New Bike Track for Kindy!

The Lake Grace Lions Club has cemented their position as a leading civic organisation within our community when, with the able assistance of fifteen volunteers from Curtin University, they constructed a new bike track at the Lake Grace Kindergarten.

Each year the Lions Club hosts students from the John Curtin Weekend to come down to Lake Grace to become involved in a community project. This year fifteen students came down by bus on Saturday morning and under the supervision of members of the Lions Club, assisted in preparing and making the new bike track. The Lions Club met all costs involved with this project.

The old bike track at the Kindy was just over thirty

years old and was well and truly worn out by years of use. Peter Stoffberg volunteered to organise the overall project, his first job being to organise having Simon Trevenen come and removed the old bike track. Once this was completed John de Vree worked out what equipment and materials were needed for the project, organised the formwork and went to the Kindy to begin the initial stages of the track.

Early on the Saturday morning John de Vree, Lawrie Dickins, Chris Harvey, Nick Maalouf, Grant Medlen, Peter Stoffberg and Ray Williams; all members of the Lake Grace Lions Club, began preparing the track before the student's arrival. The students arrived by bus at 10.45am. After





Step Forward for Lake Grace Daycare

Gaillene Kennedy, co-ordinator of Lake Grace's branch of Gnowangerup Day Care, was thrilled with the overwhelming support that the proposal for a site specific day care centre received at the September Shire Council meeting.

The Gnowangerup Family Support Association was founded in August 1989 and is involved in the care of 160 families in the Great Southern. GSFA has two mobile vans operating; one travelling to Borden, Ongerup and Tambellup; the other to Lake Grace and Newdegate. They are currently in discussion with the Cranbrook community.

Daycare commenced its mobile service in Lake Grace in 1992, operating one day per week before increasing to 2 days in 2002 and 3 days in 2004. Since its beginnings it has been situated at the Pavilion, not an ideal venue but it met the needs of the time. High standards and rigorous auditing have raised questions as to the security of the pavilion; it is also difficult to reconcile a carpet that may have fielded the contents of food and drinks over the sporting weekend will then become the bedding down and play area for the children of Lake Grace. After 18 years our community has recognized that day care is here to stay and needs a permanent home that better meets the needs of our children.

Over the last two decades, day care has grown from one day per week to three, with Gaillene and her staff doing a fourth day in Newdegate. This increase in daycare days has been a double edged sword; good for families but it has also meant that the pavilion has become less available to the community. A site specific Day Care centre will make the pavilion more freely available for meetings and sporting events throughout the week. On average Day care is looking after 15 to 21 children per day. The service offers an opportunity to mothers to study, work or simply run errands without having to tow their children behind them. Where once grandparents or friends may have fulfilled any 'child minding' activities; changes in the family dynamic has meant that grandparents are often working themselves or don't live within the same community as their children and grandchildren.

The site that has been earmarked for a permanent daycare structure is the area west of the present kindergarten building; between the shed and the fence. Daycare would share the grounds with the kindergarten but retain an independent building. The daycare facility would also be used by Playgroup and the Toy Library. The multipurpose use of these grounds would be beneficial to the children of Lake Grace, building a familiarity for them that would help with their transition into the education system.

The Shire is currently working with the Education Department (premises belong to the Shire but are leased by the Education Department) and Gnowangerup Day Care to complete a lease

agreement. Community Development Officer, Ms Michelle Slarke will now be looking for funding sources. It could be 12 months before we see further steps forward in the process, Gaillene and staff are glad that they have pushed for this to happen but are mindful that without the numerous phone calls and letters of support from within the community, the process may not have moved this far along.

Jan House, Director of Gnowangerup Family Support Association, is pleased that the Lake Grace Shire Council is seeking to be proactive for the families of Lake Grace.

Azella Trevenen would like to thank everyone who brought from her stall at last Saturday's Market Day.
The \$163.45 that was raised has been given to Constable Clive to put towards pens for the children in Africa.

ZERO WASTE STRATEGIC WASTE MANAGEMENT PLAN - Public Comment Invited

The Shires of Lake Grace, Cuballing, Dumbleyung, Narrogin, Pingelly, Wagin, Wandering, West Arthur, Wickepin, Williams, Woodanilling and the Town of Narrogin combined resources to prepare a Draft Regional Strategic Waste Management Plan. The Regional Strategic Waste Management Plan has been developed in alignment with the Waste Management Board of Western Australia's Zero Waste Plan Development Scheme. The purpose of this Plan is to provide strategies and actions to guide the Local Governments and communities of the region to improve waste management practices consistent with the State's vision of Towards Zero Waste which has a 2020 deadline. After consideration by each of the twelve Councils, it is now necessary to place the plan on public exhibition for thirty days for comment and feedback. 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Welcome to Night Watch for the fortnight from midnight Friday 24th October to midnight Friday 7th November. Astronomy is looking up. Daylight saving timeshave been accounted for.

Our Local Star "The Sun" resides in the constellation of Virgo until Saturday 1st November when it will rise in the constellation of Libra. The Sun's visual magnitude is -26.72 and is 0.993 Astronomical Units, or 148 million kilometres away; a distance which light takes 8.5 minutes to travel. As you see the Sun rise or set, it actually happened 8.5 minutes before.

Morning twilight on Saturday 25th begins at 3:51am and evening twilights ends at 7:55pm. On Friday 7th November morning twilight starts at 4:36am and evening twilight ends at 9:10pm.

The **MOON** at 18% on Saturday 25th in the constellation of Sextans (the sextant) will be 5° (2 fingers at arms length) south of the ringed planet Saturn in the morning sky. On Tuesday 28th in the morning twilight, the 2% Moon will be very close to the planet Mercury at 0.3 (very close) south in Virgo. The New Moon will occur at 8:06am on Wednesday 29th in Virgo. On Saturday 1st November the 7% Moon in Scorpius will be 0.06° (very close) north of the red supergiant star Antares (heart of the scorpion) and also 3° south of the bright planet Venus. On Sunday 2nd at 2pm the 12% Moon will be at Apogee (furthest) at 405,724 km/s from Earth in Ophiuchus. The 27% Moon on Tuesday 4th in Sagittarius will be 1.9° north of the bright giant gas planet Jupiter. On Thursday 6th in Capricornus, the 45% 1st quarter Moon will occur at 2:55pm in the east/ north east at 45°.

The Moon on Friday 7th in Aquarius will be 1.1° south of the planet Neptune.

MERCURY at magnitude -0.7 rises in the morning twilight in Virgo but is not observable.

VENUS in the constellation of Scorpius on Saturday shines at a very bright magnitude -3.9 and sets in the evening sky at 9:21pm in the west/south west from 200 million km/s distant. On Sunday 26th Venus will be 3° north of the red supergiant star Antares high in the west/south west. In Ophiuchus Venus on Saturday 1st November will be 3° north of the 7% Moon. On Friday 7th Venus sets at 10:45pm in the constellation of Ophiuchus (the serpent carrier).

MARS the red planet is in the constellation of Libra on Saturday at a distance of 370 million km/s, sets in the evening twilight at 7:25pm in the west/south west and will slowly move closer to the Sun.

JUPITER: the giant gas planet in the constellation of Sagittarius shining at a bright magnitude -2.2 high in the western evening sky to just after midnight. On Tuesday 4th November Jupiter will be 1.9° north of the 27% Moon. Jupiter sets just after midnight on Friday 7th in the west/south west.

SATURN: the ringed planet in the constellation of Leo

shining at magnitude +1.0 rises at 3:26am on Saturday in the east/north east at 5° of the 18% Moon. On Friday 7th November Saturn rises at 3:38am.

URANUS: the blue/green coloured disc in the constellation of Aquarius at magnitude +5.8 is high above in the north/north east at 38° at 8pm and sets on Sunday at 4:27am. On Friday 7th Uranus remains in the sky until after midnight setting at 4:27am on Saturday.

NEPTUNE: the grey/green coloured disc in the constellation of Capricornus at magnitude +7.9 is high above in the north at 40° of the horizon on Saturday at 8pm and sets 2:24am on Sunday. On Friday 7th November Neptune will be 1.1° south of the 55% Moon and sets Saturday morning.

The Moon this fortnight travels through the constellations of Sextans on Sat 25th at 18% illumination, Leo on Sun 26th at 11%, Virgo on Mon 27th at 5%, Tue 28th at 2% and Wed 29th at 0% N.M. Libra on Thur 30th at 1% and Fri 31st at 3%, Scorpius on Sat 1st Nov. at 7%, Ophiuchus on Sun 2nd at 12%, Sagittarius on Mon 3rd at 19%, Tue 4th at 27% and Wed 5th at 36%, Capricornus on Thur 6th at 45% and Aquarius on Fri 7th at 55%.

This is a good time to view the Moon with binoculars and telescopes as each night the Moon is very different as the light from the Sun filters through the hills and mountains, also good to view the craters. You will also notice the Moon follows the Earth and not the Sun's path along the Ecliptic as the Moon can either be north or south of the Ecliptic.

ECLIPTIC: the mean plane of the Earth's orbit around the Sun. It is also the path of the Sun against the background stars.

MAGNITUDE, Stellar: a measure on a logarithmic scale of the brightness of a celestial object considered as a point source. Fainter stars have numerically larger magnitudes. The brightest stars, excluding the Sun, are about magnitude 0; the faintest star visible to the unaided eye is about magnitude 6. A star of magnitude 15 is one-millionth as bright as the half dozen brightest stars of magnitude 0. Stars as faint as magnitude 28 can be seen with powerful terrestrial or spacebourne telescopes. The Sun is magnitude -26.72, Full Moon -12, quarter Moon -6, Venus to -4, Mercury to -3, Jupiter to -2.6. The brightest star besides the Sun is the star Sirius in the constellation of Canis Major at -1.47.

Viewing of the Sun, moon, stars, planet's, galaxies, planetary nebulae, star clusters and the pointing out of the constellations is free at my house and can be arranged at your place if you live out of town for the cost of fuel. All enquiries welcome day or night.



Thirteen Ways to Flood Recovery – Lotterywest Grant for Lake Grace

A Lotterywest Special Initiatives grant, launched next week, will see \$508,720 committed to thirteen flood recovery projects in and around Lake Grace. The Hon. Kim Chance MLC will launch the Lake Grace Flood Recovery Project on Friday October 31 at Lake Grace Shire Visitor Information Centre.

In January 2006, Cyclone Claire created a Natural Disaster in Lake Grace, dumping 230 millimetres of rain on the town over two days. Floodwaters flowed through the streets and farms, and isolated the community for thirteen weeks.

Two years on, the floodwaters have long receded and Lake Grace has rebounded with a plan for community renewal. Local community groups nominated thirteen projects that would create the widest benefits and have the most positive effects.

These include Lake Grace Cemetery restoration and improvements, tree planting and re-vegetation of Shire gravel pits and townsite remnant bushland, improvements to Lake Grace Shire Visitor Centre, and street furniture and shade structures for Lake Grace town centre.

"These projects will benefit our community at many levels and in many ways", said Lake Grace Shire President, Andrew Walker. "They will inject considerable funds into our local economy and improve our sustainability. I invite all community members to the project launch and celebration of our recovery."

The funding will also reduce the workload of volunteers by employing local people to complete a number of current community projects such as the Mosaic Garden Gallery. Additionally there are opportunities for volunteer groups to complete project components as a fundraising opportunity. The Shire of Lake Grace will work with local community groups and contractors to implement the projects over the next two years.



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Searching

Handmade artworks offer a sense of connectedness that symbolises peoples needs to get in touch with their surroundings and other people and their history. Kerrie Argent and Tania Spencer's latest exhibition: **Searching** evokes such thoughts and delighted guests at the opening function.

Searching, an exhibition showcasing the work of two Lake Grace artists; Kerrie Argent and Tania Spencer, opened on Friday October 3rd at the Australian Prospectors and Miners Hall of Fame. About 120 guests were in attendance when ABC Goldfields/ Esperance presenter Fiona Cornelisse formally opened the show. Ms Argent also held two anticipated artist talks the next day. Both sessions were attended favourably.

Kerrie Argent's work was well received on the night, with eight pieces sold. Ms Argent recycles found objects, like cans and broken glass that she has collected from the Goldfields. Textiles are dyed with rust and stitched with wire so that landscapes and stories evolve. The names of the butcher, the baker and the prospectors of times gone are blended and reflected through the earthy red tones and plaited aluminium.

Tania Spencer's work explores the integration of Islam into Australian culture through the medium of wire and

the textile processes of embroidery and knitting.

Ms Spencer makes use of rural materials, like fencing wire — creating a 2metre high temple from just one coil. This body of work is a personal investigation exploring beliefs and examines some of the principals behind the Islamic culture and religion. The exhibition closes on Sunday, November 23rd, 2008.

CHEMICAL HEMISPHERE:

A "chemical equator" divides the polluted northern hemisphere and the clear skies of the south. Carbon monoxide levels, for instance, differ by 120 parts per million on either side. Samples taken by Jacqueline Hamilton of the University of York, UK, and her team show the line sits well to the north of the real equator (Journal of Geophysical Research, DOI: 10.1029/2008jd009940).

FISHY FINGERS:

Our fingers and toes were already evolving before our ancestors conquered land, it seems. A new CT scan of a fossil <u>Panderichthys</u>, one of the first fish to make excursions on land, reveals previously overlooked digit-like bones in its fin (Nature, DOI: 10.1038/nature07339).

TELOMERE TRIUMPH:

Levels of telomerase, an enzyme thought to reduce the effects of ageing by protecting the ends of chromosomes, increased in 30 men with low-risk prostate cancer after three months of healthy diet and exercise (The Lancet Oncology, DOI: 10.1016/51470-2045(08)70234-1. It seems that lifestyle changes may slow ageing and disease.

FUNGUS-TOLERANT FROGS:

Armoured mist frogs have come back from the brink of extinction.

A team at James Cook University found them prospering near Cairns, Queensland,



despite being infected with the global frog-killing fungus that wiped out most of them 17 years ago. The search for the key to their fungus tolerance is on.

GENES TELL PLANTS WHEN TO WAKE UP:

Plants use alarm clocks too, it seems, and we may one day be able to set the time of the wake-up call. Genes have been discovered that trigger a plant's growth spurt just before dawn and by tweaking them it may be possible to engineer crops that grow for longer every day and so produce bigger yields. The timing of the early-morning growth spurt



is choreographed by a plant's circadian "clock", which is reset by changes in light at dawn and dusk. The clock dictates when most physiological processes happen throughout the day, such as the uptake of water and the break-down of starch. The wakeup call works by triggering a flood of hormones before dawn that stimulates growth. The genes were found by taking samples from mustard plants at four-hour intervals and passing them over DNA microarray chips that highlight which of its genes are active.. They found that 71 hormone genes were turned on in the early morning after being inactive all night. The work also points to the cog that links the mustard plant's circadian clock to the hormonal alarm call. When analysing the DNA of the 71

genes involved 55 of them contained an identical region that, when bound by a specific protein, triggers the production of hormone. The circadian clock may stimulate the production of this yet to be identified protein, which in turn switches on hormone production and plant growth. Tweaking the production of this protein could make the genes active for longer, increasing plant growth and crop yields. Since the plant's circadian rhythm is reset by light levels and temperature, team member Steve Kay from the University of California, San Diego, suggests that this could help to "tailor crops to the new conditions caused by climate change".(PLoS Biology, DOI: 10.1371/journal.pbio.0060225).

GENETIC FOOTPRINT UNITES ALL OF INDIA:

The first humans to arrive in India from Africa 65,000 years ago left a genetic "footprint" still visible in the DNA of the country's tribes. Anthropologists have hotly debated the country's genetic make-up because of its complex history of migrations. So Vadlamudi Raghavendra Rag of the


So Vadlamudi Raghavendra Rao of the Anthropological Survey of India in Kolkata and his team analysed 2768 samples of mitochondrial DNA inherited only through our mothers - from 24 tribes all across the Indian subcontinent (BMC Evolutionary Biology, DOI: 10.1186/1471-2148-8-230). The team looked for a set of mutations called the M2 haplogroup, which is unique to India and is a subgroup of the M haplogroup of the first migrants to India. They discovered that M2 appeared in India about 50,000 years ago, and make up nearly 10 per cent of the modern tribes' mitochondrial DNA. The M2 "signatures of earliest antiquity", as Rao puts it, cut across major linguistic barriers - both the Dravidian and Austro-Asiatic language groups share these genetic markers. The traces of the earliest settlers are "not restricted to one particular population", says team member Satish Kumar. Rao agrees: "Biologically, there are no castes or tribes, there are only communities."

DINOSAUR WORLD DOMINATION WAS SHEER LUCK:

The dinosaurs dominated life for 135 million year during Earth's Jurassic and Cretaceous periods but only on luck. They were also-rans to their crocodilian cousins until climate change wiped out the competition. Near the start of the Triassic period 250 million years ago, the reptilian archosaurs split into the dinosaurs and the crurotarsans, whose only living descendants are the crocodiles. Both lived together for 30 million years and evolving at the same rate until climate change 200 million years ago wiped out all the crurotarsans— bar the crocodile although they had a much wider range of body types. So luck beat evolution (Science, DOI. 10.1126/science.1161833).




