# **Kerrie Weaves Some Magic**

Kerrie Argent recently had a four day residency at Houghtons Winery and Gallery in the Swan Valley. She was invited to create a sculpture from the grape vine pruning's.

Normally pruned by machine Houghton's had especially hand pruned a selection for Kerrie to work with. By doing this by hand the prunings were able to be a lot longer than normal, ideal for weaving.

With five big piles of prunings, Kerrie had plenty to work with. Set in picturesque environment Houghtons boasts a menu that includes café style, catered dining and also picnic baskets. The lush, green gardens are full of birds; restful in the mornings but busy with people as the day went on.

Kerrie had planned a large sculpture but with limited time to create the works settled for a more moderate size. With the help of daughter Jayne and others dropping in to help they were able to create ten burst grape sculptures, the largest being 156cm with other varying sizes.

Thursday they worked inside the gallery because of the weather; cold windy thunderstorms with a dash of hail!. The rest of the time they worked in the gardens so people could come and watch or have a go, which they

did. As the sculptures grew in numbers and size the visitors were interacting with those and photographing each other with the forms.

The Gallery has organised workshops before but Kerrie is sure this is the first artist in residence using their vine prunings.

The sculptures will remain at Houghtons and be installed in their garden landscape, which is lovely.

# McGowan Labels CRC Employees "Hacks"

The ignorance of Mark McGowan has again been laid bare after the Premier labelled Community Resource Centre employees "hacks" who did not earn their position

The Premier's comments came after The Nationals questioned his Government's decision to spend \$38,000 of taxpayer money on a report which concluded that CRCs were vital community infrastructure in regional WA.

"We do want to move away from the model the National Party had when they just put National Party hacks and friends into CRCs," the Premier said on Wednesday afternoon.

"You give a mate a job, you give a friend a job, you give the branch president's husband or wife a job in the CRC. That was the National Party model. We're going to move away from it being National Party placement zones."

The Nationals WA Leader Mia Davies said she was shocked and appalled at the Premier's unsubstantiated outburst.

She demanded an apology on behalf of the hundreds of CRC employees across the State.

"A few months ago the Premier caused great offence when he told Parliament that CRCs were redundant because everyone in the bush had a smartphone – now he has gone even further," Ms Davies said.

"Not only did the Premier label the hardworking and dedicated staff of our 105 Community Resource Centres 'hacks', he has insinuated that they had not secured their employment on merit alone.

"The Premier should apologise for these hurtful and offensive comments.


"As a Leader of the State he should know better."

Regional Development Minister Alannah MacTiernan later refused to back the Premier's comments.

"As Minister responsible for our regional communities I am calling on the Minister to denounce the Premier's dreadful comments," Ms Davies said.

"This is Ms MacTiernan's chance to show regional communities she cares.

"Ever since this Labor Government came to power CRCs and regional communities at large have been under constant attack – whether it be verbal barbs or funding cuts, it's clear that Labor hates the bush."



# "Barra 64" - A Northern Territory Fishing Experience

Getting away from the southern shivers is the wish of many folk during the cold winter months.

This very opportunity presented itself to my wife and I for a period three weeks, July into August when we visited family living in Humpty Doo. The Muntzs, comprising our daughter Emma, husband Steven and five year old grandson Alby, have a small holding there, where they live and run a business. With the weather being idyllic, there were no barriers to the range of activities we could undertake.

Many "Top Enders" are keen fishermen, our hosts being no exception. Owning a boat and a 4WD to tow it is almost mandatory equipment in the NT. Possessing both, Muntzy took us to the popular fishing spot known as Corroboree Billabong on the Mary River, about an hour's drive S-E of Darwin. The billabong in fact is a large water expanse which needs to be viewed from the air to fully appreciate its scale and make up.

From the boat ramp most fishermen travel several kilometres to their favourite trawling spots. Out on the water there are house boats to be seen, hired by groups for an overnight stay - or more.

Apart from the fishing there is much to see in the way of birdlife, crocodiles and native vegetation which consist mainly of pandanus, paperbark and lotus lilies. On either side of the water way is station country where cattle or buffalo can sometimes be seen in the distance.

On our first trip, our fishing lines weren't cast into the water until after midday. Steady trawling close to the river bank and especially near the lily pad fields is the normal procedure. Several small fish were caught at first. Glenda pulled in a cat fish and Alby a small barramundi, which Emma helped him pull in.

An hour and a half into the day's outing WHACK - a HIT! Arthur's line tightened, the rod bows dramatically, a fish leapt to the surface 35 metres from the boat then dived back under! The instruction from the skipper was

"KEEP THE LINE TIGHT, DON'T TRY TO PULL HIM IN TOO HARD".

Doing the right thing I gradually reeled the fish closer to the boat with great anticipation and hope, wondering whether the fish would stay hooked. The excitement was building and everyone was shouting their encouragement.

Finally the fish was in reach of the long handled scoop net. Steven reached out, gathering it up then landed the gyrating beauty into the boat. The Barramundi was sizable, with 55-90cm being the size range allowable to keep. Laying the fish over the measuring rule, stuck to the bottom of the boat Skipper Steve revealed the Barra was 64 centimeters long. "Great, we'll take this one home".

Barra 64 being the only REAL catch of the day was put on ice until our return home. Steven duly filleted by slicing the slabs of flesh from both sides from the backbone to the belly, close to the ribs.

Keeping on the job, he turned half into seasoned taco nuggets which was eaten as a main course while still fresh. The remainder was sliced into strips, smoked and eaten as snack food with evening drinks the following night. Both preparation techniques were employed to reduce the potential muddy taste of a fish caught from fresh waters.

Several days later, another fishing event was undertaken by Steven and friends from Corrigin WA on the Adelaide River where a good catch of saltwater mud crabs was brought in. There being enough for 12 people to engorge themselves with delight - and regret in one case.

If you are now thinking of taking a trip to Darwin next year to beat the cold weather and if you decide to go fishing on the rivers, remember to keep your limbs inside the rim of the boat, crocodiles are present in practically all waterways in the far north. Cheers!

### **NDIS Fake Calls**

Media Release - Scam Watch

Be aware of callers claiming to be from NDIS (National Disability Insurance Scheme).

If you are contacted by someone asking for personal information over the phone - be aware they may not be who they say they are.

These are phishing calls attempting to gain your:

- personal information
- bank details

They request personal information including date of birth and address of the person with the disability in the household. The next day they may call back asking for banking details.

NDIS will never request banking details over the phone.

As scammers are becoming cleverer, it is wise to check for an organisation's correct details by searching directories and checking the official website.

G'day all,

I have been off from work for a couple of weeks with a stubborn chest infection, but I'm back in the fray again and things have been getting a bit busier the last couple of weeks.

Firstly, our attention has been drawn to Newdegate again for a number of reasons not least the latest "wild west saloon brawl" at the Newdegate Pub. After the shenanigans of last summer, the pub installed some excellent CCTV in a number of locations in the pub and four or five people will be getting a date with a Magistrate courtesy of Lake Grace Police. Infringements have been handed out in recent times, however the nature of this incident means a court appearance is the only way to get the message into some rather thick heads. Another plonker decided to punch and smash the window of the pub so he is going to join the other idiots at court as well.

We have also been getting some helpful community information in relation to those persons driving cars around town with no number plates attached. It is pretty safe to assume that if there is no number plate then the car is probably unregistered as well so it shouldn't be on the road. We have directed more patrols that way and have dealt with one individual by way of court summons (incidentally seen by one of the officers from here off duty in Newdegate) for driving without a licence. As usual a photo or video clip is always helpful so keep it coming!

The school Principal and the team from the school have spoken to me about an incident that occurred over the school holidays recently. The incident itself was reported to Police, however we also just wanted to reiterate that no one is allowed on school grounds during the school holidays, other than authorised staff and contractors. The school has good security and there is usually someone around, but it isn't a public place and there isn't a right of access just because you attend the school or your kids do.

Which brings me neatly to a funny story about a similar issue. A few weeks ago I came to work to discover that Lake Grace Police station had been gifted a motorbike! No, we haven't been lucky enough to acquire a new "Scooter Pig" but in fact an unnamed person thought it would be ok to leave an abandoned motorbike in our back yard. No note was left or a phone call made to let us know a pile of junk was in our back yard. Not a dicky bird as they say. A bit of 'detective' work located the well-meaning miscreant and the offending bike was promptly removed. On a serious note, the Police Station is not public property (I thought that went without saying, but clearly not) and anyone discovered on our

grounds is liable to be charged with trespass. Of course visiting during working hours or knocking on the door is reasonable, but entering a gated compound is not.

Finally, it wouldn't be a newsletter without some sage traffic advice. Wear your seatbelts. There, I've said it. Need a reason why? It stops you from getting killed and getting a massive fine and demerit points. 

# **Know Your Rights When Goods are Faulty**

Shopping smart doesn't only mean bagging a great bargain but also applies to knowing your rights under the Australian Consumer Law, especially when it comes to refunds, repairs or replacements for faulty products because sometimes businesses get it wrong.

A nationwide Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) investigation recently resulted in 21 Australian Football League (AFL) and National Rugby League (NRL) clubs making changes to their returns and refunds policies in relation to merchandise sales

Like all consumers, if football fans buy a piece of merchandise that has a major failure then they are entitled to a choice of a refund or replacement. The ACCC's investigation showed that from at least April 2018, the 21 clubs made claims in their returns and refunds policies which were misleading.

These claims included that items must be unworn, purchased at full price and returned within a specified timeframe to qualify for a remedy. Some of the clubs also told consumers they had to provide the original proof of purchase when seeking a remedy.

In fact, the ACL does not mandate an original receipt be presented by consumers when exercising their rights. You need to prove the item was purchased from that business but if you don't have the cash register receipt

then you can show a credit card statement, a lay-by agreement, or even a confirmation or receipt number from a phone or online purchase.

Rights to a remedy are also not limited to a specific time period, nor are discounted items or used products excluded from the consumer law guarantees.

These guarantees include that items will be free from defects, fit for their intended purpose, match the description in any advertising and are safe to use. The type of remedy available will depend on the problem.

Under the ACL:

□ Retailers cannot refuse to give you a refund, repair or replacement for a faulty item because you bought the item on sale or at a clearance store, unless they brought the fault to your attention before you bought the item.

☐ Signs stating 'no refunds' or 'no refunds or exchanges on sale items' are misleading and unlawful, and do not alter your rights under the ACL for faulty products or prevent them from applying.

□ Retailers cannot restrict the period in which you can get a remedy for faulty products. You have a right to a remedy for a reasonable amount of time after buying the item. This period can last longer than any express warranty period given to you when you purchased the item.

But remember that retailers do not have to give you a refund, or exchange, or any other remedy if you have simply changed your mind about a purchase.

Our iShopWA app can help to keep you informed about your consumer rights. It puts all of the information at your fingertips plus it lets you store photos of receipts and set reminders to use gift cards before they expire.

The app is a free download from both the Apple store and Google Play.

# St John Ambulance WA Ltd - Lake Grace Sub Centre Annual Chairperson Report Summary

It is my pleasure to present the 72nd Annual Chairman's report for St John Ambulance - Lake Grace Sub Centre.

#### YEAR IN REVIEW

This year we saw a 10% decrease in total job load (inclusive of public duty), with our case load reaching 91 for the year. This figure is 38% less workload than our record year of 2015/16, and it is driven by decreased hospital statistics, including jobs being completed by other sub centres when Lake Grace could not supply a crew i.e. Narrogin and Kukerin.

Community Paramedic Earl Stamp became our 4th Community Paramedic in August of 2017 and his tenure finished in January of 2018. Murray Parker became our 5<sup>th</sup> Community Paramedic in April of 2018.

#### **BENEFIT FUND & GOVERNANCE**

Benefit membership as at the 30th June was 210 (down 36) financial members and 50 un-financial (up from 31) members. There were 115 families (down 24) and 84 singles (down 14) that were sent renewal notices.

The rates for 2018/19 are \$91 for families and \$55 for singles as set by St John Ambulance Western Australia Limited each year.

Over the last twelve months there have been 5 general meetings and one Annual General Meeting making us compliant with the guidelines of sub centre operations.

building is now completed and has had its 12-month inspection, all building accounts are now closed except for the Asset Management Fund where \$10k each year will be deposited into the account for long-term management of the building.

#### **Total Volunteer Numbers**

We currently have nine officers at Level 2 level (Jade Cameron, Paula Carruthers, Ross Chappell, Debrah Clarke, Christine Fyfe, Raymond Gosling, Grant Medlen, Amanda Milton, and Joseph Sousa). We currently have four Level 1 Officers in Mike Barnes, Lois Dickins, Keith Higgs and Graham Milton. We currently have one Senior First Aid Recruit in Annie Argent, and there are four members holding administration roles in Lauren Caffrey (Treasurer), Ollie Farrelly (First Aid Training Co-Ordinator), Helen Bennett (Facilities Manager) and Trish Medlen (Assistant Treasurer and Social Media Co-ordinator).

In summary, 14 active qualified officers, four administrative personnel for a total of 18 active volunteers (up two from 2016/18).

#### Job Numbers & Training

We have completed 91 ambulance jobs taking a total of 2821 hours to complete, which is 33% less job time than last year. 66 of these jobs were medical/ trauma or inter hospital transfers and there were 25 public duty events.

Of the 91 jobs in 2017/18, 20 jobs (down from 25) were trauma cases, 37 (down from 41) were medical cases, 9 (equal) were cardiac patients and 20 (down 6) were classed as other (event standbys, sporting events, etc).

There have been 724 hours of training this year over 26 separate training events with 185 attendances for an average attendance of 7.1 volunteers/ training session.

Working with WA Country Health Service and the Royal Flying Doctor, we continue to provide a service from the hospital to the airstrip and hospital to hospital. This service makes up 80% of our current work load (up significantly from 57% in 2015/16 and 67% in 2016/17).

There were 18 RFDS jobs in 2017/18 which is a decrease of 3 jobs from 2016/17

Transfers to WACHS facilities continues to fluctuate significantly from 48 transfers in 2015/16 to 23 transfers in 2016/17 and has bounced back to 33 transfers in 2017/18 (including transfers to Albany and Kondinin)

#### Response Times

Response times are measured from time of departing the depot to arriving on scene. The longer response time for Priority one jobs (lights and sirens) is directly related to some long transport times to Pingrup, Harrismith and Kulin to attend Priority 1 jobs.

#### First Aid Training

First aid training for 2017/18 continues to be coordinated by John Ambulance WA Ltd from the Northam Regional Office. We ran 5 courses for 46 students in 2017/18, and we plan to run 4 or 5 or Provide First Aid courses in 2018/19.

#### **Finances**

All figures quoted in this section are to the end of June 2018. The 2017/18 accounts were externally audited by St John Ambulance WA Ltd and passed.

#### Income Vs Expenditure

As at the 30/06/2018 the financial records system for the 2017/18 financial year recorded an income of \$101,499.04 and expenditure for the year of \$154,636.04 for a net loss of -\$53,137.00 for the year from the cashbook.

Donations of \$25,000 to the Newdegate Sub Centre and \$30,000 to the Dowerin Sub Centre for capital infrastructure contributed substantially to the loss.

Outstanding debtors as at the 30/06/2018 total \$409 with \$0 to become "debt not recovered". This is the lowest amount of carryover debtors ever and is a testament to the work that the Regional Finance team from Albany are doing with us to manage debt. In 2014 nearly \$17,000 was outstanding as at June 30.

#### **Vehicles**

We currently have one 2012 and one 2013 ambulances that were brought into service in Lake Grace in December 2017. These vehicles will be set for changeover in 2019/20.

#### Social Networking

This is our second year of using social media specifically Facebook. Our thanks to Trish Medlen for the administration of our Facebook page.

#### Priorities and Goals for the next year

- Finalise building outstanding items. i.e. installation of donor tree leaves and ground artwork.
- Investigate purchase of a Crash Kelly mannequin-Estimated \$20K
- Upgrade 19 lpad's. Estimated \$12K
- Recruit 4 more active volunteers and get them trained to Level 1 within 3 months of joining.
- More external interactive training sessions in and around town with other organisations.
- Host 4 to 5 First Aid Training Courses
- Host the Lake Grace and District Local Health Advisory Group (WACHS Committee) Meetings
- Investigate floor painting at the Patient Transfer Facility at the Airstrip.
- Continue to use Social Media to promote our actives to the wider community.

#### Closing

As I look back at nearly 15 years with St John Ambulance, I continue to be amazed at the rate of change in the organisation, and acknowledge the desperate need for even more change as we strive to deliver a premium service in a challenging volunteer environment.

The retirement of CEO Tony Ahern will not doubt lead to more change as Michelle Fyfe takes over the role as CEO of organisation later in the year.

Out thanks to the Staff of the Lake Grace Hospital, the various doctors we have worked with, the members of the Lake Grace DFES, and members of the Lake Grace Police Service, for the ongoing partnerships we share, and teamwork we rely on, to provide the best service possible in peoples' time of need.

The volunteer role with St John Ambulance is unique. Each experience changes us, and the fragility of the life is constantly reinforced.

In closing, this has been a year of settling and stability. A year to take stock of the last 7 years effort to achieve a new facility, and a year to catch our breath.

In this our 72nd year of service to our community, we are stronger, more focused, more skilled, more resourced than ever before. But we must always strive to be the best we can be.

As a sub centre we have gifted forward \$85,000 (GST return from our building) to three new projects (Newdegate, Dowerin and Cranbrook) to help them achieve their new/refurbished building needs in 2018. We also plan to assist Varley Sub Centre in 2018/19.

As a community should be very proud that the "internal

crowd funding through the St John Family" model that Lake Grace started, is gaining momentum in the organisation, and that volunteer facilities are being upgraded around the state at an unprecedented rate because of that.

As change is inevitable, a healthy sub centre needs a change of leadership from time to time, and now it is time for someone else to drive the sub centre with new ideas, and to put their own brand of leadership on this team

# **Understanding Retirement Village Contracts**

Thinking of moving into a retirement village? Before you sign on the dotted line, make sure you understand matters set out in the contract. Much of the detail about how a village is managed and run is contained in the residence contract – and they can vary greatly.

Also be aware that there are three common options for retirement living - retirement villages, residential parks and strata title units. Even though they may have similar sounding names each of these options is classed differently and come under different laws.

When it comes to retirement villages in Western Australia the majority are lease villages, meaning residents never own the premises but simply purchase a lease granting them the right to live there. Finding out if you will be a **lease owner** or **owner resident** is important as it will affect your rights and obligations once you have moved in.

Be sure to get a copy of the **village rules** as there could be limitations on pets, visitors, noise and nuisance and use of common areas, parking or gardening.

In a recent case, a couple found out the hard way that pets were prohibited. They had already paid a \$2,000 deposit on a unit and were looking forward to moving in with their beloved dog Nancy when the sales representative informed them that although he had verbally agreed to their dog living in the unit with them, the operator had informed him that pets were not allowed. The couple got their deposit back but were obviously disappointed.

Financial matters also need to be clarified. You need to be aware of the monthly charges and what they cover and if you will be charged special levies on top of **recurrent charges**. Ask for details about **Capital Maintenance and Replacement** and who pays for the various costs of maintaining or replacing items of capital in the village.

While you can hopefully look forward to many years in your new home, do not forget that many retirement villages have substantial fees that are payable when you leave, often known as **exit fees**, deferred facilities fees, deferred management fees or deferred payment.

These fees will be determined by the contract you have entered into with the operator and how long you have lived in the village.

In one case, a resident who had vacated his retirement village after living there for three years and 11 months was forced to pay an extra \$10,000 in exit fees because it took 13 months for his unit to be re-leased.

When you move out the operator may determine a renovation is in order to get the best sale price. To make sure you are not paying excessive **refurbishment fees**, check the refurbishment arrangements in your contract.

Asking the right questions during the pre-contract disclosure and contract stage is essential and could save you heartbreak and money down the track. If an operator is not providing clear answers to your questions, ask yourself if this is really the village for you?

As part of pre-contract disclosure retirement villages are required to give you a summary of what the village offers and what the costs will be. This summary is in a standard form and can be used to help you compare villages.

# Bowel Health - It's Worth Giving a S\*it!

The bowel is an important part of our digestive system, but what is it, and what should we be aware of when weighing up our overall bowel health?

The bowel is made up of three parts:

- The *small intestine* is around 6 metres in length and is the narrower (small) section of the bowel. It absorbs the nutrients in the food we digest.
- The colon and rectum make up the larger intestine, it is much shorter but thicker. Its role is to reabsorb fluid and process the waste material.
- Finally, the rectum is where the waste material is stored until we go and drop a log so to speak.

What comes out and the frequency of our bowel movement is something else we should take note of. Our poo or stool should be soft, sausage shaped and should not require too much effort to pass. The frequency can depend on individual habits, changes to our diet, but the main thing to remember here is a sudden change in your poo routine could indicate other issues.

So, what's not normal?

Signs of Blood: Bright or fresh signs of blood on the toilet paper could be a result of haemorrhoids (usually a result of constipation or straining too hard) or wiping too hard and frequently can cause small cuts/tears on the anus. Blood in the poo (especially darker blood) could mean bleeding further up the bowel and should be discussed with a doctor immediately.

Constipation: Dry or hard poo sometimes associated with cramping or bloating in our lower abdomen (something we have all probably experienced) can often be resolved with some lifestyle changes ie. drinking plenty of water, eating a diet high in soluble fibre (fruit/vegies/oat bran/lentils/beans) and an increase in physical activity.

*Diarrhoea:* We have all probably had a mean curry that has caused us to frequent the loo, but diarrhoea is

usually caused by our intestine becoming inflamed and irritated affecting the reabsorption of water from the waste material. This can be caused from numerous factors such as: illness/infection, food poisoning, drinking contaminated water, ulcers, stress and certain food intolerances.

Leakage: Accidental leakage or incontinence can be associated with severe diarrhoea but can also be caused by weakness or damage to the muscles around our bowel and anus. Bladder and Bowel Health WA, (previously The Continence Foundation of WA) is a great resource to get assistance, advice and support if you are affected by incontinence.

If any of these issues is having an effect for more than 2 -3 days a visit to the doctor is recommended. A prominent cancer is bowel cancer and can remain undetected until well advanced.

Remember good bowel health and our digestive system is often compared to being just as important as brain function, just at the other end of the body. So, remember it is worth giving a s\*it about!!



# CEO's Corner



What a fantastic day it was for hockey on Saturday in Kulin, great company and the bonus of the Souths Hockey club having teams in all four Grand Finals. They were successful in winning the Ladies A Grade and Men's Premiership. This is the first year they have had the Men's team and to win the Premiership first up is a great credit to all involved. It was great to see so many out in support of the club. The Ongerup Winter Sports Association is holding the Grand Finals in Newdegate on Saturday. #### Flooding Event

The past week has seen our first sector completed, with Newdegate Grading & Plant Hire having finished all designated work in the North sector. By October the West sector will also be finished. The contractors are estimated to have completed 60% of outstanding works, it is anticipated that we will have all works finished by December.

There are a number of roads on which the remediation works have now been completed, if you have any concerns with the completed works, please let us know and the quality of work can be inspected and repaired if required.

As this work is being carried out, the Shire would like to remind road users to be courteous and slow down within the areas that crews are working, this will allow them to do their job in a safe manner and complete it sooner. Unfortunately we continue to have had a number of reports of vehicles speeding through the road works.

#### 2018/2019 Budget Adoption

The 2018/2019 budget was adopted by Council last Wednesday, there will be a 2.5% increase in General Rates and the Lake Grace Sewerage Rates. Lake Grace & Newdegate SARS remain at a similar level to last year. With Lake King & Varley having a slight decrease in their SARS rates. It is intended that the rates billing will be issued by Wednesday 12 September.

Townsite Gross Rental Values remain the same as last year, with the Rural Unimproved Values increasing by 1.79%. Given this is the case, there will also be variances greater or less than the 2.5% average rate increase. Comments from the District Valuer were;

"Overall 'broad area' unimproved values have remained unchanged with the exception of minor increases along

the Eastern fringe of the Shire as part of the mass valuation process.

Some changes to individual assessments may have occurred either as a product of the mass valuation process or where records have been amended or corrected for more up to date information about soil types etc."

#### Dogs - Please keep your dogs on leads!

I ask that all dog walkers keep their dogs on a lead when walking through town, this also applies to dog walkers on bikes. The penalty for having a dog off the leash or untethered is \$200. As complaints have been received the Rangers have been notified and will be paying attention to this matter.

#### Dogs - Please pick up after your Dog!

It is also a \$200 offence under the Shire of Lake Grace Dogs Local Law if a dog excretes on any thoroughfare or other public place or any land which is not a public place without the consent of the occupier. The person liable for control of the dog at the time commits an offence if they don't pick up after the dog. The Shire does provide dog litter bags for the purpose. If you see this happening take a photo and report the incident.

#### Speeding through Back Lanes

It has been brought to my attention that there have been a few incidents of people speeding through laneways. Back lanes have limited visibility, to ensure the safety of anyone in the area, speeding vehicles are not acceptable. If this behavior is to continue we will be forced to install engineered devices that will restrict the speed of vehicles.

This is your community, and you need to ensure the safety of others from your actions. If an incident were to occur there is the potential for prosecution under the provision of the Road Traffic Act. If you witness someone speeding in the laneways, note down their vehicle details and report them to us.





Almost half (46%) of Australians over 15 lack the literacy skills they need to meet the demands of everyday life and work.

Literacy is one of the most important foundations for success in school and life. It is well documented that an individual's literacy levels affect their opportunities in life for education, employment, income and wellbeing






