Rifle Range Hill Gets a Facelift

For the third consecutive year the Lake Grace Lions Club played host to Curtin University students who volunteer their time to help with community projects in rural towns.

As reported last fortnight Rifle Range Hill has been suffering an onslaught of vandalism from not-so-proud locals with too much time on their hands. Fierce winds have also caused damage.



Nine students, accompanied by 'Bob the Bus Driver' (Curtin University horticulturalist), came to Lake Grace on Saturday 9th October, arriving in time for a light lunch prepared by Hazel Thiel and Joan de Vree.

The nine students, six male and three female, cleaned up the area in record time. Loose iron, sleepers, bricks and aluminium cans were all collected into what is left of the shed until a means of removing it permanently is decided upon.

Lake Grace can now direct tourists to the Rifle Range Hill to view our beautiful wildflowers without feeling embarrassed about the condition of the area.

The students were all billeted by local Lions families; Chris and Lulette Harvey, Neville and Maureen Moulden, Alan and Hazel Thiel, Henk Doelman, Nick and Laure-Ann Maalouf and Kevin and Jean Seaman.



On the day of the cleanup Curtin students and Lions volunteers along with locals, Bill Jenks and Simone Mahoney, completed the facelift within two and a half

hours. The 'busy bees' set a cracking pace - with the reward of the Lions club hosting them to a steak night at the Sportsman's Club.



Once plied with breakfast by their hosts the students were taken on a bus tour. Of the students seven were of Australian background, the other two were from Germany and Luxemburg. All of the students had the common background of having limited exposure to broadacre farming.

After driving in the south Lake Grace area the group arrived at John de Vree's farm. John showed the students his deer then went on to explain the devastating effects salt has had on farming in Australia, showing students trenches that have been dug as part of a salt land reclamation.

Following their tour the Lions and students had an hour of playing bowls and enjoyed a sausage sizzle before departing at 1pm.

Before leaving the Curtin students presented Lions President Neville Moulden with a shield commemorating the collaboration between the Curtin University Volunteers programme and the Lake Grace Lions Club. This annual weekend is held in recognition of John Curtin.

Lions Club spokesperson Kevin Seaman said, "It's a very worthwhile weekend which helps strengthen bonds between rural and city residents. The students are great, all of whom we would welcome back into our homes."

Early Days at Lake Grace by H Bishop

We continue on with the fourth instalment.....

Up until this time and after, mails reached Lake Grace by means hardly credible today. A mail contractor brought it by horse transport to the White Dam every Wednesday, arriving there some time in the afternoon. Arrangements had to be made for someone to bring it from there and mostly one of the Carruthers brought it to their home and other settlers converged on this centre to obtain their own and their close neighbour's letters and papers during each Wednesday evening. This process explains how it happened that one of the most, if not the most, important event of this century was not known in Lake Grace until it had been in progress for eight days. The event was of course the outbreak of World War I.

By the outbreak of the War the population had increased gradually through the years and very soon the district had representatives in the Forces. Jim Lawson, who had joined his brother George, was one of the first to go and, like Tom Walmsley, who had joined the Slarke family from Towcester, did not return. Jack Lay had a very long war and returned to marry Lizzie Slarke and raise a large family and build an excellent farm. He is now about 80 years young and, though he lives in the township, he spends his days at the farm.

Jack Bennett, Jack Carruthers, Charlie Lucas and later Jack Bishop were others who enlisted, but to have a complete list I must refer you to the Honour Board in Lake Grace Hall.

The first school was opened with 10 pupils in February of this year (1914), the teacher being Miss Effie Mary Padley, a member of the well known Wagin family of that name.

During the 'bad years', as I have referred to them, it would be nice to be able to report that the residents were one big happy family, but being an ordinary cross-section of the community it is hardly likely that this would be so, and it was not. Many suffered from a complaint called locally 'Barcoo Rot', which was undoubtedly a form of scurvy, from insufficient vitamins in diet. With no doctor, dentist or chemist within about 80 miles, toothache and all other major or minor ailments had to be borne; we were very poor, and the constant daily round, without entertainment or contact with the outside world except week-old papers, was inexpressibly boring. This must have been

particularly so with those who had been accustomed to many social contacts and it is no wonder that trifles such as a horse breaking through a fence were blown up out of all proportion.

The wives and mothers made life possible. I can of course speak only of one, but I know it was true of them all. They made meals as attractive and nourishing as possible with a minimum of ingredients. Clothes were patched and the patches were patched, washing was done in tins or boilers on stoves or over open fires. Bread was baked, but only after the yeast with which make the bread had first been made. In the summer – and I have known a temperature of 118°F the only coolers were of the Coolgardie-wet-hessian type, bush fires and dust storms had to be contended with, and small children had to be comforted.

When Jim Bennett arrived for a visit and brought his phonograph it was a gala night at "Brockham". He had, from memory, about ten cylinder records, and these we would hear at least twice each. Some were of the old-fashioned comedy types such as 'Father painted the Parlour' by Billy Williams, and some duets and sentimental songs, but no symphony orchestra was ever listened to with more rapt attention. We played cards to while away some evenings and read everything we could beg or borrow. Mr and Mrs Fisher of Brown Street, East Perth, sent us a lot of books and periodicals and during that time I read a great deal of Dickens and Hall Caine and probably would have read even Edgar Allen Poe if his writings had come my way. I read the Bible too, perhaps not so much as a Bible, but as a book.

Perhaps in one way my brothers, sister and myself were lucky inasmuch as we are all naturally enquring types and while our formal education had been drastically curtailed it had at least left us all with a desire to know more. Any mispronunciation or grammatical error would be quickly corrected by one or another and the same occurred with historical or geographical facts. This could not possibly be a substitute for higher education but at least we tried to improve our vocabularies and our general knowledge.

There were attempts at sport on Sunday afternoons when Charlie Lewis came over with

Jack Bennett and we would run, jump, play rounders (it would be baseball now) and pole-vault with gimlet saplings.

Also during these years some people, and particularly one, developed considerably. I am referring now to Mr Robert Carruthers, who naturally, having a son of the same name and being the father of a large family, was usually referred to - without disrespect but with a good deal of affection - as 'old Bob'. A small man, when I first knew him he had sandy hair and mutton chop whiskers. Quietly spoken, he gradually and unobtrusively emerged as the logical leader of the community at Lake Grace and filled that position with distinction. Through these years every effort was being made to secure the extension of the railway line from Kukerin and during 1915 a route for this was actually surveyed, the route which was eventually followed. Innumerable deputations had waited on politicians and ministers and all these were of course full of promises and enthusiasm, but nothing was done until this time. There was a last minute effort by one man who had a considerable tract of land to the North of the lake (and considerable influence, being a man of wealth) to have the route turn from in the vicinity of the White Dam and skirt the lake on the North instead of crossing at 'the Causeway'. To Mr Carruthers must go the credit for securing the route which served the settlement best, and for this alone he deserves to be remembered. This narrative is designed to be factual and objective. and no good point would be served by going into details of some minor conflicts, even though the outcome was important. I often quote Mr Carruthers when some piece of poor quality merchandise comes my way - "It was made to sell, not to use".

An illustration of how far residents were from medical help and how difficult this was to obtain occurred in 1916, when Sid Bishop cut his foot with an axe while clearing. The cut was a ghastly one about four inches long and the point of the axe penetrated well into the sole of his boot. nearest neighbour, Mr Slarke, was summoned and hospitalisation was obviously necessary. The only vehicle in the district which could possibly been even reasonably satisfactory for transport of a patient as seriously injured for such a distance was Bennett's buggy, and the following arrangements were made. At 5am the following day Mr Bishop and Sid were taken by spring cart about six miles and there met by Ern with the

buggy and pair. Sid was placed in the buggy with his back to the kick board and legs extending under the seat. Forty-five miles to Dumbleyung were covered by mid-afternoon and Mr Bishop drove straight to Russell Bennett's farm near that township, requesting a change of horses. Russell (brother of Ern, Jack and Jim) stopped his team, gave the horses a short snack, and harnessed two of them to the buggy. The patient was duly delivered to Wagin Hospital, another 25 miles, by late that night. The story has a happy ending as Sid recovered with only the slightest limp to show for it, and during his stay in hospital met for the first time Miss Sinclair, to whom he was later married. This story also illustrates how completely neighbours would co-operate in time of need. Mr Slarke, who came running when called and also rode to Mr Ern Bennett's to make arrangements for the rendezvous the following morning, and the two Bennett's who made their horses and vehicle available. without regard for their convenience. A painful part of the episode was the iodine (the only antiseptic available) which was poured into the wound, but it prevented infection – the hard way.

With the rail track approaching in 1915 settlers had a much brighter outlook on life generally, but new problems constantly arose, For the first time a fungus disease in wheat appeared, which ruined large areas of crop. It was called locally 'take all' (Septoria was, I think, the scientific name) and it was several years before effective remedial measures were discovered. In the meantime farmers, endeavouring to get some little value from the withered plants, cut these areas for hay, with the result that the disease was distributed by the stock over wider areas.

Rabbits also became a major problem and soon the Government Vermin Department had rabbit inspectors stationed in the district, engaged full time in distributing phosphorous baits, but the solution to this plague was not found for many years; firstly trapping, the humble rabbit carcase having become commercially valuable, and then by the introduction of myxomatosis. Long before that time every farm was equipped with a poison cart and fumigation equipment, and a substantial percentage of each year was spent in attempting to combat the menace. Fencing the entire property with rabbit netting was the best answer. but Lake Grace farmers were by no means affluent at this time.

Greetings From Bulgunnia - South Australia

It seems pretty amazing that only two months ago I was boarding the plane at 4.40am in Perth, headed off to my new job. I arrived at 9.30 to a very cold and wet Adelaide. I was absolutely packing myself thinking about what I was about to do – not only was I starting a new job, I was in a different state miles away from home and knew nobody!

To warm me up a bit and because I had just turned 18, I decided to go to the pub. I walked in and ordered a Swan Draught, only to be rudely reminded by the bar staff that I was in South Australia and they didn't sell Swan Draught!

At 6.30 that evening, I got the bus for a 10 hour trip. I was dropped off at a sign post on the Stuart Highway at 3.30am. (Mum was praying that there would be someone there to pick me up – on Peter Falkonia Highway). Thankfully, Kasey – a 3rd year jillaroo who turned out to be a good mate, was there. We drove to the homestead to drop off my things and then straight out to camp. About an hour later we arrived at camp, which was a shearing quarters out at the western shearing shed. I unrolled my swag and was soon fast asleep. I woke about three hours later and got ready for my first day of work on Bulgunnia, a 770,000 acre property approximately two hours south of Coober Pedy.

After meeting everyone – Shane Miller the manager and two other very inexperienced workers – I was put on a motor bike. I was lucky that I had worked with sheep before. I was left with a mob of sheep to drive in that direction. Kasey was surprised that they were all still together and going in the right direction when she got back.

We were mustering one of the last few paddocks needed to finish off the lamb marking season – we alternated days, one full day was spent mustering and the next marking and mulesing the lambs in the mob. After we yarded the sheep that we had mustered for the day – which is almost always a HUGE job, we set up the portable yards and drafting race ready to start the next morning. Well, I won't go into lamb marking coz everyone knows what happens there. That day didn't end until the mob was finished. I was lucky to arrive at the end of lamb marking season, so I only had to do about two weeks of it. After over 10,000 lambs, it can become very monotonous!

When lamb marking was finished we got one day

off (hooray!), which we spent checking out the sights of Coober Pedy, which wasn't much but dirt mounds. I found it quite ugly and was very surprised to hear that they had made a few movies there.

Back at work it wasn't long before we started crutching. Kasey, Jenna (another female worker), and I would usually muster three paddocks a day on our little Yamaha DT motorbikes, while Shane would fly the plane.

We would line up on a fence line while Shane would fly left – right. He would call us on the two way and direct us to where there were sheep, until we had mobbed them into one mob at the opposite end of the paddock from where we started. We then had to drove the sheep back to the yards.

Crutching has taken approximately five weeks with over 30,000 sheep being crutched. Despite a real sore bum from riding the motorbike all day, crutching went pretty good and I was glad to have five new people to talk to – four crutchers, two who were beginners and who took turn crutching, and one rousie. Finally, last Friday, the generator stopped, two sheep short! Those two sheep were crutched with the shears.

In between mulesing and crutching I have learnt many other skills. I can now mules lambs and castrate sheep without using elastrator rings — Dad would be proud of me, I have learnt how to repair a broken water pipe and light a hot water system, which is a boiler type. Mum is not so excited that I have learnt to kill a sheep — I can also cut it up! I have learnt to do motor bike repairs. These need to be done after work and ready for an early start the next day. We were responsible for our own bike — I was lucky enough to get the newest one.

Breakdowns/servicing are a frequent occurrence as the environment is not very motorbike friendly, especially when it rains. We travel many kilometres each day, the average being 100kms per day. One day recently, I travelled 167kms. I have also learnt to become very aware of the environment and surroundings. I can track and find missing sheep. I have also been lost, and this experience, although not a pleasant one, has taught me a great deal about the outback.

Well, it won't be that long before I am home and working on CBH as a sampler and earning some money!! I hope to catch up with everyone then.

What caused the collapse of Easter Island civilisation?:- The mysterious inhabitants of Easter island in the Pacific Ocean did not wreck their pristine environment and so ruin their chances of survival. They were the victims of circumstance and

were doomed to perish.

Easter Island has long been a mystery: a wind-blasted and treeless landscape dominated by giant stone statues set by its long-since-departed Polynesian inhabitants. Because it was once forested, it has become an emblem of environmental and social decline.

But a detailed study of 70 Pacific islands pinpoints nine environmental predictors of Pacific deforestation before the arrival of Europeans, and comes to a different conclusion. Easter Island's collapse was not because its people were especially improvident, but because they faced one of the Pacific's most fragile environments. The island's remoteness in the eastern pacific meant it rarely, if ever, benefited from fertile volcanic dust brought on the winds from eruptions in Asia. It is also low-lying, small and dry. And the island is distant from the equator, so the Polynesians' favourite trees, such as breadfruit and Tahitian chestnut, would not grow there. These factors would have made it difficult for the island's inhabitants to grow new trees to replace those they used. (Nature, vol431, p443)



Lawsuits over reef damage:- Australia could find itself in the dock for failing to cut greenhouse gas emissions, on the grounds that it has a legal duty to protect the Great Barrier Reef, a World Heritage site. Other countries with

World Heritage sites could also face legal action. Australia has refused to ratify the Kyoto protocol or take other steps to tackle climate change, even through many scientists regard global warming as a serious threat to the reef. Yet under the World Heritage Convention, the government is obliged to "do all it can", "to the utmost of its resources", to preserve the reef. Failing to do so paves the way for legal action. Green groups could seek an "in danger" listing for the reef under the convention. If Australia still took no action, a case might be brought before the International Court of Justice. A case could also be brought under domestic legislation, which obliges the country to abide by the World Heritage Convention. Several groups are now considering pursuing legal action after the federal election now over. Other World Heritage sites threatened by global warming include Los Glaciares national park in Argentina and the barrier reef system in Belize.

Seismic surveys blamed for giant squid deaths:- Like whales, giant squid may be killed by very loud noises. Unusual numbers of carcasses, washed ashore in

Spain, are being blamed on geological surveys conducted offshore. Normally, only one giant squid a year is found along the Spanish coast. But in a 10-day period during 2001, five carcasses were found ashore or floating at sea in the Bay of Biscay. In 2003, another four were found in one week. On both occasions, geologists were conducting offshore seismic surveys, firing 200-decibel pulses of low-frequency sound into the seabed. The nine dead squid, up to 12 metres long and weighing up to 140 kilograms, all had badly damaged ears. Geologists thinks that the ear damage might have disoriented the huge creatures and made them swim to the surface. There they probably

suffocated because the oxygen-carrying molecules in their blood do not function well in warmer water. Seismic surveys and high-intensity naval sonar systems have previously been blamed for whale beachings. Fear of harming marine mammals has already resulted in noise restrictions in the US.

Photosynthesis got a really early start:-The case for the existence of photosynthetic life 3.4 billion years ago has been significantly strengthened. New evidence, which comes from a layer of carbonaceous rock in South Africa, is certain to fuel the controversy about when exactly such life began on Earth. In 2002 it was disputed that claims that microscopic patterns found in 3.5-billion-year-old rock in Western Australia were microfossils various bacteria, of including photosynthetic cyanobacteria. It was claimed that the fossils were really patterns formed during the recrystallisation of volcanic glass from a hydrothermal vent that formed tens of metres under water-too deep for photosynthetic bacteria to live. But now it has been found that iron minerals alongside the carbon settles the case for photosynthesis. If the microbes were nonphotosynthetic, they would have oxidised the iron. But none of the surrounding iron is in an oxidised state, suggesting that it was photosynthetic microbial life that produced the carbon 3.4 billion years ago, this evidence for photosynthesis is new and better.

Humming Earth:- It seems that large storms at sea cause the Earth to hum. Scientists collected data from networks of seismometers in California and Japan and worked out the direction a humming signal was travelling. Between January and March, the hum originated mainly from the north Pacific. Then the source shifted to the Southern Ocean before moving back to the northern hemisphere in October. The source of the hum seemed to be tied to winter in each hemisphere, when ocean storms are at their worst and causes the hum of frequency range of between 2 and 7 millihertz. The Earth also cracks, rumbles and rings like a bell normally.

Credit Card Fraud

Scamsters saying they are from Visa or Mastercard are cold-calling people with so-called alerts about abnormal amounts being charged to our credit card from overseas locations. This understandably sets a bell off in our heads and because the callers sound very authentic giving a full name, badge number and their department at Visa/Mastercard we can be duped if we are not on guard.

They have been quoting amounts of between \$297 and \$497 and when you say "no I did not authorise that" they tell you they will arrange a credit for your account before your next statement. Hearing of your "credit" could easily be your downfall as they then ask for the 3 digit security number on the rear of your card to confirm you actually have the card in your possession.

Some people who have become suspicious shortly after this type of call have called the REAL credit card people only to find their card had just been debited using the information they had themselves given to the bogus caller!

This is wide spread and they are good, so be very careful.

- Banks will ALWAYS know everything about your account - they will not need you to tell them anything
- Ask for their contact details (compare with your bank)
- Banks will rarely call you on the phone they will usually send you a letter
- If YOU have CALLED the bank or credit card provider on their official phone number you are safer

If you have received a call:

- Do NOT give or confirm ANY details to the caller
- Take a note of the time/date of the contact and persons name
- Call your bank immediately to verify and report
- File a Police report in addition to advising your bank

If you HAVE given or confirmed any details:

- Don't panic but act without delay
- Contact your bank immediately so that your

account can be closed, a new one opened and a fraud report taken to protect you from any losses

FAKE BANK WEB SITES

Many people who use Internet banking have been receiving emails from Scamsters who are using very clever "look-a-like" bank emails and websites.

They tell us that for security upgrading reasons we should log on using their handy URL included in the email and resubmit our user names and pass words.

These emails and sites look almost exactly like the actual bank sites...very slick.

What you are actually doing by clicking on the URL link (which is the blue address bar for websites contained in emails) is logging onto the Scamsters own site where they collect your details and password and then can operate your account as you!

- NEVER go to your banking site by clicking a URL - manually type in the banks address in your browser or use your OWN computers "favourites" selection
- · If you have received one of these emails:
- Do NOT REPLY in any way
- Notify the bank immediately

Game Over for the Leader of the Itinerant Traders

The alleged mastermind and ringleader of the itinerant traders who have been plaguing WA consumers with shoddy painting and roof work has been arrested on criminal charges. The English itinerant, who cannot yet be named for legal reasons, has been the focus of a joint Consumer Protection and Painters Registration Board operation to bring the itinerant scamsters to justice.

"With the cooperation of the WA Police Service, we have laid 6 charges relating to 5 alleged violations of the Door-to-Door Trading Act and 1 alleged violation of the Fair Trading Act. The charges have been laid against a person believed to be the ringleader of these itinerant traders. The Department has also charged another man with similar offences who is a known associate of the ringleader.

Breaching the Fair Trading Act can attract a maximum penalty of \$20,000 for an individual and \$100,000 for a company.

The Department's investigations are continuing into other complaints received and the Department expects to lay further charges in relation to these matters. Given the ongoing nature of the investigations the Department cannot name these individuals at this time.

Consumer Protection has been warning Western Australians over the past few weeks of the risks associated with these shonky tradesmen who make unsolicited approaches to consumers with the offer to lay bitumen or paint roofs and gutters using materials 'left over from another job,' at much reduced cost if cash is paid.

"A big concern for the Department was that these crooks target the elderly and use stand over tactics to extract cash from them. This man being arrested and held to a large surety shows the community has had enough", Commissioner Walker said.

"We are still out there looking for the rest of this crew and repeat our requests for anyone seeing or hearing of their activities to contact us immediately.

"We rely on information from the public to help us protect vulnerable people who may get caught out by these rogues and information obtained from the public can lead directly to charges being laid.

"The type of information we need is vehicle types and registration numbers, descriptions of individuals and what areas they are operating in. All information will be treated as confidential.

"On behalf of the Department, I would like to pass on my appreciation to those members of the community who provided valuable leads and for the vigorous efforts of the taskforce which has culminated in the arrest and charges being laid, Mr. Walker said.



Home Buyers Assistance Fund

Many people would be aware of the Federal First Home Buyers Grant of \$7,000 which has been so eagerly sort by many first home buyers in recent years.

However, there is an additional grant available to first home buyers which is not so widely known about.

The Home Buyers Assistance Fund, (administered by the Real Estate & Business Agents Supervisory Board) provides a grant of up to \$2,000 for the incidental expenses of first home buyers.

This grant of \$2,000 can be sought in addition to the \$7,000 previously mentioned.

The Home Buyers Assistance Fund is funded from the interest paid on real estate agents trust accounts in Western Australia and can be used for costs such as, conveyancing fees, valuation fees and a range of other costs associated with the purchase.

There are some basic guidelines which determine whether an application for this \$2,000 grant is

successful and these include:

- The purchase must be of an established or partially built home.
- The purchase must be made through a licensed real estate agent.
- The applicant (including the spouse or partner) must not have previously owned any property in the State of Western Australia
- The loan must be financed through an authorised lending institution.

The value of the purchase cannot exceed \$125,000 in city & country areas; \$170,000 in remote areas; or \$190,000 in the Kimberley.

9.8 million tonne harvest begins for CBH

Harvest has commenced in Western Australia with the first load for the 2004-05 harvest delivered to the CBH Geraldton Port Terminal last week.

CBH Operations Manager, Grant Thompson said the lack of rain over the past few months had forced CBH to again revise its estimate downwards to 9.8 million tonnes, almost five million tonnes less than received during the bumper 2003-04 harvest.

"The lack of rain during the crucial September/October period has had a significant impact on yields throughout the state," Mr Thompson said.

"The south west region, in particular, is very dry and crops still need a substantial amount of rain to achieve decent yields. With the outlook for warming conditions during coming weeks it does not appear as though we will get the rains needed to achieve average yields.

"We are expecting the frosts experienced earlier in the year to have an impact on receivals as harvest unfolds. There is already evidence of frost damage in some of the crops that have been delivered in the north of the state."

Mr Thompson said CBH staff would continue to work with growers throughout harvest to ensure the grain gets in the bin quickly and growers can get the best value for their crops.

"One of the strategies we have in place to assist in growing value this harvest is through LoadNet, our

new, improved internet service. LoadNet will prove an invaluable tool for growers during harvest that will allow them to track deliveries and payments, and transfer grain online," he said.

"Priority trucks will be operating again for this harvest to help maintain local services and make efficient use of resources. We will make every effort to minimise disruption to normal services and ask that growers be understanding and patient if CBH transfer trucks are operating at their site.

"CBH has invested more than \$24 million in infrastructure at strategic sites this year and an additional \$100 million will upgrade the Albany Port Terminal.

"Work at the Albany terminal commenced in July of this year and will continue throughout harvest. We ask that growers help us this harvest by avoiding delivering grain directly to the Albany Port Terminal while the upgrade is in progress.

"Grain quality remains of great importance this harvest and CBH will continue to stringently monitor the quality of grain delivered into the receival point network to ensure we maintain our access to international markets.

"After a bumper year in 2003-04 that was full of some outstanding achievements, we are looking forward to once again working together with growers to ensure a successful harvest in 2004-05."

The Sun is in Virgo until the 31st, when it will have moved into Libra and shines at -26.7 magnitude. Morning and afternoon twilight is around one and a half hours before and after sunrise and sunset.

The Moon this fortnight moves through the afternoon and evening sky. The full Moon is at 10:57am on Thursday 28th in Aries. On Wednesday 3rd, the Moon will be at Apogee (furthest), at 404,998kms from Earth at 2am in Gemini. The last quarter Moon is at 1:43pm in Leo on 5th November at -6.0 magnitude. The Moon this fortnight is in Aquarius on 23rd and 24th. Pisces on 25th & 26th, Aries on 27th, 28th & 29th, Taurus on 30th & 31st, Gemini on 31st, 1st, 2nd & 3rd, Cancer on 4th and Leo on 5th.

Mercury in Libra sets at 7:19pm on the 23rd and at 8.04pm on the 5th of November.

On Saturday Venus rises at 3.43am in Leo at -4.2 magnitude, and on Sunday will have moved into Virgo. On the 25th Venus will be 0.6° north of Jupiter and rises at 3.35am.

Mars in the morning twilight in Virgo rises at 4:47am on Saturday at magnitude 1.7. On Nov 5th will rise at 4.19am.

Also in Virgo Jupiter rises in the morning twilight at 4:18am and is at magnitude -1.7, and rises at 3:34am on the 5th of November. Also on the 5th Jupiter will be 0.6° south of Venus.

The ringed planet Saturn in Gemini rises on Saturday morning at 12:49am at magnitude 0.1. On November 4th

Saturn will be 5° south of the Moon, and rises at 11:58pm on the 5th.

In Aquarius Uranus in the evening sky, sets at 2:52am at magnitude 5.8, and is 4° north of the Moon.

In Capricornus Neptune in the evening night sky sets at 1:48am.

Pluto in the constellation of Serpens sets on Saturday at 9:58pm. 5:06am on 5th.

Constellations and objects to see in the night sky. In the north the four bright stars of Pegasus in a large square. With the naked eye a smudge of the very large Andromeda galaxy M31 lower and slightly to the right.

In the south east the two naked eye galaxies that look like clouds in the night sky are the two Magellanic clouds. In the smaller cloud is the globular star cluster Tucanae 47 that looks like a smudgy star, but is really a million stars in a small clump. If you have a telescope you can see that there are lots of clusters in the small cloud. In the larger cloud is the Tarantula nebula (which looks like a spiders web), and lots of star clusters globular and open.

The two clouds are 186,000 and 140,000 light years away and are moving towards us. In Aquarius are the two Planetary nebulae, the Helix which can be seen with binoculars and the Saturn nebula for which a telescope is needed.

There are also two globular clusters and an asterism of stars shaped in a Y.

SUMMER AND SENSE – Drowning prevention

Drowning remains a significant problem amongst young children and young adults in Western Australia, and last year, 250 Australians of all ages and swimming abilities drowned. With the warm weather coming upon us quickly it is time to be cautious. Remember when mixing children and water, adult supervision should be available at all times in and around water. Fence your swimming pool/spa/house dams, familiarize your child with water and learn resuscitation.

Before you take a dip think about; the depth and condition of the water, your swimming ability, how far away is help and if in doubt don't go in.

Don't Drink and Drown

Alcohol is the biggest contributor to drowning for the 15-29 year olds. One in three young adult drownings involves alcohol. Alcohol affects the body in 7 ways, impaired judgment, spasm of vocal chords, disturbance of the inner ear, hypothermia, impaired reaction time, lack of coordination and greater risk taking behavior.

Alcohol and Drowning: The Process

- **1 Before** Drinking alcohol impairs the senses and encourages risk taking, meaning you'll be more likely to get into trouble.
- **2 During** Tired muscles and confusion from being under the influence of alcohol makes it harder to get out of trouble.
- **3 After** Even if a friend does come to your aid, alcohol seriously reduces your chances of surviving a near drowning, as resuscitation methods are less likely to work. If you choose to drink around the water, you can be safer by: avoiding aquatic activity by yourself, avoiding aquatic activity at night, avoiding aquatic activity in conditions or environments that you aren't familiar with.

All information regarding the drowning statistics is sourced from the Royal Life Saving Society.

Aquatic & Recreation Corner with Letisha ROYAL LIFE SAVING NATIONAL DROWNING PREVENTION PROGRAM 'KEEP WATCH'AND HEART BEAT CLUB

DID YOU KNOW?

- The number one cause of preventable death in children under the age of 5 is drowning
- On average, one child in Australia dies each week as a result of preventable drowning
- For each child that drowns there are at least three near drownings.
- Children drown in home swimming pools, public swimming pools, rivers, nappy buckets, laundry troughs, bath tubs etc.
- 21 People have drowned in Western Australia so far this year.

Heartbeat Club is where a group of people can join together and in a 3-hour course are taught drowning prevention techniques and are instructed in the methods of Cardiopulmonary (CPR) and Expired Air Resuscitation (EAR).

The course specifically highlights the skills to be employed in the resuscitation of babies and young children. It is suitable for parents and all carers of children in the home, and participants do not have their skill levels assessed. Correctly and speedily applied CPR and EAR can maintain life and prevent brain damage prior to the arrival of professional medical assistance.

As well as CPR and EAR, participants also receive the first aid treatment for children with Croup and choking babies, and, time permitting, can bring up other baby/child first aid topics prior to the end of the course.

The 3-hour course costs \$15 each, based on the minimum course cost of \$150 for 10 people.

Mortgage Wrappers Beware

The Department of Consumer and Employment Protection is warning WA Consumers to be aware of property investment promoters who suggest 'mortgage wrapping' as a finance option. 'Wraparound' mortgages occur when a purchaser buys a property using a mortgage from a financial institution, then enters into a credit arrangement with a second purchaser, who is often unable to obtain finance from a financial institution.

The property is 'on-sold' at a higher price, with the second buyer charged a higher interest rate than is being paid by the first purchaser on his/her mortgage. If either party defaults on the payments, the end-buyer has no equity in the property and no certificate of title, compared with the original purchaser whose name appears on the title and who may on-sell the property again.

Furthermore, if the 'wrapper' defaults on the mortgage or goes bankrupt, the end-buyer is unlikely to receive any of the proceeds unless there has been strong capital growth over and above the outstanding mortgage. Unfortunately, wrapping may be used to take advantage of people who are desperate to buy property. Often they are low-income earners who may find it difficult to obtain

finance through many financial institutions.

Consumers having difficulty obtaining finance may wish to contact a licensed finance broker to evaluate their options. Under the Finance Brokers Code of Conduct, a broker is required to enquire as to whether a prospective borrower is eligible for a low interest government loan. Consumers considering providing finance through a mortgage wrapping arrangement should be aware that a credit provider's licence may be required, and the contract must comply with the Consumer Credit Code.

Recent promoters of these schemes see nothing wrong in adding up to \$100,000 to the price of a property and then finding a desperate buyer who is likely to be unable to maintain the payments and then face eviction. The "wrapper" uses the repayments from the second purchaser to pay off his or her existing mortgage with their financial institution. The "wrapper" retains the property title until the final payment is made, years later.
