

What's Happening With the Argus?

Fairfax Media has announced plans to restructure its Western Australian operations and revitalise its newspapers and websites with a significant investment in new digital publishing technology and training for journalists and sales staff.

The proposal includes the closure of some newspapers and workforce reductions.

The company is halfway through an 18-month overhaul of its Australian Community Media (ACM) division aimed at building a stronger, sustainable and modern media network of newspapers and websites serving regional, rural and suburban Australia.

Staff across WA were briefed on Thursday about the proposed changes at Farm Weekly, Bunbury Mail, Mandurah Mail, Busselton-Dunsborough Mail, Collie Mail, Augusta-Margaret River Mail, Esperance Express, Merredin Wheatbelt Mercury, Donnybrook Bridgetown Mail, Wagin Argus, Avon Valley Advocate and Central Midlands Advocate.

Under the proposal, the Merredin Wheatbelt Mercury, Central Midlands Advocate and Wagin Argus newspapers would no longer be published, with the popular Farm Weekly to expand its editorial coverage of those regions.

Staff at some smaller offices in the group would be relocated to new arrangements locally.

If the proposal goes ahead, the company expects to call for voluntary redundancies of about 21 full-time equivalent positions. This includes about 10 full-time equivalent positions in editorial, with the balance from administration and sales.

Consultation with employees is now under way.

Business Manager of ACM's Western Australia operations Percy Henry and recently appointed WA Group Manager Trevor Emery will oversee the restructure.

Mr Emery said the business had no choice but to "adapt and evolve in response to how audiences are consuming news and information".

"Led by Farm Weekly, our newspapers and websites will have a strong voice in rural and regional Western Australia and champion issues in the local communities we will continue to serve," he said.

Director of ACM John Angilley said the WA plan was based on a detailed assessment of the needs of the business in order to sustain the important work of Fairfax publications across the state.

"Our mastheads must embrace truly transformational change and better focus resources to ensure they remain the most trusted source of news and information for years to come," Mr Angilley said.

Group Managing Editor Travis King and Group Sales Manager Wendy Gould will lead the editorial and sales teams, respectively.

The proposal includes investing in a new digital-first publishing system, equipping journalists and sales teams with new technology and skills, introducing new ways of working, and refreshing and redesigning the company's stable of newspapers.

"Our journalists and our sales teams will work with new skills, capabilities and resources so they can continue to do what they do best - create quality journalism and connect advertisers to our audiences," Mr Angilley said.

"Our NewsNow editorial model involves journalists reporting local news across multi-media as well as being trained to write headlines and captions and take photographs.

"Quality-checking processes and procedures are built into the system and our editors remain responsible for maintaining editorial standards."

Thursday's announcement follows the introduction of new technology and new ways of working at ACM mastheads in regional Queensland, Victoria, and the Illawarra and south-west regions of NSW.

Mr Angilley said no final decisions had been made about the WA business.

"Our full focus and attention in the weeks ahead is consulting with our staff in Western Australia to ensure everyone fully understands the proposal and has the opportunity to share their feedback with us," he said.

Fairfax's ACM network includes hundreds of newspapers and websites serving regional, rural and suburban communities in every Australian state and territory.

The final decision for the future of the Wagin Argus will be made on October 10. Ed.

Why Agatha Christie is Even More Awesome Than You Thought

Today marks the 125th birthday of famed British novelist Agatha Christie, a pioneer of detective fiction best-known for creating enigmatic characters Hercule Poirot and Miss Marple along with suspenseful whodunits like "Murder on the Orient Express" and "The Mousetrap." But even Christie's less-publicized accomplishments are impressive. Below, a few highlights that may surprise you.

1. She wrote her first novel on a bet.

Agatha Christie wrote her first novel, "The Mysterious Affair at Styles," because her sister Madge bet her that she couldn't. The book was published in 1916 and featured Hercule Poirot, a Belgian detective who would appear in many of her works.

2. She knew how to catch a wave.

Christie is the first British woman documented to have stood up while riding a surfboard, according to Pete Robinson, founder of the Museum of British Surfing. In 1922, Christie's first husband, Archie, was helping to organize a world tour promoting the British Empire Exhibition, an event celebrating British imperialism that ran during the summers of 1924 and 1925 in Wembley Stadium in north London. While in Cape Town, the two took up surfing. They later travelled to

Australia, New Zealand and Hawaii, where Christie stood up on her board for the first time. She wrote about the experience in her autobiography:

"I learned to become expert – or at any rate expert from the European point of view – the moment of complete triumph on the day that I kept my balance and came right into shore standing upright on my board!"

3. She was a part-time archaeologist.

In 1928, Christie became interested in archaeology and toured a dig led by archaeologist Sir Charles Leonard Woolley at Ur, an ancient Mesopotamian city, in Iraq. She was invited back the following year, when she met her second husband, archaeologist Max Mallowan. Christie learned to help out and assisted on several of Mallowan's digs while also reserving time for writing.

4. She was an expert on poisons.

Christie's novels are known for their descriptions of poisons, with more than 80 people having fallen victim to poison in her stories. In "The Pale Horse," she described the symptoms of thallium poisoning so well doctors were able to use it to identify and cure a real case.

Christie learned about poison while working as a nurse and pharmacy dispenser during World War I. She addressed her preoccupation with poison while writing about her first book "The Mysterious Affair at Styles" in her autobiography. "Since I was surrounded by poisons, perhaps it was natural that death by poisoning should be the method I selected," she wrote.

5. She's second only to Shakespeare in popularity.

Christie is widely acknowledged to be the best-selling author in the world after Shakespeare. Her books have sold more than two billion copies and translated into more than 103 languages.

6. Her characters received the star treatment.

The New York Times ran a full-page obituary for Hercule Poirot on Aug. 6, 1975, shortly before "Curtain: Poirot's Last Case" was published. The first paragraph read, "Hercule Poirot, a Belgian detective who became internationally famous, has died in England. His age was unknown." It is the only time the paper has published an obituary for a fictional character.

7. She wrote the world's longest-running play.

Christie is the author of "Mousetrap," the world's longest-running play. First performed in 1952, the play is still running at the St. Martins Theatre in London. Its run exceeds that of the longest-running Broadway show, "Phantom of the Opera," which opened in 1988 and continues today at the Majestic Theatre. She was also the first female playwright to have had three plays running on the West End simultaneously.

Speaker, Author, Walkley Award Winning Journalist

Estelle Blackburn took on the justice system and, against all odds, rectified two grave injustices, demonstrating the power of an individual to alter history and improve society at a fundamental level.

Now based in Canberra, Estelle is a former Perth journalist who has worked for The West Australian and the ABC, various WA Government ministers and a Premier. She gave up full-time work and spent six years researching and writing the book Broken Lives, published in 1998.

Estelle's book exposed an injustice which led to the 2002 and 2005 exonerations of John Button and Darryl Beamish, who had been convicted of murder in the 1960s, and created history as the longest standing convictions to be overturned in Australia. Her unfunded, determined sleuthing unearthed fresh evidence that prompted the Attorney General to allow the men new appeals after they had lost a combined total of seven Appeals in the 60s.

Coming across the story by chance and persisting with it turned Estelle's life around. Here was a courageous woman who without a second thought impoverished herself to fight the cause for strangers. With no legal training and armed only with extraordinary qualities of courage and determination, she took on the system and won. Because of her vision, hard work and self-sacrifice the justice system may have been set on a truer course.

This work won her an Order of Australia medal in the 2002 Queens Birthday Honours List for her service to the community through investigative journalism. She has also won journalism's highest honour, a Walkley Award for the Most Outstanding Contribution to Journalism, the Perth Press Club Award, Western Australia's Clarion Award, the Premier's Award for nonfiction, the Australian Crime Writers' Award for best true crime, and a scholarship to undertake a PhD in journalism at Murdoch University. She was also awarded a Churchill Fellowship to study innocence organisations overseas and undertook this study in 2008.

Estelle has also been included in 25 Most Outstanding Western Australians, won WA's Woman of the Year in 2005, won WA Citizen of the Year in Arts and Entertainment in 2010 and was inducted into the WA Women's Hall of Fame in 2011. She has also been the subject of three one-hour episodes of the ABC's Australian Story shown in 1998, 2002 and 2007, a 60 Minutes segment and an episode of the US Forensic Files program.

In an entertaining, motivational, informative, humorous and inspirational speech, Estelle Blackburn details the events in Perth in 1963, when a serial killer changed forever the psyche of the previously safe, secure, 'big country town'. With pictures and television clips to illustrate the story, she takes the audience through the eight murders and 14 attempted murders of the last

person executed in Western Australia, Eric Edgar Cooke, and his insistence that two innocent men were in prison for murders he committed. John Button had been jailed for 10 years with hard labour for the hit-run murder of his girlfriend, and Darryl Beamish had been condemned to death (later commuted to life imprisonment) for the axe-murder of wealthy former Melbourne heiress and socialite Jillian Brewer. Despite Cooke's many and detailed confessions, including one on the gallows minutes before his execution, the wrongly convicted youths (Button and Beamish) lost a total of seven appeals in the 1960s and exhausted all legal avenues of proving their innocence. They lived their lives with the stigma of being murderers and the pain of injustice, and would go down in history as murderers.

Estelle tells how she chanced upon the story of these injustices after the men had served their time and were out of prison, why she decided to investigate it and how she tenaciously researched, sleuthed, found people and convinced them to reveal untold stories - and, after publishing a book that re-opened the cases, how she won the support of a newspaper editor who added scientific evidence, and convinced two top lawyers to take the new appeals pro bono in court cases that saw cameras permitted in a court room for the first time in Western Australia, and which ultimately resulted in the longest-standing convictions to be overturned in Australia.

Often described as Australia's Erin Brokovich, she has an amazing real life detective story encompassing murder, innocence, wrongful conviction, determination, perseverance and finally justice in her enthralling presentation 'Challenging Justice, Changing Lives'. Her presentation is motivational, inspiring, entertaining and spellbinding.


The Lake King and Varley Progress Associations have agreed to a 12 month trial with Lake Grace Shire and *drumMUSTER* to provide year-round access to both compounds with the support of local resellers.

Dumping has been a significant issue in the past and unfortunately, if it continues, the **drum**MUSTER service may be withdrawn completely.

Graeme Passmore, **drum**MUSTER Regional
Consultant for Western Australia, hopes the
trial will improve farmer participation and increase
fundraising for local communities.

"Strong community support and involvement can significantly lift farmer participation in **drum**MUSTER," he said.

"Over the past four years, deliveries in the Esperance Shire have increased from 6,000 to nearly 18,000 drums per year. This is during a period when estimated drums being sold by resellers have halved. Farmer deliveries also increased from 29 to 120 and community groups working with *drumMUSTER* in Esperance received close to \$4,000 to support their activities in 2014."

Employee in Profile - Madis Hein

In a bid to familiarise the community with their employees Lake Grace Engineering will be running an 'employee in profile' item in the Lakes Link, so next time you see Madis say hello!

I am from a small seaside country called Estonia! It is located on the border of North and East Europe, the neighbours being Finland, Russia and Latvia. There are 1.3 million people on nearly 50,000 square kms with lots of islands, lakes, rivers 50% of the country is forest and half of the border is seaside. In Estonia there is medieval architecture and castles. Old traditions are kept alive and we have the biggest collection of folk songs! Now IT is the main industry – free wifi, digital prescriptions, online voting, 5 minute tax returns, e-residency, digital signatures equal to handwritten ones.

I left behind my mother, father and my brother. This year my brother visited us in Lake Grace and worked and stayed in town for 3 months.

At home I gained my High School diploma and minored in border protection (additional certificate during high school). I then worked 4 years in construction, next 5 in Finland in shipyards.

I left Estonia to travel and see the world. I first arrived February 2012 in Sydney. I spent a month there, then moved to Queensland, 600kms from Brisbane to the outback (St George) where I worked for half a year on the second largest cotton farm as the workshop welder.

I am currently employed at Lake Grace Engineering and have been living in Lake Grace since March 2014. I am a qualified mig/mag and tig welder. I have a love for engineering, creating with your own mind instead of doing the same thing over and over again daily. I liked it quickly after a few tries. I find my job rewarding - no day is the same and if people leave with a smile on their face their expectations were met.

We have got to see some amazing parts of Australia. We had a week's holiday in the Whitsundays amongst four friends, rented a boat for five days/nights, snorkelled, bbq-d and had a few cold ones We had on boat training on the first day for four hours and then we were our own bosses after that! Great Barrier Reef, Whitehaven beach, it was a holiday of a lifetime! This year we travelled to Exmouth and got to go swimming with whale sharks, orcas and humpback whales in real life action. We witnessed the mothers training young ones how to hunt, water display in nature, dugongs, manta rays, sea turtles and reef sharks. Was really amazing.

There are quite a few differences in culture between our two countries. I find workers here are more experience based, people go to work at an early age where as in Estonia they would study at school longer, quite often they finish studies in the mid 20s. Also people are more straightforward in Estonia, and people do not take offence to it. On the other hand there is so

much more politeness in Australia, it is not that Estonians are rude, they are more outspoken. Australians are also much more tolerant/accepting to different people/cultures. I am lucky to take the best from both worlds.

I have played Aussie Rules Football for the first time of my life this season for the Lake Grace Bombers B grade. This was a great way to mix with the local community and learn new skills. I have really enjoyed playing this sport. In Estonia I played basketball, soccer and track and field events.

I would like to thank everyone in the Lake Grace community for being so welcoming and making our transition into the community so easy. We love living in Lake Grace! Initially we had the fear of the unknown when travelling to Australia but now we have no regrets.

Changes to the Incorporation Act

Taken from www.commerce.wa.gov.au/consumer-protection/associations-incorporation-bill-2014

The Associations Incorporation Bill 2014, was recently introduced into State Parliament, which if passed, will replace the current Act regulating WA's incorporated associations.

Following its successful passage through the Legislative Assembly (the Lower House) in March 2015, the Bill was introduced and second read in the Legislative Council (the Upper House) on March 26 2015. The Bill is now awaiting consideration by the Legislative Council.

Relevantly the Bill will require associations to update their rules as well as introducing a number of changes regarding:

Important: Please remember that the Bills provisions have no effect until passed by Parliament. The current requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1987 continue to apply to all incorporated associations.

Key Features of the Bill

Financial Reporting

The Bill introduced a three–tiered system of financial reporting and accountability requirements based upon the associations revenue.

- Tier 1 associations (revenue of less than \$250,000) can elect to prepare basic financial statements with no independent review or audit.
- Tier 2 associations (revenue of \$250,000 \$1,000,000) must prepare financial reports that give a true and fair view of the financial position of the association in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards. Such reports must be reviewed by a member of a professional accounting body.
- ☐ Tier 3 associations (revenue of more than \$1,000,000) must prepare financial reports that give a true and fair view of the financial position of the association in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards. Such reports must be audited by a professional accounting body holding a public practising certificate.

Associations will still be required to provide its financial reports to members; they are not required to be provided to the Commissioner.

Management

The Bill seeks to formalise the obligations of committee members, which already exist under other laws. These include:

- duties of care and diligence;
- to act in the best interests of the association and for a proper purpose; and
- □ not to misuse their position or information Eligibility requirements are also set out which prohibit persons from sitting on the management committee where they have:
- an undischarged bankrupt or whose affairs are under insolvency laws,
- been convicted with an offence involving fraud or dishonesty punishable on conviction by 3 months or more imprisonment; and
- been convicted of an offence in connection with the promotion, formation of management of a body corporate, including duties under the Bills provisions.

Whilst the prohibition period applicable is dependent upon the reasons for the disqualification, any person can request the Commissioner's approval to be appointed to the committee.

Privacy

The Bill provides measures to better protect the privacy of association members. Access to the membership register continues to be restricted to association members but now the Bill limits how the information

may be used and only including enough information in the register to enable contact to be made between members.

Model Rules

Importantly all associations will be required to update their rules and either adopt to the Model Rules, or adopt their own rules (provided that the rules comply with the new law). Where a set of rules does not comply with the Act or is silent on a matter, the relevant Model Rules clause will be applicable.

A significant transition period of three years has been included in the Bill to ensure associations have enough time to do so.

Dispute Resolution

The Bill requires each association to include an internal dispute resolution process in its rules. Any unresolved disputes between members of an incorporated association, and incorporated associations and their members can be heard by the State Administrative Tribunal (SAT).

Amalgamation

A procedure for amalgamation of two or more associations into a new incorporated association has been provided under the Act.

Winding Up

The Bill modifies the process an association uses for ending their incorporation. Associations can choose either a winding up, which is a formal process using a liquidator, or a cancellation of incorporation, which is a simpler process without the need of a liquidator.

Contact Address

Under the Bill each association will be required to give the Commissioner details of its address, and also notify the Commissioner of a change of address within 28 days of it occurring.

What to do now

With new legislation on the horizon all incorporated associations are encouraged to enrol for Associations Online to ensure they stay informed on the Bills progress.


Money for the IGA Community Chest is raised in a variety of ways through the IGA chain of stores. Generally, when you purchase a product with the IGA Community Chest logo printed on the label, a percentage is automatically credited to that store's IGA Community Chest account. For local activities the beneficiaries are then chosen by the local store. The philosophy behind the program is IGA beneficiaries should engage in the local community, promote health, fitness and wellbeing, and be a value adding and cultural fit.

The Community Chest and associated programs have raised over \$60 million for local community

Much of the equipment in use has been used for most of the thirty years gym has been held in Lake Grace! Our boys pommels (affectionately known as the "horse") are so old they are almost a museum specimen, so we intend to put the Community Chest donation towards the purchase of a new set - the total cost of which is in the vicinity of \$2 500!."

She continued "The members of the Lake Grace Gymnastics Club would like to thank very much, the Stanton family and the IGA Community Chest program for donating these funds to our Club - their investment in our club and the local community with this wonderful initiative is very much appreciated by us all."







A modern take on etiquette



This week we explore table manners.

We all like the opportunity to go out for a meal and whether it be at a restaurant or a friend's home everyone wants to be welcomed back.

There are a few things you can do to ensure a repeat invitation and a few things you shouldn't do!

- Don't eat with your mouth open no one wants to see your food.
- Don't talk with a mouthful nothing is that much of a conversational gem that it can't wait until you are finished.
- Ladies, keep your handbag off the table. Invest in a bag hook or place under your seat out of the way.
- Keep your feet off the table and chairs does this need explanation?
- Never use your fingers unless of course it is finger food and knives and forks have not been provided.
- If you find something that is not to your taste, leave it on your plate or if it's already gone in your mouth, discreetly dispose of the offending item into your serviette (not your linen napkin) or excuse yourself to do so.
- Always excuse yourself if you need to leave the table.
- Try not to reach across other diners. If you want the salt and pepper, then ask for it to be passed.
- Always thank your host and compliment the cook.
 Even if the food is not to your liking, they have made an effort to get it onto your plate.

What Is Loss and Grief?

Grief is a universal, instinctual and an adaptive reaction to loss, in particular the grief from the loss of a loved one. Feelings of loss are very personal and only you know what is significant. Less obvious losses can also cause strong feelings of grief such as loss of possessions, job, relationship, health, or physical ability.

Loss is an inevitable part of life and grief is a natural part of the healing process that varies for different people. The grieving process allows those left behind after a death to accept the person is no longer around.

When experiencing and reacting to grief, it is common to:

- feel like you are "going crazy"
- have difficulty concentrating
- feel sad or depressed, anxious, nervous or fearful
- be irritable or angry (at the deceased, oneself, others)
- feel frustrated or misunderstood
- feel like you want to escape
- experience guilt or remorse
- be ambivalent, lack energy and motivation
- feel numb.

Each one of us has an individual style of coping with painful experiences (there is no right or wrong way). Some people don't show their grief in public but only express it in private. We don't always know how people are coping simply by what we see.

The following tips may help generate ideas about how to manage feelings of grief:

- talk to family, friends or a mate
- engage in social activities
- exercise, eat healthy foods
- take time to relax, listen to music
- seek counselling or join a support group
- be patient and let yourself feel grief.

The length of the grief process is different for everyone. It takes time to heal and this may not be just days it can be weeks, months and even years.

Grief comes in waves. When the ship is first wrecked, you're drowning, surrounded by wreckage reminding you of the ship that was and is no more, and all you can do is float. As you float you hang onto a piece of wreckage for a while in the form of a physical thing (a memory or photograph), it may even be another person floating with you, and for a while that's all you can do is float. In the beginning you had 100 metre waves crashing over you 10 seconds apart barely allowing you to breath. After a while (maybe weeks or months) the 100 metre waves still come crashing over you but they are now further apart allowing you to breathe and function without as much difficulty. There will be triggers of grief that will arise (a song, a place, a photo) and a wave will come crashing but in between there is

life. Somewhere down the line (it is different for everybody) you will find the waves are only 80 or 50 metres, they still come but are further apart. You will be able to see them coming (special anniversary days) but now you can prepare yourself for the waves, knowing you will come out the other side, soaking wet, spluttering and still hanging onto a piece of wreckage but you will come out. Intermittent waves never stop coming and you don't really want them to but you will survive them.

If you feel you are not coping seek professional help from your GP or a counsellor.

What's New? Adult Colouring



Unsecured Load Unsafe Road

Keep Australia Beautiful website

At highway speeds, even small debris can be deadly.

What is an unsecured load?

Materials being transported on the back of vehicles such as utes, trailers and trucks that are not completely covered or secured can fly off whilst driving and become litter.

Why should I care?

- Unsecured loads can pose major safety risks to other drivers and cyclists.
- Litter from unsecured loads is a hazard that can cause fishtailing and damage such as a flat tyre or even a traffic accident with injury or death.
- At highway speeds, even small debris can be deadly.
- The most common ways that road debris contributes to accidents is by either causing a driver to lose control of his vehicle, or by being launched by the tyres of a car into the windshield of another vehicle.
- If items on the roadway are particularly large, they can necessitate sudden braking or require drivers to change lanes, increasing the risk of a collision.
- Litter on our roads can enter the environment where it impacts on flora and fauna.
- Roadside litter has a high chance of entering the stormwater system where it can cause damage to local waterways, flooding and blockage of drainage systems and threats to areas such as swimming beaches and urban wetlands where water is discharged.
- We must significantly reduce the amount of litter in our environment to protect the health, safety and visual quality of the environment, people and wildlife.

Littering is illegal

A load that hasn't been secured properly, including sand, soil and small debris, which leaves a vehicle and becomes litter is illegal under the *Litter Act 1979*. You can be fined \$200 on the spot.

Besides causing unsightly roadside litter, unsecured loads can cause risks to motorists, pedestrians and cyclists from the rubbish falling off trailers, trucks and utes and creating dangerous projectiles.

According to Main Roads WA, they responded to 1,675 callouts to collect debris from roads in 2013, including debris such as household goods, building materials and green waste.

This type of littering causes road closures, disruptions, costs thousands of dollars in damages to vehicles and property and is a major contributor to serious crashes.

Littered Roadsides

According the the National Litter Index 2013-2014, highway sites contributed the largest volumes of litter to the litter stream and put WA as one of the worst littered states by volume. Read more.

On a recent study of litter on the Mitchell Freeway, Keep Australia Beautiful WA found that approximately 40% of the litter was not deliberately thrown from vehicles, but appeared to come off the back of trucks and utes where loads were not tied down or not tied on securely.

This type of littering is completely avoidable if drivers take care when transporting items on trailers or utes to follow some simple procedures to secure loads effectively.

Tie down before you take off!

What you can do to help reduce litter from unsecured loads

- When transporting any materials, always tie down your load before you take off
- Cover garden refuse with a tarpaulin or trailer net.
- Restrain furniture and white goods with good quality straps.
- Use webbing or straps to restrain cardboard boxes.
- Don't carry loose tools in the back use a restrained toolbox.
- Larger tools (e.g. garden tools like shovels) should be restrained by ropes, straps or a trailer net if they are not adequately contained by the body.
- When carrying loads, periodically inspect your vehicle to make sure it is safe and secure.
- If you are someone who does the right thing, register as a litter reporter and report littering from unsecured loads.

Crochet Workshop Creates Blankets, Beanies and Bowls

"There's something about the creative process. The heart opens up and takes you to another place. It's like how you feel after hiking up a mountain." So said an avid crochet convert recently and she is not alone in her assessment of the craft's palliative effects on the mind. Many extol the soothing rhythm of crochet and distraction from fatigue.

Crochet has even been called the "new yoga" and for good reason. Some consider an active meditation, something you can do and focus on, with a repetitive rhythm to it. Famous for its relaxing, meditative qualities, crochet increasingly is being used in hospitals, clinics, schools and even prisons to help people lead healthier, happier lives.

Increased health and well-being was just one of the goals that the Lake Grace Community Resource Centre (CRC) had in mind when they launched a short-term series of crochet workshops 11 weeks ago. The most common and most obvious goal was for our local crocheters was to learn enough in order to complete a few crochet projects, which were typically useful items such as granny squares for blankets, beanies and bowls.

With over 20 regular participants exercising their creativity on Friday mornings, it soon became apparent that the Wheelchairs For Kids charity project was set to receive quite a few beautiful handmade blankets to package up with their custom-built wheelchairs and send off to impoverished, disabled children in underresourced countries. Whilst learning the 3 basic stitches of chain, double and treble, there were many other aspects to explore, including colours, techniques, stitch patterns, shapes, designs, textures, project types, and finishing details.

Eight beautiful blankets have been completed so far and more granny squares are still rolling in, so who knows what the final tally will be? Three kind and talented Wagin ladies have also been generously contributing their beautiful handiwork, thank you Del Baker, Liz Williams and Margaret Mazerack.

For some crocheters, finished projects aren't as important as the knowledge they gain from each of their experiences with crochet. For us crochet became a group activity and a means of giving to a worthy charity, as well as creating items to keep and use or give as gifts. As our confidence increased, it also became a relaxing activity, and most crocheters found it to be soothing and meditative, although perhaps not so much when first learning the somewhat advanced basket pattern!

Having something artistic to work on really did give us a solid sense of accomplishment. We are looking

forward to learning all about hand-sewing with traditional English Paper Piecing next term. Come join us!

About a dozen people gathered at the Lake Grace CRC last Wednesday to enjoy wine and nibblies as author Linda J Bettenay regaled us with the real-life tales that inspired the two books in her Secrets Series - fictional novels set in Western Australia. Amazingly this happy event coincided with her 60th birthday, a milestone we were only to pleased to help her celebrate with a rousing chorus of "Happy Birthday' and a delectable cupcake!

Linda's stimulus to write her first novel Secrets Mothers Keep came from the discovery of an amazing true story, about a murder from her husband's family's past. This story had been kept secret since 1928 and was only recently uncovered via a chance conversation. Linda and her husband Mike researched online, in libraries and museums and with many road trips from their hometown Roleystone to Wubin and other parts of WA to discover the truth. Although Secrets Mothers Keep is a fictionalised account of what led to the murder and the impact it had on the people involved, Linda assured us that ninety per cent of the book is based on fact.

Her second novel, based on the memories of Linda's grandparents, is a blend of historical fact and fiction.

Set largely in the Perth Hills area - a location Linda is very passionate about - *Wishes For Starlight* is the story of a deaf, mute aboriginal boy found abandoned in a chook pen in Canning Mills who is befriended by three white children who give him love, friendship and protection in a racist and prejudiced world.

These books form part of Linda's 'Secrets Series' - fictionalised stories based in the rich history of Western Australia.



Biosecurity Blitz

Media Release

Biosecurity Blitz 2015 is a collaborative effort by all to discover and report as many unusual or damaging pests (i.e. insects, diseases, weeds and animals) as possible across Western Australia.

The Blitz is slightly different in that it engages the public to use a suite of pest reporting apps developed by the Department of Agriculture and Food, Western Australia (DAFWA), such as the MyPestGuide – Reporter app to head outdoors and record observations over a two week period.

The origin of the Biosecurity Blitz comes from the Boosting Biosecurity Defences "E-Surveillance of pests and diseases projects" made possible by Royalties for Regions and Council of Grain Grower Organisations.

The MyPestGuide project team have worked hard to promote the department's reporting apps by presenting information about biosecurity to over 40 stakeholder and school groups attending agricultural farm field days as well as at university and local garden club days.

Reporting *any* unfamiliar pest found from the paddock to the pantry protects our valuable environment, our food and help maintain access to Australia's export markets thus sustaining our enviable standard of living and securing employment across the supply chain for many industries.

The MyPestGuide project team encourages everyone to download one of the apps and participate in the first ever Biosecurity Blitz. To participate in the Biosecurity Blitz, you'll first need to download one of the free reporting mobile apps below onto your smartphone:



MyPestGuide is for everyone to quickly report pests by taking up to four photos and sending it to DAFWA. Experts will identify the pest, reply back to you on your device and map it online.

PestFax (iPhone only) is for those who are already confident at identifying pests in the field. It sends reports to the PestFax Map and Editor service and users can request feedback.



MyCrop is a suite of diagnostic apps to help identify and report crop constraints (i.e. pests, diseases, nutrient disorders and herbicide damage) in wheat, barley, canola or pulse fields. Users can request support from

DAFWA experts when reporting.

If you don't have a smart phone, you can still report pests using either the MyPestGuide or PestFax online websites or by calling the department's Pest and Disease Surveillance team on 1800 084 881.

The department will use the results of the Biosecurity Blitz to support and verify Australia's freedom from certain exotic pests and diseases, such as the Brown Marmorated Stink Bug, which is a very important step to maintain Australia's access to export markets.

Volunteer Emergency Service Groups to Receive \$2000 Fuel Cards

Media Release

The Nationals WA have delivered on their promise to provide rural emergency service volunteer groups \$2000 fuel cards.

The Regional Emergency Services Volunteer Fuel Card Scheme was a Nationals WA commitment at the last State election, aiming to acknowledge the incredible work volunteers do protecting and supporting regional communities and the natural environment.

Announced today by Regional Development Minister Terry Redman and the Emergency Services Minister, the cards will provide eligible volunteer brigades, groups and units (BGUs) in regional WA and peri-urban areas with \$2000 to use at their discretion.

Nationals WA Member for Wagin Terry Waldron MLA said Royalties for Regions would provide \$7.37 million over four years to fund cards for 846 eligible regional BGUs.

"This program is modelled on the extremely successful Country Aged Pension Fuel Card, which has now assisted more than 50,000 regional pensioners since being introduced," Mr Waldron said.

"The scheme will operate in a similar manner as the CAP fuel card. After a tender process, a fuel card supplier will be contracted to manage the cards.

"Officers-in-charge of eligible brigades and volunteer groups will be issued a card upon successful application. BGUs then have the flexibility to decide how the \$2000 is expended."

An additional \$228,000 from the State Government's Consolidated Account will fund the same fuel cards for a further 27 BGUs servicing urban fringe areas.

Eligible BGUs comprise Bush Fire Brigades, St John Ambulance, Volunteer Fire and Rescue Service, State Emergency Service, Volunteer Fire Service, Volunteer Emergency Service and Volunteer Marine Rescue Service.

"These men and women often put their own lives at risk in the line of duty to protect the safety and wellbeing of others," he said. "Giving them assistance to manage fuel and transport costs is just a small way of showing our appreciation for the outstanding service they provide."

Mr Waldron said it was expected applications for the Regional Emergency Services Volunteer Fuel Card Scheme would be available by December 2015.

and using the competition rules, presenting themselves correctly, moving between apparatus quietly and smartly, and displaying good sportsmanship. The judges are also looking for coaches who follow the Code of Ethics and safety guidelines, and who develop good attitudes, skills and knowledge relating to the sport of gymnastics. The spectators for each club also don't escape scrutiny, having to remain in the stands, respect the decisions of the officials, use their cameras with the flash off, and show appreciation for volunteers and officials.

Winning this award is a credit to our coaches, gymnasts, parents and committee members, especially when you consider that we compete against some clubs who do gym several times a week, all through the year, and we only have gym once a week for half the year.

The SRGA Regional Championships are an annual event held over two days in Katanning, with teams competing from Esperance, Narrogin, Dumbleyung (Kukerin), Katanning and Denmark.

Our team of sixteen gymnasts (thirteen girls and three boys) were accompanied by their coaches, Lauren O'Neill and Lisa Pearce, and assisted by trainee coaches Lea Murray and Renae Jury. Some of our gymnasts had never competed in a gymnastics competition, so it is quite daunting to compete in large groups, in a formal gymnastics setting.

Our two (WAG - women's gymnastics) Level 3 girls, Mackenzie Palmer and Abbey Strevett, were our first gymnasts to compete (on Saturday morning). Girls compete on four apparatus - vault, bars, beam and floor. Their scores on each apparatus are tallied to give each gymnast an overall score and ranking. All gymnasts then receive either a gold, silver or bronze medallion based on their ranking. The girls did a great job, both bringing home bronze medals in a very competitive field of 42 gymnasts.

Next up were our three boys, Clancy Lay (Level 3), Troy Murray (Level 2), and Jonty Robinson (Level 1), competing in a field of 25 gymnasts. Male gymnasts (MAG) compete, and are scored on six apparatus - floor, pommel, rings, vault, parallel bars and high bars. Again, our gymnasts did very well, receiving the following medals: Clancy Lay (Bronze), Troy Murray (Gold), and Jonty Robinson (Silver). We would like to thank Amanda and Paul Nenke and Greg Mycock from Dumbleyung Gymnastics Club (Kukerin) for taking our boys for

several training sessions leading up to the competition, and for assisting the boys on the apparatus during the competition.

On Sunday morning it was the turn of the Foundation Levels 1 & 2 girls. We had eleven girls in a field of 45 gymnasts. After brushing off their initial nerves, the girls showed off the skills they have been working on all season, and should all be very proud of their achievements. The girls received medals as follows: Gold - Kira Pearce, Ruby Stanton, Holly Stanton, Sara Bray; Silver - Amber Pearce, Tess Stanton; Bronze - Kelsie Murray, Gianna Jury, Eliza Jury, Maisey Lay, Mia Fairbrother.


