Lake Grace Canola Trial Contaminated with GM Crop

In possibly Australia's worst GM contamination, trace levels of Monsanto's genetically modified canola has been found growing among non-GM canola at Lake Grace.

The contamination, at trial sites at Lake Grace and Cranbrook, was discovered in samples tested by the Victorian Department of Primary Industry in National Variety Trials (NVT). Similar incidents have been reported in other canola-growing States – Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania. The trials are being conducted by the Federal Government's Grains Research Development Corporation, which is doing another 33 similar trials in four other States. There are two canola National Variety Trials trial sites in WA.

The detected GM level was 0.04 per cent. WAFarmers president Trevor De Landgraft said the contamination endangered WA's clean, green image and might endanger its non-GM status in overseas markets. "It is a real concern that the contamination levels are only half a per cent under tolerance levels accepted overseas," Mr De Landgraft said. "But I think what this case shows, is that there is a trace of GM canola in WA's crop."

Agriculture Minister Kim Chance called on GM companies to take greater care and responsibility for their product or face clean up costs in Western Australia. "Regrettably, the GM companies appear unable to contain their product within the laboratory, or within Office of Gene Technology Regulator (OGTR) trial sites, and they appear unable or unwilling to respect WA's moratorium, or those in place in other Australian jurisdictions," Mr Chance said.

Although the Office of the Gene Technology Regulator (the national regulator of gene technology) approved the release of GM canola in 2003, the states are also permitted to regulate gene technology under their own laws and all Australian states where canola is grown have placed moratoriums on GM crops. While Lake Grace Shire Council has voted to keep the Shire GM free, any legislative power rests with the Western Australian government.

Julie Newman, spokesperson for the Network of Concerned Farmers, said the latest contamination highlighted GM companies' negligence, and that they should be liable for any costs farmers incurred. "Who pays for any economic loss caused by this contamination is a key issue," said Mrs Newman. "Farmers are signing CBH dockets that say there is no GM grain in their consignment and they will indemnify CBH if this grain causes any

contamination. Farmers will ultimately pay and this has to be addressed – strict liability legislation is absolutely critical," she said.

Such legislation will be discussed next month at a meeting of the Federal and State Agricultural ministers. "I shall be raising the issue of GM contamination and the need for strict liability legislation as a matter of urgency at the next meeting of the Primary Industry Ministerial Council," said Mr Chance.

"I will be seeking urgent advice from the Department of Agriculture on the necessary means to ensure that such events do not recur in WA while our moratorium is in place."

Mr Chance said the contaminated trial sites were now being treated as GM sites and would be managed in accordance with established and approved protocols. All grain harvested from the sites once the trials are completed would be destroyed, the sites would then be monitored and any volunteer canola plants that germinate would be destroyed before they could flower.

The grape vines are now at the bud burst



Wheatbelt Cultural Forum

Thirty-four artists and arts workers from nine different towns headed off to Moora last fortnight for the second Wheatbelt Cultural Forum. Hosted by Moora Fine Arts Society, the day's activities gave us an opportunity to meet and mix and discuss many things. The Lake Grace contingent of Kerrie Argent, Catherine Hendry, Michelle Slarke and Tania Spencer enjoyed swapping ideas, picking up practical hints and putting names to faces. The forum featured a great line-up of Wheatbelt speakers, town tour, creative workshop, (run by Tania and Kerrie) and social interaction. The group clearly identified that an annual face-to-face gathering for Wheatbelt people associated with culture and the arts was absolutely essential. We also wish to connect more regularly with artists from neighbouring towns.

We discussed the Wheatbelt Cultural Network E-Group as another way of maintaining the culture connection within the region. This was set up at the beginning of the year and some people have made excellent use of this. The more people in the e-group the more effective it will be, the wider the net will reach. Some interesting facts from various reports given at the September Development Association meeting include:

The **Station Masters House** is now open to Tourists and training will be organised for the volunteers, 10th October and 14th November between 2-3pm. The committee thought it better to have the Visitors Centre open as soon as possible. Local arts and crafts will be able to be on display and for sale. All interested in volunteering a few hours to contact Michelle Slarke or Mary Naisbitt or place name on roster in Visitors Centre. The official opening is to be held in October and plans are underway to celebrate the completion of this project and the Town Clock and mosaic project.

Plans are being discussed re **street furniture**, new planter boxes and replacing some of the plants in the main street.

Roadwise have a banner competition (see last Lakes Link for details) and Elizabeth Trevenen has completed a child safety car restraint course.

Local residents raised concerns about the physical condition of our **local hospital**. 

NIGHT WATCH

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 23rd September, to midnight Friday 7th October. Astronomy is looking up. Remember to never look at the Sun with the unprotected eye or with an optical instrument without the proper solar filters. You may suffer permanent eye damage.

This fortnight on the 4th, 5th and 6th, Mercury, Jupiter and the star Spica start in a straight line, the Moon is close on the 6th of October.

Our local star, the Sun, resides in the constellation of Virgo all fortnight at Magnitude -26.72.

The last quarter moon will be at 2:31pm on Sunday 25th at Magnitude -6.0. On Wednesday 28th, the Moon will be at Apogee (furthest), at 405,308 kilometres from Earth at 11pm. The new Moon will be at 6:18pm on Monday 3rd October. The Moon is in Taurus on 24th and 25th, Auriga on 26th, Gemini on 27th, Cancer on 28th and 29th, Leo on 30th, 1st and 2nd October, Virgo on 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th, Libra on 7th.

Mercury in Virgo, sets at 6:26pm on Saturday in the bright evening twilight, and will be to close to the Sun to see. On Tuesday 4th October, Mercury, sets at 7:06pm at 0.7° north of the Moon, and 2° north of the bright star Spica, and on Thursday 6th will be 1.5° south of Jupiter and shines at magnitude -0.6. Mercury sets at 7:17pm on Friday 7th.

Venus in Virgo on Saturday sets at 9:29pm, shines at magnitude -4.2. On Friday 7th at -4.3 magnitude, Venus sets at 9:51pm, 1.4 degrees north of the Moon (thumb at arms length).

In Aries, the red planet Mars, rises on Saturday evening at 8:40pm, shining at a bright -1.7 magnitude. On Monday 26th, Mars rises in Taurus at 8:33pm, and on Friday 7th October Mars rises at 7:49pm.

The giant gas planet Jupiter, sets on Saturday evening at 7:43pm at -1.5 magnitude. Jupiter on Wednesday 28th, will be 3.1° north of the bright star Spica. On Wednesday 5th of October Jupiter will be 2° north of the Moon and 1.9° south of Mercury

(thumb at arms length). Jupiter will only be 1.5° north of Mercury on Thursday 6th at -1.7 magnitude and sets at 7:05pm on Friday 7th.

The ringed planet Saturn, in Cancer, rises on Saturday morning at 3:24am, shining at +0.3 magnitude. On Wednesday 28th, Saturn will be 5° south of the Moon (three fingers at arms length) and will rise at 2:37am on Friday October 7th.

The blue/green coloured planet Uranus at +5.7 magnitude in Aquarius sets at 5:01am on Saturday morning and at 4:09am on the 7th October and is near the 4th magnitude star Lambda Aquarii.

The grey/green coloured planet Neptune, close to the 4th magnitude star Theta Capricorni, sets on Saturday morning at 3:51am, shines at +7.9 magnitude, and sets at 3am on Friday 7th.

Pluto, in Serpens Caput, sets at 12:05am on Saturday and at 11:11pm on Friday October 7th at +13.9 magnitude.

With the Moon out of the night sky you should be able to make out the two small irregular galaxies, the large and small Magellanic Clouds in the south east. Both can easily be seen with the unaided eye with the small cloud at magnitude +2.2 and 210,000 light years away and the large cloud at +0.1 magnitude and 180,000 light years away. In the large cloud resides the large Tarantula Nebula, shaped like a spiders web. Close to the small cloud is the large globular star cluster, 47 Tucanae, with a million stars in a small circle at 15,000 light years away.

High above, slightly to the north east, you should also make out the shape of the Constellation of Capricornus, which is shaped like a large boomerang. To the east of that you can make out Aquarius, with lines of stars running south from four bright stars almost in line.

Coming up on Wednesday 28th of September RAIN will be hosting their annual field day at **Owen and Terri Brownley’s property, Mt Madden.**

The field day will be held on RAIN’s Research and Development site. The site features a current project, **“Soil Health and Precision Agriculture”**. With an aim to demonstrate the long term effect of Organic residue retention in a continuous cropping system, along with the role of precision technology in protecting and improving the condition of land resources.

There will be a superior line up of fantastic speakers, beginning with Dr. Daniel Murphy from **the School of the Earth and Geographical Sciences at UWA**. Dr. Murphy is familiar with RAIN’s current project and is currently analyzing samples on the site. Presenting along side of Dr. Murphy will be Frances Hoyle, also from UWA. Frances has conducted a number of studies in the past on Stubble retention.

From CSIRO Dr. Margaret Roper will be presenting her findings on the **Impact of Farming Systems including Tillage practices on Organic matter and Microbiology of Soils**. Dr. Roper’s presentations will be based on results from this site from previous samples.

Silverfox will be represented by Ian Maling. Silverfox provides a number of Ag Services including Biomass Analysis, Header Yield Analysis and Digital Farm Plans. Ian will be illustrating their Variable Rate Technology. This involves analyzing biomass/header data to determine **“Management Zones”**.

After spending the morning in the Marquee the afternoon will mean stretching those legs, and walking through each trial with a short description on each. SEPWA have in Wheat and Barley Variety trials, Dr. Mohammad Amjad from (DAWA) Esperance and Alaina Garthwaite (DAWA) from Albany will detail these selections. The National Pea Breeding trials are focused on semi-leafless dun-types, with better standing ability and non shattering pods similar to Kaspas. Jeremy Lemon from DAWA in Esperance has a trial in place to demonstrate the importance of **Adequate Nitrogen Nutrition to achieve desired protein Levels**. Summit’ Fertilizers’s goal is to explore the uptake and availability on Nitrogen from two product types at different application timings in a wheat plant. Barley variety competitiveness with Ryegrass and weed competition **as affected by Barley’s plant shape and row spacing are two trials in place by Blakely Paynter and Alaina Garthwaite.**

The day will start with an all important **“Cuppa”** at 9.30am, and lunch will be on BYO basis. There will be an opportunity to converse with Researches, speakers, sponsors and farmers at the end of the day where a BBQ and light refreshments will be supplied through Summit **Fertilizers and Steve Tilbrook’s CBH Directors funds.**

Roma's Ride

It was Pauline Taylors dream to raise awareness and collect donations for breast cancer, the illness that claimed the life of Ross's sister Roma Bairstow in 2003. She combined ten hard working support crew, a couple of effervescent spokespeople and four horsewomen to ride a relay from Perth to Kalgoorlie. This is our story.

Thursday - we all made our way to a lovely little B & B called Picture Perfect just down the hill from Yule Do service station. Once horse yards were made Lauren and I saddled up and went for a ride in the pouring rain to take some sting out of them as we hadn't ridden for three days. It was great exposing them to rain, kangaroos and traffic. That evening a local family put on a BBQ and told us of the plans for Friday.

Friday – All of us riders saddled up and went for an early morning ride. The horses Ellie, Stanley, Doc and Reynard, although fresh, were well behaved.

Floating in we arrived at McCallum Park, not far from the Burswood, and set up the horses in their yards. Purple bra's were everywhere - on the yards, floats, vehicles and people. The police didn't arrive to give us an escort out of the city so we floated up to our next reception at Northam. I for one was not upset about that.

The reception at Northam was fantastic we were greeted at the hospital by the staff and a group of cancer survivors put on a lovely afternoon tea and made generous donations. Then it was off through town to the Northam show, our band of tin rattlers did really well from the lovely people on the street. It was nearly dark when we attended our final reception for the day at the show itself. The horses did well, bless them, but the lights, speakers and noise from sideshow alley was too much for country nags.

We stayed that night with Geoff and Alison Fosberry, they were terrific hosts, hence it was a late night! One of our party, who shall remain nameless, went to brush her teeth, emerging from the bathroom with a dreadful frothing mouth, making frantic illegible sounds, having

mistakenly put arthritis cream instead of toothpaste on her brush! This caused endless laughter and comments as you can imagine!

Wednesday – A longer ride this time into Merredin. Arriving around lunchtime we firstly had a photo shoot for the local paper, before spending sometime on the main street, then visiting two schools. It was here that the Lions club put on a meal and a very entertaining evening which involved people being fined for various things – of course one of our support crew was fined for not knowing the difference between toothpaste and arthritis cream!

We stayed this night in the Merredin high school gym, most of us very comfortable in our swags. This was the first time many of us had used our swags, and even though it had only rained on Thursday, that had been enough, if you're bedding was in the wrong place on the trailer. One support member was heard to say that she had a wet bed. This again was cause for laughter!!

Jenny and Jane were in the money backing a horse called Barry Brock, Barry is the name of Ross's mate who came along to help - we thought it a good omen. Like his namesake Barry didn't let us down.

Saturday – The last leg into Kalgoolie. It was a windy day - we unloaded the horses at the ABC in Kal, and walked up the main street. It was in the square that the lovely banner created by Kelly Gooch and signed by those who helped us along the way was presented to Muzzo Bairstow. The support crew then went tin rattling outside the races, while we took the horses back to Coolgardie. This is where our only horse injury happened. "Stanley" banged his head creating a pretty big wound on his forehead that required stitching. That night a car load of the purple bra brigade set off to do a pub crawl in Kalgoolie, while Coolgardie put on a country and western to entertain the rest.

Sunday – Our final day. Coolgardie show - the support crew set up a stall and set to work selling tee-shirts etc. The place was really humming we walked in and Pauline cut the banner. This signaled the end of the ride a great adventure we were all proud to be part of

VP Day Archives

Children's Medals School Presentations

Broadcast by the Premier.

Well-rehearsed and expectant, 120 members of the Perth Girls School choir assembled in the main studio of station 6WF yesterday afternoon for the special Victory Day broadcast and the symbolic presentation of a Victory Day medal by the Premier (Mr. Wise) to the head girl of the school. During the broadcast the choir, under the baton of its conductress, Miss Merle Jones, sang as part songs, "Prayer of Thanksgiving," "Land of Hope and Glory," "There's a Land—Dear Land," "The Song of Australia" and the National Anthem. The Supervisor of School Broadcasts (Miss K. Kinnane) and the Superintendent of Music in State Schools (Mr. O.G. Campbell Egan) assisted in the broadcast.

"Today and on Monday we celebrate the great victory won by the United Nations over our enemies after long and weary years of war," said the Premier in his broadcast to schools. "It is first and foremost an occasion for rejoicing and thanksgiving; it is also an occasion when we must stop and think of what this victory really means."

"We must remember first of all the great cost at which it has been won and the great sacrifices which made it possible," continued Mr Wise. "We who will enjoy the benefits of victory owe to those who made it possible, a debt we can never fully repay. In Australia some of our small towns were bombed, but we were spared the terrors which Britain suffered. We have to thank the fighting forces of our own nation and those of the British Empire, the United States of America and our other Allies for being saved these terrible trials."

Mr. Wise said that peace and victory were largely the result of service to the cause, service to the country, the community, to one another. The lesson we must learn was the value of united effort. We all had a great responsibility before us to ensure that the peace won at such great cost must be worth while, and to make the victory worthy of those who won it for us.

"The medals which are about to be presented should be treasured not only as a symbol of a glorious victory, but also as an inspiration to service and effort," said the Premier.

Asking the head girl of Perth Girls School (Margaret Hemery) to step forward, Mr. O.G. Campbell Egan said she was receiving a Victory Medal on behalf of the boy's and girls of Western Australia, and particularly the correspondence pupils, who were asked to pin their medals on at that time.

In the Schools.

In common with other schools throughout the state, pupils of the Claremont State School were assembled to hear the broadcast. The headmaster (Mr. A.R. Morrison) explained the symbolism of the Victory Medal and the meaning of democracy and allegiance to the King. As the choir sang "There's a Land—Dear Land," a representative of each class was presented with a Victory medal by the headmaster. Explaining to the children what England had fought for, he said that at one time she stood alone and later stood side by side with America in protecting the Four Freedoms—freedom of speech, freedom of religion, freedom from fear and freedom from want. They were vividly illustrated on four posters which had been presented to the school by the American Consul. When one pupil was asked why America intended to conduct atomic bomb tests in the Pacific he replied: "For the use of mankind." The headmaster commented that no better reply could have been given. After singing hymns the children marched off to their schoolrooms while they each received a Victory Medal. Apart from the youthful exuberance displayed at the thought of a holiday, the children appeared to have been impressed both by the broadcast and what had been told to them of the significance of Victory Day.

SCIENCE AND STUFF

HIDDEN VIRTUE of OLIVE OIL:

Extra-virgin olive oil has a similar anti-inflammatory effect to ibuprofen. That may help explain why the Mediterranean diet, rich in olive oil, protects against heart disease, cancer and Alzheimer's disease. Scientists have discovered that olive oil contains the compound oleo canthal which, like ibuprofen, turns out to be a COX-1 and COX-2 inhibitor. Structurally it's not similar, but pharmacologically it's very similar. About 50 millilitres of olive oil a day effectively amounts to a low-dose anti-inflammatory. (Nature, vol 437, p45).

SOIL JUST GOT A LOT BUGGIER:

The earth beneath our feet may be teeming with 100 times as many bacteria as we thought. One gram of dirt can harbour a million microbial species, according to a re-analysis of DNA data. Measuring the bacterial biodiversity of soil is difficult because only a few species can be cultured for testing in the lab. Biologists therefore have to estimate biodiversity using a technique called DNA re-association. This involves unzipping the two strands of every bacterial genome in a sample, mixing them up and timing how long they take to rejoin. If all the DNA strands were the same, they would find matching partners very quickly. The more diverse the DNA strands, the longer they take to pair up. In the late 1990's, researchers using this technique estimated that a gram of dirt contained around 16,000 species. But this assumed that the populations of all the different species were roughly equal in size. Biologists re-analysed the data using different assumptions about population sizes. They found that the most probable distribution was one with a few very common species, but lots of rare species so many in fact, that their estimate of bacterial biodiversity hit one million species per gram of soil. (Science, vol 309, p 1387).

EARTH'S INNER SPIN:

Earthquake records have revealed that Earth's inner core is rotating far faster than the rest of the planet. A seismologist has examined the historical records of 18 pairs of earthquakes from around the South Sandwich Islands in the South Atlantic. The quakes that made up each pair originated at exactly the same location, anything from a few days to 34 years apart. When studied, the time taken for seismic waves to reach a monitoring station in Alaska he found that if the earthquakes in a pair occurred more than four years apart, the waves that travelled through the inner core

reached Alaska, more quickly after the second quake than the first. By contrast, the waves that avoided the inner core, and only passed through the outer core, showed no such differences in travel times. The differences were attributed to rotation of the inner core which resulted in the waves



from the second quake travelling through a slightly different patch of the inner core than the first. It was calculated that the inner core was rotating at 0.3 to 0.5 degrees per year relative to the mantle and crust, and should complete one extra revolution over the next 900 years. (Science, vol 309, p 1357).



DIRECT FROM THE MASTER:

An original manuscript by Albert Einstein has been found by a student in the Netherlands. Rowdy Boeyink discovered the 16 page document, dated 1924, among papers that belonged to one of Einstein's friends. It describes the exotic state of matter now known as a Bose-Einstein condensate, which Einstein was working on at the time with the Indian physicist Satyendra Nath Bose.

CLONES GO WILD:

For the first time, cloned individuals of a wild species, the African Wildcat (*Felis lybica*), have bred with each other. A male and two females produced eight kittens in New Orleans. Researchers hope this achievement will aid captive breeding programmes for much rarer species. African Wildcats are thought to be the ancestors of domestic cats.

BLOOD TEST FOR BSE:

Misshapen prion proteins, which cause degenerative brain disease such as BSE in cows and Creutzfeldt-Jakob disease in humans, can now be detected in blood. The technique could allow contaminated blood donations to be intercepted and enable diagnosis in cattle before they develop symptoms. (Nature Medicine, DOI:10.1038/nm1286)



SUPER BUG KILLER:

A new weapon against the drug-resistant "super bug" MRSA was unveiled in Washington this month. The drug gets inside bacteria by mimicking a component of their cell walls and then deactivates an enzyme that usually protects the microbes, triggering a deadly chain of events.

SIGN'S:

A sign spotted on the A1 road near Harrogate in the UK tells drivers to "follow the existing signs to Wetherby". Wonder how many drivers disobey this instructions and follow the signs that don't exist.

Road safety not a priority for MacTiernan

Liberal member pushes for works on important trade and tourist road

Liberal Member for Roe Dr Graham Jacobs is disappointed over the State Government's lack of commitment to improving safety along Chester Pass Road, Borden to Albany, through the Stirling Ranges.

Dr Jacobs raised the matter in parliament on Thursday, August 25, outlining concerns over the 120-kilometre stretch of road between Borden and Albany.

The stretch has no gravel shoulder on either side of the road and road train trailers often run into the gutter causing a hazard for motorists.

"The section of particular concern is the northern third of the road which includes the section through the Stirling Ranges National Park which is one of the state's great tourist attractions," Dr Jacobs said.

"The minister has not treated this situation with the seriousness it deserves."

"The road was built 40 years ago for eight-tonne trucks, nowadays with the 36.5 metre road trains which regularly use this road it's past its use by date in terms of safety aspects."

In the past five years there have been 32 crashes on the road of which three were fatals, five required hospitalisation and six needed medical treatment.

Dr Jacobs also drew the minister's attention to three danger sections of the road, the Tilbenup (12 kilometres south of the Stirling Range roadhouse), the woolshed corner and the intersection of Salt River and Borden-Albany Roads.

"Despite this, Alannah MacTiernan has dismissed the importance of this work being done as soon as possible saying, it was not a high priority, despite the crash rate," Dr Jacobs said.

"The Stirling Ranges are a tourist attraction and this road in this condition with tourist and trucks could be a potentially disastrous combination."

"A tourist passenger vehicle may end up in the gutter, and there is also a potential for a car versus road train incident."

"There is a lot of bleating about roads, this is an important trade route that carries 10 percent of Australia's wheat crop. No alternative route is available."

"There needs to be a priority plan to build some shoulders on this road, particularly on its northern third to attend to the three danger sections and perhaps to provide passing lanes and passenger lanes."





Junior coach Gary Frost said, "As the Junior Captain of our Club Rebecca's ongoing determination to succeed and positive attitude towards the game is exceptional. She is a fine example to all our juniors as to what can be achieved through perseverance and hard work."

Following its inception in 1983, the Lake Grace Junior Golf Club had a brief hiatus in the late 80's and also in the early 1990's. A suggestion was made at senior Club level in mid 1995 that a coaching course with the Graham Marsh Foundation be arranged, with senior players learning specifically how to coach children. Junior golf would have the threefold effect of attracting new members to the sport, give players the opportunity

to learn when they are at their most malleable, and provide Lake Grace children with another sporting outlet.

From 1996 the Junior Golf Club went from strength to strength under the guidance of Gary Frost, with assistance from Wayne Milton in the earlier years and Chris Carruthers in the latter years. A solid membership of between twenty and thirty children has been maintained, with a very well attended Talent Identification Clinic run every July school holidays by state level coaches from the Graham Marsh Foundation.

Lake Grace Junior Golf Club has a bright future with continued generous sponsorship from local business, hard work from those that volunteer their time, and the junior players that continue to turn up each week.

The handicapper will be worn out (well he is getting on) after he pays a visit to all those who had good scores. Nice to see Stuart continuing to


play, the trees are nervous but we all enjoy his company.
