# **Local Girls at Australian Youth Olympics**

Courtney Gray from Lake Grace and Ashleigh Nelson from Wagin were thrilled to be selected to represent Australia at the Australian Youth Olympic Festival at Homebush Sydney in January 2007.

This selection was made even more special for both girls as it has extended an already amazing history between them. Both growing up in small country towns in the Upper Great Southern they met and became friends when they played hockey for the under 13's Regional side. Courtney started her hockey in Lake Grace and has had great support from the Lake Grace Hockey Club, before moving to School in Narrogin. They have remained friends ever since and have attended many state competitions together and are currently team mates for Willetton in the Premier League Competition in Perth.

To be selected in this Australian team both girls along with five other WA contenders attended a three series test in New Zealand recently which they won 3-nil. Four of the seven where lucky enough to be selected to attend the fourth Australian Youth Olympic Festival (AYOF), which lived up to its promises to be the biggest and most spectacular yet. The Australian Youth Olympic Festival (AYOF) is the largest Australian multisport event for athletes aged 13 – 19 years.

The AYOF is an initiative of the Australian Olympic Committee (AOC), following the success of the Sydney 2000 Olympic Games. The festival has previously been held in 2001, 2003 and 2005 enabling young athletes across Australia to compete with each other and international athletes from over 20 nations.

The AYOF's mission is to discover future Olympic Champions, provide them with an environment reminiscent of an Olympic Games and promote the Olympic ideals of fair play, honesty and pride in your country.

To win silver the Australian Women's team played extremely well going into the finals undefeated against countries such as China, Great Britain and New Zealand. They met Great Britain in the final which was always going to be a hard game as previous games had been close. In extremely hot conditions, Great Britain got off to an early start with two quick goals and managed to hold on to win 4-2. Although disappointed with the result of the final, Ashleigh and Courtney enjoyed the

fantastic opportunity to meet and play against other elite athletes, relished the opportunity to emulate the Olympic experience, and were enormously grateful to be lucky enough to live in a country which offers such an amazing opportunity to their youth.



# **Cemetery Restoration**

All jokes aside, the view from the Lake Grace Cemetery is fabulous. Although the residents aren't likely to appreciate the lake and its numerous bird life, it creates a restful atmosphere for those visiting loved ones.

Over past years, improvements such as a niche wall and a memorial for stillborn and neonatal babies have been made to accommodate the needs of the town. Dedicated locals have held regular busy bees to fight the encroachment of weeds and other pests. When the scheme water was run west of Lake Grace the opportunity arose to install a water tank, providing a means of watering natives shrubs and as

means of watering natives shrubs and an olive grove that have since been planted.

The heavy rainfall of January 2006 caused the ground to subside, damaging 60 grave sites, headstones and memorials within the cemetery. The resultant damage has spurred the Shire under the guidance of the Cemetery Restoration Group to not only repair, but to enhance the site. A Lotterywest grant provided funds for Albany Monumental Masons to complete this restoration work. This funding takes the pressure off families to repair the damage, it also means those residing within the cemetery that have no family locally will also have their sites treated with the respect that a final resting place deserves.



# **Make Money Out of Your Saltland!**

If you have salt affected land, or are noticing areas where your crop is getting patchy due to salinity, then saltland pastures may be for you. Saltbush-based pasture provide many benefits including:

- A source of high protein, out of season feed.
- A good source of Vitamin E.
- Reduce hand feeding in drought years.
- Manage salinity by reducing recharge on the valley floor.

Taking your paddocks out of production at the earliest signs of salinity can make a big difference in the productivity and grazing value of your saltland pastures.

Early intervention can mean the difference between be able to grow saltbush alleys with productive understorey (photo a) and block planting saltbush (photo b). Alleys of high protein saltbush, combined with a low salt, high energy understorey provide a valuable feed source. Block plantings still provide the high protein saltbush, but a low salt supplement such as a good quality hay is needed for weight maintenance.

# SCIENCE AND 等字的序序

2006 SKEPTICS AWARDS: Australian Sceptic of the Year was the peripatetic and colourful Dr Karl Kruszelnicki, who is the Julius Sumner Millar Fellow at Sydney University and a prolific author, broadcaster and tireless promoter of the wonders of science to young and old alike.



The winner of the \$10,000 prize was Dr Martin Bridgstock, a senior lecturer at Griffith University School of Science for his unit on Science, Scepticism and the Paranormal, which is designed to encourage students to research their own subjects using tools of scientific method and scepticism.

The \$2000 runner-up prize went to Kylie Sturgess, a teacher at PLC Perth, for her initiative in instituting a course to encourage students to investigate popular beliefs using sceptical principles.

The 2006 bent spoon award was Australian Pharmacies. The Bent Spoon Award is presented to the perpetrator of the most preposterous piece of pseudoscientific piffle. The ABC is the favourite contender so far to win the award this year for replacing Catalyst for Psychic Investigators, which is further evidence of a politically driven agenda to introduce "balance" to the ABC. Earlier the ABC had come under fire for axing the <a href="https://dx.natego.org/repsi/">THE GLASSHOUSE</a>, a panel-based satire that had won a large audience but was criticised by the government for perceived bias against it. (www.skeptics.com.au).

WHAT ARE OMEGA-3 FATTY ACIDS: Omega-3 and Omega-6 fatty acids are polyunsaturated fats. Unlike saturated fats, which are used for energy and can be harmful (and fattening) if we eat too much of them, Polyunsaturated fats are chemically active fats that are important structural components of every cell membrane in our body.

A large body of research has shown that omega-3 fats are very important for cardiovascular health, and can therefore help to maintain a healthy heart. However, our bodies can't make these polyunsaturated fats, and diets in western societies have become increasingly deficient in omega-3. Vegetable sources of omega-3 include dark leafy vegetables, nuts and seeds. These can be converted to long-chain omega-3 fatty acids in the body, which are particularly important. However, many people have difficulty making these conversions. For these people the long chain omega-3 fatty acids can be obtained directly from oily deep sea fish like tuna, mackerel, pilchards and sardines, or marine algae. (Australian Science Magazine) (web site at australianscience.com.au).

ANCIENT REEF RUNS AGROUND NEAR MARGARET RIVER: The discovery of the World's most southern coral reef has sounded a warning about how severe the impact of global warming could be. The fossilised coral reef was discovered 2.5 metres above the high tide mark at Foul Bay near the WA Town of Margaret River.

Prof. Malcolm McCulloch of the Australian National University's Research School of Earth Sciences said the reef dates back 128-125,000 years ago, which is in the middle of the last period of



global warming before our most recent ice age.

Sea levels would have had to be 3-4 metres higher at the time for the reef to grow. Given its southerly location, the oceans must have been much warmer than now. At the time we know that atmospheric CO2 levels were high, climate had warmed, that the northern icesheets had melted significantly and that sea levels rose before dropping by around 130 metres again as the ice age returned and locked up water, McCulloch says. Sea levels 6 metres higher than today have been hypothesised for the era, but evidence has been unclear, partly because the peak was apparently brief.

Only around 0.5 metres can be attributed to thermal expansion of the oceans, so rises above this must have been the result of catastrophic melting of the Greenland or Arctic ice sheets. McCulloch says that estimating how much melting occurred has been the largest uncertainty in establishing what the World was like at the time. "Now from the Margaret River corals we have evidence of not only unusually warm ocean temperatures, but that this was associated with rapid melting of icesheets contributing to an additional 3-4 metres of sea level rise." Past changes were caused by regular cycles in the Earth's orbit, and McCulloch acknowledges that historical sea level rises "are all slightly different from one another". Nevertheless, he believes the discovery presents a warming for all those living close to the sea as to what they need to expect. Given the Australian rush to the coast over the past few decades and development that removes the ability of coastlines to respond to rising water levels, this may soon be a problem for many inhabitants of towns like Margaret River. (Australian Science vol 28 number 1 2007).

BREAKING UP IS ALL TO EASY: You would think that someone would notice a missing chunk

of ice 30 metres thick and as large as 66-square-kilometres, but the Canadian Ice Service only discovered the change to the Coastline of Ellesmere Island, Canada's northernmost Arctic island, during a recent

analysis of satellite images. The loss of the Ales ice shelf is the latest event in a process that has been going on for more than half a century. During that time about 90 per cent of the ice shelves that once fringed Ellesmere Island have disappeared. 2007 is International Polar Year and is to focus attention to these regions.





# NIGHT





Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight, from midnight Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> February to midnight Friday February 16th. Remember astronomy is looking up. Never look at the Sun without a solar filter that completely covers the skyward end on a telescope and never with binoculars.

Viewing of the night sky is available here at my place or your place if out of town, just ring to book on 9865 1516 for information. All times are WA daylight saving.

Our local star, the Sun, resides in the Constellation of Capricornus for the whole fortnight and shines at magnitude -26.72. Morning twilight starts around 5am and evening twilight ends around 9:38pm. The sun takes around 12hrs 30 minutes to transit across the sky. Viewing of the sun can be arranged, as I check the sunspots every day possible.

**MOON PHASES:** The Moon will be at the last quarter phase on Saturday 10<sup>th</sup> in Libra at 6:41pm and shines at magnitude -6.0.

On Wednesday 7<sup>th</sup> at 8:11am in Virgo, the Moon will be at <u>apogee</u> (furthest), from Earth at 404,992kms.

**OTHER MOON PHENOMENON:** On Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> in Leo, the Moon will be 0.9° north of the ringed planet Saturn, and also 1.1° north of the +1.3 magnitude blue double star Regulas, which is 77.49 light years away. The double shines at +7.6 magnitude and is yellow. In Virgo on Thursday 8<sup>th</sup>, the Moon will be 1.3° (small finger at arms length), south of the bright magnitude +0.8 blue star Spica, which is 262 light years away. (Spica means sheaf of wheat).

On Monday 12<sup>th</sup>, in the morning sky in Scorpius, the Moon will be 0.7° (close), to the red supergiant star Antares (heart of the scorpion), which shines at magnitude +1.2 at 603 light years from Earth. Antares has a close double at magnitude +5.4 and shines blue/green. It will also be 6° (three fingers at arms length), south of the planet Jupiter.

On Thursday morning 12<sup>th</sup>, the Moon will be 4° (two fingers at arms length), south of Mars. With the moon moving through the night sky mostly after evening twilight there should be plenty of good nights for viewing.

**PLANETS:** Mercury in the Constellation of Aquarius, sets on Saturday evening at 9pm in the twilight, shining at magnitude -0.7 at 18° east elevation. By Friday 16<sup>th</sup>, Mercury will set at 8:19pm.

Venus at a very bright -3.9 magnitude, in the evening night sky in Aquarius, sets at 9:22pm just before end of twilight. On Friday 16<sup>th</sup>, Venus sets at 9:13pm.

The red planet Mars in Sagittarius, rises in the late morning sky at 4:05am on Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> at magnitude +1.4. Mars is close to the moon on the 15<sup>th</sup> and rises at 3:59am on Friday 16<sup>th</sup>.

Jupiter the giant gas planet in the constellation of Ophiuchus, rises in the early morning sky at 2:04am at

magnitude -1.9, and is close to the moon on Monday 12<sup>th</sup>. Jupiter rises at 12:24am on Friday 16<sup>th</sup>.

The ringed gas planet Saturn in the constellation of Leo, rises in the evening sky at 8:30pm at magnitude +0.0 on Saturday just 0.9° (close), south of the moon. Saturn will be at opposition (opposite side of the Earth to the sun on Sunday11th). On Friday 16<sup>th</sup> Saturn will rise at 7:36pm.

Uranus in Aquarius at magnitude +5.9 sets in the evening twilight at 8:44pm and would be hard to find. Neptune in Capricornus is starting to rise in the morning twilight and too close to the sun.

Meteors in the Constellation of Centaurus will be at twenty per hour some time during night. To find Centaurus, look for the southern cross (Crux), as it almost surrounds it.

There are satellites and meteors during the night. If you see a very bright light crossing the sky, it will be the space station or if the light oscillates it is a plane or a tumbling satellite.

CONSTELLATIONS IN VIEW WITH THE MAIN OBJECTS ARE: Orion the Hunter (the saucepan), with the nebula M42 in the handle, the flame and horsehead nebula near the southmost star of the three bottom stars. The bright red star to the north to north east is the supergiant Betelgeuse at 427.47 light years distant and shines at magnitude +0.5, and the bright blue star Rigal is also a supergiant and at 772.88 light years shines at +0.18. In the handle there are four stars called the Trapezium that light up the gasses. The bright stars under Orion represent Lepus (the hare).

The brightest star in the sky southeast of the saucepan is Canis Major at 8.6 light years shines at magnitude - 1.44 and is a close double. The double star is a white dwarf and a spoonful would weigh as much as a large bulldozer. To the north-northeast is the constellation of Gemini. To the North of Orion is Auriga (the charioteer) and to north to northwest is Taurus (the bull) with the orange/red star Alderbaran in the open star cluster Hyades and along the same line is the open star cluster, the Plaiades or the seven sisters, which is the oldest eye test known.

You should be able to see seven stars or better. The line of stars and dark gas marks the Orion arm of the Galaxy, which is where we live. Carina is in the south east and the southern cross is behind that with Centaurus.

Please report any strange sightings so they may be explained if possible.



Batting first Norths made 6/173 from 44 overs, with W Milton 89 the highest score.

For Lake Grace R Walker 3/42 saw him achieve 350 wickets.

Lake Grace began the run chase well, scoring 1 for 59 off 10 overs before heavy rain intervened, causing a delay in play.

On resumption Norths were able to restrict the scoring and take wickets. N Bairstow bowled very well to claim five wickets while S Rodgers was economical at the other end.
