

Local artists will create a regional view in this year's UWA Perth International Arts Festival with a collaborative art exhibition. *Liminal* by Lake Grace Artists' Group features in PIAF's Great Southern program and is the inaugural exhibition for the new Lake Grace art space.

The Artists' Group have collaborated to create 'Bluing', a series of artworks reflecting on the 'Liminal' theme. Liminal refers to thresholds, and states and places of in between. Artists, set the task of creating an artwork only with blue and its complementary orange, explored topics such as geography, the spiritual and nature to address the theme.

Officially opened by local artist Michelle Slarke last Friday, the exhibition includes the work of 19 artists and craftspeople aged six to seventy five. Ms Slarke paid tribute to the gallery owners Kerrie and Greg Argent and Tania and Darren Spencer who bought the former supermarket and "transformed it into a cultural asset for the community".

"It is because of their vision, commitment and generosity that we are able to have a permanent art space in Lake Grace and in such a great location," said Ms Slarke.

Biting Bugs

Earth Dries up as Temperatures Rises



The fraction of the Earth's land area suffering drought has more than doubled in the past 30 years. Rising temperatures caused by climate change are probably to blame.

Researchers worked out the severity of previous droughts using the global

records of temperature and precipitation dating back to the 1870s. Little change was found in the figures between the 1870's and the 1970's, but after that, the proportion of land categorised as experiencing very dry conditions began to rise from less than 16 per cent, in the early 1970's, to about 30 per cent in 2002. The drying up has been widespread over Europe, Asia, Canada, and parts of Africa and Australia. The water eventually condenses and returns to the surface as rain. But this redistribution is uneven, and the moisture does not necessarily return to the area it came from. The increase in moisture loss has other effects. As the amount of moisture in the atmosphere increases, so does the number of severe storms. In the US the total of precipitation has increased by 7 per cent in the 20th century, but the fraction classed as heavy precipitation increased by twice much. (report to the American Meteorological Society).

Silk Surprise



Spider silk, long noted for unusual strength and elasticity, maintains its strength even at extreme temperatures. The discovery boosts the idea of using spider-like silks for surgical stitches. Single strands of silk from the large orb-

weaving spider Nephila edulis was tested at temperatures between -60°C to 150°C.

It was found that over the entire temperature range, the threads could stretch by at least 20 per cent before snapping. Above 150°C the fibres became weaker, but they did not break down until the temperature reached 370°C. This suggests spider-like silk could safely be heat-sterilised before being used in surgery.

Oxford Biomaterials, is hoping to use the fibres for stitching wounds, nerve regeneration and tendon repair. (Advanced Materials, vol 17, P84).

Why Swordfish always get their Squid

Look into a swordfish's eye and you'll see a burning desire to go hunting. For these ocean predators heat their retinas, a trick that allows them to see prey

better. Most fish are cold-blooded, but swordfish can maintain the temperatures of their eyes and brains at between 19°C and 28°C, even in nearly freezing water. The swordfish's retina is extremely sensitive to temperature, reacting



five times faster to visual stimuli for every 10°C increase in temperature. Swordfish typically hunt in dim light at depths of between 100 and 300 metres. Here their warm eyes can spot a squid 7 to 12 times faster than they would if they were not warmed. It is also likely that the fish's eyes react more quickly than those of the cold-blooded squid. The comparatively great advantage of a warm retina may be why the fish evolved this unique strategy of warming only its eyes and brain, while similar fish with heat-sensitive eyes, such as tuna, warm their bodies. (Current Biology, vol 15, p 64).

Genetic Test for Parkinson's

Genetic screening could soon help identify people who have inherited a mutation linked to Parkinson's disease. In three studies published online, researchers show that a single gene is to blame for 5 per cent of cases of Parkinson's disease in families with a history of the disease. The same mutation is also responsible for 2 per cent of cases in families with no Parkinson's history. That makes the mutation, in a recently discovered gene called LRRK2, the most common yet linked to Parkinson's. Other mutations in the same gene may also predispose people to Parkinson's. (the Lancet).

Herb Mania

Herbal supplements and yoga are soaring in popularity in the US, a survey reveals. It has been found that 38 million adult Americans now take herbal supplements, up 50 per cent from 1997, and 10 million adults practice yoga, up 40 per cent.



Just Say Yes

Drug companies have agreed to allow unprecedented access to all clinical trial data. Under



the proposals drawn up by the International Federation of Pharmaceutical Manufacturers and Associations, a world wide register would provide the results of all trials to date.

Prickly Saltwort in Western Australia

Prickly saltwort or roly poly (*Salsola tragus*, previously *Salsola kali*) is distributed over the entire continent of Australia, with the exception of Tasmania. Like any summer weed it uses stored soil moisture and nutrients that would ordinarily be available to the following crop, which can significantly reduce crop yield. Mature plants need to be crushed or burnt at the end of summer to prevent them from interfering with seeding operations, although crushing is occasionally difficult as they are capable of blocking machinery.

Plants can be controlled by grazing, but this is difficult because sheep will only eat young, small plants. Chemical control is attempted with a range of herbicides. The most effective control is usually achieved with knockdown herbicides, glyphosate or SpraySeed®. As the plants can germinate continuously over summer, it is difficult to continuously catch the new cohorts while they are young. ALS herbicides, Group B, also give useful control as they are residual and so manage all cohorts. However, most plant species develop resistance to ALS herbicides relatively quickly, so control with the Group Bs is not a long term solution.

Saltwort plants break free at maturity and can move considerable distances carrying viable seed. This means that any herbicide resistance genes that develop in the species can spread between properties much more rapidly than resistance in other, non-mobile weed species.

Salsola rust (*Uromyces salsolae*), a biological control agent, has been successful in controlling *Salsola tragus* in America. Salsola rust appears to only attack prickly saltwort plants; is not a threat to commercial crops and has not yet been found on native plants. This fungus has only been recorded east of Yuna, in the northern wheatbelt. It is not known if the pathogen has persisted in other parts of Western Australia.

Prickly saltwort is the subject of a PhD project that aims to investigate the biology of this species, including seed production and dispersal, seed dormancy and seed bank longevity. Further its herbicide resistance status and possible control strategies are to be determined.

Swimming Pool Break In

There were no feelings of goodwill at the Lake Grace Swimming Pool after the discovery of a break in. The burglary occurred on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day with thieves making off with goods and cash.

Items stolen included prizes donated by local businesses for the annual Royal Flying Doctors Service raffle and a RFDS collection tin that contained approximately \$125.00. After smashing the tin open and retrieving the money, the offenders threw the tin in the diving pit of the swimming pool.

The thieves smashed the window into the kiosk before climbing through and helping themselves, a clear hand and palm print was left on the window which local police have now entered into the WA's forensic database. A DNA swab was also taken. These forensic details will be available to police throughout Australia.

Not content with making off with other people's property, the trespassers then entered the ladies toilets and change rooms, shoving towels into toilets and performing other antisocial acts.

Pool Manager, Kevin Seaman, is adamant that a local person wouldn't be selfish or thoughtless

enough to steal from the RFDS, a charity that is so pertinent to the population of rural areas.

Amongst the goods taken was a Fremantle Dockers camping chair (RFDS raffle prize - value of \$35.00); a bottle of Walker's Wine (RFDS raffle prize - value of \$30.00); RFDS donation tin - approximately \$125.00; Petty Cash - approximately \$20.00; 12 pairs of TYR 20 Swimming goggles - value of \$188.00 and three gas cigarette lighters used to light the BBQ.

Senior Constable Dave Sinclair said there was a small crime spree over the Christmas period with damage done to toilet fixtures at the old Railway Station and an attempt by a man and woman to steal a 'keep left' sign at the Roadhouse. A witness said the couple trying to steal the sign were off a 'gothic appearance' but were scared off when approached. Police are not sure at this stage whether the three incidents are related.

In an unrelated incident, a farmer at Varley has been a victim of sheep stealing, one hundred head of pregnant ewes were stolen while the farmer was away. Senior Constable Sinclair said that this has been an ongoing problem in Varley for a number of years.

The four R's Reading, wRithmetic and Resilience Promoting resilience in schools

Trish Travers (Coordinator Mental Health Promotion) explains that "A resilient school community is one in which school connectedness is fostered between school staff, parents and students". Resilient students are socially competent; problem solvers, solution focused, and have a sense of purpose and optimism.

With as many as one in five people experiencing mental health problems, building a new generation of resilient young people is essential to combat the rising levels of anxiety and depression in our community. Anxiety in childhood is the most common risk factor for depression in adolescence and early adulthood. Early intervention programs beneficial for individuals, families communities as they help prevent the development of anxiety and depression by increasing resilience and promoting positive coping skills. Mental health promotion and illness prevention programs assist teachers and school communities to build resilience in students Two programs that are offered in the Albany and Narrogin Education Districts are the FRIENDS and RAP Resourceful Adolescent Programs.


The FRIENDS program is suitable to be taught in primary schools and is delivered as part of the

health curriculum. The skills taught in FRIENDS assists children and youth in developing life skills to effectively cope with difficult or anxiety provoking situations, builds resilience and problems solving and encourages using support networks. FRIENDS is a leading Australian program with a strong evidence base designed to be delivered in schools to a whole primary year group.

The RAP- Resourceful Adolescents Program is taught in year 8 at high school. The skills taught in RAP are similar to FRIENDS. Therefore, students attending primary schools that deliver FRIENDS and then go on to a high school that delivers RAP, ensures students get a double dose of resilience skills.

WA Says 'yes' to School Uniforms for Public School Students

All public high school students will be required to wear school uniforms following an overwhelming 'yes' from Western Australians to the State Government's compulsory uniform proposal announced last year.

The announcement followed a two-week public comment period, which saw 70 per cent of respondents agree with the State Government's proposal to make school uniforms compulsory in public high schools from 2006, with this year to be a transition year. "Major stakeholders including the WA Council of State School Organisations, representing school P&Cs and the WA Primary Principals' Association support our concept of compulsory school uniforms," Dr Gallop said. "This is in addition to strong anecdotal support from teachers, students, parents and the wider community."

The Premier said compulsory school uniforms would bring a number of benefits including improved safety and security at schools. "Many secondary schools have found that uniforms can help readily identify who is supposed to be on school grounds and who is not," he said. "Parents will also benefit by not being pressured to spend money on keeping their child up with the latest dress fad and uniforms will help minimise the socioeconomic background differences between students." Education and Training Minister Alan Carpenter welcomed the community's input and said the results confirmed his belief that the proposal would be widely supported. "A school uniform reflects the public image

of a school and its students, just as a uniform does in the workplace," Mr Carpenter said. "From 2006, I expect to see all public high school students smartly and neatly dressed in attire that is easily identifiable as a school uniform, not like they are dressed for the weekend."

The Minister said schools could decide details of their own uniform in consultation with the school community, however he would not accept jeans or denim skirts as part of any school's uniform policy. "A number of public high schools already have a school uniform, but for those who do not, they will have time this year to design one," he said. "The transition year will also give those schools that do have a uniform the opportunity to redesign it if they wish." Mr Carpenter said a school's uniform policy did not necessarily mean the formal dress of school ties and blazers. "A school uniform could consist of smart pants/skirts teamed with a polo shirt with the school's logo," he said. "Some public schools do have the more formal blazer and tie but rather than this being the everyday uniform, it is a 'formal' uniform for special school occasions and when students may be representing their school at particular functions."

The red planet MARS, in Sagittarius, rises at 1:48am at magnitude +1.3 on 12th and 1:38am on 25th.

The giant gas planet JUPITER, rises at 9:29pm on

12th and 8:37pm on 25th in Virgo, at -2.4 magnitude.

The ringed planet SATURN, in Gemini at magnitude -0.3, is in the sky nearly all night and is 5° south of the Moon on Sunday 20th.

URANUS & NEPTUNE, in Aquarius & Capricorn are too close to the SUN to be sighted.

The small planet PLUTO at magnitude +13.8 in the Constellation of Serpens Cauda (the serpent's tail), rises at 1:29am and a large telescope is needed to view it.

Bright stars in night sky are; Canis Major, which is the brightest at -1.4. Betelgeuse at 0.50. Rigel at 0.15 both in the saucepan (Orion). The three stars on the bottom of the saucepan are called Alnitak, Alnilam and Mintaka, and the star opposite Betelgeuse, which is red, is Bellatrix. Further to the north is Aldebaran, in the head of Taurus, and to the far north is the yellow sunlike star, Capella, in Auriga the Charioteer. High above is the second brightest star in the night sky, Canopus, in the Constellation of Carina the sails at -.72 magnitude. To the south, south east sky is the Southern Cross with beta and alpha Centauri following.

Where there's a crossing, there's danger - always expect a train

This is the new slogan for the Road Safety Council's new community education kit regarding railway crossings.

The Western Australian Local Government Association's Community Road Safety Program, RoadWise and Main Roads WA are warning drivers, cyclists and pedestrians to take extra care at railway level crossings.

RoadWise Regional Road Safety Officer, Nadine Hendry said, "Police have told us that up to 95 per cent of crashes are due to driver error. Most crashes involve cars, four-wheel drives, vans and utilities, and a study shows that the driver's failure to take sufficient care or action was the major cause."

Announcing the new Road Safety Council community education kit to highlight the dangers of railway crossings, Ms Hendry urged road users to follow road rules and signs, and to pay attention to the road environment when approaching railway crossings. The message is particularly relevant to the Wheatbelt South Region where railway crossings are prolific.

Ms Hendry said, "Not all railway crossings have boom gates and some do not have flashing lights, especially not here in the Wheatbelt. When you see a sign indicating a crossing, slow down, look, listen and be prepared to stop. Trains can't stop quickly, they can't swerve to avoid you and freight trains don't run to published timetables."

Whilst crashes between trains and vehicles at railway level crossings claim relatively few lives – about one per cent of all deaths from road crashes a year – lives lost at railway crossings cannot be ignored. Ms Hendry said this was particularly so when studies of fatal rail crashes showed in most cases driver error was the cause.

In fatal crashes at rail crossings:

- more than 80 per cent were during daylight, in fine weather and on a straight road;
- two–thirds were in country areas;
- forty-four per cent happened at crossings without an electronic warning system, such as flashing lights and/or boom gates;
- more than half occurred where there was a warning system – including 10 per cent where there were boom gates;
- two-thirds of drivers, motorcyclists or cyclists were hit by the front of the train; and heavy trucks were involved in about 15 per cent of fatal rail crossing crashes.

Main Roads is progressively updating existing signage on railway crossings in the Wheatbelt South Region. The new, bigger and much brighter signs and bitumen road markings provide a fresh appearance on railway crossings in the Region, while making them highly visible at all times to approaching traffic.

An Office of Road Safety spokesperson, said, "We would like to remind the community to be vigilant. When approaching a railway crossing always assume there will be a train on the track. Newton's laws show that given the size of the train and the science of motion, it takes longer for a train to stop compared to a vehicle or truck. Even when the train driver applies the brakes, a loaded train can take more than a kilometre to stop."

WA Harvest Ends With 10.6m Tonnes in the Bins

The Western Australian grain harvest has drawn to a close with 10.6 million tonnes delivered into the CBH receival network during the 2004-05 season, making it the fifth largest harvest on record for the state.

Another 50,000 to 100,000 tonnes is expected to come in over the next few months as growers deliver from onfarm storages outside the traditional harvest period.

Wheat deliveries made up around 70 per cent of the total grain deliveries this harvest, with barley receivals comprising 20 per cent of the total. Other grains received this harvest included canola, lupins, oats, field peas, triticale and chick peas.

General Manager Operations, Colin Tutt said the 2004-05 harvest was one of the fastest on record, with good weather helping to bring the majority of the grain into CBH storages by Christmas 2004.

"The fast, efficient delivery of grain into the network this season can be partly attributed to a number of strategies put in place by CBH throughout 2004," Mr Tutt said.

"Our network strategy, which focuses on streamlining the CBH receival network, combined with the \$31 million invested in improving our storage facilities across the state, enabled the most efficient use of space and infrastructure during harvest.

"The tremendous work carried out by CBH logistics staff and marketers throughout the year, which saw an average of 1 million tonnes of grain leave the state each month, aided significantly in clearing the storage space in readiness for harvest.

"Of course, the greatest contributor to getting the grain in the bin quickly this harvest has been the excellent cooperation between CBH staff and growers. Once again, the contribution by growers has been outstanding this harvest and I would like to thank the growers of Western Australia for their understanding, co-operation and continued support throughout the year."

Record speed

Despite frosts, fires and harvest bans, this season's harvest had one of the earliest finishes on record. Harvest officially commenced on 5 October 2004 when the first load of lupins was delivered to the CBH Geraldton terminal. By Christmas, the majority of the season's 10.6 million tonnes had been delivered into the CBH storage network.

The Esperance zone recorded its earliest finish on record with receivals of 1.36 million tonnes, surpassing the zone's original estimate by 600,000 tonnes for the season.

Record volumes

Across the network, 38 facilities recorded their highest daily receival tallies and seven sites received their highest ever recorded tonnages.

Strategic capital investment was rewarded at the CBH Cascade site which broke its daily receival record with 6,531 tonnes delivered on 21 November 2004.

Calingiri and Miling receival points achieved record tonnages of 151,971

tonnes and 110,267 tonnes respectively for the season. Moora receival point also managed to break their previous total tonnage record with a new season total of 85,139 tonnes.

Recent newcomers to the CBH storage network, Narrakine and Regans Ford, continued to perform well this year with both sites exceeding receivals achieved last season. Narrakine total receivals reached 114,750 tonnes and Regans Ford received 43,584 tonnes for the season.

Staff numbers

More than 1,400 casual staff were employed as samplers and receival point operators across the CBH receival network to help bring in this season's harvest.

Grain Quality

The lack of rain during the crucial September/October period and frosts experienced earlier in the year made less impact on grain yields than anticipated for the 2004 -05 crop. Wheat quality, in particular, was excellent throughout the state. The quality of malting barley was disappointing with a record volume being lost to the feed stack due to high screenings.

Record shipping throughout the year

The record 14.7 million tonnes received in the 2003-04 harvest kept CBH logistics and operations staff busy throughout the past year. In September 2004, CBH broke its previous 12 month shipping record of 11.2 million tonnes set in the bumper 1999-2000 harvest.

The intense shipping program saw an average of one million tonnes of grain leave the state per month with a total of around 15 million tonnes of grain exported from Western Australia since 1 November 2003. Shipping is expected to continue at this rate well into 2005.

Wheatbelt Child Safety on Farms Workshops for WA in 2005

NORTH LAKE GRACE CRICKET

North Lake Grace v Kukerin At Lake Grace 5th February 2005

Kukerin travelled to Lake Grace to face a much depleted North Lake Grace team and after winning the toss decided to bat on a very good batting wicket.

North Lake Grace were missing five of their front line bowlers (Paul Morton, Jon Burns, Marty French, Wayne Milton and Brendan Desmond) and in their absence stand in captain Lindsay McGlinn threw the new ball to Regan "Rags" Bennett and Justin "Brash" Wright even though they had only bowled a total of 2 overs between them this year (Rags had not bowled either of these overs). Despite the makeshift attack Norths got off to a good start with Rags bowling S. Adams for 4 and Matt Dowling running out D. Leo for a duck with a direct hit from mid wicket which even Andrew Symonds would have been impressed with.

However after this good start it was all downhill for Norths as T. Adams and T. Leo put on a 74 run partnership before McGlinn turned a ball at right angles which resulted in Adams spooning a catch to Matt "Symonds" Dowling who took the catch comfortably. It then took another 124 runs before Norths were able to take another wicket and it was again McGlinn who came to the party with the help of veteran keeper John O'Neill. McGlinn pitched the fourth ball of his 10th over in line with middle stump and with the help of a prodigious crack in the pitch turned the ball enough to beat the bat of Troy Leo who had advanced down the pitch with the intention of dispatching McGlinn over cow corner – as always John O'Neill did the rest.

Matt Dowling, showing his versatility, was then the next to pick up a wicket when he had G. Taylor caught by a substitute fieldsman (the writer will not name this fielder as Grant "Billy" O'Neill might be heavily fined by the Lake Grace team for helping out the North's side). Matt, continuing his good form, picked up another wicket when young Benn Tompkins showed captain McGlinn how to take an outfield catch.

A beautiful last over by Justin Wright denied Nathan Ditchburn his century when he only conceded one off the over, which included the run out of J. Joyce after Wright gathered a loose return from Matt Dowling to find Joyce short of his ground. Whilst the scorebook credits the run out to Dowling the credit should have been all Wright's. In the end Kukerin ended up with a very credible 266 off their 44 overs.

After opening the bowling and bowling 22 overs between them, Wright and Bennett were expecting to put their feet up for a while, but captain McGlinn had other ideas – they were required to open the batting as well on a deteriorating pitch that was now favouring the bowlers.

Bennett and Wright got off to a steady start before Bennett was trapped in front for a well made 3. This brought Captain McGlinn to the wicket and with Justin Wright they managed to put on a 63 run partnership before Wright received an unplayable inswinger that clipped his leg stump. Wright's total of 42 was the top score for North's and included two sixes and four fours.

The next to go was the ever reliable Captain McGlinn for 37 after putting on a 27 run partnership with Matt Dowling. However McGlinn was heavily fined later for being dismissed one ball before drinks.

Matt Dowling (15) had produced a couple hefty blows before drinks and had decided the first ball after drinks was going to be dispatched to Pingrup but discovered later it was not the shot to play to a Yorker as his middle stump went cart-wheeling towards Kulin.

From the there it was just a matter of time for Kukerin as they quickly dismissed Royce Taylor (2), John O'Neill (9 – the previous two deliveries had been dispatched to the boundary by Johnno but after trying to hit the third one there found his stumps scattered on the ground), Ben Haines (0), Jamie Eggers (8), Matt Trevenen (0) and Jarrad Desmond (3). Ben Tompkins remained not out on O in a total score of 121.

Whilst the result was disappointing for North's (it was 2nd vs 3rd on the table) they were severely undermanned on the day but fought it out to the end. Regional Ambulance Services in Crisis

The Nationals' candidate for Roe, Jane McMeikan, has called for renewed support for country ambulance services which are struggling with a lack of resources and volunteers.

"There is a growing crisis in the regions as many ambulance services in smaller towns struggle to find enough volunteers to provide ambulance services, as well as the funding for essential equipment," Mrs McMeikan said.

"The volunteers cannot perform their job properly without adequate equipment and it is disgraceful that volunteers are expected to find funding to provide such basic equipment as satellite phones."

Mrs McMeikan said members in one community were seeking funding assistance to provide a satellite phone communication system that allows volunteers to be contacted when on farms with poor mobile coverage.

"One volunteer has told me she worries about driving down to the school bus or hanging clothes on the line because she is out of range and unable to take emergency calls," Mrs McMeikan said.

"It is scandalous for volunteer members in the community to be expected to foot the bill or write funding applications to provide satellite phones to assist the community in times of emergency.

"These volunteers provide an invaluable service to their communities and need our full support.

"Like our wonderful country fire brigades, these organisations need government assistance to survive and I am committed to making sure funds are available to St John's Ambulance to provide vehicles and equipment so they can concentrate on saving lives."
