Community Reaps Grant Funding From Community Crop

In 2014 the community crop group purchased a 120ha block of land south east of Lake Grace off Willcocks road. Previous to this the community crop group was partly cropping the old Newdegate Research Station farm but the distance from Lake Grace meant this location was too far away to be feasible.

With a deposit being funded from the previous cropping group the land was purchased with loan from the Lake Grace shire and paid back over the last 6 years. Money left over from the previous cropping was also used to put our first crop in in 2014. In 2019 the community crop paid the last of the instalments for the loan however with finding an extra 50ha of lease land and with 2020 not being the finest season in the Lake Grace area we have not been able to start the community grants scheme until now.

The community crop group falls under the umbrella of the Lake Grace Development Association. An association which allows not for profit groups to operate without the extra complication of having to be incorporated, therefore minimizing the overall startup costs and time. The Development association currently has 18 similar groups under its banner.

The management of the cropping group has been from the chair Royce Taylor for the last seven years, with his trusty second in charge organiser Johnno O'Neill and main agronomist/operations manager Grant O'Neill.

As we all know from farming in Lake Grace, we do have sluggish years, yet with the level of support and consistent donations of time and labour from our community we have been relatively shielded from the down sides of farming. All the machinery used to seed, harvest, truck, spray and spread have been donated. Many of the inputs of chemical, seed and fertiliser are subsidised with much of these costs falling back onto individual farms and businesses. These donations of machinery and inputs have been going on every year for the last seven years of this cropping program .Without any hesitation or acknowledgement, from this generosity alone we have got to where we are now.

The community crop community grants are open... This year the total funding pool available is \$20,000 and the amount available each year will be dependent on the season. The grant applications form will be available from either the Lake Grace CRC or online at https://www.lakegrace.wa.gov.au/news/community-crop-community-grants-program/24

The grant applications can be accessed every 4 months by a committee of 6 made up from the Development Association, Community Cropping group and two more community members. They will be assessing all grants, and monies will be distributed to applications which best fit the community. This is just the first round, but the grant fund can be fully distributed in any round until the next crop comes in.

The grants are open for any community based project




from small (under \$1,000) to large (\$5,000 plus). Even if you have a project coming up within the next few years but are not ready yet, a small message of expectations will also be appreciated to help the community crop grants committee plan for the future.

I can't emphasise enough that this grant fund is only possible due to the donations of time, machinery and money made to the community crop from the **Community of Lake Grace**.

A Field Guide to Flora

Despite the flooded roads and paddocks, the shearing shed at Cambinata Yabbies was ready to receive expectant people from as far away as Perth, Yallingup and Mundaring. The doors opened at 9.30am and Jolanda had her book ready for signing and buying. Mary and Michael Nenke had provided heaters to warm up the room, and coffee and tea. Mary had been baking shortbread cookies and delicious scones which were served with mulberry jam and fresh whipped cream.

Then it was time for the official launch. Mary welcomed everybody and Anne Rick told a bit about Jolanda's background and her meticulous work on getting this book together. Jolanda then gave an overview of the work she has undertaken over the last three and a half years which has culminated in the book, documenting 624 flora species, of which 247 have not previously been recorded for the reserves and 30 are weeds. Jolanda indicated that of the 32 species of conservation concern found on the reserves, 12 were new records for the reserves. She also mentioned that 18 plant species are considered an extension of their previously known range and showed some examples of this.

The book provides information about 25 Eucalyptus species, 16 orchid species and also includes a monthly flowering calendar as well as species lists and photos for fauna, fungi and lichens observed during her fieldwork. She mentioned that there will still be flora (and fauna) out on the reserves that are not covered in the book, but it is a good effort and was an enjoyable journey. She thanked her supporters before handing over to Peter Rundle, MLA.

Peter thanked Mary and Michael for always promoting regional development and Jolanda for producing the book, which will be an asset for the region and will draw more tourists to the area.

The book is available from the Lake Grace Visitor Centre, Dumbleyung CRC, Cambinata Yabbies and the Wildflower Society of Western Australia. It retails for \$40.

After the launch, some 20 people went out for a guided tour in the reserve. Although it was cold, we were very lucky that it wasn't raining. We gathered on Hills Road and walked along the central track. Due to the rain, some flowers were out early and Jolanda used the book to show the species. Marissah Kruger from the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions explained why some species are in decline and what the department's fire regime is doing to try bring them back. After a pleasant hour browsing through the reserve, we said goodbye and went on our way home.

Islands of Town Bush Need Protection

Over the last century, the local countryside has been changed dramatically due to large-scale land clearing --for farms, towns, houses and roads. Lake Grace townsite, established in 1911, still retains patches of bushland however, and these are the focus of a conservation project with community volunteers.

Groups of trees scattered around Lake Grace townsite may go unnoticed yet are important as survivors of what the country was like before clearing and therefore deserve protection. A collection of Red Morrels near the horse-yards and the school are significant; Red Morrel Woodlands of the Wheatbelt are now critically endangered (Priority 1) and protected under law. The quandongs near the Sportsman's Club and the Kondinin Blackbutts in the Child Care Centre yard and town centre are also important reminders of the natural history of the area.

The west end of town was home to a salmon gum woodland that stretched from Dewar Street to the south side of Stubbs Street. The last of these trees remain in the new industrial area (some magnificent specimens), near Farmers Centre and as single trees in the yards of SBM Tyres and Elders. These iconic trees are mentioned by early settlers in town histories and some can be seen in early photographs of the town, probably making them more than 100 years old.

Islands of Town Bush Need Protection (cont.)

More plant species, possibly any rare or endangered, will come to light when local botanist Anne Rick prepares a flora survey of the seven Bushcare project sites. Mrs Rick's report will also provide a species list for replanting each site, scheduled for early next winter.


Initial reviews of each site have been completed with interesting results of a range of flora. These reviews also record the health and condition of each remnant. Critically, the obvious factor that threatens the bushland and the resident fauna is the past and continuing damaging behaviour of people. That is, dumping rubbish and garden waste, cutting firewood and driving on and cutting down vegetation.

These impacts can be seen in the diagram below showing the .35 ha bushland at the west end of Clarke Avenue. These same issues are common at the other project sites.

Despite these impacts, these islands of bush are home to old and new eucalypts, acacias, and other flora, as well as a diversity of birds, reptiles and other fauna. Local people can help improve and save these remnants by joining busy bees to remove rubbish and garden waste before replanting next year. The first busy bee will take place this weekend.

Lake Grace Bushcare Project is led by Lake Grace Community Resource Centre and Lake Grace Land Conservation District Committee.



provided directly to police, or anonymously via crime stoppers. We can't just go entering someone's house because we don't like them or we 'think' they are drug dealers, without that reasonable information. This usually comes from the people in the know....that's YOU!!

If you see or hear of any suspicious activity and you do not want to report it directly to Police, then there is an alternative; You can call CRIME STOPPERS on 1800 333 000, Crime Stoppers is an independent body that allows a person to report a crime anonymously, the report is then vetted before it is sent to Police, the report source is never revealed to us.

As a result of recent anonymous crime stoppers information, Lake Grace Police recently conducted a Misuse of Drugs Search Warrant at a local private residence. This resulted in prohibited drugs being seized, and a person being charged for possession of a prohibited plant.

When a search warrant is granted to Police it provides us with certain powers when entering someone's home, this includes the right for Police to enter a person's home even if they are not present and police can enter by force if necessary.

LOCAL NEWS

The recent rain appears to have filled most of the dams up to overflowing which is good news for all of those concerned, although we are hearing that sometimes having too much of a good thing is not always ideal as some have been struggling to get out into the paddocks for spraying.

The volume of rainfall and subsequent run off from the surrounding paddocks did cause some disruption on the local roads, as we found out ourselves when we tried to get to Narrogin in our traffic car. We came across a large amount of water on the road, and we were unsure of the depth, and flow of the water. We decided to make a U turn and change our route.

These conditions often lead people to take unnecessary risks, as they are running late, just want to get home, or

for some other reason, they think that their car turns in to a boat.

This week we had the unpleasant task of having to assist our colleagues in Wagin. We assisted in the search for a missing car driver who was one of those who took an unnecessary risk, and sadly lost his life. Although we can't comment too much about the incident as a sign of respect for the family, it is a timely reminder to always drive to the conditions presented to you, the vehicle you are driving, and your experience as a driver. If the road ahead of you appears dangerous, or you are not sure, or if there is a sign up saying 'Road Closed', please be sensible and turn around otherwise you could find yourself in a situation that can very quickly escalate into something out of your control.

Some local roads are still affected, so please be vigilant out there, the MAIN ROADS website has some useful information regarding road closures.

TRAFFIC

It has been a fairly steady period of road policing with some drivers obviously in a hurry, however they were not so keen after we had spoken to them. We are happy to say as usual most were not locals, so well done everyone.

Last week we had a few reports coming in for damaged cars as a result of loose gravel the Lake Grace-Pingrup Road. Unfortunately, as police, we are not able to assist with any damage reports from this. If you have been affected by this and have sustained damage, our suggestion would be to contact the main roads department to advise them, and see how they can assist you.

Action Needed to Ensure Equal Access to Education

Equity in education in WA is not a privilege. It is a right every student needs and deserves. Unfortunately, access to that right is a long way from ideal.

Families across WA are faced with a raft of issues every day at their local schools. From substandard facilities to a lack of maintenance, all are problems no student should have to put up with.

There is no doubt the COVID-19 pandemic has proved challenging for the Education Department, but it should not be a scapegoat for subpar education and resources. Principals and teachers stepped up to the plate to deal with the barriers they faced, ensuring students' learning and safety were the highest priority.

Lockdowns meant online learning became the norm, but it also proved to be the main barrier for regional, and even some metropolitan, students as a lack of access to reliable data, connectivity and network speed compromised their education.

What is the point of online learning if students can't access it?

The lack of relief teachers has also put extra strain on full-time staff, given an increased workload as they are requisitioned for internal relief.

Stressed teachers equate to a stressed classroom and

can lead to a compromised duty of care and safety for both staff and students through no fault of their own.

I have absolutely no doubt teachers are doing the best they can and will always look after their students first and foremost but, with 25 per cent of graduate teachers leaving the sector within five years, the Government must address what is shaping up to be an impending crisis

One of the schools in my electorate of Roe has seen its fifth principal appointed in five years. A lack of continuity in leadership weakens the school and, by default, the community.

The recruitment of a principal shouldn't just be about filling a role. The needs of the community must be considered, and priority given to finding the best person for the position. The current recruitment processes are outdated and unsuited. I call on the McGowan Government to conduct a review into the process quickly.

Even if the right person is selected for the position, housing them in our towns creates an even bigger issue.

Rents are skyrocketing, house prices are at record highs and public housing is in such a deplorable state, that in some instances, the applicant for an education





position will refuse an offer purely due to the lack of suitable accommodation.

I have heard stories of principals and teachers waiting a full term or more to get the keys to their house. Financial benefits for teachers should be addressed by this Government. The \$1000 public sector salary freeze imposed by the Government in its last term is looking shaky as expected. Freezing wages for four years not only puts a strain on the recruitment of excellence, but it also puts immense pressure on budget projections as the Government tries to make up for the time lost in normal wage increase cycles. Many teachers will become tired of the rhetoric and austerity and want some reward for the work they do, justifiably so.

Our orange school buses are the lifeline for our families in accessing education in our State. People ring my office every week regarding an issue with a bus service. School bus services regulations are outdated and inflexible.

Some families have left communities purely because they cannot access a bus to their local school. When families leave, communities flounder. I know of mothers who had to give up work because they must get their children to numerous bus stops many kilometres away at different times. I am very pleased to see the transport minister has agreed to a review of school bus services,

and I look forward to working with her on this.

Mental health in our youth must also be a priority. Intervention can save and change lives and schools need the support of qualified professionals to work with vulnerable students and families. The latest results from the DETECT report said 40 per cent of secondary school students were experiencing anxiety three times higher than the last time a similar study was conducted, in 2014.

On a more positive note, I am pleased to see our colleges of agriculture have very high rates of enrolments and the colleges are attracting girls as well as boys.

We cannot underestimate the importance of quality teachers and leaders in our schools.

Considering the \$5 billion surplus predicted, this is an opportunity for the State Government to better support teachers and staff, replace outdated facilities and infrastructure of many schools and improve accessibility to bus services and networks to help create better outcomes for our youth. Their fundamental right to equity in education should be top of mind.


Robotham is the master of the sinister. It's not just the main character who is not sure of the direction that the plot is heading in but also the reader. Philomena McCarthy may be a new character that Robotham is introducing to his readers, or perhaps she's a stand-alone.

Philomena McCarthy has defied the odds to become a promising young officer with the Metropolitan Police despite being the daughter of a notorious London gangster. Called to the scene of a domestic assault, she rescues a bloodied young woman, Tempe Brown, the mistress of a decorated detective. The incident is hushed up, but Phil has unwittingly made a dangerous enemy who has powerful friends.

Determined to protect each other, the two women strike up a tentative friendship. Tempe is thoughtful and sweet and makes herself indispensable to Phil, but sinister things keep happening and something isn't quite right about the stories Tempe tells.

When a journalist with links to both Phil's father and to the detective is found floating in the Thames, Phil doesn't know where to turn, who to blame or who she can trust.

After what has seemed like months of rain, it has been great to see some sunshine at last over the past week or so. With the rain stopping for a while we will be inspecting all roads for any damage caused by local flooding and where possible will be seeking support from Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFWA) which may be available for local governments potentially impacted by the recent severe weather events.

When we received the funding to clean out the Lake Biddy dams and tidy up the catchment there was no way that we thought that it would fill up this year, we thought it would take at least a year or two. Judge for yourselves at the result of some impeccable timing by all those involved .



At the Ordinary Council Meeting of Wednesday 28 July 2021, resolutions were made for the following;

- 1. AA Dam 190 James Dam—Council supported the proposed entry into the State Register of Heritage Places provided that that the registration will have no restrictions on the continued negotiations with the neighbouring land owners for the use of the water
- 2. The Lake Grace Development Association Inc. sought in-principle support to install a recycled corrugated iron fence along the railway reserve north of Stubbs Street from behind "the Shed" down to Farmers Centre. Council supported the proposal subject to approval by ARC Infrastructure and the Public Transport Authority as well as the LGDA providing full details of project.
- 3. The Public Sector Commissioner now requires all public sector agencies, (the Shire of Lake Grace is bound by some of the same rules) employees and elected members to undergo mandatory Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultural awareness training. The training resource was developed by the

Aboriginal Advisory Council of WA which includes historical and contemporary information with sections on family, education, country and work.

- 4. The Ordinary Council Meeting scheduled for Wednesday 22 September 2021 has now been changed to Wednesday 29 September 2021 because of the WALGA Convention. Confirmation of this meeting date will be published on the website and Facebook as well as the coming Community News.
- 5. Council has endorsed the new Code of Conduct for Employees which complies with the revised Local Government Act 1995. The Code of Conduct is now published on the website.
- 6. Council endorsed the recently completed Regulation 17 Audit review which examines the effectiveness of the Shire's systems and procedures pursuant to Regulation 17 of the Local Government (Audit) Regulations.
- 7. The 2021/2022 Shire of Lake Grace budget was adopted pursuant to Local Government Act 1995. Copy of the budget is available at the Reception and is also published on the website.
- 8. Council endorsed the review of the Shire of Lake Grace Disability Access and Inclusion Plan (DAIP) Progress Report as presented.

The response to the workforce survey has been overwhelming with some good suggestions coming in.

If you have not done so yet, there is still some time to return the survey responses.

WorkSafe has issued a warning to licensing assessors and industry in general after a Perth assessor had most High Risk Work Licence assessor classes cancelled for not properly assessing license applicants.

The assessor was registered to assess 18 classes of high-risk work, but 17 of these were cancelled after a WorkSafe investigation found the assessor was not properly assessing workers.

The classes of work included dogging and rigging, scaffolding, cranes, hoists, forklifts and elevating work platforms. The assessor can now only assess for a tower crane licence, but has not completed any assessments in this class since the other classes were cancelled.

More than 40 licence holders have been contacted and are now required to be reassessed as they may not have demonstrated that they can do the work in a safe and proper manner.

WorkSafe WA Commissioner Darren Kavanagh today warned assessors that it was likely they would be found out if they did not conduct assessments properly.

"This latest case has led me to warn other assessors that WorkSafe has increased compliance activities in the licensing area, and it is even more likely they will be

caught if they're not meeting licensing conditions," Mr Kavanagh said.

"The potential repercussions of inadequate assessments are serious – from the loss of the assessor's livelihood to a significant number of workers who have been granted licences when they have not demonstrated that they can safely do the work, which can endanger lives.

"We are working with other agencies – namely the Training Accreditation Council (TAC) in WA and Australian Skills Quality Authority (ASQA) nationally – to ensure that workers receive appropriate training for High Risk Work Licences.

"This case should also serve as a reminder that employers all have a duty of care under workplace safety legislation to provide workers with site-specific and machinery-specific training for each and every job."

New Resources on Employment Rights in WA

Wageline at the Department of Mines, Industry Regulation and Safety is reaching out to community organisations to highlight our new resources and offer to help your clients and members understand employment rights and obligations in Western Australia.

Wageline has recently launched a new education campaign, the *Employment Rights in WA Initiative*, to raise awareness of employment rights and obligations and the pathways available for employees wishing to resolve an underpayment issue. The launch of the campaign follows the findings of the Inquiry into Wage Theft in Western Australia that community education was essential to combatting wage theft in WA.

Many people in the WA community do not know where to start with finding information on employment, and in particular do not understand that two systems of employment law operate in WA (the state system and the national fair work system) and that these systems have different employment rights and obligations.

Information about our Employment Rights in WA campaign is available on the Wageline website and will guide you to the information for employees on our Employee central information hub, and for employers on the WA employers information hub. These pages will guide employers and employees to find the right information and help for the industrial relations system

that covers their business or the work they do. For employees, information is provided on how to resolve an issue of underpayment of wages or leave and how to report wage theft anonymously.

Information on how to report wage theft is available on the Wage theft website in English, Arabic, Simplified Chinese, Traditional Chinese, Italian, Korean and Vietnamese.

Wageline also has a series of information flyers on these topics available in pdf on the website or as a hardcopy on request.

These new resources complement the comprehensive information on the Wageline website for state system employers and employees on WA awards, minimum rates of pay, leave entitlements, and rights and obligations when employment ends.

The long service leave content on the website applies to most private sector employers and employees in WA, including national system employers.

Wageline's community education team can also provide specific information for your staff, clients or members on request about how they can find or help people find the right information on employment rights and obligations, as well as specific information on rights and obligations under **state** employment laws. Because of the soggy conditions vehicles can't move around the course which has meant maintenance such as mowing has come to a standstill.


Once the course dries out a little the golfing calendar will resume and the final round of the championship will be played out.













Some Interesting Olympic Facts



The last two weeks have provided us with some very good armchair sport and for once we were all going for the same team. Australia! At the Tokyo 2020 Olympics, medals contained parts of old electronics, in an effort to make the Games more sustainable. Japanese citizens are donating these materials by recycling their old devices – cool! Here's some interesting anecdotes from previous Olympics.

- As per National Geographic, the original Olympics took place in 776 BC. They began as part of an Ancient Greek festival, which celebrated Zeus, the Greek God of sky and weather. The Ancient Games featured wrestling, boxing, long jump, javelin, discus, and chariot racing, and lasted for up to six months. Colobus, a cook from the city of Elis, was the first Olympic champion.
- It would take another 1,500 years before the modern Olympic Games would be celebrated. In 1896 Baron Pierre de Coubertin revived the Olympics as he admired the focus on physical fitness. Each year to commemorate the origin of the games, a torch is lit in Olympia and carried all the way to the city that will host the games

that year. The first modern Olympic Games were held in Athens in the summer of 1896. In 1894 Pierre de Coubertin had presented his ideas for an international sports competition to promote international understanding. He founded the International Olympic Committee in 1894. The first multi-sports event was then called Games of the Olympiad and was the biggest international event at that time!

- Teams from 11 European countries originally joined those of Australia, Chile, and the USA at the first host city, Athens. Now, more than 200 countries compete in the Olympics each year!
- Gold, silver and bronze medals were not awarded until 1904. During ancient Olympics, the winners were awarded with an olive wreath.
- Olympic gold medals were only made of solid gold until the 1912 Olympics. Today, gold medals are made out of silver and are goldplated with about 6g of gold while silver medals are made out of pure silver and bronze medals are mainly made out of copper

- During the 1936 Berlin Games, two Japanese pole-vaulters were tied for second place. Instead of competing for the event again, they cut the silver and bronze medals in half and fused the two different halves together. This was done so that each of them had a half-silver and halfbronze medal.
- There were three cancellations of the Summer Olympic Games due to the world wars. The 1916 Summer Olympics were cancelled for World War I, while the 1940 and 1944 Olympic Games were cancelled during World War II.
- Solo Synchronized Swimming (1992). Yes, you read that right. The 1992 Olympic games saw Solo Synchronized Swimming as an actual registered event. Nobody seemed to tell the inventor of this that you need two people to be in sync. Apparently the idea was that the swimmer was in sync with the music. Sorry, but solo synchronized swimming would have to be the weirdest Olympic event of all time.
- Superstitious sports fans breathe a sigh of relief when they hear Olympics facts like this one. The 2008 Beijing Olympics specifically opened during the auspicious hour of 8:00 PM on August 8,

- 2008. Part of Chinese culture links the number 8 to prosperity and confidence. Because of this, the host country began the beautiful opening ceremony with a bit of luck in mind.
- The five Olympic rings represent the five major regions of the world, Africa, the Americas, Asia, Europe and Oceana, and every national flag in the world includes one of the five colors, which are (from left to right) blue, yellow, black, green, and red.
- No Olympic Village was built in 1948 due to a lack of money; instead, the government accommodated the 4,100 or so athletes and over 1,000 officials at RAF stations, schools, colleges and nurses' homes
- An estimated 260,000 loaves of bread will be eaten by athletes in the Olympic Village.
- Australia placed 6th on the Olympic Tally for Tokyo 2020 bringing home: 17 Gold, 7 Silver and 22 Bronze. A total of 46 medals all up! Fantastic job to all our athletes who have performed at the Tokyo 2020 Olympics!! Now it's time to watch the Paralympics.
