In August last year, Lake Grace Gym Club submitted an application for grant funding in the "Holden Home Ground Advantage" program. A long term goal of our club has been working towards building a shed for use as a dedicated gymnastics facility, and we were seeking funds to assist us in this goal. Inspired by the power of local communities, Holden started their "Home Ground Advantage" grants program to help clubs improve facilities, purchase equipment and even develop exceptional talent.

In October we were thrilled when contacted by Graham Broad (Narrogin Holden) and Adrian Edwards (Edwards

Holden, Katanning), who advised us that our application had been successful, and we would be receiving \$12 000 from the grant pool of \$250 000. There had been around 2000 applications in this round, so we were ecstatic, humbled and extremely appreciative of Holden's commitment to grass roots sport, their support and belief in our club, and their acknowledgement of the volunteers who dedicate many hours to coaching and administrating our club.

During the application process, clubs are encouraged to submit a basic video to help Holden get to know the club and what the grant is needed for. We were very lucky to

Dear Editor.

When I think back to the start of a new school year, I can still remember the buzzing feelings of excitement, anticipation and nerves. Am I going to have classes with all my friends? Will I get better results than last year? Which teachers will I have?

Millions of young people across the country heading into primary and secondary school over the coming weeks may be facing similar feelings – whether they are starting another school year or commencing a new school for the first time.

Some students can adjust to the changes and settle into things quickly. However, some young people may find this a daunting and challenging time.

There can be a number of reasons why it might be hard to go to school: trying to make new friends, pressure to get the best marks, dealing with bullying, or perhaps going through a mental health issue such as anxiety or depression. These worries can make the next few weeks an uncertain time.

Whether you are a young person struggling, or a parent with concerns about your child, headspace is here to help. As the National Youth Mental Health Foundation, headspace provides support for young people aged 12-25 years old who are struggling with their mental health and wellbeing.

No matter where you are, you can access help at headspace – either through one of our 95 centres in metro, rural and regional areas of Australia, or via eheadspace.org.au where you can receive online and

Super For Self Employed

Many small business owners don't start paying super for their retirement until they are into their 50s. Often they see their business as a retirement asset, however, the value of the business usually drops significantly when the owner stops working.

It helps to start paying into your super account early. The longer you contribute to super, the larger your retirement income will be when you stop working.

Being self-employed, you may be able to claim a full tax deduction for contributions you make to your own super until you turn 75. You may also be eligible for the super co-contribution payment.

You may want to discuss retirement planning with your accountant or tax agent. Now is the time to act!

If you're a sole trader or in a partnership, you don't as an employer have to make super guarantee (SG) payments for yourself.

But you may want to make personal contributions to super as a way of saving for your retirement.

Most self-employed people can claim a full deduction for contributions they make to their super until they turn

75. Keep in mind that contributions you make may attract extra tax if they exceed the contributions limit for that year.

You may also be eligible for the super co-contribution payment. This helps eligible low-to-middle income earners save for their retirement. If you're eligible and you make personal super contributions, the government will match your contribution up to certain limits, unless you have claimed your contribution as a tax deduction.

Make sure your super fund has your tax file number (TFN). If it doesn't:

- your super contributions will be taxed an additional 34%
- your fund won't be able to accept personal contributions from you, which means you may miss out on any super co-contribution you're eligible for
- it will be harder to keep track of your super.

The Driver Reviver was out on the 23rd and 24th December, thank you to the Firies for putting the van out and a big thank you to those who helped staff the van.



Last Post Ceremony for Sergeant Norman Leslie Oliver

At the end of each day, commencing at 4.55 pm AEDT, the Australian War Memorial farewells visitors with its moving Last Post Ceremony. The ceremony begins with the singing of the Australian National Anthem, followed by the poignant strains of a lament, played by a piper. The story is then told of the serviceman who is featured that day; this includes personal information and details of their service.

On Wednesday 21st December a service was held for Sergeant Norman Leslie Oliver. A large photograph is displayed (if one is not available they show a photo of the Australian flag) of the nominated soldier through the day in the entrance of the Australian War Memorial. This is then moved out to the Pool of Reflection prior to the service starting. The family are given instructions on what will happen throughout the service and are

invited to lay a wreath (or more than one if they wish). They are asked to write on a card which is then added to the AWM's archive.

The service has only been going a little more than 3 years and with more than 102,000 Australians on the Roll of Honour there is no shortage of soldiers to commemorate. Family can nominate a family member, which is what I did ever hopeful that Les's name hadn't been one of the earlier ones pulled out of a hat. There was less than twelve months between my nomination and the date of the ceremony; however with a rise in popularity of the ceremony (and family desperate to hold the service before aging family pass away) the waiting time has now pushed out to two years.

Regardless of whom is being celebrated the service is incredibly moving; we were honoured to be approached by so many after the service wanting more information about Les and his family. There was some degree of incredulity that Les was involved in Gallipoli and then reenlisted to take part in the Western Front where he was eventually mortally wounded.

The service is live streamed from the Australian War Memorial out to participating RSL clubs and can also be watched via their website. Les had eight members of his family present at the service; the two great nephews (Malcolm Oliver and Ken Francis) and one great niece (Suzanne Reeves) laid the wreath in honour of his parents and siblings who never stopped missing their son and brother.

G'day all,

Happy New Year to you all.

Firstly, I want to address a subject that came to prominence over the New Year's Eve festivities. There was a well-publicised incident involving a member of the Lake Grace community, and I won't go into details about that for obvious reasons. The person concerned has had issues with drugs in the past, but he is not the only person in town using drugs I can assure you. Google "signs of meth use" and you may be surprised at what you read. WA Health websites have information and support lines for those of you that have family members or friends using drugs. It is only a matter of time before someone else goes the same way and we the Police end up dealing with them too. The person concerned has a lot of family support and it was heartening to see that they will try everything to get him well again. They also have our support at the station too.

So, if anyone knows of people dealing drugs or supplying drugs by picking them up from another place. Call us here or Crime stoppers. Simple really – don't let dealers get away with it and we won't have serious incidents in our towns. The former Chief of the Australian Army and Australian of the Year Lt Gen David Morrison famously said "the standards we walk past are the standards we accept." If we walk past someone urinating on a building in the main street then expect it to be something we see over and over again. Someone smoking weed outside the pub? Acceptable? Not really. Call those people on it and if they don't accept that then call the Police. I'm not asking for vigilantism, I'm asking for us to start setting the standards of behaviours for others. It's not being nosy or a sticky beak it's called community spirit!

A good example of this came from Newdegate in recent days where an individual has extended the middle finger to his community in a number of ways, but more recently by hooning round town in an unregistered car and a few other traffic offences to boot. Members of the community tried to reason with the bloke and when that was met with blank indifference they called us. He is now the recipient of \$1200 in fines and 3 points on his fairly non-existent license.

Some new legislation has been enacted in State Parliament in relation to unregistered motor bikes — typically off road bikes made and used for that purpose. If anyone uses or attempts to use an off road bike on a road it can now be seized and impounded for 28 days. Off road bikes are just that and I expect off road bikes to be on trailers or walked to the places where they can be used and enjoyed safely. They are not capable of being licensed for a reason, in that they don't have lights or indicators or other safety features found on typical road bikes. Hence the new legislation.

Also, noticing on our travels a lot of trailers and caravans being towed at 110km/h. The speed limit for vehicles with trailers is 10km/h **UNDER** the posted limit. Speed limit shows 90km/h then someone towing a trailer should be at 80km/h or less.

Australia Day weekend is coming soon and the usual double demerit week applies. Again, keep the speed down and make sure the kids are strapped in properly!

Talking Trash

CSIRO

CSIRO's marine debris team is calling on Australians to do the right thing with their rubbish in 2017, with new research highlighting the nation's ocean and coastal pollution issue.

The research, published today in *Frontiers in Ecology* and the *Environment*, showed the coastline from Brisbane to Melbourne, western coast of Tasmania and the southern part of Western Australia to be the worst hot spots.

"More than eight million tons of rubbish finds its way into the worlds' oceans each year," CSIRO Principle Research Scientist Chris Wilcox said.

"While about one million tons is out floating in the ocean, the rest ends up on the shore.

"Apart from looking ugly, it causes significant harm to wildlife with about half of all seabirds and 30 per cent of sea turtles found to have eaten plastic.

We think turtles eat plastic bags because they look like jellyfish in the water and with seabirds it's the smell of plastic which takes on a krill-like smell in the water."

The research showed that while marine debris was a global issue, a significant amount of the litter found in a

region had originated from the local area.

"Our research shows that in most cases, communities are being affected by their own rubbish, not the big rubbish gyre out in the middle of the ocean or rubbish from a neighbouring country," Dr Wilcox said.

"This means that we are the cause but also the solution.

"While up to 40 per cent of litter found during clean-up activities are beverage containers, things like discarded fishing equipment are also common culprits.

"Our new research shows this is the case in western Tasmania with a large amount of the debris found to have been coming from fishing.

"With millions of tons of rubbish produced each Christmas, it's something to keep in mind during this years' celebrations.

"If you're out on the beach or at the park, take your rubbish home with you – don't add to the pollution pandemic."

The facts about marine debris:

- More than 600 marine species have been found eating plastic
- There are about six items of plastic on our coast for every person in Australia
- About half of sea birds and 30 per cent of turtles have plastic in them
- As many as 15,000 turtles are caught in dumped fishing gear in Northern Australia every year

High Blood Pressure – A Silent Killer

Sadly lots of us blokes don't have our blood pressure (BP) checked because we don't visit our GP for checkups or the GP has not done a blood pressure test.

High BP is one of the 3 main risk factors for heart attack and the main risk factor for stroke. Having a consistently high BP isn't a good thing and may become more common as we age. High BP isn't inevitable, nor unmanageable if we have it, but controlling high BP is critical in protecting our long term health and wellbeing.

Our bodies contain about 5 litres of blood which the heart pumps continuously around an intricate network of blood vessels. This process delivers vital nutrients and fresh oxygen to our body's tissues and organs whilst creating a certain amount of pressure inside our arteries (blood vessels that take blood away from the heart and out to the body).

Our blood pressure depends primarily on two things:-

- · The amount of blood pumped by the heart; and
- How easily the blood can flow through the arteries.

Blood pressure readings are given in millimetres of mercury (mmHg) and consist of 2 numbers:

- The top number measures the pressure in your arteries when your heart pumps – systolic (sys-tol-ik) pressure;
- The bottom number measures the pressure in your arteries when your heart relaxes – diastolic(di-as-tolik) pressure.

What is 'normal' blood pressure? According to the Australian Health Foundation there is no 'normal' or 'ideal' blood pressure reading. The following figures should only be used as a guide.

| Normal | Less than 120/80 |
|-------------|-------------------------------|
| High/Normal | Between 120/80 and 140/90 |
| High | Equal to or more than 140/90 |
| Very High | Equal to or more than 180/110 |

(Source – Heart Foundation – Managing high blood pressure)

The cause of high BP quite often is a mystery. It can be linked to genetics (family history is important), poor diet, being overweight and/or lack of exercise. The effects of some medicines being used to treat varying health conditions can also be a factor along with underlying health disorders that we may have.

The harm of high BP over time is simple. It can overload both the heart and blood vessels which in turn make us more susceptible to heart attack and stroke.

There are many things that we can do to keep our blood pressure healthy. To help manage high BP many people need medicine but by making the following healthy lifestyle changes blood pressure can be lowered.

- Be a non smoker;
- Eat less fat & salt;
- Lose excess weight;
- Exercise regularly;
- Keep alcohol intake down.

It is possible to have high BP for years without knowing it, which is why it's called a 'silent killer' and is most often discovered during routine physical examinations. Remember, be proactive and make an appointment for a service visit to your GP and always have BP on your checklist for your GP to look at.

So What's Your Role?

You've taken on a committee position within a local organisation and although you're chuffed about being asked to join, you aren't really sure what you're doing. That's perfectly normal and it really is up to the club or organisation to help you find your way.

If you've landed the job of coach for the local footy team or perhaps the treasurer of the local bird watching group the title enough is to make this role a little more self explanatory. However even in these more defined roles the lines can become blurred if the committee person is inexperienced and the organisation does not have succession planning or training in place.

Being on a committee isn't just about attending meetings; it's about believing and supporting the organisation you're involved in. On the flip side of the coin an organisation shouldn't grab at people to make up numbers; they need to think about the gaps within their committee and target prospective committee members accordingly. It is important to have diversity on a committee; variances in ages, gender and life experience.

In an organisation where everyone is a volunteer the roles will stretch from executive roles through to more hands on tasks. In small towns such as Lake Grace, clubs can't afford to have members along for a free ride, they need everyone to 'do their bit'.

In the case of a committee where a manager is in place, the CRC is a good example of this, many of the tasks are carried out by staff. The committees role is more about support, strategic planning and governance. The committee aren't there to order the stationery or become involved in the general day-to-day running of the establishment; this would be micromanaging and a waste of both staff and committee members time.

Overstepping the boundaries of your role can create an unhappy environment within any organisation, nobody would (or should) want to be that person. If your job is to manage the equipment, don't rearrange the bar. If you're not happy with how something is being run don't backbite or white ant but bring the matter up in a meeting and respect those around you. Think about that email before you push send!

It's important to define the roles of everyone that is involved in an organisation; the easiest way to do this is by creating a job description. This may seem formal, but it can save a great deal of anguish in the long run. around sport, particularly in areas where clubs, recreation centres and pools provide a great hub for social connection," he said.

"Quality facilities are important as they create an opportunity for clubs, which is why the State Government has worked hard to invest and improve community facilities."

Ten projects across regional Western Australia will benefit in this round of CSRFF grants (Annual and Forward Planning Grants round), with 16 in the metropolitan area.

This latest round takes the total of grassroots sport facilities funding since 2008 to more than \$169 million, of which \$93 million has been spent in regional WA.

Nationals WA candidate for Roe Peter Rundle said that through this state-wide infrastructure program 55 per cent of the funds had been spent in the regions.

"This is a valuable investment in our community and allows people living in the regions access to quality sport and recreation facilities," Mr Rundle said.

The Department of Sport and Recreation administers CSRFF annually through two rounds of small grants (up to \$200,000 in total project cost) and one round of Annual and Forward Planning Grants (from \$200,001 in total project cost).

The State Government also provides \$10 million a year to support state sporting associations and local regional sporting associations.

have Peter Stoffberg compile our video application. We are very grateful for the countless hours Peter put into editing our video to ensure it made a lasting impression on the Holden team assessing the applications.

In the 32 years since Lake Grace Gym Club was formed (in 1984), the club has operated from various venues, including a shearing shed, a railway shed, and our home for the last 20 years, the town hall. Because this is a community facility, we need to pack up our equipment whenever the hall is booked for other functions. This is a huge undertaking, taking five adults around an hour, removing a door from its hinges, and painfully stacking all of our equipment into a 5 x 3m storeroom (the gym mats reach almost to the ceiling!). We then have to do the reverse to set it all back up! It is physically hard work, bad for volunteers backs, bad for our equipment, and a huge drain on volunteer time.

Which is why we are working towards our own venue - a shed to call our own where our equipment can remain set up all the time, and perhaps give us the opportunity to offer gymnastics for a longer season. This is a difficult task though when we also need to upgrade equipment and uniforms, pay affiliation costs, pay hall hire (beginning this year), and all the while keep gymnastics fees affordable for families.

And so, when Graham Broad and Adrian Edwards visited our club in December to present us with a cheque for \$12 000, they could not have over-estimated how much Holden's financial contribution means to our club. It might take a while, but when we finally do get our own gym shed, it will be in no small part due to the belief that the people at Holden have in the importance of sport, of communities, and of the people who give so much of themselves to both. Building Works - Progress on Lake Grace Units & Maintenance

Total Fire Ban

A Total Fire Ban is declared on days when fires are most likely to threaten lives and property. In Western Australia, Total Fire Bans are declared by the Department of Fire and Emergency Services following consultation with local governments based on a range of criteria including forecast weather provided by BOM, bushfire activity and availability of emergency resources.

In addition to prohibiting lighting any fires in the open air, a Total Fire Ban also extends to any other activities that may start a fire. It is generally issued from midnight to midnight but may be revoked if the forecast weather does not eventuate or if weather conditions ease.

Vehicle Movement Ban

Vehicle Movement Bans are issued by local governments and place an even stronger restriction on Western Power's activities. Local governments will impose the ban when their Bushfire Control Officer is concerned that the use of engines, vehicles, plant or machinery (including mobile generators) is likely to cause a fire or contribute to the spread of a bushfire. Vehicle Movement Bans may be imposed for any length of time but are generally imposed for the 'heat of the day' and may be extended or revoked by the local government should weather conditions change. A Total Fire Ban may be in place at the same time as a Vehicle Movement Ban but not necessarily.

The Fire Danger Rating is based on the weather forecast and gives you advice about the level of bushfire threat on a particular day

Bingham's foot was never located.

Caltrop is About

With recent rains Caltrop is germinating! Please be on the lookout and take action to eradicate it.

What you should know about caltrop

Caltrop (*Tribulus terrestris*) is a summer-growing weed found widely throughout Western Australia. It is most common in areas of frequent spring and after summer rain.

Under the *Local Government Act 1995* it is a prescribed **pest plant** in a number of southwest and cereal growing shires of the State. However it is not a declared plant, and there is no requirement to report it to the Department of Agriculture and Food, Western Australia.

What you should look for

Caltrop has seeds that remain dormant in the soil for probably four to five years. They germinate after summer rain. Plants grow rapidly, flowering and forming new burrs within three to five weeks.

The trailing stems of caltrop are long and wiry. They are covered with fine hairs. The stems lie prostrate on the ground, radiating from a central taproot. The leaves consist of several leaflets arranged opposite each other on the stems. The leaves are fern-like and greyish-

green. Caltrop is often confused with doublegee; however, the latter has a green leaf similar to English spinach.

The flowers are small, less than 1cm in diameter, and yellow with five petals. Wedge-shaped burrs are formed in clusters of five, each with four or more long sharp spines.

Under cropping situations the weed is of little agricultural importance as it is a summer-growing plant, which does not affect winter crops. Sheep readily eat it, but there have been a number of confirmed cases of caltrop poisoning in sheep and goats. Caltrop is a nuisance around farm buildings, townsites, railway yards, roadsides, car parks, cycle paths and other recreation areas because of the sharp spiny burrs.

A heavy infestation after summer rain can produce an abundance of spiny burrs, which make it very uncomfortable for people and animals alike.

What you can do about it

Small numbers of plants can be eliminated by hand grubbing. The plants may be placed in a bag and disposed of in a bin or they could be dried and then burnt, if permitted by local council bylaws.

How Soil Organisms Can Help Plant Species Co-Exist

Media Release - UWA

A new study of shrublands in Southwest Australia has identified how plant species can successfully coexist while competing for space and limited resources.

A team of international researchers, including Dr François Teste, Dr Michael Renton and Dr Etienne Laliberté from The University of Western Australia, found that part of the answer for high plant diversity is due to the many organisms that live in soils.

The study is the first of its kind to show that soil organisms interact with the way plants absorb nutrients which plays an important role in maintaining plant diversity in rich ecosystems.

While some organisms are harmful to roots, causing diseases or even plant death, others are beneficial and enhance nutrient uptake and protect roots against harmful microorganisms.

Infertile shrublands in semi-arid regions support 20 per cent of the world's plant species on just five per cent of the land surface, and those of Southwest Australia are some of the most species-rich of all.

By understanding the reason behind this high plant diversity, researchers can explore solutions for the conservation of species-rich ecosystems.

The study, published today in the journal *Science*, looked at the interaction between a range of shrubland plant species and the organisms around their roots to

understand how they influenced plants' long-term coexistence.

Results reveal that soil organisms helped counteract growth differences between plant species. The researchers then used simulation modelling which showed this helped long-term coexistence of diverse plant species in ecosystems such as the Southwest Australian shrublands.

The researchers selected a large number of plant species and exposed them to soil organisms collected either from the plants own species or from other species.

While some plants grew better in their 'own' soils, many others actually performed best in the soils of other species.

Lead author Dr François Teste, said the results highlight the 'unseen' interactions that occur in soil.

"These interactions can enhance our understanding of the mechanisms that maintain local plant diversity, thus better informing ecosystem conservation efforts," Dr Teste said.

"Ultimately, our study should enhance our ability to predict the way plants and ecosystems respond to global environmental change."

Beware of Scams

Coles is cautioning customers about a new email scam that offers random recipients a free \$500 gift card in exchange for a few personal details and liking its Facebook post.

The shopping chain is warning customers to ignore the fake message.

This new scam is another in a long line of email scams using major retailers' brands to 'phish' for personal details.

Woolworths, JB Hi Fi and Bunnings are just some of the stores being used as a front for fake emails.

The Coles email reads: "Congratulations! Your email address was selected! Please make sure you claim your chance to receive this \$500 Coles gift card".

Once clicked, customers are led to a social media page, asked for personal details and then to share or like its Facebook post in exchange for a gift card. If customers click any of the links they'll unsuspectingly download malicious software. Upon closer inspection, you'll also note that the unsubscribe email address is based in New York.

Coles has released a warning statement about the scam, informing customers that "These offers predominantly attempt to collect your personal details

or financial information. Coles will never request personal or banking details in unsolicited communications".

Cybersecurity experts are warning Australians not to be conned by increasingly sophisticated phishing scams such as this one from Coles and to report any such activity to Scamwatch.

Another scam doing the rounds is in relation to the shower head swap. The statement below comes from the Water Corporation.

It has come to our attention that a direct marketing company who has no connection or business relationship with the Water Corporation, has been contacting households directly by telephone offering a service where-by someone will come to the customer's home, to install the showerheads for them. This practice has been taking place in areas which include many of the towns currently eligible for the Regional Showerhead swaps and is a campaign on behalf of a Solar Panel sales and installation business, who are using a non-existent link to our Showerhead Swap programs in an attempt to generate sales leads for them. Consumer Protection are currently investigating these questionable and concerning sales approaches.
