## Interactive Community Education - Building Partnerships



Lake Grace has been chosen for an exciting new pilot programme designed to open up the spectrum of education in rural and remote locations in Western Australia.

The initiative revolves around forming a stronger partnership between community and school by taking education out into the community, and bringing the community into the school.

Student involvement could be included in local initiatives, this would enable students to see the practicality behind the subject matter they are learning at school as they see it applied in day to day situations.

Lake Grace like any community is a veritable 'treasure trove' of talent with many individuals within our community having a vast practical experience to offer our local students. Our local school and teachers also have the potential to offer further education to older students with their up to date facilities.

Although primarily intitiated by the Rural and Remote Education Advisory Group, the Wheatbelt Development Commission and the Lake Grace Shire soon became joint collaborators with the programme.

An initial meeting was held on Wednesday 11th February with consultation from representatives from the Lake Grace Shire, Lake Grace School, Isolated Children's Parents Association, Narrogin Education District Office, Lake Grace Development Association, Rural and Remote Education Advisory Council, Wheatbelt Development Commission and the Lake Grace Telecentre.

This initiative has the potential to change the face of education in rural areas as there are no boundaries. Get your thinking caps on ready for the open public meeting will be held on the 5th May, more details will follow in further articles.

#### Ian Robbins Memorial Land Care Award

I'd like to take this opportunity to give you a bit of background information about the Ian Robbins Memorial Land Care Award which is being presented to a Year 7 student at the Lake Grace District High School each year.

When he requested Lake Grace as his first teaching appointment Ian Robbins began a 38 year career in education . He was born in Southhampton England and at the age of 12 his migrated to Australia, having been sponsored by an uncle Harry Fry. Soon after arriving lan and his brother Mick were invited to Jack Lay's farm in Lake Grace, and so started his love of the bush, especially this area. He often said that had he not been called to teaching, he would have been farming around here. He taught at the school from 1962-67 and was only 21 at the time. When we came to the school reunion a few years ago, he was so pleased to see that the Morrison which he had founded was still in existence. The attachment to the school was further strengthened when his daughter Dinah's husband Andrew Watt also had his first appointment there from '87 - '89.

After Lake Grace Ian moved to a variety of different primary schools around Perth, and he also did some lecturing at Mt. Lawley Teachers' College and at Curtin University. In 1988 he was appointed Deputy Principal of Alinjarra Primary school in Alexander Heights, and he spent the last 13 years of his career there. An award has also been created for a child at Alinjarra to receive the Ian Robbins Memorial Environment Award.

In the year before he died of cancer he received an Award of Recognition at Government House during Children's Week, for his positive contributions to the happiness and well-being of children. Alinjarra also honoured him by naming a nature trail which he had created at school The Ian Robbins Nature Trail.

In his early years in England, Ian had a teacher who took his students into the New Forest to study the plant and animal life, all in his own time. This made such an impression on him that he also wanted to teach children about their environment and about caring for it. He ran environment clubs in most of the schools he taught at, and at Alinjarra he had worm farms, and planted trees in our local park, with parents and children from the school on the weekends.

One could sum up lan's philosophy on the environment with the following quote which he loved.

WE DON'T INHERIT THE EARTH FROM OUR FATHERS, BUT WE BORROW IT FROM OUR CHILDREN.

In the last 7 months of his life, when he knew that his skin cancer was terminal, he decided to paint and write poetry about nature especially birds, and he produced a book of his work called "An Earthman's Gratitude". It was very important for him to leave his message behind.

Over 1000 copies of this book have been sold, and I am very grateful to Terry and Lenore Gladish for selling it at the post office. This book has been sent all over the world including Canada, the U.S., England, Germany, Denmark, Finland, Austria, South Africa, Botswana, New Zealand, Singapore, and every state of Australia.

In creating the Memorial Awards for a student from Lake Grace, and Alinjarra each year I wanted to honour his memory and also recognise the efforts of children who show a keen interest in the environment, and have an affinity with the land, it's preservation, and show a desire to care for the land. The teachers at each school have a list of criteria from which to determine the recipient each year.

So, it is with great pleasure that I travelled to Lake Grace in 2002 for the inaugural award presentation to Liam Fyfe, and again in 2003 to present it to Lauren Bushby.

I plan to be there each year, and hope to be able to bring along members of the family from time to time.

Thank you to your community for your welcome, and your lovely stories of Mr. Robbins. And a very special thanks to Ollie and Lucy Farrelly for their hospitality and for making me so comfortable at the Salt Bush Inn.

I'll see you all next year, and I hope that the New Year will be good to us all.

## REGIONAL AGEING LIFESTYLE ACCOMODATION GROUP

In June 2003 an enthusiastic group of individuals met to look into improving the facilities for the aged people in our shire and the possibility of attaching a dementia unit to the Lake Grace Hospital. It did not take long for this to expand to a Hostel and Lifestyle Village within our town.

The overall objective of our group is to have a Lifestyle Village (as opposed to a Retirement Village) that will attract retirees to Lake Grace when we are able to offer an appealing lifestyle that is affordable and secure. It is our intention that there will be an industry built on this.

The group has visited a number of other rural communities to look at their facilities. A recent survey sent out by the hospital included specific questions about accommodation facilities for the seniors in our shire, which has assisted us greatly. We have also spoken to Mr. Joe Douglas - Town Planner - to determine potential land requirements for a Lifestyle Village. The committee recently had a basic concept plan drawn up by Mr. Max Hannell to meet shire Town Planning requirements. In the concept plan a Hostel is shown at one end and ten 3 bedroom two bathroom units along the west side of Bishop Street.

These plans are by no means final and were drawn up to give an initial idea of a possible layout on the area of land. These plans are on display in the School display cabinet at the Lake Grace Shopping Centre, Kukerin Nursing Post, Varley Telecentre, Newdegate Telecentre, Pingrup Telecentre, Lake King Store and the Pingaring Store. We hope to have a public meeting towards the end of February so that we can receive some public comment.

## NIGHT





Welcome to the first Night Watch for 2004, from midnight from Friday 13th to midnight Friday 27th of February.

Our local star the Sun, resides in the constellation of Capricornus until the 17th when it will have moved into Aquarius.

On Monday 16th at 3.23pm the Moon in Sagittarius, will be at Perigee (closest), 368,322kms from earth. The new Moon occurs on Friday 20th in Aquarius at 5.08pm.

Mercury in the morning sky rises around 4.33am in Capricornus and rises 4 minutes later each morning. Mercury will be 2 degrees south of the planet Neptune on Sunday 15th.

Venus, shining at a bright -4.1, is in the evening western sky in Pisces sets around 8.53pm and sets 1 minute earlier each night. On Monday 23rd, Venus will be 3 degrees north of the Moon.

The red planet Mars, in Aries sets around 10.00pm and is at magnitude 0.9. Mars on the 26th will be 0.9 north of the Moon.

The giant gas planet Jupiter at magnitude -2.2 in Leo rises around 8.00pm and rises 4 minutes earlier each night.

The giant ringed planet Saturn, in Gemini at magnitude -0.2, sets around 2.00am. Saturn sits at the feet of the twins.

Uranus, the last naked eyesight planet, is in Aquarius at 5.9 in the evening twilight and will be on the far side of the Sun on the 22nd.

Neptune in Capricorn will be 5 degrees north of the Moon on the 19th at magnitude 13.8.

A few meteors can be seen in the morning sky around 2.00am in Leo, and in the small southern constellation of Norma the carpenter's rule near Alpha Centauri and near the scorpion's tail on the 25th.

Morning and afternoon twilight starts and ends around 1 hour and 35 minutes before sunrise and sunset.

Comets: after the last few years without some bright comets, this year we have three. They are c/neat (2001 q4) down to 0.9, the brightness of Mars now. C/linear (2002 t17) down to 0.3, and c/linear (2003 k4) down to 5.1. They are in the night sky during April, May, June through to December.

The transit of Venus across the face of the Sun on June 8th starts at around 1.30pm and is visible right up to sunset.

It is from these transits that we have learned that the travel of planets across stars like the sun makes them blink as the star hd209548 did to reveal the planet Jupiter.

The Moon rises at midnight on the 14th and is not in the evening sky until it starts on the 21st when it sets at 7.42pm, and sets an hour later.

Remember that if you need any information on anything or want to look through the telescope just ring or come around home as you are welcome at any time.





## SCIENCE AND STOFF

Some of the main events for 2004 are:

1 A detailed 3D map of the brain to tell us what neurons really get up to. The map will be called the Allen Brain Atlas. This will be a three dimensional map of gene expression that will show which neurons make which neurotransmitters and other chemicals, to help divide the brain into functional regions.

#### 2 Venus Transit

On the 8th June, 5 billion people will be treated to a sight no living person has ever seen - the planet Venus passing across the face of the Sun. The last time this happened was in 1882. The transit will last about 6 hours. The first transit was first observed in 1639 and there has only been four since then. They occur in pairs, eight years apart, once every 120 years or so. The next will be in 2012.

#### 3 Other Worlds

NASA's Martian landers already have 2004 off to a good start and on 26th February, the cometchasing spacecraft Rosetta will be launched. On 1st July, after traveling 3.2 billion kilometers, the Cassini spacecraft will arrive and start orbiting the ringed planet Saturn, exploring the planet, it's magnificent ring system and it's myriad of moons. Next Christmas Day, a probe called Huygens will head for the moon, Titan, the only moon if the solar system with an atmosphere. At its surface the atmosphere pressure is 60% higher than Earth's.

#### 4 Singapore

Singapore is hoping to become the first nation with a nationwide network of communication channels protected by quantum cryptography. The security of quantum cryptography relies on the properties of "entangled" pairs of photons to carry the key that protects data. The fragile nature of quantum entanglement means that once the key has been established, those exchanging information can be assured that no one can read their secrets undetected.

#### 5 Atkins Verdict

There will be a lot more fuss about the Atkins Diet. This controversial weight-loss programme used by celebrities, allows people to eats as much protein and fat as they like but not carbohydrates. A team of doctors are pouring

over the data from the biggest medical test yet for Atkins, comparing it with a convential caloriecontrolled diet in a group of 132 people. They will soon report their verdict whether Atkins promotes weight loss as successfully as it promotes it's self.

#### 6 Giant Telescope

By the end of the year the giant 30 million dollar Southern African large telescope will be finished. The 11 metre hexagonal mirror array will record distant stars, galaxies and quasars a billion times fainter than objects visible to the naked eye.

#### 7 Bitter Blocker

This year a white powder will replace those spoonfuls of sugar to help the medicine go down. The white powder takes out the bitterness of food and drinks.

#### 8 Solar Sailing

A rocket carrying the first spacecraft driven by a solar sail will break the surface of the Barents Sea later this year, shot into orbit from a converted Russian nuclear submarine.

The three stage-stage rocket will deposit a modest craft called Cosmos 1 in an orbit high above the international space station. Within a few days, the craft will unfurl eight shiny mylar sails each measuring 14 metres across. These will harness the radiation pressure of photons streaming from the sun to lift the craft to higher orbits.

#### 9 Hunt for Atlantis

It could be 2004's most fabulous expedition: a voyage to the lost world of Atlantis. The people planning it are no crystal-waving cranks. A team of underwater archaeologists has pin-pointed a submerged island whose features match some of Plato's legendary description. They hope to find evidence that prehistoric hunter-gathers lived there before the island flooded at the end of the last ice age.

Hope you find some of these things interesting throughout the year.



#### SAFE PLAY AREAS ON FARMS CAMPAIGN

Farmsafe WA Alliance is urging farming families to pay special attention to child safety with the recent launch of the national *Safe Play Areas on Farms Campaign*.

The campaign is a timely reminder of safety issues as children begin a new school year on their farms and in the community.

Research recently conducted by the Australian Centre for Agricultural Health and Safety shows that up to 80% of farms with children have a fenced house yard, but less than half considered their yard to be 'almost impossible' or 'difficult' for a child to leave without the help of an adult.

A securely fenced house yard that keeps small children away from dams, tractors and reversing vehicles, can drastically reduce the risk of serious injury.

Each year on average around 30 children are killed on Australian farms and a further 600 injured severely enough to require hospitalization. In response Farmsafe Australia is implementing a national strategy including promoting the following key messages:

- Have a safe play area (such as a securely fenced house yard) to keep children particularly toddlers - away from water hazards and vehicles and mobile plant
- Keep children off the backs of utes and have them wear seatbelts when in farm vehicles
- Keep children off tractors and ATV's (4 wheel

- motorcycles)
- Ensure children wear helmets when riding motorcycles and horses

The Safe Play Areas on Farms Campaign encourages farmers and graziers with children to check whether their house yard is up to scratch. A kit with a six step approach to making a house yard secure, good examples of what farmers have already done, and ideas for creating a child friendly garden environment is available from Farmsafe WA.

Farmsafe WA Chairman, Tony Hiscock, said a farm is a great place to raise a family, but uniquely, it is both a home and a workplace. So it's important that the right environment is created - to keep children safe.

"Now that most families are back on their farms after the school holidays and in the routine of school again, it is the perfect time for responsible parents to be aware of and creating a safe environment for children.

#### **Concern over Number of Self-employed Deaths**

WorkSafe has expressed concern at the number of self-employed people being killed in workplaces in WA.

Acting Executive Director Nina Lyhne said today that there had been a worrying increase in the number of self-employed people involved in workplace incidents.

"Our statistics show that self-employed persons have historically accounted for around 35 per cent of fatalities in WA workplaces," Ms Lyhne said.

"But so far this financial year, self-employed workers have accounted for 6 out of ten or 60 per cent of workplace deaths, which I find alarming.

"Another cause for concern is that many of these incidents have also involved the maintenance or repair of machinery – tractors in particular."

Over the past 15 years in WA, ten farmers have died as a result of being run over by their own tractors, with the most recent death occurring in the Wheatbelt in late January.

There have been 363 workplace fatalities in WA over this period, and 277 - or more than 76 per cent - have taken place in regional areas.

Ms Lyhne said that self-employed workers may become over-confident about the tasks they performed on a regular basis.

"It's possible that a high level of familiarity with tasks can lead to workers not properly considering all the hazards and risks involved," she said.

"It is important for self-employed workers to remember that safe systems of work are just as important to a self-employed person working alone as they are to someone working on a building site or in a factory."

### Injury in Western Australia

An Epidemiology of Injury, 1989 to 2000

Injuries are a significant health issue in Western Australia ranking fourth as a cause of death.


Hospitalisation rates due to injury have increased significantly since 1989. Falls are the most common cause of injury hospitalisation, placing a considerable burden on the Western Australian health care system.

Males, indigenous people, rural residents, young people and elderly adults are at greatest risk of injury.

Violence related injuries have emerged as a growing issue in Western Australia, particularly for males, young people, Indigenous people and rural residents. These injuries resulted in an average of 270 deaths and 5,000 hospitalisations per year between 1995 and 2000.

Self-inflicted injuries resulting in death were more common than injuries inflicted by another.


Hospitalisation due to accidental poisoning with pharmaceuticals was another emerging issue. Findings suggest that pharmaceuticals are being used with intent to cause self-harm.



Funding for this review was provided by the Injury Prevention Branch, Department of Health and undertaken by the Injury Research Centre, University of Western Australia.



#### Increased Ross River Virus Risk



The Department of Health warned about a continuing high risk of the mosquito-borne Ross River virus disease in the South West of Western Australia during the summer months.

The warning follows a marked increase in the number of cases of Ross River virus disease in November and early December as well as continued detection of the virus in mosquitoes collected at several South West locations.

More than 100 cases of Ross River virus disease have been reported from the South West since September this year. This is more than six times the number of cases reported from the South West for the same period in each of the two preceding years.

The Department's Medical Entomologist, Dr Mike Lindsay, said that the Department's forecast in October 2003 of a likely epidemic of Ross River virus appeared to have been accurate.

"Higher rainfall and temperatures this spring have lead to more mosquitoes and a higher risk of contracting Ross River virus," Dr Lindsay said.

The surveillance program carried out for the Department by The University of Western Australia is continuing to find considerable numbers of mosquitoes carrying the Ross River virus at key locations in the South West.

"The mosquito population is slowly declining with the onset of warmer, drier weather, but a higher proportion of mosquitoes is infected with the virus compared with a month ago," said Dr Lindsay.

"For this reason, the Department strongly urges holiday makers and residents of mosquito-prone areas of the South West to avoid mosquito bites during the summer months.

"We must not become complacent just because there are fewer mosquitoes around. The reality is that a larger proportion of remaining mosquitoes are infected with the virus." Ross River virus can cause painful or swollen joints, sore muscles, skin rashes, fever, chronic fatigue and headaches. These symptoms can last for weeks and sometimes months. The only way to properly diagnose the virus is by having a blood test, requested by your doctor.

People who are most at risk of being exposed to the virus are those living or holidaying near saltmarshes and seasonal wetlands, especially in coastal areas between Perth and Augusta. However, the virus has also become active in some inland areas of the South West and the Wheatbelt and as far east as Esperance. The virus may become even more widespread if mosquito breeding is boosted by summer rains or abnormally high tides.

Dr Lindsay said Local Governments and the Department of Health were continuing to work hard to minimise mosquito breeding in high risk areas.

"However, it is not possible to eliminate all mosquitoes, and there is no cure or vaccine for these debilitating diseases, so taking precautions to avoid being bitten is very important. Eliminating mosquito breeding from back yards is also necessary as some domestic mosquitoes can transmit the virus during outbreaks."

Dr Lindsay said there are some simple but important steps people can take to avoid being bitten by mosquitoes, such as:

- Avoiding outdoor exposure in areas of high mosquito activity, especially around dawn and dusk;
- Ensuring insect screens on houses are installed and completely mosquito-proof. If camping, use mosquito nets and mosquito-proof tents:
- Wearing long, loose-fitting protective clothing when outdoors in mosquito-prone areas.
- Using personal repellents containing diethyl toluamide (DEET) or picaridin. The most effective and long-lasting formulations are lotions or gels. Most natural or organic repellents are not as effective as DEET or picaridin; and,
- Ensuring infants and children are adequately protected against mosquito bites, preferably with suitable clothing, bed nets or other forms of insect screening. Only infant-strength repellents should be used on children.

#### **Hard Drive or Soft Drive**
