


Wheatbelt White-Out

Major Hailstorm Destroys Crops

Amanda Miller, Department of Agriculture Lake Grace District Manager, said a survey of local farmers showed that the storm or storms hit five areas. The upper level low headed east/north-east bringing slow moving thunderstorms to the south-east of Lake Grace, East Tarin Rock/North Lake Grace, Jilakin Rock South, North Pingaring to Kulin/Holt Rock South and West and North Karlgarin.

Ms Miller and department staff estimate 30-40 growers were badly affected with 7,300 hectares of wheat and barley crops covered deep in hail, causing 100% damage to individual crops. A further 200-250 growers may experience 5-75% crop loss with most



experiencing 30% loss to crops.

The damage bill will not be known until crops are assessed. Ms Miller said initial estimates place losses at \$2.5m however the cost could be four times that. This does not include damage to pasture, native bush or wildlife.

Local insurance brokers say most farmers will have insurance coverage for hail and fire. Crop assessors will start arriving this week to make initial assessments and follow up during and after harvest.

Some property damage was recorded. Michelle Dunham of North Lake Grace said their house roof started to creak under the weight of the hail. "The gutters blocked with ice and water started to run down the inside of the walls and windows, said Mrs Dunham. "We thought any moment the roof would collapse. The kids had a ball though, and made an iceman."

For local farmers who are preparing for harvest, the loss is more than financial with their year's program disrupted, hopes dashed and being left with a sense of unfinished business.

Wheatbelt White-Out continued


"It's very disappointing, said North Lake Grace farmer Doug Dunham. "You grow something all year, do all the trials, and then you don't get to put the header in. This year the barley looked to be the best type of grain we've had and it's now all on the deck."

There are always disadvantages and advantages with farming however, said Mr Dunham. "Somehow you have to find an advantage and this time it is that maturing crops will be better than they would have and also we have plenty of water."

The storm brought some welcome finishing rain which filled dams, some in 11 minutes. The hit and miss nature of hailstorms which dumps hail and rain in shafts means some paddocks or farms will be affected but not those neighbouring. Rainfall varied from 15 millimetres at Tarin Rock to the not so welcome 116 millimetres at east Lake Grace. The dramatic images of the Wheatbelt turned white generated considerable Australia-wide media attention with visits and telephone interviews from television and newspaper journalists and crews.



ANTS AND UNWANTED TREES:

Ants were accomplished farmers long before humans acquired the knack, and now it seems their agricultural prowess even extends to the use of herbicides. Previous studies have shown that leafcutter ants make compost in their nests to grow an edible fungus, while other types of ants keep "herds" of aphids in order to harvest their secretions of nutritious plant juices. People from the Stanford University in California wanted to know whether the ant Myrmelachista schumanni could be responsible for cultivating large clumps of trees in the Amazonian rainforest that are made up almost entirely of one species, Duroia hirsute, in which the ant lives. To see whether these devil's gardens, as they are known locally, are the ant's handiwork or the result of competition between tree species, they planted saplings of a common Amazonian cedar either inside or outside the gardens protecting some of the saplings from the ants. Within five days, worker ants had devastated the unprotected saplings in the garden by poisoning them with formic acid, causing most of the leaves to drop off. This behaviour could allow more D. Hirsuta trees to grow in the area cleared by the ants, enabling the colony to massively expand its number of nest sites. This may explain how some colonies live as long as 800 years. (Nature, vol 437, p 495).

PRECISION POSITIONING:

The first of eight new Global Positioning System satellites was launched atop a Boeing Delta 2 rocket from Cape Canaveral, Florida, on 25th September. The new satellites will give civilian users access to two GPS frequencies for the first time, making positioning more accurate. Until now, only the US military had access to two channels.

BONES BEFORE BEAUTY:

Seven beauty queens told young girls not to jeopardise the health of their bones by obsessing over beauty. Appearing in September at a conference organised by the International Osteoporosis Foundation in Bangkok, Thailand, they urged girls not to skip calcium-rich drinks such as milk, to

avoid obsessive dieting, and to exercise

regularly to build up bone.

INSECT BODYGAURDS:

A common weed has been given the ability to summon an army of bodyguards to fend off attacks by leaf-munching spider mites. Researchers equipped Arabidopsis thaliana with a gene from strawberries that synthesises scented chemicals called terpenoids. These attract a species of predatory mite that eats spider mites. The ultimate aim is to incorporate this gene into crop plants, either by conventional breeding or by genetic engineering, to give them similar protection. The researchers directed the gene into the plant's mitochondria, where the main precursor to terpenoids is found. The gene codes for an enzyme that catalyses the production of the terpenoids nerolidol and

dimethyl nonatriene. The latter has never been seen before Arabidopsis. Plants that exuded these scents after being given the strawberry gene became more attractive to the predatory mite Phytoseiulus persimilis. The researchers now hope to extend their work to cucumbers. (Science vol 309, p 2070).

ANIMAL BANK:

Of the 15,000 to 20,000 new animal species named every year only a fraction grab the headlines. Most languish in obscure journals or private publications, which delay widespread recognition of their status and slows research. A planned global online registration system called ZooBank could help combat this, and new guidelines should clear up the misconception that you can't register a new species without a dead specimen. The International Commission on Zoological Nomenclature (ICZN), which regulates the naming of new species, thinks ZooBank could also help stop fraudulent researchers registering bogus species and will by now be online.

ANYONE FOR A DIP:

The first extraterrestrial sea may have been discovered, on Saturn's Moon Titan. But any visiting astronauts can leave their beach towels at home, for the sea is thought to be made of liquid methane, cooled to below -179 degrees C. Radar images from Cassini have revealed what appears to be a distinct shoreline, fed by meandering channels carved deeply in the surrounding terrain. A dark, flat region next to the bright shoreline is where liquid or a wet surface has most likely been present. Seas of liquid methane, perhaps mixed with other hydrocarbons, have long been expected on Titan, the second-largest moon in the solar system. It is also the only moon with a thick atmosphere-thicker than Earth's. The discovery of the new features, one of the main goals of the four-year Cassini mission, adds to evidence that Titan also has methane rivers and periodic episodes of methane rain.

ELEPHANTS BEWARE:

Imagine 12,500 elephants roaming wild in a small area. That is what's happening in Kruger National Park in South Africa, and they are doing so much damage that their number must be cut the government has decided. A report warns that if elephant numbers are not brought under control, ancient trees and habitats of other species such as the black rhino will be decimated. Providing contraception for 4000 female elephants is not practical. Nor is transporting elephants across the nearby border to Mozambique, at a cost of at least 450 pounds per animal.

VP Day Archives

Story told by Al Buckland, (Father of Lynnette Zweck), written by Allan Zweck, 10 / 10/ 2005.

From Northolt, Middlesex, London, Al Buckland was not yet 18 years of age when he offered his services "to King and Country" in World War II. After some months of training, he was assigned to serve in the Royal Navy on the supply ship HMS MAIDSTONE, as a Stoker. Though a British ship, the MAIDSTONE came under operations alongside the Americans in the battles of the Pacific. It was an important ship, because as many as ten submarines were dependant on her for their supplies.

As a stoker, Al was well aware of the dangers, especially when they were on "action stations" and all hatches were closed, that should they be hit at any time, along with other crew, they may well be facing a watery grave. Regardless, they manned their positions honourably.

On the 15th of August 1945, while in the vicinity of Subic Bay, news came through of the Japanese surrender, and VP DAY – meaning Victory Pacific, was declared! For the young Al, now 20 years old, it hardly seemed like the end of the war, but rather it was more like the beginning of the end, as they had been commissioned to take the surrender in Hong Kong, a former British colony, and there were now experiences to be had, the memories of which would stay with him forever!

Entering Victoria Harbour, the harbour of Hong Kong, the MAIDSTONE was slowed. An announcement was made, "This is your Captain speaking. We are now in range of the 16 inch guns"! Advancing slowly, with Australian mine sweepers zigg-zagging their way in front to clear a path, the MAIDSTONE made cautious approach, for it was not known what action may yet confront them. The enemy had been seen still manning their big guns, in fact they had ordered the mine sweepers to halt, but the MAIDSTONE countermanded the order. It was an anxious time as the enemy had signalled again, this time for the rescue ships to come because the mine-sweepers had advanced too close for them!

The Captain's order to continue was carried out, and he made progressive announcements of their own position in relation to the range of gun power that could strike, as they continued to advance, which eventually called their bluff. The moment passed without incident, and with the intensity of the situation calmer, when it was considered safe, an approach to the Island was made by launch. A Stoker was always a part of the crew in the launch, so Al was included in the party. It was his duty to have the motor always ready for use, to start the motor, and advance the throttle "ahead" or "astern", according to the Coxswains command. Reaching their

landing, they noticed a large swarm of flies before the grizzly find of a body of the enemy.

From their position, Al witnessed a group of the enemy running along, pushing an open rail truck loaded with boxes, and from their facial expressions he could not tell if they were being laughed at, or if it were their normal demeanour, never-the-less, the Marines were watching them closely. He also saw some of the war damage, and one incidental recollection was of a shell hole punched neatly through a plate on a crane at the jetty.

Al was in a party that went to Kowloon in the Chinese territory, and it was here that he was to witness his first example of the brutality and mistreatment of Prisoners of War. A group of them had been found, weeping for joy that they were now free, however their bodies were so frail and misshapen, their limbs were so thin, and with sunken eyes and hair gone grey, they were a picture of misery and appeared much older than they really were. It was a sight that shocked Al, and his party also helped ferry them to Hospital ships in the harbour.

On another trip on the launch, a tug pulling two barges was intercepted, and they discovered the cargo was newly made occupation money, and there would have been millions upon millions of yen! The matter was given to the Marines to deal with, though at 12 o'clock that night that money ceased to be legal currency.

After the Union Jack was raised and the surrender was signed, their mission was complete, so they set a course for Simonstown, a Naval Base in South Africa, however, nearing the Celebes Islands a signal was picked up, so they called in to Macassar. Al was in the party to discover a Prisoner of War camp, where only 320 had survived from an original 4,000, and they were in a shocking state of health! Their skeletal appearing bodies reflected how poorly they were treated, and the Captain doubted any of them could survive. Al was horrified and believes he could never erase from his memory the distressing sight he witnessed. And equally overcome were the Prisoners, who struggled to grasp that after four long years of captivity they were now about to be rescued!

At the prison camp, the gates had been left wide open and the enemy guards had fled, leaving the Prisoners to fend for themselves, however, of such demoralised and lowly spirit were they, that no one was game to venture through the gates, in case they were fired upon by a hidden enemy! Their fear turned to joyous relief as they realised that at long last they were now free and in the safety of their British rescuers.

There was anxiety among the ex prisoners as they all wanted to be first to be taken to their rescue ship – on a launch that only had room for thirty at a time! They were calmed by an assurance, "We will come back and pick you up"! The most indisposed were taken first, and other craft assisted too with transporting them to the MAIDSTONE, where all of the crew gave some part of their uniform or clothing for their comfort.

It was realised that most of the men were too sick to be returned to England, so it was decided to take them to Fremantle for hospitalisation. News that they were to head for Fremantle was greeted with wild enthusiasm by all of the crew, for they had been there before and enjoyed great hospitality from the people of Perth. When the MAIDSTONE arrived at Fremantle, on the 30th of September, 1945, almost five thousand people turned out to greet them, in fact the wharves swarmed with so many people, that the ambulances to pick up the sick were almost lost in the crowd. It was really only then that Al felt, VP DAY had finally arrived! He had another reason to be happy too, because he had a few days leave in the city, where previously he had such wonderful memories!

Amongst the Prisoners of War was one whom Al befriended, and it was him who told of the suffering of the thousands who died, and between them they shared their stories. For Al's new friend it was a pitiful day when he discovered that, believing he was dead, his wife had remarried another. Quite a few times it was for Al to comfort him, when he would lament his cruel quirk of fate, by bursting into song with the words, "You always hurt the one you love"!

Al took his shore leave, and one day, in the Supreme Court Gardens, he met a beautiful girl called Doreen! It was a Sunday morning and Doreen was having her photo taken to send her brother who had now been away at the War for some 5 years or more, and had forgotten what his young sister looked like! Doreen had met an elderly lady at the Park who was so excited with news she was now able to return to England, that she had to share her joy, and Doreen told how she too was born in England and came to Australia when only a baby.

Four sailor boys happened along, and they got hold of Doreen's photo as it was developed, and Al boldly said to her, "Why didn't you smile, beautiful?" Discovering they too were British the lady introduced them to Doreen Al walked with Doreen to catch her train, and asked if they could meet again next day. A ten day courtship then evolved between Al and his new found sweetheart.

They had chosen each other, and almost from the beginning of their romance, wanted to marry, and each day they met Al gave Doreen a red rose. Whilst Doreen's parents gave consent, aboard ship it was a some what different story for young Al. He had to have permission from the Chaplain to marry, and consent was not so forthcoming. The Chaplain reasoned, "We are going to sea again in a day or two, why don't you

just go away and forget about her?" "But you don't seem to understand what I want", protested Al.

Al's determination won him the consent he so keenly sought. They married, and though the honeymoon was hardly a days duration, they were both very happy. Next morning, at 8 o'clock, Al was on a packed train to Fremantle, overhearing conversations people were saying, "I hope we get to Fremantle in time to see the MAIDSTONE go out", which to some extent unnerved him, so that he was thinking "I hope I get to Fremantle in time to CATCH the MAIDSTONE!"

Arriving at Fremantle, Al had to push his way through the large crowd to board the MAIDSTONE, and relieved that he had made it, was not long on board when they put to sea, while the band played the "Maori's Farewell". They were on their way home to England, and after arriving there, unannounced, Al found his way home, where he was surprised to find the door way decorated with, "Welcome Home Maidstone". It was his brother Richard who answered the door, and exclaimed, "Blimey, look 'oos 'ere!" (Richard had gone to the War at the beginning with the Eighth Army, and he and Al had a "rare surprise" meeting in Algiers, after one of the successful battles against Rommel in 1943).

Mother was quietly sitting by the fire, and was comforted by the safe return of her son after almost 3 years at the War. Richard went quickly to fetch their sister Phyllis from just round the corner, and father from further up the street. Al was only able to spend a few hours with family because he had to be on duty again next morning, and had to catch a train to take him back to Portsmouth.

Almost ten months later, Doreen left Australia on a specially fitted out ship, with hundreds of other War Brides, to join their husbands in England. About two years later, 1948, Al and Doreen, with their 11 month old daughter Lynnette, returned to Perth aboard the

AUSTIRIUS, have lived Western Australia ever since, and have taken out Australian Citizenship. On October 24th this year. ΑI and Doreen, with their five children, and extended their families. will celebrate their 60^{th} Wedding Anniversary.

LAKES LINK NEWS 20th October, 2005

Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 21st October, to midnight Friday 4th November. Astronomy is looking up.

The main event for this fortnight is the closeness of the red planet Mars, on the 30th, when it will be only 69,422 million kilometres away. With telescopes you will be able to see the poles and with larger telescopes some other features and markings. Colour filters such as red, green and blue makes them even better. You can see them for the fortnight and if anyone wants to come around, do so any time its clear enough.

Our local star the Sun, resides in Virgo until the 1st November, when it will have moved into Libra.

The last quarter Moon will be at 9:07am on Tuesday 25th. On Wednesday 26th at 6pm, the Moon will be at apogee (furthest), from Earth at 404,494 kilometres. The new Moon on Wednesday 2nd November, will be at 9:15am. The Moon resides this fortnight in Taurus on 22nd, Auriga on 23rd, Gemini on 24th and 25th, Cancer on 26th, Leo on 27th, 28th and 29th, Virgo on 30th, 31st and also on 1st and 2nd November, Libra on 3rd and 4th.

Mercury on Saturday sets at 8:08pm in Libra, shining at magnitude -0.4. On Sunday 30th, MERCURY will have moved into Scorpius and sets at 8:24pm. Mercury on November 4th will be 1.3° (small finger at arms length), north of the Moon, and also at its greatest elongation east at 24° and sets at 8:31pm in the head of the Scorpion.

The very bright planet Venus at magnitude -4.5 in Scorpius, sets at 10:13pm on Saturday. Venus on Friday November 4th in Sagittarius, sets at 10:25pm at its greatest elongation east at 47°.

The now bright red planet Mars at magnitude -2.2 in Aries, rises at 7:55pm on Saturday. Mars on Sunday 30th will be 69.422 million kilometres from Earth at its closest approach. On Friday 4th November, Mars, rises at 6:45pm.

THE giant gas planet Jupiter, in Virgo, sets in Conjunction on the far side of the Sun on Saturday.

On Tuesday 1st November, Jupiter rises at 4:53am at 2.6° north of the Moon and shines at magnitude -1.7.

On Friday morning 4th, Jupiter rises at 4:43am.

Saturn, the ringed planet in Cancer at magnitude +0.2, rises on Saturday morning at 1:38am. On Wednesday 26th, Saturn will be 4°, (two fingers at arms length) south of the Moon, and rises at 1:32am. Saturn rises at 12:52am on Friday 4th at magnitude +0.2.

The blue/green coloured planet Uranus, at magnitude +5.7 in Aquarius, sets on Saturday morning at 3:09am, and at 2:17am on Friday morning 4th.

The grey/green coloured planet Neptune at magnitude +7.9 in Capricornus, sets on Saturday morning at 2am and on Friday 4th November at 1:09am.

Pluto the very small distant rocky planet at magnitude +13.9, resides in the Constellation of Serpens Caput and sets at 10:14pm on Saturday evening, and at 9:25pm on Friday November 4th.

Around 8:40pm lying in the northern night sky is the Constellation of Pegasus, the flying horse, which can be recognised by 4 bright stars in a large square. Running down from the north east star to the north east is the Constellation of Andromeda, named after the Princess of Ethiopia, and can be recognised by a single star, then two stars close together. To the north of the two stars is the very large Galaxy M31, the Andromeda Galaxy. This is the furthest object a naked eye can see, and is 2.2 million light years away and two and a quarter times the size of our galaxy, and 3 times as many stars.

Curtin Volunteers 2005

Lake Grace Lions played host to a group of volunteers from Curtin University last weekend. The volunteers have been coming to Lake Grace since 2002, assisting in community projects and busy bees.

The Curtin Volunteer programme, instigated in 1994, celebrates the life and legacy of the late wartime Prime Minister, John Curtin with a weekend of community service involving student and staff volunteers from the university.

Groups of volunteers are bussed out to rural towns to assist in sustainable changes and programmes that are of benefit to that community. The programme provides labour for projects in towns that are often suffering from volunteer burnout; it also showcases rural towns to students who may have had no exposure to country life in Australia, particularly international students.

For four years now the Lake Grace Lions have hosted the volunteers, coordinated projects for them to work on and taken the time to show them the sights around Lake Grace.

This year a group of 13 students and their bus driver helped with two projects. One group assisted in tidying up and completing maintenance in the Lions Park at the eastern end of Lake Grace, the other group attached the aerosol art mural panels to a fence at the undercover BBQ area. The aerosol art murals were completed by local teenagers in 2004 as part of a National Youth Week programme coordinated by the Youth Advisory Council. The Shire erected the frame for the fence while the volunteers attached sheets of iron as a backing before securing the paintings in place.

After completing their projects the Lake Grace Lions hosted the group to a steak night at the Lake Grace Sportsman's Club, the students were all billeted out to Lions members. On the Sunday the group inspected the AIM Hospital Museum before taking a bus trip out to the Lake Grace Lookout. The volunteers completed two mural panels of their own, which will be hung with the others once they are sealed, before having lunch and heading back to Perth.

Lions President, Neville Moulden, said, "They were a wonderful group of kids who we would have no hesitation in welcoming back into our homes. I would also like to thank our local Lions members for making the volunteers feel so welcome, and for giving up so much of their time to make the weekend the success it was. Thank you also to

the Lake Grace Shire for erecting the framework for the fence as promptly as they did." Local Lions members worked alongside the volunteers, providing direction and advice and also sourcing equipment and products needed to see the projects completed.

Residents are exposed to the benefits of volunteering on a daily basis in small country towns, whether it is as a provider or as a recipient, either way all parties benefit from the experience. Saturday 22nd October will see the official opening of the former Stationmaster's House as the Lake Grace Visitor's Centre. A team of energetic volunteers have pitched in at numerous busy bees to restore the building and grounds. 





DETERMINATE CANOLA – NEW OPTIONS FOR DIRECT HARVESTING

Canola Breeders Western Australia Pty Ltd has released its variety **Boomer** in 2005 - a large seeded TTOP[®] (triazine tolerant open pollinated) canola with vigorous early growth, well suited to the medium to

high rainfall regions of Western Australia. CBWA **Boomer** has a uniform and determinate growth habit with a reduced flowering window. The crop is shorter than "traditional" varieties with a narrower band of podding which improves harvestability. The entire crop stops flowering earlier than "traditional" canola varieties and there are no later or taller types to delay maturity. The crop is ready to direct harvest 2-3 weeks ahead of "traditional" canola varieties.

Until now, determinate canola was not an option for Western Australian growers. CBWA **Boomer** is a determinate canola that offers a new option for direct harvest, several weeks earlier than "traditional" canola varieties. Early direct harvest of a determinate canola has several potential benefits for canola growers:

- The risk of pod shatter and wind or storm damage is reduced because harvest is occurring earlier than for "traditional" canola varieties.
- The direct cost of swathing the crop is eliminated (\$20/ha).
- There are no losses of seed during swathing, or while the swath is on the ground, or while harvesting the swath.
- The risk of swaths blowing away or being covered in sand is eliminated.
- The "oil penalty" of swathing is eliminated.
- Average seed size is greater with direct harvest compared with swathing.
- The bulk of the seed matures under cooler conditions and therefore has higher oil potential than "traditional" later-flowering types that are swathed.
- The energy of determinate canola is directed towards filling out seeds, rather than branching, which increases oil content and seed size compared with later flowering types that are swathed.
