The Lakes District Local Drug Action Group (LDAG) held a successful stall at the Newdegate Field Day event. With thought-provoking and eye catching posters and information brochures on display about the dangers of drugs and excessive alcohol consumption, the stall holders had many visitors stopping by to enquire about and discuss drug and alcohol information. With Holyoake representatives also in attendance at the stall, drug and alcohol related mental health issues were able to be answered as well. Consisting of alcohol and drug counsellors, Holyoake partner well with LDAG.

A quiz wheel was heavily utilized with players having a chance to win merchandise, including shopping bags (which come in very handy now with the plastic bag-free rule at shops), Frisbees, water bottles, stress balls, slapbands (hugely popular with the children) and many more fun and useful items.

A short quiz was filled out by many, with the chance to win one of five iTunes music vouchers. With the winners being drawn earlier this week, it was shown to be entered by a mixture of both local and state-wide attendees. The successful entrants were Kelly Callope, Hayden Gossage, Django Featherstone, Wade Cook and Jenny Davidson.

The following questions were in the quiz:

- Does cannabis use increase your risk of schizophrenia?
- Does steroid use lead to acne?
- Can ecstasy use lead to heat stroke?
- Is it an offence for anyone to supply under 18's with alcohol in a private setting without parental or guardian permission?
- Does methamphetamine use lead to a range of mental health problems such as anxiety, depression, paranoia and psychosis?

The answer to all the above questions is yes. It was interesting to read the results of the completed quiz as it gave us a wider understanding of what people believe to be true about the use of drugs. This is further proof of

Lake Grace Engineering started in 1999 with a staff of one, this being Clint. The business grew so quickly that Clint and Tracey were having to employ others to help.

In the last few years as they have branched further into product manufacturing and with the customer base growing rapidly Lake Grace Engineering have had the need to employ more and more staff. They currently have 13 employees, including Clint and Tracey.

As most businesses and organisations have found, it's very difficult to entice people to move to the country areas for work. Couple that with the need to find those with the correct skills for the job and you have a dilemma if you're trying to grow your business.

However they have had great success employing foreign residents through the Skilled Visa program. This has brought new families to the town who want to settle here into the community.

To help their staff further develop their careers and personal lives Clint and Tracey organised a professional development day; although this involved them closing their workshop down for the day they considered it well worth the investment. The all-day workshop provided workplace skills such as customer service, productivity, job costing and time management; the facilitator also touched on general personal finance and the traps to avoid.

With many of their staff having overseas backgrounds, this workshop was a great familiarisation process to help them steer their way through the Australian landscape both professionally and personally.

Looking at celebrating 20 years in business next year Lake Grace Engineering have a solid reputation that is becoming more widely known, having recently sold their first Seed and Super Bin interstate to Tasmania.

Planning Your Funeral

Dying can be a stressful business, not so much for the person who died but certainly for those left behind. Hoping to alleviate some of that stress the lake Grace CRC held an 'Organising Your Funeral' information session with Ben Steicke from Dawsons Funeral Home in attendance.

The most important question is burial or cremation? Sadly many families arrive to organise a loved ones funeral and find that they don't even know the answer to that. From there it can go downhill and Ben recounts that a higher than expected percentage of families are in conflict before their loved one has gone to their final resting place.

Like many funeral homes Dawson's have a booklet that you can prefill. This booklet can be given to Dawson's and they can keep on file; alternatively, you can keep the booklet yourself or give to the family member who's most likely to be organising your final journey. Ben had left a number of these booklets with the CRC, we only have one left at this stage but will be organising more.

So what was the wisdom of Ben?

Funeral insurance, is it worth it? A big fat no. If you want to put some money aside put it in a high interest bank account and let it build. Ben recounted one gentleman in his 80's who had paid over \$30,000 into funeral insurance; he feels obligated

now to keep on paying it. Another client had paid for years, one payment 18 months prior to their death had not gone through and although the payment for that month and the following 18 months continued the Insurance company refused to honour the claim; instead reimbursing the family 18 months of payments. Quite immoral.

- Funeral Bonds? A good way to go but remember the money is only available once you die. You can open with a minimum lump sum payment of \$500 and continue paying in or you can set up a payment plan (minimum of \$50). 


Established in 2013, by the Plymouth Brethren Christian Church (PBCC), RRT is an on the ground charity that channels their support into four key areas: youth, emergency services, homelessness, health and disability. Currently they're focussed on drought relief in NSW. On top of the 1268 tonnes they have already

donated, RRT has committed to another 100-150T of hay per week for the next 4-5 weeks for drought-stricken farmers in NSW.

Many transporters have donated their equipment and time to help with this initiative. Local freight companies Fyfe Transport and Stevemacs have both done the long haul delivery from WA to NSW.

Along with the farmers, support industries for the rural sector are also struggling with the drought having bitten hard into their bottom line.

Pension and Senior Card Advice

Under the Rates and Charges (Rebates and Deferments) Act 1992, the Local Governments are required to periodically review all pensioners.

If any of the details checked do not match, the claim may be rejected and concessions may be amended or cancelled.

Therefore, some things that pensioners and seniors may need to consider and advise the Shire about are:

- Do I hold a Commonwealth Seniors Health Card as well as a Seniors Card and am I only registered at the Shire with my Seniors Card?
- Has my partner also now received a card and we have not completed a joint application yet?
- As I am now not working more than 25 hours per week and am over 60, have I applied for a Seniors Card yet?
- Has the ownership of my property changed recently?
- Have I moved from one property to another and not made a new application for concessions with Water Corporation yet?
- Has my spouse ceased occupation of the property and I have not completed a new application?

If you work more than 25 hours per week, you are no longer eligible to have the Seniors Card and must return the card to Department of Community Services with a note advising them of your situation.

Unfortunately if concessions are cancelled, pensioners/ seniors do not get their rebates again until new applications are made.

But we all need to be aware of how these sites actually work to make sure we do get the best price, because the way the information has been selected and displayed may not be immediately transparent.

Under the Australian Consumer Law (ACL), you have the right to expect that comparator websites will provide truthful and accurate representations, statements or claims.

The Australian Competition and Consumer Commission (ACCC) has instituted proceedings in the Federal Court against trivago N.V. (Trivago) alleging it made misleading hotel pricing representations in its television advertising and website, in breach of the ACL.

The ACCC alleges that from at least December 2013, Trivago ran television advertisements presenting its website as an impartial and objective price comparison service that would help consumers identify the cheapest prices for hotel rooms. However, Trivago's website prioritised advertisers who were willing to pay the highest cost per click fee to the company.

Trivago's website aggregates deals offered by online

travel sites and hotel proprietors for available rooms at a hotel and then highlights one price out of all their advertisers, which the ACCC alleges created an impression that the highlighted price was the best deal. However, in many cases the highlighted price was not the cheapest available at that hotel.

So to get the best out of comparator websites you need to:

- Know what is being compared. The website may not compare all the offers or products in the market, so check what's on offer across a range of comparator sites.
- Check if there's a commercial relationship. The website operators may have commercial relationships with, or receive financial inducements from, listed businesses that can influence recommendations.
- Identify the site owner. Sometimes a comparator website is owned and operated by the same business that owns the products being compared.
- Work out what you need. Before you start searching, decide what non-price factors are

important to you such as hotel location or a direct flight rather than one requiring a stopover.

- Check offer availability on other websites including the service provider's website.
 Comparator website operators allow service providers to add or remove offers in a number of ways, such as placing restrictions on how many products can be sold in a month on that site.
- Double-check what's covered. Product classification can vary and you may need to check the websites of the service providers for the full details.
- Check the site's privacy policy. Some operators use your information for purposes other than comparing products. Make sure you are comfortable with how your data will be used.
- Work out the total cost. Be aware that these websites may compare the headline price only, with additional fees and charges only disclosed further down the track.

There are a number of comparator websites operated by government agencies. These websites are designed to provide consumers with industry-wide information and they are free of charge.

Reporting of Work-Related Hazards and Incidents

Media Release

WorkSafe has reminded workers and the community that hazards and incidents in their workplace can be anonymously reported by telephone or in writing.

Reports can also be made online 24 hours a day, seven days a week, but it is necessary to provide contact details – which will not be divulged to the employer - so inspectors can make contact to obtain further information.

WorkSafe WA Commissioner Ian Munns today reassured workers that reports and complaints could be made to WorkSafe in confidence.

"There are a number of ways in which workers can report workplace hazards or incidents to WorkSafe without fear of their identity being disclosed to others," Mr Munns said.

"WorkSafe encourages a consultative approach in workplaces, and hazards and incidents should initially be reported to the employer or an elected safety and health representative.

"But if consultation does not resolve the issue, or if a worker does not feel comfortable reporting within the workplace, they can report the matter to WorkSafe and request an inspector's intervention.

"Online reporting allows reports to be made at any time of day or night, from home or any other location if the person feels they need privacy.

"Contact details must be given so an inspector can follow up the report, but the inspector will not divulge the source of the report when they visit the workplace," he said.

"When contact details are provided, a reference number is given that confirms the report has been made and allows the person making the report to add further information at a later date or speak to an inspector about the progress of an investigation.

"It is sometimes reported that it is not possible to anonymously report hazards or incidents to WorkSafe or to keep a report confidential, but that is not the case.

"We strongly urge anyone in a workplace to report hazards and incidents with confidence that their privacy will be protected."

It's Swooping Season

Forget fake eyes and spiky helmets — if you want to avoid being attacked by magpies, just make an effort to be friends with them.

Swooping magpies are common in Australia at this time of year, as male birds attempt to protect eggs and chicks in their nests from predators.

Official government websites give tips to avoid being swooped and a crowdsourced online map tracks reports of swooping magpies nationwide. Some people go to great lengths to deter magpies from swooping, wearing fake eyes on the back of their head to fool the birds into thinking they are being watched.

But a magpie "will only swoop when he doesn't know somebody", said Gisela Kaplan, emeritus professor in animal behaviour at the University of New England and author of Bird Minds.

"We know that magpies remember and recognise human faces and they will remember them for years," Dr Kaplan told ABC Radio Melbourne's Sami Shah and Jacinta Parsons.

Dr Kaplan said that once a magpie knew you and judged you to be a nice person, you would have earned a friend for life.

"They will form very long friendships, like dogs," she



said.

On the other hand, if you are mean to a magpie it will bear a grudge for a long time.

Schoolchildren and others who wear a uniform may suffer the consequences if someone else wearing the same uniform has attacked the bird or thrown stones at them.

And if you haven't yet had time to make a magpie's acquaintance, you can avoid being attacked this spring by keeping your distance from nesting areas and not running if you are swooped.

It seems that despite their reputation for attacking passers-by, magpies have many fans — and we're not just talking Collingwood supporters.

Beneficial Garden Insects

Beneficial insects help manage pest populations in the garden. Greenhouse and orchard operators have used them to control pests for years. The key word is **control** - complete **prevention** of insect pests is not a realistic expectation. Pesticides are efficient; however, spraying eliminates not only the pests, but also the beneficial insects. In addition, pesticides also require regular applications, but a population of good bugs provides ongoing pest control service.

Beneficial insects operate by one of three methods:

- 1. **Predators** control insect pests by feeding on them. Some predators eat hundreds of pests in a single day.
- 2. **Parasitic** insects lay their eggs in, on, or near their chosen victim. Their larvae feed on and eventually kill their host. Smaller numbers of pests are destroyed by parasites than predators, but the outcome is the same.
- 3. **Pollinators**, especially bees, ensure the flowering and fruiting of the garden. Without this group's contribution, there would be no gardens.

How to Attract Beneficial Insects

You have more good bugs than you imagine in your garden already; otherwise, your garden probably wouldn't be there. If you want more good bugs, attract them with plants. Pollen and nectar-producing plants, especially perennials, offer shelter and food. Some examples include catnip, dill, parsley, yarrow, daisies, alyssum, cilantro, Queen Anne's lace, thyme, clover and goldenrod.

Water is also a welcome addition during hot dry times. A saucer of water with a stone placed in it for insects to rest on is a simple water source. Keep the water fresh to prevent mosquitoes.

Your six-legged mercenaries can also be purchased from specialty insect farms. They're often shipped as eggs or larvae, so don't expect them to pounce on the bad guys immediately. Introducing beneficial insects to your garden is a long-range remedy, not an immediate solution. It may take a few weeks for the newcomers to get busy. Even then, they may eat the pests, then die or fly away. Ideally, they will eat the pests, stick around and raise a family, beginning a resident population.

Follow the supplier's instructions carefully to ensure the most efficient time and method for establishing your new residents.

Beneficial insects help in the battle against garden pests, but don't expect complete eradication of the enemy. In spite of your efforts, occasional spraying may be necessary.

Common Beneficial Insects

All of the insects listed below are predators except for the Tachinid Fly and Trichogramma Wasp – they are parasitic.

Assassin Bug: They earn their pretty cool name by sneaking up on and attacking their prey. Assassins are up to 1 inch long and are identified by their long head and curved beak. They can also inflict a painful bite on humans. Assassin bugs prey on mosquitoes, flies, caterpillars, beetles and anything else that moves.

Ground Beetle: Ground beetles are up to 1 inch long, with black or brown shells. They like to hide under yard debris and loose bark. There are many varieties and shapes. They are welcome consumers of cutworms, maggots, snails and slugs.

Lacewing: Adult lacewings are about 3/8 inch long. Their delicate wings easily identify them. They eat aphids, thrips, lice and other larvae.

Ladybug or Ladybeetle: The larvae resemble alligators and are just as ravenous as the more easily recognized and familiar adult beetles. They eat aphids, thrips, tree lice and other larvae.

Praying Mantis: Fascinating to observe, the praying mantis can grow up to four inches long. There is some debate about keeping praying mantis since they will eat anything, including their own kind.

Soldier Beetle: About 1/2 inch long, they resemble lightning bugs. Soldier beetles primarily eat caterpillars, bean and potato beetles.

Tachinid Fly: Similar to a house fly, only hairier, tachinids tend to stay near plants, not people. They attack moths, bean and potato beetles, grasshoppers, caterpillars and cutworms.

Trichogramma Wasp: Don't let the word wasp scare you — this species is too small to see but is a valuable control. This wasp preys on worm larvae, borers, webworms, leafworms and cutworms.


