Native Tree Revegetation Project

Local farmer embarks on native tree revegetation project in the Tarin Rock region.

After three months of extensive planning and State NRM funding for a revegetation project to establish new bush corridors and windbreaks, local Tarin Rock farmer Michael Gray had been busy prepping allocated revegetation sites on his High Valley Farm property.

Creating rip lines, managing weeds, preparing fence lines, and procuring his seedlings which were

propagated from seed which was collected by a local seed collector.

Over a period of three weeks, across six sites, 26 types of native plant species were planted with the help of local landcare volunteer Amber Bateup, American backpacker Bryce Tierney and Lake Grace resident John-Mark Cuyom.

Michael Gray led his team over fresh country and sometimes through trying weather conditions to plant

Lions Cancer Institute Visit

On Saturday 23rd of July the Lions Cancer Institute (LCI) bus rolled into town to perform free skin cancer screening to the community. Located in the carpark next to the driver reviver van, it was in prime location to get attention. The day went well, with everyone that attended getting something out of their time.

The LCI has been visiting remote and rural areas of the WA state since the early 1990's, providing full body skin screening clinics. From humble beginnings, the volunteers of LCI have screened over 80 000 patients. The free clinic this year was well received by the community with a good turnout, with over 50 people attending and 37 lesions in total identified (*all lesions are suspect only until proven by further investigation*). A big thank you to the volunteers of the LCI and the community support of the clinic, despite the cold winters day.

The Cancer Council states that about two in three Australians will be diagnosed with some form of skin cancer before the age of 70, with Australia rating as one of the countries with the highest cases of skin cancer in the world. There are three main types of skin cancer and various other skin spots that are not cancerous (further information about types of cancer can be found through Cancer Council or your local GP). If you are ever concerned about any mark or growth on your skin,

you should see a GP to get a check up. Living in remote and rural areas such as Lake Grace, having access to the LCI is a great resource and a timely reminder to get


your skin checked.

Your Honest Guide to STIs

No, I'm not talking about Subaru's motorsport division, rather an important aspect of our sexual health - Sexually Transmitted Infections (STIs). These are infections or diseases passed on during sexual contact with an infected partner.

We need to raise awareness of STIs with all sexually active blokes regardless of age and while sex ed is taught to us as teenagers, STIs also affect our aging population. Concerningly, some STIs have also been on the rise throughout the Australian population in the last couple of decades, namely chlamydia, gonorrhoea, and syphilis.

There's a lot of misinformation that you might hear going around about STIs (no you can't catch herpes from a toilet seat) but what are the facts?

Firstly, lets bust some key myths:

- "We don't need to 'tarp-up' if we are using another form of contraception". While condoms are a good form of contraception, they are also just as important to reduce the risk of an STI.
- "If I don't have symptoms, I don't need an STI check-up". While these little nasties can cause some uncomfortable symptoms, many STIs can be asymptomatic. If we are sexually active and

have multiple sexual partners, we need to be getting a check-up regularly.

- "HIV only affects men who have sex with men".
 About one quarter of Australian HIV cases are attributed to heterosexual sex. Routine STI tests (which include a check for blood borne viruses) are important for all sexually active men.
- "They only affect promiscuous blokes". STIs aren't exclusively contracted by young men with a lot of sexual partners and contracting an STI does not mean you are 'dirty'.

So, what can we do to practice safer sex and better manage our sexual wellbeing?

- Maintain communication. Like other aspects of our sexual wellbeing (prostate issues and erectile dysfunction), STIs are a topic that aren't discussed very often. Maintaining a positive relationship with our partner must include open lines of communication. This will involve a conversation around recent STI tests, condom use, and contraception methods.
- 2. **Use protection**. If used correctly, male condoms are extremely effective at protecting against most STIs. So, it's incredibly important to use a condom every time you have sex, particularly if you are not in a monogamous relationship.
- 3. **Get tested**. If left untreated the impact from STIs can be exacerbated. Gonorrhoea and chlamydia can cause blockages in the sperm tubes and affect male fertility. If you do test positive however, it isn't the end of the world as you know it. There might be a few awkward conversations but most STIs are easily cured or managed with appropriate and timely medical treatment.

This article isn't intended to scare us into abstinence. Sex should be something that is fun and enjoyable, not feared. Intimacy can be an important way to connect and show love to our partner in healthy adult relationships. We simply need to take responsibility for our sexual wellbeing to protect ourselves and our partner.

Remember, stay smart and stay safe!


Book Review: Run Rose Run by Dolly Parton and James Patterson

The story follows AnnieLee, a lady in her 20's hitch-hiking her way to Nashville, who loves to sing and write country songs. The story follows how she tries to change the course of her life and get a break into the country singing industry. All the while though, AnnieLee is running from something or someone sinister that keeps catching up with her. The Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail

The Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail is a new and significant series of sculpture collections in the NSW historic towns of Adelong, Batlow, Tumbarumba, the hamlet of Tooma and the vineyards of Courabyra Wines, Johansen Wines and Obsession Wines.

Created by the team behind Sculpture by the Sea at Bondi and Cottesloe in consultation with a wide cross section of the Snowy Valleys community, the Snowy Valleys Council and a Local Community Advisory Group, the Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail will stretch 100km from Adelong to Tooma and is funded by the Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund.

Destined to become a world class sculpture collection, the Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail offers another reason for a stunning driving holiday along the Snowy Valleys Way with the wonderful Tumbarumba vineyards, great food experiences at The Nest in Tumbarumba, Courabyra Wines, Nimbo Fork Lodge and Tumut River Brewery, the Tumbarumba to Rosewood Rail Trail (for bicycles), mountain bike trails, hiking tracks, bush walks, the Batlow cideries, fly fishing in the Tumut River and a drive over the Snowy Mountains to Thredbo and Jindabyne.

The Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail was launched with 26 sculptures by Australian and international artists from

Denmark to Japan and South Africa to the Czech Republic, with many of the artists travelling to stay in the Snowy Valleys for the opening celebrations. One of those artists is Lake Grace's Tania Spencer who travelled to the opening of the sculpture trail in May with her husband Darren.

Each of the seven locations in the Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail has its own collection tailored to the town or vineyards and winery with cellar doors. Tania's piece 'Gumnut Cap Trio' is installed at Adelong.

Details on the locations of the sculptures currently installed in each of the seven locations across 100km trail, artists bios and information about each sculpture is available on our website (https://sculpturebythesea.com/snowyvalleys) and on the free to download Sculpture by the Sea App.

As part of the Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail artists visited 14 of the 16 schools across the Snowy Valleys to provide sculpture making workshops for more than 1,200 students. In addition, three empty shops in Batlow and Tumbarumba have been transformed by artists into Shop Art Projects.

The Snowy Valleys Sculpture Trail will expand with additional sculptures to be installed later in 2022 and then in the first half of 2023, growing to over 35 sculptures thanks to a grant from the Bushfire Local Economic Recovery Fund.

It really is a wonderful way to spend a day exploring a beautiful part of New South Wales and, perhaps more importantly, making a financial contribution (through lunch and morning tea) to some small towns which, post -COVID, are doing it tough.

Alfresco at Walkers Hill Vineyard

COVID-19 has brought hardship on many industries; one particularly hard hit has been the restaurant, café and hotel businesses with many struggling to stay afloat.

The State Government has provided \$420 million worth of COVID-19 related business support, with a total of \$1.7 billion provided since the start of the pandemic.

In March of this year a \$5 million COVID-19 Activating Alfresco Rebate Program was released, with small businesses including cafés, bars, pubs, restaurants and hotels able to benefit.

Under the scheme, small businesses can apply for grants of up to \$5,000 to reimburse the costs of creating or expanding alfresco operations.

This includes the costs of things such as purchasing new furniture, lighting, weather protection, interactive play spaces and art. The alfresco rebates are a key part of the McGowan Government's COVID-19 Business Assistance Package, allowing businesses to expand their operating footprint and for more people to dine out in a COVID-safe way.

The McGowan Government is also progressing changes to local laws which will cut red tape and make it easier for cafés and restaurants to create street alfresco dining spaces.

Walkers Hill Vineyard have been recipients of the WA Government Alfresco Grant; having purchased some outdoor seating to enhance their outdoor space. Tania said the process was incredibly simple and is a welcome addition to their facilities. Although not currently the weather to be outdoors this furniture will get a good workout come the summer months, providing a spectacular view across the vines and a backdrop of farmlands.

Watch this space though as Jared is putting the tool belt back on in readiness to make more improvements to the alfresco area.

Lotterywest Contributes to WA Community

For the second consecutive year, Lotterywest has contributed a record-breaking return to the Western Australian community, with 2021-22 producing a return of \$1.03 billion in lottery prizes and grants.

The year saw a record number of jackpots and prizes with two significant wins contributing to the huge windfall for the State. In late 2021, a group of 55 women from a northern suburbs' gym won the \$80 million Powerball prize, and in February a syndicate from Kalgoorlie took home a \$63 million share of the \$120 million Powerball jackpot Division One prize pool.

The significant community return also includes \$323 million that has gone to support the WA community through statutory and direct grants - the highest ever achieved - exceeding last year's record.

There were 428 WA not-for-profit groups and local governments that benefited through Lotterywest grants during 2021-22, with 454 grants totalling \$105.4 million.

Among the 428 WA not-for-profit groups was the WA Council of Social Services who received \$3.9 million towards the WA Digital Inclusion Project, a collaboration of agencies, to build the digital skills, knowledge and capability needs of front-line workers in WA in an increasingly online world.

The State's health sector received a record \$174 million in Lotterywest statutory funding, while sports and the arts received \$21.8 million each.


In terms of lottery prizes, Western Australian players won \$708.8 million across all divisions, including 73 Division One winners, and 70 Top Prize Scratch 'n' Win winners.

Lotterywest's results have been possible following an unprecedented year of lottery sales, totalling \$1.2 billion, an increase of 14 per cent on last year's record sales

A Retirement Well Spent

State Library of Western Australia

In the early 1960s, the Foundation Director of the King's Park Botanical Garden John Beard, set to work on a project to map Western Australia's vegetation.

At the time there was practically no information of any sort in Western Australia in the botanical field, no vegetation maps. How could there be, there weren't even any accurate topographic maps or road maps!

With some assistance from the Department of Geography at the University of Western Australia, the project to map the plant cover of the whole of the State took John seventeen years.

"In fact, I think I can definitely say that it resulted in mapping a far larger slice of the Earth's surface than had ever been mapped by any one person at that scale. Two and a half million square kilometres." (John Beard, 1986)

John worked on creating a series of vegetation maps long after he retired from King's Park, and was full-time on it until he completed the project in 1981.

For John, the most stimulating experience in those early days was the feeling of exploration, of being the first in the field. In 1964 he was the first professional botanist to enter the Great Sandy Desert. In 1966 he made the first botanical north-south crossing of the Great Victoria Desert and explored the Nullarbor Plain. In 1967 John traversed the Gibson Desert.

In 1990 John wrote the book 'Plant Life of Western Australia' - essentially a photographic record of 25 years of his work in Western Australia. It serves as an important scientific record and as a source of pleasure to the reader.

In this post is a selection of images from the book, mostly taken by John himself. Some of the forty-five different people who accompanied John on various expeditions, appear as scale objects. Among them wife Pamela, King's Park staff members, a Land Rover, and John's car keys.

Take a moment to enjoy the remarkable flora and landscapes of Western Australia and appreciate John's

STATION NEWS

On our days off, in between the rain, we've all dusted off our golf clubs and got some practice in. It turns out golf isn't like riding a bike, and we all need plenty more.

Wade has had a few weeks off and has spent the time camping and helping his old man out on the farm in Geraldton.

CRIME

Someone passing through the area broke into the Lake Grace Volunteer Fire Station, causing damage to a door in the process. Scott was there at first light and conducted a forensic examination of the scene. We're still waiting for the results back from the lab but are hoping for a positive identification of the suspect. The same suspect also burgled the Dumbleyung Volunteer Fire Station, stealing \$700 they had raised in a recent charity event.

Although these sorts of offences are rare in our area it's a timely reminder to consider investing in CCTV cameras, certainly for business premises but also for residential properties. CCTV is a valuable tool for police in identifying suspects. We now have access to facial recognition and biometric software that would have been considered science fiction a number of few years ago.

TRAFFIC

Lake Grace Police conducted a traffic action recently with help from Kulin, Kondinin, and Corrigin Police. We also had vehicle compliance officers from Main Roads and the Department of Transport. The main purpose of the action was to conduct heavy vehicle compliance checks to ensure that the vehicles are compliant and roadworthy. This plays an essential role in minimising the number of people killed and seriously injured on our roads

As is common when we conduct these sort of police actions, a lot of heavy vehicles parked up outside of Lake Grace, deciding it was a good time for a break. This meant the number of heavy vehicles dropped after the first hour. We were advised the number of heavy vehicles increased drastically after police cleared the area.

This driver behaviour suggests we are onto something and we will continue to make these inspections a regular occurrence for the foreseeable future. Further evidence of this is that 30% of all inspected heavy vehicles had issues/defects requiring some form of action to be taken.

One truck driver was found to be driving on an Extraordinary licence. He was breaching almost every condition of his licence and as a result, he had to make an awkward call to his employer in Perth asking for someone to collect the vehicle and himself. The male was charged with No Authority To Drive and was summonsed to court.



Lastly, we've had reports of a vehicle doing burnouts around the streets of Newdegate. In the process the driver has caused damage to property items and fled the scene. If anyone has any information about these incidents, please let us know.

Rare Bussell's Spider Orchid Will Bloom Again

Botanic Gardens and Parks Authority

The endangered Bussell's Spider Orchid (Caladenia busselliana) has been successfully germinated at Kings Park using seed collected more than 20 years ago from a sub-population that has since disappeared in the wild.

Scientists from the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) based at Kings Park and Botanic Garden have been investigating how best to conserve Bussell's Spider Orchid.

Their germination success comes as a result of <u>The</u> Rare Bloom Project™, a partnership between WWF-Australia and Botanica by Air Wick in collaboration with the <u>Australian Seed Bank Partnership</u>. This nation-wide project aims to improve conservation outcomes for 120 native Australian plant species.

The rare bloom of Bussell's Spider Orchid is known from just 13 plants in a few small populations in the Busselton region of southwest Western Australia.

The recently germinated orchid seeds were originally collected in 1999. For the last 22 years, these tiny dust-like seeds had been conserved in cryogenic storage at Kings Park, along with the symbiotic fungi which help the orchid seeds to germinate and grow.

"Germinating orchids is a delicate process. We first need to cultivate the orchid's partnering fungi on agar

jelly, and then the seeds can be fed by the fungi to get the nutrients they need," said Kings Park Research Scientist Dr Belinda Davis.

"By germinating this older collection of seeds, we now have valuable information about how long this rare orchid and its partnering fungi can survive in storage. Since the wild parent sub-population of those seeds no longer exists, these germinated plants represent a precious



source of genetic diversity. Seedbanks are vital to the conservation of species that find themselves on the brink of extinction."

Germinating these seeds is one part of a larger journey of recovery for this rare orchid. Bussell's Spider Orchid has been the subject of one of the largest orchid translocation efforts undertaken by conservation staff at DBCA, with 560 plants grown at Kings Park now boosting wild populations.

The next stage of this research is to monitor the translocated plants and identify other potential translocation sites. Researchers will cross-pollinate plants in the four remaining populations and collect the resulting seeds to increase the genetic diversity of existing collections. Seedlings will be raised in the nursery to one day be re-introduced to the wild and planted into the display gardens at Kings Park for public education and enjoyment.

The Kings Park Science Orchid Conservation research program is also supported by the Friends of Kings Park, including a dedicated group of volunteer orchid carers. You can discover more about conserving and restoring rare orchids in the Friends of Kings Park Special Issue magazine for the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration.



Holy Cow!

These days the news is all about escooters, a century ago it was a different kind of hazard.

Shortly after 2 o'clock on 18 November 1905, a cow appeared in the city of Perth out of nowhere.

Looking 'wild and infuriated', the well-bred Shorthorn springer dashed into the Economic Store from Hay Street, moving clean through the drapery establishment to William Street. Doing no more damage than breaking a chair.

The shop assistants were in a state of wild excitement, and there would have been the element of comedy in the whole unceremonious proceedings, but for the tragic collision between the infuriated beast and a young woman riding her bicycle by the store's William Street entrance.

The unfortunate girl, Ruby Stephens, was seriously hurt and treated at a nearby chemist. Before being conveyed to hospital by the Fire Brigade ambulance.

Without stopping to inquire of the damage done, the cow bolted for sanctuary into the grounds of the Wesley Church.

Here Reverend Fry narrowly escaped injury when the maddened animal rushed at him head down and tail in the air. Round and round went the clergyman and beast. Thrice did the cow charge and luckily thrice missed her mark.

Finally the cow sought refuge in the church yard where there were several trees and a flat-topped fence. Sitting on every available inch of the fence, hundreds of excited spectators watched the 'wild west spectacle'.

Sorties were made to placate and capture the cow, but only ended up in police having to escape to safety up trees. Eventually the command to shoot came, it was Constable Patterson with a carbine, who administered the coup de grace from up a tree.

Sadly and not without public controversy, the cow's one day in town was over.

The cow it turned out belonged to a Mr Thomas Dunn, a resident of Florence Street in West Perth. It had only just arrived in Perth that morning from the country and had broken away when spooked by a train. Careering first along Melbourne and Milligan Streets and then into Hay Street Subiaco, where Mr Dunn had lost sight of his runaway.

Miss Ruby Stephens, the young woman knocked down by the infuriated cow was still in hospital a few days after the incident. However reportedly out of danger and a speedy recovery was anticipated. Inquiries as to her health were frequent at her place of employment, a tobacconist in Hay Street.

From the CEO

At the Council meeting held on 27 July Resolutions were made approving the following:

- Callope Road, Marshall Road and Dolan Road were the names selected by Council to be put
 forward for the new road on the industrial land. The public will be invited for comments or
 objections before it is submitted to the Geographic Names Committee for approval.
- Temporary bulkheads for CBH at Varley and Newdegate have been approved given another favourable harvest is predicted.
- · Conditional approval was given for additions and upgrades to the Lake Grace Men's Shed.
- Due to no nominations being received for the recent Councillor vacancy Council will seek permission from the Electoral Commissioner to run with 8 Councillors until the October 23 ordinary elections.
- · Council adopted the Bushfire Risk Management Plan for the Shire.
- Subject to approval by the Department of Water & Environmental Regulation Council
 approved the action plan to remove the surface contamination and to fence off part of
 Reserve 21558 being the land for the proposed Lions Walk Trail Site thus making it
 unavailable for development. This leaves the door open for discussions regarding an
 alternative site and plan.

Administration staff and Councillors have been busy working on the Council Budget for 2022/2023. The rise in costs across the board for materials, plant, contactors, fuel and utilities it will be interesting times ahead for all of us.

Landgate have advised of a significant increase of the Unimproved Values (UV) on farmland. These rates are based on sales of land within the shire which have risen in recent years, however, consequently an increase in rates. Shires have no say in the increases of UV rates, however we can make some adjustments to our Shire rates to help reduce the impact.

Foot-and-mouth disease (FMD) is a highly contagious viral disease and is one of the most serious diseases in livestock affecting cloven-hoofed animals, such as cattle, goats, pigs and sheep. With the recent outbreak of FMD reported in Indonesia and Bali Australian farmers are being asked to implement biosecurity measures, including limiting the number of people to enter their properties.

There will also be changes to the import conditions and permits for certain goods that are manufactured or sourced from Indonesia. Biosecurity Response Zones are currently being established at international airports within Australia. These measures will include foot mats; travelers will be required to walk over upon disembarking aircraft arriving from Indonesia. You are still required to declare on the Incoming Passenger Card, if you have spent time in a rural area, if you are carrying food or other risk goods, including footwear in your luggage.

Travelers arriving from Indonesia are being asked to think about some basic measures that will help prevent this devastating disease finding its way into Australia. There are penalties of up to \$2,664 for breaching Australia's biosecurity laws.




As an outcome of the horrific Black Saturday fires in 2009 a national project was commenced to align and simplify the fire danger ratings throughout Australia. Thirteen years and a significant amount of work later we will be nationally adopting the Australia Fire Danger Rating System as of 1 September this year.

A key change is the simplification of the system down to 4 ratings and a significant improvement in the science that power the calculations behind the scenes.

Locally you will interact with the changes through burning permits now being tied to the "High" rating, where previously it was "Very High" and the process to calculate the trigger for Harvest and Vehicle Movement Bans has also been updated which will take some familiarisation from our FCOs.

The new Australian Fire Danger Ratings (AFDRS) levels are:

Native Tree Revegetation Project (cont.)

over 12,000 saplings. The species selection process was specifically curated to enhance biodiversity and represent the natural habitat of the Tarin Rock region.

Plants were paired with their respective soil types to ensure a better seedling survival rate. The species that were chosen to be planted, included various eucalypt mallees and mallets (*E.incrassata, E.flocktoniae*, E.dorienii, E.gardneri), york gum (*E.loxaphleba loxophleba*), and red morrell (*E.longicornis*), as well as multiple types of melaleuca, acacia and allocasuarina.

This is a three-year project resulting in 30km of fencing, 15 ha of revegetation and is scheduled to run through until the year 2024.




