Visitors Centre Officially Open

Lake Grace has a new Visitor Centre and what must be a tireless army of volunteers. On Saturday October 22, Lake Grace Development Association hosted a day of celebration for the official opening of the Lake Grace Shire Visitor Centre and completion of the town clock. Lake Grace Development Association chairperson Debrah Clarke and Lake Grace Shire President Darcy Roberts spoke of the significant contributions volunteers give to our community. Mrs Mary Nenke of Cambinata Yabbies followed with an inspiring speech about the spirit that links our towns and region, and cut the ribbon to declare the Visitor Centre open.

Both the Visitor Centre and clock are testament to the major roles volunteers play in Lake Grace. In 2001, Lake Grace Development Association decided to bring together a number of its main street initiatives as the Town Centre Development Project. The project included the restoration of the former Stationmaster's House, *On The Sheep's Back* Public Art project, a landscaping plan for the Main Street, a Tourism Development and Marketing Strategy and the Town Clock.

The project, with Shire of Lake Grace collaboration, has transformed the appearance of Lake Grace and was key to the Development Association winning the Ninth Annual Community Service Industry Award for 'strengthening rural and remote communities' in 2003.

The historic Stationmaster's House was saved from demolition by an enthusiastic and dedicated subgroup of LGDA, the Stationmaster's House Action Group. In late 2000 Westrail began divesting its properties in Lake Grace and Lake Grace Shire Council sought expressions of interest "from local community groups wanting to redevelop the Station

Master's House". Westrail proposed to demolish the building 'due to its poor state of repair' and Council estimated the cost of repairs at \$40,000.

Not all were in favour of keeping the building. The 'burn it' and 'bulldoze it and bituminise' views were put forward; Council was advised to support the demolition of the House and request that the vacant land be transferred to the Shire of Lake Grace. The

Lake Grace Businesses Change Hands

Lake Grace is currently witnessing a commercial reshuffle with new owners taking over businesses and old premises being revived.

Lake Grace Rural became a Farmworks branch in July this year. Previously owned by Lynn and Anne Parker, the business has undergone various transformations and seen numerous employees since 1982. Lynn and Anne opened the Lake Grace Gas Centre in one of Fred Slarke's buildings (now a vacant block) in Stubbs Street. They sold gas stoves and hot water systems, welding equipment and music cassettes, rented videos and were an agent for BOC and LP gas. The business soon grew too large for the premises however, so they moved next door to what is now Rosie's Coffee Shop, only to find they needed both premises. They diversified into rural merchandise and moved to the present site in 1994 as Lake Grace Rural, taking up three blocks. Considering themselves too young to retire, Lynn and Anne Parker brought CCL Thrifty Link in 2000 and now specialize in hardware and gardening supplies.

Branch Manager Athol Kennedy and administration/accounts clerk Debbie O'Neill remain at Farmworks, joined by new merchandise sales staff Peter Stoffberg and Ashley Peczka. For Athol, a farmer's son from North Lake Grace who began as sales/store-person in 1994, the business will remain a long-term commitment. "We intend to stay here for a long time and will continue to be a one-stop farm shop and deliver our high standard of service."

Farmworks, with branches and agencies throughout the state, is a West Australian owned company based in Osborne Park. The Lake Grace branch will expand its role to include buying and selling livestock and also offer farm finance.

Kate Dowling-Burbridge (below) begins her new life as owner/manager of Sand 'n' Salt with a Melbourne Cup fashion parade of the latest summer fashions. In at the deep end! Former school principal and teacher, Kate is passionate about Lake Grace and says she will continue to provide the Lake Grace district with the great Sand 'n' Salt service. "It's a vibrant place and

because of the town and people, the business opportunity was too good to refuse."

Outgoing owner Tania Spencer started the store in 1993 as Country Style in the old bakery shop in Bennett Street. After moving to the former Wesfarmers building in Stubbs Street during the mid 1990s, Tania soon included children's wear.

Like many local business people, Tania has experienced the ups and downs of the agricultural crises over the last decade. "A lot of businesses had put their faith in the town, and renovated and developed their premises, to be hit by the effects of the drought." So the move across the street to Lake Grace Plaza complex in 2001 could have been a gamble. Using a local builder, Tania outfitted the shop, employed local graphics artist Melissa Cugley to design new signage and the signature mural on the streetscape, and relaunched her clothing store as Sand 'n' Salt.

The main street will be the work place of Lake Grace Cabinet Maker Nick Trevenen, who has moved his business into town. Nick's son Marcus will complete an apprenticeship with Nick, who will continue to make robes, vanities, and kitchen and office cupboards. They will also sell a small selection of furniture in the showroom. Nick previously worked at a workshop at his home and has more than twenty years' experience. "Tradesmen in the country need to be versatile – you can not survive on one thing".

The move will make good use of what has come to be known as the 'Pink Barn', and yes, in time the building will receive a facelift.

Diversifying is also the secret to the success behind Pam and Kim Lannin's gourmet food line Sophisticake. The Lannins were recently selected and sponsored to show their Sophisticake produce at the inaugural Fine Food and Beverage Trade Fair and Awards. Over three days, thousands of international guests attended the event at the Perth Convention Centre and tasted the Sophisticake range of cakes, desserts and edible gifts. "We picked up clients all over Australia and are presently negotiating with importers from Singapore and Dubai," said Pam.

Pam and Kim began producing edible gifts in their home kitchen in August 2004, while running Darean Farm Bed and Breakfast. Kim was farming and Pam had retired as a teacher (beginning in Home Economics), and made cakes for special events. Demand soon meant Pam and Kim were involved full-time however, and they now employ three people. The Sophisticake team is now busy baking to keep up with orders, including Christmas cakes for West Australian restaurants.


YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL

Happy Chooks = Better Eggs

We all know that a battery hen's life is not a happy one, but suffice to say we keep that knowledge in the dusty recesses of our brain as we put the carton of eggs in the trolley on shop day.

However, we as consumers, can now shop guilt free - as far as the eggs go anyway - with Lake Grace Plaza now stocking free range eggs. Not only are they free range but they're locally laid!

Lyn Smith, proprietor of Chooks Everywhere, has reared pullets for 21 years and recognised the natural opportunity to expand into free range eggs. Lyn became aware 12 months ago of the impending deregulation of the Egg Industry, but seasonal conditions delayed her plans.

Lyn's show bird pets were sold and the numerous yards have been stocked with egg laying hens. The 150 hens in residence, live in veritable luxury. Penned in lots of 10-12 to prevent overcrowding, disease and to keep the pecking order problems to a minimum, the hens look forward to a diet of home grown grains, a dirt bath whenever the feeling takes hold and scratching in the wide open spaces. On alternate days hens have the opportunity to leave their yard and roam their surrounds.

"During the drought, greenery yards were introduced and these will be doubled to access all girls to a healthy green pick during dry spells. This is important for the yolk, and taste of the egg", said Lyn. Lyn takes great pride in offering a home grown product and is quite thrilled with the packaging. Local artists Maureen Jenks, then Melissa Cugley, developed all Lyn's stationery over the years. "In this product label Melissa has excelled herself", says Lyn, "I just adore it".

In an economic environment such as ours, where the rights of animals cannot compete against the cost of production, it is refreshing to know that our local consumers have the opportunity to support a local

industry that is compassionate about the welfare of its 'workers'. With new laws in several European countries banning battery hen farms, Australian producers are facing reality that these bans may eventually extend down under.

For a hen destined to a battery existence, life is not so pleasant. Destined to live in a cage until around 72 weeks of age - when productivity decreases and there is a rise in age-related disease - hens are subjected to beak clipping, limited room to move and extended hours of artificial light. When their time is up they're taken away, slaughtered and processed for pet food.

With 150 hens giving their all, Lyn expects to be able to maintain a supply of 75 dozen eggs per week to her customers. 'Eggs Everywhere' has the ability to be able to house up to 200 egg layers, which would bring production up to 100 dozen - however, Lyn can not see a need for her business to extend beyond these production limits.

\$3.99 is a small price to pay to support both local business and our feathered friends. On top of the feel good effect, your cooking will look and taste better - which for some of us is nothing short of a miracle!

SHIRE OF LAKE GRACE RECEIVES FUNDING FOR LOCAL PHYSICAL ACTIVITY PROJECT

The Shire of Lake Grace has recently been awarded \$7000 funding for a new project "**Active Mum's**". It is one of 17 physical activity projects around the State that Premier Geoff Gallop recently announced under the Physical Activity Taskforce's Local Activity Grants Program. The Shire of Lake Grace will match the funding.

The State Government, through a Lotterywest grant has provided \$218,808 in the second round of funding for the projects, which are coordinated by Local Government.

Shire President Darcy Roberts said the Local Activity Grants Program was aimed at encouraging communities to become more physically active.

"We are very excited about receiving this Local Activity Grant funding to support our Active Mums project," said Councilor Roberts. "Everyone needs to find 30 minutes a day to be active for health benefit and this project will help make it easier for our community to be active."

The program is for mothers of new born to pre school age children which will encourage social interaction, physical activity, self confidence, assistance in weight management and lifestyle change.

The program will focus on promoting and supporting participation by this particular high risk group through education, motivation, easy and conventional ways for women of this sector to join in developing a healthy lifestyle.

The environment created will be family friendly, non-intimidating and will cater for mums to exercise with their children present. The program will be designed to encourage easy accessibility, flexibility, variety and affordability.

Local Activity Grants form part of the Premier's Physical Activity Taskforce's target to increase the proportion of Western Australians who undertake sufficient physical activity to gain a health benefit by five per cent (from 58 to 63 percent) by 2011.

The Physical Activity Taskforce Local Activity Grants program is jointly administered by the premier's Physical Activity Taskforce and the WA Local Government Association.

Councilor Roberts said that developing and implementing physical activity strategies required a multi agency approach.

"If community groups and Local Government work together with the assistance of the State Government we can succeed in encouraging people to be more active," he said.

"Together we can develop new physical activity programs and build on facilities and resources which already exist in local communities."

The fifth round of funding under the Local Activity Grants program will open in March 2006.

Our local star, the Sun, at magnitude -26.72 resides this fortnight in the Constellation of Libra and spends from 12 hours to 12 hours 2 minutes crossing from East to West, and from morning to evening.

The first quarter Moon will be at 9:47am on Wednesday 9th. On Thursday 10th at 8am, the Moon will be at <u>Perigee</u> (closest), at 370,010 kms from Earth. The Full Moon will be at 8:47am on Wednesday 16th. The MOON will be in Scorpius on 5th, Sagittarius on 6th, 7th and 8th, Capricornus on 9th, Ophiuchus on 10th, Aquarius on 11th and 12th, Pisces on 13th and 14th, Aries on 15th and 16th, Taurus on 17th and 18th.

Mercury in the Constellation of Scorpius, on Saturday, sets at 8:32pm, shining at magnitude -0.3. On Tuesday 8th, Mercury will have moved into the Constellation of Ophiuchus, and sets on Friday 18th at 8:27pm, shining at magnitude +0.1.

The very bright sister planet Venus, reflecting sunshine at magnitude -4.3, residing in Sagittarius, sets at 10:26pm on Saturday evening and is 1.4° (thumb at arms length), north of the Moon on Sunday evening. On Friday evening 18th, VENUS sets at 10:27pm at magnitude -4.5, 0.2 degrees south/west of the blue star Sigma in the handle of the teapot.

Moving through the sky from sunset to sunrise in Aries, Mars, shines at magnitude -2.4. On Monday 7th at 4pm, Mars, will be at opposition, opposite side of the Sun to the Earth. On Tuesday 15th, Mars, will be 3° (two fingers at arms length), south of the Moon, and sets at 4:18am on Friday 18th.

The giant gas planet, Jupiter, in Virgo, rises in the early morning twilight on Saturday at 4:40am, shining at magnitude -1.7. JUPITER rises at 3:57am on Friday morning 18th.

Saturn, the ringed planet in Cancer, shining at

magnitude +0.2, rises on Saturday morning at 12:49am, and rises at 11:58pm on Friday 18th.

LAKES LINK NEWS

The blue/green planet, Uranus, sets on Saturday morning at 2:13am in Aquarius, shines at magnitude +5.8. URANUS, on Thursday 10th, will be 3° (two fingers at arms length), north of the Moon.

On Friday 18th, Uranus, sets at 1:22am.

The grey/green planet, Neptune, sets at 1:15am on Saturday morning and shines at magnitude +7.9 in Capricornus. On Wednesday 9th, Neptune, will be 5° (three fingers at arms length) north of the Moon. On Friday 18th, Neptune, sets at 12:15am.

The small distant planet Pluto, in the Constellation of Serpens Caput, sets on Saturday at 9:17pm and on Friday 18th at 8:32pm, reflects sunlight at magnitude +14:0 and a large telescope and dark site needed.

Meteors, can be seen in Taurus on Saturday morning and also on Saturday morning 12th. The Leonard Meteor shower of up to 1000 per hour, is on Thursday morning 17th, if they happen at the right time.

On Sunday 13th at 9pm, the smallest of the 88 Constellations, the Southern Cross (Crux) will be due south and below the horizon.

Saturn's Spokes - First spotted in Voyager images 25 years ago, Saturn's mysterious ring "spokes" are back. The Cassini spacecraft has recently imaged some of these spokes in the planet's B ring, covering an area roughly 3,500 by 100 kilometres. The spokes are strange, inconstant patches that sometimes appear running across parts of Saturn's rings. When looked at from one side of the rings they appear light; from the other side they look dark.

Stationmaster's House Action Group and supporters however, could see the potential of the building and recognized its heritage significance.

Volunteers and people such as Lynne Stewart and their great passion for the project has been the key to its success, said Project Coordinator Michelle Slarke. "Lynne brought her renovating skills, ability to organise, and a team of very skilled people with equal passion."

Mrs Stewart, with Project Coordinators Jeanette Bennett and Michelle Slarke, was backed up by a substantial number of volunteers who gave their time at numerous working bees – scraping, painting, repairing, digging, removing, alterations and rebuilding. Local contractors gave their services at a reduced rate and also joined the volunteer force.

The group secured almost \$40,000 in funding through grants from Lotterywest and Department of Family and Community Services grants, and was pleased to achieve its aim of spending the majority of the funds locally.

The Town clock is Lake Grace Development Association's gift to, and acknowledgment of, community volunteers such as these. In 2001, Jill Duckworth and Debby Clark suggested that Lake Grace Development Association construct a town clock for the International Year of Volunteers. They then secured

funding from International Year of Volunteers/ Department of Family and Community Services and Community Arts Network WA.

Lake Grace Engineering built the clock tower. The mosaic, which reflects the line and colours of our salt lakes, was designed by Kerrie Argent and created by Phyllis Dunham and community members. The signage reads "A Lake Grace Development Association initiative to honour the many hours contributed by community volunteers".

Recent Statistics about Volunteers in Australia

- There is a clear upward trend in volunteering rates in Australia and volunteers can be found in all areas of the community - from arts to welfare, sports, health, schools, the environment and more.
- By 2002, more than a third of all Australians volunteered through an organisation over the year. 4.4 million Australian adults volunteer each year (32% of the population). There are 700,000 non-profit organisations in Australia, many dependant on volunteers.
- According to the 1997 Australian time-use survey, the hours purported to be spent on informal volunteering is nearly three times as large as formal organised volunteering.

- Australian volunteers donated 510 million hours to community organisations in 1997. By 2000 this had risen to 704 million hours per year. Almost 429,000 Western Australians, around onethird of the population are volunteers and they contribute over 70 million hours a year, worth an estimated \$800 million dollars.
- When the value of volunteer work is added to the contribution made by the non-profit sector (3.3% of GDP) our national economy is \$29.7 billion dollars better off (4.7%) a contribution larger than the mining or agriculture industries.
- 33% of women living in Australia volunteer compared to 31% of men. Rural Western Australian recorded the highest volunteering rate in Australia with 45% of the population involved in volunteering.
- Almost half (48%) of all Western Australian volunteers had been volunteering for more than 10 years.
- In both 1995 and 2000 the most common reason West Australians gave for being a volunteer was to 'help others/community' (49% in 2000 and 41% in 1995). The next most common reason was 'personal satisfaction' (41%).

Lake Grace a has an estimated 60 formal volunteer organizations. More than forty volunteers were involved with the restoration of Stationmaster's House and volunteers continue to be involved in its maintenance and operations.

VP Day Archives

To many of our senior residents, James Lyall was a person they well remember, having worked in the local Co-op before enlisting in the Air Force. He was popularly known as Jim or Jimmy and he and his wife Lill used to live in the house opposite the Methodist Church, (now Uniting), and Lill believes he was the second of our local men to go away on active service. Sergeant James Lyall was awarded a rare Air Force Medal, (only six having been awarded), and his wife has kindly sent a copy of **his citation** for the Lakes Link. Mrs Lyall said that while they were in England in 1973, they saw an advertisement in the paper, wanting to buy a medal such as James's owing to its rarity, and she still has the cutting.

No.16638 Sergeant LYALL, James Smith, Fitter 11E, No. 1 Aircraft Depot, LAVERTON, Vic.

Sergeant Lyall enlisted in the Citizen Air Force on 30th May, 1940 as a technical trainee. After completing his recruit course, he was posted to a school of Technical Training and, subsequently, to No.1 Engineering School, where he underwent a fitter course. On completion of his fitter course, he was remustered as a FITTER 11A and, on 10th February, 1942, was posted for duty at No.1 Aircraft Depot where he rendered faithful and efficient service, and was subsequently promoted to the rank of Sergeant.

In August, 1941, Sergeant LYALL in the ordinary course of his duty, was detailed as a member of an Anson aircraft crew on a ferry flight from LAVERTON to GERALDTON, Western Australia. After taking off from FORREST, in the course of this flight, Sergeant LYALL was instructed by the captain of the aircraft to wind up the undercarriage. When promptly executing this order and with the gear approximately half wound, the winding handle suddenly became slack and then Upon examination, Sergeant LYALL iammed. discovered that the intermediate shaft on the starboard side had snapped inside the sprocket socket leaving both landing wheels immovable in half raised position. Sergeant LYALL thereupon removed a link of the primary chain and wound down the starboard leg inch by inch by pulling on the secondary chain with wire loops improvised to effect a grip. Upon endeavouring to wind down the port leg in a similar fashion. Sergeant LYALL found that the loose end of the broken chain had slid back and was jamming the landing gear. In these circumstances it became necessary for him to make a hole in the floor of the cockpit in order to free the This he successfully completed and jammed chain. then wound down the winding gear.

The time occupied in effecting this repair in the air was approximately 90 minutes and, during most of the time, Sgt. LYALL was forced to lie in a prone position with both arms and his head partly in the fairing. As the flight at the time was made in extremely bumpy conditions, which are always likely to be encountered in that part of the Commonwealth, the prevailing conditions considerably accentuated the difficulties with

which Sqt. LYALL had to contend. By his resources and ingenuity under extremely trying conditions, Sergeant LYALL undertook and completed successfully task by which a probable crash was happily averted. Sergeant LYALL'S skill as a fitter and the devotion to duty displayed by him whilst flying have been of great value i n



sustaining the keenness and morale of his fellow airmen.

CANBERRA, June 10. – His Excellency the Governor-General (Lord Gowrie) has received advice that His Majesty the King has been pleased to confer the following Commonwealth birthday honours:

Air Force Medals: No 16638 Cpl James Smith Lyall,

[This is how the Newspaper of June 10, 1942 announced the honours — Cpl James Smith Lyall, RAAF, was the last listed of 26 other honours. Though it is not stated in the citation, Mrs Lyall told how it was necessary for crew to be holding James by the ankles for the 90 minutes while he was effecting repairs, with his body partly suspended outside of the plane. Mrs Lyall has also sent a description of the Air Force Medal. In 1947 the Lyalls left Lake Grace for Tambellup to manage the Co-op. They made other moves to Bunbury, then Katanning, before Mrs Lyall returned to Tambellup where her daughter lives. We thank her for obliging us with the citation and photo of James and further information!]

AIR FORCE MEDAL

Description. – The Air Force Medal shall be silver and oval-shaped bearing the Effigy of the Sovereign on the obverse and on the reverse within a wreath of laurel the date 1918 and a representation of Hermes mounted on a hawk in flight bestowing a wreath. The whole ensigned by a bomb attached to the clasp and ribbon by two wings.

Ribbon. – The Air Force Medal shall be worn on the left breast pendant from a ribbon one inch and a quarter in width which shall be in color red and white in alternate diagonal stripes of one sixteenth of an inch in width running at an angle of 45degrees downwards towards the wearer's left.

Abbreviated Title. – The award of the Air Force Medal shall entitle the recipient to have the initials A.F.M. appended to his name.

THE WAR BRIDES SHIP.

Following the VP Day story of the last issue, are some items of interest about the War Bride Ship. It was one of Britains most famous fighting ships, the air craft carrier, HMS VICTORIOUS that took the Australian War Brides to England. The huge hangar had been converted to sleeping compartments for 750, complete with a mess hall (dining area), and lounge, work which had been completed by West Australian workmen. In further conversions for comfort convenience were made, such as a completely equipped beauty parlour, and on the flight deck, two swimming pools, an ice cream and soda fountain and another lounge. Special fans and lights were fitted for use in the tropics. There was also a cinema and internal broadcasting system, as well as a hospital staff of doctors and a dentist.

The VICTORIOUS sailed from Sydney to Fremantle on the first part of the journey, with 605 War Brides on board, and they experienced "mountainous seas" across the Great Australian Bight, so much so that it delayed her arrival, which then delayed her scheduled departure to the following day. At Fremantle a further 50 War Brides had assembled, including Doreen Buckland (Lynnette Zweck's mother), who then had to wait around all day for their ship to come.

By the time the VICTORIOUS berthed, the West Australian contingent were very weary and anxious only to get on board and settle in, whilst those on board were anxious to come ashore, due to the roughness of the passage, and many were seen "giving loving pats to the firm earth as they stepped ashore". A most noticeable thing about them was their extreme youth, the youngest being 15½ years, while most were younger than 21 years. Another was a bride of 1½ hours before her husband sailed, and she had not seen him for eight months.

For Doreen Buckland, it was not the "fairytale family farewell" one could envisage, as it was their kind neighbour who drove her and her mother to Fremantle,

her parents having never owned a car. For many it was a Ionely farewell, due to the delayed departure. and Doreen's mother was only able to see her to her cabin. However, paper the did record "To Mrs Buckland the trip to England is a return to her homeland. although she left London as a child month old baby] 20 years ago. Now it is to London she is returning".

A large crowd assembled at Plymouth to meet the War Brides, though for Doreen her husband had to be given special dispensation from the hospital, where he had been suffering a bad bout of tonsillitis.

The paper wrote, "Hundreds of relatives crowded the docks early today and as the first of the parties of brides went ashore they were smothered with affectionate kisses by husbands and relatives". On the flight deck, the Lord Mayor of Plymouth addressed the brides, and in part said, "....Their coming to Britain would strengthen the ties of friendship still further and they would find a hearty welcome throughout the country".

On the voyage, one bride was widowed, having received the news at Aden after passing through the Suez Canal, that her husband was "reported missing after taking off in a Spitfire". Another two brides wanted to return to Australia, one having a change of mind and the other stating that her mother was ill, though they did talk the matter over with their husbands. The fare to England for the War Brides was 5 pounds! In England, living at that time was very difficult, said to have been worse than during the War, as England was obliged to share her food with both Germany and Poland.

In May of 1948, Al and Doreen Buckland with 11 month old baby Lynnette returned to Perth aboard the Asturius. Of interest is that on board as a 7 or 8 year old boy, was the "to become" well known quiz master of "Sale of the Century", Tony Barber. Though he was not identified at the time, it is believed he was amongst the many children who always played together, including Lynnette, aboard the ship.

Have Your Say on the Future of the Marron Fishery

A favourite Western Australian recreational pastime - marron fishing - is under review.

Recreational Fisheries Program Manager Nathan Harrison said the marron fishery was fragile and current management arrangements were being reviewed to ensure the fishery was sustainable.

Mr Harrison said that interim management controls had been successful in stabilizing the catch and protecting breeding stocks since 2003, however, a long-term strategy was now required to improve the quality of the fishery.

The Department of Fisheries has released a draft management paper for public comment outlining proposals designed to form the basis of a five-year management plan for the fishery. The paper was developed by the Recreational Freshwater Fisheries Stakeholder Sub-committee.

Key proposals of the discussion paper include:

- ★ Increasing the length of the marron season;
- ★ Timing of the season (January or Easter);
- ★ Merits of a change in minimum size limits;
- ★ Possession limits: and
- ★ Managing certain areas as 'trophy waters'.

"Factors such as declining rainfall, land management practices, predation by introduced fish such as redfin perch and fishing pressure have an ongoing impact on stocks in many popular 'marroning' locations," Mr

Harrison said.

"In addition, recreational fishers have lost access to many of the State's once popular reservoirs, as they have been progressively brought on-line as drinking water supply dams.

"We know there are a lot of Western Australians who enjoy marron fishing and want to be able to do so in the future, so it is important that we have effective management arrangements in place for the available places people can fish, to protect the future quality of this important fishers."

Fishing for marron is a unique experience to Western Australia, as marron are not found in any freshwater systems outside of the State's South West. In 2005 about 5,000 dedicated marron fishing licences were issued by the Department of Fisheries.

Mr Harrison encouraged people to have a say in the future of this fishery and formally make a submission.

Copies of Fisheries Management Paper No. 198 'A Quality Future for the Recreational Marron Fishers' are available on the Department of Fisheries website at www.fish.wa.gov.au or by contacting 9482 7333. Submissions close on 16 December 2005.

A final decision on management arrangements will be made by Fisheries Minister Jon Ford in time for the 2007 marron season.

Balloons, banners, ribbons and pink, pink, pink greeted those attending the medical centre on Monday 24th October - Pink Ribbon Day - an annual Australia-wide awareness day to raise funds and awareness in the fight against breast cancer.

- Breast cancer is the most common cancer (excluding non-melanocytic skin cancer) in Australian women.
- It is also the most common cause of cancer death among Australian women.
- Y One in 11 Australian women is likely to have breast cancer.
- In 2000, 11,314 women were diagnosed with breast cancer and 2,521 women died. 86 men were diagnosed with breast cancer, and 21 died of the disease.
- The cause of breast cancer is unknown; major risk factors include age and family history.
- Every woman is at risk: only 5-10% of all breast cancers happen because of inherited genetic mutations.
- If breast cancer is detected early, while still localised in the breast, chances of five-year survival are around 90%.
- × The risk of developing breast cancer increases with age.
- Between 1982 and 1996, about 28 per cent of women with breast cancer were aged under 50 years, 44 percent were aged between 50 and 69 years, and 28 per cent were aged 70 years and over.
- Men also get breast cancer, but it's uncommon. Less than 1% of all breast cancer occurs in men.





THE NOODLE:

Who invented the noodle? The Italians, Arabs or Chinese? Well they all stake a claim.

But the discovery of a pot of thin yellow noodles preserved for 4000 years in yellow river silt may have tipped the bowl in China's favour. It suggests that people were eating noodles at least 1000 years earlier

than thought, and many centuries before such dishes were documented in Europe. The noodles were buried 3 metres deep in flood-plain sediment at Lajia in north-eastern China. The noodles came from two species of millet grass grown in north-eastern China at that time. Nature (vol 437, p 967).



17 million sites were added to the web in the year to October, according to the internet company, Netcraft.

WILDLIFE CRIME ARRESTS:

Police in London made their first arrest under a new wildlife law designed to punish those who trade in material from endangered species. Officers arrested a woman at a shop in central London supplying Chinese medicine, seizing hundreds of products which turned out to contain traces of tiger, bear, rhino and musk deer.

Type 'google' into Google and you will find that one of the hits is a new Madagascan ant Proceratium google. It was described and named by entomologist Brian Fisher of the California Academy of Sciences in San Francisco. The ant eats spider eggs. So like its namesake, it excels at locating juicy nuggets.

HELIUM:

Helium is strange stuff by anyone's standards. At temperatures where most other elements just freeze into lumps, liquid helium can flow straight up and over the side of a cup on its own. Stir some chilled helium in a coffee cup and it will continue to swirl around effortlessly forever; it is not slowed by viscosity the way ordinary liquids are. Such renegade liquids are called superfluids. Both of helium's isotopes, helium-3 and helium-4, morph into superfluids when the thermometer dips within a few degrees of absolute zero. Helium is two electrons orbiting the nucleus of the neutral atom.

ARTIFICIAL HIPS GET BUG-BUSTING COAT:

Bacteria looking to make a home on medical implants such as replacement hips are in for a shock. Researchers at Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia have chemically bonded the antibiotic vancomycin to the metal titanium for the first time. They hope it could pave the way for infection-proof implants. The antibiotic is bonded to titanium via siliconcontaining silane molecules. If clinical tests are successful the bacteriocidal implants could be in use within five years. Tens of millions of people a year have

medical implants, and 6 per cent of these develop lifethreatening infections as a result. (Chemistry and Biology, vol 12, p 1041).

TEKTITES:

Farmers and other people around Lake Grace find tektites on roads and in the bush when walking. If you put them up to the light, they are coffee coloured. These tektites are made from sand from an impact area thought to be in Indo-China, on the Cambodian border and are very hard glass, rating from 3 to 5. They are found all the way to Tasmania. The tektites found around the bottom half of Western Australia are called "normal", and made from silica between 65% and 82% and have almost total lack of water. Other components of tektites found in other parts of Australia include aluminium oxide, iron oxide, magnesium, calcium, potassium and sodium and minor amounts of titanium and manganese. If anyone wants to know more, I have the latest book on them.

If anyone would like to have a look at the Geological Survey Maps of the area, I have them from Williams down to Jingalup and through to Mylies Beach, up to Hyden and Gibb rock. The Dumbleyung map covers from Williams across to Burngup, down to Jingalup and across to Ongerup. The booklets that go with the maps show all the types of trees, rocks and sediments as well as the age of the lakes and rocks found in the area and where all the types of minerals are found.

EARTH'S COOL PAST:

Meteorites preserved in Antarctic ice are providing baby -snaps of the newly born Earth. Soon after Earth formed, 4 to 5 billion years ago, a Mars-sized object smashed into it, chipping off the moon and changing the Earth's chemical make-up. All history of primitive materials would have been wiped out as the temperatures soared to above 1500°C. So to find out what Earth was like before then, scientists examined 29 meteorites from the Antarctic, of the type known as chondritis, which are believed to have formed in the same gas cloud as Earth. They analysed them for elements such as cadmium, thallium and indium, which evaporate at high temperatures. Their concentrations suggest that early Earth was around 500°C, which is 200°C cooler than previous estimates. (Environmental Chemistry. Vol 2, p 215).

BADGER BRUSHES:

The last thing a man wants to think of in the morning, is that the shaving brush he is using, is made from the hair of protected Eurasian badgers. Tests have found that the hair in shaving brushes are only supposed to come from the South-East Asian hog badger.

Warning on Harvest Time Dangers

Western Australia's agriculture industry has one of the state's highest rates of work-related injuries and fatalities, prompting a call from WorkSafe to farmers to take all possible safety precautions as the harvesting season gets under way around the State.

WorkSafe WA Commissioner Nina Lyhne said today hazards and risks are particularly high especially when farmers are facing great pressure to get the harvest done quickly," Ms Lyhne said. "In these circumstances it is especially important they pay attention to their safety responsibilities.

"Many deaths and injuries in the farming sector involve machinery, machine guarding and fatigue.

"Ensuring that equipment is well maintained, properly guarded and serviced regularly and workers adequately trained in the use and servicing of equipment is crucial. Of the 18 tractor related fatalities in WA since 1988, WorkSafe believes half may not have happened if tractors had been fitted with roll-over protective structures or protective cabs."

Ms Lyhne said it was also important to make sure that machinery operators have adequate rest breaks in order to reduce the risk of fatigue. Long working hours and the associated fatigue are significant occupational safety and health issues that require particular attention during harvest time.

The Occupational Health and Safety Commission is currently developing a working hours code of practice.

In order to support farmers in developing safe systems at work the Government has provided funding for independent rural safety advisers who are currently working in the rural community. They are holding farm walk throughs, doing demonstrations to highlight best safety practices as well as conducting risk assessments.

These services are offered free of charge under the Government's farm safety strategy introduced last year by Consumer and Employment Minister John Kobelke.



Annual Ryegrass Toxicity Moves Northwards

The first case of Annual Ryegrass Toxicity (ARGT) for the year has been detected - 50km north of the usual 'risk areas'.

Until recently the danger area ranged from Three Springs and Perenjori in the North, down through Northam and Merredin and all the way down to Cranbrook. There have also been cases reported in the Esperance area previously.

The presence of ARGT in previously "clean" areas is a warning to producers who are grazing sheep, cattle and other stock including horses on pasture paddocks containing annual ryegrass throughout the state. A farmer north west of Morawa has recently lost 20 calves and 10 adult breeder cows.

Farmers should be aware that ARGT can be spread by machinery and hay movement. Running water and strong summer wind can also move the bacterium that causes ARGT.

Producers are advised to implement a biosecurity plan to minimise the risk of this disease and other pests, weeds, seeds and diseases being introduced onto their

Producers should also be alert for the signs of ARGT in stock. Affected animals will develop nervous signs from four days to 12 weeks after the start of grazing on affected paddocks.

Initially stock may not want to move, or if they do move, they walk with a stiff-legged gait, they can collapse and convulse when driven. Once you stop driving them they can settle down and appear to have recovered. When they are resting they may stand with their legs wide apart, swaying and drooling from the mouth. Muscle twitching may also be apparent. Animals can die from the convulsions, although some mildly affected animals can recover.

Affected stock should be moved at their own pace into a known safe paddock providing fresh water and good quality hay. Sick animals can be drenched with water to avoid dehydration. After moving stock into the safe paddock the problem should decrease after seven days. If it is not slowing down then producers should check for continued exposure to toxic plant material within the safe paddock.

Producers should be on the lookout for ARGT from early October in the Northern Region and from late October, early November in the Southern Region. A second wave can also occur when animals are introduced onto infected stubble paddocks. Producers should also be aware that ARGT can occur at any time of the year when feeding toxic hay or fodder to stock.

Producers are advised to test paddocks for ARGT. Test kits are available from the Department of Agriculture and there is a subsidy for testing conducted before 18 November which will reduce the cost to approximately \$30.

Advice on long-term strategies to prevent ARGT can

also be obtained from DAWA and the stockguard sheep and biosecurity plan is online www.agric.wa.gov.au or can be picked up at the local DAWA office.

Workshops will be conducted in the Three Springs or Mingenew areas in March 2006 to plan for next year and to assist growers develop a year round control program. 



David Rhodes Chain Letters

The "David Rhodes" chain letters are doing the rounds again!

Consumer Protection issued a public warning early in 2004 about a chain letter telling how Perth man, David Rhodes, claimed to have turned \$218 into \$78,000 in just 60 days!

As a result of the publicity in 2004, concerned members of the public sent around 17,500 of these chain letters to Consumer Protection. West Australians, who participated in the scheme, received formal warnings to cease all involvement or risk prosecution.

The David Rhodes letter is a scam. Consumer Protection has seen the same scam, promoted under different names including Edward L Green, Paul Collins and David Stein, doing the rounds since the mid-1970s. It is amazing that the same scam has been around for 30 years.

This how it works:

A four-page letter is either faxed to you or arrives in the mail telling you 'not to bin this immediately' and to 'think about it for a few days'. David Rhodes, a fictitious identity, uses all the best scam-triggers by appealing to our desire to provide well for our family, have more money, be successful and get it all quickly by doing very little. Sounds too good to be true, doesn't it? Well, it is!

He tells you that it is a 'perfectly legal business opportunity' and here is all you have to do:

• Send \$10 to the person with a number #1 next to

- their name on a list of five that arrived with your letter
- Delete that person and move everyone else 'up' the list, putting your own name and address at number #5
- Copy 200 of 'new' letter and send out to 200 people you have found through the phone book or other source

Do this within 60 days and your \$70,000 will start rolling in!

Mr. Rhodes also notes that if you decide not to participate, then you should pass the letter onto someone else and watch him or her succeed.

Some obvious concerns consumers should have are:

- Prosecution for participating
- Having your name and address widely distributed
- Alienating your family & friends if you involve them

Chain letters requesting money, even if disguised as a 'gift' like in this one, are illegal in much the same way as pyramid frauds are and participants can be prosecuted. The maximum penalty is \$20,000.

You should not bin this letter if you get it. Simply contact Consumer Protection on 1300 30 40 54. Alternatively, you may send it to *WA ScamNet:** Reply Paid 64772, Locked Bag 14, Cloisters Square, WA, 6850, (Fax) 9282 0862.
