On August 15th, communities across Australia gathered to commemorate the sixtieth anniversary of VP Day – Victory in the Pacific. Sixty years have not dimmed the loss and suffering endured by not only those who played an active role in the war effort, but also those who lived through such desperate times. It was gratifying to see Lake Grace turn out and show their gratitude and respect to the World War II veterans who attended the VP day celebrations.

The idea of holding a VP Day celebration bounced around the table at a number of Lion's Club meetings. It was only when Lion Allan

Zweck asked others at the meeting about their memories of VP Day that they realised that all those present were either too young or simply had memories of a day off school. World War Il veterans were still on active duty so had no personal experience of the euphoria that swept through the nation. It was realised that it was important to capture the memories before it was too late, and backed by the Lions Club, a soon formed committee was to collate memorabilia organise and an event acknowledging the anniversary. Allan Zweck interviewed local residents and their memories were published along with photographs in the Lakes Link News.



Meeting attended by Lesley Solly, a consultant appointed by Council to assist with the development of Lake Grace Sporting Precinct.

The committee discussed options with a view to having an application for funding with Community Sporting Recreation Facilities Fund for new facilities by October 2005.

Celebrations began at 1pm with the parade leaving from the school. Bearing the Australian flag and representing the Parents and Citizens, Ross Chappell (who's uncle, Flight Sergeant John Chappell, lost his life over Berlin on 21st July 1941) led the parade. The cadets followed, carrying the services and RSL flags. Students from preprimary to year 10 and school staff next, waving miniature Australian flags; community members closely followed them. The community bus, carrying veterans and our elderly citizens, completed the parade.

With a police escort, the parade marched along School Place before turning into Bishop Street. Upon reaching the Shire offices, the parade travelled east along the Stubbs street footpath, collecting more participants along the way.

Allan Zweck welcomed everyone to the RSL Memorial Hall. In his opening address, Allan honoured and thanked those from our district who had served or been manpowered for securing our freedom. The names of the six men from our district who lost their lives were read, with a wreath laid by cadets Rhiannon Wallace and Nicole Chappell. Following the unveiling of a commemorative plaque by Mrs Pat Strevett and Mrs Mary Eggers, the parade adjourned to the Shire Hall.

Excited children frenetically waving Australian flags met the veterans (led by the cadets) as they entered the Hall. Guest speaker and Vietnam War Veteran, Ian Menzies, gave a personal account of his family fleeing Singapore after it fell to the Japanese.

Local clergy Rev Captain Derek McArtney, Fr Pierre Repuyan and Rev John Whaley officiated the thanksgiving service and throughout the proceedings a digital slideshow of memorabilia, articles and photographs of veterans was shown.

The Hall looked fabulous with enormous displays of our natural flora. After the formal proceedings were finished, an afternoon tea was served and those attending had the opportunity to look at the memorabilia displayed in the lesser hall.

Organiser Allan Zweck said, "There was no better time to celebrate this important anniversary. It was important for the children to see what their



DON'T DRINK THE WATER:

According to conventional wisdom, athletes should down fluids even before they feel thirsty. But excessive hydration can be deadly, says a study of Boston marathoners. It may lead to hyponatremia, the potentially fatal depletion of sodium, an electrolyte essential for cellular function.

Number of marathoners studied: 488. Number with hyponatremia at finish: 65.

Percent who drank every mile:

Among runners with normal levels: 54. Among those with hyponatremia: 75.

Among normals: 29.

SPELLBOUND:

What gives mediums their seemingly uncanny ability to read minds? Do you know anyone who has consulted a professional medium, astrologer or fortune teller? Or you may have yourself?

One of the most remarkable features of such encounters is the uncanny insight that many psychics seem to have about their customers. In fact there are myriad psychological techniques that allow someone to appear as if they know a great deal about you. Collectively known as cold reading, these tools are basic yet can be startlingly effective, particularly when the customer is willing to be convinced. One important ruse is to make general statements that apply to most people, yet can seem uniquely relevant to the sitter. This is known as the personal validation fallacy. Imagine, for example, reading the following description of yourself in a horoscope: "Disciplined and selfcontrolled outside, you tend to be worrisome and insecure inside. At times you have serious doubts as to whether you have made the right decision. You prefer a certain amount of change and variety, and become dissatisfied when hemmed in by restrictions," This is a general personality sketch drawn by psychologist Bertram Forer back in the 1940's. When unwitting subjects are asked to rate on a scale of 0 (very poor fit) to 5 (excellent), the average score is 4.2. The phenomenon doesn't just apply to personality sketches. People who consult clairvoyants tend to do so for broadly similar reasons, so generic hints at health, work or relationship worries usually have good hit rates. And statements such as "I see ill-health in your family," will often be recounted to friends later as: "she knew all about dad's heart attack." Even specific pronouncements can apply to many people. For example, a survey of 6000 people showed that one

third agreed with the statement: "I have a scar on my left knee," and over a quarter with: "someone in my family is called jack." As long as the psychic makes numerous guesses, the odds are that a few will hit the mark. And thanks to our selective memories, we tend to remember the hits and forget the misses. Psychics are usually skilled at reading body language so they know when they are onto something and should elaborate. Many sitters will help by verbally acknowledging a correct guess-and may even provide extra details. Consulting local newspaper archives about their sitter, and at stage shows, they may choose volunteers with whom they have previously corresponded. Richard Wiseman, a psychologist, tested five mediums, who each gave readings for five sitters. In each case, the mediums' statements were recorded while the sitter was located in a different room, to exclude all feedback. The sitters were given transcripts of all 25 readings and asked to rate them for accuracy, not knowing which five referred to themselves. The mediums were a flop-no reading for any sitter was rated as significantly more accurate than the control readings. These findings were published in the (British Journal of Psychiatry, vol 96, p 165). Around about twenty years ago, one of the best known clairvoyants in Britain died from food poisoning.

GLACIER SPEED:

One of Greenland's largest glaciers is crashing into the sea dramatically faster than before, reigniting fears about the stability of the island's ice sheet in the face of local warming. The glacier is flowing into the sea at 1.6 metres an hour, three times as fast as when it was measured in 1988 and almost as fast as the World' speediest glacier, West Greenland's Jakobshavn Isbrae. The Greenland ice sheet, which is thinning, holds enough ice to raise sea levels by 7 metres and these two speedy glaciers between them drain 10 per cent of Greenland's ice. Unless the melting ice is replaced with greater snowfall inland, which appears unlikely, it will raise sea levels Worldwide. (British Antarctic Survey).

MICROCHIPS:

14.8 per cent of microchips sold this year will come from China, making it the 3rd biggest producer in the World.

ARSENIC POISONING:

Arsenic poisoning may have contributed to the madness of Britain's King George III. The arsenic poison may have come from his Medication for porphyria, a genetic defect that leads to faulty protein synthesis in the body, and accounts for the King's physical and psychiatric symptoms.

U/21 National Hockey Championship in Darwin 9th to 24th of July 2005 - *Courtney Gray*

With a disappointing, but encouraging, 3rd at the recent U/18 national hockey championship on the Gold Coast in April, I was extremely pleased at the way I played and wasn't content in finishing WA hockey so early in the year. Although I was still playing club hockey when the opportunity to trial for the U/21 team arose I thought I'd take the chance to play with and against some of the most elite junior hockey players in Australia. As always the trial process is gruelling, but fortunately the selectors knew what they were looking for and to my surprise the team was announced within two weeks. I was one of the 16 girls named. At first it was more disbelief but looking at the team announced there was one player younger than me, three others the same age as me, the rest up to three years older. So I wasn't the only 'youngie' in the team.

Like all national tournaments the 8-10 weeks of preparation are always the hardest and most exhausting so it is important that you are physically and psychologically in the zone. I knew it was going to be a risk playing this tournament, because I started so early on in the year for 18's, so it was a test on my body to see whether I could handle it, without getting worn out and injured. Every week I dedicated four trainings to the U/21's (included one purely for short corner defence and attack) plus the additional two trainings and one game I played for Willeton Goundry League, although it was advised that club hockey was to be taken very lightly. Unluckily, I was plagued by all sorts of illness so it was frustrating not being at the standard I expected for myself. However, this improved closer to our departure date. With three weeks to go, instead of the usual trainings, we played games against a variety of quality sides including the AUS U/21 Junior World Cup Squad, WAIS and the well known Hotspurs - a team filled with Australian and ex-Australian men and women. We also did weight training in heat chambers with the purpose of trying to acclimatise us before having to play in 35°C weather in Darwin. Instead of playing the usual 5,3,2,1 system in normal hockey we adapted a new system that was devised by ex-Australian coach Ric Charlesworth, who used it when the Hockeyroos won the gold medal in the 2000 Olympics. Trying to understand the system was another difficult hurdle but with help from Trini Powell and Kate Starre (Hockeyroos, 2000), who passed on the knowledge and experience of the game, plus numerous black board sessions our team was looking flash and ready to take on the rest of Australia.

Coming into the tournament W.A were already a highly respected team with the reputation of finishing in the top three of most championships at all ages, although QLD, NSW and VIC were huge contenders. Our first game was against QLD and we were happy to accept a 3 all draw. The next 3 games we won 3-1, then a 1-2 loss to VIC. We then played NT who were desperate to finish in the top four in front of their home crowd. They fought

an excellent game but we were the stronger team and won 3-1. Our last team was NSW, who have always been our arch rivals. Luckily we stepped up that extra notch and won 2-0. Of the 7 games we played we lost 1, drew 1, and won 5 so this placed us on top of the ladder before the finals.

By this time in the tournament I was battling serious injuries with my lower legs and feet. Everyday would involve a 9:00am recovery swim (as the recovery walk would flare up my shins), intense stretching, three visits to the physiotherapist for massage and strapping pregame, anti-inflammatory gel and tablets, massage during the warm up phase and half time. After the game would be a 10 minute walk/run plus 20 minutes of stretching followed by ice-baths, then separate icing for my shins and lastly before bed would be a small massage and acupuncture. All this, just so I could last one game of hockey without too much pain. After all I was playing at least 55 minutes out of the 70 of each game.

Our first final was against the 4th placed VIC who had beaten us in the round, so we needed to show our resilience, turn things around and beat them to make the grand final. To our surprise they came out harder and scored an early goal. As time went on it was us that had control of the game and all the attack although we weren't able to penetrate a goal until the very last 6 minutes of the game. With the final siren going it meant that we had to play golden goal in extra time which finished in 1 minute and 10 secs because we were able to break through their defence and pass their extremely talented keeper. It was now QLD vs WA in the 2005 grand final.

As the game was at 8:00pm at night the day's lead up was so nerve racking. We just tried to stay calm and stick to our usual routine including analysing every aspect of QLDs game and trying to pick out their weaknesses. QLD came out firing but we maintained our composure and both teams had equal opportunity at scoring. In the last minutes of the first half our goalie took on one of their strikers, consequently, giving away a short corner and earning herself a yellow card and was sent off. Our 2nd goalie had been chosen on the day to be our 17th player which meant she wasn't allowed to sit on the bench so we padded up a player to put in goals leaving us with 9 field players. QLD took this opportunity and converted the corner right on half time. The 2nd half was a little more promising with our goalie allowed to come back on in the 10th minute. Yet QLD were still too good and converted another by an unmarked player. With just 15 minutes to go W.A started to pick up huge momentum and put extreme pressure on their defence with shot after shot on goals. Finally we scored from a short corner which had been a huge key for us during the whole tournament. Time got

to watch and NSW deserved to win.

Marshmallow No Treat for Stock

Making sure stock have alternative feed can help farmers avoid problems associated with a weed that has an attractive name but some very unpleasant effects.

Department of Agriculture District Veterinary Officer Roy Butler said marshmallow poisoning or marshmallow staggers occurs in sheep, cattle and horses which eat too much of the marshmallow or small flowered mallow plant.

With poisoning happening most commonly in late winter or early spring, Mr Butler has warned stockowners against the dangers. Poultry that eat marshmallow seeds and leaves are not visibly affected, but their eggs may develop abnormalities.

"Marshmallow is a weed introduced from Europe," said Mr Butler.

"It is commonly found growing along roadsides, in neglected gardens, around buildings, chicken runs and especially in stockyards. In recent years, perhaps associated with reduced cultivation, it has become more common in pastures, especially those bared by drought or overgrazing.

"Marshmallow is not palatable to livestock and they generally only consume it when hungry they have no alternative feed.

"Signs typically occur after animals have been eating a diet which is all or mostly marshmallow. This may occur after stock have spent a night in yards full of marshmallow, or after some weeks grazing pasture where marshmallow is the dominant feed source.

"Affected animals are reluctant to walk, taking short steps and moving stiffly with back arched.

They become more distressed, eventually stopping and lying down. They remain relaxed and do not convulse as do sheep affected with annual ryegrass toxicity.

"If left alone, most animals make a full recovery. If forced to move, they will lie down again after a shorter distance. In a mob of ewes and lambs, only the lambs may be affected. Deaths are rare.

"There is no treatment for marshmallow poisoning, other than rest. Do not force affected animals to move, but leave them undisturbed, sitting up and not flat on their sides.

"To avoid the problem, don't put hungry stock into yards or paddocks infested with marshmallow," Mr Butler said.

"If that is unavoidable, provide alternative feed, such as hay, both before and while stock have access to the marshmallow."

For more information people are advised to consult their local Vet or Agronomist.

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 26th August, to midnight Friday 9th of September. Astronomy is looking up and never look directly at the sun with the naked eye, use the right equipment.

During this fortnight Jupiter, Venus, the Moon and the bright star Spica in Virgo are close together. The Sun still resides in the constellation of Leo this fortnight and shines at magnitude -26.72. On Wednesday 31st August the Moon, in Gemini, will be 1.6° (finger at arms length) of the bright double star Pollux. The Moon on Thursday 1st September will be at apogee (furthest), at 406,213 kilometres from earth at 11am. On September 4th, the new Moon will occur at 2:35am. The Moon on Wednesday 7th will be very close to Venus, Jupiter, and the star Spica in the evening sky. The Moon will be in Taurus on 27th, 28th and 29th, Gemini on 30th and 31st September, Cancer on 1st and 2nd August, Leo on 3rd, 4th and 5th, Virgo on 6th, 7th and 8th and Libra on 9th.

In the early morning twilight, Mercury rises at 5:38am in Leo at -0.9 magnitude on Saturday morning. On Wednesday morning 31st August rising at 5:43am, Mercury will be at perihelion, around 45 million kms from the Sun at -1.0 magnitude. Mercury, on Friday morning 2nd, will be 2.5° south of the Moon (thumb at arms length) at magnitude -1.2. Mercury, slowly moving back towards the Sun, rises at 5:58am on Friday 9th and resides in Leo.

Venus, in Virgo at a very bright -4.0 magnitude, sets on Saturday night at 8:43pm. On Friday 2nd September, Venus will be 1.4° (thumb at arms length) of Jupiter at 8pm. Venus, on Sunday 4th, will be very close to Jupiter and the bright star Spica, and on Wednesday 7th you can add the Moon. On Friday 9th, Venus sets at 9:04pm at -4.1 magnitude.

The red planet, Mars, rises on Saturday night at 11:10pm in the constellation of Aries at magnitude -1.0, and rises at 10:41pm on Friday 9th.

The giant gas planet, Jupiter, in the constellation of Virgo, sets on Saturday night at 9:08pm at magnitude – 1.7. On Sunday 4th, Jupiter is close to Venus and the bright star Spica in line, and on the 7th add the moon. Jupiter sets at 8:28pm on Friday 9th.

The ringed planet, Saturn, in cancer, rises at 5:04am on Saturday in the morning twilight at +1.0 magnitude. Saturn, on Thursday morning, 1st September, will be 5° (about three fingers at arms length) south of the Moon. On Friday 9th, Saturn rises at 4:18am.

The blue/green coloured gas planet, Uranus, just in naked eyesight range at magnitude +5.6, resides in the spring constellation of Aquarius, rises at 6:02pm on Saturday and is in the sky all night for the fortnight.

The grey/green coloured planet, Neptune, in binocular and small telescope range at magnitude +7.9, resides in the spring constellation of Capricorn, setting at 5:43am on Saturday morning and 4:51am on Friday, 9th September.

A large telescope is needed to see the small planet, Pluto, at magnitude +13.9, which sets at 1:55am on Saturday and resides in the constellation of Serpens Caput, and sets at 1:04am on Friday 9th September.

Meteors at around five per hour and travelling at 64kms per/sec can be seen north of the open star cluster, the Seven Sisters on the morning of Friday \mathbf{g}^{th}

My first year as President with Pingaring Progress Association has gone quickly, being busy and full of interesting events and challenges. I would like to thank Kathie Thompson, Jeni Wyatt and Terri Stone as my office bearers, and everyone else who has helped me in my role to try and guide the Association to do useful, productive work which benefits Pingaring and its residents.

The foremost achievement of our work with Progress this year is, to me, the extent to which Progress has been involved in helping the community. As Progress was established as a central body to help keep the Pingaring Community together when the School closed, it is gratifying to see how well Progress services and facilities are used.

Amongst other things, this year we have helped the golf club by supplying them with our old computer at a very good price, with the scanner donated as well. Thanks to Vicki Smith for her efforts in selling the computer - it keeps her very busy in the golf club office on Sunday nights!

- We have helped the Pingaring Store by providing a new weatherproof notice board to be displayed there for community announcements.
- Also at the store, we have helped preserve our heritage by organizing for a plaque to be made commemorating part of Pingaring history.
- We have helped the Pingaring students who attend Lake Grace School to be proud of where they come from by supplying Pingaring numbers plates for their bus at cost price – PING-00 is a regular traveler on our roads now!
- We have helped local mothers and children to revitalize Playgroup and open a new facility in our town by supporting Playgroup's application for a grant to establish a toy library, supplying storage and a play room for the toys and altering our insurance policy to include toy library toys.
- We have helped advertise and support police visits to Pingaring to enable people to do their police business locally.
- We have also lent our support to other communities, helping Lake Grace Development Association in their application for a Grant to employ a Community Development Officer in the Shire.

A major asset to Progress and the reason we are able to provide so many services is, of course, our Community Centre. It has once again been well used this year for the regular day-to-day activities that the community engage in.

- Weekly Play Group and Toy library operate.
- Fortnightly we see the production of the Gumtree Gazette, where many of our local ladies work from our efficient little office to bring us all of the latest news. We also have new technology, with e-mail now available for both submitting articles and receiving the Gazette.

- Monthly we have the visits of Ian Squire, for whose services people come from far and wide.
- Of course another monthly event is our Progress meetings, which are attended by a small and loyal band of members – thank you all for continuing to support our work.
- Among our occasional users this year have been Investment Group and a scrapbooking class, plus another visit from Mundaring SES. Thank you to everyone for continuing to use our community center and its facilities. Progress keeps hire charges as low as possible and maintains the center as a community service for your convenience.

Of course, maintaining a building is not without its problems, and we are fortunate to have a very able Maintenance Committee headed by Joan Fisher who help everything to run smoothly. This year maintenance have been kept entertained by the more mundane aspects of life, such as plumbing, cleaning and lights. A major achievement is the purchase and installation of a new hot water system, giving those who use our showers a higher level of comfort. The old hot water system has been installed at the kitchen end of the building, and the old gas system has been removed, thus giving us a more efficient hot water system in the kitchen. The grounds and gardens of our community center are looking fabulous.

A challenge of maintaining a building with a foot in two Shires is liaising with the Shires. Many phone calls, letters and meetings have been undertaken this year to achieve results for our local community. Among our achievements this year are disabled toilet facilities, the repair of stumps and the removal of the old ramp behind the building. We have secured a pay rise, taking our combined annual contribution from both Shires to \$8,000. We have also submitted several proposals to the Shire for their budgets, and we wait to hear the results from them.

Our townscape committee also has a major achievement to its credit this year, with the opening of our new public toilets. Townscape have also improved the safety of our streets by having the streetlights repaired, and continue to liaise with the Brand Kulin project.

Progress volunteers have been kept busy fundraising this year, working at both the Holmes and Dixon clearing sales. We have also had income from another run of number plates. A fantastic fund raising opportunity fell in our laps this year, and I would like to thank Ida Byass for arranging the production of the "Voices of Pingaring" CD. This CD was hugely popular around Christmas time, and sales continue to be made. We very much appreciate the years of hard work and effort that went into the making of this CD, it is a marvelous piece of our heritage forever preserved.

Our seniors have been a little quiet this year, though they are gearing up for another breakout, with a wonderful sounding trip to Esperance coming up. A trip
