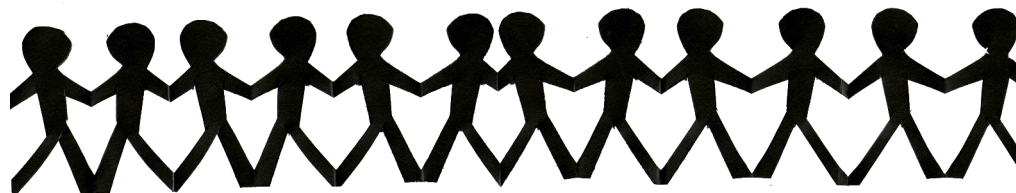

Fed By Ted

Ted Wright arrived in Lake Grace in March of 1960 as a sixteen year old lad. His family had relocated from Busselton to commence farming in Lake Grace.

Soon after arriving Ted became involved in the local sporting clubs. Football was a high priority and thus began a long association with the Lake Grace Football Club.

During his playing days Ted won many awards and held various positions in the club and the association. At one stage he was umpiring in the Ongerup League on Saturday and playing for Lake Grace on Sunday.

Owing to family illnesses Ted retired from playing football in about 1970 but still remained an avid supporter of the club.

When his own sons were old enough to play football Ted rekindled his interest in the club by taking on the coaching and President roles in Junior Football for many years until the Wright boys went away to school.

When the Football returned to the Ongerup league the "Fed by Ted" award was born. Two players per week were given a voucher to be used at the kiosk and coach Alan Connolly then named it the "Fed by Ted" award.

Over the years many lads have enjoyed the opportunity to be "Fed by Ted" and Ted has enjoyed the opportunity to be associated with the club in such a unique way. Ted wishes Lake Grace Junior Footballers and the club a bright and happy future. Keep the white flags waving!!!

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The Golden Wool Clip for Blue Vale

Many Aussies remember the days when "Australia rode on the sheep's back" and not many would disagree that the wool industry is a volatile one. From the highs of the 50's when wool reached a pound a pound and those heady days in the 1980's when 1000c/kg was an achievable brag to the slump we experienced in the 90's.

One Lake Grace family is celebrating 50 years and 3 generations all still farming on their property, "Blue Vale". The farming history goes back even further as Lou Chappell moved from Owen in South Australia to try his luck farming in Dumbleyung. It wasn't long however before he pushed further east buying properties in the North Lake Grace and Beenong areas. Lou Chappell passed away in 1958 leaving son, Don to run the farm. Don recognises that wool is Australia's oldest export commodity and still has faith in it.

In 1966 the Chappell's and 8 other farmers from the Beenong area formed a syndicate, putting an advert in the West Australian for a shearing team to come the area for the spring shearing. A concept they had discovered from a contact in Bruce Rock.

Solo round the world yachtsman, John Saunders, then a wool shearing contractor/woolclasser was the successful applicant.

Sheds and conditions in the 60's were quite different to most modern day facilities. The Beenong syndicate acquired an ex mainroads caravan and 2 MTT buses one for shearer's quarters and the other served as the cookhouse. When required the farmers would tow these buses with tractors up the road to the next shed.

The Chappell family have sourced their merino rams from the Brockham stud since Brockham was established in 1935 with the first rams purchased in 1936 and are still buying with confidence 73 years later.

Ross maintains that things have a habit of going in cycles and with global weather change and wool being a natural resource it will still have a place in society.

Stephen hopes to continue the standard set by the generations before him. He believes that done properly merinos play an important role in mixed farming.

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Martha Mathilda Willock

7th August 1917- 23rd August 2008

Martha Mathilda van der Meer, daughter of Marien Johan van der Meer and Alberta van der Mark, was born in Capelle a/d Ussel, the Netherlands on the 7th August 1917. She was the 10th child in a family of 14; all of her siblings predeceased her.

She left school aged 15 and went to work at a boarding house as a general household help. She went to Delft at the age of 17 where she spent several years at St Joris clinic, a psychiatric institution where she attained her psychiatric nursing certificate and where she experienced the terror of the German invasion and occupation. She worked at another psychiatric clinic in Amsterdam for a year or so, before moving to Eudokia, a hospital in Rotterdam where she completed her three year general nursing and midwife training.

After the war, aged 30, she travelled to Indonesia because the Dutch government was recruiting nurses to care for their soldiers injured in conflict there. She was requested to join the flying nurses' corp. accompanying those soldiers to different parts of Indonesia and on flights back and forth to Holland. They flew in Constellations, which back then took about six stops and three overnight stays for a one way trip. She spent three years in Indonesia

Whilst she was there, her sister Bep, (Mrs Slobbe) and her husband had migrated to Western Australia. Her mother insisted Martha visit Bep before returning to Holland in 1950 after the Dutch colonialism of Indonesia had ended. She recalls being amazed by how isolated and spartan the conditions were of the families that lived here. She had a six month visa to stay in Australia.

She couldn't bear being idle, so applied for a temporary nursing position in Lake Grace as there was a flu epidemic there at the time. The WA government was offering nurses six pound a week if they would help out for a fortnight. She stayed a year. The doctor at the Lake Grace hospital promised her that after this time her Dutch nursing certificates would be recognized in Australia. She lived in the nurses quarters at the Lake Grace hospital. She also worked for short periods in Denmark, Wagin and Albany.

Whilst working in Lake Grace she met her husband to be, Charles Willock. They were married on the 7th March 1953 and settled on the farm. The Lord blessed them with three children; Liz, Ron and Robin. Soon after Robin was born, Martha contracted TB and spent a year in the sanatorium at Wooroloo, whilst the children stayed with family. She recovered and returned to the farm.

Farm life in Australia was tough at times for a city girl from Rotterdam as she had to adjust to a completely different lifestyle. Some of her strength and tenacity came from farm chores like picking heaps of mallee roots, as much of the farm still needed to be cleared for cropping. Because of the isolation she soon learned to



be frugal and to make do with what they had. Sundays were always rest days highlighted by meals by the open fire in the winter months listening to 'Community Hymn Singing' on the radio or playing a game of Chinese Checkers!

As an example of her selflessness and devotion to her family, she and the children moved to Armadale in 1971 to give the children the opportunity to attend high school years that were not available in Lake Grace. Charlie carried on farming till Ron could take over after which he retired and joined his wife in Armadale. School holidays were spent at the farm helping with major jobs like shearing and tailing lambs etc.

In 1989 Charlie passed away and she has lived alone for the passed 19 years. She joined the Free Reformed Church which she had been attending for many years. Her fiercely independent nature and determination allowed her to continue living in her own home but she recently spent three weeks in respite at Fairhaven Hostel and although she appreciated the wonderful care, she was eager to return to her own home and independence. Her mind remained sharp and she was always ready for a conversation. She had a genuine interest in the day to day lives of family and friends. She will be dearly missed by all those who knew her and will live on in our memories forever.

Early Detection Is Your Best Protection

Women aged 40-69 years are urged to take advantage of the FREE screening mammography service in Lake Grace. The service is free for all women 40 years and over, but specifically targets women aged 50 to 69 years, as this is the age group in which screening mammography has been shown to be most effective in decreasing breast cancer mortality. The Health Department's mobile van will be located at the Lake Grace Shire Hall, Bennett Street from 15th October to 22nd October 2008.

The service will then be moved to Dumbleyung and Wagin.

Routine screening mammograms every two years for women aged 50-69 can significantly increase the chance of a woman surviving breast cancer and reduce the amount of treatment required. Current medical evidence shows that screening is the most effective for this age group. More than 70% of breast cancers occur in women over the age of 50.

BreastScreen WA's Medical Director Dr Elizabeth Wylie, said screening mammography was the most effective method for early detection of breast cancer. "Women in Australia have a 1 in 8 risk of developing breast cancer in their lifetime. The biggest risk factors for breast cancer are being a woman and being over 50 years of age".

"Screening every two years is vitally important to increase the chance of a cancer being detected when it is too small to feel or be noticed. Finding a cancer at this early stage often means that the breast cancer is small and can be more effectively treated".

"Breast cancer is not choosy about who it affects - all women are at risk of developing it, regardless of family history".

Screening mammograms can detect up to 90% of breast cancers. Any woman with a persistent change in a breast should see her doctor immediately.

An appointment for a free screening mammogram can be made by call 13 20 50, from three weeks prior to the visit. Early detection is your best protection.

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Lake Grace students 'feast' on some AWESOME Art

The talented young people of Lake Grace Primary School had a creative, fun filled fortnight from 8 - 19 September with AWESOME Arts' *Creative Challenge food art project 'FEAST.'*

Budding young artists used food as an artistic medium to explore ideas of identity, community and the natural landscape in Lake Grace.

The culinary creations included jelly crystal paintings, identity sculptures made from fruit, dyed rice prints, wire sculptures, spaghetti invitations and a Lake Grace town map made of food!

AWESOME Artists Amanda Hayes and Marnie Orr work shopped with the students to create a group painting of 'trails and pathways,' made from turmeric and paprika paste, beetroot juice and bits and carrot juice.

"The pathways included handprints, ant prints (made with a fork) and horse hooves," said Marnie.

"The group installed their identity sculptures along the wire fence and chose their sculpture's placement for different reasons – including random, practical, to see if the birds would eat it – and one sculpture was half buried next to a tree to see if the worms would eat it!" she said.

Lake Grace's spectacular artwork culminated in a community celebration on Thursday 18 September at the Multi Artspace. The exhibition displayed rice prints, salt crystals, fabric hangings, a massive Lake Grace map and even a sensory spot to feel and smell materials. "We got some great feedback from the community in our feedback box, mostly that they want us to come back next year," said Amanda.

One hundred family, friends and the community members attended the celebration to view the 'FEAST' projects. Amanda said, "All the parents were very excited to be led around by their kids and surprised at some of the art material explanation, such as the screen our video was being projected on being made out of sago!"

The artworks showcased an exploration of community, environment, family and history of the young people of Lake Grace. The works will later be showcased in Perth at the **AWESOME**

International Arts Festival for Bright Young Things held in the Perth CBD in November.

AWESOME works to inspire and encourage creativity amongst young people and aims to be a catalyst in developing creative, open-minded, young Western Australians who are engaged with the world.

NIGHT WATCH

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 26th September to midnight Friday 10th October. Astronomy is looking up.

Our Local Star "THE SUN" resides in the constellation of Virgo for the fortnight shining at magnitude -26.72. Morning twilight on Saturday begins at 4:30am and at 4:11am on Friday 10th October. Evening twilight ends on Saturday at 7:30pm and at 7:40pm on Friday 10th October.

The **MOON**, on Sunday 28th will be 5° (abt. 2 fingers at arms length) south of the planet Saturn in Leo. The New Moon on Monday 29th occurs at 4:04pm in Virgo. On Wednesday 1st October the 2% Moon will be 5° south of the red planet Mars. The 6% Moon will be 5° south of Venus on Thursday in the evening in Libra.

On Saturday 4th October the 18% Moon at 7pm will move over (occultation) the red supergiant star Antares (heart of the scorpion) and then move to 0.1° south at 8pm. The 26% Moon in Scorpius on Sunday 5th will be at Apogee (furthest) at 404,72 km/s from Earth at 6:34pm. On Tuesday 7th October the 43% 1st quarter Moon occurs at 4:56pm and will also be 2° south of the bright planet Jupiter in Sagittarius. The 72% Moon in Capricornus on Friday 10th will be 0.9° north of the planet Neptune.

MERCURY in the constellation Virgo at magnitude +1.2 on Saturday can be viewed in the west sets at 7:32pm at end of twilight and by Tuesday 7th of October Mercury will be at Inferior conjunction (between the Sun and Earth) and then move into the morning sky later on this month.

VENUS in the western sky at a very bright -3.8 magnitude on Saturday in Virgo sets at 8:25pm. Having moved into Libra on Thursday 2nd October, Venus will be 5° north of the 6% Moon and sets at 8:35pm. Venus sets at 8:51 pm on Friday 10th in the west/south west near the bright star Alpha Librae.

MARS the red planet in Virgo at magnitude +1.6 sets in the west on Saturday 27th at 7:45pm just after the end of evening twilight. On Wednesday 1st October Mars will set at 7:42pm 5° north of the 2% Moon. Mars sets at 7:35pm on Friday 10th in the west.

JUPITER the giant gas planet in the constellation of Sagittarius high above at magnitude -2.4 rises on Saturday at 11:36am and sets on Sunday at 1:43am in the west/south west. On Tuesday 7th Jupiter will be 2° north of the 43% 1st quarter Moon and is in the evening sky to after midnight all this fortnight. Jupiter may be viewed even when the Moon is also in the sky.

SATURN now in the morning twilight and too close to the Sun to view.

URANUS the blue/green coloured gas planet in the constellation of Aquarius rises at 4:49pm on Saturday 27th and sets at 5:20am Sunday 28th. Uranus rises 4 minutes earlier each day.

NEPTUNE the grey/green coloured planet in Capricornus rises on Saturday at 2:35am and sets at 3:58am on Sunday morning. On Friday 10th October Neptune rises with the 72% Moon at 1:48pm.

Jupiter's Great Red Spot may be viewed with telescopes for 1 hour from 9:07pm on Sunday 28th, 6:39pm on Wednesday 1st, 8:19pm on Friday 3rd.

Jupiter's Moon IO'S shadow starts its journey across the planet's disc at 7:22pm and finishes at 9:38pm on Saturday 27th. On Tuesday 30th at 6:31pm the Moon Europa starts to cross the planets disc followed by its shadow at 9:07pm with the moon transit finish at 9:15pm. On Wednesday 1st the shadow of the Moon Ganymede moves across the disc at 6:34pm and finishes at 9:55pm. On Thursday 2nd at 7:04pm the Moon Ganymede returns from behind the planet (looks like a pimple). These and more may be viewed from my home at any time, just call and make a booking (all free). For more information give me a call. Constellations explained, view double stars, planetary nebulas, star clusters, star clouds. the planets currently in view and also the ability to view the Sun safely.

If you need anything explained just give a call anytime day or night.

Red-tailed Phascogales Under Threat in the Avon

Red-tailed phascogales also known as kingo, are an endangered species and one of their last remaining strongholds is the Avon River Basin. With the aid of the Avon Catchment Council (ACC), The Department of Environment and Conservation (DEC) and WWF, working with the community in the Avon to secure the survival of this tiny mammal.

The Pingelly Scouts and the Northam Cadets, together with local landholders, were lucky enough to recently take part in a red-tailed phascogale monitoring program. Early mornings were spent checking traps and measuring and releasing animals at sites within Tutanning Nature Reserve.

The red-tailed phascogale is a small brown-grey nocturnal marsupial with a white underbelly and a distinctive reddish tail with a black brush at the end. At just 14cm long from nose to tail, these tiny creatures are small enough to fit into the palm of a hand.

These beautiful creatures face a number of threats. Their small size means they are often the perfect snack for feral predators like foxes and cats. They are also under threat from loss of habitat due to extensive clearing in the Wheatbelt.

During and after the July breeding season is the best time see phascogales as males die soon after. 'I was amazed to learn that the males only lived for around 11 months,' said Ella McPhee, a volunteer from La Trobe University who took part in the monitoring.

Members of the 1st Pingelly Scout Group were also thrilled by the opportunity to have a close encounter with a phascogale. 'I enjoyed it because I got to see an animal that I had never seen before,' said Pingelly Scout Samantha Smith.

'This work is being carried out in an effort to help understand the ecology of this endangered species,' said Sally McPhee, WWF's Avon Community Engagement Officer. 'It is vital that we learn more so that we can help private landholders manage remnant vegetation in a way that ensures these animals maintain their natural nesting and feeding sites.'

DEC and WWF need more people to get involved in red-tailed phascogale conservation. They are hosting workshops in the Avon region, where participants can make a red-tailed phascogale nestbox while learning more about the species. The use of these nestboxes by phascogales will provide DEC with important information to aid future conservation efforts. Workshops will take place in Tutanning on October 6, Corrigin on October 16 and Toodyay on October 23. For more information contact Sally McPhee on 0429 202 753.

SCIENCE AND STUFF

TOO HEAVY ON THE METALS:

Do Ayurvedic medicines cure or cause harm?

That's the question raised by a study showing that 21 percent of 193 traditional Indian Ayurvedic medicines bought on the internet from US or Indian sources contained high amounts of lead, mercury or arsenic. One sample of a preparation called Ekangvir Ras had 26,000 parts per million of lead. This compares with a US legal limit of 2 ppm in pharmaceutically produced calcium tablets for the elderly.

In a subset of preparations called Rasa Shastra medicines, minerals with heavy metals are deliberately added. "Ayurvedic practitioners think that if these are mixed properly, they are non-toxic, but that conflicts head-on with conventional scientific thinking," says Robert Saper of Boston University School of Medicine (Journal of the American Medical Association, vol 300, p 915). Saper wants regulators to limit the heavy metals in all food supplements.



MALARIA'S BIG BANG PINPOINTED:



MALARIA'S ability to infect species as diverse as humans, birds and mice led us to assume that species-specific parasite strains had slowly evolved along with their hosts. Now it seems that the explosion in vertebrate diversity happened well before the parasite was able to infect them, ruling out the co-evolution theory.

Vertebrates began to split from each other about 310 million years ago.

Toshiyuki Hayakawa and colleagues at Osaka University in Japan analysed the parasites mitochondrial genes and found that modern strains suddenly diverged from a common ancestor only 38 million years ago. In an upcoming paper in Molecular Biology and Evolution, the team says the spurt occurred when the parasite learned to switch hosts.

DESERT GRAVES REVEAL GREEN PAST:

Looking at the dusty Sahara desert now, you wouldn't think that it could ever have been a lush, green home.



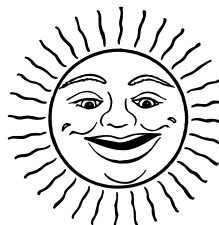
The excavation of a graveyard on the shore of a dried-up lake in Niger suggests that at least two Stone Age peoples once lived there.

Paul Sereno, one of National Geographic's explorers-in-residence, stumbled upon the 10,000-year-old site, called Gobero, during a dinosaur-hunting expedition in 2000. The 67 graves excavated so far reveal intriguing clues about these desert dwellers. First came the Kiffian, who grew up to 2 metres tall and hunted wild game, the bones of which were found nearby. They vanished when the Sahara entered a dry spell about 8,000 years ago, to be replaced by the shorter, leaner Tenerians when the rains returned a millennium later. Bones and artefacts imply they herded cattle and hunted fish and wildlife. "The most amazing find so far is a grave with a female and two children hugging each other," says team member Elena Garcea of the University of Cassino in Italy.

SUMMER SCORCHERS WILL GET HOTTER FASTER:

Peak temperatures may rise twice as fast as average temperatures as climate change hots up.

By 2100 Australia and north-east India can expect peak temperatures of 50°C, while southern Europe and the US Midwest could exceed 40°C. So say Andreas Sterl at the Royal Netherlands Meteorological Institute and his colleagues. They used an ensemble of climate models to calculate the peak temperatures the world can expect until 2100, given plausible future greenhouse gas emissions. The team conclude that peak temperatures will rise twice as fast as average temperatures, resulting in increasingly frequent heatwaves. In particular, they say that by 2100, any point within 40° latitude of the equator will have a 10 percent chance of peaking at over 48°C each decade.



(Geophysical Research Letters, DOI: 10.1039/2008G034071). Besides agricultural and environmental consequences, such heat will have serious health implications, especially for elderly people and those with cardiovascular disease. During the summer of 2003, when temperatures climbed into the forties in Europe, 35,000 people are thought to have died as a result of the heat. Sterl and his colleagues predict that such tolls will become commonplace if people fail to adapt.

WRAPPING UP THE PROBLEM ON BROKEN LIGHT BULBS:



Fears that compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs) might pose a health risk may now be eased, thanks to a cloth impregnated with nanoparticles that soak up mercury.

Used in protective packaging, the cloth would absorb mercury vapour released if the bulbs break in transit. Energy-efficient CFLs work by passing a current through mercury vapour. This excites mercury atoms, making them emit ultraviolet light, which in turn causes a phosphorescent coating on the inside of the bulb to emit visible light.

CFLs use up to 75 percent less energy than incandescent bulbs and can last 10 times as long. Each bulb contains up to 5 milligrams of mercury, and has led to fears that the health of children and pregnant women could be at risk when the bulb breaks. "There is a

Lake Grace Men's Shed Proposal - Survey Results

Last month the Shire of Lake Grace conducted a survey to determine how many people were interested in utilizing a Men's Shed in Lake Grace. Thirty-seven people responded to the survey including:

- Thirty men
- Six women
- One man who said he would not use a Men's shed

The ages of respondents ranged from 21 to 88 years. Most respondents were aged 36 to 45 years and 56 to 70 years followed by 20 to 30 years. Twenty-four respondents live in Lake Grace town and seven on farms near Lake Grace. Five people did not state where they live.

RESPONSES

WOULD YOU USE A MEN'S SHED?

Of those who said they would use a men's shed within the next three years, eleven respondents said they would utilize it weekly, seven said they would use it fortnightly and seven would use it monthly. Three people said they would use the shed every few months. One person said they would use the facility twice weekly. Three respondents indicated they would use a men's shed in the future (within the next 5 years).

WHAT EQUIPMENT WOULD YOU LIKE TO SEE?

Respondents suggested a long list of equipment including the following: Woodwork/ wood turning tools,

MIG welder & gear/ welders, metalwork tools, lathe, sander, exercise equipment/treadmill machine, forge, plasma cutter/cutting machine, gardening tools, cut-off saws and fridge.

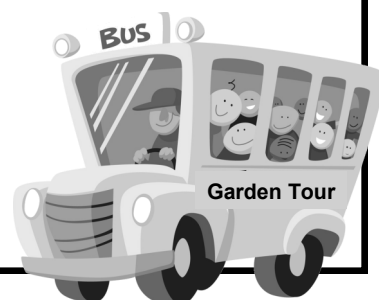

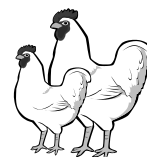

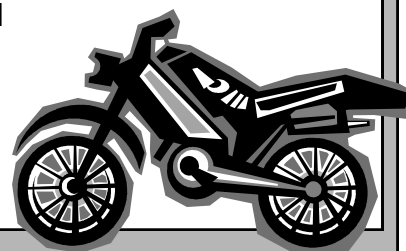
