Flying Visit - Dedication of Bi-Plane

A Community Builder's initiative conceived in 1999, culminated with a dedication of a bi-plane model at Apex Park on Thursday 12th August.

The dedication was in conjunction with the 'flying visit' by Royal Flying Doctor Service fundraising committee members Jan Ende (retired RFDS pilot), Penny Ende (retired RFDS nurse) and Amanda Duggan (fund raising officer RFDS Jandakot) who were travelling in a restored Cessna 180 used by the RFDS in the 1960s.

The visit was also part of the WA On Show Key Destination Tour, the team carrying with them the \$75,000 gold key which will be delivered to the opening of the *WA on Show* and the *Perth Convention Exhibition Centre* on Thursday 26 August 2004.

The main objective of the bi-plane, aside from catching travellers attention as they drive in to Lake Grace, is to promote the Australian Inland Mission Hospital and encourage tourism and travellers to our town and district.

Funding for the restoration and erection of the bi-plane was raised from a food festival held in 2001. This was a sit down meal for 120 people featuring locally grown produce. Two thousand dollars was also contributed by the Lake Grace Development Association, recipients of the 2003 'Strengthening Rural Communities' Award. Local tradespeople also donated enormous amounts of time and resources to see this project through to fruition.

Darren Spencer officiated, inviting retired RFDS pilot Jan Ende to dedicate the plane.

Lake Grace people can be the proud owners of the most talked about mob of sheep in the district.



Flying Visit - Dedication of Bi-Plane (cont...)

Attendees toured the AIM hospital (with a very welcome sausage sizzle) and contributed to the money chain that snaked its way down the Penny Pavers Pathway. Lake Grace District High School students and Newdegate Primary School students attended.

The Royal Flying Doctor Service is a sentimental favourite in the more remote rural areas such as Lake Grace where residents know how vulnerable they are in the case of a medical emergency.

The bi-plane is a model of the De Havilland model DH50 aircraft used by the RFDS on its first flight on 17 May 1928. This plane was hired from the Queensland and Northern Territory Aerial Service, which later became Qantas.

The aircraft was a single engine, fabric covered, cabin bi-plane capable of carrying a pilot and four passengers at a cruising speed of just under 80 miles per hour. For the first trial year, Qantas charged two shillings per mile flown. The Federal Government paid half the cost while the other half was funded by donations.

It is significant that over the years the Flying Doctor has maintained a very good aviation safety record, despite the sometimes very difficult conditions under which aircraft have to operate. In 1928, flying was still in its early days, airstrips often left much to be desired and there was a lack of navigational facilities and airstrip lighting.

The first Flying Doctor pilot, Arthur Affleck, had no navigational aids, no radio and only a compass and inadequate maps, if any. He navigated by landmarks such as fences, rivers, river beds, dirt roads or just wheel tracks and telegraph lines. He also flew in an open cockpit, fully exposed to the weather, behind the doctor's cabin. Airstrips were, at best, claypans or at the worst, hastily cleared paddocks.

RFDS founder Reverend John Flynn told many tales to illustrate the need for medical care in the outback. One such story was that of Jimmy Darcy, a stockman hurt in a fall near Halls Creek, Western Australia in August 1917.

"Found badly injured, Darcy was transported by his friends to Halls Creek, 30 miles away, a 12 hour journey. There, the only person who knew first aid was FW Tuckett, the Postmaster, who quickly saw Darcy's injuries were serious. After trying unsuccessfully to contact doctors by telegraph at Wyndham and Derby, he finally thought to telegraph 2,000 miles to his former first aid lecturer, Dr Holland, in Perth. Following diagnosis by morse code, Holland went on to instruct Tuckett

through two long and painful bladder operations with a pen knife. Holland then set out on a 10 day journey from Perth to Halls Gap by Cattle Boat, Model T Ford, a horse drawn sulky and finally foot. When he arrived he found that although the operations were successful, Darcy, weakened by undiagnosed malaria and an abscessed appendix, had died the day before."

The tragedy elbowed even war news from many Australian newspapers and, more than any other single event, attracted nationwide attention to the urgent need for doctors, hospitals and nurses in outback Australia.

In 1903 the first powered air flight had taken place and by 1918 the aeroplane was beginning to prove itself as a reliable means of transport. Radio was also displaying its remarkable capability to link people thousands of miles apart.

Residents from all rural areas have benefited from the wisdom of Reverend John Flynn.

In 1969/70 Lake Grace pilots made an airstrip on Syd Treloar's farm for their own use. The RFDS made use of this strip on October 30th 1974 when they evacuated an ailing mother and baby. This was the first of many fly-outs from Lake Grace.

In her memoirs, RFDS pilot and nurse, Robyn Millar, wrote of her first visit to Lake Grace...

"Home again, very tired and Harold with a heavy cold - laryngitis. A ring at 10pm from Dr Chong in Lake Grace. A woman was haemorrhaging after delivery and he had no blood to hand. The baby too, after a precipitous arrival, was suffering respiratory distress. Lake Grace has no airstrip so Harold (Dr Harold Dicks, Robyn's husband) feeling like death anyway said that as I was obviously going to kill myself, he might as well die with me. We landed in a paddock, indicated by the headlights of ten or twelve cars positioned in accordance with my instructions. Made a good landing in the circumstances and complimented those concerned on their effective flare path."

Concerns were raised about the lack of a suitable airstrip for Lake Grace and Mr Laurie Thiel was given the task of finding a suitable site. After surveying the lake and surrounds, a 1219m long by 60m wide air strip was built with the opening held on 28th August 1976. This airstrip was built by the Shire and volunteers, funded by the Shire and the State Transport Commission.

Lighting was provided by car headlights and then kerosene flares for night landings and take-offs .

In 1979 it was realised that an upgrade needed to

be carried out on the strip to bring it up to night landing specifications. So the strip was widened, electric lighting installed and the wind sock illuminated. Work was completed in 1980. Two nights after testing the strip was used by the RFDS. The pilot can now switch these lights on from the plane.

Thursday's dedication raised \$1,290.00 was raised for the RFDS from the sausage sizzle, money chain, collection tins and the competition for guessing the wingspan of the plane; which incidentally is 6.02m. Judy Walker won this with her 'educated estimate' of 6.15m.

None of this would have happened without the hard work of so many; the original community builders group Rita Marshall, Glenda Slarke, Nicki Connolly and Darren Spencer; Allan Marshall for

sourcing the plane and providing other invaluable help; Lake Grace Development Association for contributing the \$2,000.00 that was awarded for Strengthening Rural Communities; Lake Grace Engineering for restoring and erecting the plane; concreting of base by Kuender Concrete; use of the Hiab from Stevemacs to erect the plane; the Shire for digging of pad hole, backfilling of hole and for cooking the sausages and feeding the school kids; Gardiner's Meat Supply for donation of sausages; Supa Valu for donation of buns; Melissa Cugley for signage; Belinda Bowron for her tin shake at the Hockey girls last game; the committee and helpers on the day and last, but not least, everyone who came and made a donation to the money chain or brought a sausage in a bun.

Make Pap Smears a Routine for Life

Cervical cancer can be prevented if all women made Pap smears a routine for life. One of the answers to reducing incidence and mortality from cervical cancer is to encourage women to participate in regular two-yearly Pap smears, and for them to maintain this behaviour throughout the course of their adult life.

A pap smear can detect early cell changes long before you would notice anything unusual. The lining of the cervix is made up of millions of tiny cells. Sometimes abnormal cells develop among them. These abnormal cells are not cancer but if they continue to grow they may lead to cancer later on.

A pap smear is a simple test which only takes a few minutes. A GP or nurse with specialised training can help you feel more relaxed and comfortable about having the test or assist you with alternative services.

In Western Australia more than 90 women develop cervical cancer every year and more than 30 women die from the disease. A pap smear every two years can prevent up to 90 percent of the most common type of cervical cancer.

If you are a woman aged between 20-69 and have ever had sex, you should have a pap smear every two years. This also applies if you have only ever had one partner, or you no longer have periods, haven't had sex for a long time or have no symptoms. Women who have had a hysterectomy or are over 70 years of age should check with their doctor to see if they still need to have a pap smear.

If you are a woman aged between 20-69 years, ask yourself this question - when did you last have a pap smear? Make an appointment with your doctor, health centre or women's health centre. It's up to you - regular pap smears could save your life!

Each year one in eleven Western Australian women will develop breast cancer, with 200 dying from the disease.

The Health Department's Mobile Mammography Screening Service, also known as the Pink Van, is coming to Lake Grace. The van is scheduled to visit Lake Grace from 7th September until 14th September, and will be located in its usual spot at the Lake Grace Shire Hall.

The service is free for all women over the age of 40 years, but specifically targets women aged 50 to 69 years, as this is the age group in which screening mammography has been shown to be the most effective in decreasing breast cancer mortality. Screening mammograms are the best way we have of diagnosing breast cancers too

Do you have a Safe Play Area for your Children?

Small children are mobile and ready to explore, but they do not have the ability to recognise danger. Of particular note is that many children are seriously or fatally injured on Australian farms each year. Major farm hazards include dams, farm vehicles and machinery, horses and farm motorcycles.

A safe play area, such as a securely fenced house yard, is ideally:

- Located where children can be easily observed (eg. A verandah, kitchen)
- Completely surrounded by an effective fence with a suitable gate

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 27th August to midnight Friday 10th September. Astronomy is looking up.

The Sun, this fortnight is in Leo, and shines at magnitude -26.7.

With the Moon rising later in the night sky after the full Moon on Monday, it will be good for observing.

The Blue Full Moon will be at 10.12am on Monday in Aquarius. The last quarter Moon is at 11.01pm on Monday 6th August in Taurus.

On Wednesday September 8th at 11am, the Moon, will be at apogee (furthest) in Gemini at 404,464kms distant. The Moon this fortnight is in Capricorn on 28th, Aquarius on 29th and 30th. Pisces on 31st August and 1st and 2nd September. Aries on 3rd and 4th. Taurus on 5th, 6th and 7th. Gemini on 8th and 9th and Cancer on the 10th.

Sunrise, Sunset: The times at which the apparent upper limb of the sun is on the astronomical horizon; ie, when the true zenith distance, referred to the centre of the Earth, of the central point of the disk is 90° 50', based on adopted values of 34' for horizontal refraction and 16' for the Sun's semi-diameter.

Zenith distance: Angular distance on the celestial sphere measured along the great circle from the zenith to the celestial object. Zenith distance is 90° minus altitude.

Zenith: In general, the point directly overhead on the celestial sphere.

LARGE DRUG SEIZURE IN LAKE GRACE

While on Patrol Lake Grace Police located an offender in the midst of shipping a significant quantity (170 grams) of an illegal substance believed to be heroin through to Esperance. This person was arrested and presented before Lake Grace Court of Petty Sessions where he was remanded in custody pending a further appearance in Perth. A second person of interest is currently being sought in South East Asia.

Such a quantity holds a street value of approximately half a million dollars and is the largest seizure in the Great Southern for many years.

As a result of this incident a number of new offenders and lines of inquiry have been identified and police are continuing to investigate the matter.

SERIOUS TRAFFIC CRASH - KUKERIN

In the early hours of last Sunday morning local Emergency Services members had the unpleasant task of attending a traffic crash where a local person was seriously injured. It was necessary to use hydraulic cutting apparatus to free the driver from the vehicle and after some time he was conveyed by ambulance to Narrogin hospital, prior to be being flown to Perth.

I would like to thank all members of the Lake Grace Fire and Rescue Service and Dumbleyung St John's Ambulance that attended at the time. These people are volunteers and worked tirelessly and professionally in very trying conditions. Their efforts are a credit to their service and our community spirit.

HOONS BEWARE

Amendments to the Road Traffic Act have been passed by State Government that prospective hoons should be aware of.

If you exceed the speed limit for ANY area by more than 45km/hr or you drive at 155km/hr or greater you will be charged with reckless driving and face a MINIMUM 6 months suspension for a first offence.

In addition—and this is the fun part—the vehicle you were driving may be impounded for up to three months, the cost of which (towing and storage) are incurred by YOU. One subsequent conviction, the vehicle may be forfeited to the crown.

Think wisely before you loan your vehicle out to someone or you decide to drive like an idiot.

HIGH SPEED ALERT

Lake Grace Police were left shaking their heads in bewilderment after detecting a local motorist within 2km of approaching town, travelling at ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY THREE kilometres per hour. 
I will be attending a state Unit Coordinator's meeting in Perth this Saturday and will keep everyone apprised of developments during my next correspondence.



Baking With Pamela

Mock Chicken

I have included this recipe for my niece Tahlee. She discovered and loved this sandwich filling at her Grandfather's funeral, after which in true country style, the local ladies had laid on the most amazing spread. I used to make this spread a lot when, as a farmer's wife, one spent many weeks each year cooking mountains of food for shearers. It can be made weeks ahead and frozen until needed. Mock Chicken is an excellent way of using up excess tomatoes when in season.

1 large ripe tomato
1 onion
1 egg
2 teaspoons butter
4 tablespoons grated cheese pinch mixed herbs
1 teaspoon salt pepper
1/2 teaspoon sugar

- Peel and chop onion finely sauté in butter (cook in a saucepan with lid on, keep shaking so onion doesn't brown).
- Slit skin of tomato and plunge into boiling water – then remove skin.
- Slice tomato and add to onion with herbs, sugar and seasoning.
- Cook slowly with lid on till tender.
- Beat egg and add to mixture.
- Stir well, add cheese and cook gently till thickened.
- Use as a sandwich filling or is yummy served hot on toast.

Hint: there is a peeling knife available now, from good knife shops, that will peel such fruits as tomatoes, mangoes, etc.

Mulled Wine

This is the best treat for yourself and friends on a cold winter's day/night. Sipping a cup of this will, for me, always bring back wonderful memories of a special friend (who will remain nameless) and the amazing Christmas in July dinner we hosted together. Actually, you could always do what she and her husband did while working up north and yearning for a cold winter's day. They pulled all the curtains over, turned their air conditioner up to high, positioned a sprinkler on the roof, turned it on, then, snuggled under their doona. Wouldn't a cup of Winter Mulled Wine be the perfect accompaniment?

This freezes well. I have often made up a batch and then divided it into smaller quantities, frozen the mixture and used when required.

4 lemons

2 large oranges

2 x 750ml bottles red wine

1.25 litres water

16 cloves

2 cinnamon sticks

125g caster sugar (use more if not sweet enough)

8 tablespoons brandy

- Peel the zest very thinly from 2 lemons and 1 orange.
- Thinly slice the other orange and 1 lemon, quarter each slice, put on a plate, cover and reserve for a garnish
- Squeeze the juice from the remaining 3 lemons and orange.
- Pour the wine, water and citrus juices into a large saucepan and add the cloves and cinnamon sticks. Bring to simmering point, then cover and keep just below that heat for 1 hour. Stir in sugar to taste, then strain.

Serve hot with the reserved orange and lemon slices floating on top. Stir in brandy just before serving.

Acupuncture Points to Post-op Comfort: Acupuncture is a cheap and safe way of preventing people who have just had an operation from being sick or feeling nauseous. That is the conclusion of a review of 26 trials involving over 3000 patients.

Trials that studied the effects of 'p6' treatment stimulation of the pericardium (p6) acupuncture point on the wrist. Patients receiving p6 acupuncture were 28% less likely to be sick than patients receiving sham treatments, such as insertion of the needle at the wrong place or pretended stimulation of p6. They were also 24% less likely to ask for anti-sickness drugs. Without treatment, post operative nausea and vomiting is estimated to affect four out of five people who have had anaesthetics. In head to head comparisons with routine anti sickness drugs, acupuncture was equally good at preventing nausea and vomiting and that there were minimal side effects, and advocate p6 acupuncture as a safe and effective means of preventing post operative sickness and nausea. (New Scientist, 31st July 2004)

Unwelcome Guest: Fears that West Nile disease might become established in western Europe, as it has in the US, have been heightened by confirmation that two Irish holidaymakers were recently infected with the disease in Portugal. There have been sporadic cases in eastern Europe for decades, but never before in Portugal.



Yawning: Yawning is contagious, for chimps as well as people. If one chimp yawns, another is likely to follow, bolstering the idea that the apes are able to understand the minds of others. Around 50% of adult humans are prone to

contagious yawning . Why we do it is controversial, although one suggestion is that it has evolved as a social cue to synchronise sleep in a group. Now researchers have shown that around a third of adult chimps also indulge in contagious yawning. A team played videos of chimps, either yawning or displaying other openmouth behaviour such as grinning, to six adult chimps and three infants at the primate research institute of Kyoto University in Japan. Two of the adults yawned considerably more frequently in response to the yawning video, while showing no difference with the others. An evolutionary

psychologist says people who yawn contagiously are better at inferring the thoughts of others from watching their faces. Also brain-imaging studies show they have more active brain regions associated with self-information processing. (New Scientist 31st July 2004)

"They took the male Tomtit and left his mate behind and he decided 'bugger that I'm going home', so he did." Warwick Murray of the Department of Conservation in New Zealand on a protected North Island Tomtit that escaped and flew 63 kilometres, a record distance for such a small bird, to return to his mate. (Reuters, 27th July)



High Cry of a Ground Squirrel: Ground Squirrels emit an ultrasound squeal to warn other animals that a predator is approaching. Bats and toothed whales use ultrasound for echolocation. Wild Richardson's

Ground Squirrels (spermophilus richardsonii) occasionally produce calls containing pure ultrasound tones with frequencies of about 48 kilothertz, far too high for people to hear. When they broadcasted pure tones at this frequency to other squirrels, the animals recognized them as a warning, tilting their heads to look and listen for predators more than usual.



Arsenic Plan Fails: The crisis caused by arsenic-polluted drinking water in eastern India and Bangladesh is going from bad to worse. Of the 2000 arsenic removal plants installed in villages in the

Indian state of West Bengal to clean up water supplies, 4 out of 5 are either abandoned or deliver smelly and discoloured water. An estimated 30 million people in the Ganges delta are drinking well water contaminated with naturally occurring arsenic. India has so far spent \$3 million on plants to capture the dissolved arsenic using ferric salts. Of the 20% of removal plants still apparently working well, many are not removing arsenic to the required standard.



Knock! Knock!

Being approached by a sales person when you aren't prepared is much like a surprise attack, you are unprepared, your defences are down and the advantage lays clearly with the caller.

This sort of approach can be sprung on you when you are out shopping, over the phone or by someone coming to your home. Because of the natural disadvantage suffered by consumers placed in this position, additional protection is provided under the Door to Door Trading Act which provides a 10 day cooling-off period for purchases over \$50, allowing consumers to change their minds without penalty. This Act applies widely to many forms of 'cold' or uninvited sales approaches.

This protection has proved invaluable to regional consumers over recent years where they have found themselves being talked into buying goods they really didn't want, some say, being 'bullied into buying'.

So-called 'surveys' or 'free' raffles are used to gain personal information for later follow up and are commonly placed near busy supermarkets, in shopping centres and at fairs or field days.

The type of sales most complained about, have involved mobile phones with long term purchase plans, home security systems tied to monitoring

contracts, vacuum cleaners and home insulation. Usually, it is not the goods that are the problem, but the way they are sold and the 'hidden' contract terms.

Increasingly, consumers are posting the "No Hawkers or Canvassers" signs on their entrance ways, and 'caller display' along with answering machines are being used to screen incoming telephone calls.

These strategies can work well, but here are some tips if you decide you do want to deal with a sales person:

In person sellers are obliged to wear a name tag displaying their full name and the name of their company. If asked to leave, they should do so. The contract itself should display advice in bold lettering just above where you sign, stating that a ten day cooling off period applies.

Do not pay any deposit at the first approach. A second form should be supplied, to be used if you decide to cancel the sale, but be aware, you can't cancel over the phone!

Avoiding the Hard Sell

Have you ever wondered why it is so hard to get away from a high pressure sales pitch?

How is it that you find it difficult to get away from some sales staff without being rude? An article recently published by Fair Trading in Queensland shows the sales techniques employed in high pressure sales to capture or trap unsuspecting consumers.

Next time you are approached, it might be interesting to see how many of the strategies you can identify as sales staff try to manipulate you into buying.

Here are some of their basic techniques according to Fair Trading in Queensland :

RECIPROCATION. Making you feel obligated after you have accepted a "free" gift or offering you a "special" deal. (A free set of steak knives?)

COMMITMENT. Getting you to commit to something early in the conversation ("Yes, I can't argue with that....") and then later in the conversation, recalling that earlier agreement to force you into agreeing to more. Don't let yourself be bullied.

SOCIAL PROOF. Everyone is buying one, so it must be a great deal and you need one too! Are they really? Just because the salesperson says something, does that make it true?

LIKING. Using their good looks, charm, flattery, sob stories or humour to earn your trust. They're so nice, you really should help them out, or should you?

AUTHORITY. Authority in or out of uniform causes an automatic response in most people and is often used to gain agreement. Is this "authority" relevant to the sale? Verify the authority if you can.

SCARCITY. This is the last chance! Stocks are limited! Are they really? This technique attempts to rush you and prevent you from thinking things through or shopping around.

Do not make snap decisions. Introduce a delay to the process to allow you to sleep on your decision, or perhaps ask for their number and call them back after you have thought the offer over.

Chain Letter Scam

And yet another scam has made it's way in to the Goldfields! A chain letter, telling you how Perth man, David Rhodes, turned \$218 into \$78,000 within 60 days, is currently being circulated.

A four-page letter is either faxed to you or arrives in the mail telling you 'not to bin this immediately' and to 'think about it for a few days'.

David Rhodes, a fictitious identity, uses all the best scam-triggers by appealing to our desire to provide well for our family, have more money, be successful and get it all quickly with doing very little. Sounds too good to be true, doesn't it? Well, it is!

He tells you that it is a 'perfectly legal business opportunity' and here is all you have to do:

- Send \$10 to the person with a number 1 next to their name on a list of five that arrived with your letter.
- Delete that person and move everyone else 'up' the list, putting your own name and address at number 5.
- Copy 200 of 'new' letter and send out to 200 people you have found through the phone book or other source.

Do this within 60 days and your \$70,000 will start rolling in!

Mr. Rhodes also notes that if you decide not to participate, then you should pass the letter onto someone else and watch them succeed.

Some obvious concerns consumers should have are:

- Prosecution for participating,
- Having your name and address widely distributed.
- Alienating your family & friends if you involve them

Chain letters requesting money, even if disguised as a 'gift' like in this one, are illegal in much the same way as pyramid frauds are and participants can be prosecuted.

You should not bin this letter if you get it. Simply contact Consumer Protection on 1300 30 40 54.

Diane Mason started her hockey career in 1967 at the tender age of five. The President of the Lake Grace Hockey Club was Mrs Jan Mason and Lake Grace played in the Dumbleyung/Lake Grace Hockey Association.

When Di started playing hockey there were A, B and C grades. Unlike now, players were graded on ability, not age. By the time Di was 12 years old, in 1974, she had advanced into the A Grade side. In the same year, Di captained the C Grade team to a premiership then again in 1975 played in a C Grade premiership team.

For a couple of years, Di played C Grade, umpired or played goalie in B Grade then played again in A Grade, at this time Lake Grace participated in the Lake Grace/Kulin and Districts Hockey Association. Between 1974 and 1981, Di played in at least 4 premiership winning teams, and received the award for Best Player in a Premiership side in 1979.

In 1982 and 1983 Lake Grace only had a social mixed competition. Di did not play in a Lake

Grace side for those years. Instead playing in the Ongerup Association.

Di returned to Lake Grace Hockey Club in 1984 when Lake Grace joined with the Central Great Southern Hockey Association. Four premierships, won against Kukerin, followed from 1988 to 1991.

In 1988 Di was awarded the trophy for Most Consistent and then in 1991 was selected in the Great Southern XI at the Great Southern Hockey Carnival in Esperance.

In 1990 Diane took on the position of President of the club for two years. Then again was President in 1997, 98 and 99.

In 1992, Lake Grace joined the Roe Districts Women's Hockey Association, starting the current affiliation with two runners-up positions in 1992 and 1993 then four premierships in 1994, '95 and '96 and 2002. In 2000 Di took on the position of Association President while Lake Grace held the Association books.

In 1997 Di also coached the A Grade side,

following in her grandmother's footsteps.

Di was recently presented with a 150 game medallion and Certificate of Achievement, which she achieved on 17th August 2002. 


