

CHAIRMANS REPORT

It is with pleasure that I submit to the meeting my fourth annual report as Chairman of the Lake Grace Sub Centre.

The year of 2007/08 will be remembered for the most amount of work completed by the Lake Grace Ambulance Service in the 62 year history of the service in Lake Grace. The year will also be remembered for the diverse range of jobs completed within the duty cycle.

Our benefit fund membership as at the 30th June was 301 financial members and 34 un-financial members, down 31 members from 2006/07. Eighty three percent of the members are from within the postcode areas of Lake Grace and Pingaring consistent with 2006/07. There were 206 families (down 30 families from 2006/07) and 116 singles (down 13 singles from 2006/07) that were sent renewal notices. The rates for 2007/08 were \$55 for families and \$32 for singles as set by St John Ambulance Australia (SJAA) in Perth annually.

Vote of Thanks

To the executive Steve Newman (Vice Chairman), Heather Bell (Secretary), Joe McEncroe (Treasurer), Terry Gladish (Receipts and Payments Officer) my sincere gratitude for your time and effort. These roles take much personal commitment to make the sub centre run smoothly.

My thanks to Ollie Farrelly (First Aid Course Convenor), Lois Dickins (LEMAC and Roadwise Delegate) and Linda Trawinski who will be taking over the First Aid Kit Restocking Service, for their hard work over the past 12 months

To our 8 qualified officers (Lois Dickins, Ollie Farrelly, Meg Marshall, Heather Bell, Wendy Hoskyns/Abrahall, Amanda Milton, Steve Newman and Matt Power) and five drivers (Kevin Seaman, Christine Fyfe, Wayne Trawinski, Lawrie Dickins, and Annie Koresec) I wish to thank you again for another outstanding year of service provision. All 65 jobs were completed with professionalism and courage. Well done to you all.

Service

Over the last year this sub centre has contributed over 1178 hours of service to the community.

The most substantial impact to service delivery has been the exponential rise in callout numbers over the last 2 years. Consistently approximately 55% of callouts over the last 4 years have related to RFDS transfers, the remainder of jobs are spread across a wide range of medical issues.

It is prudent to note that in the 13 month period between the 2006/07 and the 2007/08 Annual General Meetings there have been 85 callouts completed which includes 20 callouts from 1 July 2008 and 10th August 2008.




Figure 1 &2: Comparison of the number of callouts of St John Ambulance Lake Grace Sub Centre 2004/05 to 2007/08. Figure 1 is based on a financial year ending June 30 2008.




Figure 2 depicts a 13 month period between the 2006/7 AGM and the 2007/08 AGM where an additional 20 jobs were completed in 40 days from 1 July 2008 to 10 August 2008.

Workload

Of the 65 jobs in 07/08 19 were trauma cases, 38 were medical cases and 7 were cardiac patients.

We travelled 2532km to complete the jobs with the average kilometres travelled being 39.56km.

Ninety- five percent of jobs were within the 6353 postcode compared with 73% last year. 67% of the patients were male and 56% of the jobs were for people (male and female) over the age of 50. Twenty-five percent of jobs were for people aged 0-25 years and 23% of jobs were for people aged 25-50 years of age.

Forty-four of the callouts were RFDS transfers. This represents 69% of the current workload

The average cost of a job was \$237.22 and \$15,182.35 worth of work was completed by the sub centre of which only 3 cases were benefit fund members or \$988.80 worth of work. The Lake Grace Hospital had 47 jobs charged to them at a value

of \$9.621.80

Over the year the job spread amongst the officers was, Heather Bell completed 34 jobs, Ollie Farrelly completed 29 jobs, Amanda Milton completed 19 jobs, Meg Marshall completed 8 jobs, Lois Dickins completed 15 jobs, Wendy Hoskyns-Abrahall completed 7 jobs, Steve Newman Completed 8 jobs, Wayne Trawinski completed 7 jobs, Kevin Seaman completed 1 job.

With another 20 jobs in just 40 days in the 2008/09 year there are some significant issues arising around workforce planning for the future.

Achievements

We have had another excellent year with many achievements. Here is a summary of what we have accomplished.

- CPR Training course "Save a Soul" co-ordinated by the year 9 & 10 students of the Lake Grace District High School and conducted by St John Ambulance Lake Grace. 25 people trained in CPR
- Nominations for 2nd 5 year service bar for Terry Gladish
- Wendy Hoskyns-Abrahall requalifying as Primary Ambulance Care Qualified
- Steve Newman, Wendy Hoskyns-Abrahall, Heather Bell and Amanda Milton all attended both days of the Annual Sub Centre Conference.
- Airstrip Patient Transfer facility received a lining of the ambulance bay which has added to better thermo insulation and the brightness of the workspace.
- Equipment Upgrades Ferno 50E stretcher and mobile phone to Next G.
- Rejuvenation of the Lake Grace Airstrip, including returning the surface to gravel, de-vegetating the edge of the runway and lighting area and cementing the runup ends.
- Provided ambulance support to the Great Southern Football Carnival (12 jobs – 5 transported)
- Attended 5 Football games.
- Ongoing operation of the First-Aid Kit restocking service

Financial Management

Income Vs Expenditure

As at the 10th August 2008 the financial records system for the 2007/08 financial year recorded an income of \$49,516.24 and expenditure for the year of \$18,096.40 for a net income of \$31,419.84

The major purchase for the year was the new Ferno 50E stretcher which has several design benefits over the older Ferno stretcher including the ability to move the unit sideways, infinite headrest positions, a higher weight capacity i.e. 239kg vs. 159kg, and better lifting operation attributes (less handles to push and hold while lifting)

Uniform charges for the year were \$1,239.59 while the reimbursement of persons for attending training was

\$1.736.25

Key running costs include insurance \$1,384.25, Equipment maintenance i.e. stretcher, oxygen systems etc \$826.41, medical supplies & oxygen \$3,211.09, telephones \$1,354.36 and first aid class materials and first aid kit and book purchases \$1,824.16

Outstanding Accounts

There are no major outstanding accounts at this time.

Term Deposits

Our term deposits continue to work for us and are constantly reviewed for the best rates. The current term deposits stand at \$142,297.14 and \$11,873.54 with an operating account balance as at the 11th August 2008 of \$4,735.46

Given that there are no extraordinary purchases planned for the current financial year the sub centre currently has \$154,170.68 in reserve. Given the significant challenges that appear to be facing our sub centre in terms of service delivery, it becomes even more important that this reserve fund continues to work very hard as we appear to run headlong into the need for major physical changes in the operation of the Lake Grace Sub centre.

Towards 2008/9

Over the last 3 years callout numbers have risen dramatically from around 30 callouts per year to 65 callouts last year. In the current year demand has reached 20 callouts in the first 40 days of the financial year. If we assume that this trend is to continue at the same level it is not unreasonable to expect callout numbers to top 100 callouts per year in the next two years.

The Triple Challenge

Ambulance

1/ In order to maintain a level of service where there are no two callouts for the same ambulance at the same time, simple modelling would suggest that a second ambulance will be required sometime in the next 5 years and possibly within the next 2-3 years.

Building

2/ Along with the potential need for a second ambulance, will be the issue of the current St John Ambulance building. The building was erected in 1983 and was built to house two ambulances which it is still capable of achieving. However in housing a second ambulance the service would then have no storage space for stores, training equipment, service equipment or training space, creating a second big challenge for what model to follow at that point i.e. build, borrow or co-use.

Personnel

3/ Physical equipment and buildings aside, the most difficult challenge will be having the required number of volunteers for staffing ambulance services in the future. At present there are 8 officers and 5 drivers. The rule of thumb is we aim to provide 3 staff to each call. If you assume that each person can achieve 20 calls per year i.e. one every 2.5 weeks, then 3 people can handle 20

jobs, 6 people = 40 jobs, 9 people = 60 jobs, 12 people = 80 jobs, 15 people = 100 jobs etc.

This model also assumes a majority of officer qualified personnel as these are the people answering the 000 call outs whilst the drivers are sort to assist as much as possible given the timeframes of the callout i.e. sometimes the callout does not allow for extra calls to be made to find extra personnel.

With the callout load at this time we have the staff to maintain the service. Further escalation of the duty load will require further recruitment preferably to officer level.

Equipment

After recently attending the 2008 sub centre conference and viewing the new scoop stretcher, I wish to recommend to the committee the purchase of the "next generation" in scoop stretchers with additional operational features over our current model. The indicative cost will be around \$1,255.00.

I will also be encouraging the sub centre to look at some of the new training mannequins whose computer generated scenario's with real time and real life responses can assist greatly with simulated exercises.

The sub centre could and should also work with surrounding sub centres over the potential co-purchase of a mass casualty kit that can be shared amongst approximately 5 sub centres and can be moved quickly to a mass casualty scene.

Grant funding for the purchase of shade shelters that can be used at sporting events, trauma accidents, social and fundraising events will be ongoing in 2008/09

Sub Centre

In 2007 I hoped that we could have the sub centre toilet floors tiled to improve the hygiene of these rooms through a greater ability to clean the facility. I believe we should continue down this path and aim to have the work completed in 2008

As mentioned previously if the need arises and a second ambulance does come into service then the committee and community will have to consider options for building, co-locating or a share location model. I would anticipate that by the 2008/09 AGM we will have begun looking at concept plans for any model we think can work. Given that funding applications can take 18 months to be accepted or rejected, early identification of preferred options is very important.

Ambulance

At the last AGM I informed the meeting that we could consider that our application for a 2nd hand Mercedes van upgrade looked like occurring in 2009. A Mercedes 316 Sprinter (2 models higher than our current model) will be available to come into service sometime in September (one year earlier than expected) to replace our current 312 Mercedes. The van is 4 years younger than our current van and has 129,000km on the odometer.

At present the 312 Mercedes is to be "gifted" to the

Newdegate sub centre until the arrival of their 316 Mercedes next May. This will ensure all surrounding sub centres are now operating Mercedes Ambulances. One possibility to be considered between now and May is the potential for Newdegate to gift back to Lake Grace the Mercedes 312 when they receive their new 2nd hand Mercedes. This would immediately allow Lake Grace to upscale to a two ambulance station. This idea is in its infancy and would need to be discussed at regional and state level to gain approval.

Vale

In recent times we have endured the sad passing of St John Ambulance Life Member Mr John Kellow. John has been an enduring part of our history, particularly in the days when he was responsible for the vehicle servicing and maintenance. John's presence will be sadly missed, however his legacy lives through the ongoing service provision of St John Ambulance in Lake Grace.

Closing

In a year of record callouts Lake Grace Sub Centre faces unprecedented challenges in service provision and service delivery going forward. Our volunteer base is still our most valuable asset in service provision and the drive for additional ambulance officers needs to continue.

In 2008 we eagerly await our replacement Mercedes 316 ambulance due in just over 4 weeks. We will be the first sub centre in the state to have made a double change, which proves that the system is working and is having a positive effect in driving down the average age of the ambulance fleet state-wide.

My sincere gratitude to all those who have served this sub centre over the year. Your personal dedication to a service you believe in is impressive.

To those who are currently serving in any role, your dedication is what makes this service possible.

To the committee and executive your support is important for us to keep moving forward.

Finally to the Ambulance officers and drivers, you continue to serve this community with humility and distinction. The community entrusts you with their lives.




SOY MILK NOT AN ALLERGY RISK: One of the most basic lessons in science - that correlation is not causation - has been revealed again in a study showing that drinking soy milk does not cause peanut allergy. Results show that parents who choose to give their children soy products are not increasing their risk of becoming




allergic to peanuts. It's a myth," says PhD student and epidemiologist Jennifer Koplin of the Murdoch Children's Research Institute. Peanuts are the most common cause of anaphylaxis. Since soy and peanuts are both legumes and produce similar proteins, some have speculated that cross-reactions with the immune system may make babies raised partly on soy milk more prone to peanut allergy. The theory gained support when a study found that children raised on soy milk were indeed more likely than the general population to have a peanut allergy.

However, Koplin found there was one thing the study left out: the decision to feed children soy milk was a parental choice and not a randomised study. Parents with family histories of allergies, or whose children were known to be allergic to cows' milk, were naturally more likely to give their children soy milk. Children allergic to dairy products are also more likely to be allergic to peanuts, and once this is controlled for the sov milk/ peanut allergy relationship disappears. Koplins findings, published in the Journal of Allergy and Clinical Immunology, are based on a study of 260 children from birth to 2 years old. She is now expanding her work to study 5000 1-year-olds to see if she can discover what really is behind the dramatic rise in the life-threatening allergic reactions to peanuts and other foods (from Australian Science Magazine, August 2008).





SCHIZOPHRENIA GENES FOUND: At last comes solid evidence that genes may predispose someone to schizophrenia. Michael O'Donovan of Cardiff University, UK and colleagues found that a gene called ZNF804A increases the risk of the disorder by about 1 per cent (Nature Genetics, DOI: 10.1038/ng.201). David St



Clair of the University of Aberdeen, UK, and colleagues discovered that when regions on chromosomes 1 and 15 are missing, the risk of schizophrenia can jump 15fold (Nature, DOI: 10.1038/nature07229). Finally, the International schizophrenia consortium found that people with schizophrenia tend to have more "copy number variations" - repeated or missing gene fragments - than healthy individuals (Nature, DOI: 10.1038/nature07239).

facial expressions in a similar way to people with the condition, despite not being autistic themselves. Ralph Adolphs of the Institute of Technology in Pasadena and his colleagues first tested which of 42 parents of autistic children qualified as socially aloof - meaning that they tend to enjoy small talk and have few close friendships. The team then asked the 15 aloof and 27 non-aloof parents plus the parents of 20 neurotypical children to judge whether faces looked happy or fearful. People with autism often struggle to read others' emotions, but all three groups of parents scored equally on the task. However, the socially aloof parents with autistic children were most reliant on looking at the mouth, rather than the eyes, when judging the faces (Current Biology, DOI: 10.1016/j.cub.2008.06.073). "This bears a striking resemblance to what we have reported previously in individuals with autism," says Adolphs. Neurotypical people tend to use the eyes to read feeling. Autism is known to have a genetic component, so the discovery of specific, heritable behaviours may help pin down genes responsible for particular autistic traits.

HENDRA OUTBREAK: Australia is experiencing the biggest outbreak of the highly virulent Hendra virus since the disease was identified in 1994. Worse, a change in the symptoms in horses suggests that new strains may have emerged. The big worry is that a strain capable of spreading from human to human will follow.



Hendra virus originated in fruit bats but passed to horses and then people, where it tends to affect the nervous system, causing headaches, convulsions and coma. It can be fatal. In July two people were in hospital, while 50 more were being tested. Classic horse symptoms are laboured breathing, frothy nasal discharge, a frothy muzzle and death within days. This time however, horses have mainly suffered neurological symptoms such as paralysis and loss of balance. This, along with "very preliminary sequencing data" suggests that "there is a cluster of strains that differ in their pathogenesis and infectivity", says Hume Field of the Australian Biosecurity Cooperative Research Centre for Emerging Infectious Disease. Such a cluster makes it more likely to pass between humans.



Thin Red Line drawn to Moora

A diverse range of artworks, linked by a common red line, is on show at the Moora Fine Arts Gallery this month as part of an exhibition touring the Wheatbelt.

The Thin Red Line, which opened on 22 August contains 39 pieces of work, all diverse in their medium and technique, but for a thin red line that runs through each one.

The exhibition was a community project initiated by the Lake Grace Artists' Group (LGAG) earlier this year. Project co-ordinator and LGAG member Kerrie Argent said the group chose to have an open-invitation exhibition that set some parameters for people to work within.

Each work had to be 45cm square, use only a palette of greens and include a thin red line that entered and exited the canvas at each side. This way the individual works could be joined and hung as a unified artwork.

The choice of medium, subject matter and what the red line did within the canvas was up to individual choice.

Kerrie said the result was dynamic and included pieces made of textiles, paint, paper, plastic, yarn and found objects. "The works are by about 30 people from the Lake Grace Artists' Group and wider community, aged between nine and 79 years – and this is reflected in the diversity of the pieces," she said.

"In fact it was the most challenging exhibition we've hung yet. We had to hang it three times before we got them into a sequence we were happy with."

Kerrie said *The Thin Red Line* was not just about the exhibition, but also about ongoing community engagement and skill development. She said in the lead up to the exhibition the LGAG held canvas-making workshops to help participants learn how to construct and canvas their own frames to work on.

"This way, people are learning life-long skills and the exhibition doesn't become an isolated event."

The Thin Red Line is at the Moora Fine Arts Gallery until September 6.


Lake Grace Cemetery Restoration Project

Morning twilight on Saturday occurs at 5:07am and at 4:50am on Friday 12th Sept. Evening twilight on Saturday occurs at 7:02pm and on Friday 12th at 7:20pm.

On Sunday 31st in Leo, the new Moon will be at 3:50am. The Moon will be 3° south of Mercury and 5° south of Venus and Mars on Tuesday 2nd. On Sunday 7th in Scorpius the 1st quarter Moon will occur at 10:04pm 0.3° (close) south of the red supergiant star Antares, also at 3pm on Sunday 7th the Moon will be at Apogee (furthest) from Earth at 404,214 kilometres. The Moon on Wednesday 10th will be 3° south of Jupiter in Sagittarius.

MERCURY in the constellation of Virgo at magnitude 0.0 sets on Saturday at 7:44pm. On Monday 2nd Mercury will be 3° north of the 4% Moon setting at 7:58pm. Mercury on Thursday 11th will be 4° south of Venus and at Greatest Latitude East at 27° at magnitude -0.1. Mercury sets on Friday 12th at 8:04pm.

VENUS at a very bright -3.8 magnitude in Virgo sets on Saturday at 7:34pm. On Tuesday 2nd Venus will be 5° of the Moon. Venus on Thursday 11th will be 4° of Mercury. On Friday 12th Venus will be 0.3° north of Mars and sets at 7:57pm.

MARS the red planet in Virgo at magnitude +1.7 on Saturday sets at 8:09pm. On Tuesday 2nd Mars will be

 5° north of the Moon. Mars on Friday 12^{th} sets at 7:57pm 0.3° south of Venus.

JUPITER the giant gas planet in Sagittarius on Saturday at magnitude -2.5 remains in the night sky all of this fortnight setting in the mornings. On Wednesday 10th Jupiter will be 3°north of the Moon.

URANUS the blue/green coloured planet at magnitude +5.7 in Aquarius rising at 6:48pm on Saturday will remain in the sky all night this fortnight.

NEPTUNE the grey/green coloured planet at magnitude +7.8 in Capricornus rises on Saturday at 4:33pm will also remain in the sky all night this fortnight.

Jupiter's Great Red Spot will be visible for one hour for telescopes from 9:52pm on Sunday 31st, Tuesday 2nd from 7:23pm, Thursday 4th from 9:04pm. The four moons of Jupiter are visible in different positions around the disc at all times and are good viewing at all times as appear and disappear.

The tail of the Scorpion will be directly above at 7:30pm on Saturday and Sagittarius at 8:15pm.

The Moon on Saturday will be in the constellation of Leo at 2% illumination, 31st at 0% (NM) and 1st at 1%, Virgo on 2nd at 4%, 3rd at 9%, 4th at 16% and 5th at 24%, Libra on 6th at 32%, Scorpius on 7th at 41%, Ophiuchus on 8th at 51%, Sagittarius on 9th at 60%, 10th at 69% and 11th at 78%, Capricornus on 12th at 86%. The Moon is good viewing for telescopes and binoculars as it is different every night.

There is very good viewing through the gas around the Southern cross and the star cluster near the second brightest star on the cross, as it has the traffic lights in the middle and also the shape of the letter A.
