



Growing Up in Lake Grace Part VI

John Dyke

A former resident of Lake Grace, John Dyke was born in King Edward Memorial Hospital in Subiaco, on 24 April 1935, to Noel Frederick Dyke and May Dyke. Dad had gone ahead to Lake Grace as Secretary to the Road Board. They had come to West Australia from Wales, UK, in 1926, paid their own way, and were sent to the South West, south of Bridgetown, to one of the Group Settlements, No's 126 and 127. The whole thing was a complete con between the British and Australian Governments, promising the new settlers a house, good land to cultivate, and the promise that within a few short years, working hard, they would be wealthy enough to return to the UK and have a good holiday. John and his wife Cheryl currently live in Albany. The following is the sixth part in a series detailing some of John's earlier adventures.

Whilst stationed at Pingelly as the second man I went to Williams to relieve the O.I.C. Fred Matson for 6 weeks during the winter of 1964. One evening about 9pm I received a phone call from headquarters in Perth to say there had been a traffic accident at the Crossman River Bridge and a car had ended up in the River. I took my mask snorkel and flippers that I carried with me at all times as an ex police diver and arrived at the bridge within the hour.

At the scene was John Smith who lived in the house immediately on the south side of the Bridge. John told

me he was in his house when he heard a loud bang and rushed outside to investigate, he found a car that was heading to Perth had crashed through the middle of the west side of the bridge a little after dark and had luckily landed on a tree in the middle of the river. The river that year was heavily flooded and three times its normal width; the water was icy cold and flowing at a very fast rate.

John could see the passenger's side of the car was still visible, the rest being under water. He ran quickly back to his house and picking up a long strong rope ran back tied one end to a tree and dived into the river, making sure he swam out 20 feet above the car to allow for the river current. Even so, he almost missed the car just managing to grab the front bumper bar as he was swept past. He tied the rope to the bumper and was able to see a woman with her head sticking out of the passenger's window. He called to her she said she had a husband and four children in the car. John instructed her to hand him the children one by one and he would swim them ashore. She did so and within the next 10 to 15 minutes, John had the whole family ashore. Luckily there had been just been enough space above their heads for them to breath fresh air.

John took the family to his house where he gave them towels to dry themselves in front of a roaring wood fire, he then rang for an ambulance and police both arriving shortly after, the family were taken to the Boddington Hospital. The distressed mother had told John that she had been holding her little baby in her arms when the car went in to the river. As it was sinking and filling up with water she opened the passengers window and the next second the baby was missing, presumably the rushing waters had sucked the baby out as soon as the window was opened.

I then stripped off and swam out to the still visible car for the next 10 minutes I dived in and under and around in the tree branches looking for the baby with no success and at that stage I had to leave the water as hypothermia was setting in. As for John Smith, the guy was without doubt a hero, he saved the lives of 4 children and 2 adults who would have died of hypothermia within a short space of time. There is no way they could have made it to shore without his help, he should have received our highest bravery award and I often wonder if he ever did as he had put his life on the line time after time.

How did the accident happen? The family were travelling towards Perth in a Holden sedan, Mum and Dad in the front seat and four children in the rear, Mum was holding baby in her arms. Passing the old service station site the road was under repair with the surface all gravel up to the bridge, it was also downhill and with quite a left hand bend coming onto the bridge. The driver, not used to gravel, braked hard coming onto the bridge and lost control with the right rear swinging out and the car then going straight through the western side half way across, it had enough speed to launch itself out into the middle of the river where it luckily landed on the tree.

I made contact with headquarters and arranged for them to have the Dive Squad at the scene by 8am the next morning. I then went back to Williams getting a few hours sleep before arriving back at the bridge at 8am with the dive squad arriving at about the same time. We set up a 2 man hooker unit in the middle of the bridge on the west side, blocked off that lane and commenced putting divers down in pairs. At the same time Constable Frank Phillips from Boddington station had been organising a search party on foot and horseback along the banks of the river for up to a couple of kilometres.

The divers spent several hours in a fruitless search of the river but the little baby's body was found about a kilometre downstream later that morning, caught in the branches of a tree. Whilst standing on the bridge I was monitoring the Hooker unit and the flow of traffic, a Mini Minor car pulled up alongside me I looked down to see a beautiful young girl with long flowing black hair. With the few words that we exchanged she told me she was a nurse at the Narrogin Hospital and having had the weekend off at home in Perth was on her way back to work.

She drove off and 15 to 20 minutes later a car travelling to Perth stopped and the driver said there has been a traffic accident two or three kilometres down south from where we were. I put another officer in charge of the Hooker unit and drove south coming to a sharp bend in the road and a car that turned out to be the Mini Minor some 15 feet or so left of the roadway at a culvert and this beautiful young girl dead behind the wheel.

It appeared, upon investigation, that she had fallen asleep whilst rounding the bend. The car drifted to the wrong side of the roadway where she woke up, pulled the wheel back and the car then went off the bitumen at a culvert. Hitting the culvert the car flipped over landing on its wheels again, but the seat belt on that vehicle rides high and across the neck. It broke her neck killing her instantly. Had she been 10 feet either side of that culvert the car would have simply run off the road travelled a short distance and stopped with no injury to the young girl. However the worst was yet to come.

A couple of days later I found out that she was the sister of another police officer who was a good friend of

mine. The death of the baby and then my friends sister shook me up a lot and I got very little sleep over the next few weeks.

Whilst doing relief work at Boddington in 64/65 I met and became good friends with Lou Stagbouer, the unofficial mayor of Boddington and Fred Prussion who worked in a local timber mill. Boddington was a big timber town in the early days with a large extracts mill just out of town. Lou Stagbouer was a champion axeman, he and Fred held the Australian Crosscut Saw Championship record for many years and maybe they still do.

Lou at about 6 foot 2inches with a bull neck and huge muscles and Fred at about 5 foot eight by 5 foot eight and a big man. Fred used to tell me that he just held on to one end of the saw whilst Lou did all the work. He also used to tell me that Lou's father was the only man he had ever seen with square muscles. Fred had a gravel voice and when half full of booze you might get him to recite The Man from Snowy River, simply amazing, I often thought if I could get Fred on tape doing it I could sell a million copies. Lou used to get invitations from other towns to attend their show days and log chop for them, which he used to do and never charged anything to do so. He never trained but was so good with the axe he could chop about 2 seconds under his Championship times.



Media Release

The Electoral Commission is conducting elections for 89 councils. A list of councils whose elections are being conducted by the Commission is available at www.elections.wa.gov.au/elections/local/current

Media enquiries

All media enquiries must be directed to the Commission's media mailbox at media@waec.wa.gov.au

Enquiries should set out clearly:

- the subject matter, including specific questions;
- any reasonable deadline.

Telephone calls or emails that simply ask us to call back will be responded to with a request for further details submitted via the media mailbox. This is to ensure fairness in responding to enquiries in the order they are received.

For requested interviews with the Electoral Commissioner, please indicate the topic and preferred time. Suitable topics may include:

- · Rolls about to close
- · Nominations about to close
- Approaching deadline for return of postal votes

Please note that the Commissioner refrains from commenting on matters relating to individual candidates.

Eligibility

To be eligible to vote or to stand as a candidate electors must be either:

- Enrolled on the State electoral roll for a residence within the relevant local government district; or
- Enrolled for that district on the owners and occupiers roll which is maintained by each local government. (An owner or occupier might be someone who operates a business within a local government district or owns a residential or commercial property that they rent out to someone else.)

Rolls will close at 5.00pm, Friday 1 September.

Votino

All but four of the elections being conducted by the Commission will be full postal ballots.

To be admitted to the count, votes must be RECEIVED by the Returning Officer by 6:00pm Election Day SATURDAY 21 OCTOBER.

Any elector who has left it too late to mail their ballot material on time may hand in their votes in person to their local council office immediately prior to or on Election Day.

The Election Timetable is available at www.elections.wa.gov.au/elections/local/current

Voting in Local Government elections is encouraged but not compulsory.

The voting system

Local government elections use the 'first-past-the-post' system. This means that electors indicate their preferred candidate (or candidates if there are multiple vacancies) and the candidate with the most votes is

elected. Where there are multiple vacancies, the candidate with the most votes is elected first, and the candidate with the second highest number of votes is elected second, and the process continues until all vacancies are filled.

Ballot paper draw

After nominations close at 4:00pm on Thursday 14 September 2017, the Returning Officer will conduct the draw for positions on the ballot paper. All candidates names are placed in separate opaque spheres, the spheres are then placed in a ballot box and the Returning Officer will then remove a sphere, open the sphere and read out the name of the candidate. This candidate's, name will be placed on the top of the ballot paper. This process is repeated until all names are drawn from the ballot box

Counting of votes

The counting of votes commences after the close of the poll 6:00pm Saturday 21 October 2017. Ballot papers are counted and the results of the election are declared after the count has been completed on the night.

Unlike a State election where votes are counted at multiple polling places, Local Government ballot papers are counted at one central point – usually the Local Government office. Limited space combined with the number of votes to be counted may mean that results are not available as early in the evening as for a State election.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT ORDINARY ELECTION CLOSE OF ENROLMENTS

Shire of Lake Grace ROLL CLOSE: 5:00 PM Friday, 1 September 2017



You may be eligible to be enrolled to vote in the local government elections on 21 October 2017 if you live in or are an owner or occupier of rateable property in the Shire of Lake Grace.

Residents

You are automatically enrolled to vote if you are on the State Electoral Roll as at 5:00 PM Friday, 1 September 2017. If you are not already on the State Electoral Roll and meet the eligibility criteria, or if you have changed address recently, you must complete an enrolment form.

Enrolment Forms

Electoral enrolment forms are available from the Shire of Lake Grace, all post offices, all Australian Electoral Commission offices or the Western Australian Electoral Commission and must be completed and reach a Divisional Returning Officer in Western Australia by 5:00 PM Friday, 1 September 2017.

Non-Resident Owners and Occupiers

If you are a non-resident owner or occupier of rateable property in the Shire of Lake Grace and are on the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll, you are eligible to enrol to vote. If you are **not** on the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll and own or occupy rateable property in the Shire of Lake Grace you may be eligible to enrol to vote.

This applies if you were on the last electoral roll for the Shire of Lake Grace prior to May 1996 and have owned or occupied rateable property in the district continuously since this time. Please contact your local government for details.

Owners of land who were on the last Local Government roll continue to retain that status until they cease to own the rateable property to which the enrolment relates. Occupiers do not have continuous enrolment and should contact the Shire of Lake Grace to confirm their enrolment status. To be eligible to enrol as an occupier, you will need to have a right of continuous occupation under a lease, tenancy agreement or other legal instrument for at least the next three months

following the date of the application to enrol.

Joint Owners and Occupiers

If a rateable property is owned or occupied by more than two people, a majority of the owners/occupiers may nominate two persons from amongst themselves who are on either the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll, to enrol as owner/occupier electors.

Corporations

A body corporate that owns or occupies rateable property may nominate two people who are on either the State or Commonwealth Electoral Roll to enrol as owner/occupier electors.

Enrolment Forms – Non-Resident Owners and Occupiers Only

Enrolment forms can be obtained from local governments and must be lodged with the Chief Executive Officer by 5:00 PM Friday, 1 September 2017. Further information can be obtained from the Shire of Lake Grace.



- a completed nomination in the prescribed form, signed and witnessed. (This form is available from the Returning Officer, the Western Australian Electoral Commission or the Shire of Lake Grace);
- a single A4 page profile containing not more than 150 words of information about the candidate;
- a nomination deposit of \$80 (cash, bank cheque or postal order); and
- a recent passport-sized photograph (optional).

The Commission has developed an online system called Nomination Builder to assist candidates to complete their nomination form which includes the candidate profile. This is the preferred method of completing the nomination form and profile for elections conducted by the Commission. Candidates complete their nomination details and profile, print the completed form which has a reference number allocated and lodge it with the Returning Officer. The nomination builder can be accessed at www.elections.wa.gov.au.

Where an agent lodges a nomination on a candidate's behalf, it must be in the prescribed form with a written authorisation signed by the candidate.

The documents may be hand delivered, posted or faxed to the Returning Officer and must be received by the close of nominations.



Car Claims in the Crosshairs

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) is warning taxpayers that they are paying close attention to claims for work related car expenses this tax time.

Assistant Commissioner Kath Anderson wants taxpayers to avoid getting tripped up by making claims that they can't justify, citing 'standard' claims as a common error.

"Some people think they are entitled to a 'standard deduction' for car expenses, using the cents per kilometre method, but this is not the case.

"While it's true that you don't need written evidence for claims of up to 5,000 kilometres per year, you do need to be able to show that you were required to use your car for work, and how you calculated your claim.

"Over 3 million people made a work-related car expense claim in 2015-16, totalling around \$8.5 billion. A significant proportion of these claims were right at the limit that does not require detailed records," she said.

"While we have no issue with people using the cents per kilometre method and we expect that most claims at this threshold may be legitimate, but we are reminding people that there's no such thing as a 'free pass' when it comes to deductions.

Ms Anderson said the ATO wants people to claim what they're entitled to, no more and no less.

Car expenses incurred in performing your duties as an employee are generally deductible, but taxpayers usually can't claim trips between home and work unless they've got a good reason, such as carrying bulky tools or equipment to work.

"If you make a claim for transporting bulky tools, you need to be able to prove you were required by your employer to take these items to work, and that there was no safe place to store them."

"It is also important to make sure you don't double-dip. In other words, you cannot claim expenses that have already been paid by your employer, including salary sacrificing arrangements," she said.

Ms Anderson said there are three golden rules for taxpayers to remember to get it right.

"One – you have to have spent the money yourself and can't have been reimbursed, two – the claim must be directly related to earning your income, and three – you need a record to prove it."

The myDeductions tool in the ATO app can help make keeping records easier, and at tax time you can send your deductions to your tax agent or upload them directly to myTax. The app is particularly useful for people who use their car for work, as it helps them track trips using GPS, point-to-point or the odometer method. This year myDeductions is available to sole traders as well as individuals.

Ms Anderson said taxpayers who are confused about what they can claim a deduction for should talk to their tax agent or visit the ATO website.

Caught up car claims

Off the rails

A railway guard claimed deductions for car expenses in travelling to and from work, basing his claim on the fact that he carried bulky tools (including his flag, safety vest, handheld radio, torch, instructions and timetables) in his car.

He attracted an audit because his deductions were much higher than those of other people in the same occupation. His employer advised us that secure facilities for equipment were available on the business premises, so the transportation of equipment was the employee's choice. For this reason, expenses relating to travelling to and from work are not an allowable deduction in this situation, and the taxpayer had to pay \$2,000 for tax owed plus interest.

Double dipping deductions

An employee manager claimed \$3,800 in work-related car expenses. When we asked the taxpayer to verify that they owned the car and it was registered in their name, we discovered the car was under a novated lease arrangement. Employees who have a novated lease arrangement are not considered to have expenses in relation to the car, as their employer leases the car on their behalf. Claiming a deduction for these expenses is considered double-dipping.

All deductions were disallowed and we applied a penalty.

Crossing the line

A school crossing safety officer claimed work related car expense for travel between his home and workplace. He indicated that this expense related to the carriage of bulky tools – a safety sign for the school crossing. However the school told us that the sign was securely stored on school property each day. The taxpayer's car expense claims were disallowed because the trip from home to work was private in nature and did not involve the transportation of the sign.

Clear drainage ditches

Leaves and debris gather in drainage areas over the winter. Now is the time to ensure that the spring rains will have adequate runoff. Spring seedlings do best in soil which drains well. Because vegetative growth is at a low point in early spring, this is the easiest time of year for clearing drainage ditches. Be sure to put the cleared material, usually dead leaves and small branches, into the compost. Spring compost piles are commonly short on carbon-rich materials, and every addition helps.


Repair any bowed sides to raised beds, fix trellises and fencing.

Soggy winter soil puts a strain on raised beds; sometimes a stake will rot and give way. Any bowed or leaning sides should be fixed now. Dig back the soil behind the bowed side and drive in new stakes on the inside of the sideboards with a slight inward lean. Push sideboards up to stakes and fasten well with screws or nails.

Weed young spring weeds, mulch bare spots in beds.

Any weeds which appear in your garden beds will be easiest to pull now, as the roots are shallow. Covering bare spots with mulch or ground cover will minimize the emergence of new weeds. Adding mulch to a depth of 3 to 4 inches is usually sufficient. Black plastic sheeting can also be used to cover the beds before planting as a way to suppress emerging weeds. If you flip the sheeting over once a week you may likely find slugs which have been hiding in the bed. This is a simple way to reduce the slug population in garden beds. When adding mulch to garden beds or around the base of fruit trees, keep the mulch a few inches away from tree trunks and the crowns and stems of plants. This will help reduce rot on the

stems of young plants and will protect the bark of young fruit trees.

Tips for Ticket-Buyers

Consumer Protection welcomes the release of a new guide for ticket-buyers by Live Performance Australia.

We regularly receive complaints from people who have searched online for tickets to an event such as a concert, sports match or festival only to inadvertently purchase tickets from an unauthorised reseller. This can leave the consumer with an invalid ticket, meaning they are refused entry at the venue, or sometimes the ticket simply doesn't arrive.

Customers of overseas-based websites may find it difficult to get a response if there's a problem. Going to a physical business address is not usually an option as it would involve a flight, phone calls may be tricky because of time differences and delays exist when using international post. Electronic communication may seem like the only way to try to resolve a dispute, however, as we all know, emails can be ignored.

The tips contained within Live Performance's 'Safe Tix Guide' are certainly worth repeating and should mean your ticket-buying experience is safer and more secure. We've picked a few for this column, but you can read the full list at www.liveperformance.com.au.

Sign up for alerts

Subscribe to mailing lists and follow social media accounts for your favourite artists, venues, festivals, event promoters and authorised ticket sellers. This is how you can find out about upcoming events, pre-sale details and other important event information in advance.

Do your research

When you want to go to an event, find out who the 'authorised' ticket seller is, the chosen venue and when tickets go on sale officially. Tickets offered for sale before the official date or by an unauthorised seller may be fake.

Don't trust search engines

Make sure the ticket seller who has come up first in your online search result is actually the authorised ticket seller and not a reseller who has paid to be at the top of the list.

Get organised

Create an online account with the authorised ticket seller and make sure you're logged in and ready when tickets go on sale.

Don't panic

For high demand shows you might be placed in an online queue; be patient. If a 'sold out' message pops up, stay calm and keep checking because additional dates or seats may become available.

Read the T &Cs

Usually terms and conditions state that resold tickets can be cancelled by the promoter or authorised seller and refused at the door when you attend.

Know your rights

If you buy from a ticket reseller your rights to money back or exchange may be affected if the show is postponed or cancelled because the refund goes to the original purchaser.

Consider credit card or Paypal benefits

Paying by credit card or Paypal provides more protection if something goes wrong with your purchase. Don't transfer money directly into the reseller's bank account.

Anyone who is supplied fake tickets or doesn't receive tickets after paying for them should contact the resale website in the first instance. The next option is to seek a credit card chargeback (transaction reversal) or utilise Paypal's dispute resolution service, provided you've followed the tip to pay in either of those ways.

ATO Releases Super Guarantee Gap Estimate

ATO Media Release

The ATO has today released its estimate of the Superannuation Guarantee (SG) gap. The gap is the difference between the theoretical amount payable by employers to be fully compliant with their SG obligations and actual contributions received by funds.

The ATO estimates the net SG gap to be 5.2 per cent or \$2.85 billion of the total estimated \$54.78 billion in SG payments that employers were required to pay in 2014-15.

"While this analysis shows that 95 per cent of the estimated superannuation guarantee is paid to employees, the gap exists because some employers appear not to be meeting their super guarantee obligations either by not paying enough or not paying it at all. Superannuation has a vital role in providing for people's retirement, and any non-payment is of concern," Deputy Commissioner James O'Halloran said.

"The ATO has a range of strategies and activities in place to educate, support, monitor and enforce compliance by employers. We encourage people to report instances of non-payment to us and we respond to every one of the approximately 20,000 reports of possible non-payment of SG from employees or former employees we receive each year."

This is the first time the ATO has released an estimate of the SG gap and the ATO worked closely with tax gap experts, other government departments, overseas tax administrations and industry stakeholders in developing and validating the gap estimate.

"As a result of this rigorous assurance process we are confident that we have an estimate that is reliable and credible," Mr O'Halloran said.

ATO Releases Super Guarantee Gap Estimate (Cont.)

"Estimating tax gaps forms part of the ATO's broader accountability and transparency as a leading administrator, and is consistent with contemporary international best practice in tax administration.

"Undertaking an estimation of the Superannuation Gap will provide a useful insight into the operation of the superannuation guarantee system and allow the ATO to assess the effectiveness of our strategies to reduce the level of non-payment of superannuation guarantee."

The ATO now meets on a quarterly basis with Australian Prudential Regulation Authority, Australian Securities and Investment Commission and the Fair Work Ombudsman to monitor the operation of the superannuation guarantee system.

"In addition to following up all reports of unpaid SG, we are increasing our proactive SG case work by one third this financial year. We have improved our analysis of data to detect patterns in non-payment, and are working more closely with other government agencies to exchange information," Mr O'Halloran said.

"While business insolvency remains a reason that 50 per cent of unpaid SG is not able to be collected by the ATO we aim to find ways to increase the collection of outstanding superannuation guarantee debt. The payment of superannuation guarantee is an important

obligation on employers and should be paid quarterly."

Single Touch Payroll will further improve visibility on reporting and simplify tax and super interactions for employers, allowing the ATO to better identify noncompliance over time.




