The 'Great Sand Cart' was initiated by the Lake Grace Pingrup Football Club due to the pressing need for two functional football fields for the Great Southern Football Carnival.

The extension to the second oval will also benefit the Hockey Club providing them with room for two ovals. While extending the oval the present hockey field was topdressed.

LGPFC spokesperson, Steve McWhirter, said "the idea of extending the hockey oval had been brewing for two to three years but that it was only now that they had been able to bring it to fruition".

After getting the green light from the Shire Council, who also provided plant and manpower the call went out for volunteers.

Twelve trucks worked non stop for 12 hours on Friday 24th and were back at it the following day for another 5 hours, carting 6,000 tonnes of sand.

Already the grass is shooting through where it has been top dressed. The extended oval area will be reticulated and seeded by the Lake Grace Shire Council.

90 years young....

Arrangements are well underway for celebrations on **Saturday the 6th of November** to commemorate the school's 90th birthday and 60 years of CWA activity in Lake Grace.

At the most recent meeting held by the organising committee some final arrangements were made for the times of the various activities. The day will commence with registrations at 10.00am. There will be a variety of activities and games including decorated bikes and egg and spoon races.

One of the class rooms will have tables and desks used in previous years as well as collections of school books and work from previous years. 

Early Days at Lake Grace by H Bishop

We continue on with the third instalment.....

At the time I first saw Lake Grace, March 1912, Ern Bennett was in South Australia at his wedding and while he was away Herbert (Johnie) Horner built the house to which he returned with his bride. This was a very good house of sawn timber and iron and was for many years the only house in the district that could be designated a house in the true sense. Ern was a terrific worker. It was said that he walked at 5 miles per hour all the time, but when he had to get through a fence he ran for a little to make up for the lost steps. He had horses and equipment brought from Dumbleyung and went ahead in land cleared and cropped much faster than anyone else, but always found time for any social activities, which were rare, and the Progress Association which was formed at an early stage, mainly in the hope of obtaining roads, water supply, and the railway. He always found time to help a neighbour in time of stress, to which I can testify at first hand.

Jack Bennett was about 17 at this time, 1912, and a splendid type of young Australian. I remember when we were trying, very unhandily, to burn up our first 28 acres. Jack Bennett arrived uninvited at about 9 am (he had walked about three miles) and without more than an "Hullo" proceeded to teach us how to do it, not by precept but by example. 'Burning up' is hard work, but a simple process once you know how. But for new chums without any slightest background in this type of exercise the work is quadrupled and the results negligible. A year or so late Maurice James (Jim) Bennett joined Jack and they worked together for several years. It is enough to say that Jim was another Bennett, but I will have more to say of him later. Jack Bennett died in France on his way up to the line for the first time; a terrible waste of a valuable life, but there were others, so many others, at that time.

I find it difficult to express myself without being fulsome, but these men were solid dependable struts on which Lake Grace survived and grew.

During the time Messrs. Slarke and Bishop were putting up the frames of their humpies several other families and individuals arrived, and among them, in October 1911, the family of Carruthers, and this is a name which has been closely associated with Lake Grace ever since.

There were thirteen Carruthers – Robert and Agnes (the parents) and then in order from the eldest, Agnes, Jean, Jamesie (often called Nina), Jack, Jim, Bill, Hugh, Bob, Dick, Tom and Mary. The ages of the children (I may be a little astray in this) would range from 21 to 3. Agnes and Jamesie did not stay

in Lake Grace very long at that time, but Agnes returned with her husband, Harold Clarke, about 1920 and they farmed in the Beenong area North-East of the township, and Jamesie returned to keep house for her father and the children who were still at home, after her mother's death. Jean and Paddy McMahon were married within a year of so, and this was the first marriage of Lake Grace people.

The individuals who arrived during this period were Bert Rose, Cyril Huggins and Jack Marshall. A family named Carter settled at the North end of the lake about this time, but stayed a few years only and little is remembered of them. The Lawson's. previously mentioned on board the "Orontes", and the Lucas's with four children also settled in about this time, and by the middle of 1912 the population was approximately 50. The humpies built by the families were all of similar type - flat iron roof, walls of sapling either vertical or horizontal lined with hessian, and with earth floors. In one case the roofing iron was nailed in the gutters instead of through the ridges with predictable results when the first rains came. This is one 'whodunit' which as far as I am concerned will remain unsolved.

My first journey to the Lake also included a mystery that was never solved. During the Christmas 1911-12 break, when my brother Ted was born, the Bishop horse, left in a paddock at Dumbleyung, died, and another, a very nice looking medium draught gelding was purchased at a Horse Bazaar in James Street. At the same time a spring cart was being built by a wheelwright in Wagin and it was decided to travel to Wagin only, by train, unload the horse, pick up the cart and complete the journey by road.

My elder brothers were earning a little in Perth at this time, Sidney in the Government Statistician's Office and Jack in the Guardian Assurance Co. at the rates of 12/6d. and 10/- per week respectively, so I was chosen to accompany my father on this trip.

On March 1st, 1912, we set out from Wagin and about one mile later the horse collapsed and lay down, and continued to do this for the whole of a nightmare journey to Dumbleyung. The complaint from which this horse suffered was never diagnosed, nor was any cure found; as soon as he was warmed with a little exercise he collapsed, but would recover when cooled off. To Dumbleyung took three days. The first night out was spent on the property of Mr Sam West at Gundaring and second near Ballaying, but the name of that farmer escapes me after the 61 years that have elapsed. This episode is included to illustrate how dependent we all were on a horse or

horses. For many years after that the sickness or death of a horse could be a major catastrophe.

By this time a causeway, forever after called 'the Causeway', had been built across Lake Grace at the narrowest part, which reduced the mileage to 55 from Dumbleyung, and on May 1st, 1912, the line was opened to Kukerin and the majority of settlers were then 30 miles more or less from the rail terminus. This still constituted a long day's travel each way and more often three days were taken for a round trip. About ten miles of heavy sand plain in the Tarin Rock area restricted both loads and speed. Sitting here in a Perth suburb I can remember that sand plain very vividly but when I travel over it on a tarmac road at 60 mph or so I am inclined to wonder that it was ever such a problem.

In June 1912 my father and I went to Perth and the whole family then returned, arriving at Kukerin at about 5pm on 28th June, Jack Bennett was there with Ern's wagon and team for the heavy furniture and stores, et., and our horse and cart (a different horse from the one mentioned earlier) was also there.

Sidney remained in Kukerin for the night and came out on the Bennett wagon the next day. The rest of the family left Kukerin at about 7 o'clock and proceeded, almost entirely at a walking pace, to "Brockham". It was a fine but bitterly cold night and my mother sat on a board seat (no back) nursing a 5 months' old baby for close on 10 hours, over stones, mallee stumps and muddy creeks. At the white Dam, with still 10 miles to go, we halted and made some billy tea, after taking a little of which Florrie was very sick.

A Metters stove arrived on the wagon the following day, and at least firewood was no problem.

At this time Lake Grace entered on a stage which I cannot help but call the bad years. Everyone was engaged in 'chopping down' or 'burning up', and the first essential was to get the land cleared of timber. Many times during those years the only water supply was the 'White Dam', situated about 2 miles west of the lake and so called because, having been sunk through a layer of pipe clay the water was always white. Almost like milk in appearance; the addition of ashes, Epsom Salts and other bush remedies failed to clear it, but apart from its appearance it was good water and without the White Dam Lake Grace could possibly have been evacuated on several occasions. Food was ordered from Perth about twice a year and picked up at Kukerin, and consisted almost entirely of tinned meat, tinned fish, jam, condensed milk, sugar, flour and dried fruit. Butter and vegetables could not be kept more than a very limited time. We even had

dessicated potatoes. Fresh meat was almost unknown. The rabbit, to be such a scourge later on, was not in evidence at that time, and until the first wheat crop at the end of 1913 hens were not kept. Over a period of about 4 years several picnics and concerts were held and these constituted all the social life of that time. At the picnics a few foot races and perhaps a tug-of-war would be contested and after sundown a cart would be tied by the shafts to a sapling and used as a stage by the performers. At the concerts undoubtedly Mr Slarke was the star performer with a repertoire of comic songs in the George Formby style but without the ukulele, Mr Bishop sand sentimental songs such as 'The Queen of the Earth' and 'Love's Old Sweet Song', and Ern Bennett recited Banjo Paterson's bush ballads. remember Paddy McMahon once weighing in with a very dramatic and tragic recitation, and once a visitor played a cornet. Usually there was no music, and the light was provided by a camp fire.

The main topic at all gatherings was of course "When are we to get the railway?" In 1913 everyone had wheat crops sown in greater or smaller acreages and yields, as I remember, were moderate, but the cost of cartage to Kukerin prevented any possibility of profit. 1914 came next, and acreages had at least doubled over the previous year, but cartage of crops was no problem, as in this year of drought most farmers obtained some hay for horse feed and enough seed wheat for the following year, and were considered From the beginning of the lucky to get that. settlement funds had been available to settlers from the Agricultural Bank for improvements done to virgin properties, at approximately the cost of the work. Clearing was paid for at the rate of 20/- to 25/- per acre through Agricultural Bank inspectors who had to pass the work as satisfactory before payment was The amounts paid out were of course charged against the property, and in 1914-15, to prevent a mass exodus from farms all over the State, another section of the Bank came into being. This was the IAB, or Industries Assistance Board, and again through the Inspectors sustenance payments were made each month to enable the people to eat and live. To have to accept what was in effect a dole, though again chargeable against the property, was a very bitter pill indeed for some swallow. Of course not all found it necessary to do so, but to many it was a lifesaver.

Baking With Pamela

With heart disease so prevalent in our society we are all becoming more aware of our fat intake. This week I have included two recipes, both being low in fat. Blueberries are slowly becoming known as "The Miracle Food". They lower blood cholesterol and help prevent

degenerative blindness and cancer.

If you are unable to buy blueberries then strawberries are a second best choice.

Note: The main difference between batters is:

Hotcakes are thicker and more fluffy than other batters.

Pancakes are much thinner and usually larger in diameter.

Crepes are wafer thin so they can be rolled with a filling in the middle.

SPINACH and RICOTTA CREPES

Serves 6

2¼ cups plain flour 3 egg whites ¾ teaspoon bicarb soda 2 cups skim milk



Filling

500 g cooked spinach 500 g low-fat ricotta 2 egg whites 375 ml jar tomato pasta sauce ½ cup reduced fat grated cheese

To Make Crepes

- Combine flour and bicarb soda in a bowl, add egg whites and milk and mix to a smooth batter.
- Cook in a hot non-stick fry pan should make 12 crepes.

To Make Filling

Combine all spinach, ricotta and egg whites in a saucepan. Stir over a low heat until mixture is combined and heated through. Season with pepper to suit taste.

To serve

Place spoonfuls of spinach mixture in a line

through the centre of each crepe. Roll up and place in an ovenproof dish. Pour tomato sauce over crepes and sprinkle grated cheese on top.

Bake at 180C for 10 minutes.

BERRY HOTCAKES

Serves 6 (Hotcakes freeze well, warm through in the microwave before serving)

1½ cups plain flour
2 tablespoons sugar
½ teaspoon bicarb soda
2 egg whites
1 cup skim milk
Blueberries/Strawberries for serving

- Mix flour, sugar and bicarb soda together in a bowl.
- Whisk egg whites then add milk. Add to flour mixture.
- Whisk all ingredients together until batter is smooth
- Pour batter into a hot non-stick frypan and cook for one minute each side until golden.
- Serve with blueberries and pure maple syrup.

Fully Trained Western Power operators aboard low flying helicopters will measure the length of bays between power poles and search for damage to lines.



You may know someone who is currently dealing with a mental health issue but because of stigma attached to the terms 'mental health' and 'mental illness' their ability to share their experiences is limited. Unlike a physical injury or illness you cannot SEE the pain or the suffering. It is often difficult to understand or gauge the feeling associated with mental health issues.

Mental health promotion aims to alter this lack of understanding and provide the necessary information and support to facilitate the process of learning thereby reducing stigma. It is hoped that one day, mental health will be discussed in an open and understanding environment under the guise that being 'healthy' is both mental and physical.

National Mental Health Week began as an awareness-raising event that endeavoured to improve the understanding and appreciation of mental health issues, mental illness and the effect of community stigma on mental health consumers and carers. It also provides an opportunity to engage the wider community through promotional activities and provided a focal point for community groups, consumer and carer support services,

mental health service providers and advocacy groups to hold mental health promotion events designed to engage varying and diverse audiences.

Mental Health Week is a principle health campaign event in Western Australia. Given the lack of government funding to develop and implement an effective, state-wide campaign to raise awareness, educate and support individuals and communities to take steps to prevent or intervene in mental health issues early, it is critical that mental health issues receive wide media and community support.

A major focus for mental health should be removed from treatment and towards prevention and awareness. This should be done with the aims to:

- Reduce stigma, that is, make it OK to talk about mental health issues without cringing or feeling threatened.
- Increase awareness of mental health issues and the devastating effects it has on the person, their friends and family and the battle they face recovering to good health.
- Provide information that is 'user friendly', accessible and doesn't scare the reader away before they begin. People are always going to be frightened of something they cannot see or understand. It cannot be expected that readers will happily want to know more they need a reason to read on.
- Making it understood that mental health is relevant to all people from all walks of life and that mental 'illness' occurs on a scale.

Hawaiian Tsunami leaves gift.

The mysterious marine fossils found at the base of the Kohala volcano in Hawaii were apparently deposited there more than



100,000 years ago by a colossal tsunami, nearly half a kilometre high, that swept inland for 6 kilometres. A research team dated the marine fossils and volcanic rock on the Kohala volcano and showed that the fossils were left there about 120, 000 years ago. The volcano had actually been sinking by about 2.6 million metres per year over the past 475 years, which means the marine fossils were deposited at a height of about 500 metres—well out of reach of storms and way above the sea level at the time. The timing corresponds with the last great landslide down the flank of the nearby Mauna Loa volcano. The researchers believe this underwater landslide triggered a gigantic tsunami that picked up coral and shells and spread them over the western face of Kohala. Mauna Loa is an active volcano that has since rebuilt its flank. Future collapse on this volcano, with the potential for mega-tsunami generation, is almost certain. British Geological Survey

Pedestrians Glow in the Dark.

Japanese car maker Honda is planning to introduce an in-car warning system that alerts drivers on dark roads when there is a person ahead of them. The intelligent



night vision system places two far-infrared cameras on a vehicle's front bumper to detect warm objects

such as people and animals up to 80 metres away. Data analysis says 70 percent of all pedestrian fatalities occur at night.

Modern World has a Heart of Glass.

The use of glass during the industrial and scientific revolutions was what separated Western civilisation from the rest of the



world in the 17th and 18th centuries. Progress in everything from astronomy to medicine to modern genetics would have been impossible without it. an anthropologist is claiming. Without glass, there would have been no microscopes or telescopes. Louis Pasteur would not have identified infectious diseases and launched a medical revolution. Biologists could not have observed cell division, understood chromosomes, or unravelled DNAs structures, leaving us bereft of modern genetics. Much of Galileo's work on the solar system would have been restricted to philosophy. And while it may seem unlikely, glass even helped in the invention of the steam engine. It essential to the barometer, manometer, thermometer and air pump, inventions that allowed Jacques Charles and Robert Boyle to derive the laws linking to the volume of gas to its pressure and temperature. This understanding led to machines that could extract mechanical work from expanding gas, to the steam and internal combustion engines and eventually to the gas turbine.

Country Women's Association Lake Grace Branch "60 Years of Action"

This year, 2004, the Lake Grace Branch of the Country Women's Association of WA celebrates its 60th birthday. So I thought I would take this opportunity to tell of one of the projects undertaken during this time.

In the early 1970's I was President of the then Great Southern Division and also held office in the Lake Grace Branch. One day while talking to one of our older members, who was a widow, she said to me "You know Shirley the worst thing about living alone is the fact that you have to eat every meal by yourself."

This set me think about what could be done. What could CWA to help in this situation? The idea of a monthly luncheon came to me. Could we organise this? I spoke to the Anglican Rector and he gave his blessing. I also spoke to the Shire Clerk and he promised to help.

On consultation the Branch Members were agreeable so we went into action.

Gough Whitlam was the Prime Minister at that time and had instituted the AAP Plan - the Australian Assistance Plan. This plan was to help people get worthwhile projects off the ground with an injection of cash. The Shire Clerk put in a submission for us and in due course we were granted \$600. In those days this went quite a long way to help.

The CWA centre was a good venue. We had plenty of cutlery and crockery as we did quite large catering jobs then. We had a No.2 Metters Stove which was replaced with a gas stove - gas installed and a hot water system, since replaced with a new one. The Shire Clerk gave us a second hand fridge, since replaced with a new one. We bought and made nice new curtains and other necessities and some card and board games which were not used as much as we'd hoped.

The Lake Grace Lions Club gave and laid a nice blue carpet in the side room, then used as a sitting room.

Members then thought we could invite other women's organisations to join in the project. So each was contacted and agreed. CWA would provide the centre and equipment. Each year the CWA draws up the roster, with organisations choosing the month best suited to them. The Lions' Ladies chose to do the December

Christmas Party, carrying on from the Apex Party as Apex was no longer functioning.

The cost of \$3 per person was decided upon to cover cost of food. For a while Meals on Wheels picked up the cost of food. Later the cost was \$5.00 per head and is now \$7.00 each. These rises were made and agreed upon by the participants themselves.

This project was not meant to be a money raiser. The charge was just to cover cost of food. If any profit was made - good luck as people had chosen to donate food to help their club.

Thirty years later this is still a popular function, looked forward to on the 1st Thursday of each month and enjoyed by Senior Citizens and anyone who likes good company and a wonderful meal.

Congratulations to all those who do such a great job and thank you.

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Fine in Commercial Driver Fatigue Case Brings Warning

The first successful prosecution under WA's new laws on commercial vehicle driver fatigue has prompted a reminder to the transport industry.

Leslie Charles Bonner, trading as LC Bonners Transport, was fined \$10,000 in the Perth Court of Petty Sessions last week after pleading guilty to six charges of failing to ensure that commercial vehicle drivers employed by him complied with the regulations covering hours of work.

WorkSafe inspectors visited Mr Bonner's Maddington premises in February to examine trip records and found that the hours being worked by commercial vehicle drivers exceeded the maximum work times specified in the Occupational Safety and Health Regulations.

WorkSafe WA Commissioner Nina Lyhne said today that excessive working hours and inadequate breaks by commercial vehicle drivers could have tragic consequences, and the transport industry should take note that breaches of this type would not be tolerated.

"There is no doubt that fatigue is a significant occupational safety and health issue, and trucks in particular can become lethal when under the

Closing Date: 30th November 2004 control of someone who, due to the effects of fatigue, is unable to fully concentrate on the job at hand," Ms Lyhne said.

"Research shows that an alarming 30 per cent of rural crashes can be attributed to fatigue, and it is estimated that 25 per cent of fatal truck crashes are due to fatigue.

"A comprehensive code of practice for the management of fatigue has been in operation in WA since 1998, and regulations governing fatigue management for commercial vehicle drivers have been in place since July 2003.

"Transport operators should be familiar with the rules by now so there is no excuse to flout them, and inspectors will be coming down hard on those who put all road users at risk by allowing drivers to work long hours and risk fatigue."

WorkSafe inspectors – along with the WA Police and Main Roads Heavy Vehicle Section – regularly conduct road blocks on the main heavy transport routes in WA to check trip records and ascertain that companies have fatigue management plans in place.

"An enormous amount of effort and consultation has gone into fatigue management for commercial vehicle drivers over the past few years, and it is disappointing when we need to prosecute because an employer is not playing by the rules," Ms Lyhne said.

"The working relationship that has been forged between WorkSafe, the WA Police and Main Roads Heavy Vehicle Section is proving to be extremely effective, and we aim to further develop it in an effort to gain a greater level of safety on WA roads.

"We have seen some horrific traffic crashes involving commercial vehicles over the years, and nobody wants to see that sort of tragedy happening as a result of fatigue when it is entirely preventable.

"The message needs to get across loud and clear that driver fatigue is a very serious issue, and this first prosecution should serve as a warning to employers that we will not hesitate to take action against anyone who disregards the laws."

NIGHT





Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 8th to midnight Friday 22nd. Astronomy is looking up.

Our local star, the sun, resides in the constellation of Virgo for this fortnight and shines at -26.7 magnitude. The moon spends the latter part of the fortnight in the evening sky. On Thursday 14th, the new moon occurs are 10.38am in Virgo. The moon, on Monday 18th will be at perigee (closest) at 8am at 367.758 kms in Ophiuchus. On Thursday 21st at 5.49am, the first quarter moon occurs in the constellation of Capricornus at magnitude -6.0. The moon spends the 9th, 10th and 11th in Leo, the 12th, 13th and 14th in Virgo, the 15th and 16th in Libra, 17th in Scorpius, 18th in Ophiuchus, 19th and 20th in Sagittarius and the 21st and 22nd in Capricornus.

Mercury, low down in the evening twilight, sets on Saturday at 6.25pm, 11 minutes after sunset and sets around 4 minutes later each night in Virgo until Thursday 21st when it will have moved into Libra to set at 7.15pm on Friday 22nd.

The brightest object in the night sky, Venus, at magnitude –4.4, rises Saturday morning at 3.50am in the constellation of Leo. On Monday 11th, the red planet Mars, now in morning twilight, will rise at 5.18am in Virgo to be in the glare of the sun. Jupiter, the giant gas planet, in Virgo rises at 5.05am in the start of morning twilight. On Wednesday 13th, Jupiter will be at 1.6 degrees south of the moon and rises at 4.21am on Friday 22nd.

The ringed planet Saturn, rises at 1.41am in Gemini at

0.2 magnitude. Saturn rises at 12.52am on Friday 22nd.

Uranus, in Aquarius, sets at 3.48am on Saturday and 1.53 on Friday 22nd. Neptune sets at 2.43am in Capricornius on Saturday and will be 5 degrees north of the moon on Friday 22nd at 7.9 magnitude.

The small rocky planet Pluto in Serpens sets at 10.52pm and can only be observed through a large telescope.

Meteors can be observed in the early morning sky in Gemini on Monday 18th and on Friday 22nd there will be meteors at 25 per hour in the constellation of Orion (the Saucepan).

High above is the boomerang shape of Capricornus, with Aquarius following just to the east. Along the Milky Way to the north are Aquila the eagle and Cygnus the swan, while the bright blue star Vega in Lyra is starting to set in the north-west. In the north-east is the great square of Pegasus with Andromeda following, containing the large galaxy M31 which can be seen by the naked eye as a smudge in the night sky. Slightly to the south-east of Capricornus is a line of double stars in the constellation of Grus the crane, and if you look just south of the double stars there are three stars in a triangle—this is the head. The wings are two stars on one side and the bright blue star Alnair is the other. Between Grus and Aquarius is the bright star Formalhaut, the southern fish that has a halo of material around it which is thought to be a planet forming as did the sun billions of years ago.

Myths and Facts

Myth: People with a mental illness are violent.

Fact: 90-95% of people with a mental illness are no more inclined to violence than the general population.

Myth: People with a mental illness should be kept in isolation, away from the community.

Fact: One in five of us will experience a mental illness at some stage in our lives. It would be both extremely costly, socially economically, to isolate 20% of the population. Part of recovering from mental illness is being able to interact in everyday living situations.

People with a mental illness have an intellectual disability or a type of brain damage.

Fact: Mental illnesses are just like other forms of illness, such as diabetes of asthma. wouldn't enter our mind to think that someone with asthma is brain damaged or intellectually disabled, so why would we think of someone with a mental illness in this way?

Myth: People with a mental illness have a flawed or weak character.

Fact: People are not to blame for becoming Having a mental illness has mentally ill. nothing to do with a lack of will power. People do not choose to be mentally ill, any more than people choose to have heart disease.

Through this kind of stereotyping, we reduce people with a mental illness to being a symptom of their illness, rather than a person in their own right. It is far easer to hate or ignore someone when you see them as an illness, rather than as a person.

The stigma surrounding mental illness has not occurred overnight. Stereotypes, myths and misconceptions can take years to develop into what we mistakenly believe is reality. It will take time to deconstruct much of the stigma in our society, especially because we don't identify it as anything other than reality. There is much we can do to actively challenge stigma, and everyone can play a role.

National Mental Health Week

An Overview

- One in five Australians have experienced a mental disorder each year.
- Mental illness is a general term referring to a group of illnesses that can be separated into two categories - psychotic and nonpsychotic.
- Fear of mental illness prevents may people with symptoms form seeking help for conditions that could otherwise be controlled before they develop into major problems or life-threatening illnesses.
- Mental illness can be transient and periodic. The vast majority of these illnesses can be successfully treated with people returning to live full and satisfying lives.
- While it is believed that some mental illnesses are caused by a physical dysfunction of the brain, the precise triggers are not yet known.
- STRESS may trigger some mental illnesses or prolong episodes.
- People who suffer form a mental illness are

- often frightened by their illness and often suffer rejection and discrimination.
- Psychotic illness included schizophrenia and bipolar affective disorder (manic depression) and effect around 1% of Australians.
- People with psychoses may develop delusions and experience hallucinations or may be depressed or elated about their life circumstances.
- Non-psychotic illnesses include phobias, anxiety, depression, dissociative disorders and obsessive compulsive disorder and are the most common mental health problems.
- Nearly one million Australians are prescribed mind-affecting medication.
- About one third of people in public hospitals who have mental illnesses are younger than 30 years of age.
- There are 20,000 new cases of mental illness diagnosed each year.
- Only a few people will suffer from a chronic, unmanageable form of mental illness.

Farmers Helping Farmers

FARMERS at Brookton and Boyup Brook this month will open their gates to others in their district while they participate in a safety audit, as part of a new fully subsidised advisory service.

The first farm to be assessed will be at Narelle and Bevan Bignell's Rylington Park operation at Boyup Brook on October 14th. Murray and Ian Hall's Hillroy Farms Pty Ltd, at Brookton will participate in the Service on October 29th.

Co-ordinated through the Farmsafe WA Alliance, the new service offers farmers a non-threatening forum to discuss their legal requirements for occupational health and safety independent qualified safety consultant.

The fully accredited advisor will conduct risk assessments and prepare safety and health action plans on the host farms. Nearby farmers will be able to participate in the assessment and they will be provided with the knowledge to then go back and complete a safety audit on their property.

The strategy, which is funded through Worksafe,

aims to increase the number of Western Australian agriculture enterprises with safety and health action plans in place.

It will run for the 2004-2005 financial year and targets the following groups in the agriculture industry:

- * Grain growing;
- * Grain-sheep and grain-beef cattle farming;
- * Sheep-beef cattle farming (beef sector);
- * Beef cattle farming; and
- * Dairy cattle farming.

The Alliance will administer and deliver the strategy in collaboration with WA Farmers and agriculture industry associations.

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Aerial Spraying Incidents Prompt Warning

Western Power and WorkSafe have grave concerns about aerial spraying safety after several recent serious incidents involving overhead power lines in regional WA.

Western Power has received eight reports of spraying aircraft flying through and bringing down overhead power lines during August and September, while WorkSafe has had five incidents reported since March.

There have been no injuries to pilots but both agencies attribute this largely to luck, and say action must be taken now to ensure safety in aerial spraying activity.

WorkSafe WA Commissioner Nina Lyhne said there was great potential for tragedy when aerial sprayers struck power lines.

"Fortunately none of the aircraft have crashed as a result of striking power lines, but if they did, a death could easily result.

"Aerial spraying activity has increased dramatically as a result of the rust outbreak and forecast locust

plague this summer, so I urge both land owners and aerial spraying operators to take every possible precaution to ensure safe work practices while spraying."

Western Power General Manager Networks Doug Aberle said pilots needed to check on the location of overhead power lines with land owners before spraying commenced.

"Pilots and land owners need to do some forward planning by discussing the location of any lines on the property and considering them in relation to the sprayer's likely flight path," Mr Aberle said.

"The recent incidents involving power lines occurred in the Central Wheatbelt from Mingenew to Northam and Moora to Koorda, and resulted in the need to replace at least seven power poles and more than 20 bays of power line.

"These incidents interrupt power supply in the local areas, and crops can be damaged by Western Power crews when they go into paddocks to carry out repairs to the poles and lines."
