# Frankie's Headed to Frame Running Camp

Frankie McKenzie and his family, Jeff, Symone and Jonti are looking forward to attending the Australasian Frame Running Camp and Cup being held at the University of Queensland's UQ Sport Athletics Centre.

The Australasian Frame Running Camp and Cup, being held from the 30<sup>th</sup> September to the 2<sup>nd</sup> October, is an event for learning how to frame run, find out about the benefits of frame running from leading therapists, have fun playing games, and compete in races. And for Frankie, it also means meeting and having fun with others like himself living with a physical disability. Activities that will be held over the three days include: the opening ceremony, team and individual games, mentoring sessions, learning about frame running, therapy sessions and competing in races with awards presented at the conclusion of the camp.

Have you ever heard of frame running? Many may not have seen this sport before. Frame running, also known as race running, is a sport for people with a physical disability that results in impaired balance and are unable to functionally run. A frame runner is a three wheeled frame where the athlete is supported by a saddle and body plate. They then propel themselves forward using their feet, and steer using the mobility within their arms and/or hands. It is a great sport for giving independence and the ability to experience the feeling of running when, someone like Frankie who was born with cerebral palsy, may normally be in a wheelchair, walker or have difficulty walking independently.

Symone and Jeff feel it is important that all their children are given equal opportunities to participate in activities that they enjoy. Frankie has been participating in frame running in Perth through Rebound WA, who specialise in sports for people with a disability, after being referred by his physiotherapist at the Perth Children's hospital. So, when the opportunity to attend this event came up, the McKenzie family didn't hesitate in booking the time to go. The family are grateful for the support of the local Lake Grace Lions Club who have donated towards this trip and the Lake Grace community who are behind then in many ways.

WorkSafe Commissioner Darren Kavanagh announced the Inquiry in June after the 12<sup>th</sup> death in the agriculture sector over a 12-month period. Ms Scott was appointed last month to undertake the Inquiry.





# Free Mammograms for Women

BreastScreen WA's **FREE** screening mammogram service is coming to Lake Grace from11th October to 18<sup>th</sup> October and the mobile clinic will be located at the Lake Grace Shire Hall. Women 40 years and over with no symptoms are eligible for a FREE screening mammogram.

Breast cancer is the most common life threatening cancer for women and 1 in 7 women in Australia will develop breast cancer in their lifetime.

Having a screening mammogram (breast x-ray) every two years significantly increases the chance of a woman surviving breast cancer and reduces the amount of treatment required. More than 75% of breast cancers occur in women over the age of 50. Research shows that screening is most effective for this age group.

BreastScreen WA's Medical Director Dr Elizabeth Wylie, said screening mammography was the most effective method for early detection of breast cancer.

"Screening every two years is vitally important to increase the chance of a breast cancer being detected when it is too small to feel or be noticed. Finding a cancer at this early stage often means that the breast cancer is small and more treatable".

"A free screening mammogram is one of the best things that women can do to look after their health. Breast

screening saves lives and only takes 20 minutes," said Dr Wylie.

Screening mammograms may detect 70-90% of breast cancers. Any woman with a persistent change in a breast should contact her doctor immediately.


We are also part of the Southern Art Trail this year, so the need to keep to the advertised opening time is important.

#### **STATION NEWS**

It's been a busy fortnight for us here at the Lake Grace Police Station. The Newdegate Field Days were a great success and there were no reported offences over the two days. Some may have noticed a large number of police at the event and that would be because we had officers from Wagin, Dumbleyung, Wickepin, Kulin, Kondinin, and Corrigin Police Stations. It was a great turnout and we all had a great time and enjoyed the friendly crowd.

#### **CRIME NEWS**

Unfortunately, we have had three more reports of payment redirection scams. These are becoming increasingly common in our area. For those who aren't aware a payment redirection scam, also known as business email compromise scams, occur when scammers impersonate a business or its employees via email and request that money, which usually is owed to the legitimate business, is sent to a fraudulent account.

In all cases the victim has noticed the BSB and account number for the business had changed from the normal account. They have done the right thing and contacted the business to confirm the change of details. The victim only confirmed the account had changed, not the specific account details. Two invoices were found to be a scam as one business had recently changed their account details. The invoice for \$60,000 was paid into the scammers account as a result. This is a reminder to confirm both the BSB and account number prior to payment of an invoice.

Businesses should look at removing BSB and account details from their invoices and either direct customers to their website, where those details can be found, or provide them over the phone. If a customer is directed to your website it is suggested the link not be provided as this can also be altered, and the customer should use Google, or similar, to find the website.

Lake Grace Police were also contacted by the South Australian Police in regards to a similar matter in their jurisdiction. A Newdegate resident has been the unknown victim of identity theft. The suspects have set up a bank account in the victim's name and used the account to receive stolen or fraudulently obtained funds before transferring the money onto its next destination, which is ultimately overseas. Identity theft is also becoming increasingly common. The Australian Federal Police (AFP) website has a lot of useful information on the subject and a list of things you can do to reduce the chances of becoming a victim of this crime.

#### TRAFFIC NEWS

We've been catching even more drivers driving under

the influence of drugs lately. Three in just eight days. Road policing and road safety are of paramount importance to us. This has been a very concerning trend considering the dangers of impaired driving. In response we have secured more drug testing kits and will be increasing our random and targeted roadside drug testing. We have received more drug testing equipment than we used in the entire 2021 period with the promise of more should it be required.

We ask that anyone who has concerns about an impaired driver contact us like you would any other crime. We are more than happy to remove these unsafe drivers from the roads.

#### **Update your devices**

Updating your devices can fix issues and address new security concerns or weaknesses that hackers could use to access your devices. They can also add new features to your apps or device.

# Turn on multi-factor authentication (MFA)

MFA means having more than one check in place to prove your identity on an account. For example, you may need a code from a text message and your passphrase. It makes it much harder for cybercriminals to access your accounts.


# Set up and perform regular backups

A backup is a digital copy of your most important information either to an external storage device or a server on the internet like the cloud. It means you can restore your files if something goes wrong.



#### Set up secure passphrases

When MFA is not available, use a passphrase to secure your account. Passphrases are the more secure version of passwords, using four or more random words as your password. This makes them hard for cybercriminals to guess but easy for you to remember.



#### Recognise and report scams

Criminals often use email, SMS, phone calls and so cial media to scam people that are made to appear as if they were sent from individuals or organisations you think you know, or you think you should trust.

Always be alert when clicking on attachments or links within emails.


When Jason Riley goes missing, his family—make that families have many questions.

# Paddy Hart - Part One

State Library of WA, Oral Histories

The Cheynes Beach Whaling Company was the last whaling company to cease operations in Australia, closing in 1978. On the evening 21<sup>st</sup> November 1978, the Cheynes II, Cheynes III and Cheynes IV berthed at the Albany Town Jetty after their last whale hunt. The last shore based whaling station in Australia closed and 178 years of whaling in Albany waters came to an end.

Now a tourist attraction, Albany's Historic Whaling Station is the only experience of its kind in the world. You can explore an intact whale processing factory and whale chasing ship – fully restored and ready for you to discover. Opening in 1980 (known then as Whale World), it is now home to an interactive museum on whales and whaling.

This story is based on the oral history of James (Paddy)

I got my nickname Paddy from Ches Stubbs. Being Irish where everyone is supposed to be called Paddy or Molly, he couldn't remember my name at times so I just got Paddy and it stuck.

My mother's side were all seafaring people. On my father's side, well there was a mixture of politicians, labourers, rogues, and whatnot. (laughs).

I grew up in Dublin, finished school at age fourteen, and was apprenticed to be a chef but didn't stay long with it.

I went to sea, starting as a galley boy cleaning pots and pans until I sat for and received my chief cook's ticket. At 20 years old I was the youngest chief cook in the Irish Merchant Navy.

In the 1950s I was on trampers, steamers... with no predetermined port of call, they just went around the world picking cargo up. You could be away for any period from six months to two years and could only sign off in Ireland or Europe.

It was extremely tough cooking under those conditions because seamen like Australian shearers are notorious whingers. Everything had to be perfect. In those days they weren't beyond punching you in the face if things weren't correct either. (laughs) We would carry provisions for six or eight months and consequently, we ate a lot of haricot beans and all sorts.

Coming up to 21 years of age, I was a crew member on the Irish Spruce and we berthed in Albany. It was a small country town in 1959 and I found the Australians terrific. I loved the place. There seemed to be plenty of work and opportunity, so I jumped ship.

But I soon found out that while it was easy to get work - as a building contractor and salmon fisherman - because I was an illegal immigrant it was very hard to get paid for doing it. Eventually, one of the contractors to avoid paying me, dobbed me into the police.

I was sentenced to be deported back to Ireland and spent time in Fremantle jail but managed to get a permit for six months on the proviso that I worked and was of good character. After six months that was extended to permanent status.

I returned to Albany and was recruited by a couple of drunken deckhands at the White Star Hotel, as a cook on the whale catcher the KOS VII.

The cook on a whaleboat was responsible for planning the menus - steak, chops, a roast, fish, bacon, and eggs, and depending on how temperamental he was, he'd be open to suggestions. The food budget was always quite substantial and there was a galley boy to help. He washed the dishes, peeled the vegetables, and mopped the floors.

In the galley on the KOS VII, there was a wood stove. Outside lashed to the rail were two 44-gallon drums with the tops cut off and filled with wood. Quite often in rough weather, the drums would get washed away so there wouldn't be any wood to cook with. Serving tinned tucker always went down with the crew like a lead balloon.

The comfort on ships in those days was non-existent for the crew. There was no relaxation space, and the quarters were very cramped, four men to a cabin. There were double bunks, perhaps a wardrobe and a couple of drawers, that's all. The skipper's cabin though was vastly different. He had his own double bunk, a lounge type of thing, plus his own toilet and shower.

After only two weeks of being a cook on the KOS VII, I applied for a job as a deckhand and continued from

there. Over the next five years I progressed on the Cheynes II to second mate, then to first mate, and finally to skipper.

A typical day during the 1960s sperm whaling in Albany started at 3 o'clock in the morning. The engineer and fireman would get up an hour earlier to prepare the boilers and get steam up. The skipper took the boat out from the jetty, through the channel, and out into the Sound, and then he retired.

From 3 o'clock till 8 o'clock there were four people on watch - two on deck and two in the engine room. At 6 o'clock the cook would be called and he'd start his work and at 8 o'clock the first watch would be relieved by the second watch.

In a lot of cases during the peak whaling period, people on an early watch might only get their heads down for a half hour before we were whaling solid all day. Harpoons were prepared on rough weather days when it was extremely difficult to tow a whale in.

Everyone got an adrenaline rush when whales were spotted. The spotter would call out "Whales" and then give directions like "starboard quarter, five miles" or something like that. We'd put the binoculars on then and watch for the blows.

A typical sperm blow hole was offset on the side of his head so it would blow to the side - a good strong blow. Whereas a killer whale had a blow hole in the centre of his head and it was just a wispy blow. The larger whales like the blue whales were very distinctive, one real high blow.

We only took large bulls, large old bulls which had finished their working life. We generally left the cows alone. People believed that we were decimating the stocks but that wasn't quite right in the case of the sperm whale. With the humpback unfortunately that was the case because they were very close offshore and the cow was large, if not larger than the bull, so it was taken a lot. Their stocks were decimated and it required a 50-year moratorium to bring the stocks back.

It didn't matter if you went whaling every day it was always different and you were always expecting the unexpected. Once you got to chasing speed it was nearly impossible to sleep so generally the crewmen that were off duty would hop out of the bunks, come up on deck and have a cup of coffee. Chasing speed was about 12 knots, depending on the weather conditions or if you were following or running into the sea.

The skipper was the master gunner so he shot the whale. Then the mate took over and it was his duty to get the whale alongside for towing. He directed

operations on deck. The second mate always operated the winch and then the four deckhands were sent to different areas. It was a team effort.

The first whale killing I saw was kind of sad. I will always remember it. I couldn't believe that you could kill such a large animal instantly, and that was a bit of a relief. I always thought the method satisfactory and quite humane because it was in no one's interest to prolong the agony or to be complacent. Generally speaking, everybody tried to make a clean kill.

The number of whales you'd get on a day depended on conditions and how early you got to them and how easy the whales were to catch. Some days you could go straight up to them and they'd be relaxed and other days they'd dive and stay under for hours so you couldn't really work out an average, you know.

Navigational aids in the early days were not good, but seeing as how we only went along the coast landmarks were extremely important for bearings, as were lighthouses. The radars on the Cheynes II and III originally were old valve jobs that came out at the end of the Second World War. They always broke down when you needed them most, and didn't seem to penetrate through a lot of weather.

In the evening you would head into King George Sound with whales in tow (tagged to identify which boat they'd come from), to the whaling station. A tow boat would be

waiting to take your whales from you. Then you'd proceed back to the town jetty and if you had enough harpoons for the next day the married men would go home. The single chaps would go to the pub, then back to the chaser to sleep.

Skipper Ches Stubbs was quite a character. He was just the greatest guy under the sun to get along with and quite generous. I can recall him inviting the whole crew up to the Chinese restaurant for a meal and it must have cost him a packet. But when he got on the hunt his personality changed. He became very excitable and berate anyone for anything that went wrong.

On occasions, Ches took his white sulfur-crested cockatoo out to sea for a bit of a trip. This was an exception because there were no pets or women allowed on the chasers. Once a woman was smuggled on and there was hell to pay.

We built a perch on the back of the bridge for the cocky. The crewmen considered her a bloody nuisance as they wore thongs and she would start chewing at their toes.

Then one day we had a whale on the line, the bird took fright and fell into the water. Ches wanted someone to jump in and get his bird but we weren't having any part of that. We got her out with a boat hook and tried to give her mouth-to-mouth resuscitation because the last thing we wanted to tell Ches was that his bird was dead. But try as we might the bird was dead and that was it.

Please contact the Shire to book Shire facilities.

The new Australian Fire Danger Rating System has now commenced. The new system has simplified the number of ratings from 6 to 4 and has been harmonised across the country, providing a consistent experience for tourists and residents alike. To provide consistency, the system adapts to the relevant vegetation types within the forecast area where previously only 2 fuel types were utilised.

Catastrophic For your survival, leave bushfire risk areas. These are the most dangerous conditions for a fire. Homes cannot withstand fires in these conditions and if a fire starts and takes hold, lives are likely to be lost. Stay safe by going to a safer location early in the morning or the night before.
