WALSA is not prepared to pay for the required work and has offered to transfer ownership of the yards to


the Lake Grace Shire. If it is decided to retain the yards the Shire would have to carry out the work. Council will make a decision at its February meeting.

How a little Sun may fight off Cancer: Sunshine is

regularly blamed for causing fatal skin cancers, but it may help save your life if you develop a different cancer. It seems that sunlight has an over-all protective effect as it stimulates the body's production of vitamin-D, which helps to combat internal cancers, including those



of colon and prostate. "A little sun exposure is a little better for you than avoiding sunlight," says Richard Setlow of Brookhaven National laboratory in Upton, New York, who co-led the new work. "Vitamin D doesn't lower the incidence of internal cancers, but it prevents more people dying from them.

The team examined global numbers of cancer cases and survival rates, and how they varied with the intensity of sunlight at different latitudes. On balance, sunlight was found to save more lives than it takes because people in sun-drenched regions are protected from certain cancers by vitamin D- but the benefit varies with location. Survival rates from colon, prostate, lung and breast cancer are between 20 and 50 per cent higher in sunny countries near the equator, such as Australia, than in shadier northern countries such as Norway, even though the rate of cases is similar (Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences, DOI: 10.1073/pnas.0710615105). Not everyone agrees with this theory as there may be other reasons for the improved survival rates.

Questions raised over trigger for mud volcano: It was billed as one of the biggest drilling disasters in recent history. Yet now it seems we were too quick to point the finger. On 29th May 2006, a mud volcano erupted near the village of Sidoarjo on Java, Indonesia. Thousands were evacuated as boiling mud engulfed houses, factories and farmland. The blame immediately fell on Lapindo Brantas, an oil and gas company drilling just 200 metres away when the volcano started to erupt, and it was ordered to pay nearly \$500 million for the damage.

Now, 19 months on, the volcano known as Lusi is still erupting, spewing some 70 million litres per day. In early 2007, a team led by Richard Davies at Durham University in the UK suggested that Lapidindo Brantas may have been at fault (New Scientist, 2nd February, p8). The team reasoned that drilling must have pierced a limestone formation 3 kilometres below the surface. This puncture could have released a high-pressure torrent of water, which shot up through the borehole, mixing with muddy rock on its way and emerging as a slurry. A team led by Adriano Mazzini of the University of Oslo in Norway now has a different explanation.

They say the disaster was probably triggered by a magnitude 6.2 earthquake that struck two days before the eruption. From the start, Mazzini believed Davies's conclusion was circumstantial, based only the proximity of the drilling platform. When he visited Sidoarjo he found no limestone in the mud. Instead, he concludes it

contained shards of clay-rich rock called mud brecca. What's more, he found that Lusi and three other nearby mud-volcanoes lie on a major fault. "It's very typical around the world for mud volcanoes to occur along faults and to be triggered by seismic events," says Mazzini, who presented his research at the annual meeting of the American Geophysical Union in San Francisco in December 2007. Recent spikes in Lusi's eruptions appear to be linked to seismic activity, he says.

Greenhouse double whammy for some crops: As

the world warms, the plants that billions of people depend on for their food are likely to become less nutritious. That's the worrying conclusion of an analysis of more than 40 studies investigating how crops will react to increasing levels of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere. This comes on



top of the damage done as global warming leads to more floods and droughts, causing ever more crop failures in poor countries. Now it seems that even in the crops that survive, the changes in the atmosphere that affect the global climate will also cause plants to produce less protein.

Past attempts to link these changes to crop yields have produced notoriously variable results. Even small variations in growing conditions - whether a plant is located in the ground or in a pot, for example - can have a big impact. Now new techniques are starting to overcome this problem. By controlling the amounts of different gases being sprayed over crops grown in the open air, researchers are able to build up more reliable data. In an effort to further reduce the uncertainty. Daniel Taub and colleagues at Southwestern University in Georgetown, Texas, combined results from around two decades of such work. Their findings make disturbing reading. For wheat, barley, rice and potatoes, protein levels fell by 15 per cent when carbon dioxide levels were high. The change happens in part because as plants incorporate more carbon they produce carbohydrate at the expense of protein. Many people in rich nations get most of their protein from meat, but in around 30 poor nations Taub estimates that people rely on the crops he studied for around half of their dietary protein. In Bangladesh, almost 80 per cent of people's protein comes from these crops. The situation may be averted if we could raise the soil nitrogen levels, which would help the crops produce more protein according to Arnold Bloom, a plant biologist at the University of California, Davis.

Lake Grace Flood Recovery Community Package

The Shire of Lake Grace has applied to Lotterywest for a Special Initiative grant to fund a **Flood Recovery Community Package**. The package applies to thirteen existing, planned and/or flood recovery projects identified and prioritised by community groups and individuals, and Shire staff. Major projects include:

- Lake Grace Cemetery restoration and improvements
- Lake Grace Shire Visitor Centre accessible toilet, ramp, various tourist booklets/ pamphlets, signage, short term employment of local person to set up operation and train volunteers
- Street furniture and shade structures for Lake Grace town centre
- Tree Planting/Conservation/Re-vegetation of Shire gravel pits, Lake Grace townsite remnants and re-vegetated areas

The LotteryWest Board is now assessing the application.

Drought Proofing the Shire

Council staff and community members continue to work to complete dams at Magenta, South-east Newdegate, Dunn Rock, Varley and Mount Madden.

Finding Water

Shire staff had an interesting visit from a Zimbabwean geologist/water diviner this month. Mr Byrne, who was visiting friends in Lake Grace, kindly showed staff a site north of the hockey oval where he had located water. Mr Byrne wet his hands with fresh water and used a Y-shaped dowsing stick to locate the site, which he said had eight geological fractures at different depths, ranging from 15 to 46 metres. He estimated an output of 4500 litres per hour at a depth of around 36 metres. The Shire is currently investigating drilling at that location.

Standpipe Users — All Rural Land Owners

A reminder that the standpipes throughout the Shire of Lake Grace are run on a user pays basis.



There are books at each standpipe where users can record the litres taken. These will be collected on a quarterly basis and accounts will be sent out. Please inform the Shire office if the recording books are missing or full.

Please write your trading name and address clearly, so accounts are not sent to the wrong person.

It seems that in the past this system has been abused by a few users which increases the cost to the honest people who do record their usage.

Any farmers who employ seasonal workers, please remember to inform them of the recording requirements if they are collecting water for you. If you are carting for someone else, please use the billing name of the person who is paying for the water, not the name of the company carting.

Housing Update



The Shire's Housing programme continues with the construction of two 3-bedroom, 2bathroom houses. Building of the houses, in Bennett Street, Lake Grace and Maley Street, Newdegate, is due to commence in February and completed in June.

The houses are funded by a \$100,000 Country Housing Authority grant, with Council contributing \$150,000 to each house. The project aims to help attract and retain trades-people to the district.

Men's Shed Proposal - Memory Jogger

The Lions Club of Lake Grace placed a notice in the Lakes Link on the 8th November last year advising all and sundry that it was investigating the possibility of constructing a "Men's Shed" in Lake Grace. A small committee was formed to undertake some preliminary research which included a visit to the recently constructed Men's Shed in Darkan.

The Darkan shed and equipment was funded entirely from grants, with the Shire providing the land, insurance and some "in kind" works that were costed at around \$20,000.00.

A Men's Shed is "primarily" built for use by men but in reality it would be usable by the community at large, including children under supervision. There are large numbers of Men's Sheds in the Eastern States and they are now starting to appear in WA. The basic theme behind a Men's Shed is to promote men's health, both physically and mentally and to provide a venue with a non threatening atmosphere for productive and social interaction between them.

The Lions have consulted with the Shire in regard to prospective sites that could be appropriate for such a building.

In the earlier notice it was advised that a public meeting

would be held early in 2008 to gauge what the level of community interest is in supporting this proposal. Should there be sufficient interest, it is envisaged that a steering committee be established to move the proposal into the planning stage.

It is now advised the meeting will be held on Thursday evening the 21st February at the Fire Brigade shed in Bennett St. (Opposite the Town Hall), commencing at 7.30pm.

Everyone is welcome to attend - both genders. Come along and have your say or just to find out what it's all about. Attendance and support (or otherwise) will be the main governing factor as to whether the proposal proceeds any further.

THE STORYTRAIL

Do you have a story to tell about the Main Street? Did or do you operate a business or live there? Can you remember people who did?

I am collecting stories about individual locations and businesses for a main street history trail. The StoryTrail project will show how the town evolved and how the significance and use of individual buildings have changed. It will cover Stubbs Street from the Shire Offices to Retravision and from Neu-Tech to the Visitor Bay/Shed. The first phase will see a series of pavers installed in the footpath adjacent to eighteen locations. It is also proposed to place signage with historical photographs at nine locations, and in the final stage, public artworks at six key places.

As the name suggests, the theme of the project is story. It is important that the project history be told by he community and in our words, rather than be a dry list of information and dates. Our community has a strong oral history tradition - funny, sad, eventful – however much is not recorded. Remember that history is not all about old times; it is about anything that happened up to the present day.

Do you remember the night the Co-op burnt down? How the old men would sit on the Post Office bench and talk? That Friday was farmers' shopping day which meant dressing up (hats and gloves for the women)? What could you buy with your pocket money? What was on the Top Café menu? What buildings were on the main street lots that are now vacant?



If you have friends or family who could help, please let them know. This is also a good opportunity to record and collect history for the Lake Grace 100 Years celebrations in 2011.

The subject matter is left entirely up to you, abstract, realistic, pattern, design or texture work is suitable, whatever interests you at the moment.

So basically that means it's a green square with a red line running through it somewhere, starting on one side and ending on the other. The line can be wiggly or straight or thick or thin, many or a singular line but it has to start ½ a cm wide and end ½ a cm wide where it runs off each side of the canvas. You can incorporate the line into your design, disguise it or lay it on top, in fact any way you can think of.

The green can be any colour green on the background or a range of greens and add black or white to it as well for tonal values, but the red we would like you to use is warm red - have a look at the chromacryl paints at the Plaza. You are not limited to just painting on it, some people are stitching or covering their 45cm square in fabric, knitting, crocheting, mosaics or clay or whatever they like to do. NIGHT





Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight, from midnight Friday 1st February to midnight Friday 15th February. Astronomy is looking up. Never look at the Sun without the proper solar filters and preferably one that fits over the skyward end as your eyes can easily and quickly damaged beyond repair. All times are daylight saving. Our local star the Sun, resides in the constellation of Capricorn this fortnight giving of light at magnitude - 26.72 which takes eight and a half minutes to reach the Earth. Morning twilight starts at 5am on Saturday morning 2nd and at 5:15am on Friday 15th. Evening twilight finishes at 9:39pm on February 2nd and at 9:25pm on 15th.

The **MOON** on Saturday morning will be 0.6° south of the red supergiant star Antares in the constellation of Scorpius. The new Moon will be at 1pm on Thursday 7th in Capricornus. On Thursday 14th in Aries at 10am, the Moon will be at <u>Perigee</u> (closest) from Earth at 370,000 kilometres, and at 1pm will be at the 1st quarter phase.

MERCURY in the constellation of Aquarius is slowly sinking back towards the Sun until it rises in the morning twilight on the 18th.

VENUS in the constellation of Sagittarius at a bright -3.8 magnitude, rises at 4:04am just behind Jupiter.

On Monday 4th Venus and Jupiter close together will be 4 degrees north of the Moon. Venus rises at 4:26am on Friday 15th.

The red coloured planet **MARS** in the constellation of Taurus, shines brightly in the evening night sky at magnitude -0.4 at 30° in the North to North West at 9:30pm and will set on Sunday morning at 2:41am. Mars will be in the evening sky all this fortnight and is good viewing for telescopes.

JUPITER the giant gas planet shining at magnitude -1.9 rises at 4:01am Saturday morning and is very close to Venus which is the brighter one. On Monday 4th Jupiter will be 4° north of the Moon very close to Venus. On Friday 15th still in Sagittarius, Jupiter rises at 3:22am at magnitude -2.0.

The ringed planet SATURN in the constellation of Leo

at magnitude +0.3 rises at 9:20pm on Saturday.

SATURN rises at 8:26pm on Friday 15th and is very nice viewing in binoculars and telescopes as the rings and some moons can be seen.

The two distant gas planets of Uranus and Neptune are in the glare of the Sun and are not in view.

METEORS: at 5 per hour may be viewed during the morning sky near the bright yellow star Alpha Centauri which is the second and brightest star pointing towards the constellation of Crux (southern cross) on Friday 8th.

COMETS: There are 3 comets in the night sky, Comet 8p/Tuttle in the constellation of Eridanus the river at magnitude +7.2 (binoculars or telescope). Comet C 2006 Q1 McNaught in the constellation of Vela the sails at magnitude +12.1 (telescopes only), and there is Comet 46P/ Wirtanen in the constellation of Pisces at magnitude +8.9 (big binoculars or telescope). Ring for information if wanted.

For the best results for viewing the night sky, find the darkest spot available away from lights. Give your eyes at least 10 minutes to adapt to the darkness and use a green or red led light to see with if needed. Just one flash of white light will ruin your night vision. When viewing the sky with binoculars you will find they shake, this is caused by your heartbeat. Resting on something or an adapted camera tripod is best.

During all nights there are always some meteors around as well as satellites and the International Space Station as well now and again and is a fairly light object and can be viewed with a telescope if you aim it in front of the light. Planes and satellites can be viewed this way as well but remember that the more powerful the magnification you are using, the faster the object you are viewing seems to move.

For any information required on the Sun, Moon, Stars, Planets or other information please ring. Viewing is held at my home free of charge day or night.

CDMA/Next G Switch - Your Feedback Please

The Federal Government has postponed the closure of the CDMA network because the Next G network is judged to be not equivalent to the CDMA network. An Australian Communications and Media Authority report found Next G's coverage using external aerials was equivalent to CDMA's, but not for some handsets.

We are asking community members for feedback regarding poor signals and black spots when using the new NextG network.

Specifically, we are interested in:

- areas with no coverage at all; and,
- areas where CDMA coverage was effective, but NextG coverage is not effective

We can provide a map for you to record these.

The information we require **must** be quite specific. Typically, we will require:

- Your name:
- Details of the problem (e.g. no signal, call dropouts, etc)
- A street or road name of the area in question; and,
- A location, lot or street number (if known)

Sarah Allen - Winner

Sarah Allen is an enthusiastic community member, artist and writer who has created an electronic community news and information service that can be accessed by all Shire of Lake Grace communities.

In 2007, Sarah initiated The Community Stix, a weekly community e-news to keep people informed about community activities including art and culture, events entertainment, sport, recreation, landcare, workshops, public information, support and opportunities. Local people can subscribe to Community Stix and also promote their event and group's activities or ask for assistance. Sarah continues to manage the service that she distributes weekly to subscribers throughout the shire and district.

Sarah is also an active member of Lake Grace Artists' Group, involved in art workshops and exhibitions. She designed the Group's logo and helps to promote its events.

Sarah has worked from home, continuing her journalism/writing career while helping her husband to run their Tarin Rock farm.

Sarah is participating in the Young Women's Leadership and Mentoring Pilot Program hosted by Wheatbelt Area Consultancy Committee.

Lake Grace Tourism Promotion Group - Nominee

Lake Grace Tourism Promotion Group actively promotes the Lake Grace Shire through the operation of the Lake Grace Visitor Information Centre.

The group dedicates numerous volunteer hours to promoting regional attractions and events, and selling local produce (including craft, books, art, food, photography). Volunteers direct visitors to tourist attractions, businesses and services in our town, shire and region. They also keep visitation records that are valuable resources for other projects.

The Visitor Information Centre houses the Lake Grace herbarium (a room of local plants/wildflower samples and information).

Many of the group members helped to restore the formers Stationmaster's House and they now maintain the building and grounds, holding regular busy bees. The group hosts a market day biannually and this is becoming a significant and popular local event. The restoration of the building, along with the development of the Lake Grace Multi-Artspace, has improved the appearance and ambience of the main street, attracting visitors and locals to our town centre.

The group is a sub-committee of the Lake Grace Development Association that, in 2003, won the *Ninth Annual Community Service Industry Award winner* for 'strengthening rural and remote communities' for projects including the restoration of the Stationmaster's House. This is a statewide award.

Gone But Not Forgotten - Winner

'Gone but not Forgotten' was a free community event that celebrated the history of the Beenong and Burngup localities of the Lake Grace Shire.

This was an open invitation event that encouraged the extended families and families of people who lived in the Beenong/Burngup area to return for a plaque unveiling ceremony and reunion luncheon. One hundred and four formal invitations were sent out for the event and over 200 people attended the day.

'Gone but not Forgotten' was held on Saturday 24th March 2007 commencing at the site of the old Beenong Cricket Ground. Here people reminisced about cricket matches now long gone, and tennis matches held at the adjacent tennis courts. An old cricket ball appeared and a couple of overs were bowled on the old concrete pitch.

At 11am the formalities began with Mr Ross Chappell as the Master of Ceremonies. The plaque commemorating the site of the Beenong Cricket Ground was unveiled by Mr Bruce Duckworth, a Life Member of the North Lake Grace Cricket Club which was the successor club to the Beenong cricket Club.

The day then progressed to the site of the Beenong Siding and Wheat Bin. At this site two plaques were unveiled, one to commemorate the life of the bin itself, and a directional plaque that indicated where different structures were once located at the site. The history of

the site was outlined by Mr Eddy Duckworth and the plaques were unveiled by Mr Alexander (Jim) Milton.

It was at this site that an unexpected treat added to the ambience of the day. A grain train came along the track just minutes after the unveiling. The event organizers had notified the rail authority of the event taking place, and the train driver was only too pleased to announce his arrival with the train horn.

Once again it was back into the vehicles and the crowd then went to the site of the Burngup siding and wheat bin. Again people heard a brief history of the site, and watched Mr Donald Chappell unveil the plaques for this site. Again there were two plaques, one providing information about the siding and one directional plaque indicating where structures were located.

The crowd then proceeded to the property of Terry and Leigh Hardy (Greenstone) where a reunion luncheon had been prepared.

Over 200 people attended the barbeque luncheon of steaks and salads whilst enjoying some ales between old friends.

In the true spirit of the day Terry and Leigh Hardy presented their property beautifully, from the lovely green grass and the shady trees to the tents for shade and the refreshing bar facilities. The lovely house garden area was adorned by three vintage cars, a 1929 Willys Whippett ute, and a 1963 XL Ford Falcon ute

owned by Ron Boulton and a 1926 Willys Overland Tourer owned by Graham and Amanda Milton. Murray and Julie Hardy donated the use of the portable ensuites, cool room, bar tapware and much more, whilst Ross Chappell was ever ready with a loader or machinery to make the event a success.

During the day poems were read, stories were told and many a laugh was had. Many people who attended were sincerely grateful for the opportunity to attend and catch up with many old friends. The organisation of the day made the event a resounding success.

A commemorative plaque for the day has since been made to mark the event and will be placed with the two existing plaques at the Beenong Siding. The commemorative artwork of the wool bale brands and or sheep/cattle brands on large hessian canvases to celebrate the occasion was also completed on the day and the week following the event.

It is with pleasure that I submit to 'Gone but not Forgotten' for the Premiers Australia Day Active Citizenship Award for a community group or event.
