With millions of children around the world struggling daily with war, poverty, famine and disease there is little opportunity for them to feel happiness. Through a simple gift-filled shoe box, you can bring joy to a child in need.

In 2013 Lake Grace District High School took part in this wonderful project and it then extended to our town community. Each student or family was asked to fill a shoe box with six items and return them to school. 112 boxes were sent to Cambodia.

This year we are undertaking this worthy cause again and asking the community to become involved. The idea is to fill a shoe box which you can collect from the Chaplain Office at the Lake Grace District High School and fill it with six items (SEE BELOW).

The six items that each box requires are as follows.

- Something to love (teddy bear, soft toy)
- Something for school (pencils, paper)
- Something to wear (T-shirt, shorts, cap)
- Something special (bangles, stickers, carry bag)
- Something to play with (ball, skipping rope, Frisbee, finger puppet)
- Something for personal hygiene (toothbrush, soap, comb)

The children of Lake Grace are very lucky in that the very same items that will be used to fill these boxes are simply a part of their lives. Genni feels that it is important for these children to realise that something small done by them can have such a positive impact on a child in need.

What Difference Does the CRC Make to Lake Grace?

This is the question that will be asked within our community as Professor John Phillimore from Curtin University leads a highly qualified and experienced team to undertake a comprehensive evaluation of the Community Resource Network (CRN) over the next six months.

The comprehensive evaluation will focus on engaging with CRCs as well as key stakeholders and community level users of CRC services. As part of the evaluation, the Curtin team will visit around 40 communities with CRCs to investigate the effectiveness and impact of the program. Additionally, they will conduct 2500 phone interviews with community members across the state to ascertain the value and impact of the CRN. Curtin will report their findings back to the Department of Regional Development (DRD) outlining the current effectiveness and impact of the CRN, as well as making recommendations on the future procurement of services from the CRN.

There have been significant changes to the CRN in the past 12 months in response to recommendations by the WA Regional Development Trust's (WARDT) Review of CRCs. Changes have primarily included a shift in DRD funding arrangements from grants to service agreements, along with operational and governance support previously provided by DRD being taken over by Linkwest.

DRD is keen to ensure that the CRN continues to strengthen and develop in capacity and value, hence the commissioning of an evaluation of the effectiveness and impact of the CRN program and changes that have been implemented.

This is an exciting opportunity for DRD and the CRN to obtain feedback regarding their services and gain a stronger understanding of what services are most valued by the Western Australian public and key stakeholders. This project will also provide CRCs with the opportunity to influence the direction of any future procurement of services. The team from Curtin will be beginning to make contact with CRCs and their communities as of now.

At the CRC we are very interested in hearing from the community about what difference the CRC makes to your life and also what you would miss out on if we weren't here. Having been involved in the CRC in a number of roles over the last 20 years I'm quite aware of what we do, but I'm also acutely aware that many within the community don't even know we exist; this apathy has the potential to unravel the future of the CRC.

Some believe the Lakes Link News is produced by the Shire even though it clearly states on the cover 'Produced at the Lake Grace Community Resource

Centre'; others don't realise we print photos or that our printing costs are competitive (and sometimes cheaper) than large chain stores in the city. I've even had one customer on her first trip through the doors say 'I didn't know you existed'. As a community organisation how do we combat that?

However on a positive note the bulk of the community use our facilities on a regular or occasional basis; I believe it is those people and our local businesses that are the best tools in getting the word out there and pointing potential clients in our direction.

With everyone leading such busy lives most don't absorb what is available within their community as it can seem like superfluous information; it is only when we can provide them with a solution to their predicament that they discover the other facilities that we have available.

If you get a phone call from the Curtin team, or perhaps a face to face interview then dig deep and think about what the CRC offers the community. You may be the key to our continued success.



Brass Monkey Weather

With the mean minimum temperature for August sitting at 5.5°C it seems that 2015 isn't going to upset the law of averages for weather in Lake Grace. The first 10 days of August in Lake Grace haven't yet seen a minimum get into double figures and the last weekend was a definite chance to stay indoors.

However sport is the linchpin for all country towns and nobody wants to let the team down. Lake Grace teams playing in the Ongerup Association were playing a home game with a minimum/maximum temperature fluctuation of six degrees; ranging from 7.3°C to 13.4°C; they also had the benefit of 3.2mm of rain falling on them and a bracing WSW 52 kmh wind just for the icing on the cake. It was slightly warmer (but just as wet) in Narembeen for the ladies who play hockey in the Roe Districts Association; however this was negated by them enjoying their afternoon tea on the verandah of Narembeen's new pavilion.

It was little wonder that WA's Weather Bureau were predicting snow on the Stirlings for Saturday night. Chilly conditions Sunday morning had golfers who were playing there championship rounds wondering if snow was possible in Lake Grace. Thankfully the day had warmed significantly by the 8:30am start to a balmy 4° C, up from the minimum of 1.4°C that had kept the rest

of the local population in bed.

Although there's a prediction of sunshine for next weekend, the bracing minimum temperatures that we're suffering through at the moment aren't likely to increase in the near future.

Rare Dusting of Snow at Bluff Knoll

A rare dusting of snow has fallen over Bluff Knoll in the Stirling Range, in Western Australia's Great Southern, entertaining some campers and others who made the trek.

Temperatures plummeted across the state's south over Saturday night, with Pingelly in the Wheatbelt recording the lowest at -2 degrees Celsius.

The last time it snowed in WA was in August 2013, also at Bluff Knoll.

More than 100 people climbed the trail at Bluff Knoll to see the snow, with some sleeping overnight in anticipation and others trekking up in the early hours of the morning.

The Bureau of Meteorology (BoM) had predicted snow was possible over the ranges, saying a front passing over the state's south was bringing a trail of cold air behind it

It said snow typically falls in WA about once per year, most commonly in the Stirling and Porongorup Ranges.

"I don't think that you're going to be able to go out there

and build a [big] snowman or ski or anything like that," BoM forecaster Neil Bennett said.

"There are going to be flurries in the showers, a little bit of snow. It may settle for a short period of time but there's not going to be a huge amount in it.

"If you do get down there, you've got to anticipate temperatures could be about as low as two degrees ... and actually in the wind it could feel like minus two so you'd have to rug up if you're going down there."

Another cold front was due to bring some moderate rainfall to the South West and Lower West districts on Monday, forecasters said.

Bluff Knoll, 90 kilometres north of Albany, is the third highest peak in Western Australia.

The BoM said while snow in WA most often occurred over the state's far south, there had been reports of it falling as far north as Wongan Hills (1923), Bencubbin (1956) and Coolgardie (1966).

Scammers continue to invade our lives, through the phone and via the internet and we all have to be vigilant not just for our own financial security but also for those around us.

It is always a shock to discover that someone has been conned, our first thought is 'surely they realised it was a scam'. It doesn't matter how smart people are, the scammers are well aware of how to hone in on an individuals vulnerabilities.

Even though the scammers would get hung up on quite regularly, there is always someone that has been having problems with their computer. The key here is that they target the fact that most homes have a computer and most people have no idea what they are doing and are afraid of clicking on the wrong thing. The fact that someone has come to their aid may seem like manna from heaven!

The key for everyone to remember is that no one ringing your house really has any idea if your computer is running properly or not.

Another one doing the rounds is the tax return; you may not have lodged one recently for one reason or another but who doesn't like the prospect of receiving a couple of thousand dollars. The amount is never TOO much but is always enough to picture a much deserved holiday or perhaps something new for around the house. The key here is that most people could do with a few more dollars and the fact that you have to hand over a couple hundred to facilitate your 'tax return' seems a small price to pay.

July was a busy month for scammers in Australia with the ACCC recording 10,607 reports. Of those reports 9.1% recorded financial losses totalling \$9,239,804. This sum of money is an indication as to why scammers keep doing what they do.

Interestingly enough gender doesn't play a huge role in getting scammed or approached) and although the over 65 age group is the largest age group featured; the numbers reported start from the 25-34 age group and rise at quite equal increments until getting to the over 65's.

The delivery of the scam is predominantly delivered via phone or email; internet, mail and social media are also a delivery method as well as in person and via texting and other mobile applications.





We will be continuing with our beanies this Friday (and then moving on to a more complex basket pattern the



could acclimatise to everything, which I did very quickly. My Head Of Department at Eastern Goldfields managed to convince me to play for an A grade hockey team....all the time I was telling her I hadn't played in years and she said it didn't matter. So there I was standing on a hockey field attempting to play a sport I haven't played since the play on rule came in.

Then my first day at Eastern Goldfields arrived. Now this school only caters for Year 11 and 12 students and they only go to school four days a week. On Wednesdays they have TAFE studies and workplace learning opportunities and also extra study sessions and seminars on life skills. The school is different from what I'm used to. One of the things I found myself getting used to was the fact the school has no sirens, you have to keep an eye on the time and move the students on to their next class when the lesson is over.

A few things that I've learnt from teaching here, especially as a Phys Ed teacher, is that it can be extremely difficult but at the same time such a worthwhile experience. Some of the students backgrounds are quite challenging but they do still attend school and put in as much effort at they can, which is amazing. This particular school (since it wasn't designed to actually be a school) is missing a few key elements that sport teachers need, mainly an oval, a gym and some essential sports equipment. I have to travel with the kids every sport lesson, which means getting on a bus which we've hired and making the trip to the local basketball stadium or oval. The equipment can also be tricky. Last week I had to teach 26 students how to play AFL and I only had five footballs.

Kalgoorlie is a fantastic place to live, the people are great and the entire atmosphere is inviting. The golf course is gorgeous (I had to add that in there!) and the locals are so willing to help each other out which is what I missed about country towns when I was living in Perth. I'm still trying to get used to the fulltime work and the long hours (I turn up to school at 7 and don't leave till 5) and the extra amount of stuff you have to organise to make your lessons work but in the end this experience so far has been well worth it.



Future of Sale Yards

Suzanne Reeves

Lake Grace Saleyards face an uncertain future due to the decline of the sheep industry. With Western Australian sheep numbers peaking at 38.5 million in 1990, it was little wonder that the WA Livestock Salesman's Association did not renew their lease in 2009 when sheep numbers had declined to 15.5 million. This underutilisation of the yards led the Shire council to hold a public meeting in June to discuss the future of the site. The 2.43 ha site is located within a 500m buffer zone of CBH and is therefore limited in how it can be developed.

First used in 1983 the yards had a holding capacity of 8,000 sheep, 3 loading ramps and a male and female toilet block and

separate office. At the time they were built the sheep industry was riding high and the state of the art facilities were an indication of this. The last time a sale was held at the Lake Grace yards was in the latter half of 2005.

Participants at the public meeting recognised that there may be circumstances where the current site of the saleyards land could be put to a better use and that would perhaps result in its sale by the Shire. However they also recognised a site would still be needed to cater for emergency holding point of stock (truck breakdowns or disease outbreak), a stock consolidation facility or to meet biosecurity requirements for machinery and vehicle wash down. This site would not need to be as large as the current one.

Discussion was taken to the July council meeting where a motion was put forward to authorise the CEO to undertake research for a future alternate location for

The idea of Living Communities was presented to the communities of Lake Grace, Lake King, Newdegate and Varley.




Waterwise Garden

The Waterwise garden at the front of the Library / CRC building is putting on a fine display at the moment with a good array of the plants currently flowering. Conditions have been ideal for the plants and the Beyond Gardens team who designed and planted the garden (with the help of volunteers and shire staff) are thrilled with how the garden is progressing with Garry Heady from the Beyond Gardens amazed at how many of the 55 varieties have flourished in their new home.

The garden was planted in May of 2011 with the costs covered by the Water Corporation and the Shire of Lake Grace. Lake Grace District High School cover the costs of maintenance with the school gardener, Linda Vlasich being helped out on occasion by garden fairies who turn up and do some weeding.

We have featured some of the plants currently flowering for those who have a space in their garden and are looking at a native plant to fill that gap.



Banksia Media

The southern plains banksia (Banksia media), also known as golden stalk banksia, is a species of shrub in the plant genus Banksia. It occurs on the south coast of Western Australia between Albany and Israelite Bay, where it is a common plant. A many-branched bush with wedgeshaped serrated leaves and large golden-yellow flower spikes, known as inflorescences, it grows up to 10 metres (30 ft) high. Banksia media plants are killed by bushfire, and regenerate from seed. The flowers attract nectar- and insect-feeding birds, particularly honeyeaters, and a variety of insects. In cultivation, Banksia media grows

is more resilient than most Western Australian banksias when cultivated in areas with humid summers. Probably not ideal for that little spot in the garden. Ed.



Grevillea pinaster

Grevillea pinaster is a shrub in the family Proteaceae. It is endemic to southwestern Western Australia.

It grows to between 0.5 and 3 metres in height and has a peak flowering period between May and September (late autumn to early spring) in its native range. The flowers are pink to red with yellowish- tipped styles. The long and narrow leaves are 20 to 55 mm long and 1 to 2 mm wide. Plants labelled as Grevillea stenomera in plant nurseries are often forms or hybrids of this species



Grevillea 'Winpara Gold'

A fast growing native with masses of golden spike flower clusters for most of the year. Ideal for a small hedge or screen (plant 2.5m apart for a hedge). It is frost hardy and requires little water once established. It can grow in full sun to part shade position. Bird attracting.



Grevillea lanigera

Grevillea lanigera, commonly known as Woolly Grevillea, is a small shrub which is endemic to Victoria and New South Wales in Australia.

Changes re Unlicensed Vehicles

Just a reminder that the onus is on the entity that a motor vehicle is registered to i.e. person or company, to ensure that vehicles are licenced if driven on a road as defined. The Department of Transport will tell you that sending out renewals is only a courtesy and of course doesn't work at all if one forgets about it or changes addresses without notifying them, which is an offence in itself. Until recently if you were caught driving, or permitting someone else to drive your unregistered motor vehicle it meant a summons and the matter being heard in Court. Usually the person involved would walk away with a minor fine. However, the laws have just changed. Now if you drive and/or permit the vehicle to be driven both the driver and the registered owner (or company director) will receive an on the spot infringement notice for \$250. In my opinion the most dangerous thing about allowing a registration to lapse is that you won't have any insurance, not for property

damage or personal injury. This situation could be devastating and financially crippling should the worst happen. If in doubt about when your registration will expire you can check it on the Dept of Transport website.

Be SunSmart During Winter

With cloudy skies and cooler days many people think they won't get sunburnt. Sunburn is caused by UV radiation not temperature therefore even on a cooler cloudy day the UV level can be intense. You can get sunburnt on cloudy days, as UV radiation can penetrate some clouds, and may even be more intense due to the reflection from the bottom of the clouds.

Outdoor workers have a higher than average risk of skin cancers because they spend long periods of time working in the sun, all year round, over many years of working life.

So it's important to remember that even on cloudy days we need to be mindful of the UV index forecast for that day and protect ourselves as necessary. When the UV index is 3 and above it is time to be SunSmart

- Slip on protective clothing
- Slop on SPF 30 or higher sunscreen
- **Slap** on a hat (broad brimmed)
- Seek shade
- Slide on some sunglasses

A really great website for learning about the UV Index, including finding out what the UV is right now and

the **SunSmart app**, is <u>www.myuv.com.au</u>. While you are there **Download the SunSmart app** to your phone and use it daily. It is free and fun and can be tailored to your location – The app lets you know when you need sun protection, the daily UV level, the weather forecast, and lets you set a reminder for putting on sunscreen and how much (it has a sunscreen calculator!) – check it out on **myUV.com.au**

Remember UV3 is the key! At UV3+, cover up. Below UV 3, no sun protection is required

Waldron Concerned with 2015 Proposed Boundary Changes to Wagin Electorate

Media Release

The WA Electoral Commission has released the draft electorate boundaries for the next State election in 2017. Member for Wagin Terry Waldron MLA has expressed concerns about the significant proposed changes that he says will "impact on representation for regional WA".

Should the proposal go ahead as outlined, the already large Wagin electorate, which currently has 150 towns, will increase in size by 13 per cent to about 78,000 square kilometres. The proposed new electorate stretches past the SE coastal centre of Esperance, which is about 500 kilometres from the town of Wagin.

Mr Waldron said the Wagin electorate would become known as the electorate of Roe, and it would lose the Shires of Jerramungup, Plantagenet, Wandering, Boddington, Cuballing, Pingelly, Williams and West Arthur. "In turn, it will gain all territory east of Newdegate, including the Shire of Ravensthorpe and parts of the Shire of Esperance, which equates to numerous additional localities," he said. "Constituents have every reason to be concerned.

"These changes will make the electorate much larger and while as the local Member it can be handled, this increase will make it particularly difficult for constituents to have regular access to their local Member.

"I am extremely disappointed with the loss of a country seat that has once more gone to the city. "Those who live in regional WA will definitely feel like they have been snubbed again.


"And while it will also be disappointing to lose the well recognised name of the Wagin electorate that I represent, I do acknowledge that with the increases and inclusion of areas north and east of Esperance that the name change to Roe is understandable."

Mr Waldron said that although modern technology and easier travel options made it possible to reach the furthest parts of the current electorate, the size of the proposed new electorate would mean that regular contact would be really difficult. The Nationals WA made a submission that would have allowed the Electoral Commissioners to meet the requirements of the Act that involved minimal change. "I encourage local governments, residents and businesses to look at the proposed boundary changes and make their views known to the WA Electoral Commission," Mr Waldron said.



It has come to the attention of the Shire's Environmental Health Officer that some residents are keeping roosters in the residential areas of the Shire.



Roosters cause a nuisance to residents with their loud crowing, particularly early in the mornings.

Please note that the Shire of Lake Grace's Health Local Law 2000 Part 5 Div. 2 Clause 5.4.4 states: If an application is made to the Council for a person to keep a rooster within a townsite in the Shire, a consultation process with residents neighbouring the applicant's premises will be conducted.

Roosters, Geese, Turkeys, Peafowls and Gamebirds

- 5.4.4 (1) An occupier of premises within a townsite, shall not without the written approval of the Council, keep or permit to be kept on those premises, any one or more of the following fowl
 - a) a rooster;
 - b) a goose or gander;
 - c) a turkey;
 - d) a peacock or peahen;
 - e) a gamebird (includes emus and ostriches)
- (2) The Council may upon written application, grant approval with or without conditions to the owner or occupiers of premises to keep any one or more birds as specified in subsection (1) of this section.
- (3) A person who has been granted approval under this section to keep a bird on the premises only while he is the occupier thereof.
- (4) The Council may revoke an approval granted under this section if it is of the opinion that the keeping of the birds specified in the approval is causing a nuisance or is injurious, offensive or dangerous to health.

Electoral Commission to Conduct more Local Government Ordinary Elections Than Ever Before

Media Release

Eighty-eight of Western Australia's 139 local governments have requested the Western Australian Electoral Commission to run their ordinary elections in October this year. Collectively, these local governments comprise over 97% of the State's 1.47 million eligible electors.

All 30 councils in the metropolitan area have requested the Commission to conduct their elections using the postal voting method. Of the 58 regional councils using the Commission's services, 52 have opted for a postal ballot, while the following six councils have asked the Commission to conduct voting in person elections on their behalf – Broome, Halls Creek, Derby-West Kimberley, Wiluna, Wyndham-East Kimberley and York.

First time ordinary election customers for the Commission include the Town of East Fremantle, Shire of Derby-West Kimberley, Town of Narrogin, Shire of Wiluna and the Shire of York. The number of local governments having the Commission run their ordinary elections has increased steadily over recent elections, rising from 70 in 2009 to 88 this year.

Electoral Commissioner, David Kerslake advised that the electoral rolls for this year's ordinary elections will close at 5.00 pm, Friday 28 August 2015. People can check their enrolment status by visiting www.elections.wa.gov.au.

"I'd like to encourage all eligible Western Australians to support their local community by voting at the forthcoming local government elections. Remember, you can't vote if you're not on the electoral roll," Mr Kerslake said.

People wishing to nominate as a candidate will be able to do so from Thursday 3 September until 4.00 pm Thursday 10 September 2015. Polling day is Saturday 17 October 2015. For further details visit www.elections.wa.gov.au.

Waldron Welcomes Local RfR Aged Care Funding

Media Release

Significant Royalties for Regions investment into projects across the Wagin electorate will help address shortfalls in aged care services as the region's ageing population grows over the next decade.

Today Member for Wagin Terry Waldron MLA announced the Town of Narrogin would receive a \$5.137 million Royalties for Regions investment to assist with the construction of a 14-bed dementia-specific wing at Narrogin Cottage Homes, Karinya.

It is one of seven projects spread over 13 Wheatbelt, Great Southern, South West and Peel shires to share in \$20.2 million via the Royalties for Regions Ageing in the Bush program.

Mr Waldron said the funding would deliver the only dementia-specific designed facility in the southern Wheatbelt and would meet growing demand for dementia care in the region.

"This investment is addressing shortfalls identified in the Ageing in the Bush report commissioned by the Regional Development Council of WA last year," he said.

"Current projections estimate the population of regional West Australians over 70 will double in size to 100,000 by 2026.

"Meeting the needs of and creating sustainable aged care services for people ageing in the bush is critical to them remaining in the communities they live in and love."

Three other projects in the Wagin electorate will be funded under Ageing in the Bush:

- 4WDL Well Aged Housing Project (\$5.024 million) will contribute to the construction of 14 dedicated independent living units (ILUs) across the shires of Dumbleyung, Wagin, Lake Grace, Williams, West Arthur, Woodanilling and Kent.
- Kojonup Independent Living Units (\$646,000) Construction of three ILUs as part of a project to build six units, allowing ageing residents to remain close to family, friends and support networks.
- Collet Barker Court Stage 3 (\$1.242 million) Contribute to the construction of four of the final seven ILUs being built as part of 21 high quality units.

Other projects funded are occurring across the central Wheatbelt and in Harvey and Dwellingup.

Mr Waldron said the benefit of keeping older people in their communities was highlighted by the Wheatbelt Blueprint, which identifies aged care as a priority action.

"Enabling senior residents to remain socially connected and engaged in their home towns brings about huge health, wellbeing and economic benefits on an individual and community level," he said.

"Ageing in the Bush funding is just the start of investment through the \$600 million Royalties for Regions Growing our South initiative that will roll out over the next five years."

Mr Waldron congratulated those involved in prioritising these investments.

"I welcome the dementia-specific facility in Narrogin and its ability to meet the needs of the local region and I'm thrilled that a number of new units will be built in the region," he said.

"I continue to be very supportive of initiatives that support our elderly, including the construction of Independent Living Units across regional WA. Building these units allows our elderly to remain in their own communities, close to family and friends," he said.

"I'd like to thank and congratulate our shires on working towards these latest Royalties for Regions-funded projects."



Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC

Each of the soldiers listed on the Lake Grace Honour Roll will be featured in the Lakes Link News, as close as possible to 100 years from their enlistment. It is now 100 years and 7 days since Charles Carter signed up.

CARTER - CHAS. [CHARLES] ROBERT: Born at Toodyay, Western Australia he enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force at the age of 20 ½ years on August the 6th 1915, naming his mother Emily, of Subiaco as next of kin. (His father was away at the War, already serving in the AIF). He was a farmer, and was among the earliest group of settlers to the northward of Lake Grace, where he was allocated location 10164, next to allocations of his brother and father. At a height of 5 feet 7 3/4 inches (I72cms) he weighed 127 lbs (58kgs), had a dark complexion with brown eyes and black hair. As he was under the age of 21 years it was necessary to have his mothers' permission to enlist. Private Carter did his training at Blackboy Hill and on the 7th of October 1915 he was appointed to the 11th Reinforcements / 10th Light Horse Regiment. On the 13th of October 1915 embarked the *Themistocles* at Fremantle, disembarking at Suez on the 2nd of November.

They marched out to Serapeum, from Heliopolia on the 26th of February 1916. Six months later he was transferred through several hospitals before being diagnosed with tonsillitis and 3

weeks later was able to rejoin his 10th Light Horse Regiment to recommence duties at Masaid. After 8 months in the Field, (now Trooper Carter), was again admitted through several Casualty Stations, suffering from mild myalgia, (muscle pain), before being diagnosed with rheumatism at Abbassia. He was transferred to Montazeh for convalescence for almost two weeks, returning to duty on 31/8/1917 when he was appointed Driver. After three and a half months in the Field Driver Carter became sick again, so after reverting back to Private was admitted to the 2nd Light Horse Field Ambulance, with myalgia and inflammation of joints. As before, was transferred to Cairo. He was there for two weeks before being transferred to a Rest Camp at Port Said and after three weeks was able to march out to Signal Training Unit at Moascar, where he was able to rejoin the 3rd Light Horse Regiment and remain for two months. Then he detached for a further two months to attend a School of Instruction, returning to the 10th Light Horse Regiment. They marched into Ludd, then to the Expeditionary Force. Two months later he was admitted to the Australian Receiving Station in the Jordan Valley and from there to the Ambulance Rest Station Jerusalem with debility (weakness and listlessness). Transferred through several Casualty Stations, eighteen days after his first confinement, he was found to be suffering with Malaria. After a period of convalescence he marched into Moascar with the Signal Training

Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC (cont.)

After this the War was soon over, but it was the end of January 1919 before he left the war zone. It was April before he rejoined the 10th Light Horse Regiment at Zagazig and on the 14th of July he embarked the *MAGDALENA* at Alexandria to leave for the United Kingdom. On the 2nd of September leave was granted in England and on the 25th of September he embarked the *MAHANA* for the return to Australia, disembarking at Fremantle on 3/11/1919. He was awarded the 1914-15 STAR Medal, the British War Medal, and the Victory Medal, and his enlistment number was 1702. His religion was the Church of England.

While away at the War, Trooper Carter relinquished his land at North Lake Grace and it transferred to Ern and Catherine Bennett. He then took up land at Kondut which was probably arranged by his father Robert who had already been to the War and returned and had relocated to Kondut. Traces of his existence at Lake Grace are still evident, with remnants of stones and mud bricks scattered about his camp area.

Newspaper reports show that he played cricket for Kondut and successfully conducted a mixed farming venture, revealing sales prices for his livestock and produce, until the Second World War, when he enlisted for action again in that theatre too. He relocated his wife and four children to a home at East Fremantle while he was on service but when he returned home on leave

during the war, he found his wife and children had left, the furniture had gone, the house was bare, and his children were in hospital with a skin disease. In the Divorce Court a rather bizarre account unfolded. Carter explained that when he found his wife at an eating joint, he had a meal there. His lawyer asked, "Did your wife say anything to you when you went into the shop?"

"Yes she did", he replied, "She said "2/3." That's all. I paid her for the meal and went out." Rather puzzled, His Honour asked, "Didn't you ask your wife why she left?"

"No" replied Carter. "I never spoke to her at all. Since the day she cleared out I haven't even passed the time of day with her." Carter charged his wife with desertion. He got his decree and was granted custody of the children.

With the enlistment of Private Charles Robert Carter in World War Two, his service number was W 27769.

The absence of an "X" in his number means his service was within Australia.



Record Number of Native Plants in WA

Media Release

WA has one of the world's highest rates of discovery of new plant species with more than 10,000 species now listed

The number of plant species known in Western Australia has passed the 10,000 mark, creating a new State record, Environment Minister Albert Jacob said today.

The 10,000th species is a tiny rare daisy, found in May during a salinity survey of the Wheatbelt. Named Angianthus globuliformis, it is known from only one location on the margin of a salt lake near Lake Grace.

"There is an incredible diversity of plant species in Western Australia and if our State was a country, we would rank as the 20th richest in the world for the number of identified plant species," Mr Jacob said.

"Nationally, Western Australia has the highest number of native species followed by Queensland with 8,545."

The Minister said WA's 10,000 species had an intrinsic value in their own right and were also important for enhancing the biological process that sustain life on Earth.

"We can also appreciate this biological richness as sources of food, for medical discoveries, economic development, recreation and tourism, and as an important resource for adapting to challenges such as climate change," he said.

The WA Herbarium at the Department of Parks and Wildlife is responsible for documenting and listing all

"Knowing what plants we have, where they grow, and their role in the environment is crucial for conservation and sustainable development," Mr Jacob said. WA has more than 12,400 distinct kinds of native plants when subspecies and varieties of species are included

New species are discovered through botanical surveys and specimens brought to the herbarium, and also from careful study of the more than 750,000 specimens in its collection.

In the last decade, on average more than 50 new species have been discovered each year. This is one of the highest rates of new species discovery in the world, which is phenomenal. Recently, 17 new species of orchids were named, taking the total number of identified spider orchids in WA to 158.
