, they can use it to impersonate you and engage in fraudulent activity."

"More than one thousand taxpayers reported their personal information had been compromised in June, up by 26 per cent from May, so we know it is a real problem at this time of year."

Ms Anderson said all reports of identity theft are taken

seriously, with the ATO working directly with taxpayers when they suspect their identities have been stolen, misused or compromised.

"We are committed to supporting victims of tax scams and tax crimes. If you think your tax file number has been stolen or compromised, you should contact our Client Identity Support Centre on 1800 467 033 right away," Ms Anderson said.

"By alerting us we can immediately take steps to secure your identity and limit the damage done by scammers. Your information also helps us understand the constantly evolving scams and therefore better protect the community from falling victim to them.

Ms Anderson said the best defence against scammers was keeping your information safe and knowing what to do if you are targeted.

"You can't be too careful when it comes to your personal details. If you are contacted by anyone purporting to be from the ATO and you have any doubts about whether it is legitimate, immediately hang up and get in touch with the ATO to verify the call."

Ms Anderson said the ATO makes thousands of outbound calls to taxpayers each week, but there are

key differences between a call from a scammer and a legitimate call from the ATO.

"Tell-tale signs include a caller threatening you with arrest or jail, aggressive or rude behaviour, or asking you to pay money into strange bank accounts or settle tax debts with things like gift cards or iTunes cards. We would never do this," Ms Anderson said.

"If something doesn't sound right, you can always check your myGov account, ask your tax agent, or call us directly on 1800 008 540 to see if the contact is legitimate. Be especially wary if you're asked to make a payment, make sure you only use one of the methods listed on our website."

How to spot a scammer

Everyone can play their part in stopping scammers. Your reports help protect the Australian community.

The ATO will not:

- > be abusive or offensive to you
- > threaten you with immediate arrest
- > ask you to transfer money into an account with a BSB that is not 092009 or 093003
- > request payment via unusual methods such as iTunes gift cards or other prepaid cards
- > request personal security information such as your TFN or your bank details via email or SMS or social

media sites

- > ask you for money up front in order to receive a refund or other payment
- > direct you to download files from the internet

The ATO will:

- > provide you with a range of options for paying debts, which are all set out on our website at ato.gov.au/ howtopay
- > contact you by phone
- if you are in doubt about the authenticity of a call claiming to be from the ATO, you can call us on 1800 008 540 to verify
- you will generally be aware of any debt before it is due for payment, but you can check through your myGov account, your tax agent or by calling the ATO
- > send emails and SMS asking to you to take specific action such as:
- provide additional information required to process a BAS or tax return lodged
- provide additional information required regarding an application that's been made
- verify changes to an account
- > send general notifications and reminders via SMS or email
- > send promotional and informational SMS and emails




