Ready for those who didn't have their creative juices flowing, Leanne had ideas at the ready that the children could peruse and give themselves a kick start on their holiday activity.

On The Lookout for Landholders

Wheatbelt NRM is on the lookout for landholders interested in partnering on a unique, local feral animal control initiative.

The initiative forms part of Wheatbelt NRM's <u>"</u>Where The Wild Things Are" project which targets patches of remnant vegetation that are consistent with conservation advice for the region's Eucalypt Woodlands. This particular aspect is focusing on feral animals and fencing as a way of protecting these threatened ecological communities.

Project Manager, Anika Dent, says, "Working with landholders on feral animal control can have a huge impact on farming outcomes and the protection of the Wheatbelt's Woodlands."

"By definition, an 'ecological community' contains more than trees. It encompasses the plants, native animals, fungi and ground cover – all of which are extremely important to the overall health of the patch."

Anika goes on to explain, "By engaging in feral animal management and fencing alongside landholder partners, we protect every aspect of the area."

Wheatbelt landholders who have patches of remnant vegetation on their properties are being urged to get in contact with Wheatbelt NRM. Successful landholders

will receive an individualised plan and one-on-one support in the plan's delivery.

To summarise, Anika says, "Feral animal control is a win-win for farmers and Wheatbelt habitats. By working together we can not only enhance commercial outcomes but we also take important steps to protect our unique environment."

I have just received this issue of the Lakes Link and found the article about the Kambarang seasons very interesting.

My attention was drawn to the description of the Christmas Tree or Moojar. ,and the gum that oozes from a wound to the tree.

This was great news that it is edible, because as children riding our bikes 4 miles to school from Easton Neston farm in the 40's, my sister Muriel and I used to stop at any spot along the road where the gum was forming. We ate it ,as it was delicious,(not really sure whether it was safe to do so or not!). However we had no effects from it, except for the fact that we would be late for school. Being late happened a lot ,especially if the Quondong fruit was ripe and visible to us as we rode !!

We also had to contend with the wind, the rain, the sun ,gravel road and whatever. Then Richie's Hill always seemed to be a small mountain and we had to walk up that !

We never ever had water with us, which is an absolute must these days, but we made it OK.

We were almost always late!

One day we decided to ' take a short cut' and ride through the JonJon track.(I dont know how this track got it's name but it was all Bush there at that time). This track used to go past, or behind ,where the old Police station used to be .! I think Fyfes transport is now in that space.

Well, the track didn't quite go where we thought it would and we got hopelessly lost somehow. We were only kids ! I can't quite remember the reception we got from the teacher !!!! Exasperation most likely !! We obviously were bright kids though because we were never held down in the same class for the next year .

Gary Raymond Strother

 $04.05.1949 \sim 14.06.2021$

Presented by Tim Cattle at a memorial service on the farm at Holt Rock.

Gary Raymond Strother was born on the 4th May 1949 at the Lake Grace Hospital. He was the eldest son of Raymond George and Patricia Carey Strother pioneers of Holt Rock.

Gary has a brother Wayne and sister Vanessa. Gary was a well behaved, easy going child who always had a smile on his face.

One of Gary's favourite pass times was to scare the crap out of Vanessa. Gary and Wayne would wait until dark and then present themselves at Vanessa's bedroom window holding torches to their faces. A few years back Gary acquired a rubber snake which was used to plant strategically in Vanessa's path for many years. It so happens Vanessa has the last laugh, as it is still in her possession today.

His love of farming started at an early age, and spent a lot of time with his Dad driving around the farm growing up.

Gary attended Lake Varley Primary School from preprimary until year 7 then attended high school at John Forrest High School in Morley. He resided with Joan and Syd Shaw and Joan recalls he always talked about his Mum and Dad and could not wait to get back to the

farm on school holidays. She said he was never any trouble and was a great big brother to her son Steven because he missed Wayne and Vanessa so much.

Syd and Joan missed him very much when he returned to the farm fulltime at the age of 14 due to Ray falling ill. As his father was unable to work, Gary took on the leadership role with pride and accepted the challenges they faced. At that time there was still a lot of new land and clearing to be done.

In 1966, at the age of 17, he sat in front of the WA Lands Board to apply for location number 2809 where Dallas and he still reside.

Wayne left Narrogin High in 1966 and returned to the farm to help Gary and their father. This continued until Ray's passing in 2000. Gary, Wayne and Gary's sons Aaron and Landon still farm together today.

In 1967 the farm bought a brand new Ford 5000, driven from Newdegate to Holt Rock. A great achievement and proud moment for RG Strother & Co as that was the first new machine acquired and is still on the farm today. The first big tractor purchased was a 1468 International that pulled 2 combines. As you would be aware, in later years the machinery got larger, as did the farms along with the progression of farming.

Gary's greatest passion on the farm was his sheep. Collinsville has been and still is the bloodline to this day. He took a lot of pride in his wool and has purchased rams from the Smith Family at Kingussie in Dumbleyung for the last 30yrs.

The day before his passing, he drafted a line of weather lambs which were sent to WAMCO and made top dollar. He would have been over the moon.

Farming, community and friendships was Gary's life for his 72 years.

Gary loved the company of his mates — Phil Hyde and Lindsay Harvey, these three decided to go to Perth to watch a footy match in Gary's Valiant ute. They all crammed in, with enough room for a carton of "king browns" and headed to Kulin on the gravel road. Unfortunately, they damaged the muffler, but undeterred they ripped it off and continued on in the pursuit of good times at the Wentworth. Again, unfortunately they turned into Wellington Street and were stopped by the constabulary for excessive noise. Concerned that the policeman may detect the dozen 'king browns' on the floor, the boys jumped out, to be told just take the ute on Monday and get it fixed,

Gary met Dallas Brackenridge at the Varley Store when she was working for Tom and Gail Thornton as a sales assistant. His mother said he suddenly showed a keen interest in collecting the milk and mail. They courted for 12 months before Gary popped the question and they married on the 23rd September 1972 at St Columbus Church in Scarborough. Gary's groomsmen, Wayne, Phil and Lindsay somehow managed to take Gary to the wrong church. They knew no one and they assumed they were all Dallas's relatives, but upon enquiry there was a mad panic and radical driving to

get to the church on time.

Gary and Dallas then moved into a farmhouse known as Goldy's near Varley, Dallas continued to work at the shop and Gary travelled to the farm each day.

On the 5th December 1973, their eldest daughter, Natasha Carey was born at St John of God Hospital, Subiaco. Natasha was daddy's little girl, she would scream every time he left for work. She would stand at the fence at tennis whilst Gary played and would scream for his attention.

On 10th January 1977 their second daughter Joanne Gail arrived, also born at St John of God. Joanne was a very quiet child except when it was time to get on the school bus.

Joanne's favourite childhood memory was going with her Dad to watch him kill sheep in the shearing shed. If she found out that Dad killed without her, he was in big trouble.

Aaron Raymond joined the family on the 21st November 1979, he remembers Dad always being available to him, teaching him to be fair and clean with his hands in football and him taking longer than he thought to be able to beat his Dad in tennis. I tell you, Aaron has talent in both crafts.

The baby of the Strother clan arrived on 1st February 1983, Landon Andrew. He remembers not being able to see over the steering wheel and driving Gary home from a session in Varley.

I am sure it was at Lake Camm tennis when I first met Gary. After a full day of social tennis on the ant bed court, and a customary BBQ and beers, Gary and a few mates came down from Holt Rock to join us for the evening. I liked him straight away, easy to talk to, easier still to drink with, and a great knack for telling a story. We were talking tennis, and I thought he was stretching the truth when he told me a relative of his played at Wimbledon. Never again did I doubt his knowledge for he was talking about the great Tim Clayton from Kulin.

Our friendship grew over the next few years even though we were opponents in football for Varley and King, but it grew even stronger when with persuasion from Gary and others, I joined the Varley team.

At Don Lamont's clearing sale, my wife Leonie, met Dallas and so began an ongoing relationship that has been so close that Gary said they could have been sisters and he continued to refer to her as 'sister in law' in all our time.

Gary was a very active community member, starting with Junior Farmers as a teenager. For many years he held positions at the Lakes District Football Club, President in 1972, 73, 76, 77, 78, 81 and 82. He held the position of treasurer in 1969 and 70, later becoming a Life Member. When both Varley and Lake King amalgamated for winter sports, Gary was chairman in 1990 and 91.

Other interests and loves included tennis every Sunday at Holt Rock. President of the Varley Museum, Kulin Shire Chief Fire Control Officer until present. Country music was also a great love of Gary's and his involvement with the Westfield country music Club introduced the Hoedowns to the District.

Football was another of Gary's big passions. He played in the number 20 jumper as a ruck and fullback for Lakes District Football Club and after every winning game he would break into the song Mockingbird Hill with his teammates singing along.

In the early days Lakes District was involved in the Hyden association. Then, Lake Grace/Kulin league and later the Ravensthorpe Association. He finished his football playing days with the 'Emu Experts' veterans teams, which was very successful. Gary was the concrete that helped mould that group together.

Gary attended all Varley football trips to Perth on Bob Baillies bus. One year a record of 21 cartons was consumed on the way up and 23 on the trip home. Many a fun time was had and apparently looking back it was good for the next seasons team bonding. On one such occasion, after a customary pit stop just outside Kondinin, the bus left three of us behind. Gary commented to me "don't' worry Tim, they'll come back" — but they didn't! We started walking with no great enthusiasm, when over the hill behind us came this gorgeous little yellow celica, miraculously driven by our new boy in town, Lumpy. Two of us had to sit in the

back of the Celica, but shared it with Lumpy's dog who saw it as a great delight. We were able to sneak past the bus when it stopped for another pit stop and weren't they surprised when it pulled into the Hyden hotel and we were already there.

One of Wayne's memories was attending games with Gary and Phil. On the way home if they had one too many they would put Wayne in the boot. (Sometimes he would be allowed to drive them.)

Gary's love for East Perth football club started when attending high school in Perth with Grant Dorrington. He followed the mighty Royals very closely, attending games when he could and catching up with old mates.

His favourite players included Sydney Jackson, Dean Turner and Derek Chadwick, whose number 22 is on Gary's number plate. Gary was star struck when he discovered Derek was residing at the same retirement village as his Brother and Sister in law, Brian and Val Flemming. As Joanne describes, "Dad had a man crush" on Derek and was honoured to meet him. Dean, who is present here today the current Club CEO was also a good friend.

In later years, Gary was delighted and excited to find out that his adopted niece, Nicole is Syd Jackson's daughter.

One of Gary's greatest friends was Norm Knell who grew up in Holt Rock and also attended Lake Varley Primary. Norm played for West Perth for many years and Wayne also had the privilege of playing Norm during his time at West Perth. Gary and Norm were good friends for many years until Norms passing.

Gary and Dallas are staunch West Coast Eagles supporters and have been members for over 30 years. In 1991, Gary, Dallas, Leonie and I travelled to Melbourne to cheer for West Coast in their maiden grand final. We lost the football, but we cemented our friendship, as we toured Victoria for a week. Since then, Gary and Dallas have been able to enjoy some truly great finals with the Eagles, not so for us, as we have defected to the Dockers. This in no way diminished our friendship, in fact, it enhanced our banter and good natured jibes. Gary was great friends and had great faith in his doctor - Manus Lochner as have I. Manus has flown up to consult in times of need, made himself selflessly available when required and I know that Dallas and Gary hold him in high regard for his attention to them.

Gary loved family history, his knowledge of people, dates and years was incredible. He enjoyed trips to Kalgoorlie, Wagin, New Norcia and many other places with his Mum and Vanessa gathering information about their family.

He was an avid reader, which included, auto biographies, West Australian country town history, phantom comics and war stories.

He was a family man. Proud of his children and their achievements. He had a special relationship with his son in law Len. They talked regularly about farming, football and country music. LOCAL NEWS

Coming in to summer, there appears to be a lot more parties, celebrations, gatherings, whatever you want to call them. This is great for most people, however not for others.

Noise in Western Australia is governed by **the Environmental Protection (Noise) Regulations 1997** (Noise Regulations). Its aim is to protect people from unnecessary disturbance from noise, defined under the Act to include any vibration of any frequency, whether transmitted through air or any other physical medium.

This applies at any time of the day, however general rule of thumb for parties is to have it at a reasonable level that you would find acceptable if you weren't at the party. I know this becomes a bit difficult after a few beers, but just be considerate.

From a policing point of view, we don't want to be the 'fun' police (we were actually called that by a local on Facebook when we drove past the (already empty) pub ha ha) but we have to look after everyone. If we get a complaint, we may have to ask you to turn the music down, this is not done to ruin your night, but it is to stop **YOU** ruining someone else's night by blasting music through town. We live in a generally quiet town, so sound travels.

Also, if you are planning to have a party that is going to be large in numbers, or a bit louder than your usual night, you could drop in to the police station, or give us a call to let us know the details and give us a contact number. That way, if we get a complaint, instead of turning up in the police car, we can give a responsible person a call, and politely ask the music to be turned down.....simples!!

We all have to live here, so let's try and make life easier and nicer for all of us to live here.

The school holidays often brings in a number of tourists, and people visiting from out of town. This leaves us a lot more vulnerable in relation to dishonest behaviour. We had a report of suspicious activity in town, where a male person was found to be in someone's garden. On being alerted to the fact someone was home, the person

Please, at all times, not just holiday times, make sure that your valuables are locked up, and all doors are locked, whether you are home or not. We shouldn't have to, but its clear that we do.

Its easy to become complacent in a small country town where everyone knows everyone.

TRAFFIC

This week there has been heavy traffic on the roads with caravanning, and holiday makers. We had a job out in Kulin for a couple who were on their way to the Kulin Bush Races, towing a caravan, when they lost control, causing the caravan to flip. Luckily, they had a flexible tow bar, which prevented the car from flipping with the caravan.

The caravan is likely to be a write off, and their weekend of fun completely ruined.

Its easy to become frustrated, as the caravans stick to the slower speed limit of 100kph, but please be patient and do not take unnecessary risks. Most of you will have a family waiting for you, or even have the family in the car. That moment of impatience and red mist, could cost lives.

The main rules when towing are:

• The maximum legal speed limit for any vehicle towing a trailer or caravan is 100km/h.

• Vehicles towing a caravan or trailer must drive at least 60m behind heavy vehicles or other towing vehicles, unless overtaking. Drivers of road trains or B-doubles must maintain a following distance of at least 200m, unless overtaking.

• People are not permitted to ride in a trailer or caravan that is being towed.

• Failure to properly secure a load will attract a \$150 infringement.

If you are towing a load wider than your vehicle, you must have towing mirrors in place.

The Myth That Men Don't Talk

One of the things that never ceases to amaze me in the job we do, is that given the right circumstances (a safe place) blokes will disclose their issues and tell their story. Every bloke that I have met has a story and/or issues and is willing to talk.

Mendo talk but we need to acknowledge the differences between how the genders go about this. There are also some other factors that need to be considered in how we go about talking with blokes. The differences are real and we need to recognise some of the communication disparities between blokes and ladies:

- Blokes only talk one third as much as ladies in a day (approx. 7,000 to 21,000 words). The majority of females think and speak in a narrative way whereas males prefer dot points.
- Single word responses to questions like yes, no, good, bad and grunting are considered responses by blokes.
- Much of the additional talk that ladies do is around describing emotions and feelings. Therefore, in comparison to blokes, they have a sort of 'match fitness' around the ability to discuss emotion that we as men lack.
- In much the same way that the Inuit people have around 180 words to describe snow (because of its cultural and safety implications), the ladies in our life tend to operate with a larger word bank to deal with discussions around emotion and feelings.
- Blokes find it uncomfortable to talk about their emotions. We have been conditioned not to and are hard wired differently, often focusing on problem solving, providing and protecting, rather than how we feel, let alone talking about it.

To have a more productive outcome when having 'that talk', some other factors to consider include:

- Choosing the right environment to communicate is essential. This is not when we are distressed and out of control, but when we have calmed down. Also, avoid being under the influence of alcohol (this can act as a 'mood enhancer' and alter our state of mind).
- Timing is an important factor to consider. Agree on a designated time to talk, avoid times when you are preoccupied with other tasks, when there is a chance of being interrupted or when there are a lot of things happening.
- Be prepared to listen. The most important part of talking is *listening* (I think this is an oxymoron!) Having respect, connection and empathy with whom we are talking to will give us more of an opportunity to become an active listener.
- Getting help with having 'that talk' with your bloke. Don't be afraid to seek help in having a talk with your dad, husband, son or mate i.e., use an independent person, your GP or a counsellor.

Considering the above factors and 'giving permission' to blokes that it's okay to talk about things that cause us discomfort or pain may assist with blokes opening up more. Sometimes this does take time.

From little things big things grow (just like this year's crop), blokes do talk, so sow the seed towards a meaningful conversation. It is a myth 'that men don't talk' they will, just not always in the way we expect.


Life could have been very different for Anh. His parents made the courageous journey to flee Vietnam after the end of the war due to the family's allegiances to the American and Australian troops.

With the increasing awareness of the new WHS Act being implemented in January 2022, we are encouraging all farm firefighting responders to register with the Shire for the zone that they live in. Registration forms are available on request from the Shire.

- We are asking that all farm responders and permanent workers register as a member in the Farmer Response 'brigade' where you live.
- You only need to be registered in 1 area, preferably where you live.
- Registration is free and allows the Shire to provide training and PPE as funding allows.

Go to the Shire website <u>www.lakegrace.wa.gov.au/</u> for the registration form and send to <u>shire@lakegrace.wa.gov.au</u>

Once registered, we are able to provide training and work towards issuing fire PPC to members. We look forward to having you registered and supporting the community this summer.

As your Shire, we want to ensure we are providing

local access to training and safe systems of work at emergency incidents, as is required. We believe that being registered, undertaking training, wearing appropriate clothing and keeping your fire unit(s) well maintained, will demonstrate that you are taking 'reasonable steps' to keep yourself and others safe.

For transient and short-term workers, we encourage you to provide appropriate training and induction materials relevant to your farm or business and seriously consider leaving these workers behind if you respond to fires in neighbouring properties for their safety and our shared liability. We will not have the capability or resources to train and equip transient and short-term workers.

We acknowledge that it is highly unlikely that we will be able to deliver training before the start of harvest and will work with registered members to deliver the courses as soon as practicable.

Apprenticeship and Traineeship Reengagement Incentive

Overview

This program aims to provide financial assistance to Western Australian businesses when they employ an apprentice or trainee whose training contract was terminated or cancelled by a previous employer.

Eligible employers, including group training organisations (GTOs), will receive a one-off payment of \$6,000 for reengaging an apprentice and \$3,000 for reengaging a trainee, payable after the apprentice or trainee's probation period has passed.

Employers who have re-engaged an apprentice or trainee who was terminated by a previous employer will be contacted by Apprenticeship Office, after the apprentice or trainee has passed through the probation period.

Payments will be made after the expiry of the probation period for the apprenticeship or traineeship, as indicated by the nominal duration of the training contract. Will consider outperforming arcDUG status. GTOs are not required to pass the Reengagement Incentive payment on to host employers.

Claims for the incentive should be made within three months of the apprentice or trainee passing the

probation period. If the probation period is extended, then the claim open date will also be extended.

Who Can Apply?

Eligible applicants include employers (including GTOs) who must meet the following requirements:

- The business is not a state or commonwealth government agency.

- The business is a WA employer.

- The apprentice or trainee resides in WA. The Indian Ocean Territories are included for the purpose of the Reengagement Incentive.

- The apprentice or trainee has passed the relevant probation period or completed the training contract, with the new employer.

Employers and GTOs with training contracts that commenced on or after 1 July 2021 and on or before 30 June 2022 are eligible to receive the Reengagement Incentive provided that they enter into a training contract where:

With an apprentice or trainee whose training contract was terminated (including termination in probation) or cancelled, on or after 1 March 2020 and on or before June 30 2022, and who is registered on the Department of Training and Workforce Development's (the Department) Out Of Contract Register (OOCR).

Apprenticeship and Traineeship Reengagement Incentive

apprentice or trainee is between 1 July 2021 and 30 June 2022.

Employers and GTOs with training contracts that commenced on or after or after 1 July 2020 and on or before 30 June 2021 are eligible to receive the Reengagement Incentive provided that they enter into a training contract:

- With an apprentice or trainee whose training contract was terminated (including termination in probation) or cancelled, on or after 1 March 2020 and on or before 30 June 30 2021.

- The commencement date of employment of the apprentice or trainee is between 1 July 2020 and 30 June 2021.

Local government, government trading enterprises and not-for-profit organisations are also eligible to access the Reengagement Incentive.

Restrictions

The following employers are ineligible for funding: - Have reinstated an apprentice or trainee whose employment it previously terminated.

- Have employed an apprentice or trainee whose employment was terminated by an employer or GTO from the same group of companies or related bodies

corporate.

- Employ apprentices or trainees who live outside Western Australia.

- Employ an apprentice or trainee following second and subsequent training contract termination or cancellation, including school-based apprentices and trainees.

Lechenaultia biloba

The genus *Lechenaultia* is a group of twenty small woody or semi-woody plants endemic to Australia. Their range of colours and shades of blue, green, yellow, red and white make them highly prized for horticultural work.

The correct spelling of the generic name, *Lechenaultia*, is open to some argument. It was named after Leschenault de la Tour, a botanist who visited Australia in 1802-3. However, when Robert Brown, an early botanist first published the name he spelt it *Lechenaultia*, omitting the 's'. The spelling without the 's' is considered valid by Australian taxonomists.

All but three of the species are endemic to Western Australia and the most famous of all is the Blue Lechenaultia - *L. biloba*.

The flowers, which grow to 1.5 cm long by 2-3 cm in diameter, have a tubular corolla, split on one side, and surrounded by five sepals. The corolla has five lobes and when laid flat it resembles an open fan or a hand with spread fingers. In *L. biloba* the corolla lobes are again divided into two segments, from which the



specific name is derived. Flowering time is from late winter through to summer. The leaves are soft, bluegreen in colour, 3-9 mm long to 2 mm across, crowded and heathlike.

The plant occurs naturally in gravelly and sandy soils of southern and central Western Australia. In its natural habitat it forms an open spreading plant to 50 cm high.

Various shades of blue are the most common flower colour in *L. biloba*, but variants exist. One is a pure white form while another, a bicoloured form, has been registered as a cultivar. *L. biloba* 'White Flash' has a distinct white central portion within the flower and a deep blue outer area.

In cultivation it is essential that the plant is grown in a sandy, well-drained situation. Plants in heavier sites will generally not last a season. The plant is not a long-lived one, three to four years being its most probable life span. A suckering form of the species exists and this has great potential with a probable longer life.

The species is easily propagated by cuttings taken at any time of the year with most success in late spring and summer. Cuttings have reportedly been struck in situ, in rockeries in full sun in front of large rocks. Semihardened material 6-10 cm long gives the best results.

Encouraging results with the species have been achieved at the Australian National Botanic Gardens in built-up beds with added limestone chips; however, this is not a prerequisite for their culture. The most important cultivation requirement is a perfectly drained situation, best achieved in rockeries, built-up beds or pots. *L. biloba* has been successfully cultivated in pots for many years in Europe. Minimal watering is required and the roots will penetrate deeply in a free-draining soil.

Lechenaultia biloba can be allowed to straggle over rocks, or a more compact shape may be obtained by a light pruning after flowering. No

injurious pests or diseases have been noted and the species is frost tolerant.

Super Choice Rules are Changing

You'll have an extra step to take if you have new employees who start from 1 November 2021 and they don't choose a super fund.

You may now need to request their 'stapled super fund' details from us (ATO).

A stapled super fund is an existing super account of an employee that follows them as they change jobs.

This change aims to stop your new employees paying extra account fees for unintended super accounts set up when they start a new job.

What You Need to Know

You may need to request stapled super fund details when:

• your new employee starts on or after 1 November 2021

• you need to make super guarantee payments for that employee, and your employee is eligible to choose a super fund but doesn't

You may still need to request stapled super fund details for some employees even though you don't need to offer them a choice of super fund. This includes if your employees are temporary residents or they're covered by an Enterprise Agreement or Workplace Determination made before 1 January 2021.

You and your representatives can request stapled super fund details for your employees if you have full access to Online services for business. You need to review and update these accesses to protect the privacy and safety of your employees' personal information.

You must meet your choice of super fund requirements and any stapled super fund obligations by the quarterly due date or you may face penalties.

What You Need to Do From 1 November 2021

Step 1: Offer your eligible employees a choice of super fund

You need to give your eligible new employees a Super standard choice form and pay their super into the account they tell you on the form. Most employees are eligible to choose what fund their super goes into.

There is no change to this step of your super obligations.

Step 2: Request stapled super fund details If your employee doesn't choose a super fund, you may

need to log into our Online services and go to 'Employee Super Accounts' to request their stapled super fund details. Your agent or other tax professional can do this for you.

We will provide your employee's stapled super fund details after we have confirmed that you are their employer.

If we provide a stapled super fund result for your employee, you must pay your employee's super using the stapled super fund details we provide you.

Step 3: Pay super into a default fund

• You can pay into a default fund, or another fund that meets the choice of fund obligations if:

• your employee doesn't choose a super fund, and we have advised you that they don't have a stapled super fund.

Containers for Change has celebrated their first birthday, 365 days of being part of Western Australian life! In their first year a massive 765 MILLION containers have been saved from landfill.

To every single West Aussie trailblazer who has returned or donated 10c containers in the last year, thank you!

There's been a lot of change in our first year, and it's been made possible because of YOU, our West Aussie container savers!

When you return your containers to Containers for Change, you're not just keeping them out of landfill and saving the planet - you're also having a direct, visible impact on your local community.

When containers are delivered they are sorted into material types. They're then transported to a processing facility, where they're prepared for recycling. Accredited recyclers then purchase the processed materials and give them another life as new containers – or completely new products.

Most aluminum, glass, plastic, steel and liquid paperboard drink containers between 150ml and 3L

can be saved; check for the 10c mark on the container – if still in doubt Containers for Change have an app where you can scan (or enter) the bar code.

Cans can be crushed and bottles need to have their lids removed. If you are recycling through Wagin's All Good Refund Depot then bags can be picked up from the Lake Grace CRC.
