Second Defibrillator for Lake Grace

A second Automated **External Defibrillator** (AED) has been installed in Lake Grace, this one at the Roadhouse. As reported in July two were budgeted for as part of **CBH's Harvest Mass** Management Scheme (HMMS), with the first one installed in the IGA two months ago. Both the IGA and Roadhouse are high traffic areas with long opening hours, making them an ideal site for the AED's. Community Paramedic, Dave Allen, did an awareness session at each location.

Sudden cardiac arrest is one of the leading causes of death across Australia. More people die from cardiac arrest annually than from road accidents. Contrary to popular

belief, cardiac arrests do not discriminate. They can happen to anyone, of any age, at any time. With optimum survival chances directly linked to CPR and defibrillation the units are a positive step forward not just for the community of Lake Grace but anyone travelling through.

These AEDs will be linked with St John's Community First Responder (CFR) program, by registering as a CFR location, they are directly

linked to St John's triple zero call centre. In the event of a sudden cardiac arrest, first responders near the location are alerted and can provide vital first aid with the use of an AED in the minutes before the ambulance crew arrives. The CFR system is operating in over 1000 locations across Western Australia.

St John Ambulance Community First Responder program manager Sally Simmonds said AEDs give



Botanica

There were no 'big bad banksia men' at the Lake Grace Regional Artspace on Monday night but there were plenty of native flora enthusiasts present to admire the photographic exhibition 'Botanica' by John E. Maloney.

The macro photography is extraordinary with the larger than life images bringing forward the texture and colours that aren't evident to the naked eye. Who would have thought a banksia was so hirsute. The square format of the images draws your eyes into the image.

John Maloney and his wife Fran, also an artist, were on hand for the opening where John talked about the inspiration behind the exhibition. John will be giving students at the Lake Grace District High School a lesson in macro photography while he's in Lake Grace.

Botanica has been around the world and as part of 'Art on the Move' and with support from the Shire has come to Lake Grace. John has had an interest in photography throughout his life and became particularly interested in macro while using it as part of his day job. His first forays into artistic photography involved shells but with Fran being a 'banksia nut' it wasn't long before he moved into making them his subject of choice.

Living part time in Albany banksias were literally on their doorstep and with the Banksia Farm up the road at Mt Barker there were plenty to choose from. John uses samples which he takes back to his studio; all of his photography is digital and the only editing to the photos is to bring the colours into line with how they look in the bush. In John's words what you see with the eye isn't what transfers via the camera lens to the computer and then to the printer, so some tweaking is needed.

Delving deeper John introduced history into his exhibition with the bulk of the collection displaying banksias discovered by botanist Thomas Brown when he and Matthew Flinders were circumnavigating Australia and spent a month at Frenchman's Bay. He then expanded the collection to include some of those discovered (and collected) by Joseph Banks in Sydney.

Those attending enjoyed the display and the relaxed atmosphere. Botanica will be open until Friday 16th October

victims of sudden cardiac arrest a much better chance of survival. "This donation empowers people living in regional WA, as in the event of a sudden cardiac arrest they can use a defibrillator to potentially save someone's life," she said.

The Laerdal HS1 Heart Start defibrillator is automated, enabling people with very little or no training the potential to save a life. It has an

excellent talk through functionality. However, St John does encourage individuals to have completed the Provide First Aid course (HLTAID003). There is no legislated accredited training required to use an AED.

Over the last 3 years the Wheatbelt and Midwest communities have received 26 AED's as a result of the CBH donation.

You Make Me Wanna Swoop

CSIRO News

With warmer weather showing signs of returning across the country, so too are many of spring's delights: the flowering of plants, greening of trees and rolling of cuffs all testament to the fact that the worst of winter is behind us.

Unfortunately, it's not all lamingtons and Cherry Cheer at this time of year. For there is also a suburban menace lurking just over the horizon: a black and white marauder waiting to terrorise unsuspecting picnickers, exercisers and office workers alike.

Yep, September is magpie season.

If this image doesn't send a primordial chill down your spine, you've obviously Deep Space Communication Complex. never spent the month of September in suburban Australia. All around the country, roadsides, reserves and office blocks turn into battlegrounds as the Australian magpie looks to protect its patch from any and every threat it can lay its beak

So why do magpies swoop us humans – is it to defend their young, or their territory? Or are they just bird ierks?

And most importantly, is there any way we can guard against them?

There was an illuminating paper co-authored by academics from Deakin and Griffith universities, titled Attacks on humans by Australian Magpies (Cracticus tibicen): territoriality, brood-defence or testosterone? The paper, published in our Emu -Austral Ornithology journal back in 2010, looked to study three common hypotheses behind magpie-human attacks, particularly in suburban areas. Were the attacks triggered by territoriality, brood-defence or (magpie) testosterone, the authors asked?

The response of 10 pairs of aggressive magpies to natural levels of human intrusion was compared with that of 10 non-aggressive pairs. Behavioural observations strongly supported the contention that attacks on humans resemble brood-defence and did not support an association with territoriality. The study also found no support for the suggestion that testosterone levels correlated with aggressiveness towards humans: male testosterone peaked immediately before laying and was significantly lower during the maximum period of attacks directed at people. Moreover, there were no differences in the testosterone levels of aggressive and non-aggressive male magpies. The pattern of testosterone production over a breeding cycle closely resembled that of many other songbirds and appeared not to influence magpie attacks on humans.

So, brood-defence can be identified as the cause of attacks.

But, of more interest to posties, cyclists and small children with blonde hair in particular: what makes magpies more likely to attack some people, and not others?

Enter the brave scientists of CSIRO Black Mountain in Canberra. In 2010 (it must have been a bad year!) a particularly aggressive maggie was nesting on the foot and cycle path between the Australian National University and our Black Mountain site. With all types of magpie-repelling adornments being attached to cycle helmets with varied successes, and (figurative) public service and academia corpses littering the notorious path, our enterprising colleagues decided to add some scientific scrutiny to the debate: how do you deter a mad magpie?

Former Lake Grace resident and current Wagin football player Mitchell Shalders has just come back from the 2015 State AFL U15's Championship in Melbourne, representing WA all the way to the finals.

Mitch was picked out of 400 players from the trials, part of the top 30 players at the trials in Bunbury in March.

The team trained for eight weeks before heading to Geelong for the carnival from July 17 to 26, and spent the first day getting used to the grounds.

"It was pretty good, pretty exciting and pretty scary as well," Mitch said. "Bigger bodies, average height was about 6 foot, pretty scary going up against some of those boys."

After the opening ceremony on their second day the WA team faced early disappointment losing to their first opponent South Australia.

"We had our heads down a bit, the next day we were playing the Vics (Victoria) and if we lost that game we'd be playing for fifth or sixth," Mitch said.

"We went into the Vics game a bit worried but really confident. We went out and gave them all we had."

WA came back to beat Victoria in the next round with a last minute clincher.

"Eight seconds left a bloke kicks it from the boundary, kicks a goal and we win by two points," he said, "It was a really good moment."

Playing out the rest of the carnival, WA ended up coming face to face with their first win when they played against Victoria.


In a tough final, WA lost to them by 10 goals

Commemorating 100 Years of ANZAC

Each of the soldiers listed on the Lake Grace Honour Roll will be featured in the Lakes Link News, as close as possible to 100 years from their enlistment. It is now 100 years and 6 days since John (Jack) Lay signed up.

LAY -JOHN (JACK): Born at Southampton, Hampshire, England, he went by the name of Jack. He enlisted in the Australian Imperial Force on 4/9/1915, his father John Lay of Southampton being next of kin. He was aged 22½ years, and was 5 feet 6 inches tall, (168cms.) and weighed 129 lbs. (58.6kgs). He was of fresh complexion with blue eyes and light brown hair, and gave his occupation as farmer. He originally came to Lake Grace as a labourer, however, he was quick to see the opportunity to establish himself as a farmer, and was granted an allocation of land accordingly, about 16 kilometres south, down the Pingrup road. The intervention of the First World War curtailed its development, but while away on Service he was mindful of his possession, and he wrote letters home of his concerns that fire should not be allowed to cause damage to it.

Jack Lay was appointed to the 10th Reinforcements 8th Battery Field Artillery as Driver, on 4th of October, 1915. His primary duties in this role were to bring up the ammunition for the Artillery, and other supplies with the use of horses. Although his embarkation is logged as Melbourne, on the HMAT Hororata, A20, on the 27th of September, 1915, his family strongly believe that Driver Lay embarked at a West Australian port. It is possible a mistake has been made with 'Records', given the short period from enlistment to embarkation – September 4th to September 27!

On the 19th of November, he joined the Mediterranean Expeditionary Force, at Heliopolis with the 8th Battery from the 11th Reinforcements. On the 23rd of March 1916 they left Alexandria for Gallipoli. He was with the forces to land at Gallipoli, but due to the seas being too rough, they were not able to safely land his horses, so he had to remain with them, having heard and seen the battle zone, and it seems Marseilles was where he disembarked on the 29th of March.

A year later, and after the withdrawal of forces from Gallipoli, he took leave, then on the 18th of July 1917, he was with the 3rd Army Brigade, Australian Field Artillery in France. On the 3rd of November of that year, Driver Lay was serving in Belgium, where he was wounded in action, sustaining a shell wound injuring his lower and upper lip, and shrapnel wounds to the throat. In this action, he is reported to have said, "the horses went down, and he went up, before landing head first in a shell hole", which saved him! He was very distressed when he saw how his horses had been mutilated and decapitated, and it was rather paralysing for him that he was unable to speak, due to his injuries.



He was admitted to the Casualty Clearing Station and transferred to Etaples on the 4th of November. This journey was made in a big covered lorry, with many injured men above and below, agonising from their wounds. Driver Lay could never erase the memory of what he had seen when they arrived at the Hospital there were very many injured men about and an 18 year old soldier, covered in blood, rushed forward to the doctor, calling, "Help me! Help me! Help me!" and the doctor insisted he go back to his position and wait his turn. He did, and dropped dead! After witnessing this act, and the many injured, much to the dismay of the medical team, Driver Lay refused anaesthetic while receiving his treatment to remove shrapnel and repair the injuries to his throat and lips, feeling there were more deserving than himself.

After miraculously surviving his ordeal, Driver Lay became known as "Lucky Jack", even though on that day, he had worked the shift for someone else! Unfortunately, luck was not with him when it was learned that his brother was in a British Hospital close by, for when he went to visit him, his brother had been

A modern take on etiquette



According to the dictionary etiquette is defined as conventional requirements as to social behaviour; proprieties of conduct as established in any class or community or for any occasion. Whereas manners are defined as ways of behaving with reference to polite standards.

There are differing opinions on appropriate behaviour expected these days and if you look on any of the social media pages and blogs devoted to raising children there are many and varied schools of thought. From table manners and the simple please and thank you to the basic tenets of respect for others and their property you can find an opinion on everything if you look hard enough.

While not judging anyone in their individual parenting style and noting there is no such thing as perfect parenting, it is apparent there is a perception that basic manners are not being taught these days.

We have all heard the expression 'children should be seen and not heard' and it is generally held that this is rather extreme in this day and age, but where do we draw the line on what behaviour is and is not acceptable from our children?

LED Light Bar For Use As Additional Lamps

A requirement still exists in WA for additional headlights to be fitted in pairs. This would prohibit the fitting of a LED Light Bar in Western Australia. However, the Chief Executive Officer of the Department of Transport has issued an exemption which provides for the lawful fitment of LED light bars from 8 August 2015 and will be valid for a period of three years. HOWEVER – please be advised that the fitting of a LED Light Bar will be subject to conditions as stipulated below.

Definitions:

LED light bar: means a lamp which contains multiple LED light sources in one or more rows.

Motor vehicle: means a motor vehicle that has four or more wheels.

Conditions:

The exemption is subject to compliance with the following conditions:

- § The LED light bar(s) must be installed at the front of the vehicle and not higher than the front edge of the bonnet.
- § The LED light bar(s) must be installed horizontally and located symmetrically about the longitudinal centre line of the vehicle.
- § The LED light bar(s) must be forward facing and positioned in a way that the light produced does not cause the driver of the vehicle discomfort, either directly or by reflection while in the normal driving position.
- § The LED light bar(s) must only operate when the highbeam headlights are in operation and must automatically turn off when the high-beam headlights are turned off. Last updated 6 August 2015
- § A manual switch must be provided to allow the LED light bar to be deactivated, so that it is not on whether the high beam is on or off. This switch must be accessible to the driver of the vehicle from the normal driving position.
- § The LED light bar(s) must only emit white light.
- § The LED light bar(s) shall not obstruct the driver's view of the roadway more than 11 metres ahead of the driver's eye position when looking through the windscreen, with the driver's seat in the rearmost position.


§ One or more (to a maximum of four) LED light bars may be fitted as additional driving lamps.

Waldron Supportive of Local Fire Awareness Day For Women

Member for Wagin Terry Waldron MLA has praised the organisers of a fire safety day for women, to be held in Woodanilling this month.

Local woman Tracey Kippin initiated the women's fire awareness day, as she felt women needed to be better informed about active preparation and participation either at the fire site or supporting from home.

Mrs Kippin says "women are often left on the property during a fire, while the men are out fighting it".

The fire awareness day will be held from 9am to 3pm on Wednesday 16th September at the Woodanilling Sports Pavilion. Pertinent questions will be answered, such as - What is the first aid treatment for smoke inhalation?

Mr Waldron continues to be very supportive of preventative and safety bushfire measures like these.

He recently welcomed the announcement of a review by the State Emergency Management Committee, in the wake of the major Boddington and Northcliffe fires.

Mr Waldron said speakers at the women's fire awareness day included representatives from the

Department of Fire and Emergency Services, St John Ambulance and the weather bureau. "One of the sessions will focus on first aid for burns, smoke inhalation and other injuries," he said.

A woman who suffered burns in 2014 will also speak to attendees about her experiences, treatment and recovery process.

Mr Waldron is pleased discussions will also include whether 'to stay or to go', and that it was recognised that a plan must be in place prior to the arrival of a bushfire.

"I'd like to remind locals that with hotter weather on its way, now is the time to ask yourself if you are bushfire ready," he said.

The search for a replacement Doctor continues, the Shire has initiated advertising through Rural

Health West. At a special meeting held during August, Council agreed to engage First Health to provide interim practice management and locum services to ensure continuity of medical services to our communities.

The August Ordinary Meeting of Council was held in Lake King on Wednesday 26 August 2015. Nine Lake King community members were present at the meeting to update Councillors on community projects. Lake King Progress Association members talked to Council about their plans for an all weather patio extension to the Lake King Sports Pavilion for which they are seeking funding. The Lake King Playgroup expressed their keen interest to progress plans for a nature playground to be established adjacent to the Lake King Hall and a question was asked regarding drainage at the Lake King Netball courts.

The meeting was adjourned to give Councillors the opportunity to go and look at the Lake King Sports Pavilion facility first hand. The pavilion was built in the early 1970's and is in need of maintenance to enable the provision of a suitable sports facility for the coming generation.



Following afternoon tea, well catered for by the Lake King P&C, the meeting was re-convened and the following items of business considered:

Tenders were awarded for the supply and lay of bitumen & aggregate to Fyfe Transport and COLAS Pty Ltd; and to GS Hobbs Contracting for the reconstruction of 18.9kms of rural roads.

Conditional planning approval was granted to Ben and Annie Argent for their proposed mobile welding business to be carried out from their home at Lot 219 Stubbs St Lake Grace and for construction of a new storage shed. The approval, originally granted in December 2014 was subject to additional plans being submitted and the access way being approved by Main Roads WA at that time. These conditions have now been met and Council is pleased to have been able to support this new business through approving a variation through its Local Planning Scheme.

Reserve 29080, Newdegate is the preferred site for the construction of a new doppler weather radar being proposed by the Department of Agriculture and Food WA in association with the Bureau of Meteorology. The proposed site will require cancellation, excision, relinquishing and re-vesting of a relevant portion of Reserve 29080 to the Department of Agriculture and Food WA. Council supported the proposal subject to CBH's written agreement to modify their current licence with the Shire on land currently used for temporary grain storage.

An application for a Traders Permit from Westcoast Seafoods was approved for the sale and delivery of preordered goods to Lake Grace and Newdegate on a monthly basis.

The list of accounts paid by the Shire for the month of July, totalling \$660,068.23 was ratified.

Unbudgeted expenditure was approved being \$22,000 (ex GST) for the purchase of a reel mower for the Newdegate Sports Grounds to be funded through the Newdegate SAR.

Council gave its support to the re-naming of the section of Kent Road, commencing at the northern most intersection on North Burngup Road travelling approximately 8km south to Holme Road to Crook Road. A letter has been forwarded to the Geographic Names Committee for its determination.

Council agreed to support the proposal from the Department of Parks and Wildlife to have Reserve 34213 set aside as a 'Conservation Park' vested in the Conservation Commission of WA for the purpose of tourism, recreation and water. Reserve 34213. Located on the western side of Fence Road Lake Camm is managed by the Department of Water. In mid 2011 the Department of Water identified the reserve as surplus to its requirements.

A report regarding the WALGA Governance Review Paper was acknowledged and received by Council.

Council considered options for the location of the next three over 55's units to be constructed in Lake Grace with Lot 107 Bennett St Lake Grace being endorsed as the preferred site. Nominations for the 2015 Local Government Elections close at 4.00 pm this Thursday 10th September 2015. The nomination process is being run by Returning Officer, Mr Terry Gladish. We wish those of you who have nominated for the 4 vacant Council positions for the Shire of Lake Grace, all the best for the October elections.

The October meeting of Council is scheduled to be held on 21 October 2015 and includes a swearing in ceremony for those four newly elected Councillors (being one Lake Grace Ward and three Rural Ward) together with a ballot for President and Deputy President for a two year term.

discharged a short time earlier. During a period of convalescence, he was given wonderful care by people of a village in Belgium called HANZINELLE.

On the 11th of December 1917, he was able to rejoin his unit, and well into the next year, he was granted three weeks leave to the United Kingdom. When he rejoined his unit in France, the war was soon to end. However, it was the 24th of February 1919, before they were able to return to England, and the 12th of May 1919 before Driver Lay was able to embark the *Soudan* at Devonport for the return trip to Fremantle. He received the British War Medal, the 1914/15 STAR, and the Victory medal, and gave his religion as Church of England.

Driver Jack Lay came to Lake Grace from England about mid 1912. Legend has it that he went to the port to catch the "next ship" – it was the *Australind*, which brought him to Western Australia, while later research found his name on the passenger list of the ill fated Titanic! After the War he returned to Lake Grace where he had taken up land, and became a very dedicated and successful farmer. He named his farm HANZINELLE, in memory of the people of that village in Belgium while convalescing during the War. It has been estimated that he has left almost 300

descendants, many of whom remain in our district, and he would often tell his grandchildren stories of his memories of the War, and they can now relate some of his many experiences of driving his horses through gunfire, and of the bullets and shells that whistled past in the course of his duties! Family also believe that he is pictured on the well published photo of the 800 plus soldiers, from the 11th Reinforcements in front of a Pyramid in Egypt.

Vegetarian Mexican Lasagne

1 tablespoon olive oil
1 onion, chopped
1 red capsicum, chopped
1 zucchini, chopped
2 cloves garlic, crushed
500g jar pasta sauce
35g sachet taco seasoning
420g can kidney beans, drained and rinsed
310g can corn kernels, drained
5 tortillas
3/4 cup tasty cheese, grated
Salad, to serve

- Preheat oven to hot, 200C.
- Heat 1 tablespoon oil in a large frying pan on high. Sauté onion, red capsicum, zucchini and crushed garlic for 4-5 minutes, until tender.
- Stir in pasta sauce and taco seasoning. Bring to boil on high. Reduce heat to low and simmer for 8-10 minutes until thickened slightly.
- Stir in kidney beans and a corn kernels. Simmer for 4-5 minutes.
- Lightly grease a round 20-22cm casserole dish. Place a tortilla as base on prepared dish (should be the same size as the tortilla). Spoon one-fifth of the bean mixture over. Cover with a second tortilla. Repeat 3 more times, finishing with a tortilla.
- Sprinkle tasty cheese over. Bake for 15-20 minutes until golden and cheese has melted. Cut into wedges. Serve with salad.

Always reliable, Abbey directed the play in Centre and somehow managed to run and stay strong in all 4 quarters. Coach Wendy is very proud of all the girls.


The final score was 41-33. Coaches award and BOG went to all 10 players.


